When it came to the year 2013, the publication opted to collectively celebrate the three women for creating the hashtag #BlackLivesMatter that went viral in the wake of George Zimmerman being acquitted for the killing of unarmed Florida teen Trayvon Martin. Time staff writer Melissa Chan wrote that despite being called terrorists and threats to America, they continued urging the public to pay attention to the spate of fatal shootings of unarmed Black men and women that followed Martin's, shutting down highways, blocking bridges and staging die-in demonstrations. —TheGrio

Though he has dropped out of the presidential race, former New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg is determined to make a difference in the 2020



presidential election. He has donated \$2 million to Collective Future, a nonprofit group that supports Black candidates. They want to register 500,000 Black voters in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Michigan, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas, and Wisconsin ahead of the November election. Bloomberg's donation will help to hire field organizers. "There is a critical need for Black voter engagement across the country in the 2020 election and beyond and we are deeply grateful to Mike Bloomberg for his partnership and dedication to this critical cause," said Quentin James, president of The Collective. —TheGrio

President Trump reportedly believes journalists are trying to infect him with the coronavirus but he won't give anyone the satisfaction of canceling any of his



MAGA rallies. The president is reportedly frustrated by the public health crisis that has gripped the nation and world. It's an epidemic that has resulted in 550 people being infected in the United States, killing more than 20. More than 111,000 people have been infected worldwide, while more than 3,800 have died. Trump doesn't just believe reporters want to paint him in a bad light, but want to make him sick. The president reportedly feared journalists would try to purposefully contract coronavirus to give it to him on Air Force One. He's instructed the Secret Service to bar anyone with a cough from entering the White House grounds. —TheGrio

CITY OFFICIALS SAY THEY'RE READY FOR THE CORONAVIRUS



Like other major cities across the nation, Milwaukee is preparing for an eminent outbreak of COVID-19, also known as the coronavirus.

Flanked by U.S. Cong. Gwen Moore and Milwaukee Health Commissioner Jeanette Kowalik during a news conference, Mayor Tom Barrett said there are still—as of this writing—no confirmed cases of the virus in Milwaukee. Nor are there any confirmed cases in Milwaukee County.

"Preparation is extremely important in the hopes that all this preparation leads to nothing," Barrett said.

"We've received a number of calls and concerns from individuals in the community, so we wanted to let everybody know what's going on," Kowalik said. "We are preparing to have the ability to test COVID-19 for diagnostic purposes only."

Wisconsin now has kits to do its own testing at labs in Milwaukee and Madison. Public health officials are asking the public to do their part to help stop the spread of the virus.

Kowalik said the city Health Department is in constant communication with state and federal officials when it comes to containing the disease.

The CDC aims to have every state and local health department testing for coronavirus by the end of next week.

"As COVID-19 evolves, eventually there should be a vaccine at some point, but vaccine development takes some time," said Kowalik. Federal officials said a coronavirus vaccine could take at least a year before it is developed, proven effective, and approved.

Barrett shared an additional reminder for the community.

"As a community, we do need to be vigilant against fear and anxiety around the virus that could lead to social stigma toward Chinese or other Asian-Americans," Barrett said. "Stigma hurts everyone by creating more fear or anger toward ordinary people."

The city is reportedly monitoring four people who recently returned from China for coronavirus. Those individuals are in voluntary isolation at home as a safety precaution.

Dear Reader,

Thank you for taking the time to learn about The Greenwood Initiative.

As someone who has been very lucky in life, I often say my story would only have been possible in America – and that's true. But I also know that because of the artificial barriers of discrimination, my story likely would have turned out very differently if I had been Black, and that more Black Americans of my generation would have ended up with far more wealth, had they been white.

Building Generational Wealth for Black Families is Critical. That's why I launched The Greenwood Initiative in Tulsa last month. I visited the site of the Black Wall Street Massacre, where a white mob decimated the prosperous community of Greenwood. It is to the memory of the lost lives and promise of Greenwood that we've dedicated The Greenwood Initiative: a plan to address the systematic bias that has kept Black Americans from building wealth.

THE GREENWOOD PLAN WILL:

- Create 1 million new Black homeowners
- Double the number of new Black-owned businesses
- Invest \$70 billion in the country's 100 most disadvantaged neighborhoods

Fixing the System for Black Families. When I was mayor of New York, I was proud to take on the systematic inequality that held back too many New Yorkers. We increased education funding, built 650 new schools and raised Black graduation rates to record highs. We led an ambitious effort to reduce poverty and managed the largest amount of affordable housing in the nation. And as President, I will work even more aggressively to combat inequality nationwide.

I understand that undoing generations of systematic discrimination won't happen overnight, but we can make progress with a clear vision and a comprehensive plan. I've included a pamphlet along with this letter that lays out my plan. When I'm President, implementing The Greenwood Initiative: will be a top priority.

Join me in ending the systemic inequality that has held Black Americans back for too long!

There was one confirmed case in Wisconsin—a Dane county patient who is now considered recovered. The Milwaukee Health Department is set up to test for the disease and isolate anyone who has it.

The recovered Dane county patient was one of 44 Wisconsinites who have been tested for the coronavirus. At least 12 patients have pending results, and 31 patients tested negative.

But the mayor and health officials continue to keep a close eye on the outbreak in Chicago, where officials in that city and Illinois announced there are seven cases of the virus.

Health officials suggest citizens wash their hands for at least 20 seconds, avoid touching your face and don't shake hands with others. Individuals who think they have been exposed to the virus are being asked not to go to the hospital emergency rooms. Doctors advise them to call the hospital's health department to coordinate care.

Patients suspected of being exposed to the coronavirus are being asked to stay in home quarantine for at least 14 days. Many people

wanting a test—simple swab of the nose and throat—may not qualify for one.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention will only authorize tests for patients who have a fever and respiratory illness and have been in contact with a suspected coronavirus case; who have a fever and severe respiratory illness, such as pneumonia, and have a history of travel to restricted locations; or have a fever and severe respiratory illness requiring hospitalization with no other explanation for the ill-

ness.

Those who meet the criteria will be tested. The Wisconsin Laboratory of Hygiene said more tests have been denied than approved in Wisconsin.

As of Sunday afternoon, 21 Americans have died from the coronavirus and eight have recovered.

There are now at least 511 confirmed cases across the country.

STAYING INFORMED ABOUT THE CORONAVIRUS

As news surrounding the coronavirus continues to develop, I want you all to stay informed. I am sharing resources from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) to help you and your family stay healthy and safe.

Background

Coronavirus disease 19 (COVID-19) is a novel coronavirus that first emerged in China in late 2019, but has spread across the world. On January 31st, HHS Secretary Alex M. Azar II declared a national public health emergency to help the nation's healthcare community respond to COVID-19.

So what can you do?

COVID-19 infections spread from person-to-person through viral droplets of mucus or saliva that contain the virus that enters a person's eyes, nose or mouth. Coronavirus can spread when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It can also spread from contact with infected surfaces or objects. Some infected people show no symptoms. When the virus does cause symptoms, most symptoms are as mild. However, COVID-19 can occasionally cause more severe symptoms.

Therefore, the CDC advises individuals to take the same precautions that are always recommended to prevent the spread of respiratory viruses like the flu and the common cold. Visit the CDC's Prevention and Treatment site for more information.

What You Should Do

- Avoid close contact with sick people. The CDC recommends maintaining a distance greater than 6 feet.
- When sick, limit contact with others as much as possible; if possible, stay home if you are sick.
- Cover your nose and mouth when you cough or sneeze.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that may be contaminated with germs.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub with at least 60% alcohol.
- Seek medical care if you feel sick with a fever or cough, or have difficulty breathing, and have traveled to China or may have been in close contact with someone with COVID-19 in the 14 days before you began to feel sick. Before you go to a doctor's office or emergency room, call ahead.

What You Should Not Do

- Do not travel to China, Iran, Italy or South Korea. This list is constantly being updated so stay informed.
- Do not use facemasks to prevent the spread of COVID-19.
- Do not show prejudice to people of Asian descent because of fear of this new virus. Do not assume that someone of Asian descent is more likely to have COVID-19.

Travel Guidance from the CDC

The CDC recommends that travelers avoid all nonessential travel to China, Iran, Italy and South Korea. The CDC recommends that older adults or those who have chronic medical conditions consider postponing travel to Japan. Please visit travelers' guidance from the CDC for more information.

IN RESPONSE TO CORONAVIRUS, SEN. TAMMY BALDWIN INTRODUCES NEW EMERGENCY PAID SICK LEAVE LEGISLATION

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin, a member of the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP), joined her colleagues in introducing new, emergency paid sick leave legislation, building off the Healthy Families Act (HFA), to provide paid sick days immediately to workers in light of the coronavirus crisis, and in preparation for future public health emergencies.

Twenty-seven percent of private sector workers don't have paid sick days and will go without pay if they can't show up at work. This emergency paid sick days legislation, led by Senator Patty Murray (D-WA), ranking member of the Senate HELP Committee, and Congresswoman Rosa DeLauro (CT-03), chair of the House Appropriations Subcommittee, requires all employers to allow workers to accrue seven days of paid sick leave and to provide an additional 14 days available immediately in the event of any public health emergency, including the current coronavirus crisis.

“As the coronavirus outbreak continues to spread, we should help ensure workers can take paid sick leave to protect themselves, their co-workers and their families,” said Senator Baldwin.

“No worker should have to choose between protecting their health, or paying their bills. We need to pass this legislation right now to give our workers the resources they need to care for themselves and keep our communities safe from this public health threat.”

“The coronavirus is highly contagious and the problem isn't going away anytime soon,” said Senator Murray. “Workers want to do the right thing for themselves, their families, and their communities—so especially in the middle of public health crises like this, staying home sick shouldn't have to mean losing a paycheck or a job. This bill would immediately give workers the ability to care for themselves, their families, and help keep their communities safe. We need to pass it without delay.”

“The lack of paid sick days could make coronavirus harder to contain in the United States compared with other countries that have universal sick leave policies in place,” said Congresswoman DeLauro.

“No one should face the impossible choice of caring for their health or keeping their paycheck or job, especially when a sudden public health crisis occurs. But millions of hard-working people must make this decision every time they get sick or a family member needs care.

Low-income workers and their families could be hit even harder by the virus, as low wage jobs are at the forefront of not providing sick leave benefits. That is why I am proud to sponsor this effort with Senator Murray to ensure that workers are able to follow the directive of public health officials

It was the Black vote that put a Black man in the white house who wasn't a butler.

When we stayed home in 2016, Hillary Clinton went back to wearing dresses.

And most recently, the Black vote resurrected the Joe Biden campaign.

Counted out by many political pundits, Biden received overwhelming Black support in both "Super Tuesday," and this week's "Big Tuesday."

And if we show up in numbers anywhere near what we provided Obama in 2008, he will hold the door for Donald Trump as he takes this lies and (five foot long) ties back to his New York penthouse, or Palm Springs country club...or better yet, Russia, in January.

But I can almost guarantee we won't be rewarded to any great extent for our vote no matter who wins in November.

That's because unlike the other special interests, we seem to be satisfied with returning to the 2016 status quo instead of demanding a

full slice of the pie, or the resources to make our own dessert.

The fact the issues of crucial importance to Black America were not even discussed during that reality show they called debates, or that the tough questions were never asked, speaks volumes about what to expect when, and if, 45IQ's reign is ended.

And in that regard, it doesn't matter (it never really did) who the Democratic Party nominee is because this presidential race is not about who's going to occupy the White House next January; but instead, who we don't want there.

Thus, I can all but guarantee 90-plus percent of the Black vote will go to the Democrat nominee.

Nonetheless, pundits would be wise to realize it is not the percentage, but the total number that will count. Many Black folks will stay home, some because of apathy and others because they don't see a pot of gold—or brass ring—at the end of the rainbow. That's the way it's been for decades.

But let's table that paradigm for a moment.

As the saying goes: "all politics

are local." And a study of our impact through those prisms reveals we are not only stuck in a political abyss, but we're "stuck on stupid," falsely believing we don't have to hold our elected officials accountable.

I've lived long enough to remember when we had just one alder(wo)man and one state representative. Today, we are in a position to control every local political entity.

The president of the council is a brother, as is the vice-chair of the County Board. We make up almost half of the school board, and you'll find a Black face, (if not cultural connection) on nearly every public board in Metro Milwaukee.

But you wouldn't know that by the metrics.

We still lead the nation in seven negative social indicators, including one of the highest African American poverty and male unemployment rates in the country.

The income gap is among the widest for a city our size south of the Canadian border (the real Mason Dixon Line), and we have the worst reading proficiency rates

for Black children in fourth and eighth grade in the not-so-United States of America.

Most recently, a report revealed Black ownership has dropped to its lowest point since the Open Housing marches and 25 cent hamburgers.

And the fact that we lost two Black banks, a major Black-owned grocery store and a radio station cannot be ignored.

Nor can the words of Ruben Hopkins, head of the Wisconsin African American Chamber of Commerce, who commented on NBC Sunday talking-heads political show "Meet the Press" a short time ago that if we want to go to a movie, an upscale restaurant or a roller rink, we have to go to the suburbs.

Obviously, you can't put all of the onus for that depressing reality

on the shoulder of Black politicians, just as you can't put the abysmal state of education solely on the shoulders of teachers.

But conversely, there is much they could do and should do, but can't or don't, in part because we don't hold them accountable, or provide them with an agenda or motivation (as in the threat of recall or one term, then out of of-

Black LGBTQ people of faith have been forced into the shadows for far too long

faithful LGBTQ people participating in religious life in houses of worship across the country, and their experiences should be recognized — not discounted.

Ensuring equity and justice for all people, while giving all individuals the space and freedom to be fully themselves, is a message inherent in all major religions and faith traditions. In fact, the cornerstones of religion and faith and the LGBTQ movement are the same: inclusion and justice. That's why Black Protestants are just as, if not more likely, to recognize discrimination against the LGBTQ community and to favor non-discrimination protections.

Recognition of this truth — and changing the narrative around LGBTQ people of faith— is critical. That is why the Human Rights Campaign (HRC) is launching a concerted, national effort to form relationships with a diverse range of prominent houses of worship across the country — not only with historic Black churches, but also evangelical churches, synagogues, mosques and other religious and spiritual communities.

Together, we launched this effort last Sunday at the nation's Historic African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas, Philadelphia, a community of faith that serves as a role model for the ways in which people of faith can begin finding common ground with LGBTQ people in their communities. St. Thomas Church has a long history of engaging in outreach to the community around them and ensuring the welcoming love we see in the Gospels is felt by everyone — including LGBTQ people.

LGBTQ people are in every faith tradition, and LGBTQ people and people of faith have more simi-

larities than they do differences. Both are based on the importance of ensuring equity and dignity for every individual. Finding a way for faith traditions and LGBTQ voices to speak that message together and ensure it is heard in the 2020 elections will grow the power of both movements.

If we speak with one voice, we can be a powerful political voice for justice. And in finding common ground between us, we will dispel the myths, change the narrative and ultimately advance fairness and equality for all.

He holds a Doctorate of Ministry in Liturgy from the Graduate Theological Foundation at the University of Oxford. He was ordained to the Episcopal Church in 1988. and stay home without the fear of losing their paycheck."

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines advise people to stay home if they are sick.

However, for many workers—including many restaurant workers, truck drivers, people in the service industry, and more—staying home from work means losing a paycheck or losing your job.

This legislation won't just ensure

workers' can take care of themselves and their families, it will also ensure that workers can help keep their communities safe.

Specifically this bill would:

- Require all employers to allow workers to gradually earn seven days of paid sick leave.
- Require all employers to provide an additional 14 days of paid sick leave, available immediately at the beginning of a public health emergency, including the current coronavirus crisis.
- Ensure paid sick leave covers

days when your child's school is closed due to a public health emergency, when your employer is closed due to a public health emergency, or if you or a family member is quarantined or isolated due to a public health emergency.

The legislation has been endorsed by: National Partnership for Women and Families, National Employment Law Project (NELP), Center for Law and Social Policy (CLASP), and the Center for American Progress (CAP).



face). For the record, there are a few Black politicians who stand up and out. And a few others who have mastered the established rules and thus benefit us from inside the castle walls. But in totality, no one can deny we are not getting the bang for our buck.

We've accepted complacency, ineffectiveness, and an occasional press release to condemn violence or police brutality as a legitimate outcome for their \$100,000 salaries and lifelong economic security.

It's debatable whether or not Albert Einstein coined the phrase about insanity being defined as doing the same things over and over and expecting a different result.

Regardless of its author, I'm sure you'll see a picture under the quote of a Black man holding a ballot card believing it's a lottery ticket.

It doesn't work that way. Or, at least it hasn't in my lifetime.

As I've repeatedly posited, we elect "our" local politicians based on their ability to articulate the problems facing our community, not because they have solutions for them.

And even when we discover—after four or five terms—that our plight hasn't changed because of our vote, we continue to follow the same script, with the difference being we'll start criticizing and complaining.

We're experts at complaining, but very poor when it comes to problem-solving.

Very few of us will ever attend a political meeting, call an elected official, or write a proposal. Even if you assumed the primary responsibility of politicians is to manage our resources—taxes—few of us know where to go to testify for a budget hearing.

We put our support behind the candidate who merely mentions that we exist, who say they identify with our plight. That's why the dozen or so finalists for the Democratic Party nod took every opportunity during the debates to connect all of America's issues to "Blacks" or Black people, or African Americans (depending on the audience).

None of them, however, introduced a solution to our myriad problems.

Biden ended up as the front runner because he boldly proclaimed the support of the Black masses, a fact that was realized during Super Tuesday.

Yet, his relationship to us was forged by Obama, not his voting record or his ability to sing the Black National Anthem.

But it doesn't make any difference, as this year's presidential election will not be about issues...including ours.

Instead, the presidential race, like our last gubernatorial election, is not about who we want in the White House, but who we wish gone from it.

That means while we will be much better off with a Democratic Party candidate, there is very little hope that our concerns will be addressed any more than they have been this century.

Of course, this sermon may be moot. The evangelicals and conservatives who helped elect Donald Duck...err Trump... did so believing he actualized a religious prophecy.

If they are correct, the end of days is around the corner. And if that's the case, it won't make any difference who will be elected.
