

ALVERNO COLLEGE NAMES CHRISTY L. BROWN, J.D. AS ITS NINTH PRESIDENT

Alverno College’s Board of Trustees announced recently they have unanimously selected Milwaukee native and local executive Christy L. Brown, J.D. as the College’s ninth president. She succeeds Sister Andrea Lee, IHM, Ph.D. who ended her service in June 2022.

Brown has served as Chief Executive Officer for Girl Scouts of Wisconsin Southeast (GSWISE) since 2012.

“I see a comparable goal in Alverno’s mission to prepare women for personal and professional distinction and meaningful engagement with the world,” Brown said.

“To lead Alverno College -- embracing its unique identity, Franciscan values, dedication to women’s education and commitment to social justice, inclusion and equity -- will be a privilege

and extraordinary opportunity to continue to impact the city from which I come.”

Brown starts her term July 5. Building on Alverno’s strengths, she will drive academic excellence and innovation, continue to attract courageous and forward-thinking students who look to develop themselves and contribute to their communities, and expand Alverno’s national and international reputation.

“Christy brings to Alverno a unique mix of higher education and mission-driven expertise focused on girls and young women’s leadership development,” said Katherine M. Hudson, Chair of Alverno’s Board of Trustees and Presidential Search Committee Co-Chair.

“She is a dynamic, inspirational and transformational leader with more than two decades of results advancing organizational mission, vision and values while achieving unprecedented operational outcomes.”

Prior to joining GSWISE,

Healthy Eating and Active Living (HEAL) is an initiative founded by Sandra Millon Underwood, PhD, that has gained momentum and is flourishing in our community, thanks to its dedicated members and committed organizations.

HEAL’s goal is simple: to educate people about the positive benefits of eating healthy, nutritious meals and finding the time and ways to intentionally be more active.

The group’s flexibility and ability to pivot to an online format during the covid-19 pandemic helped it gain even more momentum.

During the almost two-year pandemic, HEAL members met virtually—twice a week—touch-

ing bases with one another, encouraging each other, and watching ‘live’ food demonstrations, courtesy of Chef Marvin Jones, who is known for cooking tasty food—without salt—but still packed with flavor.

“Our project was challenged by the pandemic, but we faced those

challenges and were able to expand our work and reach broader audiences by delivering pandemic-related supplies such as facial masks, sanitizer, and tissues.

Initially HEAL provided education related to healthy living and active living.”

The group wanted to incorpo-

rate healthy eating into lifestyles and prevent diseases such as diabetes, hypertension, cancer and heart disease.

“As we sheltered in place, we were not able to go out into the community, but since so much of our work focuses on education, we used virtual media to continue to interact with and educate the community, including educating and responding to covid-19 mandates and concerns.

It's amazing what we have been able to do using Zoom and Facebook to continue to engage with our community," said Dr. Underwood.

Now that shelter in place mandates have expired, HEAL has started taking its education initiatives 'on the road' again.

The group works with nursing homes, community centers, and senior citizen organizations.

This is especially significant to Milwaukee's senior citizen population because many of them receive Stockboxes.

A Stockbox is a box of healthy foods that Hunger Task Force delivers to low-income seniors free of charge.

Each box contains nutritious items including rice, cereal, juice, beef stew, pasta and vegetables.

Each month, nearly 10,000 boxes are delivered to seniors throughout Southeastern Wisconsin.

Chef Marvin uses some of the ingredients contained in Stock-

boxes to demonstrate nutritious meal preparation. Residents sample the foods and are given recipes to prepare meals quickly, nutritiously, and most often without salt.

Chef Marvin, Bonnie Anderson who often presents canning demonstrations, and Valley Hollins who demonstrates mental and physical exercises, are members of HEAL who have sustained their engagement in the community, even during the pandemic.

"They are committed members who are not here for a moment, but on a long-term basis."

"They are from the community, in the community, and using their talents and resources to help the community. Various organizations and churches are asking us to come and share information with their members and associates because they see the benefits of the work we do."

"HEAL reaches out to the faith community to present its program, and we don't just visit

large facilities. I believe we must make sure we reach the smaller flocks as well.

"Our aim is to ensure that more people are served and that no one is left without or that no one is left behind."

"We make a special effort to reach out to smaller, less-frequented, and often overlooked and bypassed venues, centers, residences, and shelters where people are just as worthy and the need is just as great—if not greater."

We have a responsibility to go deeper and further into the community to reach, educate, and serve," said Dr. Underwood.

HEAL is a diamond, depositing healthy related initiatives in our community to help guarantee a better and brighter future.

Brown served as Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administrative Affairs, at University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee from 2007 to 2012 and as Executive Vice President and General Counsel at Milwaukee Area Technical College from 2002 to 2007.

She also served as Vice President, South East Region and Corporate Counsel, for Lutheran Social Services of Wisconsin and Upper Michigan from 1997 to 2002, and as an Associate Attorney with Michael Best & Friedrich from 1994 to 1997.

Brown is a member of The Medical College of Wisconsin's Board of Trustees and the Duke Law Alumnae Leadership Council, which is a select group of women graduates that advise on issues that impact women students and alumnae.

She has also held leadership and membership roles at several other state and local organizations, including serving as past member of the Carroll University Board of Trustees and as a past appointee of the Wisconsin Educational Approval Board.

Brown has received numerous awards and honors including the TEMPO Mentor Award, the Milwaukee Business Journal Women of Influence (Inspiration) award and the Women and Girls Fund Women of Distinction award.

Like many Alverno students, Brown was a first-generation college student. She graduated from

Stanford University with a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology in 1987.

With a passion for learning and scholarly achievement, she then pursued a joint-degree graduate program earning in 1994 both her Juris Doctor from Duke University School of Law and a Master of Arts in Humanities with a focus on African American History and Women's Studies from Duke University Graduate School.

Brown's appointment concludes a nine-month national search led by the nine-member Presidential Search Committee comprised of Alverno trustees, faculty, staff and alumnae. Spencer Stuart, a global executive search and leadership consulting firm, assisted Alverno with the search process.

"Known both locally and nationally as a passionate advocate for girls and women, we can't wait to welcome Christy to Alverno," Hudson said.

"We look forward Christy's visionary and strategic leadership as we embark on the 2023-2024 academic year and celebrate the 50th anniversary of Alverno's innovative and revolutionary '8 Abilities'-based curriculum, which is the foundation of the Alverno experience."

COMMUNITY HEALTH FAIR AND CHARITY BASKETBALL GAME FOR COLORECTAL CANCER AWARENESS APRIL 29

Health Connections Incorporated (HCI) and the Milwaukee Black Grassroots Network for Health Equity (MBGNHE) are hosting "Slam Dunk Colorectal Cancer Health Fair & Charity Basketball Game" to bring awareness to Colorectal Cancer (CRC) Saturday, April 29.

The event will be held at the Early View Academy of Excellence, 7132 W. Good Hope Rd., starting at 9 a.m.

In addition to raising awareness about CRC, this family-friendly event aims to provide health education, foster community engagement on the critical issue of colorectal cancer and introduce pathways for CRC screenings.

When the original "Black Panther" Star Chadwick Boseman died of colorectal cancer at age 43, it highlighted the U.S. cancer disparities within vulnerable racial and ethnic populations.

For so many people, especially for African Americans, the shock of Boseman's death created a national conversation on the importance of preventative health and health screenings.

The film release of "Black Panther: Wakanda Forever" in 2022 propelled Health Connections Inc. to join forces with several community partners to galvanize the most vulnerable and high-risk communities that we already serve to create Wakanda Wellness Week in November 2022.

The event is a continuation of these community-level health promotion activities for CRC awareness

and screenings.

Colorectal Cancer (CRC) is the 2nd most common cancer in Wisconsin and it is a preventable cancer. Overall African Americans are 20% more likely to develop CRC and 40% more likely to die from CRC.

In Milwaukee County, 40% of adults ages 45 and above have not screened for CRC as recommended by the US Public Health Service. Screening is a powerful tool that can prevent an avoidable illness and death.

Health Connections Incorporated is a medical clinic with services that include a focus on impactful community outreach, active awareness, and creating systems for healthcare access and health equity.

Colorectal cancer is a key area of focus for HCI, and this event is part of its ongoing efforts to promote screening and early detection for this disease.

The "Slam Dunk Colorectal Cancer Health Fair & Charity Basketball Game" will feature a number of health partners who will share their expertise and provide valuable information about colorectal cancer along with other health-related resources. Attendees will also enjoy a charity basketball game played by Milwaukee leaders from various organizations.

"If you are under 45 and display symptoms - constant diarrhea, constipation, stomach cramps or blood in your stool - you need to be screened for CRC," says Ericka Sinclair, Chief Executive Officer of Health Connections.

"If you are age of 45 and above - it is important to get screened regardless if you are showing symptoms or not."

"Routine screening for CRC directly impacts the number of long-term CRC survivors." In addition to the health fair and basketball game, there will be a live DJ, a variety of food vendors including food trucks, health screening demonstrations, and free

Milwaukee County to Highlight Ways to Access Mental Health Services During May - Mental Health Awareness Month

In May, Mental Health Awareness Month, Milwaukee County Behavioral Health Services (BHS) wants to ensure residents know what mental health and substance use disorder services are available, and how to easily access them.

With the closure of the Mental Health Complex last fall, Milwaukee County Behavioral Health Services transitioned to community-based locations in neighborhoods, meeting residents where they are.

Accessibility to behavioral health services is greater than ever. Services include Community Access to Recovery Services (CARS), the Crisis Assessment Response Team (CART), the Milwaukee Mobile Crisis Team, Access Clinics and the Milwaukee County Mental Health Clinic.

These services provide care and treatment for individuals in need of mental health or substance use disorder services.

This community-based approach is part of the behavioral health system redesign which began more than a decade ago.

“Our hope is that more families, friends and loved ones will have open conversations about mental health and struggles being faced,” said Shakita LaGrant-McClain, Executive Director, Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services.

“Mental health challenges affect our entire community, and we must work to destigmatize the need for mental health support.

I encourage Milwaukee County residents to explore the services and resources available to them.

There are mental health and substance use crisis resources here within our community, and the teams are ready to help.”

Highlight a Different Area of Focus Each Week in May

Each week in May, BHS is offering interview opportunities with spokespeople to discuss services and resources available for Milwaukee County residents and how they get connected.

Week of May 1-7: Community Access to Recovery Services (CARS)

For over 30 years, CARS has proudly served adults living with substance use and mental health disorders.

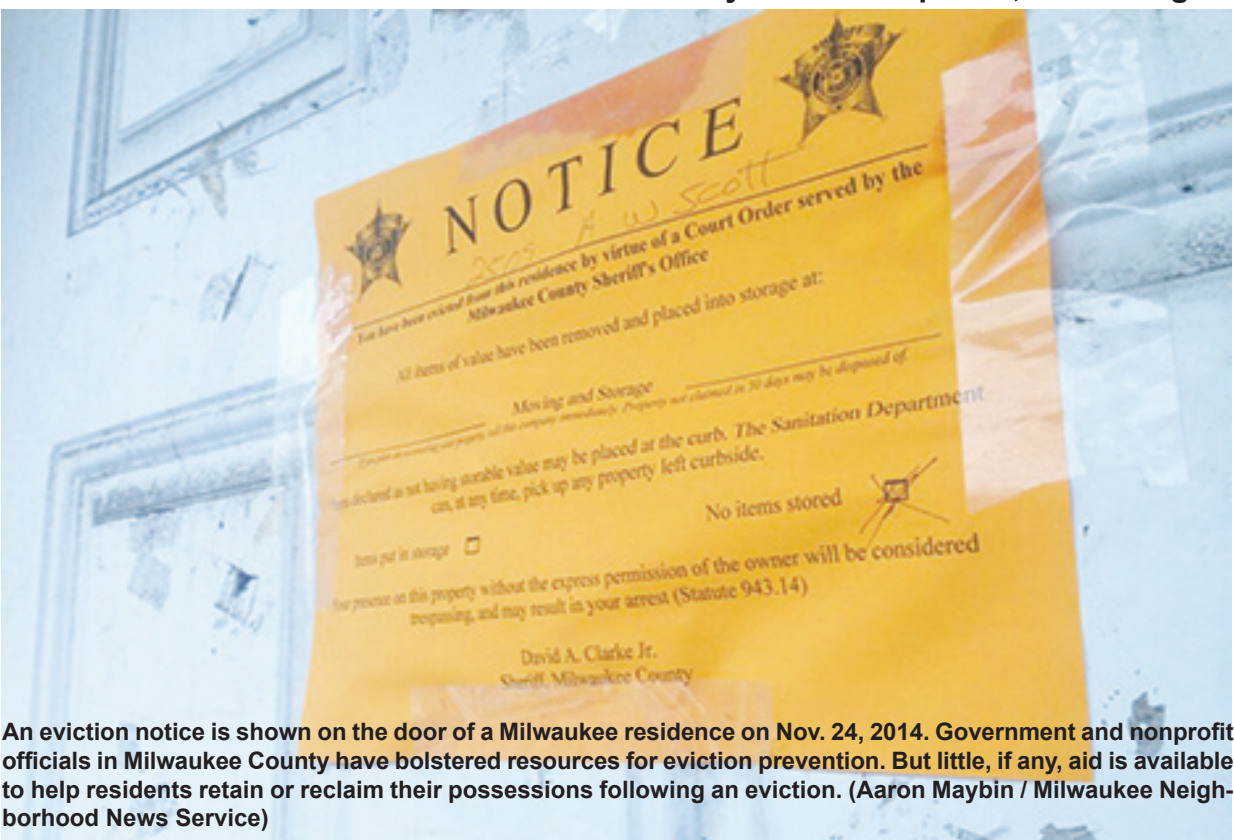
CARS provides a range of supportive services (prevention, treatment, care management and recovery support) to Milwaukee County residents that are rooted in compassion and dignity.

The goal is to eliminate barriers to behavioral health services and increase our community's ability to thrive.

Week of May 8-14: Crisis Assessment Response Team (CART)

CART works in partnership with law enforcement for co-response to mental health emergency calls. Clinicians respond to 911 dispatch and requests from other police officers or mobile clinicians for mental health emergencies.

WISCONSIN EVICTION PROCESS: What happens to a tenant's property?

What Milwaukee renters and those statewide should know about their possessions after an eviction.

Wisconsinites who experience eviction sometimes lose more than a home.

Those who can’t afford to move and store their belongings may lose them, too — adding to the financial and emotional toll of displacement.

In Milwaukee County, where landlords filed for more than 200 evictions in the first week of April alone — about half of those filed statewide — government and nonprofit officials have in recent years bolstered resources for eviction prevention. But little, if any, aid is available to help residents retain or reclaim their possessions following an eviction.

What happens to a tenant’s stuff during and after an eviction? Here’s what to know:

Eviction requires judge’s signoff
First, remember that a landlord can’t remove a tenant without a judge’s order.

It is illegal for a landlord to file for an eviction before giving a tenant a notice, usually of five or 28 days.

When tenants face an eviction, housing advocates suggest they talk to their landlords, apply for rental assistance and find legal support. Milwaukee County residents can visit EvictionFreeMKE.org to find resources, including free legal representation and information about their rights as a tenant.

Check language in lease
Milwaukee County is among jurisdictions that used to require any landlord to hire a moving company to assist a county sheriff’s office with eviction. But a 2013 state law made such requirements dependent upon leasing language.

Under that state law, landlords may dispose of items however they want to — without hiring a mover — if a lease specifies that landlords won’t store left-behind items. There is one exception: prescription medication and equipment. A landlord must hold those items for seven days and return them at a tenant’s request.

If the lease doesn’t explain how the landlord will handle left-behind property, Milwaukee County landlords must hire one of the two moving companies approved by the

sheriff’s office.

Executing an eviction

When the sheriff executes an eviction, a tenant who comes to the door gets about 15 minutes to gather their belongings and leave, said Tom Brittain, president of Eagle Movers, one of the bonded moving companies in Milwaukee County certified for eviction-related moves.

Sometimes tenants aren’t there when the sheriff arrives. In either case, the sheriff decides what goes with the moving company, according to Brittain.

The movers do not take items the sheriff declares as junk, such as

dressers with missing drawers, stained beds or insect-infested furniture, Brittain said. Due to safety concerns, the company also leaves clothing that’s on the floor or dirty. A landlord can ask the movers to place “junk” items on the curb for garbage collection.

State law requires the sheriff to mail a notice to the tenant’s last known address within three days of the removal of possessions. The notice must tell tenants where they can retrieve their possessions.

Landlords and tenants must pay the moving company. In some counties, the moving company’s monthly storage can cost more than the tenant’s rent. Eagle Movers charges landlords \$220 per hour for five movers and a truck, Brittain said. The company charges tenants \$30 per month for every 100 cubic feet plus a \$60 labor charge, Brittain said.

If items go unclaimed for two months, Brittain notifies the tenant by phone, email or letter that their belongings will be sold. About 60 to 70% of people reclaim their belongings, Brittain said.

“I’ve always looked at us as kind of a lifeboat for tenants,” Brittain said.

Currently, there aren’t any programs that assist people with funding to rent trailers or U-Haul vans to move their belongings. But Heiner

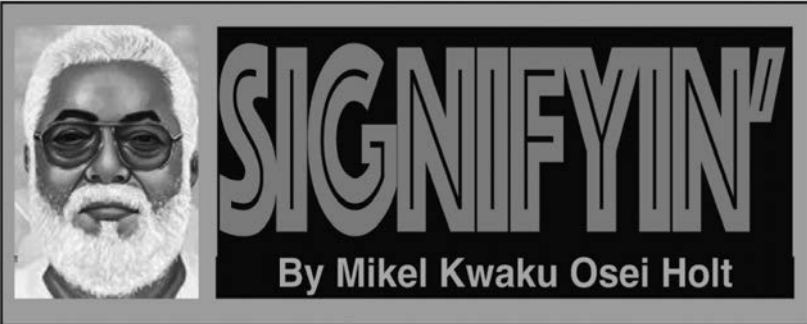
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There is little doubt Black America is facing an unprecedented mental health crisis.

In many respects, it is one of the most profound challenges of our existence, dating back to when our ancestors were released from plantation prisons without a pot to pee in and a window to throw it out.

As in 1865, our streets today are littered with the psychologically scarred survivors of 'American apartheid.'

Unlike Reconstruction, however, today they carry the added weight of a virus (COVID-19) that has resulted in the loss of jobs, drained bank accounts, and burdened Black students to the point the Black depression rate is soaring.

At the very least, it widened the academic achievement gap where our children are, on average, two years behind their white counterparts.

One report conservatively suggests 60% of Black Milwaukee students emerged from the pandemic in need of counseling—"emotional repair."

Depending on your reference, a similar rate of Black adults have been affected.

This mental health crisis has turned our village into a reservation (no disrespect to our Native brothers and sisters).

As such, we have turned our frustration, anxiety, and depression inward in the form of road rage, domestic violence, and child abuse.

Car accidents now lead to gun fights. The dozens can

quickly lead to 'six' (six bullets—if the gun is a revolver—or six feet in the ground...as in grave).

The atmosphere is so toxic the police have hired security.

But jokes aside, at what point does our cultural dysfunction intersect with mental illness?

In other words, are we blaming mental illness for the communal implosion, urban terrorism, and record homicide rate?

The pandemic did, in fact, exacerbate the level of what has been called 'urban PTSD.' Still, there are other contributing factors to the poor academic performance and discipline problems in local schools, as well as the epidemic of reckless driving, domestic abuse, and record-breaking murder rate.

Simply put, another viral contamination impacts a large percentage of the innocent and vulnerable. And it's not chemical; it's cultural.

I received hundreds of comments from a photo I posted last week of a mother and pre-teen daughter adorned in matching outfits, extending their middle fingers (above photo).

While the photo was widely condemned, few responders expressed shock. No one suggested it was an anomaly.

On the contrary, most posited that this 'mother' was planting

dysfunctional cultural seeds that would manifest into another Neckbone...2.0...with hot sauce.

Don't blame this example of cultural dysfunction on a virus. Instead, shift the focus on a sub-culture that is overwhelming social services, law enforcement, and spiritual ignorance.

Worse still, it is not by accident we are confronted with this disingenuous paradigm. Many will point toward a conspiratorial poison we ingested as if it were sugar-laden Kool-Aid. Ironically, we had the opportunity to abate but, instead, fueled this scheme with ignorance, apathy, and gullibility.

Few members of the 'Negrocracy' will admit it. Still, when the overseers' political agenda replaced fathers with an uncle (Sam) in the 1970s, a 'devolution' of our Africentric tenets was set into motion, replacing them with the existing 'Culture of Poverty.'

Despite warnings, Black leaders hid their heads in the sand or tapped danced to 'missionary tunes' while they stripped from us our mores,

values, and even our God-ordained family prototype.

Before that 'scheme,' it is estimated that 70% of Black households were nuclear (mother, father, two children tops), albeit a large percentage being poor.

Today, 70% are headed by a single sister (mother), trying to take on the Herculean task of being a mother AND a father.

Far too many ventures into that role, either ignorant of the task at hand or hopeful that the sperm donor will awaken from his fog of self-hatred, illiteracy (over half can't read or write above a fifth-grade level), and illegitimate lifestyles.

Many brothers do take responsibility for their child or children. They work hard, provide both financial and emotional support.

Within that group, a significant percentage have become role models worthy of duplication.

Many single mothers likewise overcome the odds, producing culturally and spiritually attuned children who embrace their God-given talents and excel in life.

But in far, far, far too many cases, today's multigenerational impoverished sistah is rowing upstream.

She is an uneducated, frequently illiterate, and spiritually bankrupt 'baby mama' who is content with her status, as she has been programmed to be.

And she 'manages' more than disciplining her children. She "raises her daughter, but loves her son," who becomes an 'independent contractor' raised by the streets and peers.

Mental illness is crippling our community, and limited resources are slowing what has become an epidemic of monumental proportions.

But you can't blame the activities of the Kia boys and girls, the urban terrorists, or the disrespect they show toward Black institutions, our elderly, and each other on the stress created by the pandemic.

Recently, I heard a White 'apologist' who, several years ago, blamed the academic failure of Black students on poverty. She updated her excuse to now blame mental illness.

Indeed, the pandemic impacted Milwaukee's status as hosting the broadest academic achievement gap between Black and white students in the country.

But Milwaukee was already—by then—home to the lowest reading proficiency rate for African American fourth graders in the country! We were 'awarded' that status in 2010!

Yet, because Black leaders went 'MIA,' and the governor—who was state superintendent of schools at the time—did nothing but sing the blues, their collective apathy led to a similar status for Black eighth graders several years later.

Milwaukee has been at the lower end of the graduation rankings since the school desegregation settlement of 1976 while hosting a suspension rate that has prompted a federal complaint.

The state distinction of having the highest Black male incarceration rate directly results

from our educational failures. Wisconsin 'earned' that distinction three decades before the pandemic.

You can blame the pandemic for much, but it wasn't a virus that kept 90% of the parents whose children are underperforming home for the school board elections earlier this month.

Mental illness doesn't stop Black parents from attending teacher conferences, teaching their children to count and/or know the alphabet before they send them to school.

What virus stops them from reading to their children, taking them to the library, or stressing the importance of education?

Or maybe it's the lead-infused water that 'forces' them to convince their children they are 'niggers (n-words), bitches (b-word), hoers, and heifers?'

If it were left to me, telling their children they are lazy, shiftless, 'ignorant savages' (that's what nigger means), or an animal---male and female dogs--is second-degree felony child abuse.

And those sperm donors (single Black males who can't keep it zipped-up) are equally, if not more, responsible for this tragedy. A male who helps make a child—but does not support or guide that child—is scum, a traitor, a 'Neckbone' covered in chitterlings gravy.

A 'man' who is proudly unemployed (unless pimping his woman), too busy smoking joints, or smelling his feet is, at best, a 'man-child' who epitomizes the disingenuous role of 'baby daddy.' Make that 'baby dud.'

Yes, COVID-19 and the resulting pandemic contributed mightily to mental illness in our community. But it is a cultural virus of another sort that has plagued us for the last half-century.

Hopefully, resources will become available to address that medical problem. But it's gonna take more than a White Knight and his 'Uncle's' intervention to solve what really ails us.

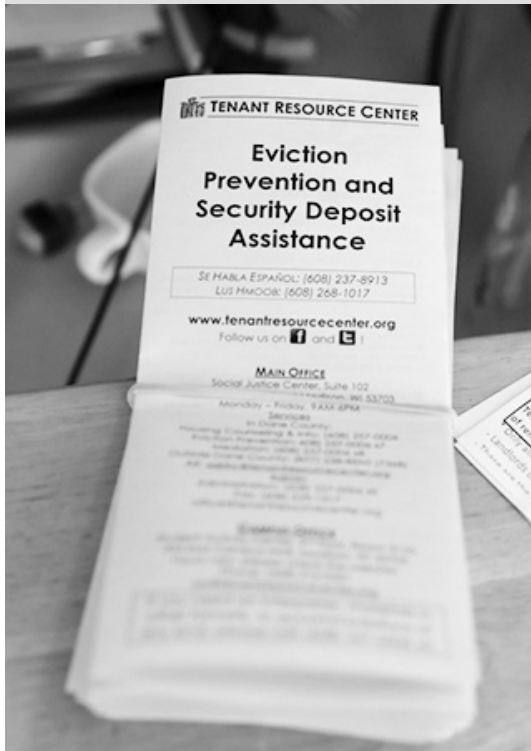

"Currently, there aren't any programs that assist people with funding to rent trailers or U-Haul vans to move their belongings. Giese, an attorney who represents the Apartment Association of Southeastern Wisconsin, said there should be.

"They've given (millions) to pay for lawyers to help tenants, which is all well and good. They can get a delay or they can get the case dismissed," Giese said. "But jeez, you know, they should take some of that money, a very small amount of it and they could really do some good by having a fund available for tenants."

What happens to pets during an eviction?

Sometimes tenants manage to remove their belongings before the sheriff arrives but struggle to find a place for their pets.

Surrendering a pet to an animal shelter can be difficult due to a lack of capacity. Karen Sparapani, executive director of the Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission, has seen cases in which a tenant will return to their former rental every day to feed the animal until the sheriff executes the eviction. In other cases, pets are left to starve, said Sparapani.

The sheriff calls Sparapani's office to pick up animals left behind during an eviction, typically dogs over 40 pounds and many cats, Sparapani said.

The agency will put pets up for adoption if they go unclaimed for more than eight days.

"We can work with somebody who has time to find a place, and we work with them on fees too," Sparapani said.

Pet owners who return must pay a boarding fee of \$20 a day, plus a \$25 impound fee for a licensed animal and \$35 for unlicensed animals, Sparapani said. Any necessary vaccines or other treatment will add costs.

HARRY BELAFONTE

Actor, singer, activist dies at 96

He was one of the organizers for "We Are the World," and was involved in the anti-apartheid movement and many other humanitarian efforts in Africa.

Prolific artist and fearless civil rights activist, Harry Belafonte never minced words when it came to challenging perceptions of race, social justice and pushing humanity to “make the world a little better.”

“I am a man who perceives life in a certain way, a man who rejects things that defecate on humankind, who rejects anything that will not give people room for dissent,” he once said.

A warrior at heart who seamlessly combined soulful performances in film and music with a fearless sensibility in matters of

race and human rights, Belafonte died on Tuesday at age 96.

Belafonte was born in New York City to immigrant parents on March 1, 1927. His father, a Royal Navy chef, was from Martinique; his mother, a housekeeper, hailed from Jamaica. Both parents had racially mixed backgrounds. In Arnold Shaw’s biography, “Belafonte,” the performer talked about his family’s makeup and the influence it had on him as a child.

“If you could see my whole family congregated together, you would see every tonality of color, from the darkest black, like my Uncle Hyne, to the ruddiest white, like my Uncle Eric, a Scotsman,” he said.

Belafonte lived in New York until he was 9 when his mother moved him and his brother to her native country to protect them from Harlem’s harsh, Depression-era streets.

He attended Jamaica’s private British boarding schools, which commonly used caning to discipline.

In Jamaica, he wasn’t always treated well by his lighter-skinned relatives, yet he found a way to embrace his new home, which had a major influence on him.

“I still have the impression of an environment that sang. Nature sang and the people sang, too,” Belafonte said in Shaw’s biography. “The streets of Kingston

constantly rang with the songs of piping peddlers or politicians drumming up votes in the lifting singsong of the island. I loved it.”

Belafonte returned to New York at age 13 and would leave high school to join the Navy in 1944.

On his return from World War II, he studied acting in the city while performing at the American Negro Theatre with Sidney Poitier, who was a janitor and drama student. Belafonte was a stagehand.

Over the next eight decades, the two would form a bond closer than brothers, working together in various films and fighting for civil rights. (Poitier passed away in January 2022 at age 94.)

“For over 80 years, Sidney and I laughed, cried and made as much mischief as we could,” Belafonte said in a statement following Poitier’s death.

“He was truly my brother and

partner in trying to make this world a little better. He certainly made mine a whole lot better.”

Belafonte paid for his acting classes by singing in cabarets and nightclubs.

Thanks to his soft but husky, melodic voice, his singing career quickly blossomed, landing him appearances in 1949 at New York’s famed Royal Roost and Village Vanguard clubs.

He signed his first recording contract with RCA Victor in 1952. In 1955, Belafonte recorded his breakthrough album, “Calypso” — the first record to sell more than 1 million copies — which introduced Caribbean sounds to mainstream audiences.

The album featured what would

become perhaps his best-known recording, the “Banana Boat Song,” also known by its popular call, “Day-O.”

With his handsome, magnetic on-screen presence, Belafonte landed a variety of strong leading roles, including “Bright Road” (1953) and “Carmen Jones” (1954), the latter a Black, modernized version of the opera, “Carmen.” (Belafonte’s voice, however, was deemed unsuitable and was dubbed by an opera singer.) In both films, he starred opposite Dorothy Dandridge. He pushed the envelope with his performance in “Island in the Sun” (1957), which features a brief affair between his and Joan Fontaine’s character. He starred in and produced Robert Wise’s “Odds Against Tomorrow” (1959), portraying a bank robber who reluctantly teams with a racist white partner, played by Robert Ryan.

One of television’s first black producers, Belafonte won an Emmy for 1959’s “Tonight With

arts in 1989, he told the Ottawa Citizen: “I couldn’t help thinking how much of my life had been spent at odds with these people, with the establishment, and here they were honoring me.”

For most of his career, Belafonte focused on using his stardom to put the spotlight on racial prejudice and injustice. He stood side by side with close friend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and other civil rights leaders. He was on the board of directors of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and helped organize the 1963 March on Washington. He was also chair of the memorial fund in honor of King.

Belafonte was one of the organizers of the Grammy Award-winning song, “We Are the World,” which also led to the formation of the USA for Africa foundation. In 1987, he received an appointment to UNICEF as a goodwill ambassador. He was also involved in the anti-apartheid movement and many other humanitarian efforts in Africa. Africare presented him with the Bishop John T. Walker Distinguished Humanitarian Service Award in 2002 for his work on the Continent.

Belafonte remained outspoken throughout his life. His left-of-center politics got perhaps the greatest attention in 2002 when he compared President George W. Bush’s Secretary of State Colin Powell to a house slave during a radio interview.

In 2006, as part of a delegation that included actor Danny Glover and scholar Cornel West, he met with Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez — a staunch Bush critic — and referred to Bush as “the greatest terrorist in the world.”

Of former President Barack Obama, Belafonte said in a 2009 interview on English Al Jazeera that the election of the country’s first black president didn’t erase the problems of racism in the U.S., and that the president had played a minimal role in generating an open and honest discussion on the subject.

In the aftermath of the 2010 Haiti earthquake, Belafonte, along with Glover and the Rev. Jesse Jackson, signed a letter demanding that the U.S. focus on sending aid to that country instead of deploying the military.

The NAACP awarded Belafonte the Spingarn Medal in 2013. During his acceptance speech, he spoke on gun control in America.

He also acknowledged previous recipients of the award who fought and used their voice “to remedy the ills of the nation” and urged Black artists to follow suit.

Belafonte is survived by his wife, Julie Robinson, and four children: Adrienne and Shari, his two daughters from his first marriage to Marguerite Byrd as well as David and Gina, his children with Robinson.
