Only 7 Black students got into N.Y.'s most selective high school, out of 895 spots

Only a tiny number of Black students were offered admission to the highly selective public high schools in New York City on Monday, raising the pressure on officials to confront the decades-old challenge of integrating New York's elite public schools.

At Stuyvesant High School, out of 895 slots in the freshman class, only seven were offered to Black students. And the number of Black students is shrinking: There were 10 Black students admitted into Stuyvesant last year, and 13 the year before.

New York Mayor Bill de Blasio has vowed to diversify the specialized high schools, which have long been seen as a ticket for low-income and immigrant students to enter the nation's best colleges and embark on successful careers.

But de Blasio's proposal to scrap the entrance exam for the schools and overhaul the admissions process has proved so divisive that the state's most prominent politicians, from Gov. Andrew M. Cuomo to Representative Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, have mostly avoided taking a definitive position — even as Black and Hispanic students are grappling with increasingly steep odds of admission into the city's eight most selective public schools.

U.S. Court says it's legal to refuse jobs to people with dreadlocks

Refusing to hire someone who has dreadlocks is legal, thanks to a recent ruling by the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission had filed a lawsuit against Catastrophe Management Solutions of Mobile, Alabama for rescinding a job offer to Chastity Jones because of her dreadlock hairstyle. The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled against the EEOC lawsuit.

According to NBC News, Jeannie Wilson, a human resources manager for CMS, reportedly told Jones her dreadlocks were "un-kempt."

Wilson told Jones that CMS would not bring her on board with dreadlocks before terminating the job offer. The EEOC, in their lawsuit, said this violated the Civil Rights Act of 1964's Title VII, arguing that dreadlocks are a hairstyle "physiologically and culturally associated" with African-Americans.



Noelani Robinson remembered at vigil

Strangers came together recently to bow their heads, pray, and remember 2-year-old Noelani Robinson, whose body was found in Minnesota Friday after being abducted by her father Dariaz Higgins days earlier.

Higgins was arrested several days after he abducted Noelani and fatally shooting one of two women, Noelani's mother Sierra Robinson in the area of 91st and Mill Road on the Northwest side. The other was wounded, but is expected to recover.

An Amber Alert went out in the city and state for Noelani. That alert came to an end late Friday when her body was found in Steele County, Minnesota.

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

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The True Cost of Peer Pressure

As we begin to wrap up our discussions about communication, it is important to always remember that not communication, but effective communication is what holds the key to a healthy parent-child relationship.

This is great for situations like when peer pressure becomes evident in your tweens life. Often misunderstood, peer pressure isn't something that just happens amongst friends. Peer pressure has been known to happen amongst people who may not even be in your child's inner circle.

Peer pressure happens the moment your tween enters a place where his or her actions can be influenced either positively or negatively. It is an unavoidable influence that every teen has or will experience.

Knowing the different types and understanding how to effectively communicate with your child when it happens, can help prevent decisions that may change the course of your tweens

life (teen pregnancy, incurable sexually transmitted disease, alcohol or drug abuse, poor behavior).

As we go into the different types of peer pressure, remember that all peer pressure isn't negative. Some peer pressure may be very conducive to the growth and prosperity of your child.

Positive peer pressure is when you are surrounded by people who have the potential to influence you to do good things you or your family can be proud of. For example: joining a book club or trying out for a challenging sport. These types of pressure are the kind that your tween would be more than happy to talk with you about at the dinner table. However, there can never be enough good conversation about these experiences and just like conversations need to be had about positive peer pressure, they most certainly need to be had when it comes to dealing with negative peer pressure.

That brings me to my next point. Negative peer pressure is

the type we mostly hear about. As tweens begin to grow into themselves and they interact with the people around them, they will soon feel the need to be liked, accepted or understood. Sometimes this want or need comes with the cost of their better judgement and integrity. So how can you tell if your child is experiencing negative peer pressure? You may notice them doing things like:

- Making negative comments.
- Making people feel bad about themselves.
- Using 'put downs'.
- Picking on people's differences.
- Discouraging others from trying.
- Teasing and harassing others.
- Bullying.
- Threatening others.
- Calling people names.
- Daring others to do unsafe things or things which could get them into trouble.
- Being rude and bad mannered.
- Using inappropriate language.
- Not considering the feelings of others.
- Not involved in positive out-of-school activities because it's not "cool"

If you ever become a witness to these particular behaviors, open the door up for conversation. As I mentioned before, communication is great, but effective communication is even better. You want to make sure you keep the floor open for when your tween goes through these phases of life. Everyone wants to feel understood and we all want to be accepted, but not at the expense of our youth's integrity and moral beliefs.



More than rhetoric should be on the agenda for the 2020 Democratic National Convention

Thanks for choosing Milwaukee as the site for the 2020 Democratic Party convention. The selection confirms that Milwaukee is indeed a city in the upper echelon of American politics; a multicultural metropolis that is ready to take its place on the national stage with a compelling history and diversity that few other cities can match.

You probably didn’t know that this “great city by a great lake” was also a station on the Underground Railroad, and one county away from the site of a major abolitionist movement. That’s an appropriate connection because there are high hopes that next year’s convention will be the catalyst for a presidential campaign that will lead to the “liberation” of America from the grip of a racist, narcissist, would-be-emperor who has this country on the brink of a second civil war.

That’s because for all the symbolism, there was little substance.

And with Trump now trying to erase Obama’s imprint and to restore Jim Crow, not all the hot sauce in the world can cover up the fact we’re being forced to make chitterlings the primary meat on our menu...again.

Yes, Milwaukee is one of the cleanest cities in America (according to some who don’t travel through the hood on a daily basis). But hidden beneath the (so-called) litter free sidewalks is Jim Crow manufactured dirt that is hidden from the public view of everyone save for those Ralph Ellison referred to as America’s “invisible people.”

And while it is true that 15 minutes west of our city is a historic site of the abolitionists northern most headquarters, today that is a community where Black Milwaukeeans are not wanted; profiled from the time they enter the city limits until they are escorted back.

Waukesha County is one of the most segregated communities in the state, just as Milwaukee is the most segregated city in the country.

Among that list are the highest Black male incarceration, infant mortality poverty rates; widest income gap and lowest fourth and eighth grade reading proficiency rates.

I have always contended that most African Americans chose our politicians based on their ability to articulate versus solve problems.

I suspect that the focus of the next presidential election will be around getting rid of Trump, versus creating a new political paradigm that will move all Americans forward.

That might be enough. But it’s only treading water; skating uphill. We deserve more than that. Our loyalty over the last-half century should be rewarded with something more than political rhetoric.

There are rumblings that some groups are planning protests during the convention. They hope to peel back the scabs and show the world the open wounds of Black Milwaukee. Remember, Milwaukee is still considered a suburb of Chicago—and I hope you remember what happened in 1968.

Of course, it’s up to you. I’ve attended a couple of conventions in the past and learned first-hand how the host cities have hidden their problems before the cameras could set up. In Atlanta, they went so far as to relocate the homeless, and reportedly give them free alcohol, until after the convention.

I hope that’s not the case next year, for if it is, there’s a good possibility the Trumpster will return to his throne (the one in the presidential bathroom) and we’ll move a step closer to anarchy.

Atlanta or Chicago?

It’s up to you.

7 Years Later: 6 Ways Trayvon Martin’s death has impacted the social and political fabric of this country



Feb. 26 marked seven years since George Zimmerman went on what feels like a Liam Neeson-esque mission to take out the first Black person he could find.

It was then that he shot and killed 17-year-old Trayvon Martin, who by all accounts was minding his own business walking from a convenience store.

Martin’s death – magnified by social media outrage and a perpetual news cycle – changed the tapestry of how America looks at race relations, and especially our inter-

actions with police.

Even as Zimmerman still walks the street a free man, the social and political ripples of Martin’s death are evident in a number of events since his untimely passing.

The Birth of Black Lives Matter

Black Lives Matter might not exist at all without Martin’s death: It started as a Twitter hashtag in its wake and morphed into a movement following the death-by-cops of Michael Brown and Eric Garner in 2014.

With Black Lives Matter protests in major cities all over the country, the movement has done a great job at staying atop of the political and social consciousness.

The Streets are Watching Everything Now

Sadly, writing details of all the Black people killed by officers of the law since Martin’s death would result in an entirely separate article.

However, the deaths of Martin, Brown and Garner helped create a culture in which folks automatically pull out their cell phones if they see police acting even slightly strange.

We’re now capturing all the horrible shit that went unseen, forcing an unprecedented level of accountability.

The Charlottesville Protest

The public response to Mar-

tin’s death doubtlessly aided in the rise of the “Alt-right,” which is a genteel title for Neo-Nazi scum.

Their little movement had its apex in the August 2017 “Unite the Right” rally, which was one of the most visible and naked organization of white supremacist hate in the United States this generation has witnessed.

The movement and its counter-protest resulted in tragedy when Neo-Nazi James Fields Jr. plowed his vehicle in a crowd, killing one and injuring dozens.

Kaepernick’s NFL Protest

When San Francisco 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick started sitting during pre-game performances of the National Anthem in 2016, he became the name and face of a movement that continues to this day.

Kaep has been blackballed from the NFL, which seems perfectly content to demonstrate that it’s unrepentant in its trash bag behavior.

He may not be making league dollars anymore, but he means so much more to so many more people now than he ever did as a quarterback

Reexamining the Confederate Flag
 Dylann Roof claimed he was motivated in part by Martin when he stormed into a Black church in Charleston, N.C. and murdered nine people during prayer service in 2015.

the anachronistic symbol of chattel slavery preservation that should’ve been buried eons ago.

The flag was removed from numerous public areas following the Charleston massacre, but we’re still working to kill it altogether, as is evidenced most recently by the cancellation of an event in Detroit involving the General Lee from Smokey and the Bandit.



Noelani was memorialized at a prayer vigil in a memorial garden, which honors the youngest victims of violence, on the city's northside. It was organized and conducted by "Guardians of the Children," a local organization whose mission is to recognize and react to child abuse and educate the public to do the same; to serve as advocates to provide strength and stability to families in crisis; and be an answer to the prayer of an abused child or teen for courage, support and protection.

Many at the vigil never met Noelani, but the loss hit close to home, especially for Margarita Fogl, the grandmother of Laylah Petersen, who was shot and killed in 2014 as she sat inside her grandparents' home.

"It's really hard because it takes me there, because it's my Laylah," Fogl reportedly said. "Even though we're going forward, we hear another story about another innocent child," she said.

Fogl said she prays no other family has to feel this pain, adding the community has to be strong and keep Noelani's family in prayer to give them strength.

Ald. Cavalier (Chevy) Johnson expressed his condolences after learning of Noelani's fate.

"There is collective heartbreak across our entire community after learning of the cold-blooded killing of Sierra Robinson, Noelani's mother, and now learning about the loss of Noelani," Johnson said in a press statement.

"Whenever someone is missing, it's important that we bring all of our resources to bear in order to locate and return them safely to family."

Johnson thanked all members of the community who prayed for Noelani, and used their social media platforms to spread the word immediately after the 2-year-old was abducted. He also thanked local media for using their airwaves to keep the story top of mind.

"Although the outcome of this case was not what anyone desired, we must remain vigilant in caring for all people and all children in our community—just like we care for Noelani."

Additionally, she has been involved in airport concessions and in addition to serving as the first African American female to chair nationally the American Automobile Association, she has instituted many programs to help other business people and to provide youth programs on business and self-help.

Daniels-Carter's influence is not limited to the U.S. After journeying to Kenya with a trade delegation headed by the former Health and Human Service Cabinet member, she and a number of her colleagues established a health facility in Kenya which serves literally thousands of people annually. In addition, Daniels-Carter initiated a micro-business initiative for hundreds of Kenyan women.

Daniels-Carter is noted for not only her business activities but for her generosity in the community.

In connection with her support of the Daniels-Mardek Boys & Girls Club she personally contributed the largest single contribution to the opening of that venue which has served literally thousands of youngsters over the last two decades. She arranged for Michael Jordan to attend the opening ceremonies and greet hundreds of youth.

Daniels-Carter is a graduate of the Milwaukee Public School system and actually is an enthusiastic sports supporter. While she played college basketball at Lincoln University she is equally proud of the impact that she has had in professional sports, serving on the board of directors of the Green Bay Packers and one of the local owners of the Milwaukee Bucks. The induction of Daniels-Carter into the Black College Hall of Fame will occur on September 27 in Atlanta, Georgia.



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
