What Happens After You Request an Absentee Ballot?

Your ballot will arrive about 1 week after your request. You can track it on MyVote.wi.gov.

If you have already completed an absentee request, your ballot will arrive shortly. You can confirm at MyVote.wi.gov.

### fisery forum Fiserv Forum, the Milwaukee Bucks' state-of-the-art downtown

arena, will serve as an early voting site for the 2020 general election. From Oct. 20 through Nov. 1, the City of Milwaukee announced recently that voters may cast their ballots in-person at Fisery Forum for the Nov. 3 election.

In addition to Fiserv Forum, the Milwaukee Brewers will open Miller Park for early drive through voting for the 2020 general election. Milwaukee's NBA and MLB teams opening their facilities to the public will help meet the increased demand for early voting due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Fiserv Forum will not only help meet that demand but will allow voters to cast their ballot indoors while maintaining appropriate social distancing to comply with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's safety guidelines.

### **VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT**

Under Wisconsin law, voters do not need a reason or excuse, such as being out of town on Election Day, to vote absentee. Any voter who prefers to vote by absentee ballot may request one.

If you are not already registered, you will need to register to vote before an absentee ballot can be sent to you. A new voter registration application is required any time you move (even minor changes such as apartment units), change your name, or if you have not voted in the past four years.

### Photo ID Required

Unless you are a military voter, permanently overseas, or are indefinitely confined, you must provide the Election Commission with a copy of your photo ID to keep on file. The address on the ID does not need to be current. For a list of acceptable photo IDs, visit Bringlt Wisconsin.

Voters who are indefinitely confined (meaning they have difficulty getting to the polls due to age, illness, infirmity, or disability) may request a ballot be sent to them for every election by checking the box on the application. Indefinitely confined voters are not required to provide photo ID.

### Deadline

Applications for absentee ballots must be received no later than

5:00 p.m. on the Thursday before the election.

Note for voters requesting a ballot within 10 days of the election: Because ballots must be received by our office (either delivered by mail or in-person) no later than Election Day, we strongly encourage you to visit an in-person absentee voting (early voting) location or request that your ballot be emailed to you.

### VOTING INFORMATION

How to Register to Vote

Wisconsin law requires every qualified voter to maintain a current voter registration before voting in an election. Therefore, you must complete a voter registration application if you are a new Wisconsin voter, your name and/or residential address has changed since you last registered to vote, or if you have not voted in the past four (4)

If you are uncertain of your voter registration name, address or status, you can go to My Vote Wisconsin and select "Regular Voter" to look up your voter record.

The City of Milwaukee provides five (5) opportunities for completing and updating your voter registration: by mail, online and at any Milwaukee Public Library, at City Hall or at your voting site on Election Day. Do not forget to include your proof of residence documentation when registering to vote! See below for acceptable proof of residence documents.

### 1. BY MAIL

Download and print the Voter Registration Application. Once complete, you may mail the application along with a copy of your proof of residence document to:

Registrations by mail must be postmarked prior to the close of registration date for each election.







### **COMMENTARY: 2020 First Presidential Debate an Embarrassment for**

American politics nose-dived spiraled and crashed and burned during what masqueraded as the first 2020 presidential debate.

"You're a clown!" "Would you shut up, man!" "Everything

Those were just some of the barbs from Democratic Presidential Nominee Joe Biden who grew irritated by repeated interruptions by President Donald Trump at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland on Tuesday, Sept. 29.

Trump, who received a regular rebuke from moderator Chris Wallace, claimed Biden was weak and unintelligent.

"Don't ever use the word smart with me," Trump railed at Biden.

"There's nothing smart about you, Joe."

The president sunk even lower, making accusations that Biden's son, Hunter, was "kicked out of the military – dishonorably discharged – because of drugs."

Biden reminded the audience of a little more than 100 people – down from an anticipated 900 because of the pandemic – that Trump called fallen military members "losers and suckers."

While Trump dared Biden to say, "Law and order," Wallace opened discussions on race. "Are you willing, tonight, to condemn white supremacists and militia groups and to say that they need to stand down?" the moderator asked Trump.

"Proud Boys, stand back and stand by," Trump reluctantly said in a declaration that fell well short of condemnation. "But," Trump insisted, "I'll tell you what, somebody's got to do something about Antifa and the left." Biden also blasted Trump's handling of the coronavirus.

The former vice president said more than 200,000 people have died, and

some 40,000 people are still contracting COVID each day.

"The President has no plan. He hasn't laid out anything," Biden charged. Trump responded that a vaccine and life-saving treatments might come before the election.

The president again hit out at China, blaming the Far East nation for the

"It's China's fault. It never should have happened," Trump contended (continued on page 10)

### Still Walking Into A Strong Wind

Book chronicaling the struggles for better education for Black students in the 1970s still relevant today

I was selecting books from my 200-plus collection for give-away Sunday, when I ran across Bill Dahlk's historical epic 'Against the Wind: Americans--the African Schools in Milwaukee, 1963-2002.

Instead of being placed in my pass-along to the 'ill-informed, brainwashed or confused' box, Dahlk's classic work quickly made a bee-line to the table next to my reading chair.

As I recall, when I first received an advance copy many years ago, I spent an inordinate amount of time completing the first chapter.

It's not that I'm a slow reader, but more so because it's one of those books where you scan through various chapters

based on name and/or event references before settling down to read the entire essay.

Moreover, since I'm featured throughout the nearly 700-page book as a reference and narrator of sorts, 'Against the Wind' provided a journalistic and historical sojourn for me then, as it does today.

What makes the book all the more relevant today is the socioeconomic and cultural evolution---or lack thereof-of Milwaukee's educational 'system of schools.

We've seen a half dozen government school superintendents

since the book, each with promises to turn around the district But for all intents and purposes, the abysmal scorecard for African American students has remained the same.

And in some cases, it has worsened.

School choice--educational options--has cemented itself as a legitimate alternative, as over the last two decades most of the mediocre schools--a majority of which were Black controlled or operated-- have been weeded out. Latest research shows today, a signification percentage of pri-

vate schools participating in the school choice program (there are no 'choice schools') are out-performing government schools on several levels—including higher graduation rates, significantly higher SAT test scores, college acceptance and parent satisfaction.

There's even a study showing how African American students of participating schools are better citizens--a small percentage of whom commit crimes; more family oriented and civic minded. and spiritually grounded.

School choice has also been an economic boon to the city and our 'Village,' along with being the largest employer of Black para-professionals since the closure of OIC. Moreover, a significantly higher percentage of teachers are African American, in comparison to MPS.

> Charter schools, led by non-instrumentality institutions. are the leading schools in the state. Two Milwaukee College Prep (MCP) schools are listed in the top five schools

Ironically, while MCP is chartered by MPS, the teacher's union is opposed to it and seeking to have those charters cancelled (forcing the Black students to attend failing government schools).

More specifically, the local union, which has fought choice tooth and nail, has spent millions in resources to undermine the empowerment of Black parents who seek alternatives to MPS.

Coincidently, during the period examined in the book a report from a national teachers' organization revealed that Milwaukee government school teachers led the na-

tion in private school enrollment for their chil-

dren. Talk about hypocrisy! The real issue today, as it was when the book was written, is centered around finances and control of student mobility-

--product manipulation and resource. meaning teachers need the bodies to insure their profitability. Masked behind all of the rhetoric, including that coming from Democrats who cater to the unions to insure their steady politi-

cal support, is a reality that undergirds the battle: opposition to school choice (allowing parents the ability to make decisions without the dictate of Big Brother and his Mama)

is the quest to control state resources. It is not now nor was it ever, about education; it's about job security and MPS losing stu-

And it's about what and how the structure will educate--or as

1. Smiling Can Make You Look **Younger.** The UMKC researchers tested the popular theory that smiling might cause others to perceive you as being younger than you ac-

In a small study, college students perceived older people who had happy smiles on their faces as looking younger than their age.

The people with frowns on their faces were categorized as looking

2. Smiling Can Make You Look

Thinner. A young psychology student at UMKC found that sad faces randomized and flashed on a computer screen were judged to be heftier leaving one to only speculate that a mouth turned down in a frown might give the impression that a person is weighed down by unhappiness.

3. Smiling Elevates Your Mood and Creates A Sense of Well-Being. Behavioral psychologist Sara Stevenson wrote in a blog: "Each time you smile you throw a little feel good party in your brain."

The notorious party animals, dopamine, endorphins and serotonin start whopping it up when you smile!

4. Smiling Induces More Pleasure In the Brain More Than Chocolate. According to Ron Gutman, the author of Smile: The Astonishing Powers of a Simple Act, British researchers found that one smile can generate the same level of brain stimulation as up to 2,000 bars of chocolate.

5. Even A Forced Smile Can Lead to a Mood Boost. While it is true that a positive experience is what makes us smile, it is also true that merely deciding to smile can provide positive experience.

6. Smiling Makes You Seem Courteous, Likeable and Compe**tent.** The first two qualities seem logical, but how does smiling make you seem competent? Perhaps, if you look sad or anxious, perhaps others wonder if you know what you are doing.

7. Smiling is Contagious! A smiling person can light up a room If you like to help others and lift the spirits of everyone, just smile!

"We couldn't agree more with this sentiment," read a statemen from 16 — undertandibly suprised—members of the city's Commor Council, who called on the Legislature to act on the matter soon and have Wisconsin join the dozens of states that already

"Such a bill has already passed in the Assembly, but the Senate did not take it up before the session ad-

Underneath the surface were battles waged not just between the political and educational status quo, but also among African Americans of differing ideologies. Those battles pitted nationalists against integrationists, Africentrics versus assemblationists.

There were those who advocated that we control our own destiny, including all of its institutions, including those that educate our children.

On the other side of the track were integra-

tionists, who believed in Martin Luther King's vision of a just and colorblind society. In between were pragmatists who viewed de-

segregation as a vehicle, education as the primary passport and empowerment as the manta---in whatever car that would get us there. Their motto was 'no permanent friends, or permanent enemies, just permanent issues.'

In many respects, those sociocultural battles

of the 1970s framed our current paradigm, as every group could claim short-lived victories.

The politically charged debate over a proposed mayoral takeover of MPS a decade ago, was in many respects the culmination of a 40year battle over who was sincere about tearing down the walls of what some called a system of educational apartheid in Milwaukee.

Some leaders refused to accept any fundamental change, insisting that the system could be improved. They also rejected school choice, lamenting that it would drain resources needed for the change; whatever the hell that was. In truth, there was some merit in both posi-

tions, but the underlying reality is that the divisions of the 1970s led us to the realization that Black progress is still an illusive dream and we're too busy fighting dragons to notice that someone else is engineering our Freedom Train. We were, and are, so busy fighting and chas-

ing illusions, we haven't noticed the train left the station without us. Scanning through 'Against the Wind' sent

WASHINGTON, D.C. - President Donald Trump refused to condemn white supremacy during Tuesday night's first televised presidential debate in Ohio.

Moreover, he told the followers of the extremist group Proud Boys that they should "stand back and stand by." Kristen Clarke, president and executive director of the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law issued the following statement:

"During a time when Black people nationwide are exercising their rights to protest police violence and contending with rising levels of racial violence, President Donald Trump used his debate platform to embolden white supremacists by refusing to disavow their activity and by issuing a directive to Proud Boys to 'stand by.' Even the FBI has identified white supremacy as one of the greatest domestic threats that we face today. The president's silence and acquiescence present a clear and present danger to Black people, who are most frequently targeted by incidents of hate.

"We are also deeply concerned by President Trump's persistent attack on mail balloting and his efforts to activate poll watchers in certain communities like Philadelphia. Attacks on mail balloting seek to undermine the public's confidence in on method of voting that is safe, secure and necessary amid the pandemic. Efforts to deploy poll watchers to areas that are home to large number of Black and brown voters are nothing more than thinly veiled attempts to intimidate and discourage turnout among voters of color."

### Report Highlights **Trump Hypocrisy** on Voting by Mail

Washington, D.C.— One day after Donald Trump's latest baseless threats and claims about voting by mail, which he claimed during a presidential debate would lead to widespread fraud, People For the American Way's Right Wing Watch project is releasing a new report highlighting Trump's hypocrisy on this issue.

The report by Bob Moser, titled "The Propaganda War Against Voting by Mail," also details the efforts of heavily financed far-right groups that are combining legal challenges with propaganda aimed at undermining remote voting this November.

"Donald Trump is making totally false claims that voting by mail will lead to a fraudulent election, while at the same time his campaign is promoting it to his supporters -- and he's voting by mail himself," said Ben Jealous, President of People For the American Way.

"Voters this spring received robo-calls from the Trump campaign urging them to vote safely by mail. Trump is trying to have it both ways, and he's willing to do or say anything if he thinks it will either win the election or cast

doubt on the results if he doesn't." "An entire right-wing industry has gown up around voter suppression, and

uch has been written about political polarization in the U.S. and how a heated political cli-

mate has drawn a line in the sand between voters.

But heading into the 2020 presidential election, self-censorship also is on the rise – including at the workplace, where some people fear sharing their political views. Nearly a third of employed Americans worry they could lose their jobs or be passed over for career advancements if their political opinions become known, according to a Cato Institute survey.

For business leaders trying to build a strong culture, knowing how to manage political expression and discus-

"Tens of millions of dollars are being spent, which makes the efforts this year the biggest coordinated effort to suppress votes that we have ever seen.

"It's critically important that people understand the forces at work and also understand that this is not the year to skip voting."

Among other things, the report

Major actors on the right working to suppress voting, via tactics encompassing lawsuits and propaganda, include Judicial Watch, the Public Interest Legal Foundation, True the Vote, and the Judicial Education Project, which is heavily funded by the Kochs and the DeVos family.

to hell,' was ecstatic that Bonds has left the political scene.

He was one of the few Black politicians, and board members, who advocated for educational options, and viewed his responsibility to all the children of Milwaukee.

What caught my interest immediately after opening Dahlk's book, is that he opens the book with a 'glossary of 'leading' actors.'

I immediately recognized most, including Lloyd Barbee, Jake Beason, Paulette Copeland, Rev. Kenneth Bowen, Father James Groppi, Larry Harwell and Polly Williams, the co-creators of school choice, and Lee McMurrin, former MPS superintendent and master public relations guru during the application of the school desegregation process in 1976.

And then there's F. Marvin Hannah, Mike McGee, Leon Todd, Teju Ologboni, Clarence Parrish and Jessie Wray.

The contrast between the ideologies of those 'stars' provides a scriptwriter with ammunition to write a compelling, provocative story-

Consider the conflicting philosophies of Marilyn Morheuser, listed as a 'White integrationist and program director of MUSIC,' the principal organization supporting Barbee's defining desegregation lawsuit, against the comments of former School Board President Lorraine Radtke who publicly declared her opposition to 'desegregation' because she theorized Black students were so uncivilized and uncultured they would urinate in water fountains at 'White schools'.

There was Harold Jackson, the city's second Black school board di-

rector who quit after declaring the district-maintained policies akin to South African apartheid as opposed to Police Chief Harold Breier who said he opposed desegregation because it would 'bus crime across town.'

Oh, the good ol' days, when issues were clearly defined, you didn't have to guess agendas, and racism was overt and to the point. It was also easier to figure out who was friend, and who was enemy.

I have fond, and sometimes horrific, memories of many of the actors' whose roles set the stage for our current stage play.

Many are long since joined their ancestors, but they left indelible marks on local history.

Dahlk brings them to life, and for those of us who participated in that educational Black sojourn, recognize how even a tiny footprint in the sand can change the course of the mighty ocean.

You can also trace today's Black high school drop out rate to events and individuals who directly or indirectly influenced the early timeframe chronicled by Dahlk.

You can assess the current state of race relations, the political pandemonium and even our economic plight to obscure events a half-century ago.

Following the trail illuminated by Dahlk will lead you back to circumstances that sparked a call for a separate Black school district, the school choice program and even a current proposal by North Division high school alumni to convert the school into a community-controlled institution, meaning an autonomous board would run it.

The 1960s was an era of dreams, while the 70s represented dreams deferred, and a period Black philosophical evolution.

In the 1970s we battled for and against school desegregation, were stunned when Black board members justified one-way busing, and were shocked when Federal Court Judge John Reynolds assigned a 'special master' to over the process

That's right, a special 'massa.'

In the 1980s we reversed course and fought for Black control of the schools, and questioned who really was leading our strug-

A bill for a separate school district was on the horizon as the school board proposed moving construction of a new North Division to 8th and Center so White kids wouldn't have to venture into the central city to attend a medical dental specialty (they would get off the #80 bus two blocks away). African American neighborhood students would not be allowed admission to the school they fought to be built.

Some Black leaders began questioning whether sitting next to White children made Black kids smarter, or was the real agenda of the school board promulgated on the involuntary movement of Back students so as not to inconvenience Whites, and thereby avoid violent repercussion from the white community.

Soon came the realization that desegregation brought with it skyrocketing Black suspension rates (several Black children were suspended for carrying Afro picks to school—White teachers thought they were weapons) hostile teachers, who went on strike to avoid being reassigned, and baseball bat carrying White supremists who threatened to beat up minority students who ventured from under the shadows of southside schools.

Desegregation did little to close the achievement gap.

School desegregation grabbed the headlines, but the battlegrounds of the 1970s morphed into civil war, not just between north (side) and south (side), but also over the direction of the civil rights movement, miscegenation versus Black empowerment, communal integration versus equality of opportunity.

When the smoke cleared, neither side was truly victorious for, as much as things changed, the more things remained the same. Today, Milwaukee is still among the most segregated cities in the land. Black high school drop and achievement rates are in many cases worse than in 1960, and the Black poverty rate, at 40% in 1965, was 42% and climbing after Barack Obama left

MUSIC and Triple O, which fought each other over the direction of school desegregation, are no more.

Other organizations known by most by their acronyms, including PACE, NCIC, UBCC, KKK (not the racist group, but the King Kluster Konvention), CORE, CPS and BCC are all distant memories, although their role in defining the 1960s and 1970s

remain with us.

Those groups are mentioned in a glossary of major and minor organizations in the prefix of 'Against the Wind.'

I'll reread the book as soon as I finish an amazing autobiography by Virginia Walden Ford titled: 'School Choice, a Legacy to Keep.' In many respects Ford's journey to bring educational options to the

worst school district in the country---Washington, D.C.---would be an excellent epilog to 'Against the Wind.' There is so much to relate to when reading about Walden's crusade to bring school choice to the nation's capital. Her battles against hypocritical or naïve Democrats is epic, and the teachers' union and Black lead-

Progressive brothers and sisters around the country, whether fighting for educational options or against systemic racism—find ourselves walking into a strong wind. "We've done a great job," Trump added, accusing the "fake news" of distorting his record on the virus. Trump claimed a Biden administration would have "lost far more people."

Biden responded: "Get out of your bunker and get out of the sand trap and your golf course."

Later, Trump again refused to say whether he'd leave office peacefully if Biden wins the election.

The ugly match further denigrated when the topic turned to Trump's income taxes, which he has refused to release them publicly.

A New York Times investigation revealed that Trump had gone 10 of the past 15 years without paying any income taxes, and in 2017 and 2018, he paid just \$750.

The president disputed the report but evaded Wallace's questions about specifics.

As a successful businessman, Trump offered that he understands the tax code, and others who don't take advantage of it are inept. Biden's campaign released the former vice president's 2019 tax returns before the debate, which showed he paid nearly \$300,000 in federal income tax last year.

"You are the worse president America has ever had," Biden told Trump.

# How To Prevent Political Discussions From Polarizing Your Workplace

sions in the workplace is critical, says Joel Patterson (www.JoelPatterson.com), a workplace culture expert, founder of The Vested Group and ForbesBooks author of The Big Commitment: Solving The Mysteries Of Your ERP Implementation.

"Unfortunately, things have gotten so divisive that even if somebody just wears a shirt or makes an innocuous comment, somebody is going to get upset," Patterson says. "When people at work are afraid to say anything political, that fearfulness isn't conducive to a cohesive work environment. Rather than ignore it or futilely try to shutter it, business owners and managers are better off having a plan to deal with the political dynamic so it won't disrupt their business and drive their employees apart."

Patterson offers tips to help business leaders manage political discussions and tensions, and keep politics in proper perspective, in the workplace:

Make company culture the first priority. Having an established set of company core values is highly beneficial in giving your team a framework for how they interact with peers, clients, and other professional contacts externally, Patterson says. "If you have a solid workplace culture, then core values like respect for others, including respect for others' opinions, will carry the day and overcome political disagreements," he says. "An emphasis on core values reminds everyone that they are all on the same team."

Give flexibility – within reason. "Most people don't want or expect a formal workplace policy related to politics in the workplace," Patterson says. "The leadership team of your business needs to let employees know they are valued as individuals while emphasizing that leaving politics out of the workplace is the best practice for all involved. Let your employees know you are flexible with their comfort level, but they are also accountable for how they conduct themselves as a representative of your company."

Keep political programs off the office TVs. "You don't want to invite arguments," Patterson says. "Making sure that office TVs, especially in the break room, are not tuned to political programs is an easy preventive measure. Sometimes the news and panel discussions get people wound up."

De-escalate, don't instigate. As a manager or business owner, employees will be watching to see how you handle a heated political conversation between workers. "Try to cool things off and lead by exam—



ple," Patterson says. "If the employees persist, tell them that their loud conversation is distracting to a productive work environment. If someone you work with is expressing a viewpoint that doesn't coincide with yours, a mental note to yourself to agree to disagree often does the trick."


"Handling political talk isn't something business owners and managers should be afraid of," Patterson says. "It's an opportunity to ease the tension their employees feel and remind them that no matter their differences, they can remain strong together."
