Lead reduction and housing highlight Mayor Barrett's 2019 city budget address

Significant investment in Milwaukee's lead poisoning reduction programs and lead service line replacements, and a continued focus on improving housing opportunities highlighted Mayor Tom Barrett's proposed 2019 city budget address to the Common Council recently.

Despite severe budget constraints created by the state, the budget proposal includes significant resources to address shared priorities among city officials, community leaders and residents.

"The budget squeeze we face — compounded by pensions, public safety costs, and disregard from Madison — seems daunting," admitted Barrett.

"Yet, great things are taking place across all Milwaukee. Enterprising people, community-minded neighbors, and organizations that work to make our city better, are all defining the future of our Milwaukee. This budget supports their vision — and our vision — for a city that is inclusive, safe, and economically vibrant."

Barrett emphasized a resounding commitment to the health and safety of

Bill Cosby, now inmate NN7687, placed in single cell

Bill Cosby spent his first night in prison alone, in a single cell near the infirmary, as he began his three-to-10-year sentence for sexual assault.

Corrections officials announced Wednesday that Cosby — now known as Inmate No. NN7687 — will serve his sentence at SCI Phoenix, a new state prison about 20 miles from the gated estate where a jury concluded he drugged and molested a woman in 2004. The \$400 million lockup opened two months ago and can hold 3,830 inmates.

Cosby will meet with prison medical staff, psychologists and others as the staff assesses his needs. Under prison policy, the 81-year-old comedian will be allowed phone calls and visits and will get a chance to exercise.

The prison's long-term goal is to place Cosby in the general population.

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Army of Ministers Lead House to House Canvass on Milwaukee's North Side

Central City religious leaders from diverse denominations unite to mobilize voters for Nov. 6

More than 40 Ministers from City of Milwaukee churches will be on the streets with their congregation members this coming Saturday morning, September 29. They will knock on every door in an 80 square block area urging people to vote on November 6 and leaving information on where and when they can vote.

The ministers will meet on Saturday, Sept. 29th at 10:00 a.m. They will convene at Canaan Missionary Baptist Church — 2975 North 11th Street -- to hold a press conference before they launch the massive canvass effort.

According to Rev. Greg Lewis of St. Gabriel's Church of God In Christ, "Our people must use their votes as a megaphone to call for jobs, health care, police accountability, safe streets and quality schools. As religious leaders

Can your Elementary Child be Taught Responsibility?

officials said. "We are taking all of the necessary precautions to ensure Mr. Cosby's safety and general welfare in our institution," Corrections Secretary John Wetzel said in a statement.

As Cosby began adjusting to life behind bars, his family and publicists vowed he will appeal his conviction on three felony sexual assault counts after the first celebrity trial of the #MeToo era.

Calling Cosby "one of the greatest civil rights leaders in the United States for over the past 50 years," spokesman Andrew Wyatt on Tuesday decried the trial as the "most sexist and racist" in the country's history.

The judge, prosecutor and jury saw it differently. "No one is above the law. And no one should be treated disproportionately because of who they are, where they live, or even their wealth, celebrity or philanthropy," Montgomery County Judge Steven O'Neill said in sentencing Cosby to an above-average sentence.

Cosby's defense team has raised the racial issue before, in 2016, before quickly scrapping it.

"We prosecute where the evidence takes us and that was done in this case," District Attorney Kevin Steele said Tuesday.

After his first trial ended in a hung jury, Cosby was convicted in April of drugging and sexually assaulting Temple University women's basketball administrator Andrea Constand. He has faced a barrage of similar accusations from more than 60 women over the past five decades, but Constand's case is the only one that went to trial.

In a statement submitted to the court, Constand, 45, said the assault and Cosby's subsequent attacks on her character had crushed her spirit, adding: "We may never know the full extent of his double life as a sexual predator, but his decades-long reign of terror as a serial rapist is over."

Prosecutor Kristen Feden said Constand told her she was happy with the sentence.

"I always look for my strength in the victims, and Andrea Constand was amazing," Feden said on NBC's "Today" show Wednesday. "Her courage and her strength was enough for me to say, 'Let's keep going.'"

Women's advocates hailed Cosby's sentence as a landmark #MeToo moment.

"Bill Cosby seeing the inside of a prison cell sends a strong message that predators — no matter who they are, from Hollywood to Wall Street to the Supreme Court —

can no longer be protected at the expense of victims," said Sonia Ossorio, president of the National Organization for Women of New York.

Cosby's lawyers asked that he be allowed to remain free on bail while he appeals his conviction, but the judge ordered him locked up immediately, saying that "he could quite possibly be a danger to the community."

Cosby — who is legally blind and uses a cane — removed his watch, tie and jacket and walked out in a white dress shirt and red suspenders, his hands cuffed in front of him.

Cosby must serve the minimum of three years before becoming eligible for parole.

Cosby's punishment, which also included a \$25,000 fine, came at the end of a two-day hearing at which the judge declared him a "sexually violent predator" — a designation that subjects him to monthly counseling for the rest of his life and requires that neighbors and schools be notified of his whereabouts. A psychologist for the state testified that Cosby appears to have a mental disorder characterized by an uncontrollable urge to have sex with women without their consent.

Constand testified that Cosby gave her what she thought were herbal pills to ease stress, and then penetrated her with his fingers as she lay immobilized on a couch. Cosby claimed the encounter was consensual, and his lawyers branded her a "con artist" who framed the comedian to get a big payday — a \$3.4 million settlement she received over a decade ago.

The AP does not typically identify people who say they are victims of sexual assault unless they come forward publicly, which Constand and other accusers have done. Five other accusers took the stand at the trial as part of an effort by prosecutors to portray Cosby — once known as America's Dad for his role on the top-rated "Cosby Show" in the 1980s — as a serial predator.

Constand went to police a year after waking up in a fog at Cosby's estate, her clothes askew, only to have the district attorney pass on the case. Another DA reopened the file a decade later and charged the TV star after stand-up comic Hannibal Buess' riff about Cosby's being a rapist prompted other women to come forward, and after a federal judge, acting on a request from The Associated Press, unsealed some of Cosby's startling, decade-old testimony in Constand's related civil suit.

In his testimony, Cosby described sexual encounters with a string of actresses, models and other young women and talked about obtaining quaaludes to give to those he wanted to sleep with.

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Incidents of prostate cancer remains high among men, higher among African American men

Prostate cancer remains the leading cancer in American men; about 2.8 million men are living with the disease with almost 30,000 men dying each year.

The American Cancer Society reports that approximately 164,690 men are expected to be diagnosed with prostate cancer in 2018, a disproportionate number of whom will be African Americans.

According to the American Cancer Society, about one in nine men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer during their lifetime.

Prostate cancer develops mainly in older men and in African-American men. About six cases in 10 are diagnosed in men aged 65 or older, and it is rare before age 40. The average age at the time of diagnosis is about 66.

Among Black men, there is a one in five chance they

will develop prostate cancer. And the mortality rate is about double that of White men.

On the positive side, prostate cancer is easily detected, and when discovered early the survival rate is exceptional.

As part of national cancer prevention month, the Prostate Health Education Network (PHEN) is joining with Froedtert and the Medical College of Wisconsin to provide information and a free prostate exam for African American men this Saturday at Pilgrim Rest Missionary Baptist Church, 3456 N 38th Street from 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

Title, 'Knowledge is the Best Defense Against Prostate Cancer,' the educational symposium is free and open to the public. Breakfast will be provided.

The symposium will provide up to date information and materials for men at risk for the disease and those diagnosed, treated and living as survivor.

The symposium will also offer information to spouses, caregivers and loved ones on how best to support these men.

Experts will be on hand to answer questions, and free prostate cancer screening will be available on site.

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

we can rebuild hope that voting makes a difference in who makes decisions that can help or hurt us."

In the 2016 elections, there were 40,000 fewer voters in Milwaukee than in 2012 -- 29,000 were African American.

Most lived in the five poorest districts in the city. Over 9,000 had no voter ID. Souls to the Polls is addressing both the lack of voter engagement and the problems with harsh new voting laws.

Voting Specialist Anita Johnson is working to make sure that barrier is down in 2018. "I am educating people

on what they need to vote, helping get their Photo ID, and making sure people have the tools to participate.

"Our community has been seriously damaged by decisions made in Madison and Washington." Says Pastor Mose Fuller of St. Timothy's Baptist Church.

We are losing resources for critical services because our community is not a priority for many politicians. In 2018, we are going to show political leaders that our voting block matters and we better be a priority in the future."

The canvass will proceed south from Chambers Street from 1st to 20th Streets, then wrap up on North Avenue.


Chances are you didn't want to look for more than three seconds any-way!

Lead reduction, housing highlight Barrett's 2019 budget address

residents by adding staffing resources to the Health Department's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program.

This budget also includes an investment of \$20 million for efforts to reduce lead risks and abate lead problems.

In 2019, Milwaukee Water Works

will support the work of the Health Department by continuing to scale up its lead service line replacement program with plans to remove 1,000 more lead connections. Positions in the Department of Neighborhood Services (DNS) were also created to conduct more lead abatement inspections in homes.

"Children in Milwaukee are safer,

and the hardworking front-line workers at the Health Department deserve credit for that," said Barrett. "We all know there have been problems in the Health Department, but we are refocusing our efforts to make sure the department continues to move in a positive direction."

The Strong Neighborhoods Plan remains a priority and will support the mayor's 10,000 affordable households commitment announced earlier this year. \$9.6 million is included in this budget to continue the initiative's efforts toward improving the accessibility, affordability, and quality of

housing options for Milwaukee residents. An additional \$500,000 is included for strategic site acquisition to maintain affordable housing in areas facing potential displacement.

In regards to public safety, Barrett touted the work of both the Milwaukee Fire Department and the Milwaukee Police Department. In the Fire Department, two positions were added to the community paramedic program to continue efforts to connect individuals with the appropriate medical resources and reduce call frequency to 911.

In order to support diversity re-

ruitment efforts in the police department, Barrett proposed adding one position to the Fire and Police Commission recruitment team.

This year Milwaukee Public Libraries saw the construction of the Mitchell Street Library and the ground breaking of the Good Hope Library. The 2019 budget will continue the successful strategy of mixed-use library developments for Capitol Drive and Martin Luther King libraries.

"Libraries are not a luxury. They're valuable resources that improve lives, create economic oppor-

tunity and bring neighborhoods together.

"Libraries are a fundamental part of the fabric of our community," Barrett said.

The anticipated start of operations for the streetcar later this year was also mentioned in the Mayor's remarks. The project is on time, and on budget with no direct impact on the city's operating budget or tax levy.

In the coming weeks, aldermen will review the Mayor's budget and consider amendments. Next year's financial plan will be finalized in November.

Cristo Rey Jesuit High School Releases Rendering of New School

Cristo Rey Jesuit High School Milwaukee today released a rendering for its upcoming new school location at 1818 West National Ave. in Milwaukee. Cristo Rey Jesuit High School, in collaboration with community partners, will anchor the community by becoming its first high school.

The new campus is located in the Clarke Square neighborhood, hosting one of metro Milwaukee's fastest-growing school-aged populations, and is more strategically and centrally located to better serve students and families. The new location will allow Cristo Rey Jesuit to educate additional children of families with limited financial means (Cristo Rey Jesuit students' average household income is \$32,500). The school projects that the earliest occupancy would be during the 2020 school year.

Now entering its fourth year, Cristo Rey Jesuit High School has outpaced its original growth projections, both in new student enrollment and retention. This led to school leadership getting an earlier start on identifying the right locale and design components for a permanent school to help the organization reach its goal of serving 500 students.

In its first four years of operation, approximately 400 students are enrolled, making Milwaukee one of the most successful launches in the Cristo Rey Network, with 35 schools nationwide. In addition, the school's Corporate Work Study Program has grown from 22 partners to 75, including all seven of Milwaukee's Fortune 500 companies.

The new school space will be more than double the current school size at St. Florian Catholic Grade School at 1215 S. 45th Street in West Milwaukee, and will allow for all academic, co-curricular and athletic programs that a college-prep high school requires, including space for athletics and parking.

"Cristo Rey is a great addition to our near south side and it will serve as a great education option for young people in the neighborhood," said Mayor Tom Barrett. "The school provides learning opportunities both in the classroom and in a variety of work place settings to prepare students to be the future leaders of Milwaukee."

School leadership engaged in comprehensive preparations required to build the right facility. Cristo Rey Jesuit has engaged more than 50 students, parents, faculty and staff in small group discussions regarding the planned move to West National Avenue and conducted a series of one-on-one meetings and small group conversations with more than 100 stakeholders.

Cristo Rey Jesuit is working with Bray Architects and CG Schmidt on concepts for a new campus. Cristo Rey Jesuit also conducted financial modeling to ensure school operations would remain healthy with the construction and opening of the new campus.

The projected cost of the new school is between \$20 million and \$25 million. The revenue sources for the project include campaign funds, new market tax credits, long-term financing and reserves from ongoing operations going forward. Cristo Rey Jesuit has launched a community fundraising campaign, called "Ignite. Invest. Impact." For more information, visit www.igniteinvestimpact.org.

"This school has, in a short amount of time, demonstrated an ability to have an impact on the lives of the kids that we're educating, on the neighborhood and the community that we're in, but just as important on the city of Milwaukee," said Cristo Rey Jesuit High School governance board chair and CEO of Husch Blackwell, Paul Eberle.

"This is really about investing in the city of Milwaukee, investing in the future of our workforce, investing in these kids, who are now given this opportunity to dramatically change the trajectory of their lives. These kids are going to be successful, we're just helping them get started."

Cristo Rey Jesuit High School Milwaukee announced last November it purchased the eight-acre property at 1818 W. National Ave. after a long-range planning committee thoroughly evaluated multiple sites and expansion options over an 18-month period. This new location is a part of Cristo Rey Jesuit High School Milwaukee's long-term strategic plan that began when Cristo Rey Jesuit opened its doors in the fall of 2015 in the renovated St. Florian Catholic Grade School at 1215 S. 45th Street in West Milwaukee.

At the time, school leaders thought the location, while temporary, would serve the community for at least five to seven years. The plan has been to grow the school carefully, one grade level at a time, to be sure it could attract enough business partners to responsibly support the work study model.

"This building is much more than brick and mortar, it's about transforming the lives of our students and their families, and we're excited about the next chapter and our impact in Milwaukee," said Andy Stith, president of Cristo Rey Jesuit High School Milwaukee.




