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Sam's Place, Shalem Healing, and Refua Medicinals Open in Historic Harambee Building

Bader Philanthropies, Inc., one of southeastern Wisconsin's top 10 foundations, announced today Sam's Place; a Milwaukee-based eatery and jazz café; will open at the end of February on the first floor of the newly renovated two-story building located at 3338 N. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive in the Harambee neighborhood.

In addition, Shalem Healing, Inc.; a 501(c)3 nonprofit clinic offering integrated and holistic health care to the community, including the uninsured and underinsured; is also open to the public on the second floor of the building.

Sam's Place

Opening as early as February 22, Sam's Place, an eatery and jazz café, will be a unique place to enjoy good food and drinks; socialize and meet; enjoy an array of entertainment, including live jazz; and learn about coffee and jazz.

Sam's Place will offer customers a full menu of breakfast, lunch and dinner; specialty fair trade organic coffee; both classic and signature Espresso drinks; as well as smoothies, juices and tea.

Sam Belton, the owner of Sam's Place and jazz musician, was born and raised on Milwaukee's north side and knows the local community well. Belton has been particularly interested in seeing the area revitalized.

"We are continuing a culture in our jazz café where neighbors of all backgrounds feel welcome, can relax and forget about everything else while they're enjoying freshly ground coffee or food inspired by jazz legends," said Belton, who also owns CITY.NET Jazz Café, Milwaukee's Jazziest Coffeehouse located in downtown Milwaukee.

"We want to be a cornerstone of vitality in the Harambee neighborhood. My hope is that we continue to make progress and people see, feel and talk about how special this space is."

Abyssinia Coffee Roasters, which Belton started in 2007, offers "small batch air roasting." All of the café's coffee is roasted onsite and will be offered at the café, for

Refua Medicinals, a blend of traditional Chinese medicine and modern nutritional science that Shalem Healing's founder Dr. Robert Fox created is also located in the historic Harambee building.

The building has been undergoing significant renovations since September 2019. The ideas for Sam's Place, Shalem Healing, and Refua Medicinals came directly from Harambee residents through a series of "Chat with Bader" events organized by the foundation to get to know neighbors and hear ideas on what would enhance the quality of life for local residents.

Shalem Healing, Inc.

Located on the second floor of the newly renovated two-story building in Harambee, Shalem Healing is a community-oriented health care practice treating all members of the family, from children to adults.

Shalem Healing combines both eastern and western medicines, and looks at patients' health from a holistic perspective to determine the best treatment for the patient, honing in on and treating the cause of what is af-

Refua Medicinals

Also located in the historic building is Refua Medicinals. Dr. Fox developed Refua Medicinals for his patients, which will now be available to the general public.

Through his studies in traditional medicinal roots and herbs, Dr. Fox combined his knowledge of both ancient practices and modern scientific principles to create these extracts. This blend of traditional Chinese medicine and modern nutrition science has been made for Dr. Fox's patients since 2001, with significant improvements achieved in patients' health.

"I am excited to welcome the opening of Sam's Place, a jazz café restaurant along with Shalem Healing and Refua Medicinals to the Harambee neighborhood," said Milwaukee 6th District Alderwoman Milele A. Coggs. "The community was a part of the planning process assisted by Bader Philanthropies hosting several visioning sessions with the residents. It is a development that the community played a role in and demonstrates that neighborhood voices were heard and now, the resources they need are accessible and available."

"Sam's Place, Shalem Healing and Refua Medicinals are signs of progress and transformation," said Daniel J. Bader, president and CEO of Bader Philanthropies, Inc. "Sam Belton and Dr. Robert Fox are humble individuals committed to bringing people together and offering oppor-

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fecting the patient not just the symptoms. The clinic has been operating at the new location since September 2020, providing a variety of science-based health care services to the community, including daily COVID-19 saliva-based testing for schools and COVID-19 vaccinations.

As a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization, Shalem Healing is not a typical clinic – its goal is to provide easy access to high-quality health care for all members of the community, no matter the ability to pay, insurance, race, creed, or background.

Since low-income neighborhoods typically have little to no access to health care and are affected by chronic diseases such as diabetes and hypertension at a disproportionately higher rate, with their health care model, Shalem Healing provides quality health care, family by family.

Dr. Fox and his team focus on developing a relationship with the patient, spending 30 minutes to an hour or more for a patient visit.

Dr. Fox believes good health care education is at the heart of good health care; when a family is educated about good health care practices, the children will grow up with healthy habits and practices are passed on to future generations.

“We want to have a real relationship with our patients and work together in a partnership to attain optimal health and wellbeing,” said Dr. Robert Fox, who founded Shalem Healing in 2003. “We want to treat our patients through the most natural, holistic, and integrative approach we can.

“We lean more toward herbal, dietary-based treatments, and use non-traditional alternative therapies. Ultimately, we hope to see a beneficial change in the local communities’ overall health and would like to see this model replicated in other communities.”

Shalem Healing’s health care services include pediatric primary care, adult, family, and women’s health care. Conditions Dr. Fox and his team treat include: allergies, attention deficit disorder (ADD), autism, Crohn’s disease, chronic migraines, degenerative joint disease, diabetes, eczema and various skin conditions, fibromyalgia, gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD), infections, Lyme’s disease, muscular dystrophy (MS), pain management, rheumatology, stroke recovery, traumatic brain injury recovery, and more.

Shalem Healing’s health care clinic hours are Monday and Wednesday 8:30 a.m.-6:30 p.m. and Tuesday, Thursday, Friday from 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Community members looking to schedule an appointment with Shalem Healing can call 414-640-5433.

retail and wholesale purchase. The coffee will be Kosher certified. Sam’s Place will also offer specialty coffee tastings and host classes and workshops on coffee.

Belton plans to use the café to bring live jazz back to Milwaukee’s central city. On Friday and Saturday evenings, Sam’s Place will host some of the best, well-known jazz musicians -- both locally and nationally, including Belton who has been a professional musician for over five decades. In addition to jazz, the café will also host poetry, ballroom and stepping dancing, and spoken word. Sam’s Place features a community room for rental for private meetings and events.

Sam’s Place currently has five employees and Belton is looking to hire additional staff from the Harambee neighborhood in the coming months.

Sam’s Place’s hours of operation will be 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Monday–Thursday; 7 a.m.-9 p.m. Friday and Saturday; and 11 a.m.-4 p.m. for Sunday brunch. Customers can also order through Uber Eats and Grub Hub. Sam’s Place will offer limited dine-in options in accordance with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention’s guidance on social distancing, and a walk-up window is available for coffee and food pick-ups.

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

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Training, research partnership to boost supportive housing statewide



WHEDA, CSH join forces in first-of-its-kind effort to promote housing for state’s most vulnerable residents

MADISON – Wisconsin’s most vulnerable residents will be the focus of a new partnership by the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority and Corporation for Supportive Housing that includes training opportunities, research and prioritized investment.

As part of the initiative, the first of its kind in Wisconsin, WHEDA and CSH will kick off a four-part webinar series starting Feb. 23 at 9:30 a.m.

The free 90-minute interactive sessions are open to all; participants may choose a single event or all four sessions.

“Wisconsin residents with mental health needs, physical challenges and substance use recovery are among those facing great difficulties in finding affordable housing,” said WHEDA CEO Joaquín Altoro. “This housing deficit challenges our rural and urban communities alike.

Housing is critical to the health and wellness of individuals and by connecting affordable housing with supportive services, we can have a lasting impact on the wellbeing of communities statewide.

We are excited to work in partnership with CSH – a national leader in supportive housing – to connect developers and community service providers with training, tools and financing to expand the supply of this much-needed housing.”

Katrina Van Valkenburgh, managing director of the central region for CSH, said, “Supportive housing improves housing stability; employment; mental and physical health; school attendance; and reduces active substance use. Supportive housing helps people live more stable and productive lives and supports

individuals and families to thrive.”

“On any given day in Wisconsin, more than 4,700 elderly residents, 2,100 people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, 740 child welfare involved families and 420 transitional aged youth are in need of supportive housing,” Van Valkenburgh said. Supportive housing combines affordable housing with services to help people who face the most complex challenges to live with stability, autonomy and dignity.”

Altoro said the partnership represents an important part of WHEDA’s efforts to cultivate an ecosystem of greater equity in affordable housing and economic opportunity. Based on CSH data, Wisconsin has a disproportionate number of Black and Native American residents involved with the justice system, child welfare services and family separations – all indicators of the need for supportive housing to achieve better outcomes.

To connect developers, community service providers and other housing professionals, WHEDA and CSH will offer free training on the basics of supportive housing, integrated housing models, supportive services and property management. The sessions include content that aims to build understanding of the racial disparities and institutional barriers that affect housing for people facing challenges of homelessness, disabilities and poverty.

In addition to the training opportunities, WHEDA and CSH will implement a statewide survey to better understand areas of greatest need for

supportive housing and the biggest challenges in meeting those needs. WHEDA also will initiate a first-of-its-kind Wisconsin Supportive Housing Institute to provide technical assistance to developers and supportive housing providers as they navigate the complex process of developing affordable housing with access to supportive services.

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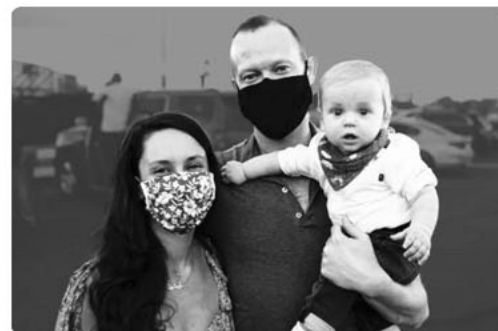


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BLACK TO THE FUTURE ACTION FUND

Urges Bold Action from New Administration and Congress on COVID Relief, Economic Recovery, and Racial Justice

Washington, D.C. — Black to the Future Action Fund is challenging the Biden administration to prioritize and advance the mandate of Black communities, who helped deliver the White House and a Senate majority to Democrats in the 2020 election.

In a new racial justice framework, announced today, the policymaking and advocacy group led by Alicia Garza outlines key policies that will empower Black communities and help translate the Biden administration's broad commitments for racial equity into bold action with tangible results.

Build Back Bolder: The Black Mandate for the Biden-Harris Administration launches a broader push by Black to the Future Action Fund to ensure action and accountability from elected leaders to Black communities. Influenced by data from its sister organization — the Black Futures Lab's Black Census Project, the largest independent survey of Black voters in 155 years — the agenda serves as a benchmark that Black communities, voters and organizers can use to measure action and results.

"After the nightmare that was the Trump administration, Biden's promise and immediate efforts to undo four years of damage is a welcome adjustment.

"But for Biden and other Democratic elected leaders to hold true to their commitments, they must act on the mandate they've been given to change the rules that have been rigged against Black communities for generations," said Alicia Garza, principal of Black to the Future Action Fund.

"Black families and communities are being left behind and pushed out-- from the economy to health care to housing and voting rights.

"The pandemic is a nail in the coffin that we are being buried alive within. If President Biden wants to 'Build Back Better,' he must take bold action to pass

policy and regulations to address the problems our communities are ready and prepared to solve."

On Friday, February 19, the organization will convene leaders who mobilized and organized Black voters in the 2020 election cycle — despite rampant voter suppression, racial terror and a devastating pandemic — for a discussion on the opportunities that the Biden-Harris administration can leverage to deliver meaningful change for Black America.

"The Black Mandate represents the first steps our leaders must take to begin to make good on their promise to deliver progress. The forthcoming COVID-19 relief package is a good start for care and recovery efforts. Discussions so far are promising, but now is not the time to be timid. We can and must be bolder," said Black to the Future Action Fund Political Director Keauna Gregory. "Our communities need monthly payments until the pandemic is over, we need to use racial justice to deliver equitable distribution of the COVID vaccine, and we need an extension on the foreclosure and eviction moratorium until we've healed from the pandemic and economic recession."

Black to the Future Action Fund's Black Mandate outlines priorities for meaningful change along four broad areas:

Enact a just Covid-19 relief and recovery plan for Black communities. COVID-19 relief and recovery, with a focus on racial equity, is needed immediately.

A detailed COVID-19 Relief and Recovery Plan for Black America is included in the report, and can be found here.

Remove policies that lock Black communities out of good jobs, and advance policies that invest in the health and wealth of Black communities.

Act on the climate crisis as a national priority before Black communities are hit first and worst by climate catastrophes.

Reject the toxic culture of white nationalism and white supremacist movements by addressing it at every opportunity and in front of every audience.

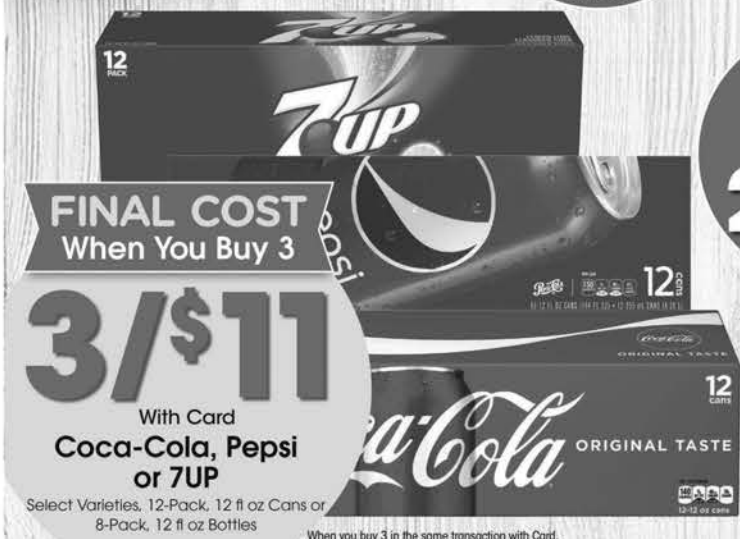
