Wisconsin's elephant in the room, EDUCATION!

National report card on education reveals Badger state's score fell below pre-pandemic numbers!

MADISON — Gov. Tony Evers, who likes to fancy himself the “Education Governor,” has an education problem.

The U.S. Department of Education on Monday released the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) on reading and math, and the results once again show the widest achievement gap between black and white students in the country.

While Wisconsin fared relatively better than most states, scores dropped from where they were pre-pandemic — more evidence of the damage caused by Evers’ school lockdowns and his silence while his teachers union pals kept schools closed.

“Today’s NAEP scores make one thing clear: the Evers administration’s school shutdowns have been catastrophic for our children,” said Quinton Klabon, Senior Research Director for the Institute for Reforming Government.

NAEP, known as the Nation’s Report Card, tests a sample groups of fourth- and eighth-grade students in math and reading. Monday’s report card was the first issued since 2019.

While Wisconsin finished among the top 10, the state’s test scores were down from 2019, and the number of students proficient in math and reading dropped from 45 percent to 43 percent. Nationally, the average fourth-grade math score declined by 5 points to its lowest level since 2005. The average eighth-grade math score dropped by 8 points to its lowest level since 2003.

Wisconsin Department of Instruction Superintendent Jill Underly celebrated Wisconsin’s results. She said public education is still recovering from the pandemic.

“The results released today reiterate trends we have seen across the nation as students continue to recover from learning disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic,” Underly said. “Recovery is a continuous journey, and we haven’t yet reached a destination we are satisfied with, nor do we just want to return to where we were before.”

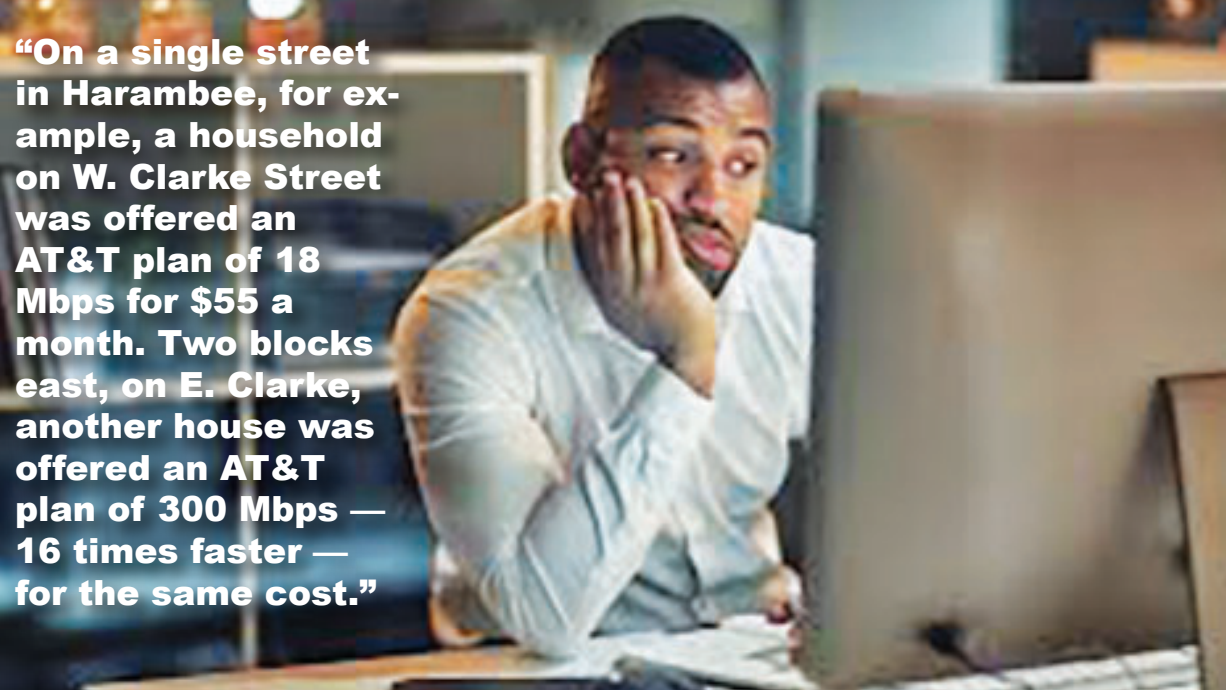
Students are recovering from poor policy choices and teacher union stooges like Underly who failed to follow public health guidance that urged schools to reopen. Milwaukee Public Schools and other union-heavy districts continued to operate failed remote learning models long after research was showing the damage being done to children — academically, socially, and mentally.

The latest report card shows;

- Wisconsin has the largest racial achievement gap of any state in the nation
- Black kids in MPS are last in the nation in reading
- Kids in MPS are two years behind kids in Chicago, New York, Los Angeles, and Atlanta

“Although our state tests have indicated this, we now know where Milwaukee stands with other major U.S. cities,” said state Sen. Alberta Darling (R-River Hills), chairwoman of the Senate’s Education Committee, “This is heartbreaking, our kids deserve better and instead we have bureaucrats fighting bipartisan reforms while schools continue to try the same failed methods that got us

Poor, redlined Milwaukee neighborhoods pay more for slow internet!

Your internet service — how fast it is, how much you pay — might depend on where you live in the city.

In Milwaukee, poorer neighborhoods and neighborhoods that were historically redlined are more likely to get worse internet deals.

It’s part of a nationwide trend in which poorer, less-white neighborhoods are paying more

for bad internet service.

That’s according to a new analysis, published by the Markup and the Associated Press, that looks at internet service offers to more than 1 million addresses across the country, including Milwaukee.

It complicates a picture of the digital divide in the city, where many already can’t afford internet at all.

“Within the city of Milwaukee, we know that there are dozens of Census tracts where at least 25% or more households report not having home internet,” said Dave Berka, who manages the Techquity project for United Way of Greater Milwaukee & Waukesha County.

The initiative aims to expand digital access across Milwaukee and surrounding counties.

Those tracts, Berka noted, are predominantly African American or Latino, and they’re also among the city’s lowest-income areas.

The analysis examined offers from Milwaukee’s two major internet providers: EarthLink and AT&T.

Internet speeds are measured in megabits per second, or Mbps. The FCC standard for broadband speed, or high-speed internet, is 25 megabits per second. But that’s a lot lower than the average home internet

speed: 167.

The cost of each megabit, it turns out, can range a lot. Data from the Markup’s investigation shows that, for the same price of \$60 a month — the cheapest plan available — EarthLink offered different Milwaukee households plans from 3 Mbps to 100. And for \$55 a month, AT&T offered anywhere from 0.8 Mbps to 300.

On a single street in Harambee, for example, a household on W. Clarke Street was offered an AT&T plan of 18 Mbps for \$55 a month. Two blocks east, on E. Clarke, another house was offered an AT&T plan of 300 Mbps — 16 times faster — for the same cost.

That means customers with slower internet service are being asked to pay much more for each megabit.

The analysis found that those customers were more likely to live in Milwaukee’s poor neighborhoods. AT&T, for instance, offered slower internet plans to about 4 times as many homes in poor neighborhoods than in wealthier neighborhoods.

Customers who lived in historically redlined neighborhoods also got bad deals. About 20% of them were offered slow speeds for the same price as neighborhoods without a history of redlining.

Berka said the pandemic put the necessity of inclusive internet access in sharp relief. Today, school, work, health appointments, and personal fi-

nances increasingly require internet access.

“Having affordable access to these resources is so absolutely crucial to having a thriving community, a thriving economy, a thriving place where people can live lives and flourish,” he said.

He noted the importance of not just internet service itself, but also larger devices like computers and tablets, depending on the users’ needs.

“I’ve heard stories of kids writing term papers or papers for school in the Notes app on their phone and trying to send that to teachers, or taking pictures of handwritten pages,” Berka said.

People with disabilities also often find themselves on the other side of this digital divide.

Brian Peters is the assistant program director of independent living services at Independence First, a Milwaukee-based organization that serves people with disabilities. He noted that people with disabilities tend to

be economically disadvantaged, both under-employed and unemployed.

“It becomes very difficult for people with disabilities to access the internet,” said Peters, who is deaf. “And that is a problem today because there are so many things online.”

Peters works with many people who have either very low or fixed incomes.

“For some people \$60 is not a huge deal,” he said. “But then we look at other individuals who are on a fixed income. \$60 is a huge part of their income. If they don’t receive good service for the \$60 that they’re spending, why would they continue to want to pay that? A lot of people choose not to.”

But that service is critical for people as they seek housing, look up bus routes, apply for jobs, or simply try to join a Zoom meeting at work.

During the early pandemic, Independence First helped provide people with internet hot-spots as well as computer and


internet classes for those who were less familiar with them. That work continues, Peters said.

A federal low-cost internet service program is currently helping low-income families pay for devices and high-speed service. The Affordable Connectivity Program offers a discount of up to \$30 a month for internet bills, or \$75 on tribal lands, as well as money towards laptops, computers, or tablets.

According to data released in August by the nonprofit EducationSuperHighway, just half of 131,639 eligible households in Milwaukee have enrolled in the program. Statewide, Wisconsin is lagging in enrollment, with 28% of eligible households participating.

You can find eligibility guidelines and apply at the program website.

That, of course, requires internet service. United Way is helping people apply, and internet access is available at libraries across the city.

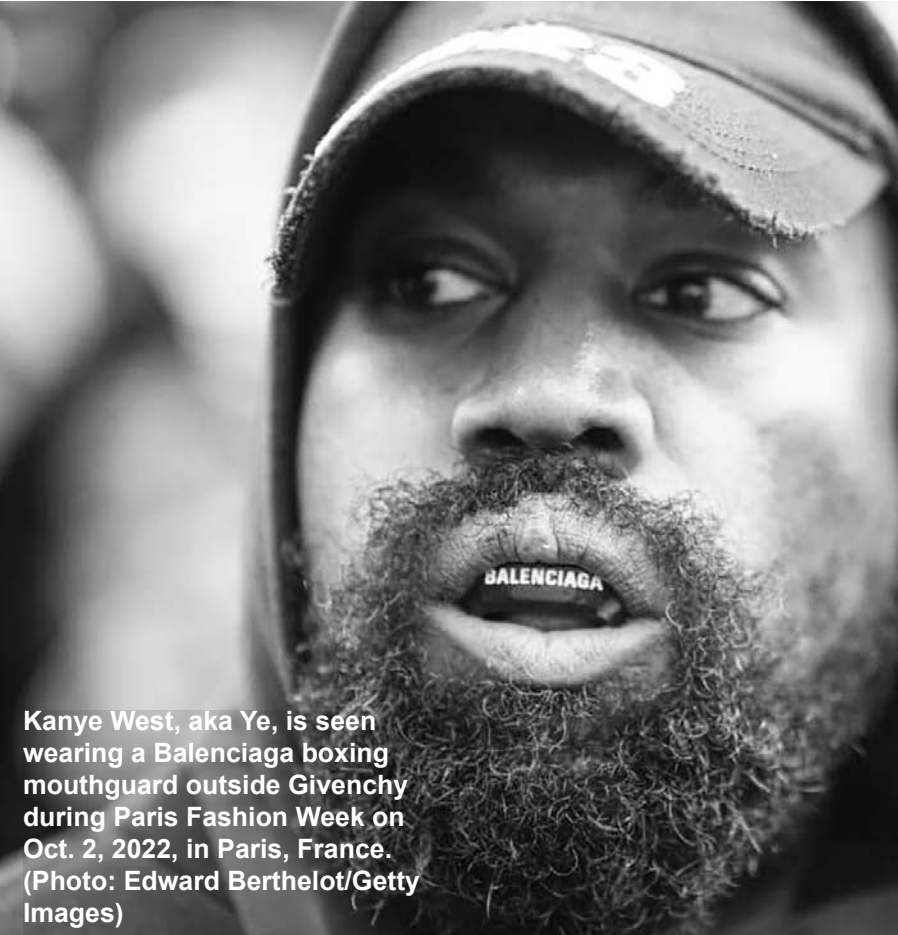

Kanye West continues to feel the fallout of his anti-Semitic remarks on “Drink Champs” and Twitter, combined with other controversial behavior, as Gap Inc. and Foot Locker have joined the brands that are cutting ties with Ye.

According to CNN, the two retailers are the latest in a growing list of corporations to sever their partnerships with West and remove Yeezy merchandise from their stores.

Gap also announced it is shutting down YeezyGap.com, saying the recent comments and actions from their “former partner” further underscored their decision.

“Antisemitism, racism and hate in any form are inexcusable and not tolerated in accordance with our values,” Gap said in a statement Tuesday, CNN reported.

“On behalf of our customers, employees and shareholders, we are partnering with organizations that combat hate and discrimination.”

West’s fashion brand Yeezy and Gap announced in September that they were ending what was supposed to be a 10-year partnership, signed in 2020.

The rapper-producer-designer attributed the discontinuation to “substantial non-compliance.”

As we get closer to Election Day over the next couple of weeks, you’re going to hear a lot of pundits from both sides of the aisle talk about how this election is the most important election of our lives.

Now, I can understand that it’s tempting to deem one election more important than another. But I think it’s a little short-sighted.

However, some elections have consequences that far outweigh others and this year, the consequences are heavy indeed—up and down the ticket.

Likewise, I agree that some constituencies are more consequential than others—that’s just the fact of the matter—and I don’t mind saying that Black men are the most consequential voting bloc in this election and will continue to be so in the elections to come.

Of course, I don’t say this to somehow dismiss the importance of Black women. The fact is that, without them, there

Nicholas Gravante, West’s lawyer, said the retailer left his client no choice after allegedly breaching their agreement by failing to launch branded Yeezy stores and distribute the rapper’s clothing as initially intended, among other things.

Gap initially planned to sell existing Yeezy merchandise in stores and online through the first half of 2023, but decided against it.

West also partnered with premium fashion powerhouse brand Balenciaga to expand his Yeezy Gap label, a collection that debuted in Gap shops in July. Last week, Balenciaga announced that they, too, were severing ties with Ye.

“ADIDAS DOES NOT TOLERATE ANTISEMITISM AND ANY OTHER SORT OF HATE SPEECH,” THE COMPANY SAID IN A STATEMENT, ACCORDING TO YAHOO. “YE’S RECENT COMMENTS AND ACTIONS HAVE BEEN UNACCEPTABLE, HATEFUL AND DANGEROUS, AND THEY VIOLATE THE COMPANY’S VALUES OF DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION, MUTUAL RESPECT AND FAIRNESS.”

Also on Tuesday, a spokesperson for Foot Locker confirmed to Footwear News its store operators were told to hold Ye’s offerings on backroom inventory shelves and won’t be supporting future releases. However, the retailer remains “a partner with Adidas and carry a wide assortment of their collections.”

Adidas has also “immediately” ended its partnership with West and will no longer produce Yeezy-branded goods or make payments to the artist or his enterprises — a move that will, by all accounts, notably sting: Yahoo!

Finance reports that according to Evercore ISI analyst Omar Saad, the Yeezy line contributes between \$1 billion and \$2 billion in annual sales to the company.

Adidas shares dropped 3% after the news and are now down around 65% so far in 2022.

Officials at Adidas revealed that due to the decision, it would lose out on about \$250 million in profits this year.

“Adidas does not tolerate antisemitism and any other sort of hate speech,” the company said in a statement, according to Yahoo. “Ye’s recent comments and actions have been unacceptable, hateful and dangerous, and they violate the company’s values of diversity and inclusion, mutual respect and fairness.”—Source: thegrio

WISCONSIN’S FIRST BLACK-OWNED RESORT PROPERTY RECEIVES HISTORIC MARKER

AFTER WORLD WAR I, AN AREA AROUND LAKE IVANHOE WAS BUILT AS A RESORT BY WEALTHY BLACK CHICAGOANS WANTING A PLACE TO VACATION.

Wisconsin is home to many lakes, but none share the same history as Lake Ivanhoe. The rich past of the state’s first Black-owned resort property is now being acknowledged thanks to those fighting for years for a historical marker from the Wisconsin Historical Society.

According to the Wisconsin State Journal, wealthy Black Chicagoans founded Lake Ivanhoe in 1926. Most of the 30 properties in the community back then belonged to African Americans yearning for lakeside living close to their residences in the Chicago region.

In 1972, Samuel L. Gonzales, a student at UW-Whitewater, maintained in his thesis that the region around the lake was built following World War I as a resort for Blacks looking for places to vacation with their families and avoid racial hostility.

Peter Baker, a retired machinist, originally came to the area in 1965 with his best friend’s father. He claimed he had no idea such properties existed before arriving as a 10-year-old African American youngster from Chicago’s South Side.

“I went home (back to Chicago), told my parents about the community, and the next week they came up and bought a home,” said Baker, according to the State Journal. “I’m just glad things went the way they went.”

Baker built and sold homes in Lake Ivanhoe after finishing high school, including his current residence on Crispus Attucks Drive, a house he built in 2007. The street bears the name of the former slave of African and Native American ancestry who escaped enslavement, known as the first American colonist murdered during the American Revolution.

In collaboration with others, Baker’s efforts helped cement Lake Ivanhoe’s place in Black history with a historical marker.

“I came into an environment that was completely different from where I was growing up, even though I lived in a real nice neighborhood, in a very big house and had a big back yard,” Baker recalled, the State Journal reported.

The Wisconsin Historical Society situated the historical marker outside the Lake Ivanhoe Property Owners Association clubhouse in Burlington, Wisconsin. The 599th marker in the state’s program, it’s a component of a three-year initiative by the historical society to create a more vibrant and accessible monument program that better reflects Wisconsin’s diverse history.

Only nine of the approximately 60 properties on Lake Ivanhoe, which is no longer a vacation destination, are occupied by African American families.

“It was definitely a hidden gem,” said Baker, the State Journal reported. “I really feel proud of this and the recognition and look forward to it being remembered for what it was and how wonderful of a place it was.”—Article courtesy of thegrio.com

and roughly \$100 billion in federal contracts to small disadvantaged and minority-owned businesses.

It doesn't matter if we're at the hole-in-the-wall happy hour Friday or the supper table on Sunday afternoon, we have to be ready. We have to stand up for the truth. We have to speak up loud and proud about all the progress we've made since January 2021 because it matters. It matters more than you could possibly imagine.

It matters because we matter and, if you need proof, just look at the last few election cycles. Just look at 13% of Black men voting for Donald Trump in 2016 and 12% voting for Trump in 2020.

That's just 1%, but it made the difference.

Still, think you don't matter?

"...when we see them in the barbershop claiming, "Them Democrats ain't done nothing for me," we have to respond with the direct facts of \$1.9 trillion from the American Rescue Plan, the expanded child tax credit, which briefly cut child poverty in half and the lowest unemployment rate in 50 years with employment growth for Black men outpacing both our white and Asian counterparts.

If we didn't matter, the GOP wouldn't be targeting us with precision. If we didn't matter, they wouldn't be doing everything

they can to make sure we can't vote. If we didn't matter, I wouldn't be writing this article.

But we do matter, perhaps now more than ever.

So, dear brothers, let's act like it because the stakes are high. Let's act like it because the ballot you cast in November is a survival vote. Let's act like it because, too often, those who participate least are impacted most.

Let's act like it...and let's make the right choice.
