



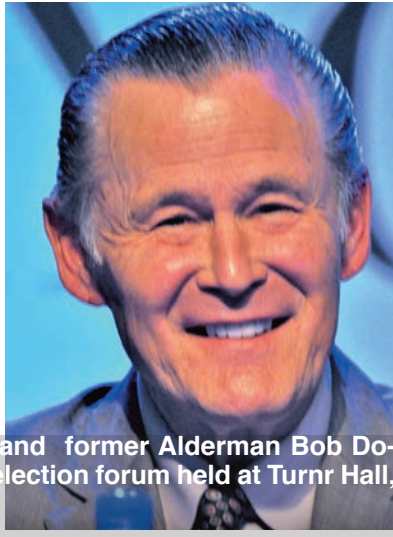

Mayoral candidates Johnson, Donovan square off on host of city issues

If Milwaukee mayoral candidates—Acting Mayor Cavalier Johnson and former Alderman Bob Donovan—agreed on anything during their debate Monday, it was improving the city’s relationship with state government to reverse declining shared revenue.

Every other issue, from funding the city’s police department, to COVID-19 response, to the future of public education, was up for grabs.

The winner of the April 5 special election will serve out the remaining two years of former Mayor Tom Barrett’s term.

Johnson is vying to become Milwaukee’s first Black Mayor. He is the second ‘acting mayor.’ Marvin Pratt was the first, but lost in the general election to Barrett.

The debate was sponsored by the nonpartisan Wisconsin Policy

SDC Launches Wisconsin Help for Homeowners Assistance Program in Milwaukee County

The Social Development Commission (SDC) is partnering with the state of Wisconsin to launch the Wisconsin Help for Homeowners program in Milwaukee County.

The federally funded program will provide grants to income eligible, owner-occupied households who have experienced a COVID-19 related financial hardship.

“Homeownership is an important tool to building wealth,” remarked SDC CEO Dr. George Hinton. “After the devastating effects of the pandemic, SDC is committed to helping low-income residents recover, rebuild and remain safe and healthy in their homes.”

Recently, Wisconsin Governor Tony Evers announced the launch of the Wisconsin Help for Homeowners program, which is set to provide more than \$92 million in financial assistance to Wisconsin homeowners who have experienced financial hardship as a result of the coronavirus pandemic.

U.S. SENATE PASSES ANTI-LYNCHING BILL

The ‘Emmett Till Anti-lynching Act of 2022’ passes by unanimous consent, now heads to the president's desk

The United States Senate passed the Emmett Till Antilynching Act of 2022 recently by unanimous consent, and it will now head to President Joe Biden’s desk for his signature.

The bill, which makes lynching a federal hate crime, passed the House of Representatives last week 422-3, with all but three Republican Congress

members — Thomas Massie of Kentucky, Chip Roy of Texas and Andrew S. Clyde of Georgia — voting for it.

As previously reported, the

Emmett Till Antilynching Act was introduced by Illinois Rep. Bobby Rush in 2019.

Senators Cory Booker and Tim Scott were co-sponsors of the Senate legislation, along with Sen. Rand Paul. Paul had previously opposed a prior version of the bill.

In a statement after the passage, he wrote, “I’m pleased to have worked with Senators Cory Booker and Tim Scott to strengthen the language of this bill, which will ensure that fed-

eral law will define lynching as the absolutely heinous crime that it is. I’m glad to cosponsor this bipartisan effort and I applaud the Senate for quickly passing this important legislation.”

The bill “establishes a new criminal civil rights violation for lynching. Specifically, a person who conspires to commit certain civil rights offenses (e.g., a hate crime act) is subject to criminal penalties.”

According to CNN, Democratic Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer made remarks from the Senate floor after the bill passed, saying, “After more than 200 failed attempts to outlaw lynching, Congress is finally succeeding in taking the long-overdue action by passing the Emmett Till Antilynching Act. Hallelujah. It’s long overdue.”

“The first anti-lynching legislation was introduced a century ago,” he continued, “and after so long, the Senate has now finally addressed one of the most shameful elements of this nation’s past by making lynching a federal crime.”

Forum and aired by public radio station WPR.

Johnson and Donovan agreed the city needs to resuscitate its connections with the Wisconsin state legislature which, under the leadership of former Republican Gov. Scott Walker and a GOP-controlled state house, all but gutted shared revenue with the city that created yearly budget shortfalls.

Noting that the federal stimulus money would help cover budget shortfalls, the acting mayor said Milwaukee needs to—in the long term—create ways to sustainably raise money for its budget.

“I’m going to continue working with folks in Madison because I’m a political realist and understand that Republicans are in charge of the Legislature,” Johnson said. “We have to work with them to move things forward.”

Johnson added he wanted to work with the state to transfer new city and county employees to the Wisconsin Retirement

System and slowly phase out the city’s pension system.

Doing so, he said, puts Milwaukee in a position to better control its financial future. “Everything, I think, has to be on the table to make sure the city is able to survive, and that we’re able to provide services to the people who both expect them and (quite frankly) deserve them.”

Saying everything needs to be on the table as it relates to explore ways to increasing the city’s coffers, Donovan said if elected, he would call for an audit of city departments to ensure they’re operating effectively and efficiently.

There was one other thing Johnson and Donovan agreed on: public safety. Both called it ‘job number one for local government.’

Well...not quite.

While Donovan called for increased police manpower and tougher policies to counter what he described as soft on crime atmosphere that has allowed the criminal element to thrive,

Johnson put his public safety money on the city’s Office of Violence Prevention.

The acting mayor also called for a rebuilding of the relationship between the police and neighborhoods, adding the Office of Violence Prevention is the best partner to do that.

In assessing the performance of local government’s performance during the COVID-19 pandemic, the candidates definitely differed in their responses.

Johnson noted the pandemic’s disproportionate impacts on the city’s Black and Latino communities. He also said the city has to be “more nimble” and utilize new approaches in getting information and vaccinations out to communities that need them.

“Overall, I think the health department has done work that they never probably would have thought that they would have done reaching out to the community and being on the ground being essentially sort of like a COVID first-responder.

Johnson said that approach needs to continue beyond the pandemic.

Donovan supports mobile health clinics that would work in underserved neighborhoods. He also wants to create a medical advisory board to work with the health department and advise the mayor on the various health concerns facing the community.

He also noted the diminished trust in public health due to “mixed-signals” from so-called experts during the pandemic.

Though the mayor has little, if any, influence in the city’s public schools, Johnson said he can still have an impact in other ways.

“If a kid is going to school and they’re hungry, well, that’s something that a mayor can do something about,” Johnson said. “That’s where my time and my energy will be focused as mayor, is on those things on the outside so that kids are prepared to go in to learn in the classrooms.”

Shalanda Young officially made history recently after being confirmed by the U.S. Senate as the **first Black woman** to serve as director of the White House’s **Office of Management and Budget (OMB)**. She was confirmed by a bipartisan vote of 61-36. As director of the OMB, Young will run the largest office within the Executive Office of the president, which President Biden called “the nerve center of government.” The role of the OMB director is to help create the president’s budget, ensure the president’s policies are implemented and coordinate inter-agency policy initiatives.

Employees in the **St. Louis suburb of Normandy** are adding their names to a growing pile of lawsuits against the city that allege discriminatory treatment, harassment and retaliation against whistleblowers. There have been at least three lawsuits filed by a range of Normandy employees, including police officers, as well as a lawsuit by the mayor against the city council, according to local reporting from the St. Louis Dispatch. The lawsuits stem from various issues of racism and sexism alleged by not only Black city workers, but White employees also.



Habitat for Humanity begins construction on new houses in Harambee

Habitat for Humanity recently launched their 2022 building year at two sites in the Harambee neighborhood in the 6th Aldermanic District. The construction is a continuation of the organization’s goal to build 80 new homes over four years in the area.

This partnership is seen as a shining example of community collaboration. In 2021 there was an effort that sold 41 city-owned vacant lots to Habitat for \$1 per lot. This when combined with Habitat’s work and a generous gift of \$1 million from Bader Philanthropies allows for the creation of safe, affordable housing that will provide families the tools to build wealth and equity.

Sixth District Alderperson Milele Coggs says Habitat has been a tremendous partner in recent years as they work with the city and surrounding community to build affordable homes that will be occupied by first-time homeowners.

“I want to thank Habitat for Humanity, as well as Bader Philanthropies, project volunteers and other area stakeholders for their continued work that has proven invaluable for Harambee residents as we strive to build a stronger Milwaukee.”

SDC Launches Wisconsin Help for Homeowners Assistance Program

The Wisconsin Help for Homeowners is a statewide program that provides housing grants up to \$40,000 to owner-occupied households who have experienced a COVID-19-related financial hardship since January 21, 2020, based on income level and other eligibility requirements.

Financial hardship is defined as: A material reduction in income or material increase in liv-

ing expenses associated with the coronavirus pandemic that has created or increased a risk of mortgage delinquency, mortgage default, foreclosure, loss of utilities or home energy services, or displacement for a homeowner.

Eligible types of expenses under the Wisconsin Help for Homeowners program may include but are not limited to: mortgage and interest payments, real estate taxes, condominium and association fees.

The property must be the owner’s primary residence. Vacation homes, rentals, cabins, and second homes are not eligible for assistance.

The Department of Administration, Division of Energy, Hous-

ing, and Community Resources (DEHCR) is administering the Wisconsin Help for Homeowners program, with funding from the Homeowners Assistance Fund established under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. An online application is available now, and additional eligibility information is available on the Wisconsin Help for Homeowners website.

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
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Milwaukee County Behavioral Health Services to Distribute 1,600 Fentanyl Testing Strips to Help Prevent Opioid-Related Deaths

Bi-partisan resolution from local leaders legalizes distribution of testing strips

Milwaukee County Behavioral Health Services (BHS) will distribute 1,600 fentanyl testing strips in the community as part of its ongoing effort to prevent deaths related to opioid use. These life-saving strips, from the Milwaukee Health Department, detect the presence of fentanyl in powders or injectables and can help prevent accidental overdoses.

According to the Milwaukee County Medical Examiner's Office, 560 people died from drug overdoses in 2021. Of those 560, fentanyl, either alone or in combination with other drugs, resulted in 79 percent of drug overdose deaths.

"Under Wisconsin law, fentanyl testing strips are considered drug paraphernalia and are illegal to possess by both community members and first responders; however, they are a crucial, life-saving resource," said Milwaukee County Supervisor Sylvia Ortiz-Velez.

"Without access to these testing strips, drug users risk overdose from the otherwise undetectable presence of fentanyl, which is why I am so passionate about the legalization of these strips and proud that bi-partisan legislation has accomplished that goal."

In 2021, Supervisor Ortiz-Velez and Senator Lena Taylor co-authored a resolution that would decriminalize fentanyl testing strips. As a result of their work, on Jan. 25, 2022, both the Wisconsin State Senate and Assembly passed a bill that would decriminalize the testing strips. Governor Evers provided the final sign-off today, March 16, 2022.

"The opioid epidemic continues to rage on, and the COVID-19 pandemic continues to have an outsized impact on every aspect of our lives -- including accessing the necessary care and tools to pre-

The Impact of COVID-19 on HBCUs and Black Students

While the world has been focused on the growing numbers of COVID-19 casualties, the media has somewhat ignored the long-term educational and economic impacts of the pandemic — especially for Black students. Although there has been some attention given to the disparities between Black Ameri-

cans and other groups contracting the virus, it is not an exaggeration to say that the Black community will be recovering from the impact of COVID-19, health wise, economically, and educationally for at least the next two decades.

Throughout the pandemic, Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) have been on the front lines addressing the impact the pandemic has had on students, fac-

ulty, staff and surrounding communities.

In March 2020, when college campuses across the country closed and sent students home, many HBCUs continued to house hundreds of students who did not have homes to return to. Groups of students were stuck on campus without the funds to pay for transportation back to their home cities.

This challenge was a byproduct of several students losing the jobs they used to help fund their education, along with loss of family income.

Many students became both food and housing insecure without the critical resources that HBCUs often provide.

The Thurgood Marshall College Fund (TMCf) worked with our member-schools—America's 47 publicly-supported HBCUs—and many of their corporate partners to help secure access to needed support for students.

Beyond academic scholarships, TMCf stepped up to help provide grants for students, assisting them with rent, groceries, and transportation.

At one HBCU, more than half of the students and faculty did not have the adequate computer hardware or broadband internet access to participate in remote classes.

Corporate partners supported the purchasing of laptops and hotspots for both students and faculty to facilitate the pivot to online learning.

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IN MEMORIAM: Autherine Lucy Foster, a Critical Figure in the Civil Rights Movement, Dies at 92

Her desire for a second undergraduate degree was cut short after just three days when a mob of racists assaulted her with food, rocks, and other items when she attempted to enter the University of Alabama.

Autherine Lucy Foster, who earned a bachelor's degree in English from historically Black Miles College in 1952, and whose legal battle with the University of Alabama concluded two years after the landmark Brown v. Board of Education decision, has died at 92.

A critical, but sometimes overlooked figure in the civil rights movement, Foster's case became the first to challenge the Brown ruling that allowed federal judges to implement the historic

decision.

In 1992, Foster recalled her experience in a New York Times interview.

"It felt somewhat like you were not really a human being. But had it not been for some at the university, my life might not have been spared at all," Foster said.

"I did expect to find isolation. I thought I could survive that. But I did not expect it to go as far as it did. There were students behind me saying, 'Let's kill her! Let's kill her!'"

Foster visited Tuscaloosa a week before her death, cutting the ribbon on the newly named College of Education building, where she took refuge from the racist mob.

Previously known as Bibb Graves Hall, the university's building adopted a new name called Autherine Lucy Hall.

"My staff was proud to celebrate the courage and sacrifice of Dr. Autherine Lucy Foster by presenting her with a Congressional Record," Alabama Democratic Rep. Terri Sewell stated.

"The naming of the University of Alabama's Autherine Lucy Hall will stand as a powerful reminder of her sacrifice in the name of justice and equity for all."

Foster "was the embodiment of courage," said Rep. Chris England, D-Tuscaloosa, who chairs the organization.

"As the first Black student to attend the Uni-

versity of Alabama, her trailblazing determination paved the way for a more inclusive and equitable higher education system in Alabama.

Her life was a testament to the power of compassion and grace in the face of unyielding adversity. We are all made better by her example."

Many others tweeted and offered statements of condolences. Foster's family asked for privacy, but they did release a statement about the trailblazer.

"She was known, honored, and respected around the world after she broke the color barrier at the University of Alabama," her daughter Chrystal Foster said in a statement.

"She passed away at home, surrounded by family. We are deeply saddened, yet we realize she left a proud legacy."

It was clear the law needed to change in order to save lives, and I'm thankful for champions in the State Assembly and State Senate who fought to legalize fentanyl testing strips and help prevent future drug overdoses," said Milwaukee County Executive David Crowley. "It's going to take all of us working together to prevent overdoses and make sure that people know there are local resources available to help them. "I look forward to working with our partners to quickly get these strips into the hands of community members and emergency personnel who need them most."

"The testing strips will be a valuable tool to help prevent death from overdose. I applaud the work of Supervisor Ortiz-Velez to make these strips available and easily accessible to the community," said Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services Director Shakita LaGrant-McClain.

"The most important step is keeping people alive so they can get the treatment and help to give them the best quality of life possible."

In addition, Milwaukee County DHHS and BHS have a variety of community-based resources, including Access Clinics, crisis mobile teams, residential facilities and more that provide care and

treatment for individuals experiencing a mental health or substance use disorder (SUD) crisis.

This community-based approach provides patient-centered, culturally appropriate care to those who need it most.

"While the pandemic has made it difficult for the City-County Heroin, Opioid and Cocaine Task Force to meet, progress is being made to curb the rate of overdose deaths," said Milwaukee County Behavioral Health Services Administrator Mike Lappen.

"This legislation proves that all of the effort and lobbying by people who are passionate about reforms and innovation will lead to positive change. The right decisions are being made, and Milwaukee County continues to be at the forefront by providing cutting-edge care to our community members."

A plan to distribute the testing strips is under development and will be rolled out in the coming weeks.

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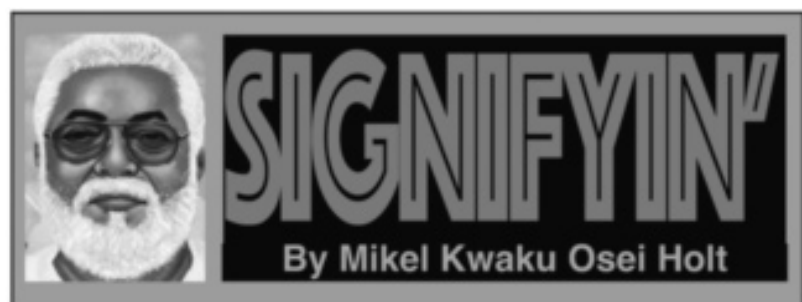

Most importantly, Cory Booker (CB1) is among the handful of Black Democrats who has shown himself unyielding in his 'hue-manity' and resolutely put his people before his party. Unfortunately, that's a rarity among our tribal leadership.

CB1 is not of the ilk of the late State Rep. Polly Williams, who stood firmly on a philosophy of Black Nationalism, but he acknowledges walking in her footsteps as it relates to education.

I first met CB1 at an east coast organizational meeting coordinated by Howard Fuller (America's second Frederick Douglass) that sparked the creation of the Black Alliance for Educational Options in 1999.

Booker's involvement in that unprecedented organization fighting for educational options for Black children put him at odds with the Democratic Party, which pundits acknowledge is under the thumb of the neo-racist teacher unions. It also, however, propelled him to a new sphere of influence and trust among tribal members.

While other 'political leaders' talked the talk, CB1 walked the walk, willing to jeopardize his political career to empower our tribe.

Make no assumptions the DNC could dump on Booker at any time as the party values unions, gays, women, and Big Foot far more than its most loyal supporters—Black Americans.

But like with Polly, they have

tempered their criticism of Booker over the years in part because of his profile and visibility.

(The fact that the O'Jay's 'Back Stabbers' is used for elevator music in the capitol speaks volumes.)

We'll see in the coming months whether Dems are more interested in moving America forward than in maintaining their essential base as CB1 attempts to navigate a proposal through Congress that seeks to pimp slap the GOP and gullible Whites rallying around the latest 'welfare mother' scheme under the ridiculous umbrella of Critical Race Theory.

Last month, Booker stepped to the podium to introduce an educational initiative that would put Black History front and center and conceivably put a monkey wrench in the revisionist history offered by the right and center.

Thus, while Demo hierarchy continues to covertly nip at his heels, they publicly appear in lockstep with the maverick who recently introduced a Black History initiative that will counter the rants of the racist roaches with irrefutable research and thus weaken their grip on America's pulse.

Co-sponsored by Senator Bob Menendez (D-N.J.), the bill would invest \$10 million over five years in the National Museum of African American History and Culture to advance African and African American history programs in schools, social media, and toward scholarly work.

As CB posited, "The story of Black people in America is inextricably linked to the story of America.

Explained Booker in announcing the bill, "The story of Black people in America is inextricably linked to the story of America. This story must be reckoned with so that we can honestly reflect upon our nation's past moral wrongs and the long and ongoing quest for justice that has been undertaken by Black Americans."

"I am proud to introduce this legislation which will invest in initiatives to make African American history education programs more accessible to the public, help educators incorporate these programs into their curriculum, and develop additional resources focused on Black History of students and families to engage with."

Two thoughts immediately came to mind as I was reading the legislation (aside from the fact that the financial allocation is one-tenth of what is needed), which was appropriately introduced during Black History Month:

How will CB1's proposal be viewed by those individuals and institutions trying to erase America's evil past, including its founding with a paradigm that fueled the philosophy of White Supremacy in the land of the freaks and home of the (Atlanta) Braves?

In fact, how will Democrats respond when a thorough examination of their resume reveals it is the party that introduced that paradigm and engineered the secessionist movement that led to the Civil War?

Will they join their Republican cousins in their continued efforts to revise history, to expunge the fact that Democrats like Thomas Jefferson and Andrew Jackson committed horrendous crimes of genocide and slavery that Adolph Hitler would have approved of?

It is not in the 'His-story' books used in government (public) schools, but the Democratic Party's first presidential nominee in 1800 was Jefferson, the author of the founding documents. Will we use the history books of John Hope Franklin or the facts as assembled by our late local historian Taki Raton, who developed curriculums for Harambee and other private academies?

In truth, there is no consensus on what 'Black History' entails, how it will be presented, and by whom.

And I'm not just talking about White misrepresentations. There is no uniformity among our tribal members either.

For example, if the first human was born/created/conceived in Africa, would not we---Africans---be God's (Nyame) chosen, created in His/Her image?

Was Moses a 'Hue-man,' and did he mutate Kemetic theology (what he was taught in the land renamed Egypt) into Judaism?

Were our ancestors the creators of math, science, and medicine? The first to acknowledge monotheism, the belief in a single god, Supreme Being, when Europeans lived in caves and prayed to the Goodwill Blimp, Donald Trump's ancestors, and Casper the Unfriendly Ghost?

Did the Twa people of West Africa visit America 2,000 years ago?

In fact, when did we arrive here as passengers on the slave ships? Most of us assume the first Africans arrived here in 1619. Research, however, shows the

Spanish brought African 'slaves/captives/POWs' to the Carolina coast in 1526.

Native Americans greeted the Europeans with open arms until they figured out their agenda. What happened next can't be found in most 'His-story' books. Suffice it to say, the Natives used an early version of Raid to rid themselves of the racist roaches but allowed their kindred cousins (Africans) to miscegenate among them. Their ancestors continue to occupy the area.

Many or most Black 'Texicans' erroneously believe the so-called fight for independence was about self-determination instead of being centered around a quest to expand slavery into Mexican territory.

While you were probably taught to the contrary, there would have been a Civil Rights Movement even if Martin Luther King, Jr. had not delivered his 'Mountain Top' speech, and Rosa Parks had not stayed in her seat at the front of the bus.

Incidentally, Rosa, who I had the pleasure of meeting once, acknowledged that she wasn't the first chosen for the historic task but the second sister. However,

the original volunteer was written out of the books by the NAACP because some members of the Negrocracy said she was a tainted woman because she had an 'illegitimate' child, whatever that is. Had the demonstration been held today, I guess 71% of all sisters would be unqualified to represent us.

Oh yeah: Actually, another sister named Elizabeth Jennings laid the template 100 years before Rosa Parks. In 1854, Jennings not only was physically removed from a carriage in New York—she was twice thrown into the streets for refusing to give up her seat—but actually sued the city and won. She was assisted by her father, a noted abolitionist and inventor, and Frederick Douglass, who editorialized about the incident, gaining support for her cause.

You won't find it generally taught, but some members of the Black church decried King while telling their congregations that Jesus was a blond-haired, blue-eyed white man.

And, given all of the graphic sexual innuendoes, incest, 'justified' murders, misogyny, and homophobia, it probably would be censured from usage in government schools along with 'Uncle Tom's Cabin,' 'Huckleberry Fynn' and 'Gone with the Wind,' as a local suburban school district did a few years ago.

By the way, Uncle Tom was not a traitor or sell-out, but based on the life of Josiah Henson, a former slave who did, in fact, betray his Black brethren. However, it was not to appease his 'Massa,' but because of his understanding of biblical scripture.

Henson later redeemed himself, created a haven for Black Americans (actually, that's a misnomer) in Canada, and led more of his brothers and sisters to freedom through the underground railroad than Harriet Tubman.

Allow me to put a local slant to this.

My grandmother believed that Marcus Garvey was a crook instead of a Pan Africanist.

Will Black historians take note that the state Democratic Party betrayed us by engineering and financing (\$750,000) the candidacy of Jill Underly for state superintendent for Public schools over the infinitely more qualified Deborah Kerr?

Every time I think that election scenario, I get angry knowing that Kerr, the former head of the Brown Deer school district, the only district in the state without a racial academic achievement gap, lost the election because the Dems valued the support of the teachers' union over that of the loyal Black voter.

Worse still, that dichotomy will result in the loss of another generation of Black children who are again handicapped by a failing status quo. Just as the teachers' union wants it.

The teachers' union wanted someone to head the Department of Public Instruction. Underly will do their bidding, including forcing our children to attend failing schools to ensure the employability and pensions of its members.

The fact is that Underly revealed herself to be a hypocrite and racist. She admitted as much on the Ken Harris radio show on the TRUTH radio station, saying she was 'privileged' and thus could send her children to private school while opposing that option for Black parents.

But that's not the history presented by the Negrocracy. They have been propagandized into believing it is better to sacrifice our children in government schools than to allow them to attend schools where the teachers and middle class send their children. You could say it's about class. But it's more to it than that.

As a result, we find ourselves fighting the wrong enemies and supporting causes and special interests that castrate our hopes for equality.

Speaking of education, will the Milwaukee curriculum and the media continue their false misrepresentation of the roots of the school choice crusade.

The movement was not started by the Republican Party, as misguided or rented Negrocracy continues to say.

In fact, the original idea originated from the office of the MPS Superintendent in 1988. After tampering with the---guess who---teachers' union and Democrats, Polly Williams organized an army of Black and Hispanic parents and community leaders to shepherd the process through the legislature.

Ironically, it was the Republicans who provided crucial support to advance that initiative.

It's actually insulting and speaks to the agenda of some Black folks to maintain the utterly false mirage that school choice was a Republican conspiracy to destroy public (government) education.

Some Black Milwaukeeans swear the late Father James Groppi coordinated and led the open housing marches.

My recollection, however, has the late Vel Phillips cast in that role, with the NAACP Youth Council and Commandoes as key contributors.

Clarification is vital to our history because it gets to the heart of the division within the tribe that has slowed our progress.

You can say the same about the school desegregation lawsuit. To the late Lloyd Barbee, the chief litigant of the desegregation lawsuit, integration was a mechanism to bring about equality and to tear down the walls of apartheid.

But I would venture to guess most supporters of the lawsuit sought only an opportunity to access better schools, institutions that were closed to people of color.

Why does it make a difference? What we teach our children will either empower or stagnate, infuse a sense of inferiority or fertilize the seeds of self-determination and Black empowerment.

My wife frequently posits that 'our' history must be a significant-essential--- part of the curriculum taught in government schools.

African Americans represent most of the MPS student body; it is insulting that we are an afterthought, a victim of revisionist 'His-story' and trivia questions during the shortest month of the year.

I agree with my queen, but with the caveat that we must determine what that history is.

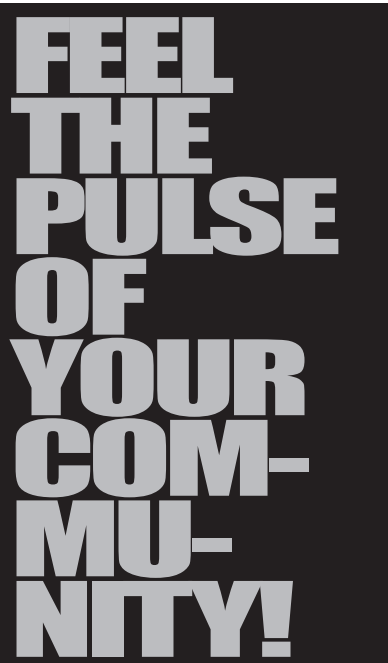
