FEEDING HUNGRY CHILDREN, BECAUSE HE WAS ONE

WASHINGTON --- Paul Taylor knows what it's like to be hungry. He knows what it's like to not have enough food at home.

"We couldn't just go in and out of mom's fridge," Taylor, 50, said of growing up in southwest Washington with his four sisters. "We had to eat what was there."

Consequently, he knows personally how important free meals can be to children, because it was important to him personally siblings.

"It was good for us, because we were able to get something other than what we had," he said.

It was from those recollections of his personal experience that Taylor, manager of the King Greenleaf Recreation Center in southwest Washington, agreed to partner with Capitol Food Bank and offer a free afterschool meals program at his center.

The food bank, an organization that works to reduce hunger through a number of free meal program, reached out to King Greenleaf, and Taylor accepted.

"I saw a need for a hot meals program, especially during the winter time," Taylor said.

King Greenleaf Recreation Center has been running the program, Kid's Café, Monday through Friday for almost four years. The program provides nutritional afterschool meals to children ages 5 to 18.



The program serves about 19 children daily. It has 32 children that are signed up for the program, Taylor said.

He said he is not just trying to provide the children something to eat, but also food that is good for the them.

"I go in a lot of households, and what the kids are eating is full of sodium," he said. "It is so important that these kids receive nutritional meals."

David*, 10, is a 4th grader at nearby Amidon-Bowen Elementary School. He said he, loves attending King Greenleaf every day to play basketball and other sports.

A bonus for him, he said, is knowing he can have a hot meal. He particularly likes the macaroni and cheese.

"I go in a lot of households, and what the kids are eating is full of sodium," he said. "It is so important that these kids receive nutritional meals."

It's important, he said, because he is hungry after school.

Most of the children in the program attend Amidon-Bowen Elementary School, other charter schools in the area, as well as Jefferson Middle School and Eastern and Woodrow Wilson high schools.

Though the schools in the area serve meals for breakfast and lunch, the recreation center is the only center in the area to serve the meals after school, Taylor said.

Most of the children in the Kid's Café program also participate in the various athletic and arts programs at the center, he said. Often, however, they come to the center just to eat, he added.

"We don't turn anyone down," he said. "If they are under 18, we can serve them."

Taylor said he and the staff have a very strict regimen regarding the meals.

"When they arrive, we take the temperature of each component," he said. "If it is within standards, we accept it. If it is not within standards, we can reject the meal."

Each meal contains a meat, a fruit or vegetable, a carbohydrate and a carton of milk.

Salisbury steak, barbeque chicken, tuna fish, chicken

The Sweet Rewards of Gardening; Start with Strawberries

One of the first food plants you'll see at garden centers are strawberries and there's lots of good reasons to get them growing in your garden.

Kids are likely to enjoy the sweetness of strawberries even more if they're involved in the planting, growing, and harvesting. Planting strawberries will offer a healthy way for children to learn about natural sweetness, and kids love watching them grow, seeing the flowers and bees and then seeing the fruit develop and turn color.

After developing a sense of ownership of their strawberry plants, they'll love eating the fruits of their labor. Getting kids in the garden will provide good, healthy exercise and an opportunity

for them to nurture nature and see, first hand, just where food comes from!

Plus homegrown strawberries just plain taste better than store bought. Strawberries are cold-hardy and very adaptable, so they're really easy to grow. You can grow them in containers, hanging baskets, raised beds or in-ground, making them accessible to everyone, no matter how much space you have -- or don't have. Growing "Ever-bearing" strawberries, like Bonnie Plants' "Ever Sweet", "Quinalt", "Tristan" or "Loran" varieties will keep you well supplied throughout the entire season and into fall.

If you want to keep it really simple, or you just don't have in-ground garden space, plant strawberries in a container, or you can buy them already planted in a hanging basket. Just remember that container plantings need more water than in-ground plantings, usually once a day, and if it's hot, twice a day. Planting in a "strawberry pot" is easy too and you can fit several plants in just one pot; just make sure whatever type of garden pot you use has good drainage.

There are two main types of strawberries, "June-bearing" and "Ever-bearing". June bearing varieties, like Bonnie Plants' "All-Star", bear all at once, usually over a period of about 3 weeks, they're high yield and produce very large, juicy, sweet berries in late mid-season.

"Ever Bearing Strawberries like Bonnie Plants' "Ever Sweet", "Quinalt", "Tristan" and "Loran" will set fruit through late spring and then bloom and bear again in late summer and fall. When you grow your own Ever Bearing strawberries, you'll get a good, steady crop of sweet, ripe strawberries all season long. Pick a strawberry variety that suits your geographic region for best results.

Tips: *When planting strawberries, be sure the crown is above

soil level and the upper most roots are 1/4 inch beneath soil level, buried crowns rot and exposed roots dry out.

*Plant approximately 14 to 18 inches apart in neat rows that are separated by 2-3 feet each. Let runners fill in until plants are 7-10 inches apart.

*Use mulch to keep berries clean, conserve moisture and control weeds.

*Strawberries like well drained, fairly rich soil, so be sure to add compost or other organic matter when preparing the pot or patch.

*Strawberries need full sun, 6-8 hours per day, and frequent, deep soakings.

You'll need to feed them a plant food like Bonnie Plant Food that has nutrients that your strawberry plants will love. Just follow label directions.

*Control slugs and snails by handpicking them off plants and prevent theft from birds by covering your patch with netting as the first berries ripen.

*Pick strawberries in the morning, when the fruit is cool, and immediately put them in the refrigerator. Wait until just before you eat or cook them to rinse the berries thoroughly with cool water.

*Harvest when berries turn red. Avoid leaving ripe berries on the vine, as they'll rot quickly.

Strawberries are one of the easiest and most delicious home garden fruits to grow. Try growing them with kids, plants produce fruit throughout the summer and children will love to pick them right off the plant, wash and eat. If your kids have yet to get growing in the garden, strawberries are a perfect first choice. Kick off this gardening season--with your kids-- and get growing strawberries!

WISCONSIN KITCHEN MART SUGGESTS STORAGE IDEAS FOR THE KITCHEN

Keeping items properly stored inside a house is a task that should be addressed daily, with the kitchen, the hub of the home, presenting the biggest challenge. According to John Draves, a designer for Wisconsin Kitchen Mart, which has provided award-winning design/build services since 1951, there are a wide variety of design ideas that can enhance kitchen storage and functionality without sacrificing style.

Open Shelves: Offering ease of access and a decorating accent, open shelves provide plenty of storage while keeping everyday dishware, pots, and pans within easy reach.

Pantry Possibilities: Including a variety of options, such as shelves, pullout baskets, and shallow drawers, ensures adequate storage no matter the size of the item. "If the kitchen doesn't have room for a walk-in pantry, you don't have to sacrifice storage," Draves said. "Consider tall pullouts and drawers or shelves of varying sizes to allow for a variety of food storage needs."

Vertical Storage: "Depending on the width of the available space, you can also add pull-forward doors on cabinets (wall, base, or tall cabinets) with attached storage units for cans, baking and cooking pots and pans," Draves said. "Also, the slim space between the refrigerator and the wall is perfect for a pull-out rack to store canned goods."

Spice Drawers: Storing spices in a drawer rather than a wall-mounted rack ensures seasonings are within easy reach for cooking while protecting their delicate flavors by shielding them from sunlight, moisture, and heat.

Pots & Pan Drawer: Draves suggests storing everyday pots in a drawer with two sections: rollouts or deep drawers for big pots and a partitioned section for storing potholders, lids, and trivets.

salad, tacos, chili and baked chicken are some of the meals that are served to the children.

"We have to serve all components of the meal," Taylor said. "It is up to the child what they do with it, but we have to serve it."

Taylor said he takes pride in helping children receive meals that are nutritional.

"Having the program has really helped the community as far as nutrition," Taylor said. "I believe it's the basic component of life in general - a balanced meal."

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STUDY: Even the smell of alcohol can make it irresistible

It is known that substance abuse problems stem from a variety of factors.

Addiction can be born of a genetic predisposition, a difficult childhood and many other factors.

But now, experts have revealed that for some people, the mere smell of alcohol can send them on a downwards spiral towards dependency.

Getting a whiff of the aroma of wine, beer or liquor makes it harder for people to control their behavior, experts from Edge Hill University said.

Dr Rebecca Monk, a senior lecturer in psychology at Edge Hill, said: 'We know that alcohol behaviors are shaped by our environment including who we're with and the settings in which we drink.'

'This research is a first attempt to explore other triggers, such as smell, that may interfere with people's ability to refrain from a particular behavior.'

The team of scientists conducted a computer-based study, the results of which were published in the journal Psychopharmacology.

Participants were asked to wear a face mask that was either laced with alcohol or a non-alcoholic citrus solution.

They were then instructed to press a button when either the letter K or a picture of a beer bottle appeared on screen.

The scientists measured the amount of times the participants incorrectly pressed a button raising a 'false alarm'.

The false alarms indicated a decrease in the person's ability to inhibit their behavior when they were expected to, the scientists explained.

Dr Monk said: 'During the experiment, it seemed that just the smell of alcohol was making it harder for participants to control their behavior to stop pressing a button.'

Another Edge Hill professor, Dr Derek Heim, noted that studies of this nature can help further the understanding of addiction and substance abuse.

Dish Drawers: Create a sturdy and deep drawer to keep plates within reach for even the shortest members of the household.

"Consider adding a peg system that allows dishes to be placed in a base cabinet for easier lifting and organization," Draves said.

"Sturdy slides under the drawer can support up to 100 pounds, so heavy plates will not be a problem." Another possibility is divided drawers for convenient bottle storage.

Utensil Drawer: Partitioned and two-tier drawers for utensils/silverware, along with pre-slotted knife block drawers, are gaining popularity.

Undersink Drawer: Adding a drawer under the sink to store cleaning supplies keeps them visible and easy to reach.

Cookie Sheet Drawer: Perfect for muffin tins, broiler pans, cooling racks, and cookie sheets.

"Another option if you don't have an available drawer is a narrow pull-out near the stove or adding wood or

metal dividers to the cabinet above the refrigerator," Draves said.

Island Storage: Large islands are an excellent place to enhance storage capacity. Potential amenities include an extra prep sink, pullout trash and recycling receptacles, deep and shallow drawers, and an under-counter beverage refrigerator.

"Another possibility is a pullout cutting board with a hole, which makes it easy to brush the scraps straight into the trash bin within the island."

Rolling Cabinet/ Cart: The concept of convenient movable storage with a countertop works well in small kitchens where an island is not possible.

Kitchen Command Station: Complete with shelves and mail slots, this is the space to sort mail and it's a media charging and storage station for laptops, iPads, and smart phones. "Offering ease of use and convenient access, this is a great way to avoid paper and electronics clutter," Draves said.

Bench Seating: A breakfast nook bench, with storage under the seats, takes up less space than dining chairs.


