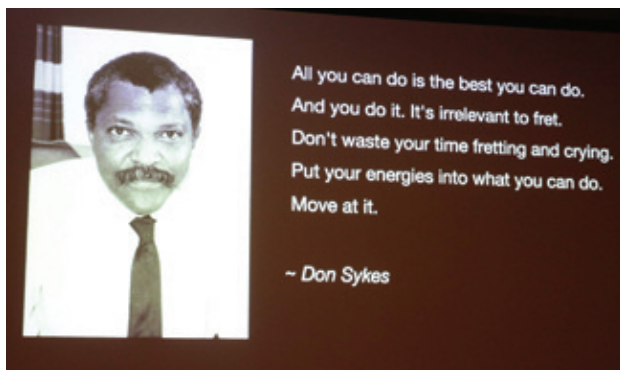
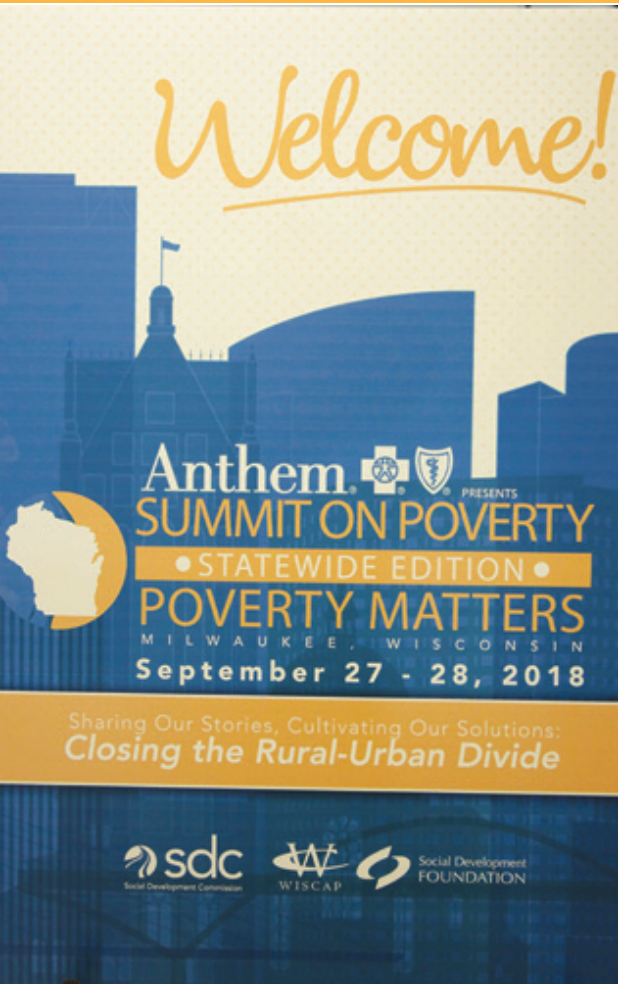

HOSTS STATE-WIDE SUMMIT ON POVERTY

Just as men contribute to sexual harassment and assault through our silence and antipathy about the social phenomena, White America similarly must take partial blame for the escalation of racism and bigotry in America though their tacit support of institutional bias and blind acceptance of White privilege.

Such was the conclusion of social activist and author Tim Wise, the keynote speaker at the Summit on Poverty held in Milwaukee last week.

Sponsored by the Social Development Commission and the Wisconsin Community Action Program the two-day state-wide summit drew hundreds to downtown Milwaukee where they attended workshops on poverty and racism and strategized around common-sense initiatives to eradicate both of those cancers.

In a sometimes humorous, and frequently sarcastic luncheon presentation, Wise said otherwise good White people contribute to racism and poverty through their silence about the interwoven social maladies

"They contribute through their complicity," he lamented, by blaming the victims or refusing to challenge institutional bias. They also refuse to recognize how racism benefits even the non-biased White American.

He used for an example, the segregation created through the escape of Whites to the suburbs. Many of the same people who decried racism, and supported school 'desegregation isolated themselves away from the people they supposedly sought equality for.

"When they discovered that the suburbs were not white enough (minorities were moving in)," he said, "they created the ex-urbs (which were further out of reach of minorities.

Wise found a collusion and cultural thread between racism and poverty, both of which have undermined the very principles on which this country was founded.

And it starts with education, or as Carter G. Woodson once declared, "the miseducation of the Negro."

"(Thomas) Jefferson, Wise noted, once said children need six years of compulsory education, the purpose of which is to "find the few" who will lead and the others of whom would follow and do the manual labor needed to sustain the status quo.

Former Education Secretary Bill Bennett said 200 years later that the 'biggest problem with education today, is too many people going to college.'

In other words, Bennett's philosophy was eerily similar to Jefferson's. Both supported a 'political paradigm' where there is two America's, one for the rich and chosen, the other for the poor.

Education both empowers and deflates students, depending on which end of the spectrum you're on.

"They say it is the great equalizer, but it is not." Instead, its pinholes individuals for certain predetermined roles in society---preparing whites to be bosses and African Americans to be the workers.

From that perceptive, and others, you can surmise that the system isn't broken, "it's doing exactly what it was created for."

It was much easier to identify those two extremes when slavery was still legal in America (it remains so for criminals as identified by the 13th amendment), thus it was necessary to create a new economic and cultural paradigm to placate and confuse those in the middle.

That scheme was focus of a century long scheme to 'racialize' poverty in America.

As part of that process was to convince White Americans merely subsisting above the poverty level, that their condition could be attributed to poor people of color who were a drain on the social services, law enforcement and deterioration of American values.

"Black folks weren't jumping off the top of buildings during the recession; only rich white folks were," Wise said illustrating how nonsensical it was to blame the poor for the economic collapse of the country.

But that seed, along with the fertilizer of racism has spouted the weeds of economic and cultural apartheid that have created the fruit that resulted in the election of Donald Trump.

While the seed was planted soon after the end of slavery, it was watered and maintained through the early 20th century and witnessed its greatest germination in the 1960s when the government and media racialized poverty.

In the "1960s media images of the poor changed," he said, noted how former Presidents Ronald Reagan and Richard Nixon introduced the false concepts of the Black welfare queen and the invasion of Black and Brown people who were draining the system through their immoral acts (having children out of wedlock).

From the vantage point of a White male, educated and financially secure, the line between racism and poverty and social destruction have since blurred.

White America now finds itself

looking up, with no one to blame but themselves.

They are unable to cope, finding themselves in the predicament that poor African Americans have survived through for over a century.

The opioid crisis provides a perfect example of where arrogance and prejudice can take you.

White America, the media and the government didn't care about drugs when they invaded the Black community in the 1960s and 70s.

And they turned their backs when Bill Clinton led politicians to distinguish between cocaine and crack, filling the prison cells with African Americans for the latter, while providing Whites with treatment for the former.

But now the chickens have come home to roost. Today heroin has found a home in the suburbs and claimed the lives of one half million White people since 1999.

"Whites didn't have the coping skills, we should have listened to the Black and Brown people."

Instead White America turned its back, it blamed the poor for their poverty and the drug epidemic on the lack of mores and values. So now, who and what do you blame the heroin epidemic on today?

The only hope for America is through a realization that we are one people, united around common ideals and citizenship, he surmised.

A step in that direction will occur when America eliminates special privileges based on economics and race.

"Everybody in this room has certain privileges," he explained, that are unique based upon class, gender and race. Some are able to drive or have checking accounts or receive benefits based on various factors.

White privilege must be eliminated and spread across the racial spectrum. The gap between the rich and poor should be eliminated. The divide between the two Americas must be closed.

And instead of trying to fix a broken system, we must all realize that the system isn't really broken all, but instead doing exactly what it was intended to do.

Thus, we shouldn't waste our time and energies on fixing the unfixable-- putting more money into a lemon---but instead buy or create a new car.

Black America's "GREEN POWER"!
African American community has the 16th largest GNP in the world!

America's "colored community" has become one of the country's most influential consumer purchasing blocks, sustaining many product lines, and "colorizing" advertising campaigns, several independent reports reveal.
The Black community now represents a \$1.3 trillion consumer market, which makes it the 16th largest (GNP) in the world, ranking higher than Spain.
According to one source, minority consumers purchased a majority of all city vegetables and grains, and over 40% of all baby food and personal health products sold in America last year.
The latest U.S. Census Bureau data shows America's brown community will become the majority in America by mid-century and already purchases a disproportionate amount of most major essential products—

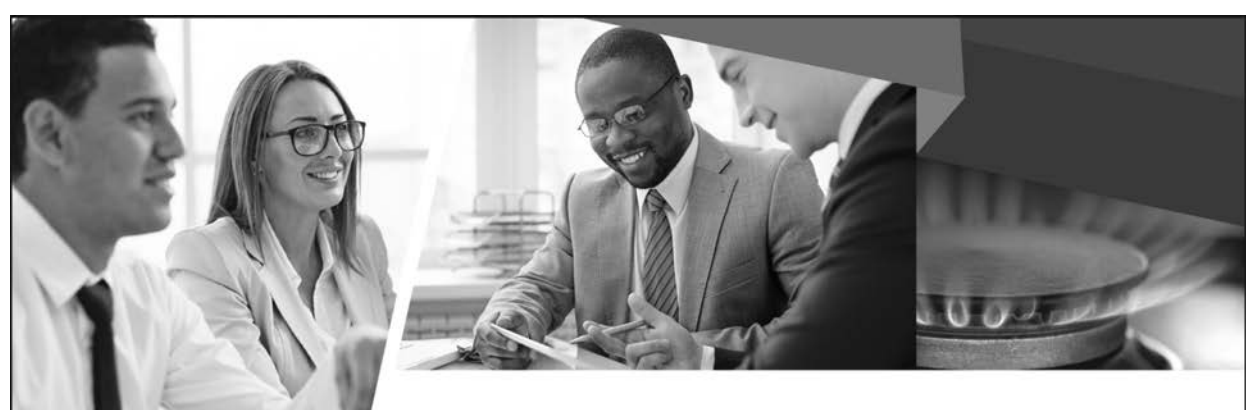
Funeral services set for former Milwaukee County Board Chairman and County Executive Lee Holloway

A memorial service will be held Friday, March 23 for former Milwaukee County Supervisor Lee Holloway, the first African American chairman in the history of the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors and county executive. He died recently at age 71.
The service will be held at Wisconsin Memorial Chapel, 13235 W. Capitol Dr. Viewing is scheduled from 9 until 11 a.m. Service will begin at 11 a.m.
A self-described "product of blue-collar, working-class people," the Milwaukee native was first elected to the board in 1992, representing the county's 5th district on the city's northside for 18 years.
He served as board chair from 2004 to 2012. Holloway assumed the county executive position in 2010, after then Milwaukee County Executive Scott Walker was elected governor. One month later, Holloway appointed former Milwaukee Common Council President and interim Mayor Marvin Pratt as interim county executive.
Holloway was instrumental in the creation of a county general assistance medical program—a health safety net—that subsequently was expanded statewide as Badger Care.
A friend of Holloway, Kabiba Fulton, believes the former board chair was instrumental in preventing Walker from being able to "suppress and oppress" the board members had to fear in proclaiming he was second-class citizens. Or as the president of the board said, "we were arrogant," who would situate in the water fountain if we were allowed to attend "white schools."
Her comments were used in the school desegregation lawsuit, which revealed there was an orchestrated effort to keep North Division a sub-par institution, while denying its students the opportunity to compete.
"Thus, as the North facility was falling down around us, MPS was building new schools where Black students would not be able to attend. Professionally, North Division showed up as a 300 on my scale again after Federal Judge John Reynolds ruled the school board had maintained a system of 'relational apartheid.'" 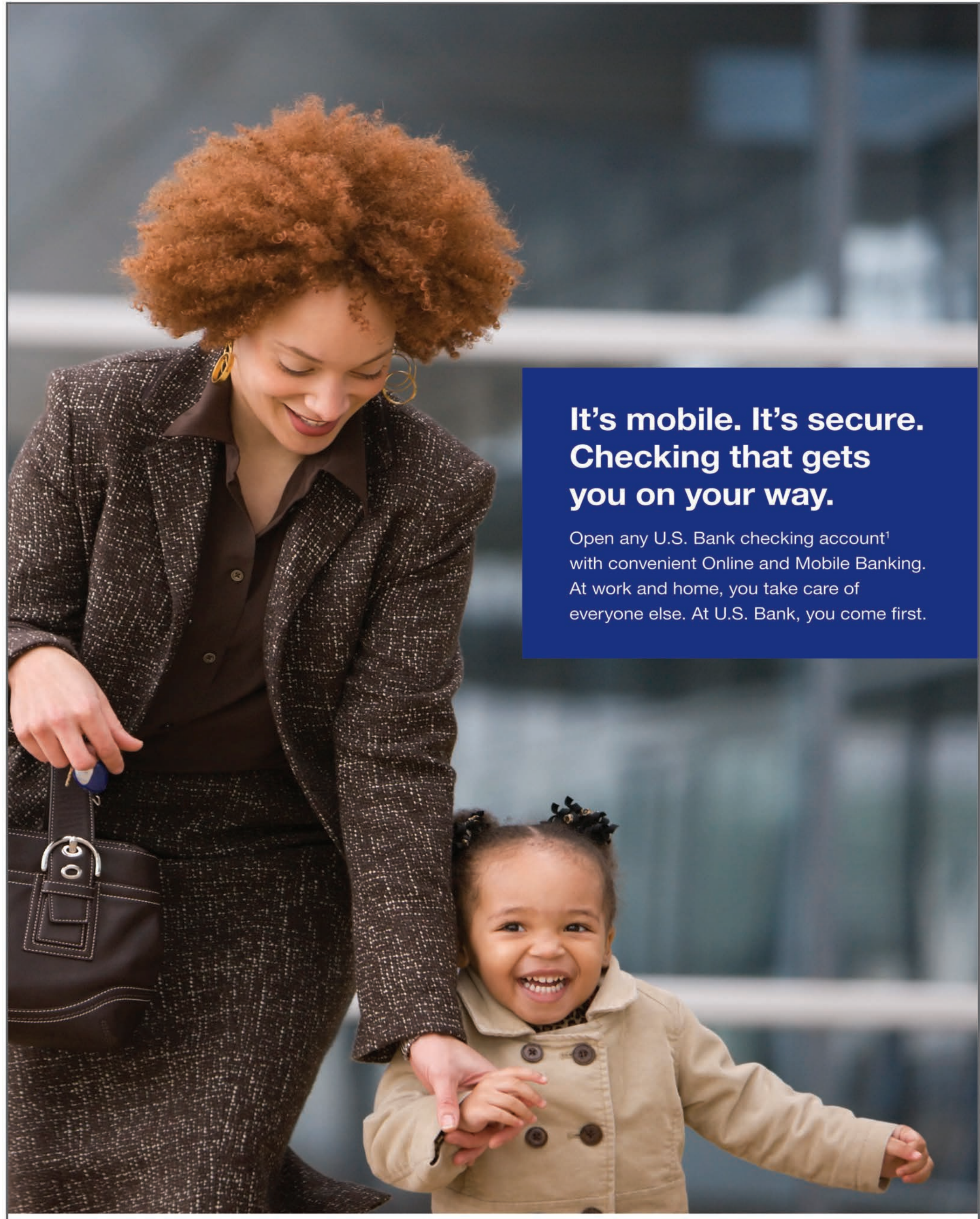
