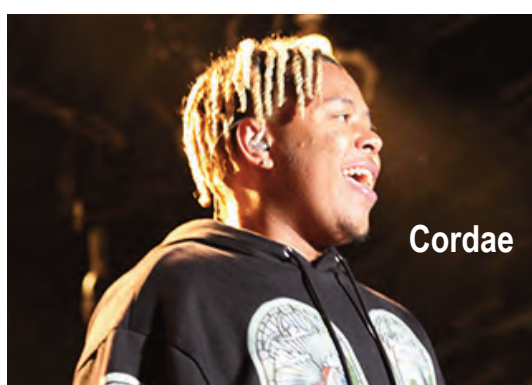

Local lawmakers condemn state high court's ruling against use of ballot drop boxes!

In response to the Wisconsin Supreme Court's recent ruling prohibiting early voting ballot drop boxes, the Milwaukee Common Council passed a resolution earlier this week opposing the Court's decision.

"Ballot drop boxes make the practice of voting easier and more accessible, and we fear this decision will only further disenfranchise voters who are elderly, hospitalized, house-bound, lack of access to transportation, or face other impediments to personally delivering their ballots," read a statement by the council.

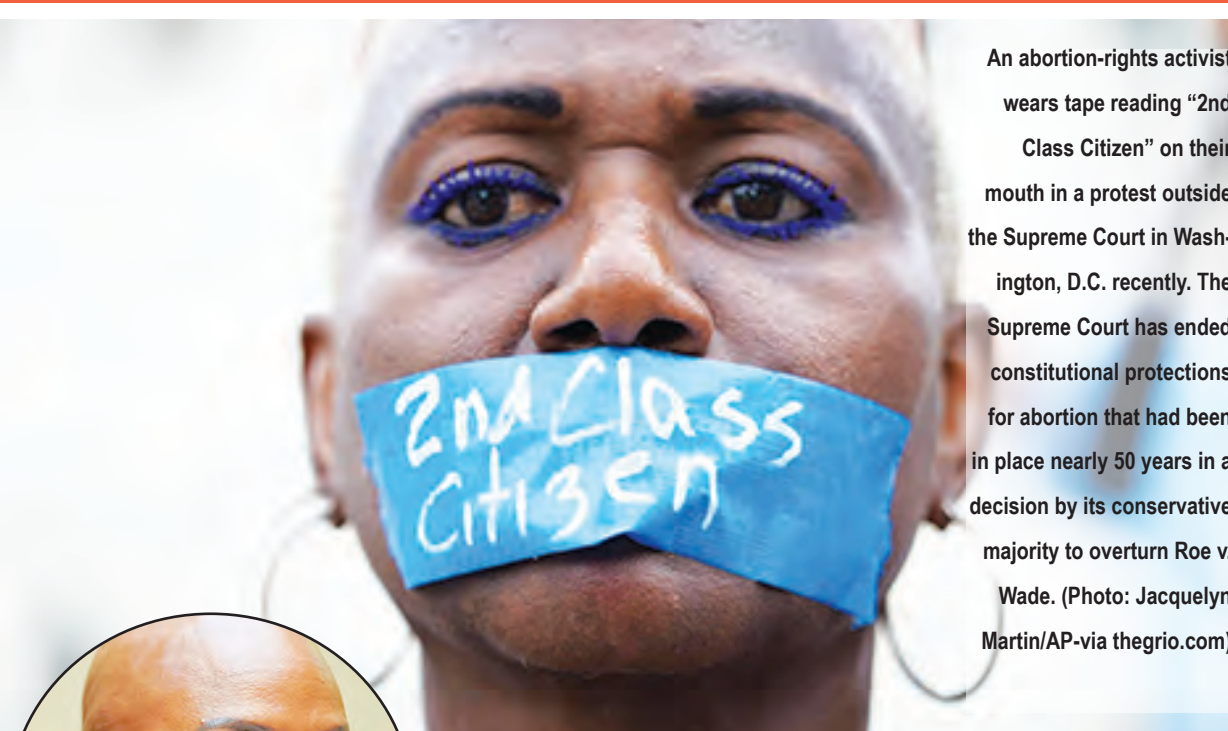
"Simply put, we strongly and fundamentally disagree with this decision."

Twelve of the council's 15 alderpersons signed the statement.

In its ruling, the state's high court argued the Wisconsin Election Commission had overstepped its authority when it issued guidance to local election clerks to allow the use of drop boxes to return absentee ballots in the 2020 election, adding voters must personally return their ballots.

Under the high court's ruling, it would be illegal for someone—even a caregiver or family member—to return an absentee ballot for another person. According to the Wisconsin Board For People With Developmental Disabilities, there are more than 80,000 people in the state with physical disabilities like cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy or spinal cord injuries that prevent them from physically putting their own absentee ballots in the

President Joe Biden on Sunday told reporters he is looking into his legal authority to declare a public health emergency in response to the Supreme Court overturning Roe v. Wade over two weeks ago.

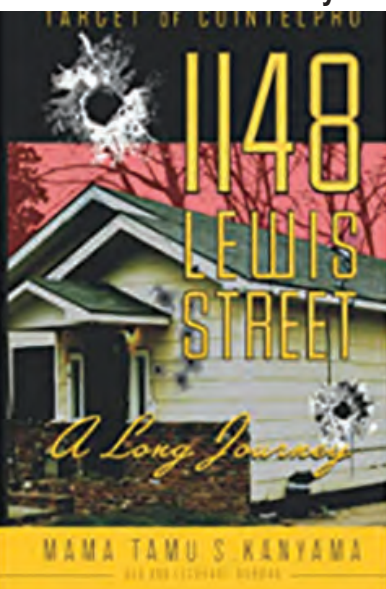

Author, MKE native Tamu Kanyama to hold book signings July 15-16

Tamu Kanyama (aka Ann Lockhart-Norman), author of the semi-biographical book, '1148 Lewis Street: A Long Journey' will appear at two book signings in Milwaukee this week.

Kanyama, a Milwaukee native, will appear at the Black Historical Society and Museum, 27th and Center Streets, on Friday, July 15 at 5:30 to 7:30p.m.

She will also be available on Saturday, 11 a.m., at Coffee Makes You Black, Teutonia and Hadley Streets.

Kanyama grew up in Milwaukee and attended North Division high school before securing a bachelor's degree. She taught school until retirement.

'1148 Lewis Street' details her journey as a member of the Republic of New Africa, a Black nationalist organization that was targeted by the FBI and other federal agencies based on its calls for establishing an independent Black nation.

Viewed in the same light as the original Black Panthers, government agencies plotted to undermine the organization through harassment, intimidation and the imprisonment of members, including Kanyama's husband.

Kanyama currently lives in Atlanta, where she works with her daughter at an alternative school named in her honor.

"Elections are a core tenet of our democracy, and we should always be striving to ensure that voting in them is as easy as possible," the Council statement continued.

"Sadly, the Wisconsin Supreme Court ruling does just the opposite at a time when roughly 2 million Wisconsinites voted absentee in the last presidential election, and 66 counties utilized drop boxes as an appropriate means to ensure their residents can cast their vote."

At the same time the Council members signed its statement, five members of the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors introduced their own resolution supporting democracy and nonpartisan election administration in Wisconsin.

The supervisors who introduced the legislation were:

Felecia Martin, Willie Johnson Jr., Ryan Clancy, Steve Shea, and Peter Burgelis.

The resolution will be officially heard Friday, July 15 during a meeting of the Judiciary, Law Enforcement and General Services Committee.

"The right to vote is among our most sacred rights, the bedrock of a thriving democracy," said a statement by the five supervisors.

"Efforts to erode this most basic right, whether legislative or judicial, reflect a deep contempt for the people hidden behind a thin veneer of manufactured concern for imagined fraud," the statement continued.

"Our election administrators, in Milwaukee and elsewhere, face ongoing challenges and an increasingly tumultuous working environment.

"We must stand strong against threats of violence and

reprisal aimed at election administrators, and we must condemn continued attempts to discredit the validity of our elections, to spread misinformation, and to overturn the results of free, fair elections."

Said Justice Ann Walsh Bradley in her dissenting opinion: "(the majority) blithely and erroneously seeks to sow distrust in the administration of our elections and through its faulty analysis erects yet another barrier for voters to exercise this 'sacred right.'"

An Associated Press review of every potential case of voter fraud in the six battleground states where former President Donald Trump is still disputing results, including Wisconsin, found fewer than 475 cases, a number so low it would have made no difference in the 2020 presidential election.

only emphasized the statistics that Black women are more likely than white women to experience health and economic disparities related to the lack of reproductive care, but she also reminded us that the history of the anti-abortion movement is “rooted in white supremacy.”

“We’ve already endured a history of medical apartheid, of experimentation without our consent [and] of sterilization and find ourselves in a Black maternal morbidity crisis,” Pressley told theGrio. “That history of medical apartheid against Black and brown, immigrant, indigenous and disabled folks is real. It’s a traumatic history.”

The topic of abortion and racism dates back centuries, says Michele Goodwin, a law professor at the University of California Irvine and a member of the ACLU executive committee. At its core, she contends, is the desire to achieve white expansion — which is intrinsically connected to the United States’ founding and participation in the Transatlantic slave trade.

“If we read Dobbs [vs. Jackson Women’s Health Organization] as just an opinion of 2022, then we’re missing the Dobbs of the 1600s, 1700s, 1800s,” Goodwin said in an interview with theGrio.

“There has been since the times of colonization in the United States, the interest in the expansion of white settlement in colonies, that was explicitly understood when colonists arrived.”

The connection between the anti-abortion movement and America’s racism is two-fold, says Goodwin, who is the author of “Policing The Womb: Invisible Women and the Criminalization of Motherhood.” There were both economic and racial motivations behind the pushback on abortion care, she added.

Popular white physicians like Horatio Storer, J. Marion Sims and Joseph DeLee in the late 1800s and early 1900s wanted to “monopolize” the field of obstetrics and gynecology.

In order to do that, they formed a medical smear campaign against women, particularly Black midwives, in an effort to thwart their work in reproductive health care.

“We go from in the 1800s nearly 100% of reproductive health care being governed by women and about 50% of that being by Black women ... to women basically caring for about 1% of the field by the 1900s,” said Goodwin.

In their writings, Storer, Sims and DeLee depicted Black midwives as “barbaric” and seized on the issue of abortion procedures, calling them “immoral.”

Goodwin also noted that Sims, who’s known as the father of gynecology, wrote about “torturing Black women.”

“He wrote in his own words about having epiphanies in the middle of the night, where he would then get these Black women who were chained in the back of his home and begin cutting into their uteruses,” she recalled.

“He believed that Black women did not feel pain, so he did not provide them anesthesia.”

Due to the rise of the abolition movement, Goodwin said, these white physicians also wrote about the need for white women to “use their loins and go east, south, north and west.”

“They aligned themselves with a white supremacy movement,” she added.

The historical reality of the anti-abortion movement being rooted in a desire to protect the white race has a modern context. In 2019, famed educator and anti-racism scholar Jane Elliott highlighted the implications of a declining white population in a country founded on the idea that whites are superior to Black and brown people.

“Right now, white people are really frightened,” Elliott said during her interview with Black Nouveau. She referenced Ben Wattenberg, author of the 1987 book “The Birth Dearth,” who wrote that “the main problem confronting the United States today is there aren’t enough white babies being born in this country.”

“[Wattenberg] says that if we don’t change this and change it rapidly, white people will lose their numerical majority in this country,” said Elliott, “and this will no longer be a white man’s land.”

Census data showing a shrinking white population released during the administration of former President Barack Obama, America’s first Black commander in chief, has been seen as a turning point in the modern rise of white grievance politics. Elliott referenced this connection.

“Finding out now, recently, that within 30 years, white people will be in the numerical minority in this country is going to be traumatic,” she said, “and that’s the reason we have to solve this problem, and we have to solve it now.”

As the Biden White House and Democrats in Congress navigate how to respond to this moment of abortion rights being overturned, Pressley told theGrio she fears that because Black women have “been burdened by so many crises” over the years, they will “be in a state of detached acceptance and resignation because they’re just so tired.”

For a variety of cultural reasons, WTMJ-4 is my favorite local station.

But I won't be watching that station's senatorial debate on July 27.

My decision is not related to my cynical disposition about politics. Nor is it because I've already committed to a candidate for next month's primary elections.

It's not because the movies 'Rosewood' or 'Glory' is on a competing channel, even though I'll probably be watching the African Channel on cable.

Instead, my reasoning can be summed up by two concerns:

First, aside from presentation---the respective candidates' ability to articulate the issues---I assume they will read from the same script Democrats have been reading from for the last 50 years.

In essence, I've heard it all before, which strongly indicates that nothing has changed but the tax rate and our tribal illusion of progress.

Different mouths--- including two big lips---but the exact words.

A quick reading of the senatorial candidates' campaign literature suggests their platforms and campaign issues are eerily similar to what Jimmy Carter espoused when I had black hair and could dance.

In fact, I would venture to guess their overlapping platforms were written by the same consultant---a left-of-center, eyeglass-wearing White college grad student who will someday run a poverty organization or a Las Vegas whore house.

Secondly, and equally importantly, based on the station's participatory guidelines, one of the most exciting candidates has been excluded.

Without Darrell Williams' unique perspective, the debate will be, at best, monotone and, at worse, deceptive.

You can learn more about TMJ's rationale for excluding Williams in his letter to the editor in this publication (see below).

In a nutshell, the station management based its 'eligibility' requirement for participation on an artificial determination that all participants must show five percent support or 5,000 campaign contributors.

But first things first, second or third, depending on your point of reference and your political affiliation: card-carrying Democrat, party pawn, or independent pragmatist.

For all intents and purposes, the primary race is a contrast of personalities more than an examination of platforms and promises.

Aside from their respective resumes, I could write a press release for most of them without the benefit of an interview.

For all intents and purposes, the only variations are generally linked to the 'hue,' money, and name recognition.

Presentations are orchestrated based on circumstances, demographics, and news events.

The Supreme Court decision on abortion prompted each candidate to release the same press release, probably penned by the same consultant. The same applies to mass murders, inflation, and Critical Race Theory.

The African American candidates are expected to personalize issues like systemic racism. Still, they won't criticize the church for its role, nor will they recite Frederick Douglass' 'what does your

The Problem with Politics!

(Or, how to continually get 'played' by the donkey party!)

July 4 mean to me' speech in rural Wisconsin.

All candidates will play to the Black community, knowing whoever wins will automatically receive the Black vote and liberal vote.

That's how the game is played, and if you don't believe me, look under the bed at the Watergate Hotel. There's a red, white, and blue book there that explains the process.

Many years ago, I wrote a column about being pressured for an interview with a local political candidate as I was trying to rush out the office door en route to an assignment.

I told the candidate to write down a simple quote (don't worry about spelling) and leave it with the receptionist, and I would finish a story within 10 minutes of my return to the newspaper office.

She thought I was being sarcastic, but I was being accommodat-

ing. With few exceptions, most candidates for local office use the same campaign template---they are concerned about crime and inadequate housing pool, jobs, and poverty.

In a nutshell, I posited that we---naive Black political pawns---elect our politicians based on their ability to articulate the problems but rarely, if ever, to provide solutions.

The same is true of this senatorial election.

The exception may be Mandela Barnes, who is running a television commercial (paid for by an out-of-state special interest), declaring he will 'make' the rich pay their fair share.

The optimal word is 'make.'

With that type of power---the ability to do something no other politician in American history has accomplished--- I would be a fool not to vote for him.

In fact, I may have to worship him since he has power similar to Yeshua's.

Innovative candidates today don't make promises- unless they speak to Black people---because they realize few voters are gullible enough to believe they can bring them to fruition.

They can't bring peace to the Middle East, have no power to provide 'family supporting' jobs for millions of Black Americans, and won't remove guns from the streets.

President Joe Biden lost me when he 'suggested' he would end systemic racism. I guess he attends the same church as Mandela.

For me, the litmus test is not whether they will lie about dreaming the impossible dream, but whether once or twice a term they will buck the status quo and put their people before their party.

And while that sinks in, allow me to clue you in on a lesson they don't teach in civics class if they offer that subject in government schools these days:

Partisan politicians of all hues and sexes are responsible---and responsive to---their party, not their people or tribe.

And in the case of Democrats, we only get an audience when we scream, threaten, or riot. And even then, little happens other than their respective city is flooded with federal money, which ends up in the hands of poverty pimps.

The bottom line is that we are pawns in the political prostitution process. Unless you hold membership (dues-paying) in the 'corporation,' you have virtually no say in the party platform and probably won't get a return call.

Let me put that in Ebonics if you don't understand English.

Ninety-seven percent of the Black voters who pencil in a Democratic Party candidate at the polls have no input in the policies of that party.

Another point for clarification: The corporate money contributed to a campaign speaks much louder than your vote.

And that fact transcends the wealth of the candidate.

Access to media is also a major contributing factor, but money buys media.

For example, while Alex Lasry has wealth behind him, it is negated by Barnes' outside contributors, which include the Democratic Party's left-wing status quo and his position as lieutenant governor, which provides him with free media.

In Wisconsin, the lieutenant governor is a ceremonial post, wielding little actual power.

What the position does allow, however, is the opportunity to campaign full time, at government expense, complete with travel reimbursement and armed security.

Several candidates have noted that factor puts them at a severe disadvantage. To them, I say, 'blame the game, not the player.'

Only Lasry, who has closed the enormous name recognition gap between himself and Barnes in the last few months, could sway the Black vote if any of the starting five of the Milwaukee Bucks endorse his campaign or the Black mayor and county executive aggressively campaign for him in the next couple of weeks.

Both Mayor Chevy Johnson and County Executive David Crowley endorsed Lasry months ago.

Barnes has been able to neutralize that impressive advantage somewhat because of his ethnicity in a minority-majority city and name recognition as the state's highest-ranking public official. But that advantage is tenuous unless he uses his race to convince Black voters he's one of us.

He can and has used that strategy recently when he read off a script and spoke about how America is built on a platform of White supremacy and legalized apartheid.

Of course, rubbing White faces in 500 years of racist dirt can also backfire.

Some Whites don't want to be blamed for the conduct of their bigoted ancestors, even if they have benefitted from apartheid.

Even though Barnes is a classic 'liberal' Democrat, as illustrated by his opposition to school choice despite overwhelming Black support for the initiative, he is following in Barack Obama's footsteps advocating that he is a candidate for all the people and not just us.

This takes me to the dichotomy inherent in the campaign of Williams, the other Black candidate.

Unlike his peer, Williams is a strong supporter of the Black Media. He is also the only candidate to publicly announce he is willing to buck the status quo when it benefits our tribe.

In a nutshell, not only does he possess the most diverse resume, he would prioritize out-of-the-box solutions to our myriad issues, starting with tearing down the walls of educational apartheid. That makes him an unacceptable candidate to special interests---teachers' unions and poverty pimps---who want to maintain the failing status quo.

But you won't know the extent of Williams' independence---will- ingness to put the people before the party---if you tune into WTMJ's debate because he has been excluded from participation.

And you can't call the station's decision racist since another person of color is included.

But without Williams pressing his opponents to offer solutions instead of promises, I can only assume the debate will be more, so a beauty contest than a no-holds-barred kumite.

Indeed, I can promise the invited candidates will spend two hours pimp slapping incumbent Senator Ron Johnson instead of offering concrete solutions to the myriad issues stagnating Black empowerment.

Then again, maybe the station is predicting its decision to exclude Williams out of fear that he could upset the political apple cart.

Valuing All Voices: Wisconsinites Lifting Their Voices Against the Voter Suppression Actions of WTMJ

criteria for Candidacy, 2,000 valid signatures in 45 days to appear on the ballot... which provides evidence of constituent support. Despite meeting Wisconsin's ballot criteria, WTMJ4 implemented new criteria that suppresses the voices of some

Candidates by denying them from being a part of the highly anticipated televised U.S. Senate debate.

Such action directly prevent voters from making an informed decision about who they want to elect. Even more concerning is why would WTMJ4 develop criteria that circumvent those set by the State of Wisconsin? This is simply not right!

The problem is the Candidate must have

over 5000 individual donations to their campaign or have a ranking of 5% or more in the Marquette Poll by June 30th. More

peculiar was the fact that I and three other candidates were informed of this on June 21st when 'I understand' the 4 other candidates were informed last month (May 19th). The Marquette Poll alluded over 48% of voters were unsure and did not

know enough about the candidates to make an informed decision on who to vote for in the upcoming U.S. Senate election.

This is why 'all' candidate voices need to be heard during the televised debate.

I am asking WTMJ4 to include all candidates in the televised debate. This criteria exemplifies the disparities this nation faces and discourages those candidates who represent communities of lower economic status as well as classism. It raises the eyebrows to why such barriers would be put in place to hush the voices of 4 (3 of 4 are minority) candidates?

ballot. Such barriers are no different than the efforts being taken to take away peoples’ right to vote! This is another form of voter suppression that keep many people oppressed. This action questions the integrity of the news station as well as insults the voting intelligence of Wisconsinites across this State.

More so, this criteria undermines the efforts of many groups such as the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) and Souls to the Polls. For years, these organizations have been organizing to get people, ‘especially minorities,’ to voting booths across Wisconsin. How can we ask Wisconsinites to make an informed voting decision, ‘especially our minority groups and the 48% of unsure and undecided voters’ when WTMJ4 is not allowing them to hear the voices of all candidates in the most important U.S. Senate election in Wisconsin’s history? Freedom of the press should work both ways....not only for the press to have access to news and information, but also to give a voice to the people who need to be heard.

I am calling on the WISCONSIN DEMOCRATIC PARTY to stand together as one. All candidates should participate or nobody should participate. Any candidate who participates is supporting one of the many forms of voter suppression that we claim to fight against. Recently, all candidates were seen and heard at the Wisconsin Democratic Conference (WTMJ4 was present). Hence, WTMJ4 should provide the people of Wisconsin with the same opportunity.

I am calling on the NAACP, LULAC, SOULS TO THE POLLS, the HMONG community and others to stand against this new form of voter suppression. Efforts such as this have kept African Americans and other minority groups uninformed for too long.

Over the past year, the NAACP forum and others around the State have included all candidates. Why not now?

In good conscious, why would we be rushing to get ‘Souls’ to the polls when the people are not allowed them to hear the voices and see the faces of the candidates they are being asked to vote for?

It is ironic that throughout this election season, we stressed to voters the importance of knowing the candidates and their views. Now....even with 48% of voters unsure....the greatest televised opportunity to see and hear them is being denied.

Hearing and not hushing the voices of all candidates in the most consequential election in Wisconsin’s history is not only essential, but paramount! Only then will Wisconsinites be able to ‘truly’ have their vote count!
