"THE MORE THINGS CHANGE..."

Despite historic Brown v. Board of Education ruling by SCOTUS in 1954, a new report reveals MKE among most segregated school districts in nation!

The nation recently celebrated the 68th anniversary of Brown vs. Board of Education. On May 17, 1954, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled school segregation was unconstitutional.

But as a famous saying goes: "The more things change, the more they stay the same."

A recent report by an independent think tank shows Milwaukee metro area schools are among the most segregated in the country.

The Century Foundation found Wisconsin's largest city ranks the highest for Black and White seg-

regation levels.

The organization says students here are closer to full segregation rather than integration.

This comes at a time when America's school-age population is at its most diverse.

Forty-eight percent are white, 27% are Hispanic and 15% are Black.

The foundation looked at 270,102 students in the four-county area of Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Washington and Waukesha. It gave the area a Black-White segregation rating of .73, where 0 represents no demographic differences between schools and 1 represents total separation of Black and White students.

Several areas are just below Milwaukee's rating for Black-White segregation between schools, with the Newark, Chicago and Detroit areas within .03 points. The average rating across all metro areas was much lower, coming out to 0.24.

The foundation also gave the Milwaukee region a rating of 0.5 for segregation between White students and all students of color, and a .46 rating for separation of students who are and are not considered from low-income families, based on 2017-18 federal data.

"The promise of Brown is still not fulfilled," said Bob Peterson, president of the school board for Milwaukee Public Schools, in an interview with the city's daily newspaper. "It's an important anniversary for people to step back and think about where the future is."

In many respects, the foundation's report mirrors a 2020 report on Black-White disparities by the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, that revealed Black students here attend the most racially segregated schools in the nation.

Not only that, but schools have re-segregated over the years. Black children are as racially isolated as they were in 1965.

UWM professor emeritus Marc Levine, the author of the report, titled: 'The State of Black Milwaukee,' said the report "outlines devastating inequality between Black and White people in metropolitan Milwaukee, which includes four counties: Milwaukee, Waukesha, Ozaukee and Washington."

"The bottom line is racial in-

After 'Brown v. Board,' Where Are All the Black Educators?

Editor's Note: This article was written in 2019 by Madeline Will for Education Week (edweek.org) as the nation was about to celebrate—at the time—the 65th anniversary of Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka, Kansas.

"I fear I may have integrated my people into a burning house!"

—Martin Luther King Jr.

Sixty-five years ago, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that racial segregation of children in public schools was unconstitutional.

That decision for the first time afforded Black children access to the same educational opportunities as White children.

Although many schools remain de facto racially segregated today, the decision is still heralded as one of the country's most significant milestones for civil rights.

But Brown also had an unintended consequence, the effects of which are still felt today: It caused the dismissal, demotion, or forced resignation of many experienced, highly credentialed Black educators who staffed

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Black-only schools. After the decision, tens of thousands of Black teachers and principals lost their jobs as White superintendents began to integrate schools but balked at putting Black educators in positions of authority over White teachers or students.

For instance, in 1953, one year before the Supreme Court decision in *Brown v. Board of Education* of Topeka, teacher Darla Buchanan received a letter from the Topeka, Kan., superintendent, Wendell Godwin.

“[T]he majority of people in Topeka will not want to employ Negro teachers next year for White children,” Godwin wrote. “It is necessary for me to notify you now that your services will not be needed for next year.”

Shortly after the *Brown* decision, the Moberly, Mo., school district closed a segregated black school, which led to the dismissal of 11 certified black teachers, including at least one who had a Ph.D. Some of the white teachers in the district who kept their jobs had fewer classroom experience or college credits than the black teachers who were dismissed, according to court documents.

Seven of the dismissed black teachers sued the school district, claiming they lost their jobs because of their race. The courts sided with the district, and the Supreme Court declined to hear the case.

In the book *The Lost Education* of Horace Tate, author Vanessa Siddle Walker tells the story of a black man in north Georgia who had been a principal for 14 years. Once the school district began to integrate, administrators transferred half of the principal’s students and half his teachers and docked \$3,000 from his salary.

Eventually, the principal lost all his students and was transferred to the superintendent’s building. He was given a windowless room in the attic as an office—where he turned in his resignation, humiliated.

These types of stories were common. Today, many scholars say the persistent lack of black teachers in the profession can be traced to the aftermath of the *Brown* decision.

“We decimated the black principal and teacher pipeline, and we’ve never rectified that,” said Leslie Fenwick, the dean emeritus and a professor at the Howard University School of Education. “It is the unfinished

promise of *Brown* that we have not integrated our faculty and school leadership.”

Prior to *Brown*, in the 17 states that had segregated school systems, 35 to 50 percent of the teaching force was black, said Fenwick, who has researched the displacement of black educators for her upcoming book, *Jim Crow’s Pink Slip: Public Policy and the Near Decimation of Black Educational Leadership After Brown*.

Now, no state has anywhere close to those percentages of Black teachers or principals, she said. According to the most recent federal data, about seven percent of public school teachers, and 11 percent of public school principals, are Black.

“Not having these models of intellectual authority and leadership in schools is detrimental to children,” Fenwick said. “All children deserve to have diverse models of intellectual authority in the classroom via their teacher, or diverse models of leadership in schools.”

‘What We Lost’

Before *Brown*, the segregated Black schools were under-resourced and underfunded compared to the White schools. In some places, Black students were forced to travel long distances to school without provided transportation.

Black teachers were often paid less than their counterparts in White schools, and taught with outdated textbooks that were handed down from the White schools in the district. Some of the Black school buildings were crumbling, with inadequate heating and cooling systems.

Despite these challenges, most of the Black teachers and principals in segregated schools pre-*Brown* had better credentials than White educators, Fenwick said.

Though they were barred from attending many Southern, segregated institutions of higher education, many Black educators received tuition scholarships to earn master’s and doctorate degrees at integrated universities like Columbia, Michigan, and New York, she said.

“That’s what we lost,” Fenwick said. “We lost these

credentialed, qualified people who had experienced integration in educational environments, who had played by the rules and come back [to teach in the South].”

Black educators were also advocates for their students, said Walker, a professor of African American educational studies at Emory University, who extensively researched the records of Black educators during this time period for *The Lost Education* of Horace Tate.

There was an entire network of Black educators who organized efforts to desegregate schools and provide equal access to transportation and school resources, even though they knew their efforts could result in job loss and even threats of violence, said Walker, who is also the president of the American Educational Research Association.

And inside the classrooms of segregated schools, there was a focus on civics and the democratic ideals. Black children were taught to aspire to greater things than the status quo of segregation, Walker said.

“They taught these children not to believe the wider societal messages, but to really believe they could be full participants in American democracy,” she said. “Rather than being victimized by what America is not giving them, they are literally teaching these children to live in a world that does not exist.”

That purposeful education—including strong interpersonal relationships between teachers and Black students—went away when Black schools were closed, and “you got rid of the people who knew how to do it,” Walker said.

“The losses were so much greater than just the individual teachers,” she said. “It matters that they lost their jobs, but the loss we need to contend with in this era is so much broader. ... Yes, we need more diversity with teachers, but we need that and more. We need to reclaim that additive model of what it means to educate all children.”

A growing body of research has found that black students benefit from having a black teacher, both academically and socially.

equality in Milwaukee is as bad as it's ever been," Levine said in a 2020 WUWM radio report on the matter by Emily Files. "Levels of racial isolation and economic isolation in schools is as great as it's ever been."

Levine's report shows 72% of Black students in metro Milwaukee attend hypersegregated schools, where students of color make up 90% or more of the enrollment.

He found Milwaukee ranks the worst for hypersegregation out of the nation's largest 50 metro areas. New York is next, with 66% of Black children in hypersegregated schools.

In 1976, a federal judge ordered Milwaukee Public Schools to desegregate. MPS created magnet schools to draw diverse students together and participated in a cross-district voluntary integration program called Chapter 220, which bused Black students to predominately white suburban schools, and vice versa.



Levine says these solutions were far from perfect.

"[There has been] lots of criticism of the excessive burdens that were placed on African American students — the efforts to bend over backwards to accommodate white students," Levine said. "Lots of very important points have made about that."

Levine says at first, the integration efforts in the 1970s and 1980s did make a difference. Milwaukee's school segregation rate plummeted.

When I looked at the data I was astounded to see that Milwaukee had gone from a place in the late 1960s of having among the most segregated school systems in the country — with 72% of African American students attending hyper-segregated schools — had gone by 1987 to having only 21% of African American students attending hyper-segregated

schools," Levine said.

But the integration didn't last.

From the 1990s to today, a combination of factors drove segregation back up to the 1960s era levels.

The factors include white flight, the end of the Chapter 220 busing program, and the rise of education options that did not have integration goals, including open enrollment and private school vouchers.

On top of that, much fewer Black people have moved to Milwaukee area suburbs, compared to other metro areas. That contributes to suburban schools remaining mostly white.

Levine says segregated schools are one factor that makes the Milwaukee metro one of the most racially unequal places in the country.

"We argue [Milwaukee] represents the archetype of modern-day metropolitan racial apartheid and inequality," Levine writes in the report. "On virtually all key measures of Black community well-being, Milwaukee ranks at or near the bottom when ranked against other large metropolitan areas."

In an effort to combat the problem of intense school segregation in Milwaukee, MPS board members Sequanna Taylor and Bob Peterson wrote a resolution in the summer of 2020 to push school districts, municipalities and county boards to address how they're going to help end Jim Crow in metro Milwaukee—the systematic, institutional racism that has been part of the region's history.

At the time of the resolution, the murder of George Floyd in May of 2020 sparked a surge of protests against injustice, which presented an opportunity to call the question on school segregation.

"People that wear Black Lives Matter shirts, it's more than just wearing the shirts, it's your actions that tells and shows us you believe in equity," Taylor said. "So this is basically placing it on the forefront and making sure there are actionable ideas and goals coming forward, not just words."

Though the board passed the resolution, it's still unclear what became of it. MPS sent surveys to suburban school boards, gauging interest and searching for ideas to promote integration.

(Editor's note: A search of Google about the MPS survey came up with nothing as it related to a response by the suburban districts.)

President Biden Prepares to Issue Executive Order on Police Reform

On the first anniversary of the police murder of George Floyd, President Joe Biden invited the slain Black man's family to the

White House.

At the time, Biden expressed optimism that the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act would become law.

That didn't happen.

On the second anniversary of

Floyd's death, Biden plans to issue an executive order on police reform, which administration officials said would establish new rules for the use of force by federal law enforcement officers.

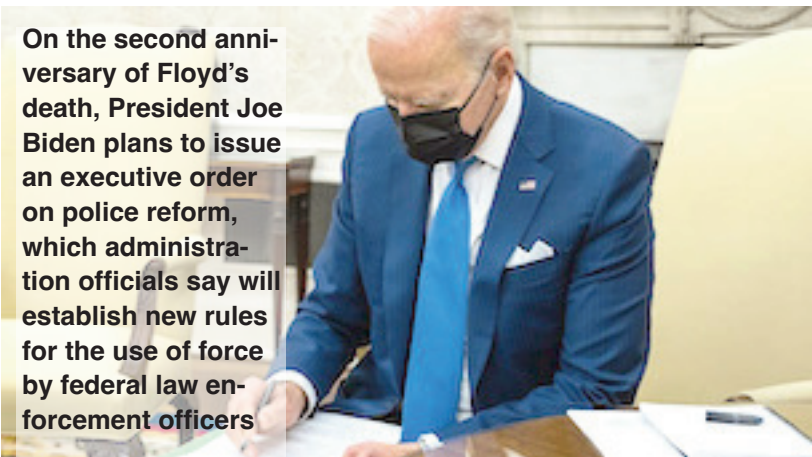
"It's an effort to be responsive,"

administration officials stated. The order likely would mimic California's police reform law which requires that new police officers in the Golden State be at least 21-year-old.

The law also allows for the discipline of officers who fail to intervene when another law enforcement member uses excessive force.

Further, the statute place firm limits on when officers are allowed to use deadly force, noting that such actions only are permitted when necessary to defend human life.

Previously, officers could use



deadly force if they deemed it "reasonable."

Following the murder conviction of former Minneapolis Police Officer Derek Chauvin, three

other cops were found guilty in federal court of violating Floyd's civil rights.

Prosecutors said the trio stood **continued on page 4)**

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demically and socially. Black students are more likely to both graduate from high school and enroll in college when they have just one black teacher in elementary school.

And black students are more likely to be placed in gifted education programs if they have a black teacher, and less likely to receive suspensions, expulsions, or detentions from black teachers. Research has found that black teachers have higher expectations for black students.

"I think in general, black students benefit from working with teachers who deeply understand and are invested in their educational progress and success," said Rich Milner, a professor of education at Vanderbilt University. "With the decline of teachers post Brown, we see that these students are often underserved and are not supported in ways that would be advantageous to their academic and social success."

A Continued Diversity Gap

Increasing teacher diversity has been at the forefront of advocates' and some policymakers' agenda for some time now, especially now that about half of public school students are nonwhite. Indeed, over the last 30 years, the number of nonwhite teachers has gone up faster than the number of white teachers, said Richard Ingersoll, a professor of education and sociology at the University of Pennsylvania Graduate School of Education.

However, that growth has been driven by a significant increase of Hispanic and Asian-American teachers. The number of black teachers has increased by about 34 percent over the past three decades—a smaller increase than any other group of teachers, except for Native American teachers (whose numbers have decreased over this time).

And black teachers are not evenly distributed across jobs. According to 2012 federal data, half of black teachers work in urban public schools, while 27 percent work in suburban schools. Nearly 70 percent of black teachers teach in high-poverty schools, Ingersoll said, and only 1 percent of black teachers work in predominately white schools.

One barrier to recruiting more diverse candidates into the profession is the licensing test that states require teachers to take. Like with other standardized tests, black and Hispanic candidates have lower scores on average on certification tests than their white and Asian-American counterparts. Some experts attribute that discrepancy to a lack of strong preparation and test anxiety. (Licensure exams are often expensive to take and retake, an additional burden.)

Linda Tillman, a professor emerita of educational leadership in the School of Education at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, said after the Brown decision, standardized tests were used to "deny black educators the opportunity to teach." States implemented certification measures that led to black teachers being fired or to school districts not renewing their contracts, she said.

Between 1984 and 1989, about 21,500 black teachers were displaced because of new requirements

for teacher education programs and certification, she said.

Another challenge for the teacher diversity gap today is retention: Black teachers are more likely than their white peers to quit teaching. Milner attributed that in part to the additional responsibilities that are often placed on black educators' shoulders—for instance, many black teachers report being pigeonholed as disciplinarians.

And one possible reason for the continued diversity gap is that children of teachers are more likely to go into teaching themselves, according to a recent study.

"This actually can explain a lot about the persistence of the white overrepresentation in teaching," said study co-author Seth Gershenson, who is an associate professor in the School of Public Affairs at American University.

Overall, children whose mothers were teachers were 9 percentage points more likely to become teachers than other children. That holds true for both the sons and daughters of white female teachers, and the daughters of black female teachers.

A Lasting Impact

Today, public schools are still deeply segregated, with large numbers of black and brown students being taught in schools that are predominately non-white and often have fewer resources. As the country's attention turns to the 65th anniversary of the Brown decision—and how far schools still have to go to be truly racially integrated—scholars hope there's also a reckoning on what happened to the black educators of the time period and their legacy.

"We really need to not just sit around and think about Brown and clap for Brown and then go on as business as usual," Walker said. "This anniversary needs to be a summons to action."

And that action should be twofold, she said: Policymakers need to focus efforts on diversifying the teaching ranks, but also schools should embrace the rich pedagogy and practices that were common among black teachers in segregated schools.

But the legacy of those black educators still exists in schools today. For instance, Pamela Benford, a regional superintendent for the DeKalb County school district near Atlanta, was mentored by her former principal, who grew up in the pre-Brown era of segregated schools. That educator carried the pedagogical practices of the black teachers in black schools into her own instructional philosophy, and imparted those lessons to her staff, including Benford.

"I think the biggest thing I learned from her was the way she encouraged and modeled ... what it means to be student-centered," Benford said. "She understood that it's really all about the child."

Benford's principal had high standards and expectations for her students and employees, but it all came down to making sure children had everything they needed to succeed, she said.

"I saw her exemplify that, and I did strive to be like her," Benford said.



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Whoopi Goldberg says if another Republican offers thoughts and prayers: 'I'm going to punch somebody'

Whoopi Goldberg ripped into Republicans after several senators expressed their thoughts and prayers in response to the elementary school shooting in Texas on Tuesday.

"Why are we always at square one with this? And I swear to God if I hear another Republican senator talk about their heart being broken, I'm gonna punch somebody. I can't take any thoughts and prayers," said Goldberg on Wednesday's episode of The View, Mediaite reports.

"If your thoughts and prayers were with everybody, you would have done something by now. It's not like anybody's not trying to make something happen. What the hell is going on?" she added.

The shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas has renewed calls for gun reform, as reported by The Associated Press. Gunman Salvador Ramos, 18, killed at least 19 children and two teachers on May 24. Ramos was killed by police after he barricaded himself inside the school, officials said.

The Texas massacre is the third-deadliest school shooting in the U.S. behind the Virginia Tech shooting in 2007 and the Sandy

Republicans have long been criticized for failing to support gun reform legislation due to their close ties with the National Rifle Association (NRA).

"I am sick and tired of it," said President Biden as he read off a list of mass shootings in the United States, theGrio's White House Correspondent April Ryan reported. "Why are we willing to live with this carnage? Why don't we keep letting this happen? Where in God's name is our backbone?"

During The View segment on Wednesday, co-host Joy Behar called on Republicans "to stop gaslighting me."

"I want them to stop gaslighting me also. Stop saying it's not guns that kill people, it's people that kill people. It's guns that kill people, OK? Stop saying the opposite. Stop saying that mental illness is behind this," she said. "There's mental illness in every country in the world, and they don't have this problem. So stop gaslighting me on that one, and stop saying that you can have a good guy stop a bad guy with a gun."

Meanwhile, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer denounced gun violence during an emotional speech on Capitol Hill Wednesday.

The lawmaker, who vowed to bring a vote on gun reform to the Senate floor, condemned Republicans who he said, "care more about the NRA."

"Please, please, damn it — put yourselves in the shoes of these parents for once," Schumer said, the Daily Mail reported.

"Maybe that thought, putting yourself in the shoes of these parents instead of in the arms of the NRA, might let you wriggle free from the vice-like grip of the NRA."

Debate between Black conservative and Black nationalist shows both have more in common than they care to admit!



I took a deep breath before answering the early Saturday morning call. On the other end was 'AE,' a former Community Journal employee calling from D.C., where she has survived and prospered, even though she is an unapologetic Black conservative.

My moment of reluctance wasn't premised on that dichotomy, however. Instead, it was rooted in our history of debates—some of which ended with an impasse, others with ill feelings.

And that expectation took the passenger seat to the probability that the conversation would last upwards of several hours. The 'discussions' were frequently engaging and entertaining but, more often than not, excessively long.

Those who remember AE (despite my masking of her name) know her as an intelligent and uncompromising sister who rarely allowed emotionalism to taint her arguments.

Some will suggest her sociopolitical philosophy is outdated and inconsistent with today's ever-evolving culture.

After all, she is an old-time Black Christian who believes in such antiquated concepts as marriage, gender roles (a man is the head of his household), and chastity outside

of marriage.

As such, there are some Democrats who would have her tarred and feathered, as they would Martin Luther King, Jr. or Malcolm X had they lived today.

AE frequently points out that African Americans voted Republican until the mid-1960s, and those antiquated concepts held the community together. If nothing else, our parents knew the difference between being poor and being 'po.

But that's another flavor of Kool-Aid that most millennials have never tasted.

I hadn't talked to AE in years, knowing that she settled in our nation's capital, serving in various government positions.

Two minutes into our conversation, I also realized she hadn't wavered from her sociopolitical platform, a fact reinforced when she revealed the reason for her call: she wanted to know my position on the two hottest cultural controversies of the day—abortion and homosexuality.

AE could be forceful and seemingly overbearing at times, which for chauvinists, poses a threat.

Having been the lone voice of 'moderate' reason on Sunday Insight with Charles Sykes television show for two decades, I learned the value of research and logic. I also learned the importance of keeping a 'hole card' up my sleeve just in case the wind shifted.

I've used that card frequently when discussing politics and theo-

logical issues with people, explaining that I view the world through cultural and spiritual prisms and, as such, cast a much more comprehensive shadow over the trivialities of (wo)mankind. Rarely is a subject merely black and white?

With AE, for example, when she takes the position that African Americans should focus on the future instead of the past, I pull out the Sankofa bird and remind her of dozens of leaders who posited that you'll never know where you're going unless you know where you came from.

Or, as the African saying goes: a tree without roots can easily be decimated by wicked weeds. (Throwing an obscure word—like decimated—in a sentence is also a good distraction.)

On Saturday, AE wasted little time announcing her 'disdain' for Black clerics who had skirted their responsibility as Christian leaders when they rejected biblical scripture to appease their political patrons.

She said she was sickened when listening to Black preachers acknowledge the sanctity of human life but support abortion. And while you can debate whether that so-called 'life' is a fetus—like a chicken egg-- or a human being and whether the bible, in fact, denounces abortion, there is no clarity needed on the subject of homosexuality, she said.

I won't bore you with the nuances of our debate on those two subjects, aside from admitting I thought I was winning the battle until I misquoted scripture and mistakenly asserted that Paul was the first pope.

Even my 'black ace' was ineffectual at that point. However, I regained ground when I revealed my late mother was a learned CME minister who taught us that even if
