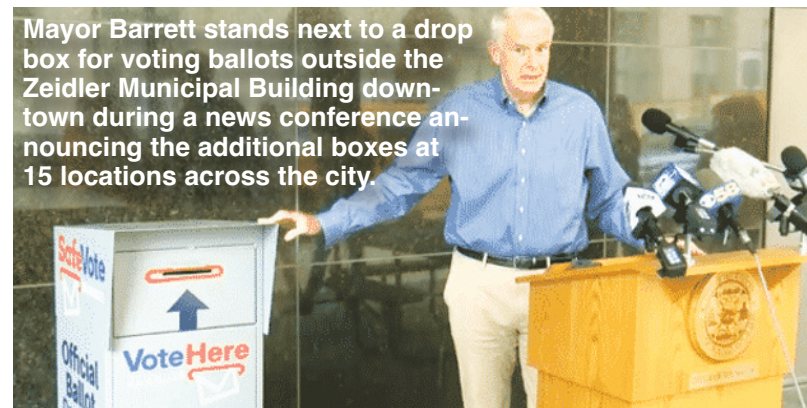
JUSTICE FOR JACOB BLAKE!- THE MKE MARCH



The family of Jacob Blake brought their message, signs and microphones to the Brew City, as hundreds of Black Milwaukeeans joined the Blake family in their continued call for justice, peace and unity during a recent march and rally held three weeks after Blake was shot in the back seven times by a Kenosha police officer. The family is keeping the spotlight on what happened to Blake as the Wisconsin Department of Justice gets closer to finishing its investigation. Once the investigation is completed, it will be handed over to a prosecutor to determine whether charges will be brought. The family and supporters said they won't stop until justice is served. City, election officials announce new ballot drop box locations for presidential election

Mayor Tom Barrett and city election officials recently announced absentee ballot drop boxes will be available at 15 locations across Milwaukee, including 13 city library branches on election day, November 3.

Barrett, Election Commission Executive Director Claire Woodall-Vogg and Milwaukee Public Library Director and City Librarian Joan Johnson highlighted the addition of the new, 24-hour ballot drop boxes in advance of the 2020 presidential election.

The city estimates that close to 290,000 residents will vote in the upcoming presidential election. Over 52% of voters, or 150,000 people, are expected to cast their ballots absentee by mail.

“Given this surge in absentee voting, it is imperative for the City to provide easily accessible, secure and timely opportunities for residents to return ballots and, equally important, feel complete confidence that their votes will be counted,” said Mayor Tom Barrett. “We’re doing everything we can to make drop boxes secure and easily accessible so that our residents can use them during this historic time.”

Absentee ballot drop off boxes are being installed at 15 locations across the city, including outside the City Hall complex, the Election Commission warehouse located at 1901 S. Kinnickinnic Ave. and all 13 neighborhood-based Milwaukee Public Library branches. Milwaukee Public Library also offers voter assistance Tuesday-Saturday from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. through Oc-

Memorial Highway Sign Unveiling and Dedication Set Honoring Jeannetta Simpson-Robinson

(MADISON) – After extensive collaboration between community leaders, elected officials, and the Simpson-Robinson family, State Senator Lena Taylor announced recently the installation, unveiling, and dedication of the Jeannetta Simpson-Robinson Memorial Highway sign.

The event will take place Thursday, Sept. 17, at the Northcott Neighborhood House, 2460 N. 6th St.

Simpson-Robinson passed away on October 9, 2008. She was a well-known activist for non-violence. Along with her mother, Claretta “Mother Freedom” Robinson, she founded Career Youth Development (CYD). CYD provided, educational and vocational training, as well as AODA prevention and gang intervention services, to at-risk youth. Simpson-Robinson, after the tragic death of both her daughter, Cheryl and granddaughter, “Little Jeannetta” created the Survivors of Homicide Grief and Support Group.

Creating the Victory Over Violence Initiative, Jeannetta was a source of light and a life-line for so many in the Milwaukee Community. Over the course of her life, Jeannetta Simpson-Robinson cemented her legacy as a true leader and role model.

AARP Wisconsin spotlights importance of 50-plus voters in new presidential poll

MADISON – Today AARP Wisconsin released a new survey of likely Wisconsin voters that found that President Trump (45%) trails former Vice President Joe Biden (50%).

The survey, conducted by the bipartisan team of Benenson Strategy Group and GS Strategy Group, also found that a majority of voters age 50-plus oppose (52%) how President Trump is managing the coronavirus pandemic.

The full survey results will be released on Tuesday, Sept. 15.

Among voters age 50 and up, President Trump (46%) trails Vice President Biden (50%). Wisconsin voters age 50 and up consistently turn out at a higher rate than younger voters.

“Candidates who want to

win in 2020 must talk about the issues that matter to voters 50 and over – like voting safely from home or in-person, preventing cuts to Social Security and Medicare and lowering prescription drug prices,” said AARP Wisconsin State Director Sam Wilson. “Most importantly, Wisconsinites are casting their ballots earlier than ever and candidates need to address their concerns now.”

The poll findings include:

- President Trump (45%) trails former Vice President Joe Biden (50%) among Wisconsin voters age 18 and up.

- President Trump (46%) trails former Vice President Joe Biden (50%) among Wisconsin voters age 50 and up.

- President Trump (37%) trails former Vice President Joe Biden (58%) among women and leads among men with 53% supporting President Trump and 42% support-

ing former Vice President Biden.

Benenson Strategy Group and GS Strategy Group conducted the survey among 1,200 likely 2020 voters in Wisconsin, which was fielded from August 30 to September 8, 2020. The overall margin of error is $\pm 2.8\%$ at 95% level of confidence.

In August, AARP Wisconsin launched “Protect Voters 50+,” a comprehensive voter engagement campaign to support and protect Americans 50-plus as they vote in the 2020 elections. The campaign will help Americans over 50 vote safely, whether at home or in person.

The “Protect Voters 50+” campaign will provide people with the information they need about this year’s elections, including video voters’ guides, issue briefings, direct mail, text messaging, social media and paid media.

tober 14.

“Milwaukee Public Library has a long history with elections,” said Milwaukee Public Library Director and City Librarian Joan Johnson.

“For decades, our staff has helped patrons register to vote and our neighborhood libraries have served as polling places.

Civic literacy is an important pillar of our work at the libraries, and we are proud to expand our role in democracy by providing voter assistance, permanent and secure absentee ballot drop off, in-person early voting and Election Day voting.”

Ballots can be dropped off at any location, 24 hours a day, up until 8 p.m. when polls close on November 3.

The ballot boxes are designed to secure and protect delivered ballots, and each is monitored by video surveillance.

Tampering with absentee ballots is a felony, and anyone caught doing so will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

Absentee ballots will be collected on a daily basis by Election Commission staff and be delivered to their offices. From there, the ballots will be processed as received and prepared for Election Day counting.

Absentee voters can confirm that their ballot was received within 24 hours of delivery online at myvote.wi.gov.

As Election Day nears and drop boxes receive more activity, more frequent ballot collection will occur, twice daily if needed. On Election Day, absentee ballots will be collected every other hour up until 8 p.m.

The Election Commission can cancel and reissue a ballot if a voter makes a mistake, if the ballot is lost or if there is concern that the ballot wasn't received and records indicate it wasn't received.

“We are still seeing voters find that voting at home is convenient, it is easy and it's the safest way to vote.

“But with that said, there is a learning curve,” said Election Commission Executive Director Claire Woodall-Vogg.

“The Election Commission will be doing everything in our power to educate voters on how to make sure that their vote counts, including updating our absentee instructions to have visuals of where the voter should sign the sig-

about how to complete your absentee ballot envelope to be sure that it is counted.”

Wisconsin is a no-excuse absentee voting state, meaning a voter does not need to explain why they need an absentee ballot in order to request one. Voters should start receiving their absentee ballots by mail beginning next week.

The deadline to request an absentee ballot is the Thursday before the election, but the Election Commission cautions voters that this is not a realistic deadline given the mail delivery schedule. If using a drop box to return an absentee ballot, October 26 is the deadline to request a ballot. Voters who wish to complete the entire process by mail, without using a drop box, have a deadline of October 20 to conduct their voting.

The City of Milwaukee currently has 171 neighborhood-based Election Day polling places, and the number could still increase before November 3. In the past, the City has offered 180 polling places. Since the August 11 election, the City has received 11,000 applications for poll workers. The total number of staff for Election Day is anticipated to be 24,000 workers.

It serves Milwaukee PBS’ commitment to producing and broadcasting quality programming with topics of importance to the diverse viewership it serves. The 29th season premieres on Thursday, October 1 at 7:30 p.m. on Milwaukee PBS 10.1.

Army of Ministers Lead House-to-House Canvass on Milwaukee's North Side

Central City religious leaders from diverse denominations mobilized voters for Nov. 6

More than 40 Ministers from City of Milwaukee churches convened at Canaan Missionary Baptist Church — 2975 North 11th Street — to hold a press conference before they launched a massive canvass door-to-door effort.

Ministers and members of their congregations knocked on every door in an 80 square block area urging people to vote on November 6 and leaving information on where and when they can vote.

According to Rev. Greg Lewis of St. Gabriel's Church of God in Christ, “Our people must use their voices as a megaphone to call for jobs, health care, police accountability, safe streets and quality schools.”

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“In 2018, we are going to show people that our voting block matters and we better on what they need to vote, helping get their photo ID, and making sure people have the tools to participate in the future.”

“Our community has been seriously damaged by decisions made in Madison and Washington,” says Pastor Steve Fuller of St. Timothy's Baptist Church. “We are losing resources for critical services because our community is not a priority for many politicians.”

THE COLOR OF RELIGION

Ok, let's suspend reality for a moment and drop '45IQ' (Trump for those not regular readers of my column) from the political equation.

In the presidential slot, insert a referendum on religion.

More specifically, Christianity's role in the centuries' long battle for the soul of America.

Let me crystalize.

Voters on November 3rd will make a sociocultural decision that will determine the validity of what many refer to as White Christianity, whether it be the false premise that there are, in fact, races, or that theirs is superior, made in God's image and ordained to rule and subjugate.

White Christians excused away slavery and ignored that brutal institution, which included rape, torture, and murder based on the idiotic premise that we were the biblical Ham's cursed descendants.

And except for Quakers and Mormons, who fought for our freedom, White Christians rewrote the Bible for their own benefit, rejecting tenets espousing universal brotherhood and the basic concept of loving thy neighbor as thy self.

The evolution of Black Christianity is in stark contrast to the White Evangelical Right, or what you might call the Christian 'White-Right.'

Are there two versions of Christianity, two bibles and two Gods? One acknowledges we are all made in Nyame's image and another permits sins far more insidious than abortion and adultery that the 'White-Right' prioritize as campaign issues?

But the real question is, can you indeed call yourself a Christian if you're a racist?

Can you turn your back on systemic racism (apartheid), injustice, and discrimination and expect to be awarded a key to the narrow doorway to heaven or the 'new earth'?

In many theologists' eyes, the COVID-19 pandemic, mass demonstrations against systemic racism, and injustice is not mere happenstance. It is God's (Nyame) call for reconciliation and appeasement.

This is not just my theory. There is a flood of like-minded Christians who feel similarly. I've read a half-dozen articles that posited likeminded assumptions, including a few Evangelicals who now see the light...or dark.

Among the most forthright was issued a few days ago from an Evangelical Christian who gave a call to his fellow Donald Trump supporters to put their concerns about abortion and homosexuality on the back burner and focus instead on tearing down the walls of racism and apartheid.

Well known Evangelical and White-Righter Jim Wallis, president of a Christian organization called Sojourners, issued a call for his fellow 'White' Christians to use the elections to start a national healing process.

"We've seen far too-long-delayed awakening among many White people about our nation's systemic racism, sparked by the public killing of George Floyd," he said in a written appeal.

"An excruciating 8 minutes and 46 seconds has led to a more in-depth conversation about the last 401 years of slavery and racism — partly because the whole nation was home and watching," he wrote.

These twin crises (racism and the killing of Floyd) proclaim a message that resonates with people of faith, and perhaps even reaching some of Donald Trump's traditional base: White Christians. We shall see.

Wallis said It might seem like a bold idea that the word 'Christian' could become more important than the word 'White' when the opposite has been confirmed for a long time.

Since the rise of the so-called 'Religious Right,' White Evangelicalism, in particular, has been successfully tied to Right-wing politics in different or actively hostile to racial equity, which is a fundamentally religious issue, he continued.

"The Religious Right, in fact, was poisoned from its beginnings with 'White race,' 'White identity,' and 'White power' being prominent among its organizing purposes."

Eight of ten right-wing White Christians voted for Trump In 2016, despite his apparent flaws, including racism, myogenic, adultery, and vainglory.

Also, 60% of Catholics and 57% of Protestants voted for a candidate who some people of color call the Antichrist.

But that should not be surprising, particularly to those who study history and take note of the Christian church's role in that 'Original Sin' (slavery) and its aftermath.

Whether His-story books continue to disguise it or not, this country was founded on the tenet of White Supremacy under the heading of so-called 'Manifest Destiny.'

That's why there is a White church, a Black church, and various shades of churches/religions in between.

Even if you can find White churches who talked about the universality of mankind, or were so bold as to remind the White-Right theologians that the first human beings were African and Black, they too were complicit by their silence and refusal to stand against injustice.

Such African American icons dating back to Richard Allen, founder of the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church, to Frederick Douglass to Martin Luther King, Jr., called out the 'White' Church for its racist underpinnings and refusal to follow God's mandates.

Most of today's middle-realm White churches find themselves prom-

enading down a similar path, some using the cover of 'more important religious concerns' to 'mask' (no pun intended...I think) their real agenda, or lack thereof.

Explained Wallis: "As an Evangelical Christian, I believe that issues such as abortion and religious liberty are important — but I've also lived the history and seen how those issues have been skewed and politicized by paper over clear biblical imperatives surrounding poverty and race."

The 20th and 21st centuries have borne witness to White political leaders also masking their racism, he posited, "subtly stoking White voters' racial fears, grievances, and hatred, so this isn't new.

"But now, racist rhetoric and policies have moved from covert to overt in what I believe is a deliberate attempt to increase fear and animosity on all sides," the former 'White-Righter' declared.

Racial fears are now a central campaign issue and campaign strategy, he explained.

"In early 2020, I wrote this election would be a test of democracy and faith. I wish those words hadn't proven true. Those of us who believe racism is the paramount religious issue in this election must find practical ways to put our faith into action for the sake of our democracy... and of our faith."

The cleric advised all Christians to return to the Bible for which the foundation of creation and universal brotherhood is the central tenet.

The foundation for all our politics is found in the first chapter of the first book of the Bible: In Genesis 1:26, he explained.

"Our holy scriptures say that God created humankind in God's image and likeness.

"That passage is central to and affirms Dei's imago, the image of God, in others and opposes what it denies."

Appeals to racial fear, grievance, and hate are assaults on the image of God in others. Therefore, every act of racialized police violence, every family separated at the border, every wink or appeasement to White supremacists, and every attempted suppression of even one vote because of skin color, is denying the image of God — imago Dei.

That may be a little too deep for the novice, the unread, and those neo-Christians---White and Black—who accept what is convenient for their lifestyles and reject all else.

They are Christian in name only...and during funerals. Nor can they understand why they can't remember Nyame's number during times of distress or fear.

In some respects, they are in the same

boat at the White-Right evangelist who worships a 'White' God who remarkably looks a lot like Uncle Sam, and a Messiah with blond hair and blue eyes.

"Until White Christians understand that loving their neighbors as themselves means fighting unrelentingly for justice for Black and Brown people and dismantling the oppressive structures of White supremacy, White American Christian claims to understand the heart of the gospel ring exceedingly hollow."

White-wing Christians will undermine the basic tenets of Christianity if they vote for Trump, Wallis believes. They are also complicit in advancing systemic racism if they don't come out of their caves to fight for equality and justice for their dark-skinned brethren.

And, of course, that starts with accepting African Americans as brothers and sisters.

"The changing perceptions among Whites of what it means to be a (Black American) and further, what it means to be a Christian in this country amid so much inequality and oppression — is leading to an unprecedented national conversation about the last four centuries of American life and America's 'original sin.'

"While Black voters, and especially Black women, are the core of the Democratic Party and are among the most religious people in the country, the party has, in recent decades, been reluctant to talk about faith.

"But when candidates talk about racism as the preeminent religious issue in this election season, it changes the conversation and opens up new space for religious voters to engage with their faith and apply it to their politics."

People of faith and conscience voting against racism means protecting against the re-entrenchment of White nationalism that has emerged in this country and protecting Black and Brown Americans' future, he said.

"Our nation and American Christianity as practiced by those identifying as White is at a crossroads. If White Christians once again refuse to treat racism as a political deal-breaker for their support, any chance to regain some of the credibility they've lost by their political captivity of recent years will be gone forever," he concluded.

I agree wholeheartedly. Or almost. I see a subliminal hurdle in Wallis's message that undermines his premise.

As long as he and other White-Right Christians see the world through a lens that is tinted in Black and White, his message is weakened. Because God sees only one race: the human race. And Nyame doesn't need glasses.

New AARP Wisconsin poll: 65-plus voters may tip the scales in 2020

Findings show Social Security, Medicare transcend party lines

MADISON – Today AARP Wisconsin released the full survey results that shows voters age 65-plus are a not a lock for either presidential candidate. Former Vice President Joe Biden (56%) leads President Donald Trump (39%) among voters 65-plus.

The survey finds that support for Social Security and Medicare unifies voters from both parties.

An overwhelming majority of voters from both parties say that they are more likely to vote for a candidate who will protect Social Security, strengthen Medicare, lower drug costs and increase protections for nursing homes.

“Candidates who want to win in 2020 must talk about the issues that matter to voters 50 and over – like voting safely from home or in-person, preventing cuts to Social Security and Medicare and lowering prescription drug prices,” said AARP Wisconsin State Director Sam Wilson.

“Most importantly, Wisconsinites are casting

their ballots earlier than ever and candidates need to address their concerns now,” he said.

The Wisconsin poll findings include:

- Voters 50-plus plan to vote by absentee ballot (34%) or early in-person (17%) in large numbers this year.
- 53% of voters 50-plus are worried about getting coronavirus and 14% know someone who has passed away from coronavirus.
- More 50-plus voters are concerned about getting infected with coronavirus (66%) than getting a vaccine for it (30%).
- A majority of voters age 50 to 64 (57%) are worried about not being able to retire.

Benenson Strategy Group and GS Strategy Group conducted 1200 interviews –by phone, using registered voter lists –with likely 2020 voters in Wisconsin from Aug. 30 to Sept. 8. 75% of interviews were conducted via cell phone; 25% via landline. The survey included an oversample of 800 50+ voters for additional analysis.

Data was weighed to ensure it was representative of the likely voting universe both overall and 50+. The margin of sampling error for the entire data set is $\pm 2.8\%$ at the 95% confidence level. Among likely voters over the age of 50, the margin of sampling error is $\pm 3.5\%$ at the 95% confidence level.
