Annual Fellowship Open Virtual Festivities to honor Sidney Moncrief, Dan Bader, and MCJ Publisher Patricia Pattillo

The Fellowship Open is set to honor Milwaukee Bucks Hall of Famer Sidney Moncrief, Bader Philanthropies President/CEO Daniel J. Bader, and pioneering civil rights activist and Milwaukee Community Journal Founder and Publisher Patricia O'Flynn Pattillo during their annual weekend of events, August 20-23.

On Thursday August 20, during special combined live and virtual ceremonies from Milwaukee's Nō Studios, Pattillo will receive her award as the 2020 Fellowship Open Community Leader Honoree.

Also during the event, Moncrief Game Changer, the Dr. Howard Fuller Collegiate Academy, and the Five Pillars/Metcalf School Virtual Tutoring Project – the non-profit organizations selected by the Fellowship Open as 2020 community beneficiaries – will be formally recognized and receive their awards.

Renowned Milwaukee artist Brad Bernard, commissioned to capture the occasion on canvas, will be on hand for the public unveiling of his 20th Anniversary commemorative portrait, and signed copies of the original will be awarded to the honorees and other special guests.

On Friday August 21, Sidney Moncrief and Dan Bader will receive their respective awards as 2020 Fellowship Open Legends and Corporate Leadership Honorees.

Those ceremonies, a combined virtual and live event, will emanate from two locations – Tripoli Country Club in Brown Deer, and the University Club in Milwaukee. Additionally, the winners of the National Golf Scramble for Youth will be announced and prizes awarded virtually.

HISTORY MAKING PICK!

Joe Biden tabs Kamala Harris as his choice for vice president

After months of speculation and lobbying from African American organizations, history was made as Tuesday when presumptive Democratic presidential candidate, former Vice President Joe Biden, picked California Senator Kamala Harris to be his vice president.

The selection Tuesday makes Harris the first Black woman and person of Indian descent to be selected as a running mate for a major party.

"I have the great honor to announce that I've picked Harris — a fearless fighter for the little guy, and one of the country's finest public servants — as my running mate," he announced on Twitter Tuesday.

"Back when Kamala was Attorney General, of California, she worked closely with Beau (Biden's son). I watched as they took on the big banks.

lifted up working people, and protected women and kids from abuse. I was proud then, and I’m proud now to have her as my partner in this campaign.”

Harris shared her “honor” at joining the ticket and praised Biden as a man who could unify the country.

“.@JoeBiden can unify the American people because he’s spent his life fighting for us. And as president, he’ll build an America that lives up to our ideals,” the senator tweeted.

“I’m honored to join him as our party’s nominee for Vice President, and do what it takes to make him our Commander-in-Chief.”

Former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton quickly offered her congratulations. In 2016, she became the first female nominee of a major party. She encouraged others to support this historic bid for the presidency.

In March, the presumptive Democratic nominee pledged to pick a woman as his running mate during a one-on-one presidential debate with Sen. Bernie Sanders.

“There are a number of women who are qualified to be president tomorrow,” Biden said at the time.

He added, “I would pick a woman to be my vice president.”

Forecasters widely believed that Harris would ultimately be picked despite the fact that she notably put Biden on his heels when she called him out on the issue of busing during a debate last June. It has been a source of contention for Biden insiders who felt the California senator was disloyal during the exchange.

Harris dropped her bid to become president and ultimately became a surrogate for Biden’s campaign. Her name vaulted high into considera-

tion as a potential VP pick after Biden secured enough delegations to earn the nomination in June.

Biden was urged to pick a woman of color in a bid to unify the fractured Democratic Party and country roiled by civil unrest over racial violence and police brutality. Many were resistant to the idea of an all-white ticket as it did not reflect the diverse base and America’s

changing social fabric.

As theGrio previously reported, an open letter was sent to Biden on Monday by prominent Black figures such as Sean “Diddy” Combs, Ben Crump, and Charlamagne Tha God who wanted him to pick a Black woman as his running mate. They warned he’d lose the November election to President Donald Trump should he fail to do so.

“Failing to select a Black woman in 2020 means you will lose the election,” the letter stated.

“We don’t want to choose between the lesser of two evils and we don’t want to vote for the devil we know versus the devil we don’t because we are tired of voting for devils – period.”—Article courtesy of the-Grio.com

The American Heart Association (AHA) announced that Jasmine M. Johnson, Diversity Programs Director – North America at ManPower Group, will serve as chair of the organization's 2021 Milwaukee Go Red for Women campaign.

Johnson is the first woman of color to hold this position, here in Milwaukee, and is looking forward to leading the fight against cardiovascular disease, especially in the Black community, who are disproportionately affected.

The Milwaukee Go Red for Women Celebration – attended by more than 400 individuals from Milwaukee's business, medical and philanthropic communities – went virtual this past year, benefiting the Go Red for Women movement and empowering women to take control of their heart health. The event cele-

City of Milwaukee Announces \$15M in CARES Act Funding for Rent Support and Assistance

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit Wisconsin in early March, the City of Milwaukee has been actively working to keep Milwaukee families housed.

On July 30, the City of Milwaukee announced an allocation of an additional \$15 million in CARES Act funding for rent support and assistance to help over 3,000 families remain in stable housing.

"With the end of federal assistance, I'm very concerned that people will be losing their homes," said Mayor Tom Barrett.

"I have been very pleased to see that as families seek help, many landlords have been holding back on evictions, knowing that rent support is on its way.

"We're hard at work with our local partners to make sure that Milwaukee residents do not have these major disruptions in their lives."

Families will be allowed up to \$3,000 in support for rent payments or security deposits. Funding will follow the same income criteria as the Wisconsin Rental Assistance Program.

Candidates must be an adult resident with a household income at or below 80% of County Median Income in the month prior to the date of application.

Persons at or below 60% County Median Income receive priority. Only one recipient is allowed per qualified household.

Applicants must provide documentation showing a loss of employment or a reduction in income due to COVID-19.

Mayor Barrett has also allocated \$1.6 million in federal HOME funds to address

higher-risk tenants and landlords, including those already in an eviction action in court.

The HOME funds are essential to support the work of the Rental Housing Resource Center partners—Community Advocates, Legal Action of Wisconsin, Legal Aid Society of Milwaukee and Mediate Milwaukee—to prevent evictions and stabilize housing for city of Milwaukee residents.

Applications for rent assistance through the Social Development Commission are still available online here, and landlords are encouraged to participate.

"We applaud the City of Milwaukee for the additional financial support," and Andi Elliott, Chief Executive Officer of Community Advocates.

"The need for rental assistance to ensure that Milwaukeeans are able to stay housed is unprecedented.

"We truly appreciate the collective efforts of state, county and city government to partner with the Rental Housing Resource Center to provide this lifeline of support."

"This is excellent news for the community," said George Hinton, Chief Executive Officer of the Social Development Commission. "This summer we've seen the tremendous need for assistance.

"This additional funding will ensure that more families get the assistance they desperately need. This also shows how government and other organi-

zations can work together to support a community in crisis."

(continued from front page) simple with a little natural light will set the mood.

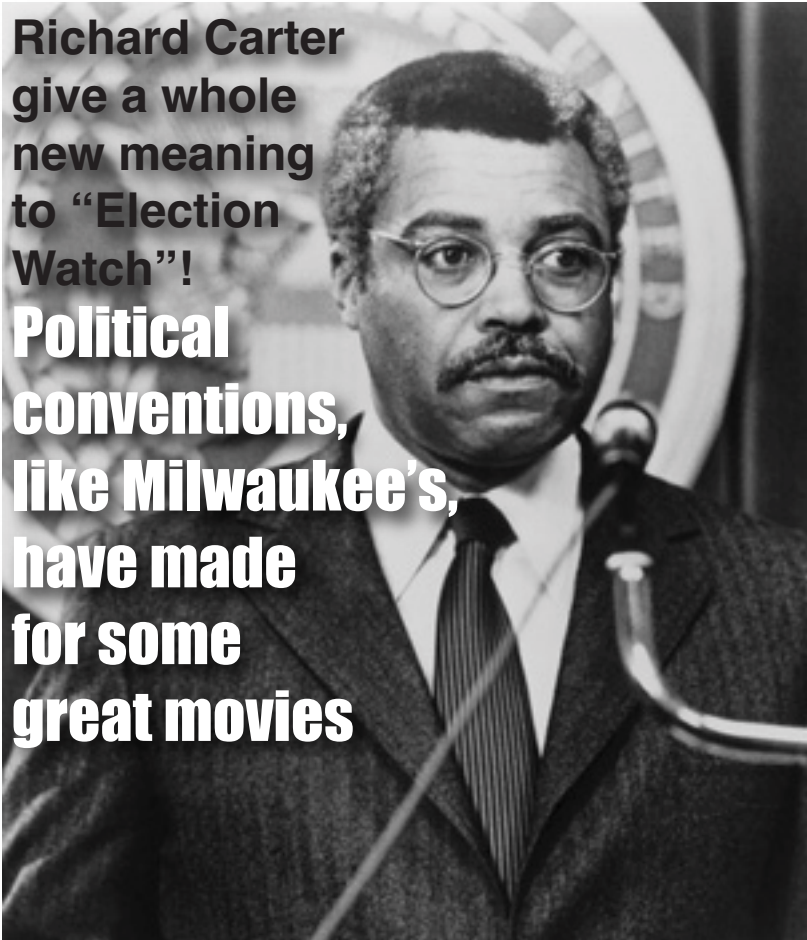

Richard Carter give a whole new meaning to "Election Watch"! Political conventions, like Milwaukee's, have made for some great movies

With the nationally televised Democrat presidential convention about to begin in Milwaukee, it's interesting to look back at some classic Hollywood movies in which political conventions were pivotal. The following four are prime examples:

"The Man" (1972) -- In Rod Serling's screenplay from Irving Wallace's novel, James Earl Jones, as Douglas Dilman -- president pro tempore of the Senate -- becomes chief executive shortly before the convention after a freak disaster in Europe kills the President and Speaker of the House, and wheelchair-bound VP (Lew Ayres) is too ill to take over.

As the first Black president, Jones -- a widower --

-- tells the Washington convention he wants to remain. With Janet MacLachlan, as his militant, graduate student daughter; Georg Stanford Brown; Burgess Meredith; Martin Balsam, and Barbara Rush -- racist wife of the Secretary of State (William Windom) -- whom she feels should be President.

"Medium Cool" (1969) -- Director-writer-cameraman Haskell Wexler expertly used disturbing, actual film of the raucous 1968 Democrat convention in Chicago -- including the protests and police riots.

A stoic TV cameraman (Robert Forster) covering the convention finds himself drawn into the action while aiding a bewildered West Virginia mother (Verna Bloom) with tragic consequences. Believable cast includes Marquette University grad Peter Bonerz, Peter Boyle, Marianna Hill and Harold Blankenship.

"The Manchurian Candidate" (1962) -- John Frankenheimer's superior original, with Laurence Harvey as a Korean War hero brain-washed to assassinate the presidential nominee at the Madison Square Garden convention. Strong support by Angela Lansbury as his diabolical Communist mother, soldier James Edwards, Frank Sinatra, Janet Leigh, Khigh Deigh, James Gregory, Henry Silva, Leslie Parrish and John McGiver.

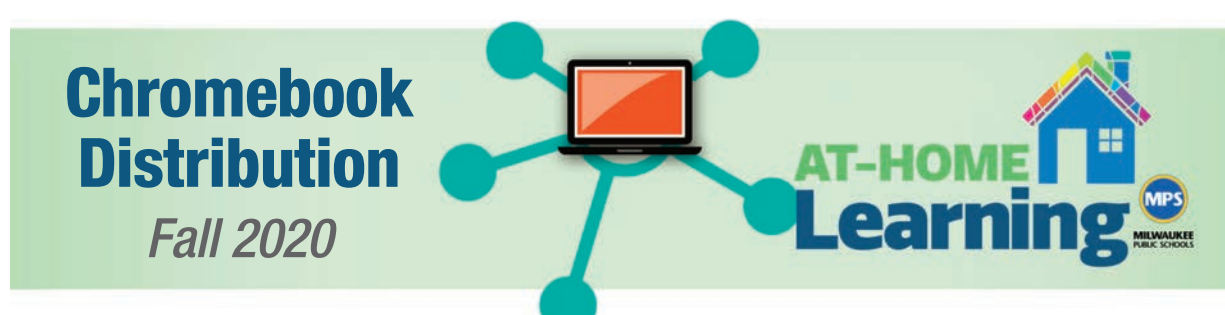
Perhaps the most compelling is 1964's "The Best Man" -- Gore Vidal's stinging insight into down-and-dirty political conventions, with scenes of noisy, partisan state delegations. The film focuses on driven men and women pulling out the stops in trying to help their candidate gain the party's presidential nomination as the convention plays out.

Directed by Franklin Schaffner, this vintage-star, black-and-white vehicle features gospel singer Mahalia Jackson, Henry Fonda, Cliff Robertson, Edie Adams, Margaret Leighton, Lee Tracy, Kevin McCarthy, Ann Sothorn, Shelley Berman, Gene Raymond, Richard Arlen, John Henry Faulk and William R. Ebersole.

As William Russell, a wealthy, womanizing, intellectual Secretary of State, Fonda (who portrayed the President the same year in "Fail Safe") seeks endorsement of the dying ex-President (Lee Tracy) at the Los Angeles convention.

His chief rival is Sen. Joe Cantwell (a smarmy, up-

We can't trust Trump with our kids' health

On July 17, America lost a courageous leader and a remarkable teacher. From a young age, Congressman John Lewis sacrificed his comfort and safety—Freedom Riding, crossing Selma’s Edmund Pettus Bridge, marching on Washington, serving as the conscience of Congress—so that others may live to see equal justice and experience the promise of this nation.

He called this work “good trouble” and urged us to keep it up as he watched the Trump administration stoke flames of hate, eliminate and drastically cut essential programs, and lead the country down a path of death and destruction with its glaring mismanagement of the coronavirus.

An unyielding passion for public service, social justice, and the people of Georgia, led me to work as a state senator and chair of Georgia’s Democratic party. Congressman Lewis was not only my mentor but my friend.

He taught me many valuable lessons over the years, but on one point he never wavered: never let a bully stand in the way of what’s right for the American people.

With coronavirus numbers rising in Georgia, and nearly 4 million cases across the country, unemployment topping 11%, mass voter disenfranchisement, and the movement to protect Black lives sparking protests in neighborhoods across the nation, the country is crying out for help and stable leadership.

Instead, we have a president who has made these crises so much worse.

Experts have told us what it will take to end this virus, but Donald Trump just does whatever it takes to save himself. Because of his failed response, more than 140,000 Americans are dead and cases are rising more rapidly than ever. More than four months into this crisis, he still doesn’t have a plan to get us out of it.

Because Trump let the virus get so out of control, many schools can’t reopen safely. Instead of listening to experts, parents, and teachers, Trump is threatening to force schools to reopen without the necessary equipment and testing, and he wants to cut their funding if they don’t.

As the mother of a rising kindergartener, I would never put his safety and well-being in the hands of Donald Trump.

Trump continues to ignore the data that shows children can contract the coronavirus and infect their teachers and family members without showing any symptoms.

A new study says kids starting at age 10 are at least as likely to spread the virus as adults. And after he claimed the coronavirus would ‘disappear’ and has still failed to set up the testing and contact tracing we needed to confront the pandemic, we can’t trust him to make decisions about our kids’ health.

The federal government should be providing schools with the resources they need during this crisis, but that is not hap-

pening under Trump.

Former vice president Joe Biden has released a roadmap for how to reopen schools safely and get the coronavirus under control. We desperately need that kind of leadership in the White House.

I am honored to carry the mantle for Congressman Lewis and the 5th Congressional District. I am ready to get into good trouble.

Sports author asks University of Wisconsin athletic director to disassociate himself from Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame

I ask that you please reconsider your association with the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame. The Association has engaged in racist and sexist practices, which has resulted in the exclusion of women and minorities from the Hall of Fame.

As a man of great influence, you can do something about this matter.

People listen to you. You can stand up for change. How? By taking a stand and refuse to accept the Lifetime Achievement

Because African Americans and women constitute a large percentage of athletes in the University of Wisconsin program, perhaps you will seriously consider my comments.

In my opinion, the Wisconsin Athletic HOF has shown blatant exclusion of some of the greatest Black athletes and women to participate in sports in our state.

Do you realize that just 8.4% of inductees are Black and only 6.3% are female?

Three of the five greatest Green Bay Packers’ defenders have been omitted from the Hall - for 40 years. According to

Cliff Christl, seven-time Wisconsin sportswriter of the year, and official team historian, Herb Adderley, Willie Wood and Dave Robinson are among the top five defensive players since 1950 to wear the green and gold. (The other two are Reggie White and Willie Davis.)

All three of the players are members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, all retired in the 1970’s, all are Black and none have been inducted into the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame. Here is a link to Mr. Christl’s article:

Once again this year, great Black players such as Adderley, Wood, Robinson, Doc Rivers, “Down Town” Freddie Brown, Marcus Lucas, Jim Chones, Butch Lee, Bo Ellis, Terry Porter, Michael Finley and others are being suspiciously excluded by the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame.

And of course, no women, such as Chris Witty of West Allis, an American speed skater and racing cyclist who won multiple Olympic medals and is a world record setter, or Waukesha’s world class triathlete Gwen Jorgensen (UW-Madi-

son).

These types of omissions were brought to the attention of the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame selection committee several years ago, at a time the present owners were in control.

Mr. Alvarez, it is my sincere hope that you will dissociate yourself from the organization to avoid tarnishing your good name and give reason for excellent African American and women athletic recruits to refuse to play for the University of Wisconsin’s athletic department, which you direct.

Or perhaps, alienate those presently in the program. It is easy to image Big 10 and major college recruiters telling prospects that UW’s Athletic Director serves as an advisor to an athletic group that limits membership to 8.4% Blacks and 6.3% women.

Enough is enough. It is time to stop supporting, enabling and excusing racism and sexism.

If you choose to resign from the advisory board of the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame, we would welcome your support to right the wrongs that continue to be made.

Please help the ignored, it is the right thing to do.

That seems to be blatant, targeted exclusion, not some kind of oversight. The so-called Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame is located at the University of Wisconsin – Milwaukee.

Again this year, a banquet is scheduled to induct two White men, who were undoubtedly selected in order to generate lots of money to line the pockets of the owners of this self-styled hall of fame.

The cost of a general admission ticket to attend this year’s sold out, elitist event? One thousand dollars a head.

And, once again this year, great Black players such as Herb Adderley, Willie Wood, Dave Robinson, Doc Rivers, “Down Town” Freddie Brown, Marcus Lucas, Jim Chones, Butch Lee, Bo Ellis, Terry Porter, Michael Finley and others are being suspiciously excluded by the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame. And of course, no women, such as Chris Witty of West Allis, an American speed skater and racing cyclist who won multiple Olympic medals and is a world record setter, or Waukesha’s world class triathlete Gwen Jorgensen.

If these great, respected, accomplished and successful athletes cannot get proper recognition, how can common folks, the indigenous, people of color or female, hope to get treated fairly in our society?

It appears as if the Wisconsin Athletic HOF continues to make a conscience decision that Blacks and women do not generate the type of high dollar sponsors and wealthy attendees – elites – that are welcome at the mega-priced banquet.

It also appears that attendees, sponsors, participants and inductees of the banquet are just fine with supporting racism and sexism.

Enough is enough. It is time to stop supporting, enabling and excusing it.

The Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame banquet, scheduled for August 21st, should be cancelled. —Royce Boyles

Residents encouraged to share their thoughts on City budget priorities

As the City of Milwaukee prepares to share and discuss the 2021 City budget, residents are being encouraged to share their thoughts on spending priorities. The City’s Budget and Management Division has created several tools for residents to share thoughts and simulate City spending to better familiarize themselves with the process. As part of the 2020 budget, Alderwoman Milele A. Coggs sponsored an amendment that directed the Department of Administration Budget and Management Division to create a system for residents to be able to better participate in the budget process and determine its allocation.

“It is crucial that residents be able to participate in the budget process early on so that policy makers can utilize that feedback to create a budget that is representative of community needs,” said Alderwoman Coggs. “I urge everyone to take a few minutes to complete the budget priority survey, and interact with the budget simulation tool to get a deeper understanding of the financial situation we must navigate. Together, we can create the best budget possible that will help us build a stronger Milwaukee.”

The City of Milwaukee Budget Priority Survey is a short, 5-minute survey asking residents several questions that will help City leaders understand residents’ budget preferences and priorities. The survey is available in English, Spanish and Hmong and responses are being collected until 11:59 p.m. on Monday, August 17th. The City has also created the Balancing Act budget simulation tool. This simple to use, interactive online platform allows residents to develop their own City of Milwaukee 2021 budget. To balance the budget, residents can adjust revenues and expenses for City departments. from-the-bootstraps Robertson) also pushing for Tracy’s support.

As the convention proceeds, they await Tracy’s decision at the Ambassador Hotel, egged-on by key advisers -- McCarthy as Fonda’s upbeat campaign manager and Raymond as Robertson’s older brother, who lost to Tracy as a presidential candidate.

Meanwhile, Fonda and Robertson also seek the support of three minor candidates -- Sen. Oscar Anderson (Arlen); Gov. T.T. Claypoole (Faulk), and Gov. John Merwin (Ebersole). However, each decides to withhold their choice until the second floor ballot.

Fonda is the odds-on favorite to secure the party’s nomination prior to a stunning turn of events. He and Robertson have dirt on each other, complicating matters. But not for Tracy, who favors no-holds-barred infighting by any candidate who is really serious.

Robertson threatens to supply each state’s

convention floor delegation with a year-old medical report revealing Fonda suffered a nervous breakdown. After he also criticizes his opponent’s adultery, the feisty Tracy tells him, “A lot of men need a lot of women.”

On the other hand, Fonda ponders releasing information from a witness (Berman) to Robertson’s alleged homosexual activity during Army service in Alaska in World War II..

Meanwhile, an annoying female gossip columnist (Sothern), blurs the issue by haranguing each candidate and pushing to interview their wives as the future First Lady -- Fonda’s stately Leighton and Robertson’s ditsy Adams.

At a glossy dinner before the first floor vote -- featuring a rousing vocal by Jackson -- Tracy surprises by declining to endorse either Fonda or Robertson, after initially favoring the latter. Hours later, as he lay in bed dying, Tracy, whose work garnered an Oscar nomination as Best Supporting Actor, chastises the laid-back

Fonda for indecisiveness.

In a secret face-to-face meeting, Fonda then challenges Robertson to release the medical report and Robertson backs down. A short time later, Robertson pleads with Fonda to become his vice presidential running mate, but Fonda refuses.

In the finale, Fonda unexpectedly withdraws from the race and, to stop Robertson, releases his convention delegates. He informs the next state to vote -- which happens to be Wisconsin -- that he endorses California’s nondescript Merwin. With the floodgates now open, each state delegation votes for Merwin as the party’s presidential candidate.

“The Best Man” is nasty and great, and should not be missed by Milwaukeeans -- especially with the Democrat convention in town this month.
