Historical musical, "We Are The Drum" concludes a successful 29th season!

CAPITA Productions, Inc. recently concluded its 29th season with a final 2023 performance of "We Are The Drum" before a sold-out audience at Milwaukee Marshall High School.

Public response was so great to its performance last Saturday, that an 'encore' performance was held the next day.

CAPITA was established in 1990 under the leadership of the late Arlene Skwierawski, long time educator and music teacher at North Division high school and the late Brother Booker Ashe, founder of the House of Peace. For the first time, CAPITA presented the 'We are the Drum Award' (WATD) in order to

honor four local individuals or organizations that have demonstrated a long history of:

- Chronicling and preserving historic achievements of African Americans.
- Conducted compelling research that educates on and supports means to eradicate systemic racial issues that are plaguing the African American community.

The inaugural WATD awardees for 2023 were: Clayborn Benson, founder of Wisconsin's Black Historical Society/Museum, for 'Exceptional Black History Research and Preservation;' community activist, historian Reuben Harpole for 'Exceptional Social Justice Advocacy, Historian, and 'Griot;' Lynda Jackson Conyers for 'Exceptional Journalism and Reporting of Black Excellence,' Reggie Jackson for 'Exceptional Research and Education on the Impact of Systemic Racial Injustice.'

Since its founding in 2018, Sherman Phoenix has become a place of pride, promise, and fulfilled dreams. Thanks to community, faith, and business leaders coming together and listening to residents in the aftermath of a civil uprising, Sherman Phoenix is serving the community and helping more than 29 small businesses succeed.

In 2022 Dr. Stacia Thompson was named executive director of Sherman Phoenix Foundation and she could not be prouder or more committed to the growth of this entrepreneurial hub and marketplace. In addition to running the Foundation, Thompson oversees the daily operations of the facility, coordinates workshops, and events.

"Sherman Phoenix is a national model. We support our tenants by providing wraparound services to help them succeed. We share funding opportunities with them, produce a newsletter to engage them and advertise their events and wares, and support them however we can," said Thompson.

Currently, Sherman Phoenix has three levels—street, mezzanine, and a gallery downstairs. All three levels include businesses and community spaces. And, as of December 2022 there are no vacancies, pointing to the success of this collective.

Walker's Point antiques shop under fire for racist antiques

A Walker's Point antiques shop came under fire recently for allowing a vendor to sell items many people view as racist. A small business owner called for them to be removed because they shouldn't be celebrated or sold for profit.

About a dozen people protested late last month outside 'Antiques on Pierce,' calling on the owners to remove the offending items. There are dozens of figurines, dolls, posters, and more that depict Black children and adults as racist caricatures.

Antiques on Pierce is located at 1512 W. Pierce St., and have been there since 2015. According to the Better Business Bureau,

Phoenix Rising Entrepreneur Program which provides information and resources on technical assistance, mentoring, skills training, professional development, and grant funding. “Vacancies and links to tenant applications are available through our website. Valentine, our building management company, vets applicants to ensure that they are not in competition with existing tenants. Applicants are also required to have business plans, but if they do not, they are referred to organizations that can help them. We will soon be onboarding staff who will provide some in-house assistance to tenants and applicants,” said Thompson. Plans are to hire a full-time director of operations and engagement, and a director of

programs and outreach. In addition, to amplify the work they are already doing, Thompson said that Sherman Phoenix is considering build out expansion plans. “We recently celebrated our four-year anniversary. Sherman Phoenix is a space where entrepreneurial dreams can come to fruition. It is part of the city’s entrepreneurial ecosystem. People come here looking to us to help them grow their businesses so hiring more employees will help us meet those needs,” said Thompson. Thompson’s advice to would-be entrepreneurs is that no idea should ever go without exploring it. “Make sure you connect with someone like Sherman Phoenix’s Rising Entrepreneur Pro-

gram to ensure you receive the proper support and information. Sometimes people have valid ideas, but they either fail or don’t proceed because they didn’t ask the right questions or know about the resources available to them. We want to be a resource of information and create a networking space where individuals interested in becoming entrepreneurs can get good, solid information. We want to make sure there is equity and equality so that people can become business owners in Milwaukee,” said Thompson. Sherman Phoenix has risen from the ashes to emerge as a valid, viable, and much needed diamond in our community. Visit Sherman Phoenix at 3536 W. Fond du Lac Avenue. the owners are Brian and Cheryl Belli. Both owners declined to comment, leading some of the vendors with booths at Antiques on Pierce to pack up and leave, upset by their lack of a response. Antiques on Pierce is set up so that vendors can rent a space and sell their merchandise. Who exactly was selling the items in question isn’t known. Three Milwaukee County Supervisors have also condemned the store for selling what they called racist, anti-Semitic, and xenophobic items. Chloe Longmire, a small business owner, said, "I was shocked to even see things like this still on display, they're really not on display, they're on sale. I was shocked to see these things on sale." Longmire went to Antiques on Pierce over the weekend to sell some of her products (“Racial Justice Apparel”) but was completely caught off guard by what she saw for sale. She said, "They are so upsetting, they are so offensive." “There are figurines of Black people—very dark-skinned Black people—eating watermelon,” she said. “It’s actually called ‘Sambo art.’ The history of these images was to demean, degrade and dehumanize Black people,” she added. One item had a sticker for \$895. Longmire said: “That’s the price of Black pain and suffering.” “The definition of antique is high-value collectibles. I’m not sure why others would want to profit off of trauma and pain and history that has brought so many people—it’s re-traumatizing to see those things, and to see people making money from it—from other people’s pain.” Longmire said the portrayals have been devastating for the Black community because they were created to spread a fear of Black people.

“These depictions are rooted in white supremacy. They’re rooted in what’s known as the racial caste system of Jim Crow.” In a now-viral social media post, Longmire said she would not breathe life into the images, and that when she brought it to the owners’ attention, she was told the antiques are a part of history (“Americana,” according to the store manager she complained to). She said, "I know that has come up a lot, that 'oh it's history.' But it's a part of history that deserves some education around it." An art historian reportedly noted antiques like this are fairly common because they were mass produced years ago. But what’s missing when they’re sold for profit is context, to explain what the images are and why they are hurtful. The historian added selling the antiques is much different than presenting them in an academic setting with descriptive notes, placards or lectures. The historian said ideally, antiques like the ones at Antiques on Pierce would be donated to institutions that can provide proper context, and where they can be made available to scholars. In a recent statement, County Supervisors Priscilla Coggs-Jones, Juan Miguel Martinez, and Sheldon Wasserman blasted ‘Antiques on Pierce’ for selling the offending items. “This is our story that should be told and shared amongst all different nationalities. We should be able to educate not only the youth but also the inexperienced adults who don’t see the importance of being able to properly display antique pieces,” said Supervisor Coggs-Jones. “When I meditate on situations such as this, I remember a quote from the Rev. Al Shaptrton which says, ‘We have defeated Jim Crow, but now we have to deal with his son, James Crow, Jr.’” “As a Latino representative to one of two majority Hispanic districts in Milwaukee County, it is important that I stand with my Black brothers and sisters, especially those who reside in District 12, said Supervisor Martinez. “My office unequivocally disavows this disgusting mockery of the Black community and their culture. These artifacts belong in a mu-

seum and should not be sold for profit. As a society, we should be striving for equality and inclusivity. “The sale of these caricatures serves to divide and ostracize Black individuals and is unacceptable. The items for sale are a symbol of a dark time in our history, and their sale only serves to perpetuate the wounds of racism that

we are trying to heal.” “All Nazi artifacts should either be in a holocaust museum dedicated to the memory of its Jewish and non-Jewish victims or they should be destroyed,” said Supervisor Wasserman. (According to one news report, a vendor at

the antique mall—who identified himself as Jewish—approached a reporter, telling him that not only was he upset by the African American objects on sale, but also the Nazi items—and said he thinks the store should not have them.) “The historical significance of the racist and anti-Semitic items on sale in Antiques on Pierce cannot be denied, but we must center the experiences of People of Color and the impact of insulting and mocking groups of people based on race,” said Longmire. “History has shown us that Black bodies are for sale and Antiques on Pierce is one of the many systems that profit from our pain and our trauma, and we will no longer be ignored or dismissed. “There have been complaints made stretching back to 2011 and there needs to be accountability and reparations made to this community. Longmire said the antiques were so offensive she’d like them destroyed, and while she welcomes conversations about them, they shouldn’t be on display and for sale. “But I think that should be left up to those whose stories are being told. And that’s Black people. It should not be left to someone who doesn’t understand or doesn’t want to understand what these things mean to us.” —Sources for this article: Channel 58, Fox6now.com, Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors

International Women's Day Celebration 2023

On Saturday, March 11, partner organizations of Milwaukee's International Women's Day (IWD) Coalition will once again lead a celebration of this important holiday. The celebration will begin at 12:00PM with a march from Dontre Hamilton Park (Red Arrow) to Village Church (130 E Juneau Ave.). Speeches will be delivered at Village Church, where endorsing organizations will also be tabling.

Last year's IWD celebration was an enormous success with its focus on honoring women on the frontlines of the COVID-19 pandemic and those leading the George Floyd uprising.

This year's theme will be "Hands off our bodies! Hands off our families!" This theme will shed light on the important struggles against the attacks on reproductive rights and the police crimes that impact countless families.

2022 represented massive steps backwards for oppressed people, especially women of color. Following the Dobbs decision, abortions are now outlawed in Wisconsin, where the 1849 State Statute 940.04 is the law of the land. Moreover, US law enforcement killed at least 1,176 people in 2022, making it the deadliest year for police violence.

The attacks on reproductive rights and the increase in lethal police violence pose related threats to women in this country. However, as they did in the early 20th century when this holiday was first celebrated, women today are leading the struggles against these attacks.

They are organizing in the community and the workplace, and they are fighting back!

Students will engage in stimulating discussions that both empower them to become future leaders, and introduce them to a career path in public service.

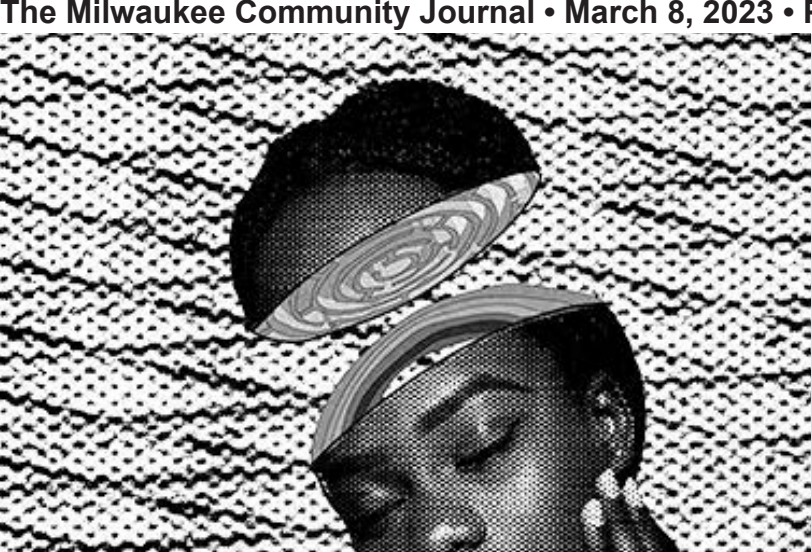

Conversion “Therapy” Ban Recommended for Adoption

According to the school's website the graduate outcomes rate was 100% for industrial engineering in 2021-2022.

Milwaukee Area Technical College (MATC), a public two-year vocational-technical college that has campuses in downtown Milwaukee, Oak Creek, West Allis, and Mequon. MATC was established in 1912 and they have day, evening, and weekend classes, which can be in person or online depending on your schedule. You can also transfer to a four-year partner with a guaranteed admission agreement to Marquette University, UW- Madison, UW-Milwaukee, and UW-Parkside.

University of Milwaukee (UWM), a public research university established in 1956 is nicknamed the Panthers and its school colors are black and gold.

According to the school's website they offer FREE Tuition for first time students, The Wisconsin Tuition Promise guarantees free tuition for qualifying students in fall 2023. This is one of the best programs I have seen, so please go to their website and get enrolled.

I hope this has encouraged you to seek further education or maximize your high school diploma to reach for the stars.

The Health Equity, Human Needs and Strategic Planning committee of the Milwaukee County Board recently approved a resolution, authored by Milwaukee County Supervisor Peter Burgelis, which declares Milwaukee County's official position of opposition to conversion “therapy.”

Supervisor Burgelis and Chairwoman Nicholson made the following statements:

“Conversion ‘therapy’ is a harmful and ineffective practice that is based on the false assumption that sexual orientation or gender identity is a defect that can be changed or ‘cured’, which is not supported by any credible scientific evidence,” said Supervisor Burgelis. “Milwaukee County has a responsibility to promote the mental health and well-being of all its residents.”

“I stand wholeheartedly with our LGBTQ community across Milwaukee and beyond,” said Chairwoman Nicholson “Conversion therapy is a cruel and ineffective attempt to change someone's sexual orientation or gender identity, and it has no place in our society.”

“We must fight for equity and inclusion for all people, regardless of their race, gender identity, or sexual orientation. Let us stand together in solidarity and continue to push for a world where everyone is accepted and celebrated for who they are.”

Several community leaders shared testimony with the committee,

including City of Milwaukee Equal Rights Commission Chairperson Tony Snell Rodriguez who said “Conversion therapy can be dangerous and even deadly. It is unacceptable to allow ‘therapeutic’ practices that aim to change an individual's sexual orientation or gender identity.” Fair Wisconsin Executive Director Megin McDonnell stated “On behalf of Fair Wisconsin we are thrilled about this important step forward and look forward to its passage by the full Board of Supervisors.”

The resolution was recommended for adoption by the Committee on Health Equity, Human Needs and Strategic Planning [4-1] with Supervisors Rolland, Coggs-Jones, Staskunas, and Wasserman voting in favor of the resolution and Supervisor Alexander voting no.

The resolution mirrors policy previously adopted by Appleton, Cudahy, Eau Claire, Glendale, Kenosha, La Crosse, Madison, the City of Milwaukee, Racine, Sheboygan, Shorewood, Sun Prairie, Superior, and West Allis.

Additionally, it calls on the Milwaukee County Mental Health Board to adopt a formal policy to condemn conversion “therapy” and would prevent any County funds from being allocated towards the practice.

The full Milwaukee County Board will take up the resolution at their meeting on March 23, 2023.

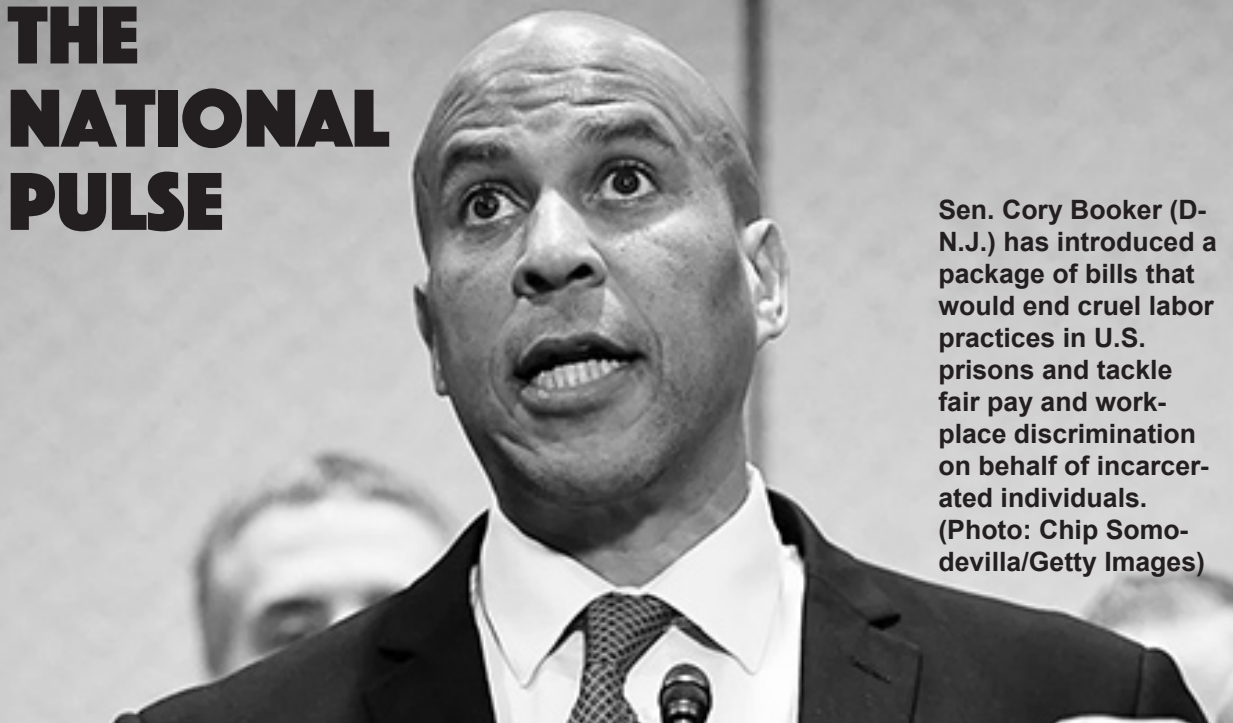

Sen. Cory Booker aims to make prisons safer, add livable wage for inmates

Booker has introduced a package of bills that would end cruel labor practices in U.S. prisons, plus tackle fair pay and workplace discrimination on behalf of incarcerated individuals.

New Jersey Sen. Cory Booker has introduced a package of bills that would end cruel labor practices in U.S. prisons and tackle fair pay and workplace discrimination on behalf of incarcerated individuals.

In a statement obtained by theGrio, Booker proposed that the four bills — the Fair Wages for Incarcerated Workers Act of 2023, Correctional Facilities Occupational Safety and Health Act, Ensuring Work Opportunities in Correctional Facilities Act and Combating Workplace Dis-

crimination in Correctional Facilities Act — would address “inhumane and unacceptable” prison labor conditions in America’s correctional facilities.

The Democratic senator believes these bills would end unfair and abusive labor policies.

“The Thirteenth Amendment abolished slavery ‘except as a punishment for crime,’ but this language has enabled and expanded the exploitation of incarcerated people in our country’s prisons,” he said.

Booker’s prison reform legislation would ensure that incarcerated individuals are deemed employees and would require correctional facilities to rou-

tinely report workplace safety and labor conditions to the Occupational Health and Safety Administration.

Beth Schwartzapfel, a reporter for the Marshall Project, told theGrio that being an incarcerated individual is a “dehumanizing experience” and that Booker’s legislation would be “life-changing.”

“People don’t have access to basic human needs,” she contended. “People don’t have access to their loved ones in any regular way. People don’t have access to their humanity in a way. The culture of prison is such a machismo sort of posturing, violent place that is all about survival.”

Other parts of Booker’s effort would ensure that incarcerated individuals are paid a livable wage and would provide resources for inmates to seek employment and educational opportunities while behind bars. He said that more than half of incarcerated people work while carrying out their sentences.

“Because fair labor standards are virtually nonexistent in U.S. prisons, incarcerated people are often compelled to work in abusive and unsafe conditions,” said Booker. “They work for little to no pay, on average making between 13 and 52 cents per hour in most jobs.”

Schwartzapfel told theGrio that if incarcerated individuals are paid a livable wage, it could prevent recidivism and would benefit the nation’s economy.

“If you have enough money in hand that you can put a down payment on an apartment or that you can buy a car so that you can actually drive to job interviews or that you can actually take a job that you can get to without public transportation ... it just creates a better circumstance for people to do better,” she said.

“When people are desperate, that’s when laws get broken,” Schwartzapfel said, “[but] when you release people from prison with enough money like a cushion to settle back into society, you eliminate the incentive to continue to break the law.”

Booker’s proposals also aim to protect incarcerated individuals’ civil rights and prevent them from falling victim to discriminatory practices. For instance, the senator advocated for having the phrase “refusing to work” removed from the Federal Bureau of Prisons inmate behaviors list, which is often used to justify why a prisoner should face harsh

consequences.

“If they refuse to work,” he said, “they face retaliation by correctional officers and have limited avenues under federal law to fight for their civil rights.”

The senator’s package of bills is backed by several organizations, including the American Civil Liberties Union, the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights, the Brennan Center for Justice and the National Employment Law Project.

One hundred and fifty-four years ago, a Black minister and the first Black man
a graduate from an American college laid the foundation for what was to become
he Black Press of America.
John Russwurm's and Samuel Cornish's first edition of Freedom's Journal car-
ried a strong message on its front page that has since become the tenet of the
Black Press. Said the Black pioneers:
"We wish to plead our own cause. Too long have others spoken for us. From
he press and the pulpit we have suffered much by being incorrectly represented."
Traditionally, each March, members of the National Publishers
Association/Black Press of America meet to reflect upon the words and goals of
tusswurm and Cornish. They also rededicate themselves to the challenges that lie
ahead and analyze their individual and collective impact on the communities they
serve.
Two items of conflicting divergence highlighted this year's conference. Reader-
ship of the Black Press, specifically among white supporters of the Black cause,
limbed drastically during the past year.
This reality was to be expected by most, as support for equal rights has histori-
cally coincided with conservative domination in national politics.
The second item on the agenda was also expected, although its impact was not
added by that fact. Advertising revenues, which had showed a substantial increase
luring the early years of the Jimmy Carter administration are expected to continue
heir downward trend along with a worsening economy.
These two pronouncements comprise the unending paradox which shadows the
Black Press. Since Freedom's Journal, the very survival of the Black Press has of-
entimes depended on factors outside of its control.
Yet during its tenure, the Black Press has built a solid foundation of specialized
ournalism and, despite financial setbacks, has, and will survive.
A strong, and some say orchestrated, effort was made after the civil rights
struggle of the 1960s to discredit the Black Press. White newspapers were quick
o say that the resulting integration-what little there actually was-signaled an end
o Cornish's and Russwurm's dream.
Yet contrary to that assumption, which was nothing more than an apparently
inancially motivated effort, the Black Press tells a story of Black people to Black
eople-a story of Black life. The story of the Black experience and its uniqueness
must be told in every ramification and only the Black Press can tell it.Since the
mid-1970s, the Black Press has become more urbanized in nature, in part because
if its large college student readership.

Yet, of late, it appears to be returning to its ethnic 'roots' with a renewed thrust,
a stronger voice than at any time in history. Moreover, the Black Press is renewing
told friendships among labor unions and special interest coalitions as its voice is
once again being called upon to serve as the vanguard for social change. The ed-
itorial policies and directions of the Black Press historically have united the frag-
mented forces. Many, if not most, of the issues presented by the Black Press cross
all racial and ethnic lines. The editorials address issues related to the 'haves' versus
the 'have-nots,' although presented from a Black perspective.
Moreover, members of the Black Press, particularly its editors and staff writers
again are being called upon to provide input into the coalition policymaking and
direction.
Considered by many as the watch-dogs of social change in America, their ex-
pertise reflects their specialized occupations. It is often they who make the news
as much as report it.
But that factor is not unusual, although it is downplayed. Unlike its major white
counterpart, the role of the Black Press has historically exceeded that of infor-
mation source. It resides just behind the Black educational institutions as a major
educational source, and its functions over the years have widened to include social
service agency, civil rights organization, and even political liaison.
Locally, for example, a series of informational lunches sponsored by the Com-
munity Journal also has provided the backbone for the annual Community Pride
EXPO, which has expanded its scope from providing an avenue to accentuate the
positives of the central city to coordinating an avenue to accentuate the positives
of the central city too coordinating an international trade fair with 20 African and
Central American nations.
The Milwaukee Courier used its communications networks to spearhead Martin
Luther King Day in Milwaukee, and to solicit signatures as part of a national cam-
paign to petition Congress to make his birthday a national holiday. And radio sta-
tion WAWA now sponsors once of the largest expos in the Midwest.
Despite its impact or the size of its readership, the Black Press continues to be
one of the strongest editorial mediums in the United States.
If there is one criticism, it rests with the traditional emphasis to editorialize too
much in its straight news accounts. Yet, because the overwhelming majority of
Black papers in this nation are weeklies, and their major responsibility is to educate
more than inform, this factor is overshadowed by the newspaper's role in the civil
rights struggle.
