**DANAE DAVIS RETIRING
FROM MILWAUKEE SUCCEEDS
IGNITES NEXT-GEN LEADERS AROUND COLLECTIVE
ACTION IN EDUCATIONAL EQUITY**

Danae Davis, Milwaukee Succeeds executive director, has announced she will retire in late fall 2022 after leading the communitywide initiative since 2015.

Part of the Greater Milwaukee Foundation, Milwaukee Succeeds supports a vision of cradle-to-career success that's centered on racial equity, community voice and changing systems.

Greater Milwaukee Foundation CEO and president Ellen Gilligan lauded Davis's vision and leadership.

During her tenure, Milwaukee Succeeds was able to align philanthropic support through a Funder's Collaborative supporting equitable educational outcomes in our community, as well as establish a collaborative leadership structure resulting in positive impact for children and families.

"Milwaukee Succeeds has added tremendous value to the Milwaukee community and will continue to do so as an embedded initiative of the Foundation focused heavily on early childhood education and centering young Black and Brown leaders in developing solutions for systems change in education," Gilligan said.

"I am grateful that Danae's

leadership has put Milwaukee Succeeds and the importance of education on the map locally and nationally with Strive Together, our national network partner."

Davis helped ensure that principles of anti-racism and community empowerment are central in Milwaukee Succeeds' current strategic focus on early childhood education and high school success.

"The Milwaukee Succeeds' collective impact model is an anchor and example to the community for how to bring people together within a sector to build effective systems, in this case from cradle-to-career," said Jackie Herd-Barber, former co-chair of Milwaukee

Succeeds.

"I am grateful for Danae's passion to bring education equity to all children in Milwaukee."

During the pandemic, Davis oversaw the development of the MKE Early Childhood Education Coalition that continues to be a force for building more equitable systems within the sector.

This collaborative approach helped Milwaukee providers stay open, keep staff employed and safely serve children.

Nearly half of Milwaukee providers reported they would have closed without support for which the coalition successfully advocated. This included:

Daniel Kaluuya, Keke Palmer and Brandon Perea costar in 'Nope'

NOPE

It came from
outer space. Or
somewhere.

Something's hovering over Otis Haywood's (Keith David, Barbershop) ranch in SoCal's parched Santa Clarita Valley. Otis comes from a long line of horsemen and is a noted animal wrangler for TV and film.

His son OJ (David Kaluuya, Get Out) works beside him and his stallions. That thing in the sky looks like it's swooping things up and propelling things down. They better be careful...

Jordan Peele has twisted the horror genre in several directions. In this instance, he veers off the path a bit, spending an inordinate amount of time setting up moments of dread.

Yes, there is some gore. Yes, bodies fly up and things are hurled down. Yes, some people are maimed or sucked away. But not in a well-measured out way.

Clocking in at 2h 10m, some may wish that Peele's script was more taut and the footage a bit tighter (editor Nicholas Mansour, Us).

That each moment was connected to something vital. Instead, there is lot of space in between the beats. You spend more time waiting to be scared and shocked than being scared and shocked.

And those shocks are accentuated by very loud sounds (sound designer Johnnie Burn). Noises that sometimes overshadow the visual effects.

And who is causing all the terror is never that clear, though their intentions are. OJ: "Ghosts out there acting all territorial."

The unidentified flying object that causes all the fright looks like a prop from a 1960s "Twilight Zone" episode—or a round casserole dish with a lid. In ways that's campy and

'See Me Because' Youth-Driven Art Campaign along Streetcar Route**

The Hop, presented by Potawatomi Hotel & Casino, recently unveiled a new partnership with Milwaukee Downtown, BID #21 and non-profit Art Start to bring youth-driven public art installations to Milwaukee.

Art Start's "See Me Because" initiative is a public transit art campaign providing historically marginalized youth from both Milwaukee and New York City with a large-scale platform sparking dialogue around youth identities

and self-determination in a public space.

During the month of August, seven Hop stations will display a series of black and white photographic portraits of local teens from both cities, accompanied by each individual's personal story as told in their own words

This effort in Milwaukee is part of the larger "Year of the Youth" campaign unveiled earlier this year by Milwaukee County Executive David Crowley, a collaborative effort between

the County, City and civic-minded organizations like Milwaukee Downtown, BID #21 to encourage and inspire Milwaukee youth by creating opportunities for mentorship, education, artistic displays, and much more.

"These young people have voices and achievements that ought to be known, and this is an opportunity to make that happen," Mayor Cavalier Johnson said.

Gilligan congratulates Davis for her commitment to building a shared leadership model that has brought many results to community. She says the Foundation is developing a transition plan to continue Milwaukee Succeeds' impact, and that she will appoint a special committee to conduct a local search for Davis's successor.

"I am proud of the positive influence Milwaukee Succeeds has advanced as an asset and embedded initiative within the Greater Milwaukee Foundation along with strategic partners in educational equity," Davis said, "The future is bright. Milwaukee Succeeds continues to evolve as a partnership model for systems transformation, capable of changing outcomes for Black and Brown children, youth and families. It has been widely reported that sleep deprivation can have a serious impact on daily behaviors, like driving a car.

The NHTSA estimates that in 2017, there were 91,000 police-reported car accidents that involved drowsy drivers, which led to the injuries of around 50,000 people and nearly 800 deaths.

GuntherMitsubishi.com conducted an analysis of 2022 County Health Rankings data to compare and determine which states in America are the most dangerous to

drive in, based on the following factors: the percentage of people who suffer from insufficient sleep, and the percentage of motor vehicle deaths per 100,000 people.

The data breakdown for each state also shows additional issues contributing towards dangerous driving conditions, including: the average traffic volume per meter of major roadways, the percentage of alcohol impaired driving deaths, and overall driving deaths within the state.

The data reveals that overall, California is ranked as the #1 most dangerous state in which to drive, considering a

combination of the aforementioned factors.

Wisconsin ranked in 30th position - making it among the safest states to drive in when it comes to drowsy drivers.

The Badger State has an insufficient sleep rate of 33%, combined with a 4.1% rate of motor vehicle deaths per 100,000 people.

The traffic volume per meter of major roadways is 597 and 36% of driving deaths involve alcohol.

Finally, the number of driving deaths in the state was 2,988 in 2019.

Dangers of Drowsy Driving

Lack of sleep can affect your attentiveness on the road, as well as negatively impact your coordination and judgement while driving. This is referred to as cognitive impairment.

Going too long without proper sleep can affect your driving ability in much the same way as consuming al-

old school.

In ways it doesn't hold a candle to other space oddities that have hovered over earth in movies like Arrival. OJ and his overly ram-bunctious and slightly annoying younger sister Emerald (Keke Palmer, Akeelah and the Bee) hatch a scheme to try and document the UFO.

A helpful and kinetic electronics store clerk (Brandon Perea, American Insurrec-

tion) and a nearly retired and very mystical cinematographer (Michael Wincott, Westworld) join their team.

Ricky "Jupe" Park (Steven Yeun, Minari), a ringmaster, runs a nearby family-themed cowboy park named "Jupiter's Claim."

There are clashes between the Haywoods and the park folks. Jupe's beef with the UFO is murky.

The Haywood's prime impetus for charting the mysterious object is monetizing

their 15 seconds of reality fame.

That's an error. Vengeance would have been a far more primal and compelling motive.

Debates will rage about the red herring storytelling, lapses and effects. But no one will argue about the spectacle.

The Santa Clarita Valley setting is a gorgeous and biblical canvas. Taupe colored sands and hills. Sparse vegetation. An ever-present

sun.

The impressive, photogenic geography is as iconic as the Durango, Mexico setting in John Houston's classic The Treasure of the Sierra Madre.

The moments when OJ gallops on horseback over dusty terrain are indelible.

And though the UFO itself may be dinky, visions of victims being sucked into it and churned up like ground beef will mess with viewers' heads.

When you hire cinematographer Hoyte Van Hoytema (Dunkirk) you know the visuals will be captured in perfect lighting, framed to perfection and composed like a painting.

When you enlist production designer Ruth De Jong (Twin Peaks) the sets will be evocative. Give costume designer Alex Bovaird (The White Lotus) purview over the clothes and they will be fly, like Yuen's dazzling red cowboy outfit.

You can count on composer Michael Abels (Bad Education) to create a dramatic musical score and rely on Stevie Wonder tunes to add verve.

Lead actor Daniel Kaluuya masterfully rides to the res-

cue on his steed like he's a matinee idol. Laconic. Stoic. Steely.

His facial expressions and eye rolls convey more thought and emotion than the script intended. Palmer is suitably energetic, but her irritating role does her a disservice.

Also, in one crucial scene, she jumps on a motorcycle and rides away like a Grand Prix racer, when nothing has ever indicated she has that skill set.

However, Kaluuya and Palmer have chemistry and their sibling banter feels real. Yeun is suitably tormented as a man suffering from boyhood trauma.

Perea's animated performance provides comic relief.

There's a better film hiding in this extravagant cowboy hor/mys/sci-fi. Peele's followers and horror fans may ignore the lulls and remember the thrills.

Others may feel frustrated waiting and waiting for something to happen. Does Nope deserve the patience it requires? Viewers will decide.

NEW STUDY SHOWS BLACK VOTERS ARE CONCERNED WITH NATION'S ECONOMY

"Our communities are increasingly dissatisfied with how economic issues are being addressed at the state level and at the federal level," said Alicia Garza, CEO of Black to the Future Action Fund.

The Black to the Futures Action Fund released on Thursday the findings of its year-long temperature check poll, which shows that Black America is most concerned with the state of the U.S. economy.

Activist and study organizer Alicia Garza, of the Black to the Future Action Fund, told theGrio, "The number one issue for Black people in America is economics."

"Our communities are increasingly dissatisfied with how economic issues are being addressed at the state level and at the federal level," said the co-founder of Black Lives Matter.

She added that out of 6,000 Black Americans that were surveyed, it was made clear that Black voters, "have the same concerns and are increasingly dissatisfied with whether or not

those concerns are being addressed or how those issues are being left to the wayside."

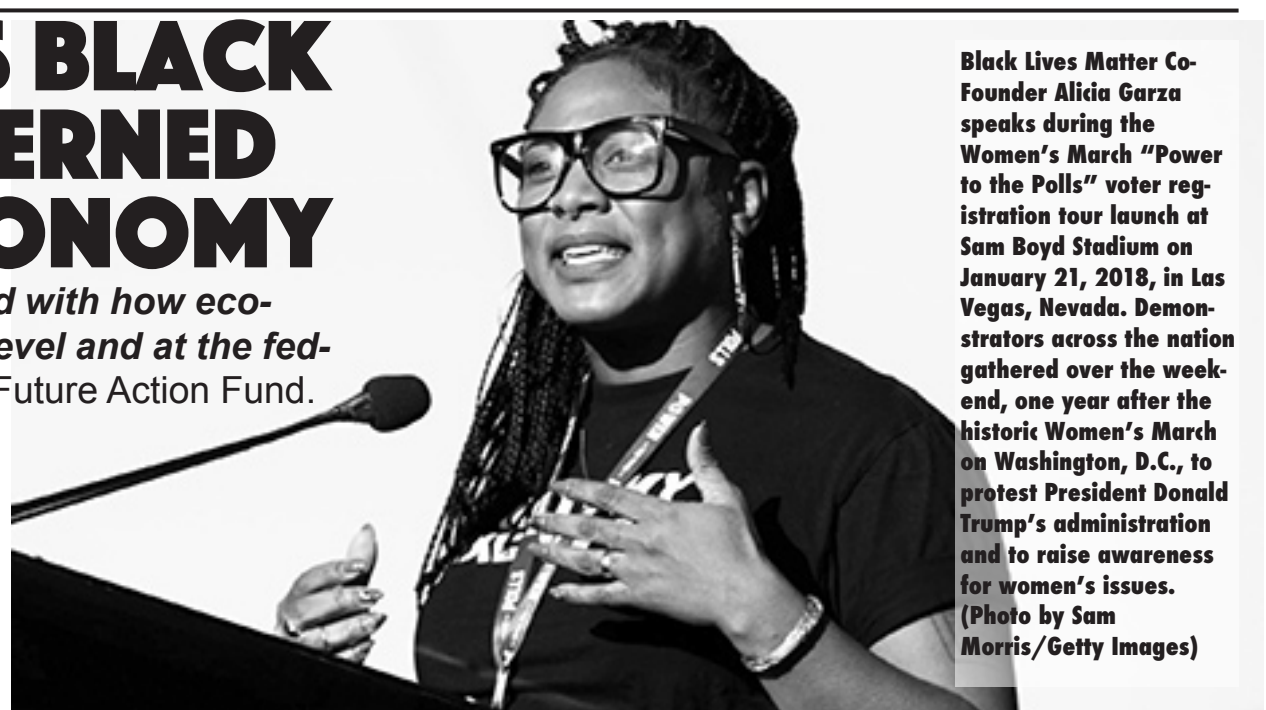
The Temp check polls are considered to be the largest recurring survey of approximately 6,000 Black adults in the United States, conducted bimonthly from July 2021 to May 2022.

Garza told theGrio that the goal of the study is to provide the Biden-Harris administration, elected officials and midterm campaigns with irrefutable data to address the needs of the Black community.

"As we head into the midterm elections, it is absolutely not a guarantee that the strongest constituency of the Democratic Party is going to be an anchor again for the Democratic Party," she cautioned. "That has severe consequences, as you know, in this political climate."

This survey comes as

cohol.

In fact, being awake for at
least 18 hours without sleep
has around the same cogni-
tive impact as a blood alcohol
content of 0.05%. Stretching
these limits, being awake for
at least 24 hours with no
sleep is the same as having a
blood alcohol content of
0.10%, which is higher than
the legal BAC limit of 0.08%
across all states.

Drowsy driving can be a re-
sult of a driver who hasn’t had
enough sleep; or who has an
untreated sleep disorder.

It can also be a result of the
side effects of medication,
shift work, or alcohol con-
sumption.

Even if the driver doesn’t fall
asleep behind the wheel,
drowsiness can impair their
ability to drive by affecting
their level of alertness, slow-
ing down their reaction time,
and impacting their decision-
making abilities.

Not only is this a hazard to
the driver themselves, but also to
other road users and pedes-
trians.

President Joe Biden and Vice Pres-
ident Kamala Harris are seeing the
worst approval rating that any pres-
ident or administration has seen in re-
cent years.

Deborah Scott, CEO of Georgia
Stand Up, told theGrio that the survey
shows that the Biden administration’s
low approval rating is due in part to
the rise in inflation, including “gas
prices and affordable housing.”

“You can’t even find affordable
housing here in Georgia,” said Scott.
“We know that these issues are
kitchen table issues that our voters
are concerned about.”

She added, “They’re concerned
about how they can get their families
to work, how they can get decent food
and health care for their communities.

So we know that these kitchen table
issues affect every single Black
woman [and] Black family in Georgia.”

On Thursday, the Bureau of Eco-
nomic Analysis released its quarterly
report on the U.S. gross domestic
product, revealing that the economy
shrank for two consecutive quarters
— a usual indicator of a recession.

A day before the report was re-
leased, White House Press Secretary
Karine Jean-Pierre doubled down on
the administration’s position that the
country is not in a recession.

“I don’t think the U.S. is currently in
recession. I think there are just too
many areas in the economy that are
doing well,” said Jean-Pierre.

That same day, the Federal Re-
serve raised interest rates for the
fourth time this year to drive down in-

flation. However, Fed Chairman Je-
rome Powell similarly maintains that
the U.S. “is not in a recession.”

When it comes to an answer to the
question if we are in a recession,
Marc Morial, president and CEO of
the National Urban League, told the-
Grio, “It is premature to saber rattle
about a recession — inflation just like
unemployment impacts Black people
disproportionately.”

Meanwhile, he stated there are
areas of concern. “We are facing
slower growth but the [Federal Re-
serve] must avoid creating stagfla-
tion,” he said.

Morial warned that “high unemploy-
ment and high inflation simulta-
neously,” is a recipe for a recession.
