## President Biden Deserves Credit, Not Complacency

We all have heard the popular expression, "give credit where credit is due." After hearing numerous critics over the past 18 months, it is refreshing to see President Joe Biden finally getting the credit he deserves for what is one of the most productive starts to a presidential term in recent history.

The Financial Times' Associate Editor Ed Luce recently wrote an opinion piece entitled, "The unexpected triumph of Joe Biden: Recent legislative successes suggest a good political system in good working order, but complacency is misplaced."

Mr. Luce made the case for why President Biden's star is rising, but warned that despite his impressive legislative record, voters may not give him the credit he deserves because too many people respond more to style than substance.

I agree with Mr. Luce's assessment. Our media-driven culture seems to rate words and deeds that generate headlines over those that make headway. Joe Biden, and those of us who support him, prefer putting people over politics.

When President Biden took office, the country was in the grip of a global pandemic.

Businesses were shuttering, schools were closing, and people were dying. The country needed leadership. Unfortunately, we had a showman at the helm when a statesman was

needed. Forty-five was pre-occupied with scoring political points and securing media hits. And when voters were given a chance to express themselves, by a margin of nearly seven million votes, they chose statesmanship over showmanship.

Joe Biden was sworn in on January 20, 2021. On that day, the country's unemployment rate was 6.4 percent. COVID-19 was infecting 193,030 Americans a day and people were dying at a rate of 3,167 a day.

From day one, Biden focused on shoring up the shaky foundation left by the previous Administration.

On March 11, 2021, less than two months after he took office, President Biden signed the American Rescue Plan (ARP) into law. It accelerated the American economic recovery by putting money in people's pockets, getting children back in school and lifting nearly half of them out of poverty.

The ARP also prevented evictions and foreclosures for millions of America's families, kept hundreds of large businesses open and reopened thousands of small businesses.

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## George Gary Retires and Columbia Savings & Loan Forges Ahead with Tradition

We have reported on Columbia Savings and Loan many times over the MCJ's 46 year history.

It remains the oldest Black business in Milwaukee. Created by the late Ardie and Wilbur Halyard in 1924, Columbia's history predates many of the Milwaukee families who have made Milwaukee's Black community a historical and industrial anomaly.

Mrs. Halyard was an accountant with the accounting knowledge from a professional standpoint, but it was the vision of Mr. Halyard and some members of Calvary Baptist Church who understood the economics of community development and gathered to

explore ways to make money stay within the community, while also benefitting the investors.

Sanctioned and licensed by the State of Wisconsin on September 24, 1924, the savings and loan has weathered many political administrations, recessions, boom years and staffing crises due to deaths.

Handpicked by Mrs. Halyard, George Gary, just retired from the president's position after 48 years of committed service at Columbia Savings. On Thursday, July 21, an overflow crowd attended the retirement reception where salutes and accolades flowed freely, each acknowledging how much he had contributed to the institution and Milwaukee.

Gary graduated from Jackson State University in Jackson, Mississippi in 1973, and was accepted into a management training program sponsored by the United States Savings and Loan League, a trade association for all savings association and the American Savings and Loan League, a trade association for minority savings and loan associations.

The two associations collaborated, and identified

over people's needs and voted unanimously against this legislation.

Democrats put people over politics and started building a foundation for the country's recovery.

The second corner of Biden's foundation came on November 15, 2021, when he signed into law the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.

This legislation made historic investments in our crumbling and outdated infrastructure.

It invested in high-speed internet, clean drinking water, a resilient electric grid, replacing lead pipes, making a down payment on clean energy transmission, and charging stations for electric vehicles.

These infrastructure investments are creating jobs and strengthening critical links in our supply chain.

During all of this, President Biden nominated the

first Black woman to the United States Supreme Court, a Black woman to the DC Circuit Court of Appeals, and 26 other Black women to various federal courts, more than the combined total of all previous Presidents.

President Biden continued working, away from public view, to help get the final two corners of his foundation solidified, and on August 9, he signed the CHIPS and Science Act into law.

This third corner of his platform restores America's standing as a global science and technology leader by providing the resources and tools needed to make more products like semiconductor chips here at home. It will create good-paying jobs, invest in building a more diverse workforce, and bolster our supply chains.

The fourth and final corner of the Biden platform,

the Inflation Reduction Act, passed the Congress with every Democrat voting for it, and every Republican voting against it. Under this new law, signed by President Biden on August 16, Medicare recipients will see their out-of-pocket prescription drugs capped at \$2,000 annually and their cost of insulin capped at \$35 monthly.

It reduces the cost of health care for 13 million Americans by extending the Affordable Care Act subsidies for more than three years with an average savings of \$800 per year. The new law includes provisions to increase taxes on corporations, address cli-

mate change, and decrease the prices of prescription drugs.

It invests in environmental justice by cleaning up legacy pollution most often found in communities of color and provides tax credits to ensure nuclear energy producers can continue to provide clean energy for consumers.

The IRA will require corporations to pay a minimum tax of 15 percent and reduce the deficit by \$300 billion over the next decade.

As Mr. Luce warns us, "complacency is misplaced." Voters should see this "good political system in good working order" as motivation to go to the polls to support more positive progress. President

mate change, and decrease the prices of prescription drugs.

The IRA will help cut climate pollution by 40 percent by 2030, while building a new, clean energy economy and creating nine million new jobs.

Biden is finally getting some of the credit he is due. And, he and my fellow Democrats will continue putting the American people over partisan politics.

## WHITE HOUSE FINALLY UNVEILS PLAN TO CANCEL STUDENT LOAN DEBT FOR MILLIONS OF AMERICANS

The Biden-Harris administration announced on Wednesday its much-anticipated plan to cancel student loan debt for millions of borrowers after more than a year of deliberations.

President Joe Biden is set to deliver remarks at the White House on Wednesday afternoon to unveil his administration's plan to provide up to \$20,000 in debt cancellation to Pell Grant recipients and

up to \$10,000 in debt cancellation to non-Pell Grant recipients. Borrowers who earn less than \$125,000 per year or households earning less than \$250,000 are eligible for debt cancellation.

larger associations countrywide willing train African Americans candidates for one year to work in the savings and loan industry. Upon completion, they could remain with the training institution or seek employment with a minority institution that might benefit from the management training.

Upon coming to the city, Gary began training with First Federal Savings and Loan. Six months into his training, he and another employee represented First Federal at an Urban League luncheon, where he was introduced to Mrs. Halyard. He shared with her information about the management training he was receiving at First Federal.

As the First Federal training was coming to an end, he contacted Mrs. Halyard, who hired him at Columbia Savings and Loan in 1974 as an assistant manager in charge of mortgage lending. He was promoted to president and chief executive officer in 1991.

Old Milwaukeeans will remember the likes of Ardie Halyard, Board Chair; and Husie Colbert, Dale Phillips, Calvin Beckett, Grant Gordan, Robert W. Starns and Thalia B. Winfield, who was Columbia's board president at that time, and whom Gary worked with.

Each was a community 'thought leader' in their own right and a collaborative ready to catapult the savings and loan into a larger economic role of financial equity and development.

With an aggressive board and a desire to utilize all of the skills and talents he learned, Gary began his tenure at Columbia.

When asked to reflect upon his nearly half-century of leadership at Columbia Savings and Loan, Gary was quick to note his highlights. And what highlights they are!

During his 48 years in the industry, the community saw the creation of two Black banks that—for a short time—did very well, but ultimately failed, while Columbia continued to sail, often quietly and efficiently, with the reserves needed to navigate the many fiscal ups and downs that sunk the other banks.

Over-extension of loans compared to retention of reserves to balance bad loans often destroys financial institutions. Gary stated: "our customers have been loyal to Columbia Savings and Loan; many of them for 50 years and more. They are commended for staying with the institution and permitting that stability in savings to be used for safe loans, and fiscal growth."

Gary is a pinnacle of Milwaukee's finance community. He continues

## HIGHLIGHTS DURING THE GEORGE GARY COLUMBIA SAVINGS AND LOAN PRESIDENCY

**1. HOME FINANCING:** "Many professionals were seeking financing to purchase homes in Milwaukee and surrounding suburbs, such as Glendale, Brown Deer, Mequon, Wauwatosa, Thiensville, River Hills, and Waukesha. Millions were extended to those new homes."

**2. INTEGRATION OF NEIGHBORHOODS:** "Halyard Park's Central City Suburban Housing was the brainchild of Beechie Brooks and United Realty Group. They took a blighted neighborhood and constructed 43 new homes. Initial financing was provided by Columbia Saving and Loan Association for various style homes with modern lighting, baths, pristine lawns and flower gardens. It remains today and is a model of modern financing that eroded stereotypes of Blacks and their home choices. Halyard Park is bound by Garfield Avenue on the North Side, Brown Street on the South, Fourth Street on the East and Halyard Street on the West. The owners still love their area and their real estate appreciation continues."

**3. INCREASED PERSONAL SAVINGS:** "Major Savings Campaigns were initiated to help Black families save and learn how to parlay their savings into lines of credit, IRA's and instruments. Many children began their first savings accounts at Columbia Savings and Loan with piggy banks cracked right on site. College savings and weddings, and first-time homebuyer trainings were initiated at Columbia Savings and Loan."

**4. BLACK CHURCHES:** "Many churches began in small quarters and grew along with their memberships. This required either building new sanctuaries or purchasing many churches that White congregations left behind."

**5. BLACK TAVERNS AND OTHER SMALL BUSINESSES:** "The heyday for Black taverns were crushed with the creation of the Potawatomi Casino (now Potawatomi Hotel & Casino) and new restaurants with free drinks. Before Potawatomi, neighborhood taverns were the hangouts for many residents and dating couples. Columbia offered restoration and decorating loans."

to envision Milwaukee's Black community with increased economic development opportunities.

"Many of the younger entrepreneurs have a good handle on creating and serving customers with the products they need," Gary said. "We expect Columbia Savings and Loan to be a part of new generations, and that's exciting."

"Columbia now has a new president who brings new technology that

will invite new customers into the fold," he continued. "And it is incumbent that the institution not only continue but thrive and be that game-changer for Milwaukee well into the future."

Now looking forward to days when he and his wife can 'sleep-in,' or head to the Dells, or the golf course, he welcomes retirement. Gary suffered a stroke a couple of years ago; but with therapy and continuous exercise, he believes he shall have many good years to contribute through mentoring, perhaps sitting on a board or two, and trips to his family farm in Mississippi, he chuckled.

We wish he and his family many happy years together. "Years of singular focus now permit time with the wife, our son, and our wonderful grandchildren who bring us joy. Both are in college now and doing well. We're happy to still be a part of their lives."

In closing, Gary reiterated: "Columbia Savings and Loan has been a tenured example of Black business. Its successes multiply in employment, in neighborhood stability and in providing the visual presence that builds institutional pride."

"Columbia Savings and Loan dispelled a lot of stereotypes about building in the central city. If carefully planned and implemented, it can be safely accomplished. Many new buildings over the last 48 years have been directly associated with our board saying, 'yes.'"

Milwaukee Community Journal, celebrating 46 years, took its first \$5,000 of profit and placed it at Columbia Savings and Loan. That savings account has remained throughout the years. It has slowly increased in value and is a reserve counted upon for loans.

"It is imperative to keep Columbia Savings and Loan on the 20th and Fond du Lac Avenue location," Gary stressed. "In 1973, there were approximately 150 Black banks in the United States. Today there are 15."

"We shall never have economic independence and financial sufficiency without the institutions that will make loans to us when larger banks will not."

"Even during the pandemic, when businesses and churches closed, failed, and some are just coming back, we never had a single loan to stop or drop us. Many know the role that a Black institution plays in keeping our businesses and families secure."

For these reasons and all mentioned before, we salute George Gary, immediate past President of Columbia Savings and Loan. We applaud his years of commitment to financing and servicing our community. And we acknowledge his devotion in building a better, stronger Milwaukee.

Thank you, Mr. Gary.

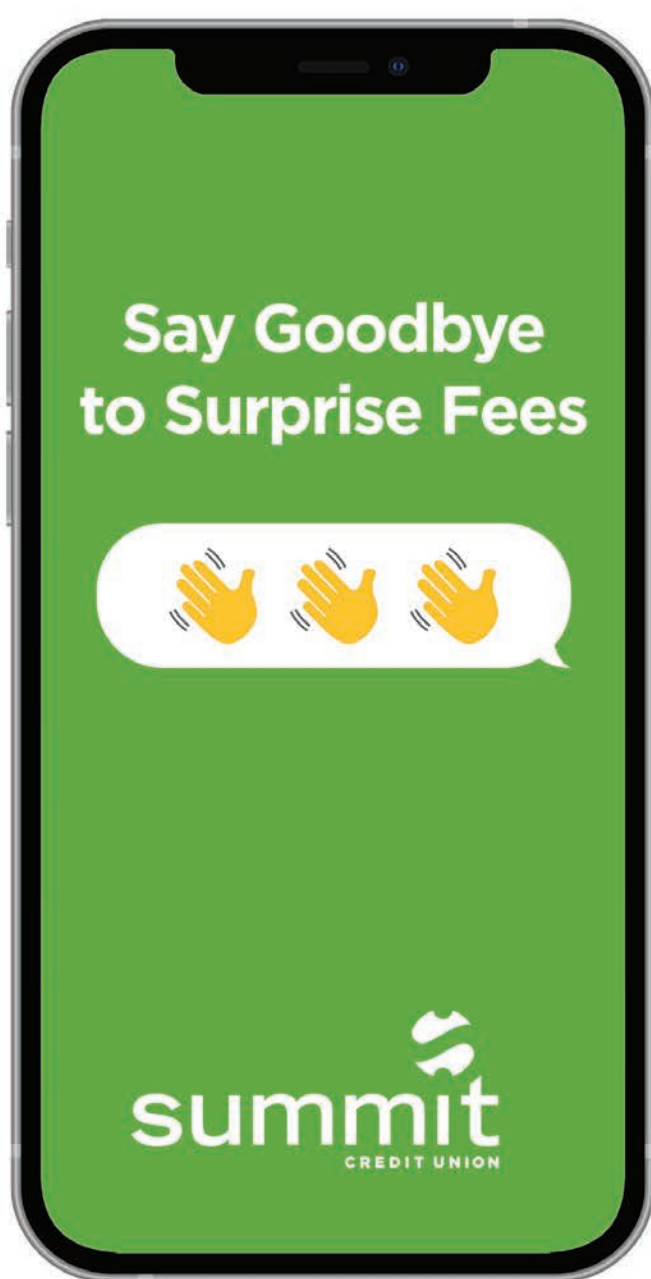

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## 10TH NATIONAL BLACK BREASTFEEDING WEEK STARTS AUGUST 25

MomsRising applauds the founders of Black Breastfeeding Week, and joins advocates around the country in celebrating 10 years of this awareness-raising week, which highlights the importance of breastfeeding and chestfeeding in Black communities.

Black Breastfeeding Week is August 25 through August 31 this year.

For 10 years, Black Breastfeeding Week has shifted the narrative by creating a movement and lifting up the stories of families.

This year's theme, "10 Years: A New Foundation," honors the new foundation of lactation support built

on racial equity, community engagement, and cultural empowerment.

During Black Breastfeeding Week, MomsRising is intensifying its work to collect signatures urging the U.S. Senate to pass the PUMP Act and support those who are without any breastfeeding protections at work – including many teachers, nurses, and others not covered by the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Lack of workplace accommodations and paid family and medical leave, as well as lack of lactation support are enormous barriers to breastfeeding.

The Centers for Disease Control

and Prevention reports that increased breastfeeding would decrease infant mortality in our country.

This year's baby formula shortage put the issue of infant nutrition into high relief, making it more important than ever for parents to be able to make choices about how to feed their babies.

But Congress has not passed President Biden's proposed investments in maternal and infant health.

And in June, U.S. Sen. Cynthia Lummis (R-Wyo.) blocked passage of the PUMP for Nursing Mothers Act – a badly needed bill that would expand workplace protections for nursing parents.

The U.S. House of Representatives passed it last October.

"Breastfeeding is good for moms and babies, and it's past time Congress pass the PUMP Act, to help meet the needs of breastfeeding families," said Tina Sherman, Senior Campaign Director for Maternal Justice at MomsRising. "We are thrilled to celebrate 10 years of Black Breastfeeding Week.

We will continue to fight for solutions to the maternal and infant health crisis, and measures that allow every parent to have access to the quality health care, support and workplace protections they need to thrive."

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years after taking on the debt.

"Black students are more likely to have to borrow for school, more likely to take out larger loans and more likely to receive Pell Grants," the senior official said.

The official projected that even before applying the additional \$10,000 in debt forgiveness for Pell Grant recipients, the typical Black borrower will "see their balance cut nearly in half, and more than one in four Black borrowers will see their balance forgiven altogether."

The White House's announcement falls short of demands from some members of Congress and advocates who have called for \$50,000 in student loan forgiveness. However,

President Biden has consistently supported only canceling \$10,000 in debt.

The \$10,000 versus \$50,000 amount has been a point of contention.

Even after reports indicated Wednesday's announcement, some Black leaders continued to express dissatisfaction, arguing that \$10,000 was not enough to provide relief for Black borrowers.

"If student debt repayments can be paused over and over and over again, there's no reason why the President cannot cancel a minimum of \$50,000," tweeted NAACP President Derrick Johnson.

Johnson pointed to the Biden-Harris campaign promise to "forgive all undergraduate tuition-related federal student debt from two- and four-year public colleges and universities and private HBCUs and MSIs for debt-holders earning up to \$125,000."

Johnson said Biden's "decision on student debt cannot become the latest example of a policy that has left Black people, especially Black women, behind."

He added, "This is not how you treat Black voters who turned out in record numbers and provided 90 percent of their vote to once again save democracy in 2020."

But members in Congress who were staunch advocates for \$50,000 in student loan debt cancellation were less critical.

Rep. Ayanna Pressley (D-Mass.), who has been a leading voice in Congress to cancel a minimum of \$50,000, released a statement Wednesday applauding President Biden's announcement.

The congresswoman said the

"We urged the President to make good on his promise to cancel student debt and bring meaningful relief to our families in this moment of overlapping crises—and today he acted," said Pressley.

## WHEDA Foundation extends 2022 housing grant deadline to Sept. 15

MADISON—Organizations throughout Wisconsin that provide emergency shelter, transitional residences, and extremely low-income housing have more time to apply for grants from the WHEDA Foundation with the deadline extension to September 15.

"So much uncertainty exists in the construction industry, including supply chain issues, rising costs for materials, and a shortage of construction providers – factors making it difficult for grant applicants to acquire the necessary bids to apply," said Elmer Moore, CEO and Executive Director of the WHEDA Foundation.

The three-week application extension is intended to help ensure the Foundation receives high-quality proposals that meet the housing needs of Wisconsin's most vulnerable residents.

The funds aim to improve housing for community members with complex needs such as individuals who have developmental or intellectual disabilities, people who are experiencing intimate partner violence, individuals with incomes at or below 30 percent of the area median income, youth experiencing homelessness, and people with mental and behavioral health conditions.

The extension does not change the timeline for reviewing and deploying the funds before the end of the year as communicated in the previous request for proposals.

Organizations that have already applied do not need to resubmit applications.

## National Action Network Responds to Biden Student Debt Cancellation

NEW YORK, NY– The National Action Network (NAN) today responded to the Biden administration's decision to eliminate \$10,000 in student debt for borrowers earning \$125,000 or less.

NAN Senior Vice President of Policy & Strategic Partnerships Ebonie Riley and NAN Youth Leaders issued the following statement:

"Today's announcement opens the door for a long overdue conversation about building wealth. Canceling student debt is a cornerstone of a comprehensive vision that helps everyone. Not acting would have kept another generation from reaching their full potential because of the crushing debt they took on in hopes of greater opportunity.

Black households carry more student debt regardless of their incomes after graduation. Approximately one in four Black Americans have negative net worth — meaning their total debt exceeds their total assets. The Administration expects the first \$10,000 of debt relief will move over half a million Black Americans from a negative to a positive net worth.

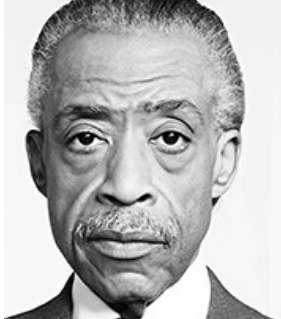
While this is undoubtedly a historic day, there is still more work to do. The \$125,000 income cap will leave a large amount of the population behind, especially in an era of high inflation. A Black doctor or attorney who earns above the cap could very well have six-figure student debt. Low levels of cancellation might leave already distressed Black borrowers struggling with repayment. Those who may qualify for loan forgiveness after several years of working in the public service field through the Public Service Loan Forgiveness program still face long delays when applying.

Therefore, canceling \$50,000 of student loans could eliminate a substantial amount of student loan debt for tens of millions of borrowers and, in some cases, all their debt. Student debt lingers for decades; some student loan borrowers are having their Social Security checks garnished. Solutions should include the entirety of the issue.

Which is why we call on Congress to provide relief by passing legislation to further build upon the President's actions."

Rev. Al Sharpton, Founder and President of NAN, issued the following statement on the Administration's announcement:

"President Biden's actions follow through on a campaign promise that will hopefully allow many Americans to build wealth. This is a hopefully first step in a long journey toward getting millions of Americans out of the debt that has prevented them from becoming economically empowered. It is incumbent upon the President and Congress to work together to cancel more student debt as well as find new opportunities for people to earn and succeed."
