## Former State Assemblywoman Tamara Grigsby passes at 41

Tamara Grigsby, a former state representative for Milwaukee's 18 Assembly District in the legislature, and recent director of Dane County's Department of Equity and Inclusion in Madison, died this week from health complications. She was 41.

Grigsby served in the legislature from 2005 until 2013, when she stepped down to be treated for an undisclosed form of cancer.

Following her successful treatment, Grigsby became the community outreach coordinator in the office of Dane County Executive Joe Parisi, who announced her death on Tuesday. She was recently appointed director of the county's new Department of Equity and inclusion.

“Words cannot express our sorrow over Tamara's passing or our respect for the life she lived,” Parisi said in a press statement. Both had served together in the legislature. “Tamara was a special human being whose sole motivation in life was to make a difference in the lives of others — a goal at which she excelled. She was a public servant to be emulated, but more than that she was our friend, and we will miss her so.”

The press statement went on to note funeral services were pending and the Grigsby family had requested privacy.

State Sen. Lena Taylor, whom Grigsby succeeded in her Assembly district, said Grigsby was a fierce advocate for children, particularly juvenile offenders.

“I will never forget the advocacy, in these times of Lincoln Hills, that Tamara did,” Taylor said, referring to allegations of neglect and abuse being investigated at the state's juvenile facility.

She added: “She always said one quote that I often use, which is, ‘Instead of the Department of Corrections, if we're not going to do programming and prevention, we should call it the Department of Punishment.’”

“During her time in the legislature and throughout her life, Rep. Grigsby dedicated herself to ensuring basic fairness, equality and justice for all our citizens,” Assembly Minority Leader Peter Barca said. “When she endured a life-threatening battle with cancer toward the end of her Assembly tenure, she fought as courageously and forcefully as she always did on behalf of her constituents.”

Senate Minority Leader Jennifer Shilling, who served with Grigsby on the Joint Finance Committee, said she was shocked and saddened by the news.

“Tamara was a strong, passionate, articulate voice for her community in Milwaukee and children and families across the state, and building stronger families and opportunities for everyone in the state,” she said. “I'm deeply saddened and we all hold her family in our thoughts and prayers.”

After leaving state government, she worked in the Milwaukee school district for 18 months before returning to Madison as Parisi's community relations director, charged with working with employers, public officials and community groups to reduce racial and ethnic disparities in education, employment and the criminal justice system.

Grigsby, who was single, earned a bachelor's degree from Howard University and a master's from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. As well as her career in social work, Grigsby taught at UW-Madison, UW-Milwaukee, Carroll University and Cardinal Stritch University.

## A Winner Take All Chess Match!

Political chess game being played by Chris Larson and Working Families “Party” has no rematch for our community

In the game of chess, the “king” is the most important piece on the board. But also the weakest.

Translated into political terms—specifically the race for Milwaukee county executive—self appointed “King” (and new conductor of the Black Freedom Train) Chris Larson, hopes to defeat the incumbent, Chris Abele, by using chess’ most powerful piece, the “Queen” and her minions of “bishops,” “knights” and “castles” (also known as the “rook”) to pave the way for a “checkmate.”

In my analogy, Marina Dimitrijevic, and her “White” Working Families Party represent the “queen” and her “court.”

The “pawns” are naïve Black voters who unknowingly are working against their own best interests.

While that may be a simple analogy to chess players, it may be confusing for those who don’t play the game (as well as those who blindly follow the political pied pipers, which includes anyone who is not Republican or says with a straight face that they “care about us po’ darkies”).

In last week’s column, I provided ample examples of the nefarious scheme of Chris Larson to establish a new political paradigm by stepping on—and over—Black people.

The race for county executive is more so about political pragmatism vs. the “new progressivism” than who should run county government.

What I left out last week was how Larson and strategist have duped Black voters into thinking their agenda would somehow benefit us, and the tricks used to confuse, alienate and undermine the county executive race.

According to insiders, the White Working Families Party (you should realize the “party” is not inclusive, because less than half the Black men in town are working) is not only funding literature and ads for “King” Larson, but has over 200 workers hitting doors throughout the county, particularly in the city of Milwaukee.

The “party” has become a marginal force in local and state politics, throwing its support behind candidates who subscribe to its agenda, which is not about empowering Black people, but instead seeks to create another layer of intrigue between us and the educrats, bureaucrats and politicians.

But let’s correct one glaring misrepresentation from the onset: The White...uh... “Wisconsin” Working Families Party is not a political party at all, even though that’s the lie they perpetrated for months after its inception until a mandatory financial report revealed the truth.

Members of the defrocked missionary organization ACORN founded the Working Families Party in 1998 in New York.

While the organization’s founders made public their intent to only support liberal candidates (they qualified

as an independent political party under New York law), the Wisconsin party template is far removed from the New York party. And as I noted, the Wisconsin Families Party, is not a political party.

The local WFP was actually charted by Larson and his former county supervisor colleague and cohort Dimitrijevic. Dimitrijevic is executive director and originally avoided inquiries about the status of the organization, selling it as an independent political party.

She repeatedly said the “White” Working Families Party would support “progressive” candidates and establish a new agenda that was supposedly removed from the Democratic Party platform. Black voters and candidates were expected to accept the platform without question.

Only after the financial filing did they finally admit the White Working Families Party was indeed just a Political Action Committee (PAC), funneling money and resources to selected candidates and elected officials who would be obligated to do the organization’s bidding.

But there are other reasons why Black voters should be suspect, if not openly distrustful of the WFP.

Among its early organizers was Thad Nation, owner of Nation Consulting, a public relations firm that seemingly works both sides of the political aisle. Under normal circumstances, Nation’s involvement would not be of any significance.

But that Nation is a contributor to ultra conservative causes linked to the infamous Koch bothers should send up red flags.

The billionaire Koch brothers are said to be the financial arm of the conservative right, and primary funder of Americans for Prosperity, an organization that is linked to a score of Republican candidates and conservative causes.

There is little doubt the White WFP seeks to use Larson—or vice versa—to establish itself as a primary political player at both the local and state levels. Some say Larson and the

White WFP also have their sites on Gwen Moore’s congressional seat.

Key to the Larson/White WFP is its influence over Black politicians. Larson used the White WFP as organizers and funders for half of the lawmakers representing predominantly Black legislative districts, and if you go to the WFP site, you might be surprised to see a slate of Black endorsed candidates receiving funding, campaign advice or both.

That’s not to say they are all under the thumb of the White WFP. But in politics, little is given without regard for receiving something in return.

If there is any doubt as to the agenda and clout of the White WFP watch this fall as State Rep. Mandela Barnes challenges State Senator Lena Taylor for her seat.

The White WFP and Larson are underwriting Barnes’ campaign with the express intent of adding that seat to their collective.

Several years ago I ran into Barnes—who I didn’t know until we were introduced—and asked him if the rumors that he was going to challenge Jason Fields for his assembly seat were true.

Fields, a pro-Black African American lawmaker (sounds like a misnomer unless you think it through) was the most effective minority lawmaker of the era if bills passed in a Republican majority legislature are the measurement used.

But like State Rep. Polly Williams, Fields made the mistake of putting his people before his party, and committed the cardinal political sin of trying to work with Republicans to advance legislation that would benefit the Black community.

Barnes told me he had no intention of running against Fields, who he admired and considered a great legislator.

Several weeks later, I was visiting Coffee Makes You Black coffee shop and café when I saw a campaign poster for Barnes. I was shocked, angry and felt betrayed.

The White WFP and Larson reportedly ran Barnes’ campaign, viciously attacking Fields, including distributing literature that made it appear as if the incumbent was in bed with Governor Scott Walker and Republicans. In this toxic era of partisan politics, you know how that story ended.

I went to school with Barnes’ father, so I know he comes from good stock. The junior Barnes has consistently said the right things when pressed on issues impacting the Black community. But it makes you think long and hard when, as the new chair of the Legislative Black Caucus, his first order of business was to invite White lawmakers with ties to the White WFP to join the ethnic body.

The White WFP also used its resources to oust State Rep. Beth Coggins, another pragmatic lawmaker. And now, the “party” and King Larson have set their (gun) sites on Taylor, another pro-Black lawmaker whose crime is not bowing down and kissing the ring of the “King.”

After becoming minority leader, Larson removed Taylor from her position on the powerful joint finance committee and reassigned her to the

## Black churches engage in winning the fight against prostate cancer

PHEN credits churches with progress in recent prostate cancer death decline

BOSTON (BlackNews.com) -- The Prostate Health Education Network (PHEN) announced today that it credits its partnership with Black churches for helping to make important progress in the fight against prostate cancer within Black Amer-

ica. Over the past 12 years, the overall death rate for prostate cancer has dropped by 40%, and declined at a rate 6% faster for black men than for white men, according to government statistics.

PHEN’s mission is to eliminate the

African American prostate cancer disparity and partnering with churches is a key part of its strategy.

Prostate cancer is the most common non-skin cancer for men in the U. S., and the second leading cause of cancer deaths, following lung can-

## Supportive families can reduce impact of racial discrimination on faster biological aging

ATHENS, GA. – A supportive family environment can help reduce the biological impact of racial discrimination on adolescent African-Americans, according to a new study by the University of Georgia's Center for Family Research.

The study also demonstrated that African-American youths from less supportive families who experienced high levels of racial discrimination showed signs of greater epigenetic aging, an index of aging in cells and tissues.

The results further established that chronic stressors can trigger harmful physiological responses that place young people at greater risk for chronic diseases during mid-life.

"Living in a family environment that is emotionally supportive, predictable and organized can create a barrier between outside stressors, like racial discrimination, and the biology of young people," said the study's lead author Gene Brody, who is the director of the UGA Center for Family Research and housed in the College of Family and Consumer Sciences.

"This study shows that families are able to ameliorate negative effects of being exposed to stress, like discrimination."

Previous research has shown that

While cumulative stress has been shown to damage, or "weather" physiological systems, the study sought to measure exposure to racial discrimination across adolescence among African-American youths in rural Georgia and determine whether the adolescents' family environments were able to offset these effects.

Researchers examined data from 616 adolescents in two separate lon-

gitudinal studies: the Strong African-American Healthy Adult Project, or SHAPE, and the Adults in the Making project. Both studies followed the participants for more than five years.

The 322 SHAPE participants resided in nine rural counties in Georgia, with 46 percent of the participants living below federal poverty standards.

Similarly, the 294 AIM participants were recruited from public schools in six rural Georgia counties,

Trump's violence inciting rhetoric such as "If Someone Throws a Tomato at Me, Beat the Crap out Of Them. I'll Pay Your Legal Fees". Or ""We used to take people like that out on a stretcher. I want to punch him in the face! Get em outta here!"

GET EM OUTTA HERE!"

He directed security to kick Bernie Sanders supporters out from his Vermont rally and to confiscate their coats. "Throw them out into the cold," Trump ordered security, as protesters shouted "Bernie! Bernie!" Trump said it was "fun" to have the protesters attend his events and kick them out.

"It's about 10 degrees below zero outside. ... You can keep his coat; tell him we'll send it to him in a couple of weeks, don't give them their coats," Trump added. "No coats! Confiscate their coats."

At a recent rally in Fayetteville NC, John McGraw, a Trump supporter, sucker punched Rakeem Jones as he was being escorted out by security guards. Ironically as soon as Rakeem was punched, he was taken to the floor by several security officers and later escorted out of the rally. John McGraw who was not touched nor approached by security was later charged with assault. However, while still at the rally, he said he really liked "knocking the hell out of that big mouth". "He deserved it, he was not acting like an American and the next time we see him, we might have to kill him." Donald Trump takes no responsibility for these violent confrontations.

America's DNA is racism and about one third of its citizens are racist based on skin color alone. During presidential elections, racism raises its ugly head to record heights. However, few candidates looking for Black votes will speak kindly of African Americans on selected oc-

casions. African Americans have no dedicated advocate during these elections.

In the past two presidential elections, the anti-Black advocates were principally members of the Republican Party. Sarah Palin and the Tea Party most specifically.
