After a three year absence due to the COVID pandemic, daddies and their daughters were back to 'cuttin' a rug' on the floor of the North Division High School gym for the 18th Daddy/Daughter Dance, which took place recently at the legendary community high school. Because the 2021 and 2022 dances were canceled, the 2023 event was designated as the 18th annual. The event is actually 20 years old. Dads—and any 'father figure' (grandfather, uncle, cousin, family friend, etc.) qualifies—and their daughters ages 1-17, the event drew close to its average 1,000 dads and daughters. The event is a celebration of the special relationship between a father and daughter, to have time together, (to reaffirm) dads' dedication to their daughters, who are given the opportunity to have a positive influence with a male role model. Daddies and daughters also had the opportunity to have dinner together before the dance.

### No History This Year!

**Madison Judge Everett Mitchell fails to advance to April 4, Pratt and Bowen move on to general elections!**

Dane County (Madison) Judge Everett Mitchell will not make history as Wisconsin's first elected African American Supreme Court justice.

He and Waukesha County Judge Jennifer Dorow failed to garner the necessary votes to advance to the April 4 general election for state Supreme Court justice.

They finished third and fourth to the top two vote getters in that contest: Milwaukee County Judge Janet Protasiewicz, and former Supreme Court Justice Daniel Kelly.

Protasiewicz received the most votes in the race—46% of the total votes counted as of 10 p.m. Kelly received 24% of the votes.

A record \$9 million was spent in ads during the judicial primary, a state record for a primary. Supported by unprecedented campaign contributions from Democratic donors, Protasiewicz spent more than her challengers combined.

Of the four candidates in the state's high court contest, Mitchell (no relation to the MCJ editor) identified most easily with communities of color, especially with African Americans in education (he is a graduate of Morehouse College in Atlanta, a Historical Black College/University), and ini-

Anyone claiming to be a history buff who has not visited the Wisconsin Black Historical Society/Museum (WBHS/M), located at 2620 W. Center Street, is missing a real treat.

As we celebrate Black History Month, one would be remiss not to schedule a tour with the museum's founder Clayborn Benson.

A retired, award-winning photojournalist, Benson founded the Museum more than 36 years ago to ensure the documentation and preser-

vation of the history of African Americans in Wisconsin. Benson believes that it's important that future generations know the history of previous generations.

"Black History is American history. Our intent is never to make people feel guilty or bad about things that have happened to Blacks. We just want to share the facts—the good and bad—because it is our history," said Benson.

As a photographer with WTMJ4 Benson traveled to faraway places like Majorca in the Mediterranean, Egypt, Somalia, and Ukraine, fueling his love and appreciation of history.

"I've always been intrigued

with history, partly because my family—the Moore's—shared so much history with patrons of the barbershops they owned in Milwaukee and Racine. I also had a burning desire to research my family history because I knew so little about my relatives," said Benson.

Benson has had the privilege of sharing information and breaking bread with almost every pioneer founder or director of African American museums in the United States including Dr. Charles H. Wright, founder of the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History in Detroit, MI; Charles and Dr. Margaret Burroughs, founders of the

## Royalty Inside Our D.N.A.

*How a Milwaukee photographer used visuals to humanize the data that is being collected for America's largest genetic research program in history.*

Terrance Sims is a renowned photographer from Milwaukee who has been using his camera to capture the stories of community members for over a decade, with a particular focus on African American and Latinx communities.

Recently, Sims partnered with The All of Us Research Program to create a photo campaign called "Royalty Inside Our D.N.A." which explores the concept of generational legacy and its impact on health outcomes.

The "Royalty Inside Our D.N.A." campaign centers around the idea that every individual has a royal legacy within their DNA, which is passed down from generation to generation.

Sims' photographs capture the intergenerational connections that exist within families and communities, showcasing the beauty and strength of the

human spirit.

The campaign also highlights the importance of generational legacy and how it impacts our health outcomes.

The All of Us Research Program is a national research initiative that aims to collect data from one million or more people in the United States to accelerate health research and medical breakthroughs.

By collecting data from diverse communities and populations, the program can help to identify health disparities and provide insights into how to improve health outcomes for all individuals.

The program also gives back genetic and ancestry information to participants to inform the future of science and improve community health outcomes.

One family that was featured in Sims' recent campaign is the McKay family, which spans four generations of women.

Shardae McKay, the founder

of a hip-hop fitness class called "Stepping Out With Shardae," set up the photo-shoot for her family to be spotlighted.

She understands the power of generational legacy and being connected regarding health, as her grandmother is also a breast cancer survivor.

Shardae takes her grandmother's health history into consideration to inform her own health decisions.

Terrance Sims' "Royalty Inside Our D.N.A." campaign is a vital highlight of The All of Us Research Program.

DuSable Museum of African American History in Chicago, IL; John Robert Edward Kinard, the director of the Anacostia Museum, founded by the Smithsonian Institution; and, Lonnie G. Bunch III, the 14th Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution and the first African American to serve as head of the Smithsonian.

In the 1980s, Benson discovered that there was no statewide effort to collect artifacts or document the oral histories of an aging population.

After receiving a grant from the National Endowment of the Arts to produce a documentary called Black Communities, he began capturing those stories.

This inspired him to establish a place to house this important history. In 1987, he purchased two buildings from the City of Milwaukee and renovated them into one facility.

He has never hesitated to use his own money to sustain the museum. In 1988, the WBHS/M became an affiliated member of The Wisconsin

sin State Historical Society.

Since opening its doors, the WBHS/M has become an archival repository.

Benson's daughter, Jamila, who has worked alongside him for 20 years, develops programming and assists with exhibits.

Last year two archivists were onboarded and they are working feverishly to digitalize and catalogue a plethora of artifacts and historical doc-

uments.

The WBHS/M is a beacon of hope in a neighborhood riddled with disparities such as unemployment, health, and crime.

It is also the overseer of one-of-a-kind documents and photographs that might have been lost, were it not for Benson.

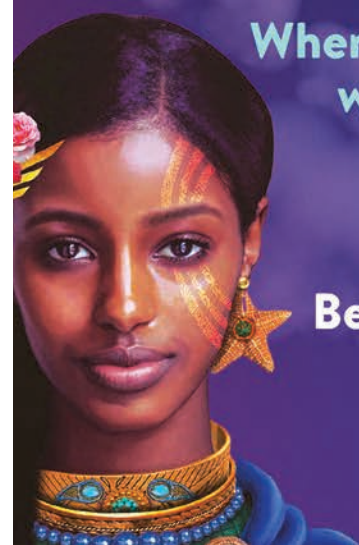

## Six candidates for three aldermanic seats advance to April 4 election

Candidates that focused on Black and poor individuals in the Dane County court system and the community, to his affiliations and honors with and from Black organizations that focus on the upliftment of youth and low income. Mitchell's campaign focused on a message of 'fairness and justice.' In three nonpartisan aldermanic special elections to fill vacant seats on Milwaukee's Common Council were also held Tuesday. These are the top two winners in those races who will faceoff against each other on April 4: **Common Council Dist. 1**— Andrea Pratt, the daughter of former alderman, Common Council President, and acting Mayor Marvin Pratt, will face former state Rep. David Bowen. Pratt finised in first with 1,012 votes (34.2%). Bowen was second with 974 votes (32.9%).  
**Common Council Dist. 5**— Annette Jackson will take on Lamont Westmoreland. Westmoreland garnered 1,581 votes (29.0%). Jackson received 989 votes (18.1%).  
**Common Council Dist. 9**— Odell Ball, the husband of Milwaukee County Sheriff, Dr. Danita Ball, will take on Larresa Taylor. Ball was the top vote getter in the contest with 842 votes (23.8%). Taylor was second with 728 votes (20.6%).

That's why Alderman Mark Chambers, Jr. is urging Walmart pharmacy clients to check out Saturday's (February 25) Neighborhood Wellness Event at Hayat Pharmacy, 8434 W. Silver Spring Dr. The free event will take place from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, and Hayat counselors will be available to assist Walmart clients (and others) who have questions or who want to transfer their medications.

"The Timmerman Plaza Walmart closing is happening in just a few weeks, and I am urging people who use their pharmacy services to plan early, so that they aren't without their medications or the vital pharmacy counseling they need," Alderman Chambers said.

On February 8, Walmart announced suddenly that it would close the store at 10330 W. Silver Spring Dr., leaving thousands – including Alderman Chambers – without a nearby option for pharmacy services and nutritious foods (groceries). 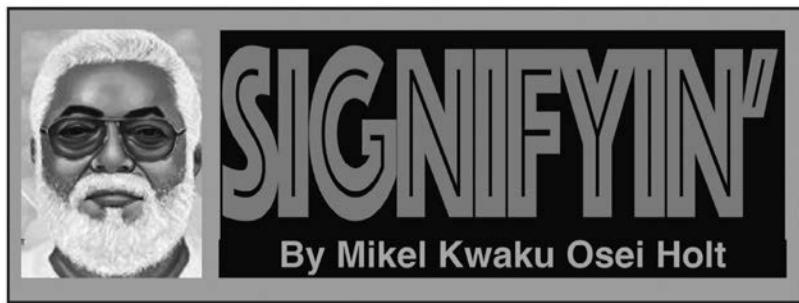

# A cure-all for racism/White supremacy White America may find to unpleasant to live with!



*“We should emphasize not Negro History, but the Negro in history. What we need is not a history of selected races or nations, but the history of the world void of national bias, race hate, and religious prejudice.” —Carter Woodson*

While my wife has never attended medical school, she could nevertheless earn the prestigious Lasker Award for her 'remedial' cure to exorcise the cancer of White Supremacy. Simply put, her remedy for American racism starts with an organ transplant replacing 'His-story' with veritable Black History.

'Doctor' Holt's cure will save White American bigots from an embarrassing confrontation with St. Peter and restore Africans and African Americans to their rightful place as the progenitors of civilization, science, math, and, appropriately, medicine.

The designated surgeon would not necessarily have to replace the diseased organ.

They need only carve out a space near the heart cavity for 'bona fide encamped' (found that procedure on the internet) and a few dozen of my thousand-plus columns detailing our sojourn since God gave my great, great, great (times 10) Uncle Adam the key to the garden.

I only passed basic CPR training, but even I know 'truth' can regenerate organs like the human liver, and political excuses.

That said, I have no doubt Dr. Holt's 'cure' for what ails America would be a pill too thick for most—White, Black, and in between-- to swallow.

However, unless Nyame (God) takes out His/Her frustration again and cleanses the earth of the sinfully wicked, racist roaches and pulpit pimps (those who view themselves more as insurance salesmen than spiritual shepherds), I see no other recourse than an operation to save the dying patient.

It will be an expensive and lengthy operation, and I don't think it'll be covered by ObamaCare, even if the insurance policy is based on a subsidized family plan.

But the alternative is to continue down this self-destructive path that will end with another uncivil war or an implosion rivaling Noah's flood.

And since I'm using a biblical reference, consider Dr. Holt a 21st-century version of the prophet Amos (I guess that would make me Andy, for those old enough to recognize that reference).

As abolitionists Frederick Douglass and John Brown posited a decade before the redundantly titled civil war, only a blood transfusion will save the patient—in this case, America.

And that's assuming the surgeon understands we're not just discussing replacing cancerous growths with Black trivia, but also by a bedside chat explaining why our children are brainwashed with revisionist 'His-story' and propaganda disguised as facts.

For this operation to be successful, it will also be necessary for the physician to explain where the growth came from and how it is used to facilitate an agenda rooted in international apartheid.

To a degree, Dr. Holt's diagnosis is correct, and so is her remedy. But it ain't gonna happen. For two reasons:

The most obvious is it does not benefit the patient to be cured.

And that's not because the truth will hurt the fragile psyche of little Charlie and Becky, as some parents and politicians are suggesting.

Only a fool buys into that disingenuous argument posited by those who decry the introduction of Critical Race Theory (CRT) would have.

The truth is that 99% of those who run that scam can't tell you what CRT is. And then they really expose their ignorance---make that stupidity---by acknowledging it is a graduate-level college thesis and is not being taught in any government school in the country!

Thus, the CRT is nothing more than a racist code template, a rallying cry to avoid the truth and keep the masses in ignorance and the safety of their ivory towers.

A more practical argument would center around the limited time for high school-level history classes.

Let's assume 680 hours are set aside for high school history classes. Theoretically, you can spend an entire school year on the events surrounding America's pregnancy and birth, with the only reference to our ances-



tors being the heroic (albeit myopic) act of Crispus Attucks.

Maybe, just maybe, you find a few minutes to discuss how the new government declared African captives to be subhuman, chattel, and ordained in the bible to be slaves.

Because of social media, I assume some Black child from a righteous home may disrupt the established lie and note that our ancestors were not first brought to these shores in 1619 but a century earlier by the Spanish on the Carolina coast.

But don't expect a challenge since several billion dollars have been invested in current history books, even though they are full of lies and propaganda.

Before you get caught up in that argument, ask yourself why a family in Superior, Sheboygan, or Solon Springs, Wisconsin, would be interested in correcting the lies?

And don't use the equity argument because, according to the 2020 census, African Americans comprise less than eight percent of the state's population.

How important is it for 92% to know about the Underground Railroad, much less Marcus Garvey's Black Star Lines?

How would they react to replacing a half-semester study about the Louisiana Purchase or the westward expansion (also known as 'Manifest Destiny') with Abe Lincoln's devious plan to remove emancipated Africans (we were not citizens until the 14th amendment) to a new colony in South America.

If I had my druthers, I would use a half-semester analyzing and dissecting Frederick Douglass' 'What Does Your 4th of July Mean to the American Slave' speech.

Then again, how can you justify allocating time to a revamped history course when Milwaukee hosts the lowest Black reading proficiency rates in the United States, Mexico, and Canada. Should you instead reallocate time for teaching our children how to read?

Even if you make a moral argument and explain how most Americans are stuck on stupid and would benefit from looking at History through the eyes of the oppressed, you can't escape the reality that so-called public (actually government) education is about indoctrination and building a workforce, not about knowledge and empowerment.

From that perspective, how important is it to study John Brown's insurrection or debate whether Thomas Jefferson and George Washington were rapists?

In fact, therein lies another reason why the authorities won't expand their his-story, as it would validate our case for reparations, which the government has previously given to Asians and Native Americans, but denied us.

The second reason may be open for debate, but it is nonetheless critically important.

What is Black History, and whose interpretation should be used in America's classrooms?

For that matter, isn't all History derived from Black History, since we are the first people and everything evolved from us?

Given only a limited amount of time allocated for history lessons, whose Black History should be maximized? The sanitized version offered by the 'Negrocracy' who want to go "along to get along?" Or the radical truth, starting not with our plowing the fields as the overseer raped our women, but with the creation and population of planet earth?

And on that point, Dr. Holt and I differ. My studies reveal a different gestation that predates the bible and upsets much of what we consider 'human history.' In fact, change that to 'hue-man' History.)

As a student of Kemetic antiquity, I would offer for discussion and debate a different story on creation and the roots of monotheism.

I would note that before our embrace of one God under Anhtenatan in Kemet, our ancestors scribed of a virgin birth, trinity, and Jesus figure. It also included the '42 negative confessions,' 10 of which mirrored what was scribed on Moses's tablet.

That was over 2,500 years before the biblical events. And 640,000 years after the discovery of the first human being---Lucy, in Northern Africa.

We can further enunciate a probable alternative history that includes the hypotheses by Sigmund Freud in his controversial 1939 book, 'Der Mann Moses und die monotheistische Religion' (Moses and Monotheism).

In that controversial and generally refuted book, the founder of psychoanalysis posited that Moses was not a Jew as described in the Old Testament, but instead was a Kemetic prince who advanced a religion based on the worship of one God, Aten I (originally the 'sun god').

This interpretation is controversial, but should it at least be discussed and dissected? The point is we have limited ourselves by following one script when there are numerous stories worthy of discussion. It just goes to show you how history is determined by the powerful and the survivors.

I could introduce many historical facts not accepted by most African Americans that would put accepted reality to the test.

Moreover, this scenario is not just about 'His-story,' a paradigm that excludes our contributions and their rationale for apartheid, but also how we feel about ourselves.

Who looks back at us through the mirror.

If the image looking back at you is a nigger (n-word), there is little hope since much of our history reveals how we desperately sought to look, act, and be like the people who kept us in slavery.

As most know, I detest the denigrating noun/adjective (the 'N-word'), not only because it is disrespectful to our ancestors, but more so because it represents a self-fulfilling prophecy. It keeps us chained to a 'His-story' we supposedly want to change.

Maybe, a revamped history would empower us with a sense of who and what we really are while simultaneously unlocking the chains of propaganda from the minds of Whites.

America can never become the democratic mecca envisioned three centuries ago until we face the cancer that erodes its body.

Moreover, we will continue to stand in quicksand until we step onto the platform of truth and justice. Ours is a cultural foundation that is envied and replicated the world over. There has to be a reason why we are the first, the chosen, and the architects of 'hue-mankind.'

Dr. Holt and I may differ on what constitutes Black History, but we agree that His story is a deceptive lie that has kept America locked to its evil past.

As James Baldwin once posited,

"Not everything that is faced can be changed, but nothing can be changed until it is faced."

55 YEARS AGO, THE  
KERNER REPORT  
PREDICTED THAT  
DIVISIONS DRIVEN BY  
RACISM COULD LEAD  
TO THE DESTRUCTION  
OF OUR DEMOCRATIC  
VALUES

OPINION: THE REPORT WAS  
REFRESHINGLY HONEST ABOUT  
THE IMPACT OF SYSTEMIC RAC-  
ISM AND WAYS TO ADDRESS IT.  
TRAGICALLY, SUCH HONESTY, IN  
A NATION CURRENTLY BEING  
DEVOURED BY ITS INNER RACIAL  
DEMONS, IS LACKING TODAY.

This month marks the  
55th anniversary of the  
release of the Kerner Re-  
port, the highly antici-  
pated 1968 document  
forged from the Pres-  
ident's National Advisory  
Commission on Civil  
Disorders.

In the aftermath of widespread vi-  
olence and racial unrest in urban  
centers across the country, the 11-  
member commission appointed by  
President Lyndon B. Johnson and  
headed by Illinois Gov. Otto Kerner  
ultimately pinpointed racism as the  
primary cause of the hostilities.

Popularly, the most indelible take-  
away from the Kerner Commission  
study, which was released on Feb.  
29, 1968, was the contention that  
“our nation is moving toward two  
societies, one black, one white —  
separate and unequal.”

However, far less quoted and yet  
as prescient was the report's sub-  
sequent prediction that without the  
adoption of drastic and timely  
remedies, there would be a “contin-  
uing polarization of the American  
community and, ultimately, the de-  
struction of basic democratic  
values.”

So was the Kerner Commission  
report — one mirroring the earlier  
prophecy of James Baldwin's 1963  
classic “The Fire Next Time” —  
correct? Are our nation's basic dem-  
ocratic values being destroyed as a  
result of the racism that continues to  
plague our country?

One need look no further than re-  
cent headlines to gauge the pro-  
phetic nature of the report.  
Consistently, the deep polarization  
of our contemporary society is

wholly reflected in our politics, our  
media, our economics, and in our  
national discourse, particularly in  
matters of race. Despite the inter-  
national focus on and aftermath of  
the brutal murder of George Floyd  
in 2020, fatal police shootings are  
actually occurring at a higher rate  
today.

Voting rights are under constant  
attack. And in June 2021, in an in-  
stallment of “Unequal,” a series pro-  
duced by the Harvard Gazette, staff  
writer Liz Mineo penned, “The  
wealth gap between Black and white  
Americans has been persistent and  
extreme.

It represents, scholars say, the ac-  
cumulated effects of four centuries  
of institutional and systemic racism  
and bears major responsibility for  
disparities in income, health, educa-  
tion, and opportunity that continue  
to this day.”

The parallels are apparent. Along  
with rampant poverty, systemic rac-  
ism, and police brutality, the 1968  
report clarified that the “social and  
economic conditions in the riot  
cities constituted a clear pattern of  
severe disadvantage for Negroes  
compared with whites, whether the  
Negroes lived in the area where the  
riot took place or outside it.”

It further pointed to lower rates of  
education and graduation for Black  
citizens; discriminatory consumer  
credit practices; a racially skewed  
system of justice; ongoing voter  
suppression; and how “Negroes  
were twice as likely to be unem-  
ployed and three times as likely to  
be in unskilled and service jobs.

Negroes averaged 70 percent of  
the income earned by whites and  
were more than twice as likely to be  
living in poverty. Although housing  
cost Negroes relatively more, they  
had worse housing — three times as  
likely to be overcrowded and sub-

The Kerner Commission, despite  
the politics of the day and Johnson's  
desire to not alienate the white mid-  
dle-class voters who elected him,  
was refreshingly forthcoming in its  
reporting.

While many Americans instinc-  
tively attributed the cause of the un-  
rest to the young Black men the  
national media captured on their TV  
screens, the report concluded other-  
wise, that white racism with its di-  
rect and systemic impact, rather than  
Black anger, was at the heart of the  
violence.

“Segregation and poverty have  
created in the racial ghetto a destruc-  
tive environment totally unknown to  
most white Americans,” declared  
the commission.

“What white Americans have  
never fully understood — but what  
the Negro can never forget — is that

white society is deeply implicated in  
the ghetto. White institutions  
created it, white institutions main-  
tain it, and white society condones  
it.”

Such honesty at a time of Ameri-  
can crisis was necessary to identify  
the problem, one that could poten-  
tially, if left unaddressed, could con-  
sume the country in flames.

Tragically, such honesty, in a na-  
tion currently being devoured by its  
inner racial demons, is lacking  
today.

There exist far too many exam-  
ples of our modern social dystopia  
in what has increasingly been re-  
garded as the “age of lies” — Trum-  
pism; alternative facts; declining  
media credibility; declining govern-  
ment and institutional credibility;  
corporate corruption; instigated ra-  
cial resentments and xenophobia  
and more.

This tragic lack of credibility in  
American institutions, be they polit-  
ical, educational, economic, crim-  
inal justice, or media, is directly  
related to our nation's dishonesty in  
dealing with issues of race.

Put differently, if American insti-  
tutions continue to employ a dis-  
ingenuous and superficial approach  
to racial equity, this accompanying  
and destructive lack of credibility  
will continue to devolve into ex-  
treme polarization, violence and  
civil unrest.

For lies leave gaps. And dirt can  
only be swept under the rug for so  
long before lumps reveal what  
festers beneath.

A more honest, proactive way to  
address the vexing racial challenges  
of today requires us to go back more  
than half a century and pull from the  
recommendations of the Kerner  
Commission.

Fortunately, and unfortunately,  
many are as timely as they were  
when first published in 1968. They  
include a large-scale investment,  
both human and financial, into our  
American future regarding the rel-

evant areas of economics, employ-  
ment, housing, education, and crim-  
inal justice.

They have implications for pol-  
itics and media as well as requiring  
a more sincere and robust discussion  
on issues of race, a more honest dia-  
logue aimed at dousing flames  
rather than fanning them.

For fires require oxygen to grow,  
and the fires of racial resentment  
have now spread from one century  
to the next, from the fire next time  
to the one this time — massive,  
leaping flames fanned by white su-  
premacy and its conjunctive need to  
conquer, to enslave, to subjugate, to  
discriminate.

Undoubtedly, in “The Fire Next  
Time,” the prophetic Baldwin  
published five years before the  
Kerner Report — smelled the  
smoke:

“If we — and now I mean the rel-  
atively conscious whites and the rel-  
atively conscious blacks, who must,  
like lovers, insist on, or create, the  
consciousness of the others—do not  
falter in our duty now, we may be  
able, handful that we are, to end the  
racial nightmare, and achieve our  
country, and change the history of  
the world.

If we do not dare everything, the  
fulfillment of that prophecy, re-  
created from the Bible in song by a  
slave, is upon us: God gave Noah  
the rainbow sign. No more water,  
the fire next time!”
