As Black jobs see decline this Labor Day, Biden labor sec. says job market should still be celebrated

Labor Day traditionally and historically is meant to celebrate the American worker. As U.S. Labor Secretary Marty Walsh tells theGrio, the recent years of the coronavirus pandemic have demonstrated the value of workers, particularly those deemed “essential” during the height of the U.S. shutdown of 2020 and 2021.

According to a report from the Center for Economic and Policy Research, Black and brown workers overrepresented most occupations within frontline industries.

“People should take a moment to think about the sacrifices that [they] have done for this country to move the workforce forward,” said Walsh.

As the Biden-Harris administration has touted, the United States has recovered 20 million jobs initially lost during the pandemic. Even as there is a celebration of the nation’s workforce, this Labor Day falls at a time when the nation’s unemployment rate stands at 3.7% – 0.2% higher than the month prior, according to the August jobs report from the U.S. Department of Labor Statistics.

What’s more, the historically high Black unemployment rate also

Dept. of Education Seeking Loan Forgiveness Applications by November 15

Following President Joe Biden’s announcement canceling student loan debt of up to \$20,000 for specific borrowers, the U.S. Department of Education said applications for relief under the plan should be submitted by Nov. 15.

Department officials said they’ve made the application process simple, and if borrowers fail to apply by Nov. 15, they’d still have until the end of 2023 to file for forgiveness.

However, by waiting until after Nov. 15, borrowers risk having to resume payments after the federal pause in repayment ends on Dec. 31.

Biden said it’s vital for the more than 43 million eligible borrowers to take advantage of the loan forgiveness plan.



“All this means people can start to finally crawl out from under that mountain of debt to get on top of their rent and utilities, to finally think about buying a home or starting a family or starting a business,” Biden stated.

And while earlier reports revealed that about 13 states could still tax borrowers on the amount of debt forgiven, Mississippi and Virginia are the latest to come off that original list as officials said they would refrain from levying taxes on individuals who receive loan forgiveness.

How do you know if you’re eligible for debt cancellation? Here are the criteria set forth by the Department of Education:

Your annual income must have fallen below \$125,000 (for individuals) or \$250,000 (for married couples or heads of households)

If you received a Pell Grant in college and meet the income threshold, you will be eligible for up to \$20,000 in debt cancellation.

If you did not receive a Pell Grant in college and meet the income threshold, you would be eligible for up to \$10,000 in debt cancellation.

What does the “up to” in “up to \$20,000” or “up to \$10,000” mean?

Your relief is capped at the amount of your outstanding debt.

For example: If you are eligible for \$20,000 in debt relief but have a balance of \$15,000 remaining, you will only receive \$15,000 in relief.

What do I need to do to receive loan forgiveness?

Nearly 8 million borrowers may be eligible

Findley Foundation and clinic to offer back-to-school shots

The Findley Foundation, which operates the Findley Medical Clinic, will provide immunizations at its Back To School Community Event on Saturday, Sept. 10, from 1 to 5 p.m., at the Trinity Baptist Church parking lot, 2829 N. Teutonia Ave.

There will be Immunizations for COVID-19; influenza; tetanus-diphtheria-pertussis (TDAP); and measles, mumps and rubella (MMR). Tests for lead poisoning in the blood also will be provided.

“As our children return to the classroom, where they will be in close proximity to each other, it’s important that all members of the family are brought up to date with their vaccines,” said Dr. Stephanie Findley, founder and managing director of the Findley Medical Clinic,.

Up to 200 families will each receive free food and book bags filled with school supplies at the event.

Findley said the event will make the updated versions of the Pfizer-

rose. The August 2022 Black unemployment rate stood at 6.4 %. The recent jobs report shows Black workers were the only

group in the demographic breakdown that saw a labor force participation decline.

The employment-population ratio for Black Americans also

fell.

Walsh confirmed that the Black “under” employment rate is the “second highest” followed behind that of Native Americans. Still, the labor secretary sees a silver lining in the economy.

“You have labor participation involvement up. You have people that want to join the union up. We have almost record numbers of people going back to work since the pandemic began,” he said. “We’re investing in American workers to make sure ... that it’s an equitable recovery. And that’s something that, again, we can celebrate on Labor Day.”

The most recent labor reports show non-farm payrolls rose by 315,000 jobs in August, just below the Dow Jones estimate for 318,000. And the unemployment rate was two-tenths of a percentage point higher than expectations. Wages also rose this year, with average hourly earnings up 5.2% from a year ago.

Walsh said he is also expecting

BioNTech and Moderna second booster vaccines for COVID-19 available to patients. The updated versions, which recently received federal approval, target the original virus, as well as the recent omicron variants,

known as BA.4 and BA.5.

The Pfizer-BioNTech second boosters will be available for anyone age 12 or older. The Moderna second boosters will be available for all adults.

Families also can receive vaccinations, booster shots and more at the Findley Medical Clinic, 10721 W. Capitol Drive, Suite 110, in Wauwatosa. The clinic has provided more than 6,600 COVID vaccinations and boosters thus far.

The clinic tries to accommodate walk-ins, but appointments are encouraged by calling 414-988-3079. Health insurance is not required to receive treatment.

In addition to COVID vaccines, other services provided by the clinic include primary care, urgent care, case management, behavioral health, medication management, family planning, laboratory services, food resources/pantry, housing resource, vocational training and more.

Fifty-five percent of the patients served by the Findley Medical Clinic are Black, Hispanic, Asian or Native American. Many would not otherwise have access to health care.

People or organizations interested in donating for the supplies at the community event are encouraged to contact the clinic at 414-988-3079.

to receive relief automatically because relevant income data is already available to the U.S. Department of Education.

If the U.S. Department of Education doesn't have your income data, the Administration will launch a simple application available by early October.

Please sign up on the Department of Education subscription page if you want notification of when the application is open.

Once borrowers complete the application, they can expect relief within 4-6 weeks.

Everyone is encouraged to apply, but there are 8 million individuals for whom the Education Department has data and who will get the relief automatically.

Borrowers are advised to apply before Nov. 15 to receive relief before the payment pause expires on Dec. 31, 2022.

The Department of Education will continue to process applications as they are received, even after the pause expires on Dec. 31, 2022.

Report Reveals 'A Hidden Key to Combating Racial and Ethnic Disparities in Juvenile Justice'

According to new Sentencing Project research, diverting youth from juvenile court involvement should be a central focus in reducing racial and ethnic disparities. It also should improve outcomes in America's youth justice systems. The report's author wrote that getting arrested in adolescence or having a delinquency case filed in juvenile court clearly damages young people's futures and increases their subsequent involvement in the justice system. "Compared with youth who are diverted, youth who are arrested and formally petitioned in court have a far higher likelihood of subsequent arrests and school failure," wrote Richard A Mendel, Senior Research Fellow and Youth Justice at the Sentencing Project. "Pre-arrest and pre-court diver-

sion can avert these bad outcomes," Mendel concluded. According to Mendel's research, Black youth are far more likely to be arrested than their white peers and far less likely to be diverted from court following arrest. Other youth of color – including Latinx youth, Tribal youth, and Asian/Pacific Islander youth – are also less likely than their white peers to be diverted. "The lack of diversion opportunities for youth of color is pivotal because the greater likelihood of formal processing in court means that youth of color accumulate longer court histories, leading to harsher consequences for any subsequent arrest," Mendel asserted. "Expanding diversion opportunities for youth of color, therefore, represents a crucial, untapped opportunity to address continuing disproportionality in juvenile justice," he noted. The in-depth analysis of the ju-

venile justice system's unequal and limited use of diversion from court involvement, particularly for Black youth, found that in 2019, 52% of delinquency cases involving white youth were handled informally (diverted), far higher than the share of cases diverted involving Black youth (40%). The report found the glaring disparity between Black and white youth in every major offense category. "Overwhelming research finds that diverting youth from the court system yields better outcomes for young people's futures and public safety," Mendel insisted. "Yet diversion remains sorely underutilized, especially for youth of color, and unequal treatment in diversion is a key driver for even larger disparities in confinement later in the process." Released on Aug. 30, the report, "Diversion: A Hidden Key to Combating Racial and Ethnic Dispar-

ities in Juvenile Justice," examined decades of research showing how educational, career and public safety outcomes are better for youth diverted away from juvenile courts. It provided a primer on diversion and its impact on racial equity – specifically, the report revealed that: Compared to youth formally involved in court, youth diverted from court have a far lower likelihood of subsequent arrest. They also are far less likely to be incarcerated, commit less violence, have higher school completion rates and college enrollment, and earn higher incomes in adulthood. Mendel found that disparities in diversion result both from subjective biases against youth and families of color and from seemingly neutral diversion rules and practices that cause disproportionate harm to youth of color either by unnecessarily limiting eligibility for diversion or by making it difficult for youth of color to complete diversion successfully. Many states and localities have recently adopted new strategies to expand and improve diversion, many of which show substantial promise, Mendel further discovered. "However, efforts to expand diversion opportunities to date have most often lacked an explicit and

determined focus on reducing racial and ethnic disparities – an essential ingredient for success," he added. In his conclusion, Mendel said the evidence leaves no doubt that the justice system "is toxic for youth and should be employed only in cases when young people pose a serious and imminent threat to the safety and well-being of others." "For most young people, diversion yields better public safety and youth development outcomes than formal processing in juvenile court – and for much less money," he wrote. However, youth of color are not being offered diversion in the same numbers as white youth. "Racial and ethnic disparities at diversion play a significant role in propelling system-wide disparities and represent a key reason why efforts to improve equity in juvenile justice have achieved so little progress to date," Mendel added. For all these reasons, the diversion stage of the juvenile court process should be a top priority for youth justice reform, he stated. "Advocates should push for, and system leaders should take aggressive action to address the disparities highlighted in this report," Mendel wrote. "Combined, the reforms recommended here to expand the use

of diversion and to enhance supportive community-led programming for diverted youth offer perhaps the most important and promising avenue currently available to reduce disparities and to improve youth justice systems nationwide."

RESEARCHERS: FAILURE TO GET PROPER REST COULD BE HAZARDOUS TO YOUR HEALTH

A staggering 90 percent of people fail to achieve a good night's sleep, according to new international research presented at the European Society of Cardiology (ESC) Congress 2022. The study found that suboptimal sleep was associated with a higher likelihood of heart disease and stroke. The authors estimated that seven in ten of these cardiovascular conditions could be prevented if everyone was a good sleeper. And while researchers homed in on the sleep behaviors of 7,200 people — comprised mostly of Europeans — Americans also aren't sleeping. Black Americans suffer worse from short sleep or sleep apnea. Earlier this year, the JAMA Open Network indicated that the problem continues to worsen for African Americans. JAMA researchers discovered that Black Americans get less sleep than white people, a deficit of 15 minutes a day in childhood that grows into almost an hour in adulthood. Additionally, an Oxford study found that far more Black and Hispanic people than white people report routinely getting less than 6 hours of sleep, well short of the recommended 7 to 9 hours for adults. "Sleep is a privilege," Dayna Johnson, a sleep epidemiologist at Emory University, told Science.org. "If we can target sleep, we might be able to reduce the burden of all types of diseases among racial minorities."

Science Direct found that more than a dozen studies have identified racial discrimination as a contributor to sleep disparities. "Black people reported more discrimination and more severe insomnia symptoms than white people, and a statistical analysis determined discrimination accounted for 60% of their insomnia severity," researchers wrote at Science Direct. Researchers also discovered that environmental factors also cut into sleep. For example, multiple studies have found that Black, Hispanic, and other individuals of color tend to reside in areas where they are exposed to approximately twice as much ambient light at night as white people. "Exposure to artificial light from the street and commercial buildings has been found to suppress melatonin—a hormone that helps initiate sleep," Researchers wrote. "That causes people to fall asleep later at night, resulting in poorer sleep overall." Science.org also found that Black, Hispanic, and Asian people in the United States are also exposed to disproportionately high levels of particulate air pollution. The researchers reported that exposure to this type of pollution can cause inflammation of the nose and throat, and some evidence suggests chronic exposure can worsen sleep apnea and increase daytime sleepiness. "And then there is night-time noise, which a 2017 study at hundreds of sites across the United States

Why is white ice assumed to be colder?...

(Editor's note: Given that September marks the 46th anniversary of Your Community Journal, we thought it appropriate to run a series of randomly selected columns, all of which are relevant today. The following column was aptly written during Labor Day Week, 37 years ago.)

For every dollar coming into the Black community, less than a dime touches two or more 'colored' hands before exiting.

The other 90 cents is spent at White businesses outside the community. This startling statistic alone explains, to a great extent, the economic and cultural crisis facing Black America.

Though we can boast of having a combined income of nearly \$202 billion annually—only seven percent goes to a Black business.

The probability of those dollars recirculating in the community is about equal to your child being drafted into the NBA.

For the record, if 30% of our hard-earned Black dollars circulated three times before exiting our community, we would cut unemployment in half, increase Black businesses 10-fold, and triple home ownership within a year.

The Black community cannot boast of having the type of businesses to make itself self-sufficient—no auto dealerships, grocery stores, or even laundry mats. There is only one Black gas station, no four-star black-owned restaurant, and the only Black clothing stores sell zoot suits that fall apart 30 minutes after you put them on.

The only profitable Black businesses are barber/beauty salons and churches. And the former may eventually go out of business if sisters keep buying wigs, and the latter suffers from declining membership.

Ask most ‘radio revolutionaries,’ and they will blame this dichotomous situation on institutional racism.

But that 'handicap' could be quickly resolved if we combined civil rights with ‘silver rights’ and practiced what we preached.

Let's start with the cancer of self-hatred and internalized prejudice and put our money where our rhetoric is. In other words, the greatest obstacle we face today is the belief many of us share that ‘white ice is colder.’

If our nation within a nation is satisfied with things as they are, then so be it.

If, on the other hand, we genuinely wish to someday control our own destinies, we must push aside apathy and ignorance, stereotypes, and self-hate. We can start immediately by joining the growing parade of civil rights groups and national leaders and take the bull by the horns. The first step along that journey would be participating in the NAACP's economic demonstration, set for Labor Day week.

For the third consecutive year, the NAACP urges Black folks to participate in a far-reaching demonstration dubbed 'Black Dollars Days.'

The NAACP encourages us to showcase our community's economic strength and flexibility this week.

Another purpose is to sensitize the white business community to the purchasing power of Black consumers by using \$2 bills and Susan B. Anthony dollar coins when making purchases.

It's as simple as that.

Many central city financial institutions are expected to have an additional \$2 bills and Susan B. Anthony coins on hand this week. The NAACP and other campaign supporters are asking us to use them to pay as many of our regular bills as possible.

Likewise, you are encouraged to ask for \$2 bills when cashing your check to pay for small purchases, including restaurant bills, groceries, and overnight parking tickets. (Hmm, that last item would send a message to city hall regarding that 'poor people's tax.')

The impact of collective demonstration, believe it or not, could have far-reaching consequences.

'Respect is not given; it is earned,' explained Chris Belnavis, president of the local branch of the NAACP.

"As consumers, we give more to White Corporate America than any

other group in this country. But what do we receive in return?"

Whether you want to believe it or not, the Black community almost totally depends on White Corporate America for its survival.

Most Black businesses must work with their White counterparts for subsistence.

Most Black people are employed by White businesses.

(I'm an exception, having worked for a Black business all my adult life. I also utilize a Black bank, invest my meager savings in black-owned savings and loan--Columbia---and exclusively utilize a Black plumber, electrician, painter, carpenter, and mechanic.

I married a Black woman and had Black children to complete the circle. Had it survived, I would have had them delivered at the Black hospital and celebrated with a beer from our now-defunct Black-owned brewery.)

Black businesses have died because they could not get contracts from White businesses or discovered their MBE contract went to a white female company classified as a minority.

In the private sector, our survival is more often the result of public relations than a genuine interest in diversity.

The problem, for the most part, can be attributed to a lack of respect from many companies.

It's a fact that most White corporations subcontract with a 'minority' because the government makes it a condition of their contract. If they didn't have to, they wouldn't. Racism and bigotry play a role, but so does prejudice. Many major corporations view Black businesses through identical prisms as most of you who think their service or products are inferior.

Conversely, many other White corporations know they can secure a 'get out of jail free' card by contributing to a Black cause or organization. It's no coincidence that many of the corporate tables purchased at the NAACP freedom fund dinner are empty, or the tickets are given away. Think about it.

Whether you realize it or not, most major white corporations would not survive without Black dollars. Thus, it is in their interest to project the illusion that they care about us ‘dumb darkies.’

Black Dollars Days, and the NAACP's Fair Share Agreement program, are intended to break those barriers and expose the hypocrisy.

"The fact of the matter is, we need each other to survive," Belnavis posited. "But we are ignored, forgotten because they assume we will always spend our money with them.

"Most White corporations don't know how economically powerful we are. Black Dollars Days is a demonstration to show them."

Last year, Black Dollar Days, with only limited publicity, resulted in \$20 million in Susan B. Anthony coins and \$2 bills being exchanged.

NAACP National Economic Development Director Fred Rasheed anticipates reaching the \$30 million mark this year, which is only a drop in the bucket.

"We need to get a reward for our contributions to the economic well-being of this country," Belnavis declared.

"We support corporate America, and now, we want our fair share back in terms of jobs, contracts, and economic investments."

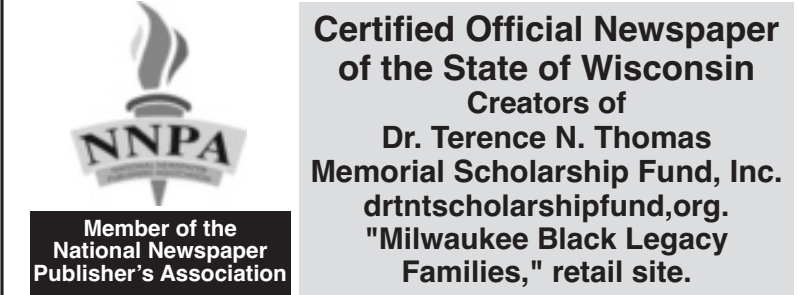

RESEARCHERS: FAILURE TO GET PROPER REST COULD BE HAZARDOUS TO YOUR HEALTH

found is higher in neighborhoods with a
higher proportion of Black residents,” they
wrote.

The low prevalence of good sleepers “was
expected given our busy, 24/7 lives,” said
study author Dr. Aboubakari Nambiema of
INSERM (the French National Institute of
Health and Medical Research), in Paris,
France.

“The importance of sleep quality and quan-
tity for heart health should be taught early in
life when healthy behaviors become estab-
lished. Minimizing night-time noise and stress
at work can both help improve sleep.”

According to a news release from the ESC,
previous studies on sleep and heart disease
have generally focused on one sleep habit,
such as sleep duration or sleep apnea, where
breathing stops and starts while sleeping.

Researchers in France used a healthy sleep
score combining five sleep habits. They inves-
tigated the association between the baseline
sleep score, changes over time in the sleep
score, and incident cardiovascular disease.

Researchers recruited men and women aged
50 to 75 years and free of cardiovascular dis-
ease to a preventive medical center between
2008 and 2011.

The average age was 59.7 years, and 62%
were men.

Participants underwent a physical examina-
tion and completed questionnaires on life-

style, personal and family medical history, and
medical conditions.

According to the news release, researchers
used questionnaires to collect information on
five sleep habits at baseline and two follow-
up visits.

Each factor was given 1 point if optimal and
0 if not.

A healthy sleep score ranging from 0 to 5
was calculated, with 0 or 1 considered poor
and 5 considered optimal.

Those with an optimal score reported sleep-
ing 7 to 8 hours per night, never or rarely hav-
ing insomnia, no frequent excessive daytime
sleepiness, no sleep apnoea, and an early chro-
notype (being a morning person).

The researchers checked for incident coro-
nary heart disease and stroke every two years
for a total of 10 years.

At baseline, 10% of participants had an op-
timal sleep score, and 8% had a poor score.

“During a median follow-up of eight years,
274 participants developed coronary heart dis-
ease or stroke,” according to the release.

The researchers analyzed the association be-
tween sleep scores and cardiovascular events
after adjusting for age, sex, alcohol consump-
tion, occupation, smoking, body mass index,
physical activity, cholesterol level, diabetes,
and family history of heart attack, stroke, or
sudden cardiac death.

They found that the risk of coronary heart
disease and stroke decreased by 22% for every

1-point rise in the sleep score at baseline.

More specifically, compared to those with a
score of 0 or 1, participants with a score of 5
had a 75% lower risk of heart disease or
stroke.

The researchers estimated the proportion of
cardiovascular events that could be prevented
with healthier sleep.

They found that if all participants had an op-
timal sleep score, 72% of new cases of coro-
nary heart disease and stroke might be
avoided each year.

Over two follow-ups, almost half of the par-
ticipants (48%) changed their sleep score: in
25%, it decreased, whereas, in 23%, it im-
proved.

When the researchers examined the associ-
ation between the change in score and cardio-
vascular events, they found that a 1-point
increment over time was associated with a 7%
reduction in coronary heart disease or stroke
risk.

“Our study illustrates the potential for sleep-
ing well to preserve heart health and suggests
that improving sleep is linked with lower risks
of coronary heart disease and stroke,” Dr.
Nambiema stated in the release.

“We also found that the vast majority of
people have sleep difficulties. Given that car-
diovascular disease is the top cause of death
worldwide, greater awareness is needed on the
importance of good sleep for maintaining a
healthy heart.” —Stacy M. Brown
