Wisconsin Ranked #2 For Black Homicide Victimization!

95 Percent of Black Homicide Victims in Wisconsin were Killed with Guns

WASHINGTON, DC — Wisconsin has the second highest Black homicide victimization rate in the nation with a rate of 45.72 per 100,000—twice the national Black homicide victimization rate and seven and a half times the overall homicide rate nationwide—according to a new analysis by the Violence Policy Center (VPC).

In addition to national data, the annual study, Black Homicide Victimization in the United States: An Analysis of 2020 Homicide Data, also ranks the states according to their Black homicide victimization rates.

It is based on unpublished data from the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Supplementary Homicide Report (SHR).

The study details homicide rates for 2020, the most recent year for which comprehensive national data is available.

A related report released last week revealed Milwaukee has the nation's eighth highest African American homicide rate.

"The consistent, disproportionate impact of homicide on Black men, women, boys, and girls is a national shame.

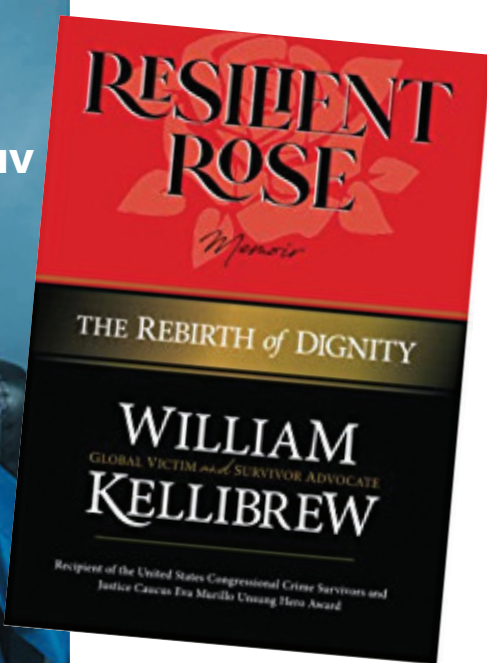
Guns are almost always the weapon used, and the ripple effects of each death ravage families, friends, and entire communities.

Each year we release this information to help support violence prevention advocates and organizations working on the local level while con-

Victim-survivor advocate, author William Kellibrew IV to give talk on surviving tragedy and trauma

William Kellibrew IV, a global victim-survivor advocate, and author, will talk about violence prevention and trauma responsive/healing centered approaches, and witnessing the murders of family members during a 'Conversation with William Kellibrew IV,' May 15, at America's Black Holocaust Museum (ABHM), starting at 5:30 p.m.

The event is being presented by the Coggs' and Coggs-Jones families, and sponsored by ABHM and Northcott Neighborhood House. The ABHM is located at 401 W. North Avenue.

Also appearing will be Pamela Coggs-Alexander, who is Kellibrew's mentor and former teacher.

Kellibrew lives each day with his passion in his

hand.

He is a global advocate for human, civil, children and victims' rights, focused on a values-driven approach to address trauma and violence.

Kellibrew knows the impact that trauma and violence has on individuals and families all too well.

On July 2, 1984, at age 10, Kellibrew witnessed the murders of his mother, Jacqueline and 12-year-old brother, Anthony, by his mom's ex-boyfriend in their family living room in Capitol Heights, Maryland.

The killer took his own life that day, but not before making William beg for his life at gunpoint.

His pathway to hope, healing, rebuilding, recovery

SAFE & SOUND: Fostering Neighborhood Safety for more than 25 Years!

More than 25 years ago Safe & Sound was founded under the premise that achieving safe neighborhoods involves residents, youth, and law enforcement working together. Safe & Sound is preparing to celebrate its Jubilee Anniversary this September.

"We're not the experts in any one area but when all players are involved, we really can achieve a safe community. Sometimes when we think of creating a safer Milwaukee, we

assume it takes a big organization to get the job done. What I find is that it is really a matter of neighbors individually and collectively feeling empowered to be the change they want to see.

"At Safe & Sound, we host many 'front porch' meetings where we talk with residents about getting involved, becoming mentors, attending crime meetings, or starting a neighborhood watch.

"I believe it takes a creative effort to become a city where there are not so many violent crimes.

"We must change the climate of having so many fatalities and

reckless driving incidents. It takes more engagement from every resident. We are not there yet, but we are making headway," said Bridget Whitaker,

Coincidentally, Safe & Sound, which had always been allocated space within a downtown law enforcement facility, recently purchased a building in

the Sherman Park neighborhood.

"Previously we could perform administration functions but we could not convene pro-

gramming and events in that limited space. The purchase and renovation of the facility at 4422 W. Leon Terrace, will allow us to host programming

and events,” said Whitaker. While Safe & Sound offers a number of initiatives and resources aimed at fostering safer neighborhoods, one of its more popular initiatives is Barbershop Monday, where youth 12-18 years of age meet at different locations throughout the city for intergenerational conversations about gun violence, bullying and drug prevention. The youth receive free haircuts at each event as an incentive to attend. According to Whitaker, they usually have been 20-25 youth at each event. Barbershop Mondays have been so successful that Safe & Sound also started a similar initiative for girls. Called “Smile and Slay,” the program creates a safe space to encourage young women, share information on how they can advocate for themselves, discuss domestic violence and healthy relationships, and introduce them to STEM programs. The girls also receive free services such as skincare, hair, and manicures. Whitaker is hopeful about Milwaukee’s future and remains undeterred by some of the negativity heard too frequently in mainstream media.



“I try to be thoughtful and focused on the great work that is happening across our community. Sometimes we lean in too much on the negative issues and stories. There are some amazing residents and youth leaders who are doing their part—working in partnership with one another—and it just shows that we are better together. “I am so proud to be part of Safe & Sound, an organization that values and recognizes that partnerships are the key ingredient to safe neighborhoods. 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OH RATS!



RODENTS found in North Division high school kitchen; health concerns raised by city health department!

As if North Division doesn't have enough problems fulfilling its mission to educate Black Milwaukee's teens!

Recently the Milwaukee Health Department (MHD) has found the beleaguered central city high school has been plagued by a rat infestation, primarily in the school's kitchen.

According to MHD reports, the problem first came to light last October. One report noted that if the problem wasn't rectified soon, health officials would close the kitchen. North Division High School students say they are not surprised rats are a problem in the building.

"It's dirty in there; really dirty. Dirty everywhere," said one student who did not want to be identified out of fear of retaliation. "My teacher was like, 'There's rats in the school already running down the hallway.' I was like, rats?!"

Parents interviewed by a local media outlet said they were shocked when they heard the news. "That really does raise a health concern and a safety concern for sure," said Tysheka Frazier, a parent of an ND student.

According to records from the Milwaukee Health Department, inspectors visiting the high school last October saw "evidence of rat droppings in the dry storage area." Inspectors gave the school two weeks to correct the issue.

In November, inspectors noted "some progress," but still found rat droppings.

A month later, inspectors spotted a "live rodent in the rest-room" during their visit. That same day, the health department issued an "intent to cease operations" notice to the school after finding "evidence of pests in the main kitchen...where food is pre-

and resilience can be credited to the many mentors, professionals in the mental health system, teachers, friends, professors, supporters and family members who did not give up on him including his grandmother who raised him and his siblings following the murders.

His journey from tragedy to triumph is outlined in his book, 'Resilient Rose: The Rebirth of Dignity,' which will be discussed during the conversation.

In 2011, the White House recognized Kellibrew as a 'Champion of Change.'

In 2013, he received the Voice Award from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration for his work across the country as a peer/consumer leader.

In 2014, he accepted the Capitol Probe Award at the District of Columbia Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony, and in 2015 he received the U.S. Congressional Victims' Rights Caucus Eva Murillo Unsung Hero Award.

decline at North, called the revelation of rats both disturbing and necessitating immediate action.

Call to Action has been soliciting input from alum and citizens for the past three years with the eventual goal of developing a plan to return North back to its historic prominence in the Black community.

Among the alumni are Rep. Gwen Moore, former Superintendent Howard Fuller and Robert Thomas, a pioneering entrepreneur.

Today, however, North is recognized as the worst performing

(a) mixer." There was even evidence that rat "traps were found pushed out of place."

On April 14, the Milwaukee Health Department told MPS the "in-house pest control program has not been successful." Inspectors told the school to have a backup plan to prepare food at another location.

"That is something that should have been addressed a long time ago," Frazier said.

Mac Weddle, president of 'Call to Action,' a non-profit created to specifically address the academic

high school in the Midwest. It has the lowest reading, math and science proficiency scores in the state.

Despite a dozen 'reform' measures by the school board in the last decade, the needle has not moved for the better.

Most recently, the school board designated North a 'community school,' which provides minuscule wrap around services for students. But that program does not address academics.

And, ironically, part of its focus

is on 'rebranding' the school to attract new students.

The highly publicized rat program, however, has blown the bottom out of that recruitment effort.

Weddle said following a meeting of the organization with alumni Tuesday, he has heard of several parents who are considering removing their children from the school.

"They are concerned about safety, not only discipline and violence, but now rat infestation. Rats are connected with diseases, and since the television report showed them in the cafeteria area, there is much to be concerned about.

"I've heard reports of children being afraid to sit down in a classroom. Or go to the rest room. If this was the suburbs, we wouldn't be having this conversation."

Waddle's organization, consisting primarily of alumni, including many community members, civic and business leaders, had planned a meeting with the principal prior to the rat revelations. Weddle said the academic concerns will now share space with safety and health concerns.

In a statement on the rat problem, Milwaukee Public Schools said it is working closely with the

Health Department and utilizing licensed personnel to perform eradication measures. MPS has also conferred with an outside vendor that confirmed the district is implementing all necessary measures to rectify the issue.

"This facility impacted is one of the district's smallest food preparation sites. All food preparation areas are washed and sanitized daily and all meals prepared at this location are heat-sealed and stored in a refrigerator or freezer.

"The district uses quality control measures, ensuring that if any food were ever identified as being

compromised it would be destroyed."

In the end, students say this has been a daily distraction.

"People barely want to sit down in the classrooms because they heard there's rats," the student said.

A health department spokeswoman added that closing a school kitchen is not something officials take lightly. In some cases, a school meal may be a child's only meal of the day.

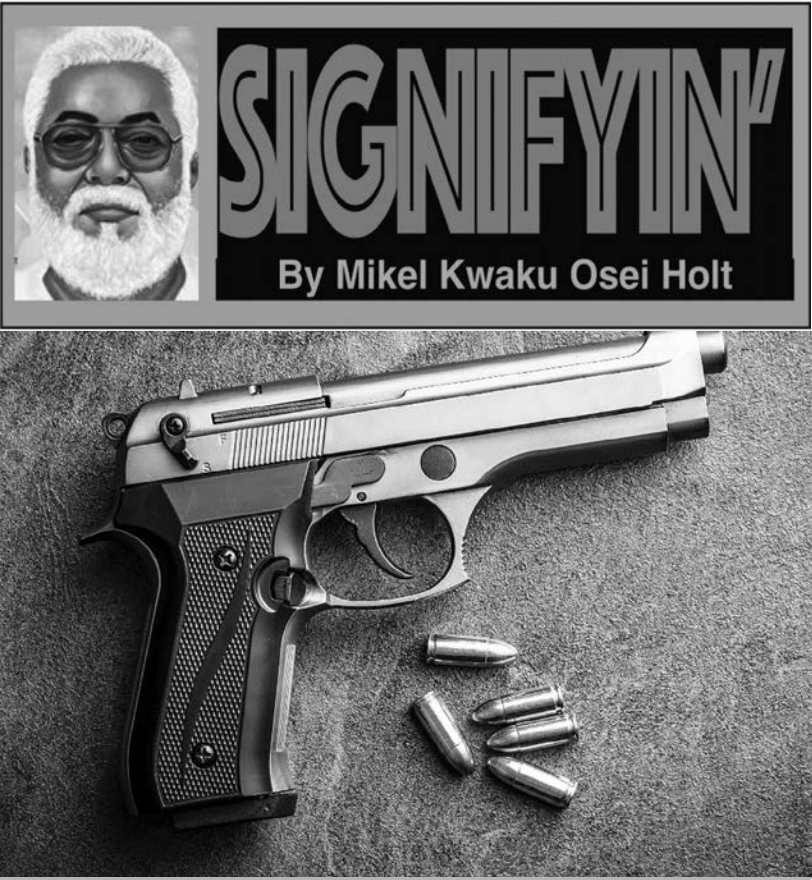
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SIGNIFYIN'

To own, or not to own, a GUN!

You could feel the angst in his voice as he spoke.

His eyes closed, and his brow tightened, reflecting the trepidation only a parent can attest to when his child is confronted with a life-and-death situation for which either of two options would permanently scar them. I was transfixed as the well-

known brother explained the scenario:

He backed up to the gas station pump as another driver pulled up. The two cars collided even though he was moving at a snail's pace.

The impact was minimal, but the sudden stop was enough to rouse the senior's grandson, who had been sleeping in the passenger seat.

But it soon became apparent

the accident was no accident.

If there was any doubt, it quickly evaporated as the driver exited his vehicle, spewing a barrage of obscenities in a threatening manner inappropriate for the 'accident.'

His tone was threatening---obviously a rehearsed diatribe.

All doubt about his intent was erased when he demanded payment for his nonexistent damages.

Shocked by the audacity of the driver, the grandfather was on the verge of equaling the tone of the 'extorter' when the 'brother' opened his jacket to reveal a sizeable semi-automatic handgun.

Before he could respond to this implied threat, the senior's grandson emerged from the passenger's door and quickly put himself between them.

Ignoring the grandson's plea to 'chill,' the driver made a menacing movement that left little doubt that this scenario was potentially heading toward an unhappy ending.

"Naw, brother, it's not going down like that," the grandson said, lifting his sweatshirt to reveal his gun.

"Don't worry, Papa," he told his grandfather, "I got this."

With anxiety written on his face, the grandparent paused before continuing his story to me.

"I can't remember being more afraid..." he said, his voice trailing. "I didn't want my grandson to get shot, but I didn't want him to shoot the guy either. It was a horrible experience; there was

no positive outcome."

Fortunately, it didn't escalate any further. Considering his options, the driver's demand of 'cash for the nonexistent damage' evaporated along with his bravado.

Not by coincidence, he quickly dismissed the grandfather's suggestion to call the police or exchange insurance information.

What didn't go the way of marriage, church membership, and safe streets, however, was the grandfather's anxiety.

"Homicides are now the number one cause of death for Black males between 16-25. And aside from an occasional stabbing or auto assault, most are committed by guns, which are easy to find since there are more of them in America than Americans."

Two weeks after the event, he was still sweating internally, and his blood pressure elevated every time he attempted to reconcile the two alternate endings in his mind.

The 'OK (coral) gas station' shootout was averted because common sense overruled emotion. But there have been dozens of incidents contributing to our city's historic murder rate that

didn't end as well.

A couple of weeks ago, the driver of a car that averted a reckless driver was murdered for expressing concern for the safety of his children.

Earlier this week, a Northside woman was arrested for stabbing her sister to death at the height of a family argument.

"I surely didn't want my grandson to get killed," the grandfather reflected, "and I also didn't want him permanently damaged by killing someone. Either way, he—we--would

his weapon. Was that intimidation? Obviously. Was it worthy of an equally volatile response?

Attribute the driver's action to record mental illness following the pandemic. Or to cultural devaluation and dysfunction, gangsta rap music, or too much reality television. I have long posited that we suffer from PTSD, but unlike Whites who explode (mass murder), we implode.

I received a report last week which revealed Milwaukee has the eighth-highest homicide rate

in the country.

I assume some of you are posulating had the grandson not been armed, there was no possibility of the scenario escalating.

But then again, had he not had a weapon, it could have also gone in an entirely different direction.

Consider also the extorter in this incident didn't have to show

Key findings from the survey include:

- Nearly a quarter of all the residential and mixed-use properties, or 3,818 properties, needed at least one major repair.
- Roughly 15% of the properties, or 2,486 properties, needed multiple major repairs.
- The percentage of investor-owned residential properties that need multiple major repairs is nearly double the percentage of owner-occupied homes in a similar condition.
- About 15% of the homes surveyed, or 2,537 properties, may have an increased risk of lead exposure since they were built prior to 1979 and were noted as having deteriorated exterior paint conditions.
- The total investment needed across the 15 neighborhoods is \$54,094,700, using estimated average costs for the major exterior repairs identified.

the homicide victimization rate for Black female victims was 6.25 per 100,000. In comparison, the overall rate for female homicide victims was 2.32 per 100,000 and the rate for white female homicide victims was 1.66 per 100,000.

For homicides in which the victim to offender relationship could be identified, 76 percent of Black victims (2,734 out of 3,585) were killed by someone they knew. The number of victims killed by strangers was 851.

For homicides in which the circumstances could be identified, 78 percent (3,837 out of 4,939) were not related to the commission of any other felony. Of these, 49 percent (1,868 homicides) involved arguments between the victim and the offender.

In addition, individuals living in communities where violence is prevalent are at higher risk for a broad range of negative health and behavior outcomes. An increased understanding of how trauma resulting from community violence influences development, health, and behavior can lead to improvements in the way many social services are delivered as well as

policy changes at the local and federal levels (see the July 2017 VPC study The Relationship Between Community Violence and Trauma: How Violence Affects Learning, Health, and Behavior). At the same time, the firearms industry, looking to expand beyond its shrinking base of white male gun owners, has launched an organized marketing campaign focusing on Black, Latino, and Asian Americans. If successful, such efforts can only increase gun death and injury in these communities (see the 2021 Violence Policy Center studies How the Firearms Industry and NRA Market Guns to Communities of Color and How the Firearms Industry Markets Guns to Asian Americans).

The rate of Black homicide victimization is calculated by dividing the number of Black homicide victims by the Black population and multiplying the result by 100,000. This is the standard and accepted method of comparing fatal levels of gun violence.

On average, more than 26 Black Americans died each day from homicide, of these, 22 were known to have died from gun homicides.

The Black homicide victimization rate in the United States was nearly four times the overall national victimization rate and seven times the white homicide victimization rate. In 2020, the black homicide victimization rate was 23.41 per 100,000. In comparison, the overall national homicide victimization rate was 6.03 per 100,000. For whites, the national homicide victimization rate was 3.24 per 100,000.

Eighty-six percent of Black homicide victims were male (8,398 of 9,753) and 14 percent were female (1,352 of 9,753). The sex of three victims was unknown.

The Black male homicide victimization rate in the United States was more than four times the overall male victimization rate and more than eight times the white male homicide victimization rate. In 2020, the homicide victimization rate for Black male victims was 41.92 per 100,000. In comparison, the overall rate for male homicide victims was 9.83 per 100,000 and the rate for white male homicide victims was 4.84 per 100,000.

continuing to educate and engage policymakers and the public on the need to address this national crisis," state VPC Executive Director Josh Sugarman.

This is the 2nd year in a row that Wisconsin has ranked within the 10 states in the nation with the highest Black homicide victimization rates.

For WISCONSIN, the study finds that in 2020: Of the 199 Black homicide victims, 158 were male and 41 were female.

Twenty-four Black homicide victims (12 percent) were less than 18 years old and 3 victims (2 percent) were 65 years of age or older. The average age was 31 years old.

When the weapon used could be identified, 95 percent of the Black homicide victims (169 out of 177) were killed with guns. Of these, 33 percent (55 victims) were killed with handguns.

For homicides in which the victim to offender relationship could be identified, 66 percent of Black homicide victims (52 out of 79) were killed by someone they knew. Twenty-seven were killed by strangers.

For homicides in which the circumstances could be identified, 79 percent (93 out of 118) were not related to the commission of any other felony. Of these, 47 percent (44 homicides) involved arguments between the victim and the offender.

For the entire UNITED STATES, the study finds that in 2020:

There were 9,753 Black homicide victims in the United States that year. Black Americans represented 14 percent of the U.S. population, yet accounted for 53 percent of all homicide victims.

For homicides in which the weapon used could be identified, 89 percent of Black victims (8,285 out of 9,297) were shot and killed with guns. Of these, 58 percent (4,776 victims) were killed with

first Black-owned gun shop in the state. He will soon be a millionaire as gun sales continue at a record-setting pace, particularly among Black women.

Don't blame Barack Obama, but gun sales went through the roof during his administration and have continued unabated since then.

Many Whites bought guns, fearing the 'Milwaukee Mau Mau.' Many African Americans, in turn, buy weapons fearing urban terrorists and 'Trump's Troops.'

Ironically, I felt safer in Vietnam than in Milwaukee today.

Today, it appears everybody and their mama's sister

is armed. And I'm not exaggerating.

A few years ago, I joked about an observance when I stopped at a gas station in a remote area up north.

As I entered the store, I observed 95-year-old 'Granny Clampett' adjusting her AK-47 in her staging bra. Her snot-nosed grandchild, 'Baby Huey,' had a .45 holding up his spoiled

diaper.

Most of my relatives, including the women, are packing, and I'm not talking about their butts.

I haven't seen statistics, but I assume the overwhelming majority of killings are of the second-degree or manslaughter variety, meaning they were not planned but resulted from spontaneous emotional reactions.

Less than 10% are the result of self-defense.

And in truth, the possibility of being presented with an opportunity to defend yourself no matter the caliber of the weapon or the color of its handle (the sale of pink, green, and blue-handled weapons is skyrocketing) is a right that I agree with.

But that doesn't mean you should carry. Or worse still, assume a gun improves your chance of survival during a confrontation with a terrorist, relative, or the Kenosha Klan.

I have a niece who was carjacked at a gas station, even though she was carrying. Her gun was in her purse---on the car seat.

My advice: either keep it in

her jacket pocket, waistband, or hand while pumping.

Better still, never gas up, at night, in the central city.

Of course, another option is to outlaw all weapons (which is both unreasonable and politically impossible) or prayer.

But given that the collective pleas of the righteous have thus far not resulted in divine intervention, other options should be explored.

Maybe the reason for that is that most large Black churches have armed guards (masquerading as deacons or ushers), and last time I checked, a large percentage of pastors are armed or hosting CCW classes.

Either they don't have 'faith' or faithfully agree that prayer without works means carrying a big stick, or 9 mm.

It's a no-win situation at this point and time in our history. America could cut the homicide rate drastically if we had the will. But to do so is to give up our civil liberties, an ideal most would reject.

I grew up in a family of hunters and migrants from the South who did not believe in turning the other cheek to bigots.

I thus understood the rationale for having loaded shotguns in the closet and why my father kept a gun in the drawer and one in the car.

He wasn't as concerned about the Milwaukee Nazis as the other terrorists in blackface.

A few years ago, he asked me to provide him a gun for safety. I considered it, but not for long since he was totally blind, and not all of his relatives knew to identify themselves before invading his space.

At MCJ Associate Publisher Robert Thomas' memorial services last week, his son, Speech, revealed his father always carried a .38.

I knew about it since I offered

to clean it more than once, thinking it would blow up in his face if he had to use it. Since he was not disfigured, I assume he never did.

The unkept weapon was not unusual given most folks with guns---a significant percentage of which are illegal---don't understand their inner workings or have never been trained in their proper operation or care.

Which makes this entire scenario all the more frightening.

All of my sons and I have earned black belts in karate. Yet all also have CCWs, knowing they will be lucky if they can resolve a problem the old-fashioned way.

Ironically, I recently took my 13-year-old grandson to the shooting range. My plans include teaching my children self-defense, including how to kill.

That might sound absurd, maybe uncivilized. But we don't live in civilized times. Many of us have designated all land to the left of the lake to be the Wild, Wild West.

And those who are trained know that John Wayne 'shoot the enemy's gun outta his hand' doesn't work. Ask the police.

I hope folks understand that no one wins in a gunfight. And even the survivor will be confronted with emotions that will most likely haunt them for the rest of their lives.

Don't take my word for it; visit the VA on any day of the week. Most of the patients suffer from physical ailments. But a large percentage are pained by PTSD, including me.

Even with that reality, I pray you will never be confronted with the emotional damage suffered by my barber. Even though his life and death experience ended on a positive note. He was eternally scarred.

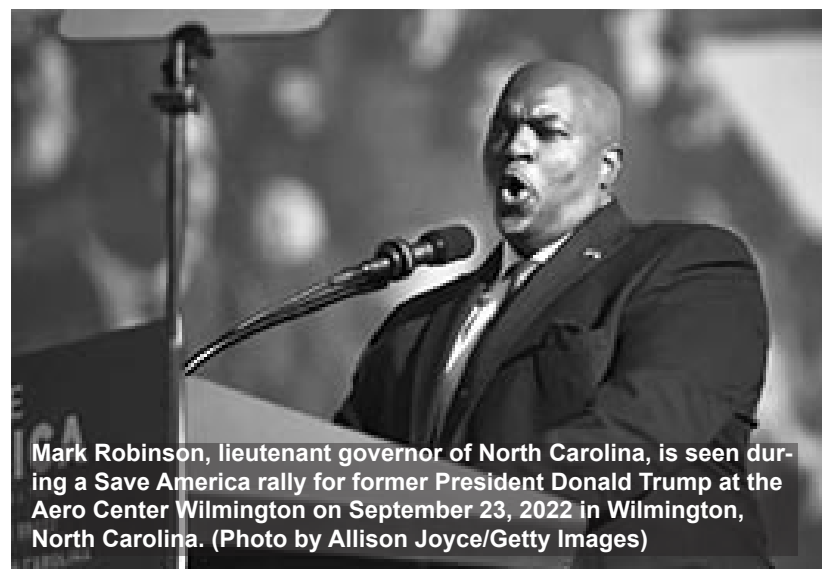

SAY WHAT?! Republican Mark Robinson says Black people owe reparations! *OPINION: AND, He could become North Carolina's next governor!*

Editor's note: The following article is an op-ed, and the views expressed are the author's own.

Meet Mark Robinson a Republican running for governor in North Carolina who thinks Black people should be paying reparations. It's bizarre even for the bizarre modern GOP, but here we are. Robinson, 54, is North Carolina's lieutenant governor, and he seems like a lefty's caricature of a modern right wing politician. He's what we would dream up to make fun of the right.

He thinks Covid wasn't a real threat, systemic racism doesn't exist and the movie, "Black Panther," was, buckle up, "created by an agnostic Jew and put to film by satanic Marxists." The right loves to say the left is filled with Marxists. It's a weird obsession. Robinson also said President Obama was "a worthless, anti-American atheist who wanted to bring America to its knees and then raise it back to its feet as a European style socialist hell hole." He also called Michelle Obama "a man." So, yeah, he's another Black Republican who's willing to say racist things. He's like a grimmer version of Candace Owens. And he could be North Carolina's next governor.

Robinson captured my attention when a speech he gave in 2021 began bubbling up on Black social media. In the speech he said he opposed reparations because no one owes Black people anything. Typical right wing stuff until ... he took a turn.

"Nobody owes you anything for slavery. If you want to tell the truth about it, it is you who owes," he said as if he was speaking to Black people en masse. "Why do you owe? Because somebody in those fields took strikes for you. After those fields were ended and slavery was ended, somebody had to walk through Jim Crow for you. Somebody fought wars and died for you. Somebody lived less than because they didn't have what you have, and they did it for you. There are people in their graves right now, and they are there because they were willing to stand up and fight for you." He concluded, "Nobody owes you anything. If anybody owes, it's you. Because you've been the benefactor of freedom, you are the one that owes." If you want to hear him say this himself you can go here but, you know, it could be triggering to deal with so much internalized racism and tap dancing for white folks all at once.

That said, I don't totally disagree with Robinson in this speech. He's actually touching on a feeling I have long had about our ancestors. From

of their work. I feel like I owe them something. On that, I agree with Robinson. But, typical of right wingers, he’s taken a good idea and leapt to a strange conclusion.
Where Robinson and I part ways is that I understand that debt is spiritual. It’s something I need to pay forward in my community and my family rather than an actual bill that I should pay. When Robinson combines this very real and beautiful notion of what we owe the ancestors with the idea of reparations, it becomes strange and even gross. And the idea we owe the ancestors something does not eliminate the moral right to reparations.
