Remarks by President Biden on the Verdict in the Derek Chauvin Trial for the Death of George Floyd

THE PRESIDENT: Today, a jury in Minnesota found former Minneapolis Police Officer Derek Chauvin guilty on all counts in the murder of George Floyd last May.

It was a murder in the full light of day, and it ripped the blinders off for the whole world to see the systemic racism the Vice President just referred to — the systemic racism that is a stain our nation’s soul; the knee on the neck of justice for Black Americans; the profound fear and trauma, the pain, the exhaustion that Black and brown Americans experience every single day.

The murder of George Floyd launched a summer of protest we hadn’t seen since the Civil Rights era in the ‘60s — protests that unified people of every race and generation in peace and with purpose to say, “Enough. Enough. Enough of the senseless killings.”

Today — today’s verdict is a step forward. I just spoke with the Governor of Minnesota, who thanked me for the close work with his team.

And I also just spoke with George Floyd’s family again — a remarkable family of extraordinary courage.

Nothing can ever bring their brother, their father back. But this can be a giant step forward in the march toward justice in America.

Let’s also be clear that such a verdict is also much too rare. For so many people, it seems like it took a unique and extraordinary convergence of factors: a brave young woman with a smartphone camera; a crowd that was traumatized — traumatized witnesses; a murder that lasts almost 10 minutes in broad daylight for, ultimately, the whole world to see; officers standing up and testifying against a fellow officer instead of just closing ranks, which should be commended; a jury who heard the evidence, carried out

(continued from cover page) their civic duty in the midst of an extraordinary moment, under extraordinary pressure.

For so many, it feels like it took all of that for the judicial system to deliver a just — just basic accountability.

We saw how traumatic and exhausting just watching the trial was for so many people. Think about it, those of you who are listening — think about how traumatic it was for you. You weren't there. You didn't know any of the people.

But it was difficult, especially for the witnesses who had to relive that day.

It's a trauma on top of the fear so many people of color live with every day when they go to sleep at night and pray for the safety of themselves and their loved ones.

Again — as we saw in this trial, from the fellow police officers who testified — most men and women who wear the badge serve their communities honorably.

But those few who fail to

meet that standard must be held accountable. And they were today; one was. No one should be above the law. And today's verdict sends that message.

But it is not enough. We can't stop here.

In order to deliver real change and reform, we can and we must do more to reduce the likelihood that tragedies like this will ever happen and occur again; to ensure that Black and brown people or anyone — so they don't fear the interactions with law enforcement, that they don't have to wake up knowing that they can lose their very life in the course of just living their life. They don't have to worry about whether their sons or daughters will come home after a grocery store run or just walking down the street or driving their car or playing in the park or just sleeping at home.

And this takes acknowledging and confronting, head on, systemic racism and the racial disparities that exist in policing and in our criminal justice system more broadly.

You know, state and local government and law enforcement needs to step up, but so does the federal government. That's why I have appointed the leadership at the Justice Department that I have, that is fully committed to restoring trust between law enforcement and the community they are sworn to serve and protect. I have complete confidence in the Attorney General — General Garland's leadership and commitment.

I have also nominated two key Justice Department nominees — Vanita Gupta and Kristen Clarke — who are eminently qualified, highly respected lawyers who have spent their entire careers fighting to advance racial equity and justice.

Vanita and Kristen have the

experience and the skill necessary to advance our administration's priorities to root out unconstitutional policing and reform our criminal justice system, and they deserve to be confirmed.

We also need Congress to act. George Floyd was murdered almost a year ago. There's meaningful police reform legislation in his name. You just heard the Vice President speak of it. She helped write it. Legislation to tackle systemic misconduct in police departments, to restore trust between law enforcement and the people that are entrusted to serve and protect. But it shouldn't take a whole year to get this done.

In my conversations with the Floyd family — and I spoke with them again today — I as-

sured them that we're going to continue to fight for the passage of the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act so we can — I can sign it into law as quickly as possible. And there's more to do.

Finally, it's the work we do every day to change hearts and minds as well as laws and policies — that's the work we have to do. Only then will full justice and full equality be delivered to all Americans. And that's what I just discussed with the Floyd family.

The guilty verdict does not bring back George. But through the family's pain, they are finding purpose so George's — George's legacy will not be just about his death, but about what we must do in his memory.

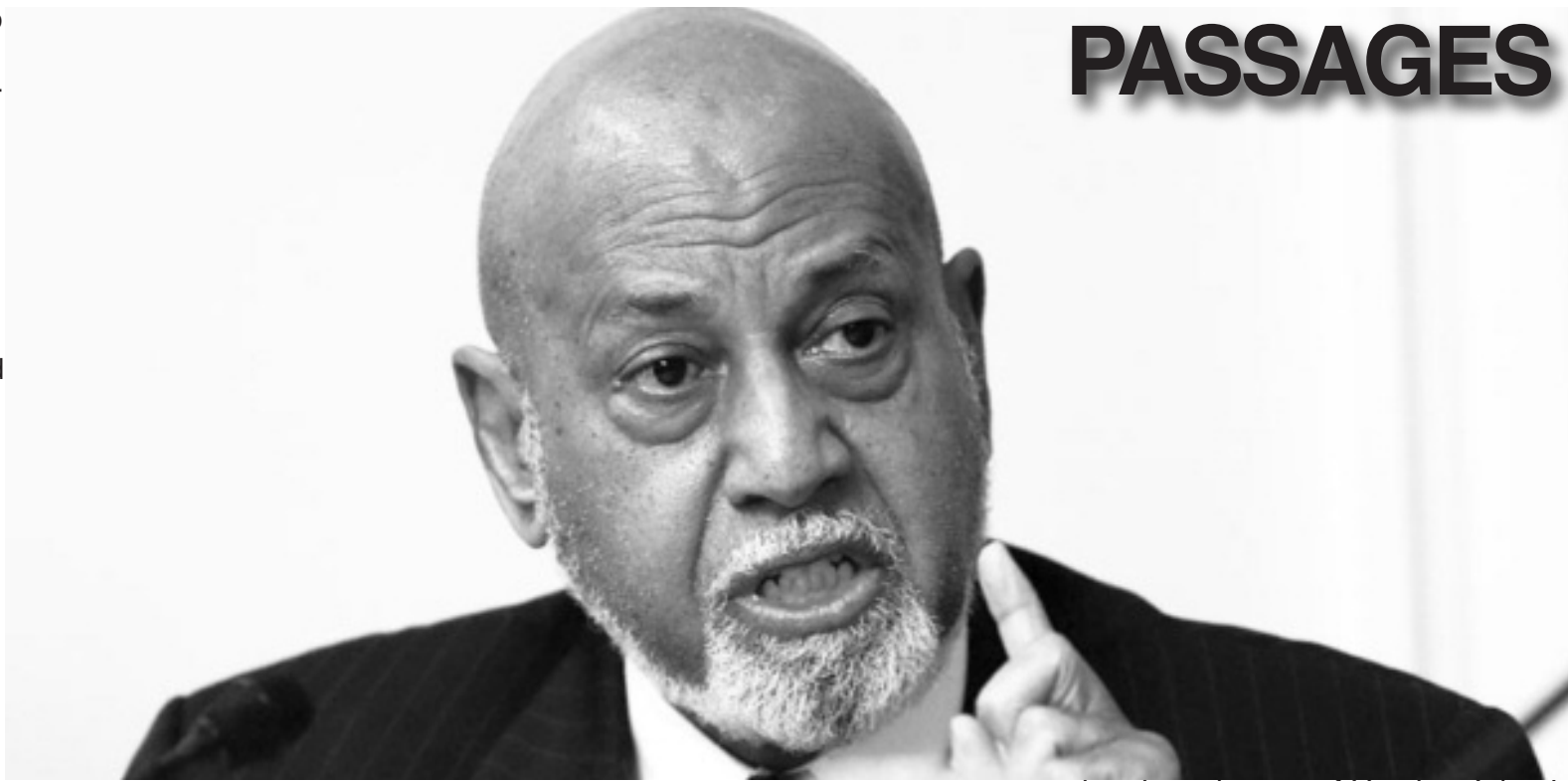

US Congressman Alcee Hastings dies at 84

Florida Congressman Alcee Hastings died recently at the age of 84 following a two-year battle with pancreatic cancer.

The Democratic lawmaker started his career as a civil rights attorney in Florida during the 1960s and 1970s, when he filed segregation

lawsuits and a landmark case to desegregate Broward County schools.

Political reporter Yamiche Alcin-

dor shared news of Hastings' death on Twitter, noting "Hastings crusaded against racial injustice as a civil rights lawyer, became a federal judge and went on to win 15 congressional elections, becoming Florida's senior member of Congress."

"U.S. Rep. Alcee Hastings served his constituents as a civil rights attorney, judge, and Dean of our Congressional delegation," his fellow Florida Rep. Val Demings tweeted. "He changed the face of

politics in FL and brought passion & unwavering dedication to the fight for justice.

"We are forever grateful for a life well-lived."

In 1970, Hastings ran to get the Democratic nomination for the U.S. Senate, which he did not win.

However, he showed that a Black candidate could be deemed worthy of such an important job.

Seven years later, Hastings was appointed a Broward Circuit Court judge.

Three years later, in 1979, President Jimmy Carter appointed him to the U.S. District Court, where he became Florida's first Black federal judge.

However, two years later, Hastings was indicted on charges that he conspired to solicit a \$150,000 bribe from an FBI agent, and a jury found him not guilty.

Still, Congress took up the case, and the U.S. House of Representatives impeached Hastings, and the Senate convicted him and removed him from office.

Yet, the decision did not disqualify him from running for or holding future political offices.

And run—and win—he did. For over 25 years.

April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month

AAA: Distracted Driving Crashes Kill Nine People per Day



MADISON – As traffic begins to pick up across the country, with increased vaccinations and decreased pandemic restrictions, AAA – The Auto Club Group reminds drivers about the importance of focusing on the road ahead and not on their smart-phones during Distracted Driving Awareness Month.

According to 2019 data from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration:

"Distracted driving crashes killed 3,142 people in the United States – an average of 9 deaths per day.

That number was up 10 percent from the year before (2,839 deaths in 2018). In Wisconsin alone, there were 28 fatal crashes involving a distracted driver, resulting in 29 fatalities in 2019."

"Distracted driving remains a growing traffic safety problem nationwide," said Nick Jar-musz, director of public affairs for AAA – The Auto Club Group.

"Any distraction, whether it be texting or talking to a passenger, could be enough to cause a crash. AAA strongly urges drivers to focus on what's most important, the

road in front of them.”
Top 3 Risky Driver Distractions:

- Mobile phone use
- In-vehicle technology
- Passengers in the vehicle

Unfortunately, drivers who use their cellphones behind the wheel have chosen to ignore the message that it's extremely dangerous. In 2019, the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety conducted a nationwide survey which found:

Most drivers (96 percent) believe typing or reading on a hand-held cellphone while driving to be very or extremely dangerous.

Unfortunately, some of them do it anyway. Thirty-nine percent admitted to reading and 29% admit to typing on a smartphone at least once while behind the wheel within the past month.

Checking your phone at the stoplight can be risky too. AAA research found that drivers can experience a “hangover effect”, where the mind stays distracted for up to 27 seconds after using smartphones or voice-to-text vehicle infotainment systems to send text messages, make phone calls or update social media. In other words, once that light turns green, your mind may still be focused on your phone and not on the road.

“The bottom line is, if your mind is not focused on driving, you're unable to properly react to what's happening on the road in front of you. That puts other drivers, bicyclists, and pedestrians at risk,” Jarmusz continued.

AAA offers these tips to avoid distracted driving:

Put it away. Place your mobile device out of sight to prevent temptation.

Know where you're going. If using a navigation system, program the destination before driving.

Pull over. If you must call or text while on the road, pull off the road safely and stop first.

Ask passengers for help. If riding with someone, seek their help to navigate, make a call or send a message.

Be a good passenger. Speak out if the driver of your vehicle is distracted.

Don't be a distraction. Avoid calling or texting others when you know they are driving.

Activate Do Not Disturb. Setting up this feature on iPhone or Android device will prevent calls from coming in while you're driving.

Everyone should avoid distractions while in traffic. Just as drivers need to pay attention, so do pedestrians and bicyclists. Never call, text or play games while walking or cycling.

I also spoke to Gianna — George's (inaudible) — George's young daughter, again. When I met her last year — I've said this before — at George's funeral, I told her how brave I thought she was. And I, sort of, knelt down to hold her hand. I said, “Daddy's looking down on you. He's so proud.” She said to me then — I'll never forget it — “Daddy changed the world.”

Well, I told her this afternoon, “Daddy did change the world.” Let that be his legacy: a legacy of peace, not violence — of justice.

Peaceful expression of that legacy are inevitable and appropriate, but violent protest is not. And there are those who will seek to exploit the raw emotions of the moment — agitators and extremists who have no interest in social justice; who seek to carry out violence, destroy property, to fan the flames of hate and division; who will do everything in their power to stop this country's march toward racial justice. We can't let them succeed.

This is the time for this country to come together, to unite as Americans. There can never be any safe harbor for hate in America.

I've said it many times: The battle for the soul of this nation has been a constant push and pull for more than 240 years — a tug of war between the American ideal that we're all created equal and

the harsh reality that racism has long torn us apart.

At our best, the American ideal wins out. So we can't leave this moment or look away, thinking our work is done. We have to look at it — we have to — we have to look at it as we did for those 9 minutes and 29 seconds. We have to listen. “I can't breathe. I can't breathe.” Those were George Floyd's last words. We can't let those words die with him. We have to keep hearing those words.

We must not turn away. We can't turn away. We have a chance to begin to change the trajectory in this country. It's my hope and prayer that we live up to the legacy.

May God bless you. And may God bless the — George Floyd and his family.

Thank you for taking the time to be here. This can be a moment of significant change.
