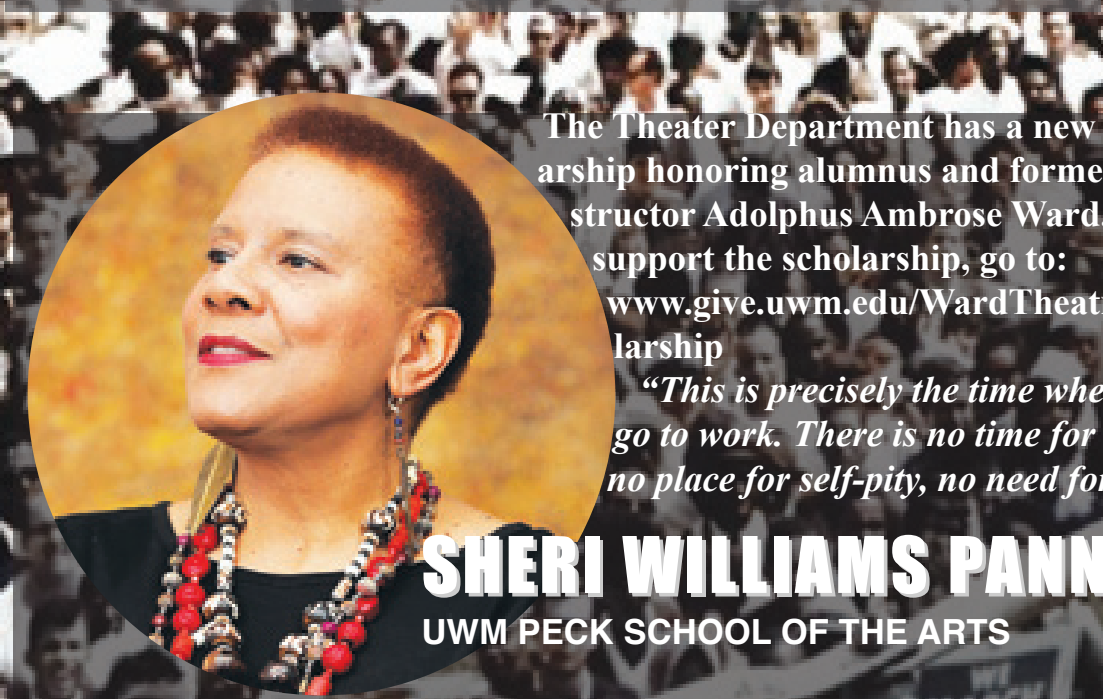


LIVING THE DREAM 2022

ADVOCACY GROUPS READY TO LOBBY BIDEN IN PUSH TO NOMINATE NATION'S FIRST BLACK WOMAN ON SUPREME COURT

Early into the 2020 presidential campaign, Biden said that he looked forward "to making sure there's a Black woman on the Supreme Court"

A White House source tells theGrio that conversations are being had over possibilities to fill the soon-to-be vacant Supreme Court seat after recent reports indicated that Justice Stephen Breyer is retiring after serving on the High Court for nearly three decades.

Breyer has yet to confirm his retirement. However, White House Press Secretary Jen Psaki tweeted, "It has always been the decision of any Supreme Court Justice if and when they decide to retire, and how they want to announce it, and that remains the case today. We have no additional details or information to share from @WhiteHouse."

Early into the 2020 presidential campaign in February during the Democratic primary, then-candidate Joe Biden said that he looked forward "to making sure there's a Black woman on the Supreme Court" if he were elected president. Now, that promise has a chance to become a reality as women's groups and Black leaders are reminding him of the pledge to nominate the nation's first Black woman Supreme Court justice.

"Never in our nation's history has a Black woman served on the Supreme Court. It's long past time we change that," tweeted freshman U.S. Rep. Mondaire Jones of New York, who sits on the House Judiciary Committee and was the first member of Congress to call on Breyer to retire.

"In his first year, @POTUS has shown a commitment to nominating jurists who reflect the diversity of America. We need him to extend that commitment to the High Court," added Jones.

Congressman Bobby Rush of Illinois tweeted, "Thrilled that @POTUS will have the chance to make good on his promise to nominate a Black woman to the Supreme Court."

The quest for a Black woman to sit on the United States Su-

Trailblazer for women business execs and author passes at 74

Former Johnson Controls executive and author Mary Dowell, a thought leader and inspiration to women throughout the community for many years, passed recently. She was 74

Dowell chaired or served on the boards of numerous organizations throughout the city.

Dowell was a trailblazer/pioneer who worked tirelessly for equity and inclusion of minorities and women in the workplace, especially in the C-suites of a number of local com-

panies.

Lauren Feaster, CEO of Professional Dimensions, a 40-plus year-old organization that helps women professionals reach their career goals, called Dowell—who was the organization's president from 2010-2012—a “role model who truly exemplified the values of PD, especially in the spirit of breaking down barriers and finding power in the work we do collectively as women.”

Starting with Johnson Controls in 1996 as director of corporate human resources, Dowell lead the company's diversity initiatives. She would transition from corporate human resources director to corporate communications, and pivot again to vice president of foundation affairs and global community relations, where she helped deploy millions in philanthropic resources around the globe.

Aside from serving as president of Professional Dimensions, Dowell chaired or served on the board of numerous local organizations including the Milwaukee Urban League, Visit Milwaukee, TEMPO Milwaukee, and Milwaukee Women Inc., the Marcus Center for the Performing Arts to name a few.

Dowell was the co-founder of the United Performing Arts Fund's Notable Women initiative.

After retiring from Johnson Controls in 2015, Dowell wrote a book, published in 2016, highlighting women who challenged and overcame obstacles in their personal and professional lives titled: ‘Playing Through the Fence.’

The book features 19 stories of women, including 17 from the Milwaukee area, who challenged stereotypes, prejudice and other barriers to achieve career success.

The Milwaukee-area women who provided stories for the book were Dowell, Maggie Beckley, Angela Brooks, Cheryl Carron, Tina Chang, Faithe Colas, Debra Crawford, Sheree Dallas Branch, Cristy Garcia-Thomas, Margaret Henningsen, Bernell Hooker, Joan Kessler, Maria Monreal-Cameron, Kimberley Noon, Deloris Sims, Becky Trochinski and Shanon Vuckovic.

According to Professional Dimensions' Feaster, Dowell's family is contemplating holding a memorial service in the Spring/Summer due to the pandemic, believing it will be safer to gather at that time.

A New Year: Family Bible Study

Happy New Year! As we begin the New Year let's begin by studying God's Word individually and as a family.

Moses, in Deuteronomy 6:4-7, admonishes:

Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength.

These commandments that I

give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children.

Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up.

The thrust of this passage is God's Word should be hidden in a person's heart and should constantly be a source of devotion and obedience to the Lord.

The intent was the Israelites were to teach it to their children. These verses should be the core curriculum of every Christian home.

Focus On the Family ran an article titled: Necessity of Family Bible Time¹ and offered these tips for Family Bible Study which I am delighted to re-run:

1. Set aside a specific day and time for your Family Bible Study and stick to it as best you can.

Young children in particular appreciate regular schedules and

routines. If your family can get into a habit of having a regular Bible study time, you'll find that your children will often come to appreciate it and miss it if it doesn't happen as scheduled.

2. Keep your Family Bible Study times relatively short. This is particularly important if there are young children in your family.

Older children in general have better attention spans, while younger children don't.

3. Pick an area, passage or topic of study that is helpful and relevant without being too difficult or challenging for children to grasp.

You may wish to find a good children's Bible and read some stories from that edition.

Pick some short biblical passages to read too. If your children are old enough to read, help them read certain passages aloud so they are actively engaged in your study time.

After reading the passage, have each member explain one verse or paragraph and tell what the verse means or how it can be applied to their personal life.

4. Include prayer in your Family Bible Study. Pray as you are moved to before your study time and perhaps during and after.

Beloved, God wants a personal relationship with all of His children and longs for us to spend time with Him in study as God speaks words of love, comfort, instruction and peace to us through the Word of God.

When we regularly and consistently attend to our spiritual education, it sets in motion a spiritual discipline that encourages a life-long commitment to developing our relationship with God. Begin the New Year studying God's Word individually and as a family.

Bader Philanthropies Reaches Funding Milestone of More than \$426 Million as it Celebrates 30th Anniversary

Foundation Gifts Nearly \$2.3 million in Local COVID-19 Relief

Bader Philanthropies, Inc., one of southeastern Wisconsin's top five foundations, announced today it has reached a milestone as it celebrates its 30th anniversary year which will include opportunities to honor three decades with the theme of "Spreading hope. Creating opportunities."

To date, the foundation has provided more than \$426 million in a variety of issue areas that improve the quality of life of people – young and old — living in neighborhoods in Milwaukee, rural Wisconsin and abroad. Of this funding, \$248,279,628 has been provided to 940 community partners in Milwaukee.

These milestones include Bader Philanthropies' efforts to quickly help southeastern Wisconsin organizations continue to provide services in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In April 2020, Bader Philanthropies announced it provided more than \$1 million toward local COVID-19 emergency efforts. The majority of the grants were paid to local organizations in need within days and weeks of the requests.

The foundation has funded 63 local organizations for a total of almost \$2.3 million dollars. In addition, Bader Philanthropies partnered with Shalem Healing to administer 1,520 COVID-19 tests at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Helen Bader Foundation (HBF) was established in 1992, three years after Helen Daniels Bader's death. Over the next 24 years, the organization approved grants and program related investments (PRI) designed to improve the quality of life of the diverse communities in which it works.

In 2015, the HBF changed its name to Bader Philanthropies, Inc. to reflect the philanthropic commitment from Isabel and Alfred Bader that would allow the organization to continue funding charitable projects in perpetuity.

In 2018, the Foundation put down roots in one of the many communities it supports by moving from its Historic Third Ward office into a renovated, state-of-the-art global headquarters in Milwaukee's Harambee neighborhood.

It is there that Bader Philanthropies continues the work begun by HBF and continues to fund innovative projects and programs, convene partners, and share knowledge to affect emerging issues in key areas including Alzheimer's and healthy aging, the arts, employment, Jewish education, neighborhood engagement, social equality, urban education, and youth development. In addition to the organization's funding, from 2004 – 2020 the foundation provided essential convening space for almost 1,500 events and 41,837 attendees.

In conjunction with Bader Philanthropies' 30th anniversary, the documentary, "Helen Daniels Bader: A Life Worth Emulating" was released this month.

It is a collection of interviews with family, board members and nonprofit and community leaders who share stories of Helen Daniels Bader's life and legacy.

Helen Daniels Bader was an early advocate for those afflicted

preme Court became louder during former President Barack Obama's administration. Women's groups pushed the idea before President Obama ultimately nominated Merrick Garland to the court. Republicans, led by then-Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, prevented that nomination from moving forward. Republicans cited timing as their reason not to consider Obama's nominee.

However, groups are ready to lobby President Biden to keep his bold campaign promise.

April Reign, the co-founder of Sista SCOTUS, told the-Grio that immediately following the news reports of Breyer's impending resignation, "President Biden has shown leadership...in this instance and in nominating Black women throughout the federal judiciary, and we're very appreciative of that."

Creating a ‘Black United Fund’ to save our children!

I'm not sure my check had cleared for my contribution to the United Negro College Fund (UNCF) before I received another solicitation from the organization Saturday.

The latest request included the customary 2x5 note pad (seemingly provided by 90% of solicitors), promising a special 'gift' if I exceeded my last contribution by at least \$10. Risibly (my new word of the week), the 'gift' is a pocket calculator---which is about the dumbest

promotion item I can think of these days.

Apparently, these must be leftover 'gifts' from the 1970s, before people began purchasing cell phones that come with calculators, dictionaries, GPS devices, movies, and microwaves.

Actually, the myopia of offering a calculator as an inducement wasn't the first or even the second thought that caused me to stumble over a pile of unopened mail stacked by my front door.

My first thought was how quickly the UNCF responded to my initial contribution with another request.

The second was my concern for the health of our neighborhood postman (excuse me, person, him or her, or them, or whatever) who will have to undergo back surgery from carrying all of the junk mail—and solicitations—I receive from every non-profit in the U.S. and Canada.

Solicitation mail outnumbers even my bills by an 18 to one margin.

And that's not because I've previously sent a contribution to the Wildlife Federation and Protect the Seals from Nuclear Holocaust Foundation.

Every new solicitation can be traced to a prior donation with another organization.

Being in the media, I understand the game and the needs. The pandemic cost millions of jobs and resulted in fewer contributions to worthy organizations.

I get that.

I don't get the nerve of organizations sharing or selling my information to other non-profits who, in turn, hit me up for cash. Or a check, credit card, or an I.O.U.

Little do they realize that many of us are barraged by so many solicitations, we get to the point of throwing anything other than a bill, Christmas or Kwanzaa card, or letter from a loved one (yeah, some

of us still write) away. Indiscriminately.

The pandemic has pretty much resulted in my being on a fixed income. I've worked for this small, Black business all of my adult life, thus necessitating side work, including consulting through Malik Communications. The pandemic has closed many doors, thus forcing financial decisions limiting my donations.

And that's inclusive of 'extra' funds originating from my pastor, Rev. Deborah Thomas's unprecedented sanction last year that congregants of the House of Grace Ministries help the poor and needy instead of tithing.

Her suggestion is another reason I am emersed---blessed---to be a member of the House of Grace. We have remained virtual to save money and to enable congregants to carry out the mission of our Christ and ancestors.

Which has opened the door for additional investments toward improving the welfare of our tribe and sparked internalizations about priorities.

Should limited resources be directed toward people's needs, research, or projects that benefit our tribe and village?

Because cancer has run rampant in my family, I've prioritized donations for research, as has my wife. I've also made regular contributions to diabetes and heart research. I was planning to donate for ED programs, assuming if more seniors were sexually satisfied, they would cut their grass and pick up litter around their homes.

But, I gave up that idea and instead sent a check to the wig and weave store, assuming it would allow sisters to spend their 'extra' cash on necessities instead of false images.

Joking aside, with resources dwindling, 2021 sparked an internal debate over whether my limited dollars be better used for research or to feed a family.

Hunger Task Force, Rescue Mission, and Food Pantries are in greater demand today than at any time in my memory. And that's despite a \$1 billion in stimulus aid from the feds that never seem to reach those in greatest need for reasons that defy logic.

My task is further complicated as my sons and I engineer the creation of a unique mentoring program that we hope will intercede in the lives of young Black boys before they slip through the ever-widening (un)safe net created by social ills, including educational apartheid, poverty, dysfunctional families and urban terrorism.

While few Black leaders are willing (or able) to discuss the herd of African elephants in the room, we are losing yet another generation of Black children to poor parenting, a failing government school system, and those who profit from our misery with the full support of political parties and the Negrocracy.

The Black incarceration, poverty, and crime rates can be directly traced to educational apartheid, which all of the powers are either ignoring or sweeping under the rug.

This deadly ‘pandemic’---there is no other way to describe it---begs for attention and remedy from entities that I don't see forthcoming.

Thus, we must take it upon ourselves to do what our ancestors, like Hannibal, did and train the elephants while we ride the donkey over the Alps.

An essential piece of the puzzle would be the creation of a Black United Fund, a vehicle funded and totally controlled by us. We've been talking about it for decades, but for whatever reason (lack of interest, apathy, brainwashing), it's never gotten off the ground.

Another puzzle piece is investing in educational and cultural programs---projects we control and operate.

In fact, given the social and cultural realities of this era, our top

with Alzheimer’s disease, and ahead of her time when it came to envisioning and promoting effective strategies related to care. At 23 years, Wisconsin Alzheimer’s Institute (WAI) is one of Bader Philanthropies’ longest-standing community partners touching the lives of people living in Milwaukee, rural Wisconsin and around the world.

WAI was created in 1998 to help people living with Alzheimer’s disease or other dementia, their caregivers, and health professionals who provide support. Today, Alzheimer’s disease affects 110,000 Wisconsin individuals and the number is projected to increase to 130,000 by 2025. WAI is a hub for research and resources such as the Wisconsin Registry for Alzheimer’s Prevention (WRAP), which is one of the world’s largest and longest-running studies of individuals at risk for Alzheimer’s disease; the Wisconsin Alzheimer’s Disease Research Center (ADRC), which facilitates knowledge sharing among academics and people living in rural and urban Wisconsin; and the Regional Milwaukee office, which focuses on making culturally-tailored and evidence-based health care available, particularly to African-Americans living in the inner city. WAI’s impact extends beyond the state of Wisconsin with the replication of the Registry for Alzheimer’s Prevention in Israel.

Bader Philanthropies’ commitment to the theme “Spreading hope. Creating opportunities.” can be seen in the organization’s program related investments (PRI). Since 1995, Bader Philanthropies has approved 43 loans, loan guarantees, equity investments and other credit enhancements to southeastern Wisconsin organizations totaling more than \$18,458,577.

Bader Philanthropies awarded three PRIs totaling 11 million,

beginning 16 years ago, to Generation Growth Capital (GGC) for its private equity growth fund investing in minority-owned businesses and entrepreneurs serving Midwest low-and moderate-income communities. More recent PRIs include the building across the street from Bader Philanthropies headquarters in Harambee which houses Sam’s Place, a Milwaukee-based eatery and jazz café; and Shalem Healing, Inc., a 501(c)3 nonprofit clinic offering integrated and holistic health care to the community, including the uninsured and underinsured. Sam’s Place and Shalem Healing are also illustrations of meeting needs that were voiced by the neighborhood.

PRIs are impact investments made by foundations to support charitable activities that involve the potential return of capital within an established time frame. Unlike grants, PRIs produce financial returns for foundations in the form of principal plus interest, gains realized on investments, etc., which can then be recycled for other charitable purposes. For the recipient, the primary benefit of this loan is access to capital at lower rates than may otherwise not be available.

“As we reflect on our thirtieth anniversary, it is humbling and heartwarming to hear about and see the spirit of connection, compassion and commitment in the work of our community partners day in and day out,” said Daniel J. Bader, president and CEO of Bader Philanthropies. “They are spreading hope and creating concrete opportunities in Harambee, rural Wisconsin and around the world.”

Since its establishment in 1992, the foundation has awarded a total of 9,113 grants totaling \$404.9 million, and approved 55 PRIs totaling \$21.4 million since 2000.

Rev. Al Sharpton Urges President Biden to Fulfill his Campaign Trail Promise and Nominate a Black Woman to the Court



According to sources familiar with the decision, Supreme Court Justice Stephen Breyer will retire at the end of the current term. Justice Breyer, 83, has served on the court for more than 27 years. This decision has sparked an outpouring of calls for President Biden to follow through on his campaign pledge and nominate a Black woman Supreme Court justice.

“As a presidential candidate, Joe Biden said that if elected, he would name a Black woman to the Supreme Court. We are looking for promises made to be promises kept,” said Reverend Al Sharpton, Civil Rights Leader and founder of National Action Network.

“There are many Black women in the judicial system more than qualified to be nominated. Secondly, we will be on high alert to make sure that Mitch McConnell does not try to block President Biden’s nominee as he successfully blocked President Obama’s nomination of Judge Merrick Garland. This opportunity presents a critical choice given that affirmative action, voting rights, and other key issues are before this court.”

Likely contenders to succeed Justice Breyer include U.S. Circuit Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson of the Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, a former Breyer law clerk; and Leondra Kruger, a justice on California’s Supreme Court.

priority should be to intervene early in the lives of those 'they' euphemistically call ‘at-risk black children.’

In essence, move beyond the slogans associated with 'villages raising children’ to create a template to manufacture that platitude.

In a perfect world and armed with the resources and personnel, I would recreate the Harambee and Urban Day schools, models that defined Black education a few short decades ago. In retrospect, had those entities been able to rely solely on Black funding and control as opposed to government regulation and intervention, that path to empowerment would have been maintained.

As history reveals, however, we made the mistake of allowing egos, greed, and government regulations to kill our dream.

If I’ve learned nothing else during my four decades of community service and research, it’s that those who control the resources focus the vision.

Expecting government, much less political entities, to empower us is akin to electing Snoop Doggy Dud to pastor your liberation theology church. All you’ve guaranteed is seeing your dream going up in 'smoke.'

A Black United Fund, coupled with uncompromised and culturally-grounded village leadership, would have ensured the survival of Harambee and Urban Day and paved the way for 'true' community control of the institutions that impact our community.

But that's another column, another dream, another reality.

Given our circumstances---leading the nation in seven negative social indicators, three linked to educational apartheid---I have committed myself from shifting resources and revenues from college scholarships and related endeavors to programs that provide a foundation for our children getting to that plateau.

I realize our dilemma is not a shortage of African American youth to sustain themselves in college or trade schools. The majority cannot qualify for admission.

Through our apathy and ignorance, disregard of cultural and spiritual tenets, and most critically, our refusal to heed the posits of Malcolm X (allowing others to educate our children, which he regarded as an absolute ‘no-no!’) and Carter G. Woodson ('Miseducation of the Negro'), our children, our future is at best unsettled.

Dysfunctional and redefined families, over 70% of whom are led by an alone and often ill-prepared woman, a vast majority of whom are themselves poor and illiterate, has corrupted the communal paradigm we maintained even through Jim Crow.

For those reasons, I am shifting my donation focus to early youth development. We must renew the rallying cry of the 1980s and 90s that we must 'Save the Children.'

Toward that end, I will focus my limited resources on youth-serv-

ing organizations explicitly targeting our children. I will embrace opportunities to redirect their paths, ground them in our Africentric culture, and empower them with knowledge and leadership skills.

For two decades, I contributed \$1,000 annually to Messmer High School for a Malik Holt Education Scholarship, earmarked for students who would major in education.

I will now redirect those funds (a reduced amount due to circumstances) to younger children who might not otherwise be provided with the tools to aspire to higher education.

My primary vehicle will be the creation of ‘MenT.O.R.S.’ (Men, Taking Our Responsivities Seriously). My family, along with a handful of committed community elders and warriors—are in the process of laying out the foundation for MenT.O.R.S.

Our first endeavor will be the formation of ‘Kids of Kemet,’ best described as Africentric Boys Scouts.

Imagine if your mind is unencumbered by gangsta rap, false political promises, and the psychological chains of slavery. Proud, educated, assertive, and service-driven young men destined for greatness.

The Kids of Kemet will be grounded on the platforms of education, culture, and spirituality. They will participate in martial arts both for physical and athletic attainment and self-defense.

They will be academically proficient and provided with the skills to conceptualize.

This may start off as a small endeavor, but I will invest what I have to ensure it grows and carries on beyond my life journey.

Let me clarify. I'm not talking about a lot of money when I reference my mailed donations.

In many respects, my financial contributions beyond the scholarships probably have no more impact than my donating old shoes to ‘Soles for Poor,’ or old glasses to the organization providing used lens to the poor. I just dropped off a toilet and tools to Habitat for Humanity to benefit low-income homeowners.

It's not much, but it's more than most.

Fifteen years ago, my wife and I used money from my book and our savings to provide \$1,000 scholarships to 23 of our late son's (Malik) classes at Young Leaders Academy. Ideally, those children called themselves the 'Kids of Kemet.'

With those resources, I could have purchased a new car or a down payment on a small house. But that's not what our life journey should be about. Most of those kids—the original Kids of Kemet, as they called themselves---are today contributing members of society, educated, employed, and motivated to give back.

I don't have the resources I had then, but I'm committed to this new venture; and will redirect some donations and find others---under rocks, in-seat cracks, and scrap metal—to continue this mission.
