**Editor's Note:** Recently, Milwaukee Community Journal Editor Thomas Mitchell, Jr. interviewed Rev. Greg Lewis (pictured above), founding president of Pastors United and "Souls To The Polls," an initiative created by

Pastors United to mobilize residents and eligible voters of Milwaukee's Black community to vote in local and national elections and defend voting rights.

The one-on-one interview took place at the

offices of the Community Journal and was taped by Souls To The Polls for use online. The MCJ will upload an edited version in the very near future.

Mitchell and Lewis discussed the upcoming November 8 elections and its urgency given what is at stake: Democracy itself!

This is the first of a three-part series based on the video taping. Three questions were asked of Rev. Lewis. Below is the first, which asked about the importance of the November 8 midterm and the importance of voting.

This printed version of the interview has been edited for clarity and context.

**Mitchell, MCJ:** Usually the Midterms are downplayed by voters and even some media. However, there's a lot at stake because of the Supreme Court decision on 'Roe v. Wade' and how that will impact other decisions coming down the pike from the U.S. Supreme Court, which is leaning heavily conservative.

**For those who need to be reminded, what makes these midterm elections different**

**from past midterms; how important is it to vote period?**

**Rev. Lewis:** Well, you know, midterms in our community are always difficult because people don't really pay much attention to politicians and their need for votes.

It doesn't resonate with most people because they're thinking about where they're going to live, what they're going to eat, how they're going to raise their children, what school are they going to if they're going to school?

All those things are resonating in the lives of our community members right now. Secondly, to talk about midterms is a little too sophisticated for folks who don't really even believe in the process and aren't thinking about it.


And then thirdly, we have to remind folks that there's going to be a vote on November 8th because most folks don't even know there's going to be a vote.

This place (MCJ offices) is located on King Drive. If you go outside right now and ask people walking by this building if they know what's going on November 8th, I can guaran-

## DEVIN WILLIAMS FACES ADVERSITY WITH WINNING ATTITUDE

Milwaukee Brewers relief pitcher Devin Williams will greet you with a warm, friendly smile and a firm handshake.

But, as the saying goes, never confuse kindness for weakness. No sir, not with this young man. Deep inside his competitive fires burn very brightly, even more so since August 1st of this season.

That was the day the Brewer's traded away their record-breaking lefty closer Josh Hader to the San Diego Padres. The trade left many Brewers fans scratching their heads and it also thrust Williams, whose previous role was primarily the eighth inning set-up pitcher, into the role of closer for Milwaukee. He's now "The Man." The pitcher whose job it is to slam the door on the opponent and seal the victory.

Williams and his teammates were surprised by the trade but if anything the added pressure has only bolstered Williams' con-

tee you that 70 to 80 percent won't even have an answer.

That's why we have to 'light-up' the city with information about voting. Because, first of all, we've got to get into the habit of voting. I hate to say this, but we can't even worry about who you are voting for.

We need to gradually get into a sophisticated frame of mind about what (and who) we're voting for, who we're voting for, and even get to the point where we have our own candidates to vote for, because right now, we kind of vote for who they (the political parties) give us.

Sometimes we have to vote for the lesser of two evils. That's what's happening right now.

So these midterms are especially important because if Wisconsin is not keeping the present governor (Tony Evers) in place, then all kinds of state voting rules and laws will be made and passed,

which will further frustrate anybody who is even considering voting.

And I'm talking about those who never vote, those who may vote, and those sophisticated voters who vote all the time.

There'll be a lot of suppression bills and laws put in place so that people will have to go an extra mile just to vote. Registering to vote now, it's almost like you need a college education.

I mean, it's easy to vote...if you understand the Internet, because now you can only register to vote if you do it yourself.

There used to be a time when they would train registrars and they would come to you and register you to vote. Now, you have to do that online.

We need to keep Gov. Evers in place to fight those suppression laws. That's paramount because we're talking about voting, right? We need

to change that Senate seat (currently held by Republican Sen. Ron Johnson, who is facing a stiff challenge from Wisconsin Lt. Gov. Mandela Barnes). Not because it's a Democrat or Republican seat, but because if we don't, the U.S. Senate will continue to be a stumbling block for laws and advantages for Black and Brown citizens.

You know, we're not even sure that they can't take away the Black vote because they haven't passed the bill or law to make sure that Black folks are secure in voting. We haven't even done that here (in Wisconsin).

So that's why we need to have that (senate) seat so there would be 50 votes; and that the vice president would make the difference in getting laws and bills passed that will just be passed to treat people fairly in America.

That's huge for the future of our young folks.

## AFRICAN AMERICAN ROUNDTABLE DEMANDS JOINT PUBLIC BUDGET HEARING

During a recent joint public budget committee hearing, and backed by members of the community, the African American Roundtable (AART) called on the city to 'defund the police' and shift a percentage of its tax dollars in order to expand other city services.

"Over the last three years, hundreds and hundreds of residents have continued to demand that you defund the police," said Markasa Tucker-Harris, executive director of the AART.

"Will you continue this reckless behavior by walking us down the aisle of bankruptcy, or will you fund libraries, fund the people, and fund our needs?"

The city's 202 budget—which was unveiled by Mayor Cavalier Johnson last week—calls for the cuts

for four libraries and the temporary closing of the Martin Luther King, Jr. branch, which saves just \$2 million dollars, while the police department budget is increasing by \$20 million.

Tucker-Harris says cutting libraries deprives communities of access to literacy support, internet access for people searching for jobs, and spaces for communities to gather. She added that this 'status quo' budget continues the trend of funding police at the expense of every other department and will lead Milwaukee to bankruptcy.

In a press statement following the hearing, the AART noted that during this budget process, four aldermanic districts are without representation, which means 160,000 residents will not have a voice in this budget. This shortcoming is the reason why AART is demanding 'participatory budgeting.' Ryeshia Farmer, community program manager of the AART said, "We're demanding participatory budgeting to give people decision-making power to improve their lives."

We ask that all residents join us in our fight to defund the Milwaukee Police Department to fund our libraries, neighborhoods, housing, mental health services and support participatory budgeting.

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

fidence. "Yeah, I mean, like you said, it was a little unexpected," said the soft-spoken Williams. "But I mean, as far as my preparation

and my mindset, I don't think I've changed at all.

"Taking the same mindset that I had in the 8th inning, and just moved that an inning later. Just continue to pitch the way I pitch.

"Some adjustments had to be made in terms of my pitch sequencing, but I think I've adjusted pretty well.

"I mean, even when he (Hader) was here, I had six saves while he was here. So I mean, it's not like I really hadn't done it before. But yeah, I mean, I think I've fared pretty well in the opportunities that I've been given.

"I really just had one bad outing, I would say, when there was a save opportunity on the line. So I mean, six out of seven is pretty good."

As of this writing Williams has a 6-3 record with 95 strikeouts, a sterling 1.64 ERA and 15 saves.

Beyond baseball, Williams is a guy who uses his competitive experiences in harmony with how he approaches life. What advice might he give especially to young people today who have

to face all kinds of unprecedented challenges as they make their way and seek to make their mark in life?

"Embrace it," Williams says with no hesitation. "Pressure is a privilege. When life gives you those opportunities for you to step up, just challenge yourself to meet what's asked of you."

Without question, the Brewers have had a challenging season in 2022.

But it's something that Williams has relished as the team pushed for a spot in the Wild Card playoffs.

"I think at this point we just need to focus on winning every game that we can," said Williams.

"It's just going to take us coming into every day, being ready to go and doing whatever it takes to get eight more wins. Can't really control what the other team's doing, but we can control what we're doing.

"I mean, even if we end up not making it, I think finishing strong and giving it everything we've got, it'd just really be good for the guys coming back next year."

## DirectConnectMKE promotes 100+ job openings following the latest drive-thru job fair

DirectConnectMKE posts 100+ new hiring and job training opportunities available to local job seekers across Milwaukee's seven leading industries following the City of Milwaukee's successful September Drive-Thru Job Fair.

The City of Milwaukee's Drive-Thru Job Fair on September 22 experienced a large turnout, drawing in 310 local job seekers in-person. The Common Council Office of Workforce Development manages DCMKE, which gave away a total of 510 job seeker resource bags at this September event, of which 200 were distributed to ten Direct Service Providers to give to their walk-in clients. This effort is conducted collaboratively with partners from established employment service agencies. Each bag contained information from 67 corporations and three employment service agencies on competitive wage rates, recruiter contact, minimum requirements, and subsidized job training. As a virtual extension of the drive-thru job fair, DCMKE has posted these opportunities on their platform for job seekers to apply, including jobs in hospitality, manufacturing, healthcare, warehousing, transportation, IT and construction.

According to Jason Thompson, Workforce Outreach Specialist



with the Office of Workforce Development, "This event provided a way for local Skill Seekers from challenged and underserved neighborhoods to safely acquire access to information empowering them to make informed career decisions. Through collaboration with our several community partners, we have found a way to use technology and social media to

overcome the challenges we have all faced since the pandemic's onset."

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The Milwaukee Police Department recently unveiled a new initiative that will help LGBTQ+ community and human trafficking victims feel safe.

Called the 'Safe Place' program, the MPD will work with businesses and social organizations to make the community a safer place.

Businesses will have 'Safe Place' stickers in their windows alerting LGBTQ+ youth that their establishments are a place to seek refuge if they are in an 'unsafe' situation.

Once inside the 'Safe Place' the individual or business can then call 911 for assistance or just relax till the threat is no longer present and it's safe to leave.

"This is an important step Milwaukee needs, and has needed for

opportunities, as available jobs remain high with two job openings for every unemployed person. In response to new job openings becoming available, job seekers' engagement on DCMKE is strong and growing.

DCMKE targets young adults, and adults looking for career opportunities by providing network access with various local workforce agencies, employers and employment service agencies throughout the city. Job seekers who were unable to make the event can still benefit from DCMKE's resources and opportunities by downloading the application for free to kick off their fall job-hunt.

a long time," said Brad Schlaikowski of Courage MKE, which helps homeless and displaced LGBTQ+ youth.

Schlaikowski added the 'Safe Place' initiative will go a long way to help people realize they do have a place to go if in trouble.

"(For) too long we've seen folks from our community—especially Black trans women—being hurt, harmed and—more sadly—murdered throughout our country," Schlaikowski said.

Two Black trans women have been killed in Milwaukee this year. One person is under arrest for one of the murders and could also be charged with a hate crime.

The man was arrested at his south side home last week. The other murder suspect is still being sought.

"Being able to be a beacon to those who are being harmed; who are suffering is the first place to start," said Milwaukee Police Chief Jeffrey Norman.

"If I'm walking past a building, and there's this sticker is the window that's blatantly saying, come in here—we'll protect you—it's a no brainer and it's a win for the city," Schlaikowski added.

"This program is another great example of the Milwaukee community coming together in the name of community safety, regardless where you are from, what language you speak, what religion you believe in, or who you love," Norman said.



The bandshell at St. Ann Center was the site of a celebration recognizing the community organization recently receiving a national Phoenix Award for the transformation of the Bucyrus Campus property at 2450 W. North Ave. Mayor Cavalier Johnson and other dignitaries were on hand to offer remarks as St. Ann celebrated this noteworthy honor.

There were also songs by childcare kids and adult clients of the care facility.

Named for the mythical bird that was reborn out of ashes, the Phoenix Award for Brownfields Excellence, presented at the Brownfields 2022 Training Conference celebrates sites that have brought new life to previously developed sites compromised by harmful substances.

The Bucyrus Campus received the award as the best project out of thousands developed in EPA Region 5, which includes Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota and Ohio.

This is the second Phoenix Award to be given in the Milwaukee area. There are thousands of brownfields across the U.S., many in urban areas.

The land on which St. Ann Center rests was once a brownfield that sat vacant for 50 years after homes and businesses there were razed for a freeway spur that



was never built.

Lead paint, home heating oil tanks and other debris contaminated the soil on the site.

Purchased from the city for just \$1, St. Ann—with grants from the U.S. EPA and WEDC (including the help from other partners)—undertook a massive clean up, removing most of the contaminated soil (what’s left is now sealed under the clean clay and topsoil that was brought in.

The clean-up brought new life to the property, opening new possibilities for outdoor activities for St. Ann’s adult day clients and childcare classes, as well as for neighborhood outreach events, like St. Ann’s second annual pumpkin giveaway (scheduled for October 15), and their summer-long Inaba Nights free concert series.

While St. Ann Center’s mission is primarily about caring for people, Lonergan noted that “one of our Franciscan principles is to take care of the Earth” and that this soil cleanup has allowed St. Ann Center to provide better care and more opportunities for people, both for the children and clients it serves and the neighborhood.—*Photos by Pat Robinson, Patch.com contributed to this story*



## Findley Medical Clinic has answers to parents’ questions about preventing and treating COVID-19 among children

WAUWATOSA— The Wisconsin Department of Health Services’ COVID-19 Response and Recovery Team continues to work on improving COVID-19 vaccination rates among the youngest population in Wisconsin.

As of Sept. 28 in Wisconsin:

- 62.7 percent of 12 to 17-year-olds have received at least one dose.

- 31.7 percent of 5 to 11-year-olds have received at least one dose.
- 9.3 percent of newborns to 4-year-olds have received at least one dose.

“It can be difficult and confusing for parents to track the latest and greatest recommendations for COVID-19 prevention and treatments as their children grow older,” said Dr. Stephanie Findley, founder and director of the Findley Medical Clinic in Wauwatosa at 10721 W. Capitol Drive, Suites 110 and 210.

The Findley Medical Clinic recommends parents follow the guidelines established by the American Academy of Pediatrics.

The clinic is staffed by doctorate-prepared nurse practitioners who collaborate with the clinic’s medical director, a physician with extensive experience.

The clinic provides COVID-19 vaccinations and booster shots for patients of all ages.

The Findley Medical Clinic accepts same-day appointments and scheduled routine care. The clinic is open Mondays through Saturdays by appointments. Walk-ins are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.



## MONKEYPOX TESTING AND VACCINATION EFFORTS RAMP UP IN MILWAUKEE

The Milwaukee Health Department and local organizations are ramping up efforts to encourage individuals who may have come into contact with monkeypox to get tested.

“If you know you’ve been exposed and if you have any symptoms, get tested immediately,” said Kirsten Johnson, Milwaukee Health Commissioner.

Those symptoms include fever, headache or other flu-like symptoms or lesions or a rash that become blisters, she said. As of Sept. 6, the city has had 25 confirmed cases of monkeypox.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration released information on Sept. 12 warning that TPOXX, the antiviral medication currently being used to treat monkeypox, may lose its effectiveness as the virus mutates.

In response, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention stated that the medication should only be used on those with severe symptoms.

The Milwaukee Health Department currently offers the vaccine to those 18 and older who live or work in Wisconsin and meet one of the following criteria:

People with contacts identified by public health officials via case investigation, contact tracing and risk exposure assessments.

People with a known sexual partner in the past 14 days who was diagnosed with monkeypox.

People who attended an event or venue where monkeypox exposure occurred or plan to attend an event or venue where monkeypox exposure is a risk.

Any men who have sex with men, trans men and women as well as gender non-conforming/non-binary individuals who have or expect to have multiple sexual partners.

Health care personnel who perform testing to diagnose or work directly with Orthopoxviruses – a grouping that, besides monkeypox, includes smallpox and cowpox – and health care providers working in sexual health clinics or other specialty settings directly caring for patients with sexually transmitted infections.

So far, the Health Department has administered more than 1,200 doses, Johnson said. The vaccine is being offered without appointment at only the Menomonee Valley Drive-Thru Clinic, 2401 W. St. Paul Ave.

The city hopes to also offer the vaccine at two additional clinics soon, Johnson said.

Center recently announced that it has a limited supply of the monkeypox vaccine and is offering it to at-risk veterans.

Johnson said those who are apprehensive of getting the vaccine, shouldn’t be.

“It has been around for a while, it’s safe and can prevent you from getting monkeypox,” Johnson said.

In addition to vaccination efforts, Johnson said the city has also been working with local partners, including those who work with the LGBTQ community, which is most at risk for monkeypox, to increase testing.

Ruthie Weatherly, clinic operations manager for Brady East STD Clinic, or BESTD, said her organization offers monkeypox testing



expensive, so picking the right insurance plan that meets your individual or family needs can be critical to maintaining a balanced budget.

## BLACK CENSUS PROJECT

### Aiming to Make History with Largest Survey of Black People Ever

*Ahead of Midterm Elections, the Black Census Project ramps up to engage 250,000 Black People about Core Issues Facing the Community*

ATLANTA— The second iteration of the Black Census Project is underway and picking up steam ahead of the November election cycle.

The single largest surveying of Black people since the one conducted in coordination with the 1972 Black National Convention, the Black Census Project is an opportunity for Black people around the nation to identify the issues, needs and ideas that must be addressed for Black communities to thrive, not just survive.

A project of Black Future’s Lab, founded and led by Alicia Garza, the Black Census is a survey-style questionnaire, the results of which will inform a comprehensive Black Policy Agenda.

“The data collected from the Black Census is intended to be an advocacy roadmap for organizers, community members, policymakers, and thought leaders,” said Garza, who founded Black Futures Lab in 2019.

“We know that the answers to the most urgent questions, along with the best solutions to the issues impacting our people, exist inside of our communities.

“So, the Black Census is a conversation amongst us and about us, that will harness the power of our collective insight to drive political, economic and social change.”

Since its launch, the Black Census Project garnered tremendous support from civil rights institutions, grassroots organizations, advocacy groups, elected offi-

cials and celebrities alike.

National partners for this year’s Black Census include the NAACP, When We All Vote, Color of Change, National Black Justice Coalition, Black Women’s Roundtable, National Action Network, Black Voters Matter, Until Freedom, and many others.

Black voices to be so deeply involved in the creation of legislation and strategy that could change the lives of so many of our people,” said Dr. David Johns, Executive Director of the National Black Justice Coalition. “We have an opportunity to put our power, brilliance, and solutions on full display.”

Those partnering with the Black Census Project believe that the voices of Black people around the nation deserve to be heard, prioritized and utilized in

making decisions to address systemic oppression.

“Now more than ever, it’s important that we center and uplift the needs of our people, our communities,” said Cliff Albright, executive director of Black Voters Matter.

“In partnership with the Black Census Project, Black Voters Matter will continue our work of listening to, mobilizing, and educating our people to reimagine what power looks like.


“That all our voices are heard, that we are properly represented by those who have our best interests. The fight continues and we are committed to doing the necessary work to support Black voting power.”

The goal of reaching 250,000 Black people is not an arbitrary one, according to the Black Census team. If, in fact, that many people or more complete the survey, it will become the largest surveying of Black people, of any kind, in history.

“This Black Census is an opportunity for Black people across regions, age, gender identity, religion, class and political affiliation, to talk about what we need for our collective political and material conditions to change for the better,” said Angela Rye, Principal and CEO of IMPACT Strategies and a member of the team leading this year’s Census.

“But it also helps us understand how to better care for one another inside of our communities. We can’t wait on legislation to create more equity for the most vulnerable among us.”

## Court’s decision to provide white juvenile offenders with shorter sentences shows bias, lawyer says

*The decision abandoned a precedent issued just a year earlier in which the court said — in the case of a white defendant — that such lengthy punishments for juvenile killers were unconstitutional because it left them no chance of a meaningful life outside prison*

SEATTLE (AP) — The attorney for a Black man serving a virtual life sentence for shootings he committed at 17 has asked the Washington Supreme Court to reconsider a split ruling that upheld his sentence, saying the leniency it granted white defendants in similar situations reveals racial bias.

The court last month upheld the 61-year sentence for Tonelli Anderson, 45, over forceful dissents from four justices.

The decision abandoned a precedent issued just a year earlier in which the court said — in the case of a white defendant — that such lengthy punishments for juvenile killers were unconstitutional because it left them no chance of a meaningful life outside prison.

“When this Court makes decisions reflecting racial bias, it must review and correct them,” Travis Stearns, an attorney with the Washington Appellate Project, wrote in a motion filed last week. “Because this decision reflects such a bias, this Court should reconsider its decision and provide Tonelli with the same relief white litigants who appeared before this Court received.”

On Monday, three civil rights organizations — the Fred T. Korematsu Center for Law and Equality at Seattle University School of Law; the Juvenile Law Center, based in Philadelphia; and Huy, which supports indigenous inmates in the Pacific Northwest — filed a friend-of-the-court brief saying the decision was also wrong because it failed to account for the youthful defendant’s capacity for rehabilitation.

Anderson was 17 when he shot two women, killing one and blinding the other, during a drug robbery in Tukwila in 1994. An accomplice also shot and killed a man at the same home.

Anderson was not immediately arrested, but went on to commit other crimes as a young adult, including assault and robbery, and he wrote letters to girlfriends bragging about the shootings. It wasn’t until 1998, after someone tipped off investigators about the letters, that he was charged.

He was convicted of first-degree murder in 2000 and sentenced to 61 years. Following federal and state rulings that children must be treated differently by the justice system, he was granted a new sentencing hearing in 2018. The judge gave him the same term, finding Anderson had not shown the shootings reflected “transient immaturity.”

In recent years, the Washington Supreme Court has taken further steps restricting what sentences can be imposed on children.

In 2018, the justices held that it violated the state Constitution to sentence 16- or 17-year-olds to life in prison without parole. That ruling came in the case of Brian Bassett, a white man who killed his parents and brother when he was 16. Bassett has since been resentenced to 28 years.

Last September, the court struck down a 46-year sentence for Timothy Haag, a white man who was 17 when he drowned his 7-year-old neighbor. In that case, a six-justice majority held that juvenile murder defendants must be given “a meaningful opportunity to rejoin society after leaving prison.”

Nevertheless, the court last month rejected Anderson’s request for a new sentencing. Justice Debra Stephens wrote for the 5-4 majority that such virtual life sentences for juveniles are barred by the state Constitution only if their crimes “reflect youthful immaturity, impetuosity, or failure to appreciate risks and consequences.”

Anderson’s was not such a case, Stephens said.

The dissenting justices said it was nonsensical that the court would find a 46-year sentence for a white 17-year-old to be an unconstitutional “de facto” life sentence, while upholding a 61-year sentence for a Black 17-year-old.

Justice Mary Yu wrote it would be “willfully oblivious” to conclude race played no role.

“Bassett and Haag are both white. Anderson is Black,” Yu wrote. “Bassett and Haag were both recognized by this court as former juvenile offenders capable of redemption and rehabilitation, and they were ordered to be resentenced accordingly. Anderson has been denied any such recognition and resentencing, contrary to the law and the evidence.”

The King County Prosecutor’s Office, which opposed granting Anderson a new sentence, is due to respond to Anderson’s motion for reconsideration by Oct. 17. The office previously urged the justices to overturn the decisions in the Haag and Bassett cases, saying they were incorrectly decided. Anderson’s youth did not play a significant role in his crimes, it argued.
