Ask players from the Bucks, or the Packers, or Danny Glover and Charles Barkley, Shaquille O'Neal, and Dr. J, (basketball legend Julius Erving) or the cast of 'The Jefferson's,' they all moved on up but loved to come 'home' to the Mr. Perkins' Family Restaurant whenever they were in Milwaukee.

Mr. Perkins' Restaurant was among the first places Black college students studying outside the state returned to, as the late Willie Perkins, Jr. provided them with a free meal as a reward for their achievements.

It would take Willie, Jr. to name all of the notables who frequented Mr. Perkins' Family Restaurant. He loved to brag about the celebs who came after games and dined on fried chicken or pork chops, smothered chicken, candied yams and collard greens.

Others wanted the crispy fried catfish or hot smoked sausage dropped into the deep fryer to make the skin pop, then placed into a hot dog bun with loads of mustard and pickle relish. Bet you're beginning to salivate too.

Everyone talks about "Soul Food." Songs have been written about it, movies made about it and most Black and White Americans and others of ethnic traditions, have tasted and enjoyed "soul food." It is a unique cuisine.

'Comfort food'...best describes it...and that makes you want more. Once one's palate acquires

the taste of unique spices, 'secret ingredients,' and 'mother's love,' you're hooked.

Pepper, salt, cayenne, ginger, cumin, paprika, oregano, cinnamon and cardamon are basic staples,

add sage and all-spice and apple cider vinegar, and you've begun the wizardry of soul food, most believe.

Mexican, Italian, German, Chi-

nese, or Thai are unique dining preferences and readily identified is the excitement of Soul Food.

And in Milwaukee, there's no one who makes SOUL FOOD

GUILTY VERDICT in fed's hate crime trial in Ahmaud Arbery's death

The jury found father and son Greg and Travis McMichael and their neighbor William "Roddie" Bryan guilty of all charges on Tuesday

A federal jury found Travis McMichael, Gregory McMichael, and William "Roddie" Bryan guilty on all counts in the murder of Ahmaud Arbery.

The verdict came on the eve of the anniversary of Arbery's murder.

The McMichaels and Bryan chased Arbery through their mostly White Georgia neighborhood in their pickup trucks, cornering him before Travis McMichael shot the innocent jogger with a shotgun.

The trio was convicted in state court and given life sentences. The federal charges included hate crime enhancers that exposed each of the men's history of racism.

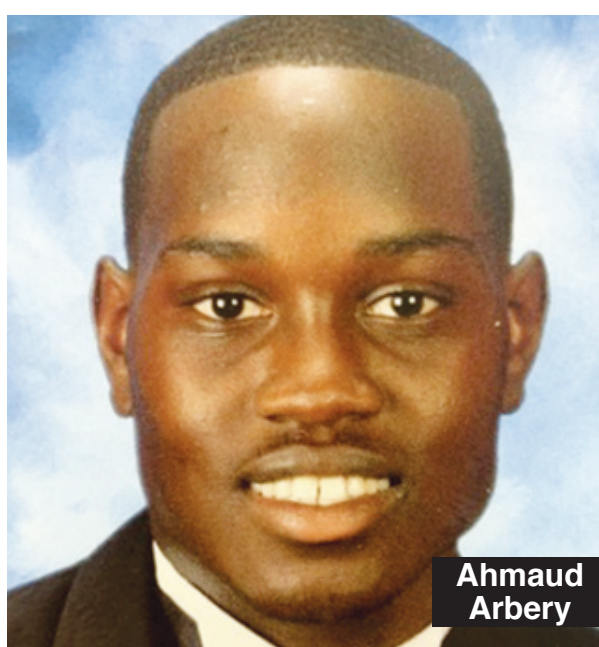
Throughout the one-week trial, defense attorneys tried to sell the jury that, while the men weren't "likable," their actions weren't driven by racial hatred.

However, Prosecutor Christopher Perras ferociously attacked that stance.

The murder "was driven by their pent-up racial anger and [Travis McMichael] was just looking for a reason," Perras insisted. He also noted that if the men thought Arbery had committed a crime, they never alerted the police.

Trial testimony from FBI intelligence analyst Amy Vaughan revealed a host of racist remarks from Travis McMichael.

Vaughn testified that Travis McMichael and his friends routinely used racist slurs directed at Af-

rican Americans.

One text from Travis McMichael to a friend describes how he enjoyed his new job because he didn't have to work with Black people.

"They ruin everything," McMichael wrote. "That's why I love what I do now. Not a [n-word] in sight."

In a Facebook video that purportedly shows a group of Black teenagers beating a white youth, Travis McMichael commented, "I say shoot them all," and he referred the group as "monkeys."

Travis McMichael also referred to a woman who dated a Black man as an "[N-word] lover."

Kim Ballesteros, who lived next door to the McMichaels, told the court about a conversation in which Gregory McMichael used racist language to describe a tenant he had.

"She was a large Black woman who did not pay her rent very well," Ballesteros told the court.

No? How about chicken and dressing and mac and cheese that would make you carry extra home, with turnip greens, cooked with smoked turkey necks, and fried sweet corn and potato salad?

Bar-B-Que rib tips, savory sweet; and three days a week, there were chitterlings....yes chitterlings. Now that's true down home cooking! But once your palate has enjoyed them, where else could you find them?

Yes, it didn't make any difference what job you were going back to ...a meal at Perkins' was a return to homecooking like Grandma used to make.

Hot biscuits and gravy or assorted jams with butter, smooth, mouth-watering grits and country style thick bacon, or a salmon patty smothered in hot sauce with a hot biscuit. Yummy!

Hilda and Willie Perkins, Sr. competed to see whose biscuits went the fastest and everybody won because they were hot, flaky, tasty treats with whatever you decided to add to the center...honey or jam, butter or apple butter, Perkins' home cooking was HOME, in caps.

It was not unusual to see Black History makers like Robert and Frances Starms, Wesley and Sarah Scott; or Lincoln and Marie Gaines and Mildred and Reuben Harpole.

They lived in the immediate area so they frequented Perkins' on a regular basis and ate in-house or take out, often at the end of their work days.

These were the days when Milwaukee was busy and rapidly building and everybody who was somebody met at Perkins, at some point to have some Soul Food, comfort food, food like mamma and grandma made.

On a daily basis, you were subject to see Ralph Holmon of the Milwaukee Urban League, or Dr. and Mrs. William Finlayson, dropping by to dine on their way home. Attorney John Daniels and Judge Leslie Clevert would drop in for a little 'comfort something-something,' too.

Other giants of Black History acclaim included Dr. James Cameron of the Black Holocaust Museum and Mrs. Ernestine O'Bee of Northwest Funeral Home, whose favorite was smoked neckbones and fried catfish. Jeanetta Robinson and Tore Johnson, or Mac Weddle and Mikel Holt., could be seen sitting on stools at the counter, shooting the breeze.

Luther Golden, Robert Mays, Beechie Brooks and Claude Baldwin were there, real estate was booming and housing and home ownership was solidly on their minds. Julius Joseph and Adrienne Davis were doing the protection through insurance or creating new loan opportunities.

Attorney (later judge), Clarence Parrish with Mrs. Ardie Halyard of Columbia Savings and Loan were helping finance the churches. They all met on those ten swivel stools in the old Perkins' Restaurant located at 1943 W. Atkinson Avenue, next to Kentucky Fried Chicken.

Some feared leasing so close to Kentucky Fried Chicken would kill the business. It did just the opposite! There's no competition to soul food cooking when it's done right. And soon the family had to move for more seating capacity, and they bought the old Mahalia Jackson Chicken store located at 2002 W. Atkinson Avenue. They've been there since.

With crisp cafe curtains and twelve double-banked booths, plus the swivel stationary stools at the counter, always lined with the three Black newspapers plus the dailies, diners caught up on the news while waiting for their meals.

Editorial giants like Walter Jones, Cal Patterson, Jimmy Ewing and Dr. Bill Rogers made certain Milwaukee Community Journals were there in abundance. We could be certain every paper would be taken home, as they spread the news and caught up with the new news. Perkins was a place to touch base, every week.

Perkins Family Restaurant was good home cooking, watchful looking; and be seen and grow. You

never knew who was coming in, be it local celebs or national notables, a sports giant....or the perfect diaspora of good "everyday" people. It was Milwaukee's Black community at its's finest.

We all have retained that love for good Soul Food. There's nothing that unites us more than sitting and conversing and dreaming and reflecting with a full plate of Soul Food and people you know, love and respect.

Oh, a many an election was won or lost at those counters and every candidate who wanted to be placed on the election ballot had to have many trips to Perkins Family Restaurant if they wanted to get a vote. Vel Phillips and Gwen Moore, Lena Taylor, Annette Polly Williams, and Elizebeth Coggs, Spencer Coggs and Gary George; you name a candidate and they will tell you they ate at Mr. Perkins' too!

These were Black History giants, many of them now deceased. But younger patrons have lined those same stools, first dates and graduation celebrations, Mother's Day and after church brunch with fluffy light pancakes or waffles were family occasions; so young children grew up in Mr. Perkins too. Who could ever forget the visits of Cecilia and her Mom and Dad, Bill and...Gore and Thelma Sias and Daphne Taylor and her family.

Cherry will tell us her regulars today, they are new history makers too because in Milwaukee you still have to take a seat at Mr. Perkins if you want to know who's up and coming and who has left the city or who's testing the waters to run for public office.

Yes, Mr. Perkins has remained THE Soul Food destination. Only the Coronavirus would create a conundrum...one that had to be addressed.

COVID-19 forced the Perkins family to pivot, stopping on-site (which still has yet to return), but take out and catering are flourishing. And old customers still order their meals for breakfast, lunch and dinner, so the tradition goes on.

Hilda and Willie are now fully retired and they only go to the shop on certain days to help if there's a big order to complete or when they're needed because of short staff. They have not lost the touch nor the taste.

And while Cherry, the widow of Willie Jr. now runs the shop daily, she knows they will come to ensure that the Perkins' Restaurant name remains untarnished and the food is forever GOOD! YUM YUM!

From 1962 to 2022. That's a lot of years, a lot of history and a lot of early rising and cooking before daybreak so they could greet their customers when they walked through the door.

Milwaukee has never stopped coming to Mr. Perkins for that morning brew and the comfort of home style cooking; the Perkins Family has never stopped desiring to make every customer remember HOME!.

Soul Food IS ALWAYS SPECIAL BECAUSE IT TOUCHES THE INNER SELF....that special place that brings us comfort ...peace...joy... We think it is cooked with spirit and heart and that transfers to the diner and touches their spirit and heart. That's how the name was created. 'Soul Food' is food for the soul. Mr. Perkins Family Restaurant is Black History....56 years of history.

It has employed hundreds of workers, fed hundreds of thousands of diners and lives on as an institution that comforts and exudes joy.

Thank you Perkins Family for your love and your legacy. Enjoy your retirement. continue to dance and share your highlights of people you've served. Continue to build this business as it expands beyond three generations to four and more.

HILDA AND WILLIE, CHERRY AND HER CREW, THANK YOU! You are Black History. You are Milwaukee SOUL, creating new opportunities to employ ...to serve...to create unity and respect through the joy of home cooking.

“Their name for her was the walrus.”

When Gregory McMichael told her that the woman didn’t pay her rent on time, he disabled her air conditioning unit.

“You should have seen how fast her big fat Black a— came with the rent check,” Gregory McMichael said, according to Ballesteros.

The FBI’s Vaughan also testified that Bryan often used the n-word and words like “bootlip” to describe Black people.

She said he routinely slurred African Americans on Martin

Luther King Jr. Day.

“Happy Bootlip Day,” Bryan told a friend in one message.

“I worked like a [n-word] today,” he stated.

Perras dismissed any notion that the defense attorney’s claims on behalf of his clients somehow justified their deadly actions.

“There’s a big difference between being vigilant and being a vigilante,” he told the jury.

“It’s important for you to understand the full depth of the defendants’ racial hatred.”

Attorney Benjamin Crump released the following statement

following the verdict:

“Tomorrow marks two years since Ahmaud Arbery was stalked, trapped, and murdered in cold blood as he jogged through his Brunswick neighborhood. And today, after much sorrow, grief, and pain, Ahmaud’s family can finally put this chapter behind them. For the last 24 months, they’ve dedicated themselves to getting justice for their son.

“They’ve had to relive his brutal murder, watch and listen as he was demonized in court, and fight to share with the world who Ahmaud Arbery was and who he could have been had his young life not been so violently cut short.

“For many of us, there was never any doubt that Greg McMichael, Travis McMichael, and William Bryan targeted Ahmaud because of his skin color. But because of indisputable video evidence, disgusting messages sent by the

defendants, and witness testimony, their hate was revealed to the world and the jury. We hope and demand that the severity of their crimes are reflected in the sentencing, as well.

“Ahmaud Arbery was denied the opportunity to define his own legacy, but America, we have the power to ensure that it is one that propels our fight for equal justice and dispels hate from this world. That is how we continue to honor Ahmaud and make sure his death was not in vain.”

Before the trial, the McMichaels cut a deal with prosecutors.

They agreed to plead guilty to hate crime charges and serve their sentence in federal prison.

However, Arbery’s parents, Wanda Cooper-Jones and Marcus Arbery argued against the arrangement.

That prompted the judge to toss out the plea deal.

“Ahmaud didn’t get the option of a plea,” Cooper-Jones demanded.

The judge gave the McMichaels and Bryan two weeks to file an appeal.

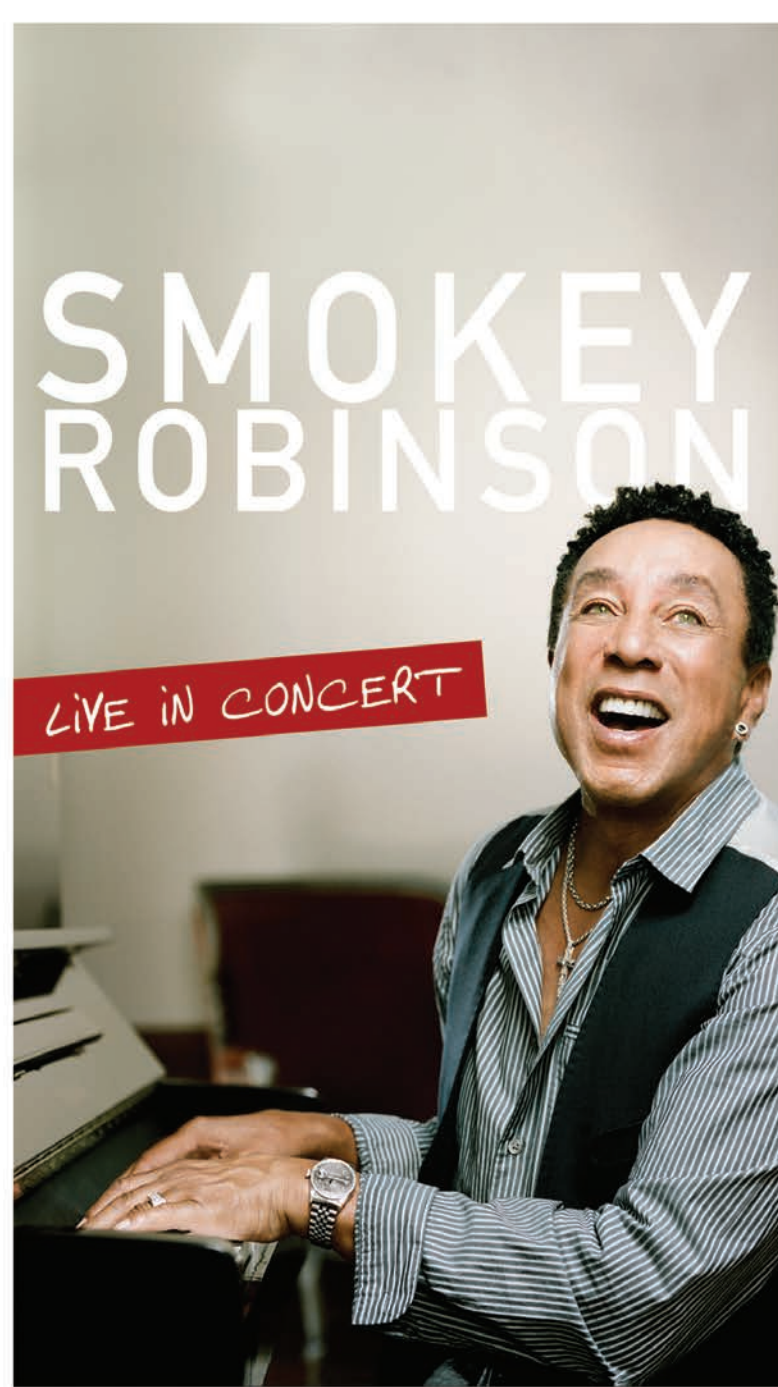

MKE Black to celebrate two year anniversary celebration

Two years ago MKE Black released an app that provided a listing of Black owned businesses throughout the Milwaukee area.

The organization, founded by Rick Bank and Paul Wellington,

had spent the previous several months compiling the extensive list. By February 2020, the app provided a listing of over 300 businesses, including restaurants, museums, beauty shops, legal services, and much more.

While the initial months were slow, the app and MKE Black gained momentum after the murder of George Floyd in May 2021.

Throughout the month of June, thousands of people downloaded the app and visited MKE Black's

website, looking for ways to support local Black businesses.

Since that time, the non-profit has grown into more than a directory, but an organization that celebrates, promotes, empowers, and advances Black businesses.

Today, the MKE Black directory contains over 700 local Black businesses.

The organization, led solely by a group of volunteers, has supported Black businesses through donations, fundraisers, events, panels discussions, and partnerships. During the upcoming two year anniversary celebration, MKE Black will highlight some of its past success stories, as well as local Black History.

DEMS DENOUNCE 'INHUMANE TREATMENT' OF BLACK MIGRANTS AS SENATORS REMAIN DIVIDED ON SOLUTIONS

As Democratic lawmakers speak out against "inhumane treatment" of Black migrants at the southern border, senators from both sides remain divided on why Black people are underrepresented in immigration policy discussions, and how current policies are contributing to high rates of deportation and expulsion of Black immigrants.

"We haven't had the narrative we need for immigration," Sen. Ben Cardin (D-Md.) told theGrio. "The communities that are directly impacted should be able to have their voices heard in developing the right immigration policy in this country. And quite frankly, we haven't had that debate."

Black people make up a little over 5% of unauthorized immigrants in the U.S. but over 10% of immigrants in the removal process, according to a joint letter addressed to President Joe Biden by several Democratic lawmakers such as Senator Cory Booker (D-N.J.) and U.S. Rep. Cori Bush (D-Mo.) on Wednesday condemning the harms against Black migrants.

"I think that a lot of folks if you mention immigration, they're going to have a picture of a person and it might not be a Haitian or of somebody from Africa, they're going to think immediately somebody from Latin America," said Sen. Tim Kaine (D-Va.) to theGrio. "Now there's a lot of African Americans in Latin America, but I think it's important if we talk about immigration for us to think broadly."

"So, I think that that's helpful to educate all of us so that we are thinking about it across the spectrum."

On this Black Immigrant Advocacy Day of Action, several Black immigration groups like Undocu-Black Network and Congressional Democrats led by Sen. Booker and Rep. Bush have been united on

one common idea: Black migrants

are suffering at the border. Title 42, which is part of a U.S. health code that gives the government the power to reign in immigration during a public health emergency, is a big reason why.

"The use of Title 42 deprives legitimate asylum seekers of their legal right to seek asylum and pursue their claims in the U.S., and its extended use has created unsafe conditions for vulnerable migrants, increased the number of dangerous border crossings and has prevented the Biden Administration from fulfilling its early commitment to restore access to asylum," said Sen. Bob Menendez (D-N.J.), a signatory of the letter to Biden, in a statement to theGrio.

Former President Donald Trump used the code in a public health order that allowed the rapid expulsion of migrants due to concerns of spreading COVID-19.

The American Immigration Council argues that this policy blocks asylum applicants from pleading their case when they enter the country.

Title 42 also made headlines after thousands of Haitian asylum applicants who crossed the southern border were expelled from the U.S. for the same reason.

"The Haitians that have been coming to the United States have largely been coming from South America.

Not from Haiti," said Kaine. "We shouldn't be returning them to Haiti. If they left Haiti, if there's any return it shouldn't be back to a place they voluntarily left. We don't do that with other people."

When asked about Black immigrants and the impact of immigration policy narratives on their

treatment, Sen. Chuck Grassley (R-Iowa) told theGrio, "What does our immigration issue have to do with African Americans?"

Many GOP leaders, including Grassley, agreed that migrants entering illegally are part of a larger problem of increasing border crossings under the Biden administration.

"You can't encourage them to break the law and the president's doing that and that's all," said Grassley.

"Well, I think they ought to go back home," said Sen. Richard Shelby (R-Ala.) when asked about Title 42 and Haitian immigrants crossing the southern border.

"They shouldn't be here, they shouldn't be coming illegally. But you don't want anyone to suffer. At the same time, I don't think we should have open arms to receive them either because they're breaking the law to get here."

Sen. Josh Hawley (R-Mo.) echoed these sentiments, focusing on the importance of legal immigration and supporting the continuance of the Title 42 policy.

But with more than 100 lawmakers calling on Biden to reverse harmful practices and help Black migrants receive equal treatment, and advocates mobilizing social media for their cause, the inclusion of Black immigrants, from Haitians to Cameroonians, in policy discussions might be coming to the forefront.

"Immigrants are even more diverse than the rest of the nation and are a key reason our country is as great as it is," said Sen. Alex Padilla (D-Calif.), who signed the letter to Biden.

Men of the Suffrage Movement

Since Carter G. Woodson and the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, conceived and announced Negro History Week in 1925, celebrated during a week in February; the celebration was expanded to a month in 1976.

In a speech on the Observance of Black History Month on February 10, 1976, President Gerald R. Ford urged Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

That year, 50 years after the first celebration, the first African American History Month was

held.

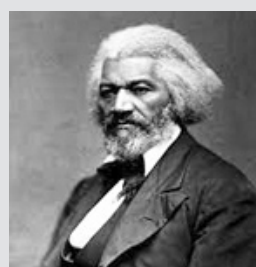
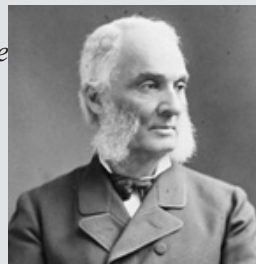
This month as we celebrate Black History Month, let's look at two of the men, of many, of the suffrage movement.

Robert Purvis (1810-1898)

Mr. Purvis was the patriarch of one of the wealthiest and most prominent Black families in Philadelphia and he used his wealth to support many progressive causes in addition to abolition. With Lucretia Mott, he supported women's rights and suffrage. When Mott was president, he was a member of the American Equal Rights Association. Purvis also attended the founding meeting of the Pennsylvania Women Suffrage Association.

Frederick Douglass (1818-1895)

According to a National Park Service article regarding Women's Rights, Frederick Douglass believing that "[r]ight is of no sex, truth is of no color," urged an immediate end to slavery and supported the women's rights activities in their crusade for woman's suffrage. Then, at the New England Woman Suffrage Association 20th Annual Convention May 1888 in Boston, Massachusetts, Douglass gave a most powerful speech. Douglass stated the women's suffrage movement "has a valid claim upon my service and labor; outside its merits for it is composed in part of the noble who dared to speak for the freedom of the slave." Douglass continued: In some respects, this woman



suffrage movement is but a continuance of the old anti-slavery movement. We have the same sources of opposition to contend with, and we must meet them with the same spirit and determination.

Douglass concluded his speech with an earnest plea the ballot be given to women.

Beloved, many of the supporters of the Women Suffrage Movement were their husbands, fathers, brothers and uncles and other men supporting the advancing of the cause of women. In more than 50 electoral campaigns and in every one, a large number of men voted in favor of equal suffrage.

A majority of the male voters in New York, California and eleven other states actually approved it. In 1920, after the overwhelmingly male Congress and 3 state legislatures approved it, the 19th Amendment was ratified and was acknowledged a mutual victory.
