Black premature babies face racial disparities in healthcare, study says

The prematurely born infants are subjected to a series of factors that put them at a disadvantage when it comes to health care

Black preemies face higher chances that they will receive poor prenatal care than white, Asian-American and Hispanic babies, and this is partially due to the quality of their parents' healthcare as well as segregation, according to a JAMA Pediatrics study released last week.

The study looked at black newborn babies born prematurely or with low birth weights at 700 neonatal intensive care units, according to UPI.

"Our results provide evidence for segregation and inequality in the care of very low-birth-weight and very preterm infants," researchers wrote in the study. "Compared with white infants, Black infants received care at lower-quality NICUs and Asian infants at higher-quality NICUs after accounting for region of residence."

"Black, Hispanic, and Asian very low-birth-weight and very preterm infants are segregated across NICUs reflecting the uneven distribution of minority populations in the United States," the study continues. "Explaining these patterns will require understanding the effects of sociodemographic factors and public policy on hospital quality,

access, and choice for minority women and their infants."

In the study, researchers looked at the quality of care newborns receive at NICUs including death while under care, lung disease, bacterial or fungal infections, and cases of babies developing hypothermia, and the results were all worse for Black preemies. The study revealed that Black preemies represented more than a third of all infants in the lowest-ranked NICUs (out of the 700). This compares to roughly 20 percent of babies at the highly-ranked NICUs, according to UPI.

In terms of rationale for the disparity among how infants fare in NICUs, researchers found the quality of insurance, the location of the hospital and the patient's immigration status, among key contributors to the dismal prenatal and neonatal care outcomes. Further, although 10 percent of babies born in the U.S. are premature, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, another study said Black women have double the risk of having a preemie compared to whites.

More concerning is the study found that the negative effects facing many of these Black preemies will continue long after they are born. Researchers found that premature babies who get inadequate care often go on to develop neurodevelopment impairments.

Prostate Cancer Kills More Black Men Than White Men

Socioeconomic factors and lack of access to quality treatment appear to drive the disparity

BLACK MEN ARE TWICE AS likely to die of prostate cancer than white men – and the disparity is largely driven by who has access to high-quality treatment, a new study indicates.

An analysis of more than 306,000 nonmetastatic prostate cancer cases shows that when black and white patients received the same treatment, they were equally likely to have survived the disease 10 years after diagnosis – suggesting socioeconomic status and other barriers to care may be driving the poorer overall outcomes for black men.

The findings underscore that "efforts are needed to address the modifiable social factors contributing to racial disparity in prostate cancer," researchers from the University of Michigan and more than a dozen universities and hospitals across the U.S. said.

To measure a broad swath of patients and treatment types, researchers compared prostate can-

County Board Unanimously Funds Doula Services to Support Women's Reproductive Health

The Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously today to allocate \$52,000 for doulas, or birth companions, to improve birth and maternal health in the 53206 Zip Code.

The action marks a significant step towards improving maternal health and addressing racial disparities with public funding for women's reproductive health care.

The proposal, from Supervisor Dimitrijevic, funds doula services for eligible women through the City of Milwaukee's health department, which will administer the program.

"Milwaukee County and the City of Milwaukee should be proud that we are ahead of the curve when it comes to supporting women's health, and reproductive health in particu-

lar.

Everyone deserves access to quality, affordable health care, and this program funds birth support for mothers who need it most," said Dimitrijevic.

The Milwaukee Common Council recently directed the City Health Department to develop the joint pilot program with Milwaukee County.

Funds from Milwaukee County will go to pay doulas directly for their services.

The City of Milwaukee will fund the administration of the program, and evaluate its effectiveness.

Alverno College and Ascension Wisconsin have signed a letter of intent to establish a strategic alliance to improve the health of the state's residents, Alverno President Dr. Andrea Lee and Bernie Sherry, Ministry Market Executive for Ascension Wisconsin, announced Tuesday.

This relationship will amplify the existing clinical relationship between the two Catholic institutions and seeks to further develop a skilled, mission-driven workforce to help meet the needs of the state's rapidly evolving healthcare environment. It also will further advance the initiatives of Alverno and Ascension Wisconsin, grounded in their shared Catholic and Franciscan values, to strategically drive improved health outcomes for the state's residents.

Alverno will expand its existing academic degree, certificate and credential programs in healthcare and develop new programs.

This includes degrees and continuing education opportunities for employees at Ascension Wisconsin's 24 hospital campuses and more than 100 clinics statewide. Ascension Wisconsin will provide expanded access for Alverno students to the clinical education experiences necessary in their preparation as healthcare professionals.

"This is a logical and desirable alliance for Alverno College," Sister Andrea said.

"As an anchor in communities from Racine to Eagle River, Ascension Wisconsin is focused on providing compassionate, personalized care to all people, especially those living in poverty and who are most vulnerable," Sherry said.

"This alliance will build on our shared commitment to strengthen educational opportunities for the next generation of nurses, with a focus on increasing diversity in the workforce."

As part of the Alverno-Ascension Wisconsin strategic alliance, leaders of the two institutions have signed a letter of intent and are engaged in serious discussions to combine Alverno's JoAnn McGrath School of Nursing and Health Professions and the 118-year-old Columbia College of

Nursing (CCON), part of Ascension Wisconsin, located in Glendale, Wis., subject to receipt of all necessary approvals.

Once finalized, CCON's coeducational programs will be administratively housed in Alverno's

School of Adult Learning and New Initiatives, with curricular oversight by the JoAnn McGrath School of Nursing and Health Professions.

"We are eager to collaborate with our CCON nursing colleagues and are especially interested in the possibility of expanding our footprint with a north side presence," said Patricia Varga, Ph.D., dean of Alverno's JoAnn McGrath School of Nursing and Health Professions.

"We share a passion for excellent nurse preparation," explained Heather Vartanian, PhD, RN, ANP-BC, president and dean of Columbia College of Nursing. "Collaborating around our shared mission in healthcare education will only enhance our capacity to contribute positively to the evolution of healthcare delivery in the

region."

"Healthcare is changing rapidly, so rapidly that demand for skilled healthcare providers cannot keep pace with the need, a clear indicator of the power of alliances such as this and others across the region," Sister Andrea said.

"Ascension Wisconsin and Alverno educators will have significant roles in advancing important conversations on healthcare delivery in the future. We are excited to continue the conversation and to move quickly to action."

Given that the Alverno and Ascension Wisconsin's strategic alliance will not be exclusive, both Alverno and Ascension Wisconsin will continue their current and emerging business relationships with other institutions and healthcare systems.

Harris, Gillibrand Offer Plans to Bolster Maternal Care

Two Democratic women running for president have unveiled plans to improve maternal health care



parts maternal mortality rate, particularly among black women.

Gillibrand announced a plan for a Family Bill of Rights, which she vowed to implement promptly if elected president. It seeks to improve access to obstetrician-gynecologists in rural areas, while making adoptions or in vitro fertilization more affordable for everyone wanting children, regardless of income, religion or sexual orientation.

Her plan would provide government-sponsored "baby bundles" for new parents, with diapers, onesies, a small mattress and other items designed to make newborn nurseries healthier.

It further includes beefed-up paid family leave allowing parents to care for their children into infancy, universal prekindergarten programs and expanded child care tax credits.

"The Family Bill of Rights will

make all families stronger — regardless of who you are or what your zip code is — with a fundamental set of rights that levels the playing field starting at birth," Gillibrand said in a statement.

Gillibrand said she had a "several ideas" to pay for the proposed initiatives, including a 0.1% tax on financial transactions like stock purchases, which she says would generate \$777 billion over 10 years.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Democratic women running for president unveiled plans Wednesday to improve maternal health care, with Sen. Kamala Harris reintroducing a bill aimed at addressing racial disparities in childbirth care and Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand promising to make adoptions and high-tech fertility treatments more accessible to those who want children.

Harris' bill, first introduced in 2018, would create a \$25 million program to fight racial bias in maternal care. It would direct grants to medical schools, nursing schools and other training programs to improve care for black women, who are three to four times more likely than white women to die in childbirth.

Her revived proposal also would allocate an additional \$125 million toward identifying high-risk pregnancies and, according to her Senate office, provide mothers with the "culturally competent care and resources they need."

"Black mothers across the country are facing a health crisis that is driven in part by implicit bias in our health care system," Harris, of California, said in a statement. "We must take action to address this issue, and we must do it with the sense of urgency it deserves."

Harris and Gillibrand, of New York, are among a number of contenders for the Democratic presidential nomination focused on maternal mortality rates.

The issue was the first that Massachusetts Sen. Elizabeth Warren was questioned on at a recent candidate forum in Houston focused on issues key to women of color, and she recently penned an op-ed for Essence magazine on the topic.

New Jersey Sen. Cory Booker earlier this year teamed up with Massachusetts Rep. Ayanna Pressley and introduced legislation aimed at reducing the coun-

Parents' Opioid Use Increases Kids' Suicide Risk

The risk of suicidal behavior among youth more than doubled if their parents were taking prescription opioids long-term

RESEARCHERS CAUTION that parents' long-term use of opioids may increase the odds of their kids attempting suicide.

Using health insurance claims data from the MarketScan Commercial Claims and Encounters databases, researchers from the University of Pittsburgh and University of Chicago examined whether there was an increased risk of suicide attempts among children ages 10 to 15 whose parents ages 30 to 50 used opioids for more than a year between 2010 and 2016.

The analysis included 184,142 children who had parents that used opioids and 148,395 children whose parents did not.

They found that children whose parents had used opioids long-term had a risk of 3.68 per 1,000 of attempting suicide – 2.25 times the risk of suicidal behavior for those whose parents had not filled their prescriptions.

"Parental opioid use is a risk factor for suicide attempts by their offspring with an associated doubling of the risk" independent of age, sex, location or parental history of suicide attempts, according to the study.

Further, the researchers found that the actual diagnosis of opioid use disorder (OUD) among parents "was rare even among those who had more than 1 year of opioid use," the study said.

"Helping the families of parents with OUD depends on identifying OUD in the parents," the study said.

"The low rate of diagnosis of OUD in our study among parents who had been using opioids continuously for at least 1 year suggests the need for improved surveillance, recognition and treatment of this potentially fatal condition."

The study, published Wednesday in the Journal of the American Medical Association's Psychiatry, comes as rates of youth suicide, suicide attempts and ideation continue to climb across the U.S.

The researchers note that all of the insurance claims examined were for families with private health insurance, so the study may underestimate the rate of suicide behavior risk.

Recent "surveys of opioid misuse find that the rates of opioid misuse in the past year among those with medical assistance, Children's Health Insurance Program or with no insurance are more than double the rates among those who have private insurance," the report noted.

"When estimating the costs and treatment needs of families affected by opioid abuse, these results support the importance of incorporating the clinical needs and attendant costs of the assessment and care of children of affected parents," the study concludes.

"Recognition and treatment of parents with OUD, attendance to comorbid conditions in affected parents, and screening and appropriate referral of their children may help, at least in part, to reverse the current upward trend in mortality due to the twin epidemics of suicide and opioid overdose."

Ascension Wisconsin Identifies its Top Health Priorities in Milwaukee

Over the last year, Ascension Wisconsin has been listening to local stakeholders through interviews with patients, individuals, community organizations, a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) and community conversations. During this process, Ascension Wisconsin conducted:

- 161 community interviews
- 27 community stakeholder meetings
- 7 community conversations with elected officials and residents



Ascension Wisconsin held a series of community conversations in Milwaukee at Ascension St. Joseph and Ascension St. Francis for an interactive discussion with residents on how to make their community healthier. Participants were asked, "What do we need to work on together to improve the health of our community?" Interactive, small group discussions were asked these follow-up questions:

- What does a healthy community look like?
- To create a healthy community, what needs to change?
- What would you expect to see in the next year to show Ascension Wisconsin is heading in the right direction?

After each question, the table host for each group reported a summary of their group's conversation. Detailed notes were taken and compiled into a summary document. In addition, a graphic artist captured the conversation visually, creating a mural that told a story representing the ideas shared in the report-out. Community members were given the opportunity to identify their top three priorities by voting on the mural with stickers. These conversations, along with the CHNA, have helped guide Ascension Wisconsin to identify its top health priorities in Milwaukee.

Q. What is a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA)?

A. CHNA is a requirement under the Affordable Care Act (ACA) for not-for-profit hospitals to assess and address the significant health needs of the community they serve every three years. In Milwaukee County, health systems collect this data together through the Milwaukee Health Care Partnership, identifying top health needs in the community. Individual health systems then determine priorities to be addressed by their system based on this shared assessment. Ascension Wisconsin's CHNA report will be posted at ascension.org/wisconsin by June 30, 2019.

Q. What are the top health priorities for Ascension Wisconsin hospitals in Milwaukee?

A. The top health priorities for Ascension St. Joseph, Ascension St. Francis and Ascension Columbia St. Mary's Milwaukee are:

- Access to Care
- Chronic Disease Prevention
- Infant Mortality
- Mental Health

Q. Why were just these four priorities chosen?

A. During the assessment process, Ascension Wisconsin considered many factors, some of which are:

- The size and urgency of the problem
- Needs of residents who experience health disparities
- Does Ascension Wisconsin have the expertise and resources needed to make an impact

Many other important health issues were noted, both in the review of the data and in the input from the community. While the CHNA process identified four top priorities to focus on, this is not the only avenue by which Ascension Wisconsin addresses the health of the community. Ascension Wisconsin will continue to address a wide array of health issues and needs through hospital-based care, primary and specialty clinics and other community initiatives.

Q. What's next?

A. Ascension Wisconsin will develop an action plan for addressing these priority health needs, called a Community Health Implementation Plan (CHIP). During the spring and summer 2019, Ascension Wisconsin will be creating a CHIP to outline specific programs/initiatives that address these four priority health issues for its Milwaukee hospitals. Ascension Wisconsin's plan is expected to be ready to share by the end of summer.

Q. Are the efforts in the CHIP part of Ascension Wisconsin's community benefit?

A. Yes. The CHIP will include programs, services and initiatives that will address the priorities identified in the CHNA. Funding to support these efforts is one part of Ascension Wisconsin's commitment to community benefit. In addition to what is provided through the CHIP, community benefit also includes financial assistance, covering the cost of uncompensated care and supporting programs and activities that provide education, treatment and promote health and healing.

Q. Beyond the CHIP, what is next at Ascension St. Joseph?

A. Reggie Newson, Chief Advocacy Officer, Ascension Wisconsin provided this update: "We are grateful to the community and thank everyone who shared their opinions and ideas on how to make Milwaukee healthier. Healthcare is changing and the needs of the people we serve are changing too. Ascension St. Joseph is an anchor in the community and is ready to lead the changes required to better meet those needs. As we've been listening over the last several months, the community clearly expressed the need for traditional healthcare services along with more access to programs that address health and wellness differently.

Ascension St. Joseph is looking at ways to combine traditional medical services with related social services that will result in healthier people and healthier neighborhoods. We are looking at how to accomplish this through collaboration, strategic alliances or partnerships. In the coming weeks, we look forward to sharing with the community our ideas for improving health equity in the Ascension St. Joseph service area."
