Another 'worst' for the 'Brew City'!

Research organization tabs Milwaukee as worst of 48 U.S. cities for racial equlity in civic engagement; single parent families a major contributing factor

That long ignored elephant in the room just keeps growing and growing.

Milwaukee, identified by several national research organizations as the worst city in America for African Americans based on seven negative social indicators, has now been tagged for yet another.

This time, a national economic research firm has tabbed Milwaukee as the worst among 48 of the nation's largest cities for racial equality in civic engage-

Milwaukee, at 48th of the 48 cities studied, edged out Washington, D.C., for this 'distinction.'

At the other end of the spectrum was Albuquerque, New Mexico, which despite having a relatively small African American population, nonetheless scored much higher on metrics used for the study.

The report was commissioned by the economic organization WalletHub and was based on five metrics--voter turnout rate, volunteer rate, percentage of population on parole, share of veterans and percentage

of single parent households. With 70% of African American families in Milwau kee being headed by a single parent, Wisconsin ranked dead last in that category, significantly impacting the study results.

And, with the highest Black male incarnation rate in the country, it was not surprising that Wisconsin was ranked 45th in its share of adults on parole.

Wisconsin ranked 41st for veterans, and 38th for

Surprisingly, Wisconsin ranked 33rd for Black voter turnout.

WalletHub analyst Jill Gonzalez attributed the vote turnout ranking to restrictions imposed to limit Black voter participation, including ID requirements.

"In order to make sure that people of all races have the same opportunity for political participation, we should start by making it easier to register to vote,' Gonzalez said.

"One way to make registration easier is by having it be 'opt-out' rather than 'opt-in' so people are registered by default, which 16 states have already implemented.

"When it comes to Election Day, we should make sure that minorities have as much access to polling stations as White Americans, and we should consider



making the day a federal holiday or at least extending voting hours so that everyone has the time to go vote," she said.

Wisconsin's voting status was impacted by the most recent election in which only a handful of polling sites were open in Milwaukee, compared to dozens in suburbs and cities with small Black populations like Madison.

The local election commission came under fire for its inability to adjust to the COVID-19 pandemic. The head of the election resigned after the fiasco.

The report's statistical data revealed what some social analysts have long feared as a major contributing factor to poverty—single parent headed households.

A half century after the controversial Moynihan Report, the author's predicted sociocultural paradigm has become a reality

The slow demise of the Black nuclear family has resulted in a state of dysfunctionality.

Yet even as Milwaukee has become an alarming national showcase in that regard, highlighted by the nation's largest poverty, unemployment and academic failure rates in the country, politicians and Black leadership continue to hide their heads in the sand. Republicans continue to blame the victims of American apartheid, while Democrats promote programs to make the poor comfortable in their poverty, instead of empowering them to break the chains of dependency.

The report indirectly notes the causation between poverty and the nation-leading Black male incarceration rate. The poverty index is exacerbated by a single-family income.

Not only does single parent households generally mean impoverishment, but it also impacts crime, and lower education attainment.

Separate studies have revealed a majority of prison inmates come from poor, female headed households Most also lack a high school diploma or were aca-

demic underachievers.


This toxic mix also impacts the electoral process with fewer poor Black individuals participating in

elections.

That may change this fall because of the focus on elections in light of the George Floyd national protests which are being led, primarily, by Black youth.

Mayor Tom Barrett recently helped cut the ribbon officially opening the new Good Hope Library, located at 7717 W. Good Hope Road. This state of the art mixeduse development has been in the works for several years and will be the first library to reopen amid the continuing COVID-19 pandemic. The new branch features meeting spaces, a children's area, greater access to technology, and much more. While some restrictions will apply, access to computers and Wi-Fi, book pickups, and reference services will be available. This library will serve as another staple of the New 9th as it continues to make the district and the northwest side one of the best places to work and play in Milwaukee.

Message to the Church

The writer James Baldwin stated in 1962, "It is, alas, the truth that to be an American writer today means mounting an unending attack on all that Americans believe themselves to hold

It is the truth that to be a person of faith in America today is to recognize that America desires Jesus slogans over morally grounded Jesus-inspired action.

America as a nation stands on the precipice of what Rev. William Barber II refers to as "the third reconstruction," a moment in history when the zeitgeist of the nation clashes with the myth of our history.

The nationwide unrest, witnessed from Maine to California, is part of America's reckoning with a lie this nation has refused to acknowledge.

As a nation, racialized thinking and white supremacy is part of not only our history, but saturates all of our institutions. I will not

bore you with historical details, but scholars such as Michelle Alexander, Ibram X. Kendi, Carol Anderson, and Richard Rothstein make the case powerfully that America has a spiritual malady supported by institutions that either aggressively promote these ideals or willfully ignore their reality.

Our national reckoning and possible reconstruction rest at the epicenter of this myth many today

courageously seek to exorcise from our body politic.

Portland and cities such as Chicago, where I live, work, and serve, offer an additional challenge to people who want to be free of the lie that comes with loving whiteness over ethnicity and power over democracy. One must understand whiteness is a socially constructed identity, created in reaction to Blackness. Ethnicity, on the other hand, is a culturally rooted identity of shared story, music, and usually, good food. One quickly sets up a hierarchy. The other sets a table and tells stories enabling people to struggle to find common chords in the collective human enterprise.

Federal troops being sent to Portland, and possibly Chicago, complicates the movement for Black lives. The case of Portland serves as a map to help us avoid marginalizing Black voices: In a city that is 77 percent white,

where a coalition organized and led by Black activists is speaking directly to America's lie of equality, we witness the stories Black anguish quieted by those on the Left and the Right along with media commentators.

Federal troops in camouflage, without insignia, have engaged white protesters in a manner Black people have screamed about to this nation since the early formation of policing, modeled after southern slave patrols.

White protesters in Portland were given a glimpse of how Black lives do not matter in the face of state-sanctioned violence. As a result, protests swelled in Portland and news coverage increased — not to highlight racial inequity, Black pain, or the racialized deployment of the police, but instead to highlight the horrific federal transgression of constitutional

The heightened sensitivity was again connected to America's historical lie reasserting itself. White citizens were being treated as three fifths" of a person.

The outrage shifted from policy, defunding the police, reparations, courageous conversations on race, repentance, and what does justice look like in America to legitimate constitutional questions that again failed to acknowledge Black suffering.

Republicans using the Lee Atwater and Karl Rove handbooks seized upon this moment to speak of "outside agitators" to frame an "altright" interpretation of the protests.

This strategy is not unlike the propaganda deployed against Martin Luther King Jr. by George Wallace in Alabama. America's racial lie has an undercurrent that does not believe that "three-fifths semi-citizens" have the intellectual capacity for free agency and must be under some "sinister" influence from the Left.

Again, Black suffering was silenced and white discomfort and pain was lifted up in the process. People of faith, those who claim Jesus, have a moral obligation and spiritual call to resist participation in this complicated

How people of faith answer in this moment will determine the future of the American church. Will believers in Jesus decide to be chaplains for the empire or prophets to the na-

Chaplains are in a position to advise those in power, but the proximity to power recuses them from the call to resist, rebel, and join revolutionary movements. The prophet, on the other hand, seeks to disrupt power and has a heart that holds the memory of Rachel's tears. the orphan's death, and the poor's exploitation as sacraments for a faithful journey. People of faith, in this moment, must decide: Shall we follow a dark-skinned Palestinian Jew, who cast his lot with those who had their backs against the wall, or will we march with the advisers of Herod, hoping our presence is enough to keep an arrogant Herod from harming all the Hebrew children?

The deployment of federal troops as a Roman legion seeking to posses the streets of Portland and Chicago must be resisted by people of faith, who have been baptized by the radical notions of Jesus who lived, loved, and ministered with and to the disinherited. How we respond to this moment will determine the future of the American church. Shall we be chaplains or prophets? The question is upon us. What shall be your answer to this moment

Notice is hereby given of a partisan primary to be held in the City of Milwaukee on August 11, 2020, at which the nominees for the offices named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office under the appropriate party, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, if any, in the sample ballot included with this notice.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the partisan primary, the voter shall select the party of his or her choice. Voting for candidates of more than one party may invalidate the ballot. The voter must cast a vote for individual candidates.

Where Optical Scan Voting is used

- If a party preference <u>is designated</u>, and votes are cast for ballot candidates of another party or write-in votes are cast in another party, only votes cast in the designated party will count.
- If a party preference *is not designated*, and votes are cast for candidates (or write-in votes are cast) in more than one party, no votes will be counted

Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

When using an electronic ballot marking device ("Automark" or "Express Vote") to mark an **optical scan** ballot, the voter shall touch the screen at the party of his or her choice. The voter shall then touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

Spoiled Ballots

If a voter spoils an **optical scan** ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **optical scan** ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.






