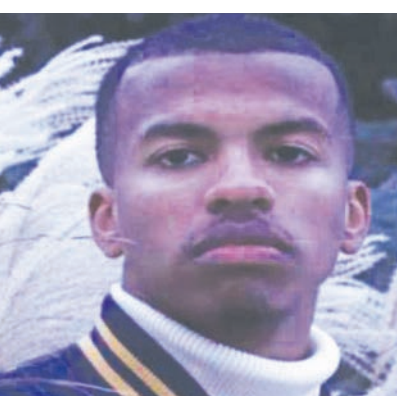

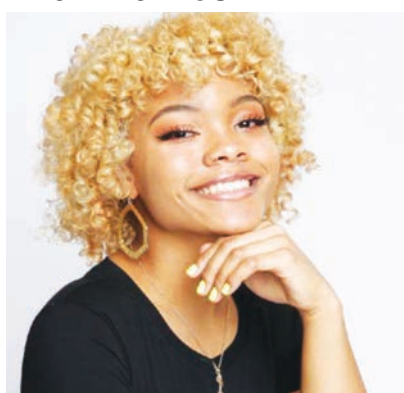

# COPING WITH COVID-19



## COVID-19 Has Increased the Digital Divide, But the Black Community is Facing Yet Another Threat to Tech Access

(TriceEdneyWire.com) – As COVID-19 wreaks havoc on a digital and educational divide that has already severely impacted African-American and other children of color, yet another situation on the horizon could further increase disparities by hindering access to crucial technological tools, according to experts.

Two cases pending before the U.S. International Trade Commission (ITC) are being watched by educators and lawmakers who describe them as deeply troubling. Many big names in technology are under attack - including Amazon, Apple, Asus, Dell, HP, Lenovo, LG, Microsoft, Motorola, Samsung, and Sony – and tech experts say the outcomes of these cases are absolutely realistic threats to the ability to obtain certain mobile communication devices – an outcome that would increase the digital divide even further during this unprecedented time of online learning.

In a nutshell, Neodron, a company just recently created in Ireland, is seeking to block the import of more than 90 percent of mobile touchscreen devices, like smartphones, tablets and touch-

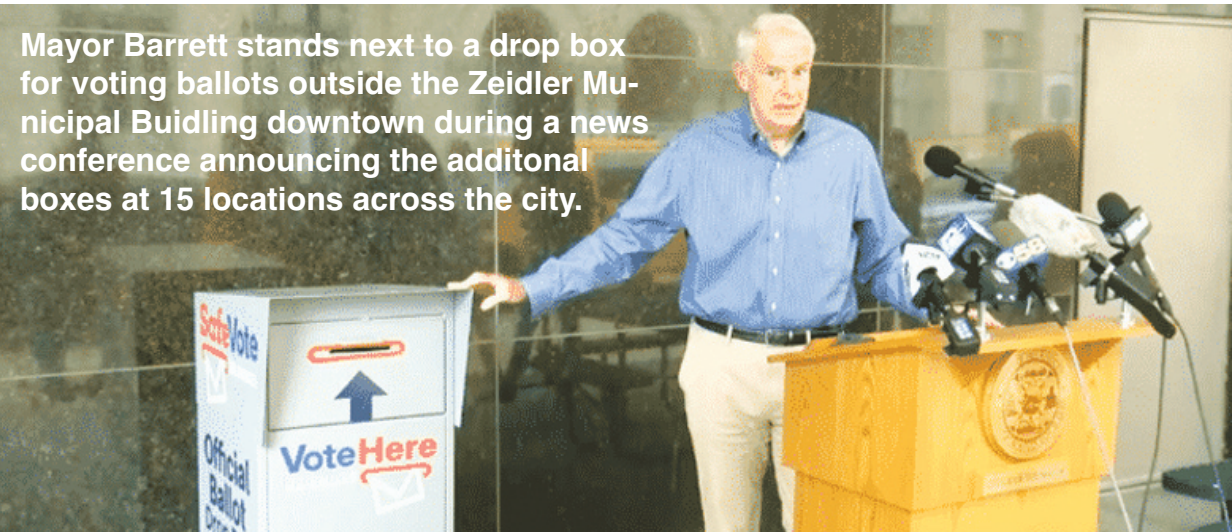

Mayor Barrett, Election Commission Executive Director Claire Woodall-Vogg and Milwaukee Public Library Director and City Librarian Joan Johnson highlighted the addition of 15 new, 24-hour absentee ballot drop boxes located throughout the city in advance of the 2020 presidential election.

The City of Milwaukee estimates that close to 290,000 City residents will vote in the upcoming November 3 presidential election. Over 52% of voters, or 150,000 people, are expected to cast their ballots absentee by mail.

“Given this surge in absentee voting, it is imperative for the City to provide easily accessible, secure and timely opportunities for residents to return ballots and, equally important, feel complete confidence that their votes will be counted,” said Mayor Tom Barrett.

“We’re doing everything we can to make drop boxes secure and easily accessible so that our residents can use them during this historic time.”

Absentee ballot drop off boxes are being installed at 15 locations across the city, including outside the City Hall complex, the Election Commission warehouse located at 1901 S. Kinnickinnic Ave. and all 13 neighborhood-based Milwaukee Public Library branches. Milwaukee Public Library also offers voter assistance Tuesday-Saturday from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. through October 14.

“Milwaukee Public Library has a long history with elections,” said Milwaukee Public Library Director and City Librarian Joan Johnson. “For decades, our staff has helped patrons register to vote and our neighborhood libraries have served as polling places. Civic literacy is an important pillar of our work at the libraries, and we are proud to expand our role in democracy by providing voter assistance, permanent and secure absentee ballot drop off, in-person early voting and Election Day voting.”

Ballots can be dropped off at any location, 24 hours a day, up until 8 p.m. when polls close on November 3. The ballot boxes are designed to secure and protect delivered ballots, and each is monitored by video surveillance. Tamper-

ing with absentee ballots is a felony, and anyone caught doing so will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

Absentee ballots will be collected on a daily basis by Election Commission staff and be delivered to their offices. From there, the ballots will be processed as received and prepared for Election Day counting.

Absentee voters can confirm that their ballot was received within 24 hours of delivery online at [myvote.wi.gov](https://myvote.wi.gov).

As Election Day nears and drop boxes receive more activity, more frequent ballot collection will occur, twice daily if needed. On Election Day, absentee ballots will be collected every other hour up until 8 p.m.

The Election Commission can cancel and reissue a ballot if a voter makes a mistake, if the ballot is lost or if there is concern that the ballot wasn’t received and records indicate it wasn’t received.

“We are still seeing voters find that voting at home is convenient, it is easy and it’s the safest way to vote. But with that said, there is a learning curve,” said Election Commission Executive Director Claire Woodall-Vogg. “The Election Commission will be doing everything in our power to educate voters on how to make sure that their vote counts, including updating our absentee instructions to have visuals of where the voter should sign the signature envelope and creating educational videos about how to complete your absentee ballot envelope to be sure that it is counted.”

Wisconsin is a no-excuse absentee voting state, meaning a voter does not need to explain why they need an absentee ballot in order to request one. Voters should start receiving their absentee ballots by mail beginning next week.

The deadline to request an

# Black Community is Facing Yet Another Threat to Tech Access

screen laptops, that come into the United States. Neodron doesn't design or manufacture products within the U.S. Its business plan is to acquire patents and then sue for infringement.

The cases have caught the attention of members of Congress, and those in the tech world express major concern.

"When we talk about digital divide, you're talking primarily about the availability of high speed internet and its distribution across our nation. The big problem with this patent infringement claim is that the vast majority of inner city schools still have barely sufficient internet connection," says Michael Russell, the lead instructor for information technology, security and forensics at the Pittsburgh Technical College since 2002.

Russell points out that "the majority of young people who access the internet today access the internet from their smartphones." Particularly low income children often use their smartphones in order to get on the Internet.

He believes the Neodron case could impact their educational lives.

Russell used the term "patent pirate" when describing the activities of companies like Neodron which acquires patents for the purpose of financial gain. Neodron recently obtained patents from Microchip Technologies, possibly with the motive of filing petitions asking the ITC to investigate and close the U.S. market to nearly all smartphones, tablets, and laptops. In short, Neodron is putting the devices that people rely on at risk amidst a season when they need them most.

According to a statement by the ITC, the complaint "alleges violations of section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930 in the importation into the United States and sale of certain touch-controlled mobile devices, computers, and components thereof that infringe patents asserted by the complainant. The complainant requests that the USITC issue a

limited exclusion order and cease and desist orders."

Restricting the import of these devices into the United States would cause educational and personal hardships for people largely dependent on their smartphones and other affected devices.

The issue is so dire that two members of Congress formed a bipartisan partnership to deal with it. Suzan DelBene (D-Wash.) and David Schweikert (R-Ariz.) introduced the Advancing America's Interests Act to stop patent abuse through the ITC and to assure that the agency adheres to a high standard of public interest.

"The ITC was established to protect U.S. companies and consumers from unfair foreign competition, but in recent years, patent licensing entities have abused the ITC process for financial gain," said DelBene in a joint release. "This legislation addresses this problem and helps protect American businesses from unfair and unjustified claims."

Schweikert called the legislation "an important step in the right direction towards reforming the ITC's unfair imports process to ensure that American businesses have equitable access to protection for their ideas."

This potential impact of this case cannot be overlooked as African-Americans and other racial minorities have been so disproportionately impacted by COVID-19. As lives have become almost totally dependent upon access to the internet and remote services, the impact of an ITC exclusion order would have a broad reach.

Instead of rushing to get children out the door to catch the school bus and then driving into work, many parents now struggle to manage their children's education as schools have shifted to remote learning and parents work from home. Government services of all types are now online, from job applications to business licenses to unemployment claims. And then there's access to health care.

Throughout the pandemic, it has become clear that telehealth is surging and is a crucial resource that allows people to protect both their community as a whole and the healthcare workers providing their critical services.

According to a recent study, up to 42 million people may not have access to broadband, a figure that is disproportionately made up of African-Americans and other people of color. But without the devices necessary to even access the internet, the problem becomes worse and communities of color are at a great disadvantage.

A key concern is that since the COVID-19 pandemic, an already serious struggle for low income students of color, has been exacerbated.

The Greenlining Institute, a 27-year-old multi-racial organization in Oakland, Calif. that aims to end economic discrimi-

nation such as redlining, conducted a survey of Oakland and Fresno, Calif. residents before COVID-19. The findings were as gloomy as expected. But all of the common themes were "made more urgent by the pandemic", the Institute reports on its website.

Those common themes include "Internet access is not a luxury; Lack of access creates significant hurdles for everyday life; Smartphone access is insufficient; Internet plans designed for low-income families are inadequate; Lack of access is a barrier to academic success."

Russell says if Neodron prevails, these issues could expand and get even worse for more people across the nation.

"I'm not only talking about just young people," he said. "I'm talking about the elderly needing to monitor their health care, making appointments with the

doctor and things of that nature. All of those things could be adversely impacted. Mostly inner city; mostly Black and Latino families would continue to have the largest impact."

As the issue spirals, even more considerations will come into play.

"The educational, financial and personal need for the internet could lead to an even greater conflict than the inability to get online," says Russell, who also teaches regulatory compliance.

"I do believe that technology has a potential of being another form of warfare," he says. "I'm really concerned about that. Like economic warfare. We have a company located in another country filing a claim against American corporations that could adversely impact the way we live and do business. That's a real deal."

absentee ballot is the Thursday before the election, but the Election Commission cautions voters that this is not a realistic deadline given the mail delivery schedule. If using a drop box to return an absentee ballot, October 26 is the deadline to request a ballot. Voters who wish to complete the entire process by mail, without using a drop box, have a deadline of October 20 to conduct their voting.

The City of Milwaukee currently has 171 neighborhood-based Election Day polling places, and the number could still increase before November 3. In the past, the City has offered 180 polling places. Since the August 11 election, the City has received 11,000 applications for poll workers. The total number of staff for Election Day is anticipated to be 2,400 workers.

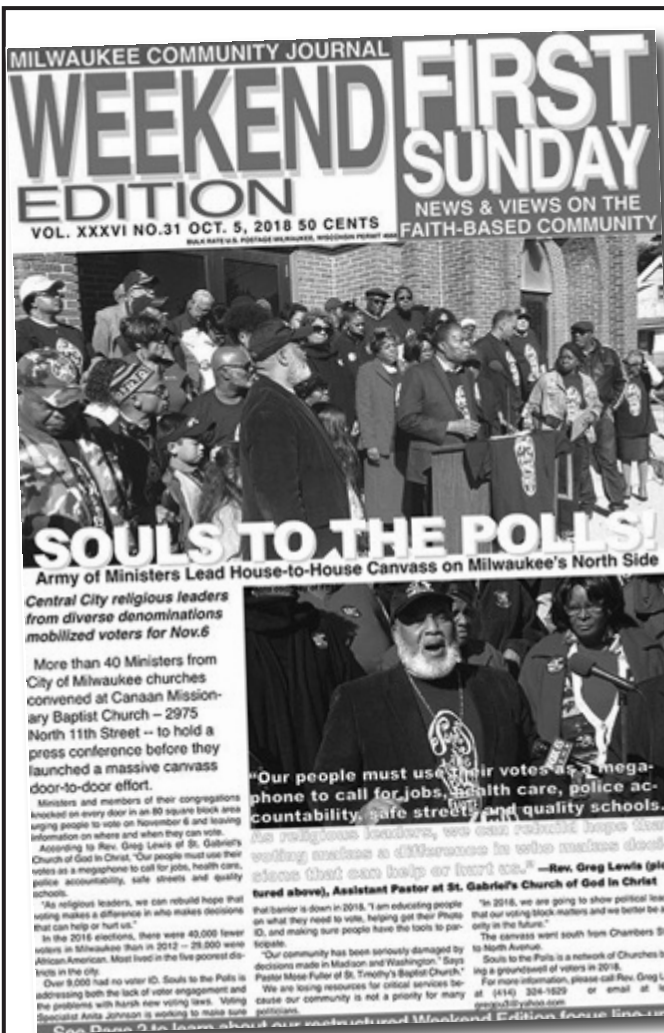


**A medical research study to learn how to treat patients with a type of prolonged seizures in the emergency department was recently per-  
formed in this community.**

**Before the study, doctors didn't know what medicine worked best. The study showed that three medicines commonly used to treat prolonged seizures all work similarly well, stopping seizures about half the time in both children and adults. The medicines were also similar in safety. These results give doctors more flexibility and confidence when treating patients with prolonged seizures.**

**The researchers thank the community for their support of this emer-  
gency research conducted with exception from consent. The study, called the Established Status Epilepticus Treatment Trial, or ESETT, was published in the November 28, 2019 issue of the New England Journal of Medicine. The study was funded by the National Institutes of Health.**
