COOKING UP REAL-LIFE EXPERIENCES AT CENTRAL CITY CYBERSCHOOL

To high school students, the future as an adult seems so distant, and at times, unreachable.

But Central City Cyberschool is bridging the divide between now and the future by bringing partners together with students to identify interests, explore career pathways, and provide a foretaste of what life can hold.

This spring, six students are getting a taste of the restaurant business through an experience brought to them by Jason Alston, owner of Heaven's Table BBQ, a Milwaukee restaurant and catering business on Milwaukee's East Side.

Twice a month, Alston meets with the students on a Monday to discuss and plan a potential menu.

Then, he returns on Friday to coach them in the preparation and serving from a food truck

parked at the school, 4340 N. 46th St.

Shaniya Sherrod, a sophomore, says she was surprised at the way the whole operation works.

"You can get a lot done in that one truck!" she exclaims. "It's not a big truck. So, at first, I thought the food was cooked somewhere else and brought there. But, no, we do it all right there in that truck."

For Desmond James, a sophomore, the experience has car-

ried him beyond his comfort zone and into new possibilities.

"I heard about the culinary class and thought that it would be a good opportunity," he says.

Under Alston's tutelage, Desmond is learning new things in the kitchen. Since some of his family members are vegetarians, Desmond says he knows how to prepare vegetables. But when it comes to meats like ribs and briskets, those open a whole new arena of food preparation.

"He showed us how to cut the brisket and draw a knife through the meat to make it a thin or thick slice. Then, he showed us how to plate certain dishes and make it look nice," explains Desmond.

At 15, Desmond is just coming into an age when getting a job becomes a possibility. Working with Chef Alston might make the search a little easier.

"I think since we have learned some of the basics from him, I have a little experience now and

Another 'Doctor' title for MUL's Dr. Eve Hall



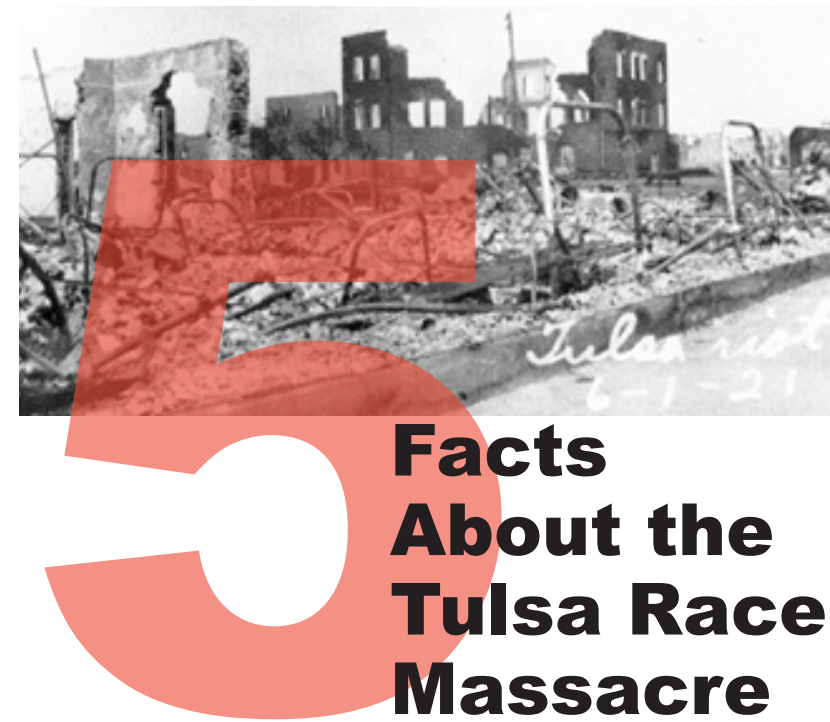

Facts About the Tulsa Race Massacre

In 1921, a White mob entered the Greenwood District and destroyed Tulsa's Black community. During the recent Memorial Day weekend, the centennial remembrance of the Tulsa Race Massacre was commemorated.

The massacre began when White townspeople heard a false rumor that 19-year-old Dick Rowland, a Black shoe shiner, assaulted a White elevator operator named Sarah Page. Below are five interesting facts about the Tulsa Race Massacre.

1. Tulsa Police May Have Encouraged Violence —Eyewitness accounts create the impression that police deputized White members of the violent Tulsa mob and police used racial slurs as they focused their violence on Black citizens in Tulsa.

2. There was an effort by the Tulsa Tribune and the government to suppress the story. The Tulsa Tribune ran the false Dick Rowland "assault" story on the front page but then made the story vanish from bound volumes of the newspaper. Stories of the massacre were removed from police archives and no public memorials of the event were held until over 70 years later — in 1997.

3. Hospital Records Reveal the Truth. Over 800 people were admitted to local hospitals, yet the Oklahoma Bureau of Vital Statistics officially recorded only 36 dead. A 2001 state commission examining the massacre estimated that as many as 300 Black people were murdered based on autopsy and funeral records.

4. An estimated 10,000 Black people were left homeless after the massacre. An estimated \$2 million in property damage resulted from the Tulsa Race Massacre. The damage to Tulsa's Black community in today's dollars is over \$130 million.

5. The false rumor that Dick Rowland assaulted a White girl, led to a White mob surrounding the jail where Rowland was kept in preparation for a lynching. But a group of about 75 Black men, many of whom were armed, also arrived at the jail to prevent the lynching of Rowland. This example of armed Black resistance is what is believed to be the start of the massacre and hundreds of Black murders during the massacre.

that will help me get a job," Desmond says, adding that taking the course gets him away from sitting at a desk and into something where he can apply what he is learning in school, like handling money or measuring ingredients.

"With the direction I am going now with the culinary classes, I might like being a chef or a cook," he adds.

Semaj Moore, also a sophomore, had not thought of working in a restaurant, but after his experience with Heaven's Table, he may try it out.

"It's fun to do, and I am making stuff that I never made before," says Semaj.

Ribs, brisket, roasted chicken are among the fare the students serve up from the food truck. The planning and preparation for it all took him by surprise.

"It wasn't like cooking ground beef," he explains. "I mean, you have to marinate the meat for a day or a couple of hours, and you have to season it so it goes into the meat enough to taste it. It's a long process."

As Alston suspected, most students he is encountering have not thought about the future. Semaj is just beginning to think about life after high school.

He has a Plan A – go to college and hopefully play for the NBA. Then, there is a Plan B – become a businessman or architect.

Initially, Semaj didn't think about the business acumen someone needs to run their own restaurant, but in considering what Alston needs to carry off a successful venture, Semaj begins to think aloud.

"He needs employees, and he has to think about all of that. Who is going to do what and how many,

Then he has to come up with a design for the restaurant and the menu."

As Semaj talks, he begins to make connections with the business side of Heaven's Table.

Alston says he is committed to creating opportunities that students

might not otherwise get. Perhaps the Heaven's Table experience will help students to at least learn how to cook a little on their own or build beginning skills so that they might secure a job in the food industry, if that appeals to them, he says.

Alston speaks from his own journey as an African American man who grew up in Milwaukee and who developed a passion for cooking from watching his grandfather and uncle.

"My granddad – he's passed now – he was from Tennessee. My uncle was from Mississippi. I played as a kid, but when they were cooking, I watched what they were doing. I

learned from them and my mother," he says of his beginnings as a chef.

His interests took him to Milwaukee Area Technical College's culinary arts program after he graduated from high school. He later continued his studies to earn a bachelor's degree from Cardinal Stritch University in business management.

"When you are younger, you typically attach yourself to your parents' hip and you see what they're doing for a living," Alston explains.

"But I think there are a lot of single-family homes, where kids miss out on learning how to do things because there are not enough people around to influence them."

That adult example for Alston led him to success. Heaven's Table is about to expand to include a second location. It also fueled Alston's decision to pay the opportunity forward to young people who may not have examples that appeal to them.

"My goal is to instill in these students some kind of knowledge of cooking so that they will have a life skill, and perhaps get a job. I want to help get their brains thinking about what they want to do in the future," he says.

"I am a person who has been through what they have been through, and maybe because of that, I am a little more respected

school."

The school has Alston's endorsement. He has made a commitment to offer the program again during the 2021-22 school year, and he encourages others to consider this kind of partnership.

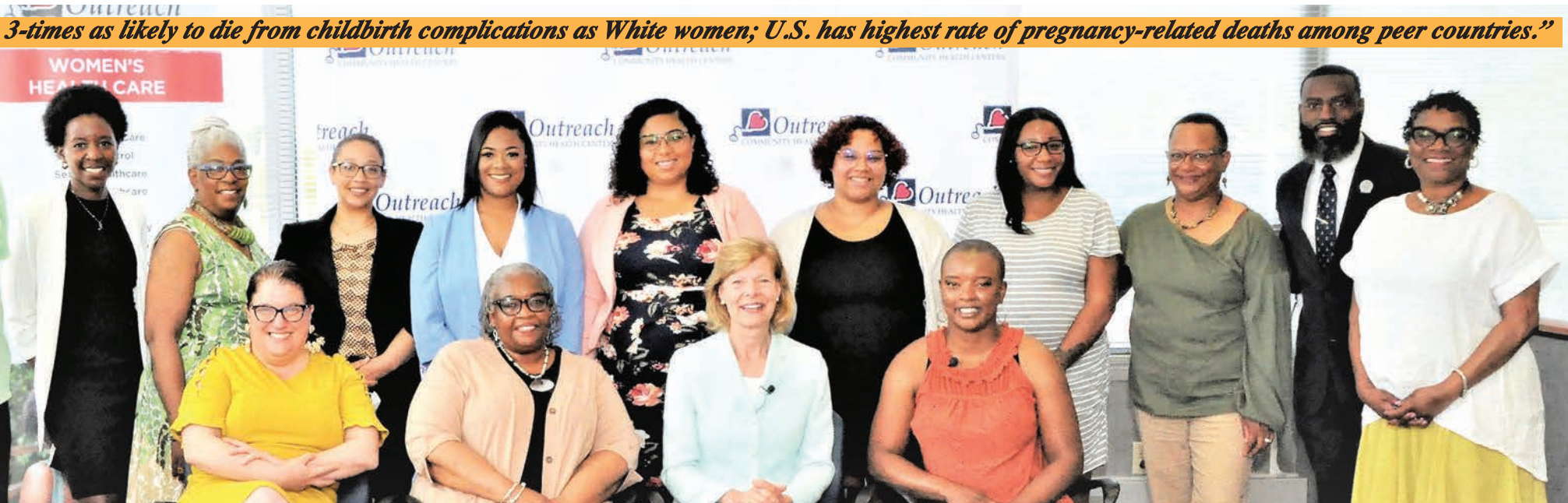

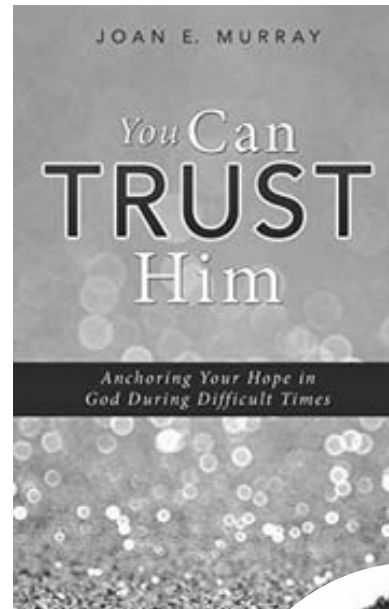
“God is faithful, trustworthy, and He is always working on your behalf,” says international Bible teacher Joan E. Murray.

The sister's response to the insult was right on point.

It was direct, humorous, and apropos:

"I will never let a man disrespect me; ever, ever, ever, especially a little white one," declared WNBA star Liz Cambage.

In fact, I saw photos of Cambage in a tiny bikini while on an island vacation, and the sister is anything but obese. In fact, if shot from a distance, you'd probably think she was a model.

Miller's remark cost him a fine and one-day suspension. It also may have permanently ruined his reputation and his ability to coach in a women's basketball league.

If nothing else, Cambage's slam-dunked retort made him look like a racist clown, or at the very least, a blind one. And he should be lucky that beautiful Amazon didn't stuff him in the net.

But that's not the issue in need of discussion here.

I was entirely behind Cambage's rejoinder---laughing my behind off---until her following sentence in which she explained she is very "proud of being a big bitch."

And she didn't say 'b-word.'

I don't know about you, but I can't put that adjective and noun together---pride and bitch.

It was only yesterday that we woke up to realize that we can be Black and Proud. We let the world know we finally recognized who we are or were.

I can't phantom Angela Davis, Fannie Lou Hammer, or Elaine Brown substituting Black for bitch. Nor do I believe African American feminists dating back to Sojourner Truth fighting for sisters to become bitches.

Naw, being a 'proud bitch' (b-word) just doesn't click. It's nonsensical to me.

In fact, being a proud bitch (b-word) ranks right up there being a proud 'nigger' (n-word), or Neckbone, or carjacker, or urban terrorist.

I recall being called out many years ago when I criticized the 'proud pimps' holding a 'player's ball' in Milwaukee. The only thing worse than being a proud pimp was being a proud 'ho, I said.

Cambage could have said she was a proud diva, which is what I hope she meant. But, like so many Black Americans, Negroes, and former slaves, she cast herself in an entirely different light, taking on a negative and disingenuous persona, one I hope she doesn't accept as her permanent reality.

Granted, many sisters use diva and bitch interchangeably...I assume.

Others see a value in being 'bitchy,' as it applies to being a strong, assertive, and aggressive woman, someone who takes on the challenges of single motherhood in a racist society. Or a career in corporate America, where they are qualified but unwanted, both because they are female and African American.

But I doubt if any one of them would be content to be called a bitch by a superior, much less an underling.

But can you have it both ways?

Like the penultimate insult---nigger (n-word)---bitch was created by people who sought to belittle and denigrate. In fact, the same White men who sought to demonize Africans (we didn't become Americans until after the civil war, and not through the emancipation proclamation) were the misogynist who introduced the word bitch.

Put lipstick and perfume on it, and it's still a derogatory term.

Unlike the 'n-word (nigger), bitch (b-word) is gender-specific but has its roots in the same worldview used to justify the enslavement of millions and maintain control of them through socialization and indoctrination.

Whether you believe there was a Willie Lynch or not, the control methodology attributed to him included the simple but effective strategy of creating a sense of inferiority and self-hatred in the victims.

Teach them to hate each other and themselves while simultaneously undermining their culture and spiritual foundation, and as one historian

posited, and you don't have to lead them to the back door; they will find it on their own.
