Oscar Night Review

The day after slapping **Chris Rock** on the **Oscars** stage and upending the **94th Academy Awards**, **Will Smith** issued an apology to the comedian, to the academy and to viewers at home, saying he was "out of line" and that his actions are "not indicative of the man I want to be."

The fallout from Smith's actions during the ceremony continued Monday as Hollywood and the public continued to wrestle with a moment that stunned the Dolby Theatre crowd and viewers at home. The Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences condemned Smith striking Rock, who had made a joke about his wife, **Jada Pinkett Smith**, and said it would launch an inquiry.

Later in the day, Smith gave a stronger apology than he did after **winning the best actor award** for his role in the movie, "**King Richard**."

"Violence in all of its forms is poisonous and destructive," said Smith in a statement issued by his publicist and posted on Instagram. "My behavior at last night's Academy Awards was unacceptable and inexcusable. Jokes at my expense are a part of the job, but a joke about Jada's medical con-

dition was too much for me to bear and I reacted emotionally. I would like to publicly apologize to you, Chris. I was out of line and I was wrong. I am embarrassed and my actions were not indicative of the man I want to be. There is no place for violence in a world of love and kindness."

Atlanta actress Zoe Renee sees light in dark horror flick's opportunities, truths

Everything seemed to be sailing smoothly for Atlanta-based performer Zoe Renee. After she had read the script for the film *Master* and had been terrified by it, she self-taped an audition and received a callback.

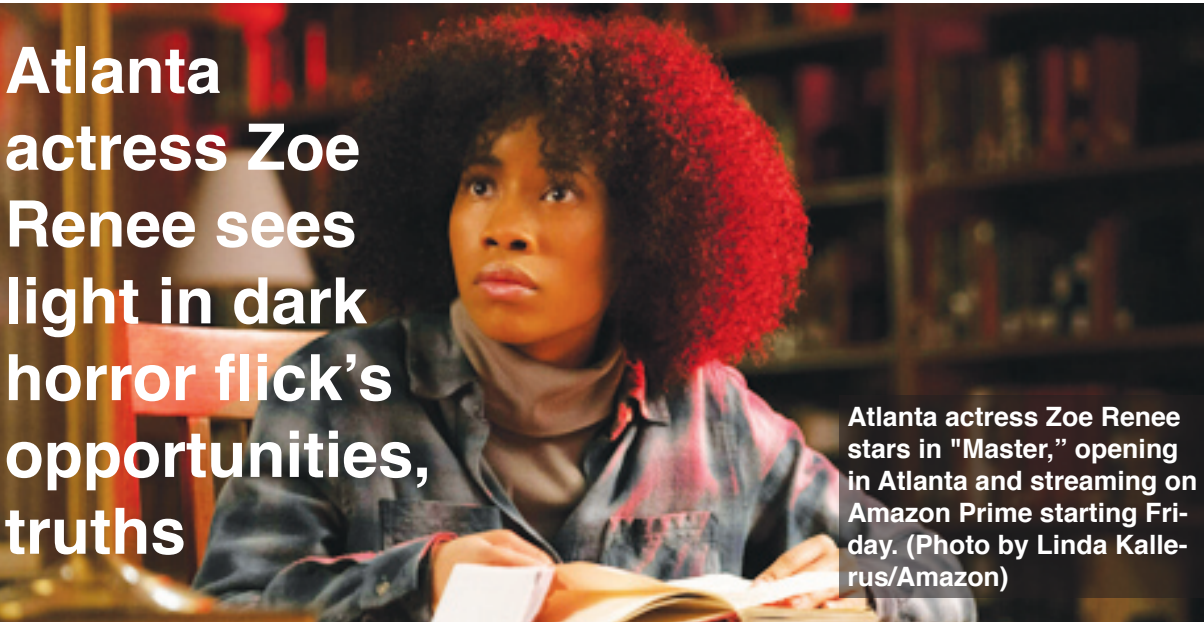
Then there was . . . nothing. After a nervous waiting period, the actress knew another move was necessary, so she headed to New York, arranged dinner with director Mariama Diallo and eventually nabbed a lead role.

With the advent of Covid-19, it took a while for the project to get made, but after a Sundance Film Festival debut in January, *Master* opens at the Landmark Midtown Art Cinema on Friday, the same day it begins streaming on Amazon Prime.

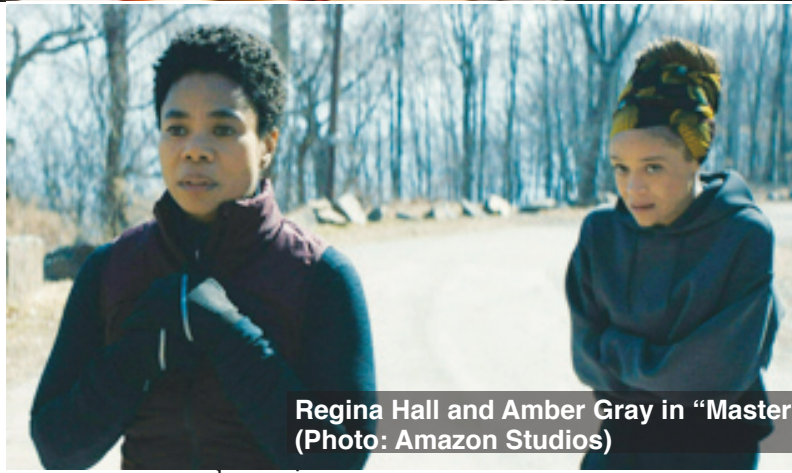
It's a creepy, disturbing horror film set on the fictional campus of Ancaster, a mostly White, New England college.

A trio of Black women there start to face unsettling experiences. Gail (Regina Hall), who is Ancaster's first dean of students, is having problems settling into her new role, while freshman Jasmine (Renee), the only non-White student in the incoming class, finds herself housed in the same room where a student took her own life years back. Jasmine also has an awkward encounter with Black professor, Liv (Amber Gray), who gives her a failing grade for an essay but passes her fellow White classmates.

Renee, 24, views Jasmine as wildly optimistic, before her slow and heartbreaking realization of what is really

happening on campus.

Getting into Ancaster "is her wildest dream, something she has dreamed of since birth," she says. "She has been heavy into academia, and her hopes have been high."

For the actress, the film draws obvious parallels between Jasmine and Gail. "I see Gail and Jasmine as one sometimes. These two situations are so closely related. They are at totally different times of their lives. One is well into her professional career and respected in every way, but going through challenges much like Jasmine, who is just stepping her foot into the door. That is what makes the film so exciting to watch."

Renee was hired in 2019 and began filming in early 2020. Halfway through production, the cast and crew heard the whisper about Covid. "It feels like in a day we were shut down," she recalls. A year went by and everyone wondered when they'd resume, and in 2021 they were able to.

Theresa Robinson noted for fighting school segregation

She and her children were part of original lawsuit challenging MKE's school discrimination policies

Theresa Laura Robinson, affectionately known as “Mom,” “Big “T,” “Mama T,” “Terri,” “Lady Theresa,” and “Grandma” passed away on March 15 in Falls Church, Virginia.

Funeral services were held March 26 at Albright New Hope United Methodist Church, 5555 W. Capitol Drive. Interment followed services at Wisconsin Memorial Park at 13235 W. Capitol Drive, Brookfield, WI.

Theresa was the wife of Alonzo Robinson, Wisconsin's first Black architect who designed the Milwaukee Fire Department's administration building.

Theresa was born in Chantilly, Virginia, to Harry and Viola Payne, and was one of 11 siblings. After graduating from high school in Virginia, Theresa moved to Wilmington, Delaware at the suggestion of her brother, Harry Payne and older sister, Marie Lockett, where she met and later married the love of her life, Alonzo Robinson.

From that union, they had four children, Wayne Alonzo Robinson, Ronald Kevin Robinson, Kim Anthony Robinson and Jean Marie Robinson.

In the early fifties, Theresa and Alonzo moved to Milwaukee so Alonzo could begin a new job as an architect for the City of Milwaukee. After relocating to Milwaukee, Theresa and Alonzo joined St. James United Methodist Church where Theresa worked actively and taught both Sunday and Vacation Bible schools.

Theresa like other African Americans growing up in Fairfax County, Virginia, attended various one-room ra-



Theresa Robinson played role in city's school desegregation battle

cially segregated "School Houses for Colored" students.

Because the desegregation of the public schools in Virginia did not begin until February of 1959 and continued through 1970 when the state governments' attempts to resist desegregation ended, Theresa was forced to complete her entire formal education in totally racially segregated Blacks-only schools that she often described as "separate and unequal."

When asked what her school-life was like growing up, Theresa would quickly and emotionally recount how she walked, "over eight miles to attend one-room Blacks-only schools that generally housed and educated grades one through seven in the same room, at the same time, 3 or 4 days a week, with a couple of books and extremely limited teaching supplies."

She further explained that "funding for black schools in Virginia fell far short of what white schools received," and characterized the discrepancies in salaries for teachers and administrators as "shameful."

Theresa's Virginia educational experience had a tremendous impact on her views regarding the value and importance of obtaining a quality education and it formed the basis for her enduring quest to ensure that each of her kids, grandkids and other family members would receive a quality education.

Determined that none of her kids would be educated in racially segregated or inferior facilities or 'separate but unequal' settings, like those she experienced growing up in Virginia, Theresa worked tirelessly as a volunteer with the Milwaukee United School Integration Committee ("MUSIC"), Father James Groppi, the Wisconsin NAACP and Civil Rights Attorney Lloyd Barbee to desegregate Milwaukee Public Schools ("MPS").

After participating with her school-age children beside her in numerous high-profile protest demonstrations that ultimately failed to convince the Milwaukee school board to change policies resulting in de facto segregation; Theresa decided in 1965, along with 40 other parents of Black and white children and the assistance of Attorney Lloyd Barbee to file a lawsuit to challenge segregation in Milwaukee public schools.

When Theresa, in consultation with her husband Alonzo, made her decision to step up her 'fight' against segregation in MPS, she later explained that she had "no idea just how long and how hard the fight would be to achieve justice and victory."

In fact, although she initially enrolled each of her school-age children as Plaintiffs in the class-action desegregation suit, because the lawsuit went on for years and the school board doggedly appealed its initial findings all the way to the United States Supreme Court, only Jean, Theresa and

Alonzo's youngest child, became a named Plaintiff in the landmark suit. Wayne, Ronald and Kim had graduated and aged out of the "MPS" system, years before the Trial.

It took Federal Judge John Reynolds more than a decade to order "MPS" to take immediate steps to integrate the schools and to rule that they were illegally segregated.

Although he made his ruling in 1976, it was not until March of 1979 that the case, Amos et al v. Board of School Directors of the City of Milwaukee actually settled and MPS began taking measures to integrate its schools.

During this turbulent 14-year litigation period, Theresa often remarked "it doesn't matter how long this fight takes, and how many friends we lose because of our position in this case, we are in it until the end because education is the most powerful weapon you can possibly have in achieving upward mobility and socioeconomic success."

In addition to valuing education, Theresa was also passionate about family and family unity, food, cooking, fishing, plants and politics. She was a fantastic cook and "foodie" who loved to dine at 5 star restaurants.

Despite, being a working mother who worked in various retail sales positions and as a candy designer at The Chocolate House, Theresa prepared school lunches and home-cooked meals for her family every day of the week, without exception.

Her homemade apple pie and chocolate cake were 'infamous' and her potato salad was referred to by some as "legendary."

At all major holidays, Theresa organized and prepared large formal family dinners accompanied

by white table cloths, China, silver, and lots of spirited family debate.

She loved fishing, seafood and "Friday Night Fish Fries" and would often-times take her kids and grandkids to fish at various Wisconsin lakes. Theresa was a plant-lover with a serious 'green thumb,' who took tremendous pride in seeing her plants bloom, grow and thrive.

Exercising her right to vote in all elections was important to Theresa and when her health precluded her from easily doing so, she took extraordinary measures to ensure her absentee ballot was always counted by the Wisconsin Election Commission.

Highlights in her political life included: working at the polls and with various organizations to get out the vote, meeting and attending a private dinner with President Barack Obama in 2015 and attending the 1984 Democratic National Convention in San Francisco.

Theresa was predeceased by her Mother and Father Harry and Viola Payne, ten siblings, Marie Lockett, Zelma Lee, Rosetta Stansbury, Richard, Harry, Howard, Grafton, Sidney, Gilbert and Paul Payne, her beloved husband Alonzo Robinson, son, Ronald Robinson and Grandson, Alonzo Robinson.

Theresa is survived by her sons, Wayne (Frankie) and Kim Robinson (Terese) and her daughter Jean Robinson, grandkids, Kenyon Robinson, Kidadar Robinson, Aaron Puckett, LaCesha Edwards, Krystal Griffin, Kim-Anthony Robinson Jr., Kourtnei Robinson, MD and Theresa Robinson, 15 great-grandchildren, 15 nieces and nephews and a host of other relatives and special friends.

Master was filmed in upstate New York at Vassar College in Poughkeepsie, in the dead of winter, and the performer jokes that "my Atlanta skin couldn't deal with all that."

She credits writer-director Diallo, in her debut feature film, for knowing exactly what she wanted to do, making a film with solid scares but also addressing racism, subtle and unsubtle, on college campuses. "I learned how valuable it is to be specific in something this big. Mariama knew what she wanted to say and didn't want to say. It was a gold mine for me as an actor. I am so excited to see what she does next."

This was Renee's first experience doing as much preparation as the cast was asked to do before the project. Even during the lockdown, the director would assign movies to watch, such as Rosemary's Baby, Let the Right One In and the original 1996 Scream, as well as some comedies. Many of the Master castmates would gather via Zoom every week to discuss what they had watched and get a new assignment.

"I got a crash course in film," Renee admits.

When the performer finally had the opportunity to see the film with an audience last week, she was overjoyed at the reception, as well as the conversations with audience members afterwards.

"I don't know if I have seen a story from the points of view like I have in Master. You see here three points of view from women of color who are trying to find their place in this institution. I know this is not rare or is made up. To hear stories from people and see how they react and say, 'This happened to me' has been the best part of this process."

It was particularly satisfying for her to see a film with three richly drawn, lead female Black characters. "There are genres that need to have way more of us onscreen. I am excited for people to see and hear these stories. When we do, I think the world of creation and the world we tell on screen becomes more layered and fun."

Known for projects such as Jinn, The Quad, and Nancy Drew and the Hidden Staircase, Renee took part in an acting camp with actor Geoffrey Owens when she was 9 years old and knew then she wanted to be in the business. Since that time she has been active taking more classes, auditioning and working. She is proud of being an Atlanta native. A self-proclaimed "Atlanta girl for life," she says she can talk about the city all day.

She grew up 40 minutes south of the city and always dreamed of being an actress. When she was making the decision to really jump in, fate intervened.

"Pinewood Studios in Fayetteville popped up, which was so close to my parents' home. It was like a sign to me to keep going. This massive studio where I wanted one day to be working (was here) and it felt like my dream was manifested right there. It also told me that I didn't need to go anywhere else. Atlanta is really the place to be — budding beautiful, small and warm. I will fly where I need to fly (for work), but will always come back to Atlanta."

However, few could have expected the almost defamatory spirit leveled by a minority of the GOP Senators. The world watched as Judge Brown Jackson retained professional decorum, judicial acuity, non-partisan responses, with a smile that betrayed the verbal assaults. She, as Senator Corey Booker reminded, held her composure, her judicial knowledge, her personal esteem, as do millions upon millions of women everyday.

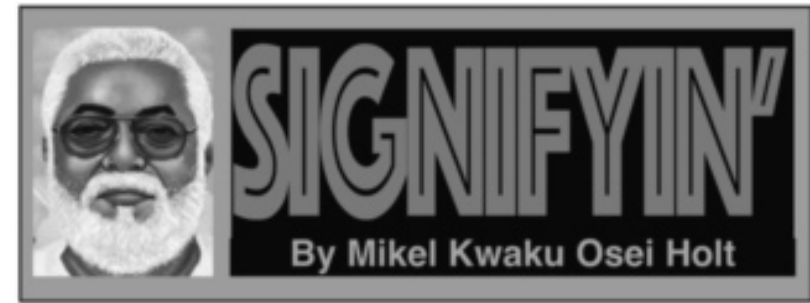

Bye Maury! We WON’T Miss You! (Well, some of us will!)



Joe Biden is threatening to take out Russian dictator and Donald Trump's pimp Valadie Putin.

Inflation is at a 40-year high, adding an average of \$4,000 to poor people's cost of living.

The government school system is failing most Black children, and the teacher's union (and its cronies on the Milwaukee school board) are blocking any meaningful reform, while 90% of Black leaders hide their heads in the sand.

But the biggest news of the week was that Maury Povich is retiring after three decades of providing a forum for Black dysfunctionality.

While Maury's producers will argue the show has provided a forum for news analysis and an equal number of entertaining episodes on mental health and the challenges of poverty, it is known primarily for its sensationalistic paternity segments.

Indeed, Maury's 'you are--or are not--the father' proclamations have been added to the American lexicon and signaled an explosion of copycat shows under the banner of surreal reality shows.

Maury has hosted over 3,600 episodes during his tenure, many of which have been edited to censor profanity, sexual innuendoes, and

for partial mobility in my gun hand, which was wrapped around my only weapon from boredom (save for visits from family and friends): a remote-control unit through which I could call the nurse, or change the television channel.

The Veteran's Administration doesn't provide a lot of channel selections, restricted primarily to local networks, so I was 'forced' to watch the flood of daytime 'reality drama' that provided a tainted view of Black life, complete with stereotypical actors and ridiculous scenarios.

Before I realized it, I found myself immersed in the daily drama provided by Maury, Jerry, and the Cutters (Couple's Court). The only reputable show was Divorce Court with Judge Lynn Toler, whose resume brought credibility to the show. She dispensed logical and wise decisions that frequently resulted in reconciliation.

Both Jerry Springer and Maury started out as objective journalists.

Jerry is an attorney and former mayor of a large metropolitan city. I first met him when he was covering a shooting at the Milwaukee Courthouse. He did a creditable interview that aired on his Chicago-based show.

Sorry, that's a 20th-century term that is no longer politically correct due to new social norms. Most African Americans seemingly have rejected my era's cultural and religious principles.

Today, everybody is a whore, and proud of it.

I also frequently found myself in wonderment at the idiocy of many Black guests. I questioned the sanity and motivations of individuals who would put their lives on public display (I assume for 20 pieces of silver), particularly those sisters who would bring a half dozen dudes on the set to determine which was their baby's father?

I found myself admonishing those quirky women who would cuss out and ridicule a brother (generally a Neckbone) for not accepting, or caring---monetarily---for 'their' child, only to find out he wasn't 'the father.'

And then, six months later, the woman would return with another possibility, and the scene would be repeated.

She would call the new dude everything but a child of God, cuss him out in four different languages (none of which was standard English), and then refuse to apologize when Maury issued his trademarked conclusion: 'you are not the father!'

I often found myself embarrassed by the illiterate rants of men and women who didn't understand tenses, incorrectly pronounced simple words, or provided the double negatives that are seemingly unique to American Africans.

(I don't necessarily blame them since they are a product of their environments and have not been educated by the government school system, primarily to maintain a system of apartheid.)

I used to take it personally, just as I did when local television news groups sought out ghettoish Black folks to respond to questions about a central city murder or the history of the Ottoman Empire.

I thought it was conspiratorial to seek out those 'representatives' of the Black community when thousands of more educated and informed tribal members were within walking distance.

Why go to North and find a high school student with a fourth-grade education to babble on and on, interchanging slang with Ebonics and third language English.

I once approached the general

Central Processing of Absentee Ballots

ALL absentee ballots are processed at a central location rather than the respective voting sites. A voter number is recorded on all absentee ballots during processing.

Voting by Absentee Ballot

Under Wisconsin law, voters do not need a reason or excuse, such as being out of town on Election Day, to vote absentee. Any voter who prefers to vote by absentee ballot may request one. If you are not already registered, you will need to register to vote before an absentee ballot can be sent to you. A new voter registration application is required any time you move (even minor changes such as apartment units), change your name, or if you have not voted in the past four years.

Photo ID Required

Unless you are a military voter, permanently overseas, or are indefinitely confined, you must provide the Election Commission with a copy of your photo ID to keep on file. If you are not sure if you have an ID on file already, feel free to contact us. The address on the ID does not need to be current. For a list of acceptable photo IDs, visit BringItWisconsin.com. Voters who are indefinitely confined (meaning they have difficulty getting to the polls due to age, illness, infirmity, or disability) may request a ballot be sent to them for every election by checking the box on the application. Indefinitely confined voters are not required to provide photo ID.


Deadline

Applications for absentee ballots must be received no later than 5:00 p.m. on the Thursday before the election.

delivered by mail or in-person) no later than Election Day, we strongly encourage you to visit an in-person absentee voting (early voting) location or request that your ballot be emailed to you.

Online: applications can be submitted online at MyVote. This is the fastest method of request for indefinitely confined and military voters.

Fax: you may fax your Application for Absentee Ballot to (414) 286-8445. Faxed photo IDs must be legible; we recommend lightening the ID on a copier before faxing it.

The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification*
- sign the poll book**

*If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.

***If the voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word “exempt.”

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device* (“Automark” or “ExpressVote”) to mark an **optical scan** ballot, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **optical scan ballot** is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter may insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

Spoiling Ballots

If a voter spoils an **optical scan** ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.
