Black political figures urge community to stay-at-home, and closure of non-essential businesses as number of Black MKE COVID-19 patients soar

“The coronavirus pandemic is deadly serious, and all Milwaukee residents need to start getting the message immediately,” said Ald. Russell W. Stamper, II in urging residents to adhere to Gov. Tony Evers’ “Stay-at-Home” order.

It’s a message Stamper wants residents in his district and the city’s Black community as a whole to take more seriously.

Why? “The deadly coronavirus (COVID-19) is spreading fast

among Milwaukee’s African American population, and it has already claimed the lives of several African American men here,” said Stamper in a statement.

“But those deaths—and a strict citywide Stay-at-Home order—don’t seem to be getting the attention of enough people in the community.”

Despite the governor’s order last week Tuesday, and the city health department the day before imposing a city-wide order to stay-at-home, there has been a spike in the number of COVID-19 cases, especially among the city’s Black men, as reported in the March 25 edition of the MCJ.

At the time of the initial Community Journal article, there

were 158 total confirmed coronavirus cases in the city. The majority of that number were middle-aged African American men, the majority of whom lived on the predominately Black north side.

Among the Black men to fall victim to the virus was state Rep. David Bowen who, recently tested positive.

Bowen learned he had come in contact with a fellow local elected official who had tested positive for COVID-19, and immediately went into quarantine. Test results confirmed he had contracted the illness.

“Had I known of my status even earlier, I would have reduced my exposure to others who may potentially have gotten





Governor Evers calls out state’s National Guard to man polling places for April 7 Spring Election

Wisconsin Gov. Tony Evers has called up the Wisconsin National Guard to help man election polling places for the April 7 Spring Election, according to a federal court brief.

Currently, nearly 60% of Wisconsin polling locations have reported a shortage of poll workers.

The governor’s amicus brief was filed as part of a lawsuit by the state Democratic Party to postpone the election set for Tuesday. The brief sought to inform the court of Evers plan for assisting with issues facing the election commission.

As of this writing, the election is still scheduled to be held.

The brief detailed the obstacles the coronavirus pandemic has caused and the steps the governor’s administration have taken to ensure the election would happen on time.

Evers brief came a day after Madison officials filed their own amicus curiae brief, which, like Evers, let them weigh in on a case to which they were not a named party and offer insight possibly unavailable to the court.

In its filing, the City repeatedly warned its Clerk’s Office would not be able to run a “full and fair election” if voting took place on April 7. It argued, not only does the Clerk’s Office likely face insurmountable challenges, voting that day would jeopardize the health of many residents.

As of this writing, a federal judge had yet to hear evidence Wednesday in the Democrats’ lawsuit asking for a delay to the election and presidential primary. Evers’ calling up the guard is part of a plan he calls a “middle path” solution.

Evers’ plan is designed to make absentee ballots easier for voters to get and make them easier to return, for example by relaxing the witness requirement.

It would adjust the schedule for when and how absentee ballots are counted, giving officials more time to tally the flood of ballots. In person voting would not be

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OP-ED: The U.S. Census and the Importance of Being Counted

During this difficult time, many people are looking for ways to help. Perhaps one of these easiest ways to impact our community right now is to complete the 2020 census.

A few minutes of your time will ensure that our community receives proper funding from the federal government, that we are represented properly at every level of government, and that research on our community is accurate for the next decade.

Every 10 years, as mandated by the U.S. Constitution (Article 1, Section 2), the U.S. Census Bureau literally counts everyone who lives in the United States and its territories. This year, census day is April 1. It is a snapshot in time. Not only are you required to respond, but

responding is in your and your community’s best interest. The census is 10 questions and should take just a few minutes to complete.

All information is confidential and protected by federal law. Answers can be used only to produce statistics. Identifiable information cannot be shared with other agencies, even law enforcement.

It has never been easier to respond, whether online at my2020census.gov, over the phone at 844-330-2020, or by mail – all without having to meet a census taker.

The census is important for many reasons. First, an accurate census count is crucial to ensure that you are represented in local, state, and federal government.

The count determines each state’s number of seats in the House of Representatives and votes in the Electoral College. Exactly where people live in the state influences congressional districts, state legislative districts, and even city council districts.

Second, an accurate census count ensures that our community receives its share of \$860 billion distributed by the federal government for a host of programs, including Medicaid, Medicare, highway funding, Pell Grants, school lunches and other food assistance, and aid to low-income families. Your response to the census helps to ensure that your community receives the public services it needs.

Finally, researchers in government and universities use census data for all kinds of critical social research to better understand and assist certain populations across the country.

The current census will influence funding and policy decisions until 2030. It is vital that East Central Indiana residents participate.

resources include opportunities for persons to ask questions about salvation, send prayer requests or respond to the invitation to Christian discipleship.

Group Bible Study - Virtual Group Bible study can also be held through weekly community groups through social media outlets such as Zoom or www.Rightnowmedia.com. Pair-groups can meet for Bible study, prayer and meditation regular times during the week using Facetime.

Online Worship in Giving - Many churches have implemented online giving opportunities that can be accessed through the church's website or through giving apps such as Givelify, PayPal/Venmo, etc. The U.S. Postal Service, an essential business, can also deliver your tithes and offerings to the church.

Beloved, often when we are facing a crisis, our hope and faith wanes. Put your trust in God and find strength in the truth of Jesus' Resurrection. Jesus' Resurrection provides comfort

that God is more powerful than anything we might face in this life. When we can hope during times of uncertainty, we can weather the crisis and get through this together. OFFICE OF THE MILWAUKEE COUNTY ELECTION COMMISSION

TO THE VOTERS OF THE CITY OF MILWAUKEE:

Notice is hereby given of a spring election and a Presidential Preference Vote to be held in the City of Milwaukee on April 7, 2020, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot, except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter’s minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

AT THE PRESIDENTIAL PREFERENCE VOTE

A voter may cast only one vote in the presidential preference primary.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice or shall, in the alternative, fill in the oval next to the words “Uninstructed Delegation,” or write in the name of a person of his or her choice for a candidate in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device* (“Automark”) to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select the party of his or her choice. Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice or shall, in the alternative, touch the screen or use the keypad to select the words “Uninstructed Delegation,” or type in the name of a person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

AT THE SPRING ELECTION

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to “yes” if in favor of the question or fill in the oval next to “no” if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device* (“Automark”) to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select “yes” if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select “no” if opposed to the question.

Spoiled Ballots

If a voter spoils an **optical scan ballot**, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **optical scan ballot** is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter’s employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

A sample ballot is included with this notice.

2019 ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION 3

To renumber and amend section 9m of article I; and to create section 9m (1) of article I, section 9m a. of article I, section 9m (5) of article I and section 9m (6) of article I of the constitution; relating to: the rights of crime victims (second consideration).

Whereas, the 2017 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2017 Senate Joint Resolution 53, which became 2017 Enrolled Joint Resolution 13, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 9m of article I of the constitution is renumbered section 9m. (2) (intro.) of article I and amended to read:

[Article I] Section 9m (2) (intro.) ~~This state shall treat crime victims, as defined by law, with fairness, dignity and respect for their privacy. This state shall ensure that crime victims have all of the following privileges and protections as provided by law:~~
In order to preserve and protect victims’ rights to justice and due process throughout the criminal and juvenile justice process, victims shall be entitled to all of the following rights, which shall vest at the time of victimization and be protected by law in a manner no less vigorous than the protections afforded to the accused:

- (a) To be treated with dignity, respect, courtesy, sensitivity, and fairness.
- (b) To privacy.
- (c) To proceedings free from unreasonable delay.
- (d) To timely disposition of the case; ~~the opportunity to attend court,~~ free from unreasonable delay.
- (e) Upon request, to attend all proceedings unless the trial court finds sequestration is necessary to a fair trial for the defendant; involving the case.
- (f) To reasonable protection from the accused throughout the criminal and juvenile justice

- process;.
 - (g) Upon request, to reasonable and timely notification of ~~court~~ proceedings; ~~the opportunity to.~~
 - (h) Upon request, to confer with the ~~prosecution; the opportunity to make a statement to the court at disposition;~~ attorney for the government.
 - (i) Upon request, to be heard in any proceeding during which a right of the victim is implicated, including release, plea, sentencing, disposition, parole, revocation, expungement, or pardon.
 - (j) To have information pertaining to the economic, physical, and psychological effect upon the victim of the offense submitted to the authority with jurisdiction over the case and to have that information considered by that authority.
 - (k) Upon request, to timely notice of any release or escape of the accused or death of the accused if the accused is in custody or on supervision at the time of death.
 - (L) To refuse an interview, deposition, or other discovery request made by the accused or any person acting on behalf of the accused.
 - 1. To full restitution; from any person who has been ordered to pay restitution to the victim and to be provided with assistance collecting restitution.
 - 2. To compensation; ~~and as provided by law.~~
 - 3. Upon request, to reasonable and timely information about the status of the investigation and the outcome of the case ~~and the release of the accused.~~
 - 4. To timely notice about all rights under this section and all other rights, privileges, or protections of the victim provided by law, including how such rights, privileges, or protections are enforced.
- (3) Except as provided under sub. (2) (n), all provisions of this section are self-executing. The legislature shall provide may prescribe further remedies for the violation of this section. Nothing in this section, or in any statute enacted pursuant to this section, shall limit any right of the accused which may be provided by law, and further procedures for compliance with and enforcement of this section.

SECTION 2. Section 9m (1) of article I of the constitution is created to read: [Article I] Section 9m (1) (a) In this section, notwithstanding any statutory right, privilege, or protection, “victim” means any of the following:

- 1. A person against whom an act is committed that would constitute a crime if committed by a competent adult.
 - 2. If the person under subd. 1. is deceased or is physically or emotionally unable to exercise his or her rights under this section, the person’s spouse, parent or legal guardian, sibling, child, person who resided with the deceased at the time of death, or other lawful representative.
 - 3. If the person under subd. 1. is a minor, the person’s parent, legal guardian or custodian, or other lawful representative.
 - 4. If the person under subd. 1. is adjudicated incompetent, the person’s legal guardian or other lawful representative.
- (b) “Victim” does not include the accused or a person who the court finds would not act in the best interests of a victim who is deceased, incompetent, a minor, or physically or emotionally unable to exercise his or her rights under this section.

SECTION 3. Section 9m (4) of article I of the constitution is created to read:

[Article I] Section 9m (4) (a) In addition to any other available enforcement of rights or remedy for a violation of this section or of other rights, privileges, or protections provided by law, the victim, the victim’s attorney or other lawful representative, or the attorney for the government upon request of the victim may assert and seek in any circuit court or before any other authority of competent jurisdiction, enforcement of the rights in this section and any other right, privilege, or protection afforded to the victim by law. The court or other authority with jurisdiction over the case shall act promptly on such a request and afford a remedy for the violation of any right of the victim. The court or other authority with jurisdiction over the case shall clearly state on the record the reasons for any decision regarding the disposition of a victim’s right and shall provide those reasons to the victim or the victim’s attorney or other lawful representative.

(b) Victims may obtain review of all adverse decisions concerning their rights as victims by courts or other authorities with jurisdiction under par. (a) by filing petitions for supervisory writ in the court of appeals and supreme court.

SECTION 4. Section 9m (5) of article I of the constitution is created to read: [Article I] Section 9m

(5) This section does not create any cause of action for damages against the state; any political subdivision of the state; any officer, employee, or agent of the state or a political subdivision of the state acting in his or her official capacity; or any officer, employee, or agent of the courts acting in his or her official capacity.

SECTION 5. Section 9m (6) of article I of the constitution is created to read: [Article I] Section 9m

(6) This section is not intended and may not be interpreted to supersede a defendant’s federal constitutional rights or to afford party status in a proceeding to any victim.

SECTION 6. Numbering of new provisions. If another constitutional amendment ratified by the people creates the number of any provision created in this joint resolution, the chief of the legislative reference bureau shall determine the sequencing and the numbering of the provisions whose numbers conflict.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2019 legislature; and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday in April 2020; and, be it further

Resolved, That the question concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

QUESTION 1: “Additional rights of crime victims. Shall section 9m of article I of the constitution, which gives certain rights to crime victims, be amended to give crime victims additional rights, to require that the rights of crime victims be protected with equal force to the protections afforded the accused while leaving the federal constitutional rights of the accused intact, and to allow crime victims to enforce their rights in court?”

The Wisconsin Constitution, article I, section 9m, currently provides that the state shall treat crime victims "with fairness, dignity and respect for their privacy." That provision also mandates that the state ensure that crime victims have certain "privileges and protections" relative to the accused and the criminal case. Separate from these constitutional provisions, chapter 950 of the Wisconsin Statutes provides a "bill of rights" for victims and witnesses of crimes.

The proposed amendment would make five general changes to article I, section 9m, of the Wisconsin Constitution.

First, in 16 subsections, the proposed amendment would expand the rights of victims by creating additional rights and incorporating other statutory rights into the constitution.

Second, the proposed amendment would incorporate into the constitution a definition of "victim" similar to the definition currently in statute.

Third, the proposed amendment would create an additional mechanism by which victims could enforce their rights as victims.

Fourth, the proposed amendment would incorporate into the constitution a limit on governmental liability for any violation of victims' rights, similar to the limit currently provided by statute.

Fifth, the proposed amendment would provide that it may not be interpreted to supersede a defendant's federal constitutional rights or afford party status in a proceeding to any victim.

A "yes" vote on this question would amend the Wisconsin Constitution as summarized above.

A "no" vote on this question would decline to amend the Wisconsin Constitution as summarized above. A "no" vote would not alter existing protections for crime victims.

Ald. Coggs seeks changes to allow tax collection relief, hazardous duty pay

Legislation introduced by Alderwoman Milele A. Coggs urges a state law change to establish a moratorium on assessing interest and penalties on property tax accounts, as well as a look at allowing certain city positions to qualify for hazardous duty pay.

Alderwoman Coggs, chair of the Finance and Personnel Committee, said the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has had a major negative financial impact on small businesses and individuals, with many Milwaukee businesses being required to close per official order and residents forced out of work because of stay-at-home and required closure orders across all sectors.

Currently, state statutes govern the billing and collection of property taxes, as well as delinquent tax interest and penalties (and currently recognize no exceptions for their assessment).

Her legislation would authorize the city's Intergovernmental Relations Division to urge the Wisconsin Legislature and Governor Evers to pass legislation that would establish a set time period moratorium on assessing interest and penalties on property tax accounts.

The Alderwoman's effort would dovetail with that of City Treasurer Spencer Coggs, who on March 20 sent a letter to the Governor and state legislative leaders, urging the passage of legislation that would establish a set time period moratorium on assessing interest and penalties on property tax accounts.

"These are unprecedented times as workers find themselves furloughed and businesses and individuals being unable to meet their financial obligations, including paying their property taxes," Alderwoman Coggs said. "With the devastating and sudden loss of income being felt across the board, I believe individual property taxpayers and beleaguered small businesses impacted by the pandemic would benefit from the relief of not having to pay interest and penalties on property tax accounts," she said.

A second legislative file introduced by Alderwoman Coggs would require the Department of Employee Relations to look at establishing hazardous duty pay for "essential" city workers.

Currently, "essential" city employees across the city workforce are required to report to their work locations during the COVID-19 pandemic, while "non-essential" city workers are asked to stay and (in some cases) work from home.

"I believe this is an issue of fairness and one that we need to look at closely, especially with the likelihood that the 'stay home' orders could be in effect

for many weeks if not months to come," Alderwoman Coggs said.

The measure could come before the Finance and Personnel Committee when it meets on April 9 at City Hall.

Jane's Walk MKE Postpones Entire Month of Walks this May

Committee Offers Safe, Fun Alternatives and donates to Hunger Task Force

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Jane's Walk MKE has postponed its annual month of walks, bikes, and paddles this May. The committee has yet to commit to a later date in 2020, but anticipates its 2021 celebration. Rather than group gatherings to explore the community, Jane's Walk MKE created a Choose-Your-Own-Adventure Challenge, 20 alternatives to exploring Milwaukee and its neighbors.

Instead of resident-led tours with large groups, these adventures are to be enjoyed either solo or with members of a household or living unit. Residents can choose to walk or run, bike, paddle, or roll outside or stay inside and curl up with a book or film. Participants are invited to share stories about their neighborhood or other places they love, discover unseen aspects of our community, and learn more about Jane Jacobs and those inspired by her.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has ordered us all to honor safe physical distancing but also recommends 150 minutes of physical activity weekly, not only for physical well-being but also mental health. A good walk or bike or kayak is great for reducing stress, which most people have a lot of nowadays. We can get this much-needed activity and explore our streets, paths, and waterways and still adhere to CDC recommendations and the governor's orders as they develop.

This year's theme, Revisioning Milwaukee, was inspired by Priya Parker's book *The Art of Gathering*. Defining gathering as a "conscious bringing together of people for a reason," Parker's book helped us choose a "bold, sharp purpose" for each neighborhood exploration and event: to vision and revision Milwaukee and its neighbors 20/20. Since the pandemic's spread, however, we've all been forced to revise how and where we gather.

This year would have been the 5th anniversary of this Milwaukee Turners program. The launch of Jane's Walk MKE in 2015 coincided with what would have been urban activist Jane Jacobs' 100th birthday. The Milwaukee organizing committee joined an international movement in 20 countries and over 400 cities dedicated to changing the ways in which we see and experience our cities.

 “the virus from me,” Bowen said in a press statement printed in the March 25 MCJ.

“Even if you are young and typically healthy, it’s even more important that you heed the call to stay home, take care of your family, and not spread the virus to others who are vulnerable.”

The only notable woman to contract the virus is Cong. Gwen Moore, who confirmed she was exposed to the illness in a recent statement. She had been informed that she came into contact with someone who tested positive for the illness.

Though she had no physical contact with the individual and was told her risk for contracting COVID-19 was low and she had not showed any symptoms, Moore nonetheless followed the guidelines from public health officials and self-quarantined to protect others from potential exposure.

“I understand that everyone cannot afford to

self-quarantine for fear of losing their jobs and falling behind in bills,” Moore said in a statement.

“Not every job can be done remotely. The economic reality many Americans face is why I joined the House in passing the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, which would guarantee free testing, strengthen unemployment benefits, and provide paid leave.”

Other notable community individuals to fall ill from the virus are Pastor Greg Lewis of Pastors United; Milwaukee Municipal Court Judge Derrick Mosley, community elder and leader Reuben Harpole, and Arthur Reid of Goldengate Funeral Home.

During the Stay-at-Home order, all public and private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside a single household or living unit are prohibited, except for a few limited purposes. Nothing in the order prohibits the gathering of

members of a household or living unit.

Stamper warned anyone who doesn’t heed the order to stay home will face severe consequences. He revealed Milwaukee Police will begin enforcing the Stay-at-Home order where needed, especially when they see people congregating and conducting “business as usual” in violation of the order.

The MPD reported problems with compliance have been especially bad on the north side, especially in the 15 district, which Stamper represents on the Common Council.

Seventh District Ald. Khalif Rainey agreed with Stamper and urged residents—especially in his district—to take the order seriously and remain home.

“I implore all residents to stay at home unless it is absolutely necessary to leave,” Rainey said in a press statement. “I particularly want to encourage residents near St. Joseph’s and the Sherman Park area to abide by these orders, as those places have seen the greatest concentration of positive cases.”

Noting the closing of all non-essential businesses in Los Angeles by its mayor, Rainey called on city Health Commissioner Jeanette Kowalik to create a process whereby non-essential Milwaukee businesses that have been ignoring the order to close will be served first with a notice warning of a shut-off of power and water until further notice.

The alderman added a non-essential business that stays open could be the source (unwittingly)

of hundreds of new COVID-19 infections—and an unknown number of deaths.

“I find it incredibly selfish and reckless for any non-essential business to continue to operate during the deadly coronavirus emergency,” he said.

“I believe shutting off the lights and the water to scofflaw businesses is one key option Milwaukee must pursue.”

“The north side and the seventh district are at the epicenter of the city’s COVID-19 outbreak, and by (population) percentage of virus spread, Milwaukee is unfortunately in the top eight in the nation, and numerous individuals from Milwaukee have already died of the disease.”

Moore also urged north side residents to adhere to the orders.

“It is crucial that people comply with this emergency order to help slow the spread of COVID-19 here in Wisconsin,” said the congresswoman in a recent E-newsletter.

The lawmakers again stressed residents who do go outside their homes to go to the store, walk a pet, go to the pharmacy, a doctor, or to an essential job, utilize safe practices such as social distancing of six-feet when walking or on public transportation.

“As a city we need to do everything we can and use every tool at our disposal to stop the spread of the virus,” Rainey said.

Milwaukee Establishes Voter Registration and Absentee Ballot Drop-Off Sites Library locations increase access for voters amid social distancing

The City of Milwaukee Election Commission announced today that four Milwaukee Public Library branches, as well as the Frank P. Zeidler Municipal

Building, will now serve as drop-off sites for residents to return their absentee ballots. Each location will be open from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m. every day up

until, and including, the April 7 election. Ballots may still be returned using the postage-paid return envelope included with each ballot.

In addition to acting as an absentee ballot drop-off location, at each site members of the public can receive help with voter registration if they are unable to complete the process online at myvote.wi.gov.

Even though online voter registration was recently extended until March 30, the Election Commission recognizes that not all residents in the city have access to the internet.

Election workers will be on hand to facilitate registration at all five sites.

To date, the Commission has sent nearly 56,000 absentee ballots to voters and is responding to an average of 5,000 requests per day.

Neil Albrecht, Executive Director of the Milwaukee Election Commission, anticipates that the City will have between 95,000 and 105,000 absentee voters by Election Day. Voters may request absentee ballots up until Thursday, April 2. Residents identifying as indefinitely confined (unable to leave home due to age or illness), have until Friday, April 3 to complete their vote.

Under current law, ballots must be received by 8 p.m. on April 7, Election Day, to be counted. To date, there has been no change to Wisconsin law regarding this requirement.

“Our absentee voting numbers are unprecedented, surpassing any previous election, including past Presidential elections. We want to be sure that every person

that is voting absentee has the opportunity to have their ballot counted in the election. It may not be realistic to anticipate that a ballot sent to someone on April 3 can be received, voted and returned by April 7,” said Neil Albrecht.

“We are very grateful for this partnership with Milwaukee Public Libraries to help us establish this essential safeguard.”

 eliminated under this design, Evers notes. Some polling locations would remain open for people who aren’t able to vote by mail.

The election is in limbo due to the impact of the coronavirus (COVID-19) throughout the state, nation and world. Wisconsin is currently under a stay-at-home order issued by the governor to curb the number of state virus cases.

Currently, there are 111 state municipalities reporting polling place staff shortages, due to the virus and the fact older individuals are more susceptible to COVID-19.

The majority of poll workers are seniors. The state election commission reported the state is short nearly 7,000 poll workers.

Though Evers’ brief doesn’t ask for a postponement of the election, it did urge the judge to make changes to the absentee ballot system that it argues would

“maintain the democratic process, while also implementing appropriate measures to save lives.”

As of Tuesday, nearly one million absentee ballots (972,232) had been requested and all but approximately 30,000 had been sent to voters.

In an amicus brief filed by the City of Madison, it told the court the city alone was facing a backlog of 10,000 requests, nearly a third of the number cited by Evers.

The governor’s brief noted, too, that of the over 940,000 sent out, more than 600,000 have yet to be returned.

Recently, presidential candidate, U.S. Sen. Bernie Sanders, called on the state to delay the election and extend early voting in the wake of the pandemic.

“People should not be forced to put their lives on the line to vote, which is why 15 states are now following the advice of public health experts and delaying their elections,” Sanders said. “We urge Wisconsin to join them.”

Sanders said Wisconsin “should delay Tuesday’s vote, extend early voting and work to move entirely to vote-by-mail. While we wait for a decision, we urge our supporters to vote-by-mail.”

1) Make sure that you and every person in your household is counted. This includes babies, children, and the elderly. The online form is available at my2020census.gov. Or you can call to complete the census over the phone.

2) Encourage family, friends, and neighbors to complete the census. Share with them that not only is it required by law, it does a lot to help their communities.

3) Share about the importance of the census on social media. Search #2020census for images and posts or share your own reasons for completing the census.

4) Do you know a college student who lives off campus? Make sure they know that they should complete the census for where they live during the academic year. Students who live in residence halls are counted in a different way and do not need to complete an individual census form.
