Ron Johnson, father of 'restorative justice' initiative, passes

Dane County's first restorative court director, **Ron Johnson**, a man remembered for his kind heart and colossal impact, has died at 71.

"We've lost the father of restorative justice," the restorative court's senior social worker Stephanie Marino wrote in a Sunday email to staff announcing Johnson's death. "Ron was an iconic community member in Milwaukee and Madison and touched thousands of lives."

Memorial service set for Dr. Wallace Cheatham

A memorial service will be held Friday, November 5, 4 p.m. at Northwest Funeral Chapel, 6630 W. Hampton Avenue for **Dr. Wallace McClain Cheatham**, an internationally recognized composer, performing artist, and scholar recently passed. He was 76 years old.

Cheatham's compositions, which span a variety of genres, have been performed in national and international settings and have been published by a number of prominent presses.

He was the subject of biographical record in 'Who's Who in the World, Who's Who in America, and Who's Who in American Education. A long-time choral director, pianist, and organist (particularly at Milwaukee's St. Mark AME Church), Cheatham was an in-demand accompanist who was also active with groups that perform at the Milwaukee Youth Arts Center, and taught for many years for the Milwaukee Public Schools.

New statue of political and civil rights trailblazer Vel Phillips on grounds of state capitol announced!

Even after her passing, civil rights and political legend Vel R. Phillips continues to trail-blaze. She will become the first African American woman in America to have a statue at a state capitol.

The Phillips statue will be on the Wisconsin state capitol grounds at the South Hamilton Street entrance to the capitol in Madison.

Phillips was the first woman and African American elected to the Milwaukee Common Council in the mid 1950s. She was also the first African American and woman elected to Wisconsin secretary of state, making her the first female and African American to hold

'Stuck in the Mud' is an expression used by the youth today to describe being in a 'bad situation.'

That's where Bianca Williams found herself several years ago. Having graduated from Thomas Edison High School, Williams decided to strike-out on her own, as many young people do.

Life was not easy during that time as the Milwaukee native took on many different jobs, including at one point, dancing. None of the jobs lead to anything more meaningful. Simply put, they were leading her to nowhere.

So, what caused the turnaround in her life, leading her to found 'No Worries Adult/Family Home, Inc.,' a 501c3 business that provides respite care in a homelike atmosphere for individuals needing support as they transition from hospital

This second group of founders builds on the success of the inaugural cohort, which concluded in June 2021 and included startups such as HUED, which recently raised \$1.6 million from investors including Female Founders Fund and Serena Williams' VC fund, Serena Ventures.

stays, or provide skilled nursing care to allow family care-givers to have a needed break?

Williams said she prayed to God to get her out of the 'mud.' One night, God answered her prayers in the form of a dream, telling her what she needed to do.

Her 'mission,' according to God? To address homelessness, sex trafficking, dysfunctional families, and single mothers with poor parenting skills in need of assistance.

With the Grace of God and the strong support of her family, 'No Worries Adult/Family Home, Inc. has grown to eight sites offering such services as: three-meals-a-day, housekeeping, laundry

services, medical transportation, basic cable TV and wireless internet, and life-enrichment activities and programs. In addition to her many responsibilities, this energetic and enthusiastic 30-year-old is working towards completing her substance abuse and counseling certification in order to work with those suffering from mental illness. "...Through hard work, perseverance, and the power of prayer, all things are possible," Williams said.

a statewide office.

The statue was approved November 1 by the State Capitol and Executive Residence Board (SCERB), which is in charge of decorations at the Capitol. It will be erected in late 2022 or early 2023.

Michael Johnson, CEO of Boys and Girls Clubs, began the push for the statue last year amid widespread protests over police brutality.

"Last year this was just an idea," Johnson said as he addressed a gathering at a press conference announcing the placement of the statue. A cutout of Phillips stood near the statue's future home.

"But the people behind me and the people in this crowd decided it would be more than an idea and because of them today... Vel Phillips will be the first Black woman in America to have a statue at a state capitol."

Said Phillips' son Mike Phillips during the press conference: "My mom certainly has done a lot of firsts and we know that, but this is a moment to look forward to some of the firsts we can anticipate. This monument should be for those folks going forward."

Milwaukee Ald. Milele Coggs, who knew the pioneering political and rights figure since she was a child, said she is "filled with pride" at the

announcement.

Coggs was a member of the Vel Phillips Task Force, which was formed to drive the effort to have the first statue depicting an African American on the capitol grounds.

"It was also my honor to author the successful Common Council legislation to rename N. 4th St. as N. Vel R. Phillips Ave., and to create the Vel R. Phillips Trailblazer Award, bestowed each year as part of Girls' Day at City Hall to recognize selfless service and work to improve the quality of life for residents in Milwaukee."

When completed, the statue of Phillips will join the "Forward" and Col. Hans Christian Heg statues, which were reinstalled in September after being torn down by protesters in June 2020. Heg was an abolitionist who died in a Civil War battle, and the "Forward" statue has come to represent women's rights. The fourth corner of the Capitol grounds features a memorial to fallen law enforcement officers.

State officials said it cost a little more than \$82,000 to restore both statues. The statue of Phillips is being donated by the Vel Phillips Statue Task Force.

Parklawn to be 'ground-zero' for city-wide Employment Summit sponsored by KOHL's

Parklawn Assembly of God will be the site of a one-day jobs fair sponsored by KOHL's and 13 public and private entities.

The Milwaukee Career & Employment Summit, to be held on November 11, aims to connect jobseekers with p to 30 employers with immediate job openings—including the Milwaukee Bucks—as well as provide resources and presentations on removing obstacles that hinder career development.

Parklawn Assembly of God is located at 3725 N. Sherman Blvd., from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. A free lunch will be served and participants will be eligible for drawings for gift cards.

Though many job seekers are in high demand by local employers due to the uneven recovery from COVID-19, many of them still find it difficult to find a good job with a pathway to a solid career.

"The summit gives us the opportunity to show 'barriers are like speed bumps they may slow you down but they shouldn't stop your journey towards success,'" said Kevin Freeman, Project Manager, Ezekiel Community Development Corporation.

"Who wouldn't appreciate and take the opportunity to have a realistic second chance at having a better financial lifestyle, being rehabilitated, released from whatever institution, or even just a second chance in general?" said Elijah Carter, owner of Crisp EE Cutz Barbershop.

The Milwaukee Career & Employment Summit will feature:

- A community dialogue with workers who have overcome barriers to employment, employers who hire them, and representatives of organizations that foster success in the workplace
- A job fair with up to 30 employers with immediate job openings, including the Milwaukee Bucks, Advocate Aurora Health, and Harrigan Solutions
- Presentations on how to get into good careers, including in the construction trades
- Resource fair with 20 organizations that help people overcome barriers to employment, including attaining a high school diploma and driver's license recovery.

There are a myriad of reasons for Milwaukee's ranking as the worst city in America for Black male unemployment.

But one of the most obvious has been too long ignored, even though it is right under your nose (pun intended).

Drum roll and cymbal crash, please...it's DRUGS!

Or, more specifically, marijuana, aka 'weed,' 'pot,' 'chronic,' 'ganja,' or as us old-timers called it, 'reefer.'

Show me a young brother—or sister—who is able-bodied, among the 'minority' with a high school diploma, and willing to work, but has been turned away at the gate. I can all but guarantee you'll smell the odor of 'stink' or 'skunk' on their clothes. That's what marijuana smells like these days: a stinky dead skunk.

Back in the day, the government tried 'scaring' people from using weed.

Later we tried appealing to their common sense by explaining the medical risks.

But both Nancy Reagan's 'just say no' campaign and Michele Obama's healthy youth project went up in a cloud of...uh... 'smoke.'

Maybe our next anti-drug campaign should focus on the outcome that has plagued our community in myriad ways, including poverty, crime, and fatherless children.

If you still haven't figured out the singular nexus, it's the inability—or unwillingness--of a significant percentage of our Black Generation--whether it's the Xer's, Y's, and Zers--to put down their joints long enough to get a decent job.

And I'm not talking about eternal abstinence. That would be impractical. But 30-60 days, which is the amount of time it takes for the chemicals in mari-

juana to escape their bodies.

Obviously, I'm not making a judgment on marijuana use.

But, as long as alcohol is legal, it is at best hypocrisy to criminalize weed.

In fact, you need to track the 'adult beverage' lobby waving big dollars under the noses of our congressmen and state lawmakers to figure out why marijuana remains illegal. And it's not out of public health concerns.

Conversely, there are many advantages to legalization, ranging from billions in tax revenue, to the release of hundreds of thousands of Black non-violent prisoners. (Ah, that's it! The state's rural areas would be losing their bread and butter!; there reason for existing in the first place!)

And, let's not forget greater employability which can solve a plethora of problems.

Weigh those attributes against weed's harmful physical and potentially psychological effects, and where do you land?

More-over, as many millennials will tell you, smoking cigarettes is far worse, and alcohol has killed more Americans than COVID-19 ever will.

Just yesterday, a prominent NFL player lost his livelihood and freedom because he killed someone in Las Vegas while driving intoxicated.

Every 52 minutes, someone dies as a result of drunk driving.

Earlier this year, a sister told me that political theories suggesting the pandemic of reckless driving is linked to weed are 'ridiculous.'

Not only are weed smokers more inattentive, but they are also paranoid to the point they run the risk of attracting police.

One study I found while researching this column showed over one-third of the drivers under 18 have used, or are using, marijuana.

Another study showed Black users of 'Mary Jane' smoke the heaviest between the ages of 18-29.

However, that study was dated. It conflicts with previously cited data revealing that 38% of teens have tried weed by their senior year in high school.

Not only was that data ethnically neutral, but it didn't consider nearly half of Black children attending 'government' schools drop out by their senior year.

And, I'm also assuming the data is based on the number of cigarette wraps (so the weed user can 'roll-his (or her)-own 'tree' (another slang-term for marijuana) found in school lockers next to the nickel bag (I assume they still sell those).

No doubt some suburban mis-

sionaries assume marijuana use has dropped because the sale of wraps---Tops in particular---has fallen over the last few years.

The truth is, while wrap sales have dropped, cigar sales have skyrocketed (that's what they make 'blunts' with for those of you farmers from Racine county).

And even while the sale of 'Black and Mild's' and 'Swisher Sweets' to juveniles is illegal (with the onus on the merchant), it hasn't stopped many 16-year-olds from purchasing a pack at the corner store along with two candy bars and a bag of 'Flamin' Hots.'

Before you exhale, let me theorize the teen who just purchased a two-pack of blunts will be denied a job in a few years because of the illegal chemicals in their system.

Take this with a grain of salt, if you will. Still, I contend a significant reason for the Black male unemployment rate is because a substantial percentage fail their drug tests.

And it seems like I'm the only one in town who wants to expose that elephant in the room.

I talked with a young bother the other day who has limited his opportunities because he can't put down his daily joint. Daily, as in the morning, noon, and night puff, puff, puffing his immediate future away.

I'm not suggesting I'm a 'virgin.' And I won't lie and repeat the lies of presidents, including Bill Clinton, who said he didn't inhale (or have sex with that woman).

I'm a Vietnam vet, having served in a hostile environment where weed was more available than Kool's, Newport's, or mentholated bullets.

I grew up in an era that created the sentence...' puff, puff, pass.'

You can travel 40 minutes to Illinois and buy marijuana in many different forms, from vapors, to pills, to candy.

You can leave your tax money there because Illinois lawmakers figured out what Wisconsin's hypocritical Republican lawmakers here have not.

And don't believe those who suggest their opposition is out of

Such a predicament would allow Democrats to kill two birds with one stone: the party can appease White millennials and take credit for cutting the Black joblessness rate in half.

Decriminalizing weed would mean thousands of brothers could then secure jobs they formerly couldn't acquire because of drug (marijuana) tests.

The young brother is far from alone.

I know dozens of young brothers who have turned to hustling (generally selling weed themselves) because they can't stop smoking for a month.

And that's how long it takes for the marijuana to disappear from your urine.

Several years ago, I asked a young Native brother working at a major corporation if he would be receptive to opening the door for entry-level positions at his firm.

He was happy to accept the challenge, noting that he had many positions open but few applicants.

Over three months, I sent him five individuals who were presumably qualified.

Only one made it past the drug test! One of five!

I assume they weren't stupid. Or maybe they were since it's well known that the company in question performed drug tests on all applicants.

Then again, maybe the young men were the victims of residual smoke.

As unbelievable as that seems, it's almost impossible to go anywhere young folks have congregated these days without getting a contact (as in 'contact high.')

Just a couple of weeks ago, I walked through a cloud of smoke entering a funeral home.

concern for the public. That's a roach too small to smoke.

But don't put the onus entirely on their gender-specific shoulders. The state GOP opposition would be moot if the Democrats, who control the U.S. House, Senate, and White House, would decriminalize, if not legalize, weed.

In fact, decriminalization was an issue during the last presidential election. Many millennials falsely believed Joe Biden and VP Kamala Harris would push for legalization instead of maintaining it in the same category of heroin and opium.
