Education Pioneer Gertrude Payton Leaves Legacy

When Gertrude Payton was hired to teach home economics at Roosevelt Jr. High School in 1953, she joined the ranks of pioneering African American Milwaukee Public School (MPS) educators.

In the early 1950s, African American teachers were primarily hired to teach at elementary schools. Some were hired to teach electives (classes that did not count toward the credits needed to graduate from high school), but it was not common to have African American teachers in grades 7–12.

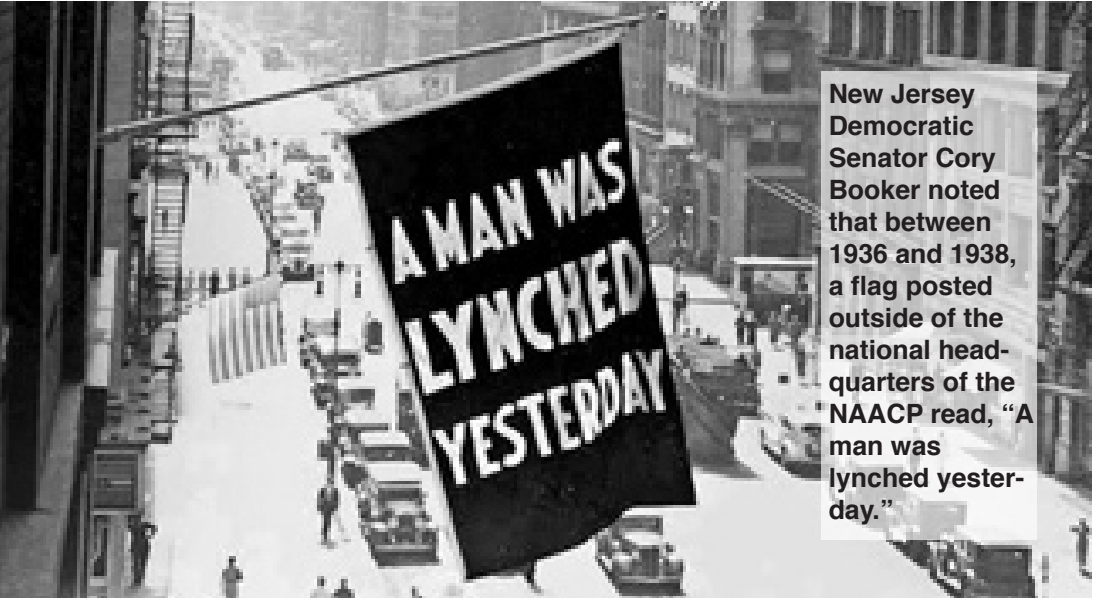
A native of Crystal Springs, Mississippi, Mrs. Payton received her undergraduate degree from Alcorn Agricultural and Mechanical College (now Alcorn State University) in Lorman, Mississippi, and worked as a teacher before moving to Milwaukee in 1951 with her husband Mack and their daughter, Shelia, during “The Great Migration” when African Americans left Southern states to seek better opportunities in the North.

Despite their degrees and teaching experience in the South, both Mrs. Payton and her husband were initially unable to get jobs in their fields of study. Her first two jobs in Milwaukee were sewing bags used to store potatoes and working in a tannery.

In 1963, Mrs. Payton became a home economics teacher at North Division High School and was later named home economics department chair.

ANTI-LYNCHING BILL PASSES HOUSE, EXPECTED TO CLEAR SENATE

The U.S. House of Representatives has passed legislation to make lynching a federal hate crime.

Named in honor of Emmett Till, the young Black boy whose suffered an horrific murder at the hands of white men in Mississippi in 1955, the bill outlaws lynching.

According to the bill’s text, “Whoever conspires to commit any offense ... shall

(A) if death results from the offense, be imprisoned for any term of years or for life.”

“(B) In any other case, be subjected to the same penalties as the penalties prescribed for the offense of the commission of which was the object of the conspiracy.”

Specifically, the legislation makes lynching a federal hate crime, punishable by up to life in prison.

The measure faced defeat for more than 100 years, with lawmakers attempting to pass the legislation more than 200 times.

The House finally passed the bill on a 422-3 vote. Three Republicans opposed the bill: Reps. Andrew Clyde (R-Ga.), Thomas Massie (R-Ky.), and Chip Roy (R-Texas).

Many believe it will also have success in the U.S. Senate.

Maine GOP Senator Susan Collins praised Supreme Court nominee **Ketanji Brown Jackson** after meeting with her for over an hour recently, raising Democratic’s hopes she would be a Republican vote for confirmation. Collins said Jackson explained in depth the process she uses when making decisions. “She takes a very thorough, careful approach in applying the law to the facts of the case, and that is what I want to see in a judge,” said Collins, who said she’ll make a final decision after Jackson’s confirmation hearings.



Acquitted Kenosha shooter **Kyle Rittenhouse** recently announced he plans to sue the celebrities, politicians, and athletes who called him a murderer and white supremacist. Rittenhouse was found not guilty for fatally shooting two protestors in Kenosha during the Jacob Blake protests. Blake was shot by a White Kenosha cop, paralyzing him. “...Everybody who’s lied, called me a White supremacist...they’re gonna be held accountable...we’re going to handle them in a courtroom,” Rittenhouse said on Fox News recently. He named actress Whoopi Goldberg, and NBA superstar LeBron James as among the celebrities and athletes he’ll sue.



The U.S. Department of **Housing and Urban Development (HUD)** recently accused a Texas agency that administered flood relief money from Hurricane Harvey of discriminating against Houston’s Black and Hispanic population, breaking federal law. HUD revealed the Texas General Land Office’s distribution process for more than \$2 billion in flood mitigation funds “caused there to be disproportionately less funding available to benefit minority residents than was available to benefit White residents.” The 2017 hurricane caused an estimated \$125 billion in damage.

She was selected to become the Title 1 Coordinator at the school and was responsible for ensuring federal dollars were properly spent to help students overcome family, social, or economic barriers so they could achieve academic success.

While teaching, Mrs. Payton enrolled in UW-Milwaukee's Educational Psychology Master's Degree program.

She graduated in 1973, became a guidance counselor, and helped students with their educational, career, and social needs so they could achieve their post-high school goals.

She became a guidance counselor at West Division High School in 1976 and was later promoted to director of the guidance department.

In that role she helped set the goals and tone for how the department functioned and helped counselors provide the best possible assistance to students.

When MPS decided to change West Division from a traditional high school to the Milwaukee High School of the Arts, Mrs. Payton continued to manage the guidance department while serving on the team that oversaw the transition.

Mrs. Payton retired from full-time work at the High School of the Arts in 1989 but continued to work part-time for MPS another 10 years.

Mrs. Payton's impact on education extended beyond the classroom through her work as an adjunct counselor at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and by representing the Milwaukee Public School system on boards, committees, and curriculum projects such as evaluation of the Minneapolis/St. Paul, Minnesota, Home Economics Department for the North Central Evaluation Committee.

After retiring, Mrs. Payton cofounded two endowed scholarships with her husband and family to help students attend historically black colleges and universities.

They are the Mack & Gertrude Payton Endowed Scholarship at Alcorn State University and the Payton-Price Family Fund at the Greater Milwaukee Foundation.

As it grows, the Payton-Price Family Fund will also provide grants that benefit Milwaukee's African American community in areas such as economic self-sufficiency, health, innovative programs and techniques that improve educational outcomes for students of Black African ancestry, and efforts

that showcase and preserve Black African arts and culture (among other things).

In addition to her work in education, Mrs. Payton was active in her church—St. Mark A.M.E. Church—and in organizations that worked to make a positive difference in the lives of others.

She was a member of the Christian Social Action Form Committee that hosted information sessions and discussions regarding issues impacting people's lives in the community.

She was a charter member of the church's credit union and First Vice President and later Parliamentarian of the Geraldine Bradford Missionary Society that provided services and assistance to people in need.

She also worked with young people as Vacation Bible School Director and was Chairperson of St Mark's bicentennial celebration souvenir booklet that accompanied a diorama created and housed in the Milwaukee Public Museum.

Mrs. Payton was also an organizer and charter member of Kappa Beta Zeta Milwaukee Chapter of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority; a charter member of Sarah's Joy Chapter #8 O.E.S., Milwaukee, Wisconsin; and a member of Church Women United that presented her with their Valiant Woman Award in 2011.

Other honors include recognition as a Living Legacy in the African American Women's organization booklet, Someone You Should Know Award in 2009, presented by the A.M.E. Church's Fourth Episcopal District, and the Shero Award presented by the Missionary Society in 2008.

Mrs. Payton was inducted into the Alcorn State University Hall of Honor and Hall of Fame, and the ASU Athletic Hall of Fame as a two-sport athlete who helped lead

She added author to her resume when she wrote A Caregiver's Journey: Dealing with the aspects of Dementia. The book shares her experiences taking care of her husband for 26 years, and provides information about resources available to caregivers.

Mrs. Payton died peacefully in her sleep on her 95th birthday on February 16, 2022. She is survived by her daughter Shelia (Milwaukee, Wisconsin), her son Renato (Fontana, California), her grandchildren Joi (Minneapolis, Minnesota), Justin and Renee (Fontana, California), and a host of relatives and friends.

Services for Mrs. Payton will be held at St. Mark A.M.E. Church, 1616 W. Atkinson Ave. Visitation

is from 10a-11a, followed by services from 11a-Noon. Live streaming of the services is available on the Northwest Funeral Home website in her obituary.

Fight COVID MKE recruiting for antibody study

Medical College of Wisconsin study provides individual risk estimator

The Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW) is recruiting adults in Milwaukee for its COVID-19 population health project called Fight COVID Milwaukee.

Fight COVID Milwaukee aims to better understand how demographics, including prior COVID infection and vaccine status, affect a person's risk for hospitalization or death from COVID-19.

Adults residing in Milwaukee County who are 1) enrolled in Wisconsin Medicaid (BadgerCare), or 2) patients at a partner health center, or 3) members of a partner church or community agency are eligible to participate in the study. Eligibility criteria can be found at fightcovidmilwaukee.org. Nearly 3,000 participants have already enrolled.

To join, the study requires informed consent, a survey about experiences with COVID-19, and an account of health history. Participants also receive a COVID antibody test at no charge and compensation for their time.

Fight COVID Milwaukee has created a state-of-the-art individual risk estimator that estimates life expectancy loss from COVID compared with cancer and car crashes using confidential demographic in-

formation, including chronic conditions, that influence life expectancy.

The estimator also compares outcomes of those who are unvaccinated with those who have already been infected by or vaccinated against COVID-19.

More than 20,000 people have used the confidential risk estimator. The tool can be found here: fightcovidmilwaukee.org/individual-risk-estimator.

supply will save more lives."

Every day, more than 10,000 patients---from
those undergoing long-term transfusion treat-
ments to accident victims---
rely on the generosity of blood
donors to survive.

The percentage of ethnically
diverse patients who need rare
blood continues to increase.
Yet, ethnically diverse blood
donors continue to be a very
small part of the overall blood
donor population nationwide.

Of the entire U.S. pop-
ulation, only five percent do-
nate blood.

An even smaller fraction has
a blood type called Ro, which
is particularly beneficial for
patients with sickle cell dis-
ease.

Sickle Cell Disease Facts:
• Sickle cell disease affects
approximately 100,000 Amer-
icans.

• Sickle cell disease occurs in
1 in every 365 African Ameri-
can births.

sage that our nation is finally reckoning with one of the darkest

The congressman recalled that he was 8 years old when he
saw photos of Emmett Till's brutalized corpse in Jet Magazine.

"That shaped my consciousness as a Black man in America,
changed the course of my life, and changed our nation," Con-
gressman Rush asserted.

New Jersey Democratic Senator Cory Booker noted that be-
tween 1936 and 1938, a flag posted outside of the national head-
quarters of the NAACP read, "A man was lynched yesterday."

"That was a solemn reminder of the reality Black Americans
experienced daily during some of the darkest chapters of Amer-
ica's history," Sen. Booker remarked.

"Used by white supremacists to oppress and subjugate Black
communities, lynching is a form of racialized violence that has
permeated much of our nation's past and must now be reckoned
with," the Senator continued.

"Although this bill will not undo the terror and fear of the
past, it's a necessary step that our nation must take to move for-
ward."

interested in their children sitting next to a White child as they were with having them gain access to better quality schools---something White students received as a result of privilege and oppression but was denied our children.

Since the shortest month of the year has passed, I'm not allowed by the liberal and progressives to talk about Black History anymore (sneeze), but I would be remiss not to mention the example laid out when John Marshall was built 50 years ago.

By that time, I was attending North Division, which overcame the odds and produced a former school superintendent, first Black congresswoman, and a four-star general, among others.

But they did so despite the facility, which was literally falling down around them. A common joke back in the day was that you could tell a North grad. After all, they were thinner than other students because they were crammed like sardines in a school built for half its number, and if asked, would say there were only 48 states because their history books were so old.

Across town, the district was constructing a new state-of-the-art school, Marshall, which we were told would be restricted to White students. Yeah, you read that correctly.

In fact, if you read my book, 'Not Yet Free at Last,' you'd know segregation was the rule of the day in part because the president of the MPS board declared our children should not be allowed to attend White schools because they were uncivilized and would probably urinate in the water fountains.

Her remarks, and the refusal of MPS to educate Black children even after desegregation, prompted State Rep. Polly Williams to introduce a bill to carve out a separate Black district, with a new North as the centerpiece.

Oops, sorry again, I forgot the mandate that we can't talk about any history linked to the Critical Race Theory (yeah, racism vs. race), as it would disparage White Chillins.

Something else came out of that era that could solve the 'false' roadblock of a MPS break up, resulting in 'resegregation' of the district.

Former state Senator Dennis Conta introduced a district-wide 'cluster' program to replace the failing MPS monopoly district.

Under his proposal, MPS would be broken up into smaller districts, including a suburban schools.

Unfortunately (depending on your point of view), the Conta Plan died a horrible death when suburban liberals were forced to pull off their sheets to express their racist opposition to mixing the so-called races.

Since I didn't see Yeshua's footprints in the snow, I assume He hasn't returned and forced the 'Kloset Klan' to address their sins. In laymen's terms, which means I doubt if they will be more accommodating today than yesteryear.

But I wouldn't mind seeing a revised Conta proposal on the table if for no other reason than to expose their hypocrisy and eliminate the excuse of resegregation.

Other proposals are floating around which deserve consideration by the community.

At least one African American alderman, state representative, and a former MPS superintendent support an initiative to create a community-controlled paradigm for North Division (currently considered the worse high school in the state) that, if successful, could serve as a launching point for similar reforms.

Director Aisha Carr, the only board member, sounding an alarm about the failure of thousands of Black students, is proposing an altered school week providing wrap-around services.

Unfortunately, as the only board member who puts children before the union, I fear she will suffer the same fate as former Director Wendell Harris. He was viciously attacked by fellow board members and the union for putting the interests of Black children before adults with a vested interest in maintaining the failing status quo.

Who knows, maybe we can even use those proposals as a starting point to discuss why we need reform in the first place.

Or, we can continue down this current road ensuring employment for the poverty pimps prison guards.
