Groundbreaking Ceremony for MLK Library Apartments Project May 19

May 19 is the date Emem Group and General Capital Group will break ground on for the new MLK Library Apartments. The groundbreaking ceremony will start at 12:30pm at the current Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Library branch located at 310 West Locust Avenue.

The \$38.8M project will transform the 2900 block of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Drive into 93 affordable apartments and a new 18,000 square foot library branch.

In total, five parcels are being redeveloped encompassing vacant land and underutilized buildings, including partial demolition and redevelopment of the former Garfield Theatre.

"Thanks to the support of so many who believed in the vision, we are ready to deliver a transformational project that the community will be proud of," said Michael Emem, Emem Group's President & CEO.

MILWAUKEE FATHERHOOD INITIATIVE: Helping Real Men Become Real Fathers

After watching her brother navigate obstacles to gain custody of his children Natasha Dotson felt his frustration.

Dotson felt his frustration. Angrily, she called the Milwaukee Fatherhood Initiative's office to vent.

As she shared her own frustration, Dotson was told by then-director, Terence Ray, that the organization could use her passion and fire.

Today Dotson is employed as Project Director of the Milwaukee Fatherhood Initiative (MFI).

In the case of Dotson's brother who had gotten in trouble with the law and served his time, the mother of his children was not in the picture and he was trying to

gain custody of his children who were in the foster care system.

He was working two jobs, but ninety percent of his paycheck was taken for back child support so he could not get ahead.

Dotson's brother's scenario is a common, circuitous cycle for

change that is needed to help these men. I want our men to know that they have support and help to connect them to the resources they need so they can take care of their children," said Dotson.

Since its inception in 2005, the

MFI has connected more than 12,000 Milwaukee men to resources to help them better meet the social, emotional and financial needs of their children and families.

MFI services include parenting, child support interest debt relief, driver's license recovery, employment, education, health, and more.

Over 95% of program participants are African American and other males of color. The MFI also hosts an annual Fatherhood Summit which is the largest annual gathering of men in the state.

One of MFI's most powerful and ongoing initiatives is their involvement with "Real Men, Real Talk," which is held every third Monday at Gee's Clippers, located on North Dr. Martin Luther King Drive. Typically, 100 to 150 men show up and have conversations about life, challenges, and encourage each other through information sharing and resources.

"These sessions are life chang-

ing. Usually, if it's not football or basketball, guys are not talking about anything.

"But, with the help of facilitators like Kwabena Nixon and Richard Badger, and others who has been involved since the beginning of MFI, these guys sit in a circle and have deep and meaningful conversations.

"Along with a few other women, I come at the beginning of these meetings to serve them a meal, then when the conversation starts, we leave so they have a free, safe space to open up and talk with one another," said Dotson.

The MFI, which started out as a City of Milwaukee initiative, is now under the leadership and direction of Wisconsin Community Services.

It also includes a nurturing training class—presented by a master trainer—to inmates in the



House of Corrections. The class constitutes as a parenting class which makes participants eligible for child support recovery from the interest owed on child support.

"Hearing the testimonies of guys after they've become part of the Milwaukee Fatherhood Initiative makes this work fulfilling for me.

"They learn that they are not alone and realize that someone is supporting them. I don't make a lot of money, but I enjoy helping these men and serving our black and brown communities.

"They come in feeling so defeated. It feels good for them to

know that someone understands what they are going through," said Dotson.

Dotson's message to fathers is clear and simple: "Don't ever give up—ever—no matter how bad the situation is. It may seem hopeless, but it is not. Never give up!"

The MFI and Natasha Dotson certainly don't plan to give up on the diamonds and gems we call children and fathers.

Tarik Moody, HYFIN, and the Art of Building Your Own Table

On March 5th the complete musical catalogue of hip-hop group De La Soul was finally available on streaming services after a very long record label dispute.

De La Soul was instrumental in not only my personal musical education but my cultural education as well.

Growing up as a white kid in a rural area, I didn't have as much exposure to different ideas, backgrounds, and points of view that were different than my friends and family and teachers. And De La was like nothing I had heard before.

Thinking back, it made me realize the importance of music. Particularly finding new music. Non-mainstream music. Music with new voices, different points of view, new sounds, new attitudes. Where can you find that new music, those new influences, those new voices now?

In Milwaukee, it's HYFIN. "Connecting the culture," as the tagline says.

HYFIN is a streaming music site that grew out of 88Nine Radio Milwaukee, and more specifically, Program Director Tarik Moody. "I have a syndicated show called Rhythm Lab Radio. I've been doing it for almost 18 years. You can call that the prototype," Tarik explains. According to the 88Nine website, "Rhythm Lab Radio redefines the urban sound with a mix of jazz, electronic, hip-hop and soul music. Each week, Rhythm Lab introduces listeners to new artists that are testing boundaries and making music that does not fit neatly into a single box." HYFIN, as in, a hyphen, which is used to join words to indicate they have a combined meaning.

Tarik calls the style "Urban Alternative." "There are so many Black artists in the diaspora not only here in America but in Africa and UK and whole diasporic sounds that really have come from Black culture that doesn't get much love on the mainstream media and so, I feel like it's an opportunity and a mission to do that justice with



HYFIN."

Everyone knows the Marvin Gayes, the De La Souls, the Jay-Zs and Beyonces, but who doesn't want to discover their next favorite

artists before they've hit it big? To be able to run and tell your friends, you gotta hear this. De La Soul is great, but what's next?

Tarik says, "If more people want

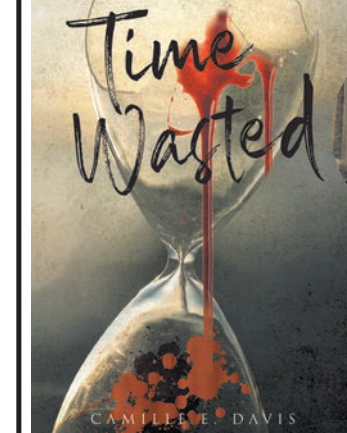
to step outside of their comfort zone and get away from the nostalgia of life and try something new, I think the world would be a better place."

HYFIN embraces the artists who are not typically what you know as R&B or hip-hop, giving their music a home. Artists like Jean Dawson, a half-Black, half-Mexican artist that pivots more into the rock side. No other rock stations play him, but he's found a home on HYFIN.

And 6lack, an amazing R&B singer who uses his music and platform to advocate for better mental health care and resources, giving young Black boys an opportunity to see a Black man sing and speak about issues that you don't nor-

‘Bestowing of the Kente’ at Alverno College

Recently these fourteen African American Alverno College grads were bestowed with a hand-woven African Kente Cloth stole during the schools annual ‘Bestowing of the Kente’ rites of passage ceremony. The stole features bright colors that honor West African heritage. During the ceremony, the students honor and thank loved ones who have supported them on their educational journeys. The ceremony is a way for Black students and their families to celebrate their heritage as well as their achievement. Alverno is one of only a handful of colleges in the U.S. that recognize Black graduates with the Bestowing of the Kente. The ceremony is separate from graduation, and over 900 people have taken part in the ceremony since its inception. The event took place in the Bucyrus Conference Center.

African American men are accustomed to irritate sisters putting their hands on their hips, swaying their heads, and rolling their eyes. But a White Walmart cashier's imitation of that cultural paradigm in response to a comment I made last week almost sparked a 'cuss out' of epic proportions.

Not only because her reaction to our conversation was disrespectful given that she was an employee with 'no business in our business,' but was also consistent with the movement re-energized by Donald Trump to 'take back America' through historical lies and claims of ethnic superiority.

For background, I was at a Walmart in Baraboo, WI, to purchase a few snacks to offset the high prices at the Wisconsin Dells (\$6 for a bottle of water at the Kalahari Resort).

While standing in line with my wife, I noticed a Native American behind me was wearing a 'cartouche,' the 'Egyptian amulet' that contains Hieroglyphic messages.

Applauding her choice of jewelry, I asked its content, at which point she proudly declared it contained her husband's name on its front and her name on the back.

I revealed mine had my late son's name inscribed, which I explained was appropriate because the amulet was initially reserved for Kemetic 'kings.' I have traced my bloodline to Rameses III. (Yeah, I'm royalty.)

Where is Kemet? She asked? "It's what the original inhabitants of the nation now called Egypt called their country. It means land of the blacks," I explained.

To the curious look on her face, I posited, what we call a cartouche, is actually a 'Shenu,' which means to encircle.

The French invaders under Napoleon called it a cartouche because it was shaped like their rifle bullets. "Cartouche means bullet."

At this point, I noticed the White cashier listening intently to our conversation instead of finalizing the sale of the person standing before her.

As I spoke, the cashier's expression morphed from curiosity to anger.

"We're not taught the truth about how Europeans colonized much of Africa, murdered our people, and took credit for our mastery of science, math, and

medicine," I declared boldly.

'Monotheism came out of Kemet, and the Greeks and Romans studied at the feet of our ancestors! They then claimed our achievements as their own. They change the names of our countries---in this case Egypt for Kemet.'

In the case of Kemet, Napoleon even blasted off the broad noses of the Kemet king statutes (the Sphinx[s]) to claim them as being European.

By now, the cashier was turning another color, rolling her eyes, and was on the verge of a connipation.

Amused by her reactions and that of the White man she was serving, I added, "Just like they killed most of your ancestors, stole your land, and made you aliens in your own country."

The Native sister was intently interested in my comments and nodded in agreement.

To be honest, the reactions of the cashier sparked my antagonistic rant. The look of disgust on her face sparked my diatribe.

Twisting the 'dagger,' I asserted it wasn't until 1879 that a lawsuit, initiated by Chief Standing Bear, settled the argument that Indigenous Americans were human beings.

The Native sister thanked me for the information and said she would look up my historical revelations, which I explained were in stark contrast to what she was probably taught in government schools.

The cashier's jaws were tight as I paid for my items. Adding to her angst was my polite comment, "How are you doing today, ma'am?"

I know she wanted to explode—probably call me out of my name.

She was lucky, as my wife, who had drifted off, had returned. My wife is less 'tolerant' than I and left (white) corporate America partly because of confrontations with its 'plantation owners.'

Honestly, my incendiary comments were directed not solely to-

ward the cashier but to every 'white winger' in North America.

Truth is truth, and it's battle we are waging today, as information becomes more readily available and access to alternative chronologies is presented. As a result, the walls of apartheid are crumbling.

Behind the cloud of 'His-story' is a bright ray of truth.

But that's tomorrow. Or in the next century. Those of us with the information will continue to strip away the lies and blasphemies.

The fact that I felt the need to 'carry' in that northwest resort city spoke volumes about my concerns---fears---of white aggression, an offshoot of the false claims of 'Manifest Destiny' and

back the past.

Despite the smiles and hospitality of merchants, it is hard to feel totally at ease if you're an African American, one of conscience who possess a grasp of 'true history' dating back to the beginning.

That fact was crystalized when we dove 20 miles outside the city for a fish-fry at a 'bar restaurant.' All of the Whites stared as if we were aliens. It wasn't until I took off my veteran's jacket and waved it around like a flag of truce that they returned to their meals.

The staff, however, was very accepting and kind.

The older I get, the less I tolerate racism, apartheid, and 'His-story.'

clusive of black and white.

But, as I said, we're not there yet.

On Mother's Day, my sister, my pastor, and her minister husband (who also wears his veteran's gear in his township near West Bend) stopped by to play cards.

(For the record, we veterans returned from six down to win the next 10 games of Bid Wist. But I'm not bragging.)

My sister and her husband needed a glass of wine to calm their nerves from an experience a day earlier when they were confronted by blatant racism while shopping at a grocery store in West Bend.

It was telling that my saintly

With 40 years of study and observation, I have earned the right, responsibility, and respect required to be heard.

And given I have more days behind me than in front of me, I have grown less tolerant of what Black men have to confront when we venture outside the 'safety' of the 'urban plantation.'

Thus, at every opportunity, I seek to educate, throw rocks at the walls of apartheid, to critique and expose the falsehood of whiteness and race in general.

And frankly, I don't care if my task offends a White cashier in Baraboo or a racist waitress in West Bend. Or the president of the United States (the previous one, not the current one).

I hold on to the reality that a large percentage of those whose lives revolve around a concept of racial/ethnic superiority, or 'divine mandate,' are dying out and being replaced by 'people' who see themselves as patterns in a quilt, as Rev. Jesse Jackson once declared.

Slowly, the generation that follows mine has access to information that unequivocally reveals the so-called racial paradigm as an illusion. There is but one race and those of vanilla complexion are linked to the same chain that started with a Black woman in Africa (Ethiopia) three million years ago.

Nonetheless, I also understand why those on the right, the terrorist, bigots, and racists, want to maintain the status quo.

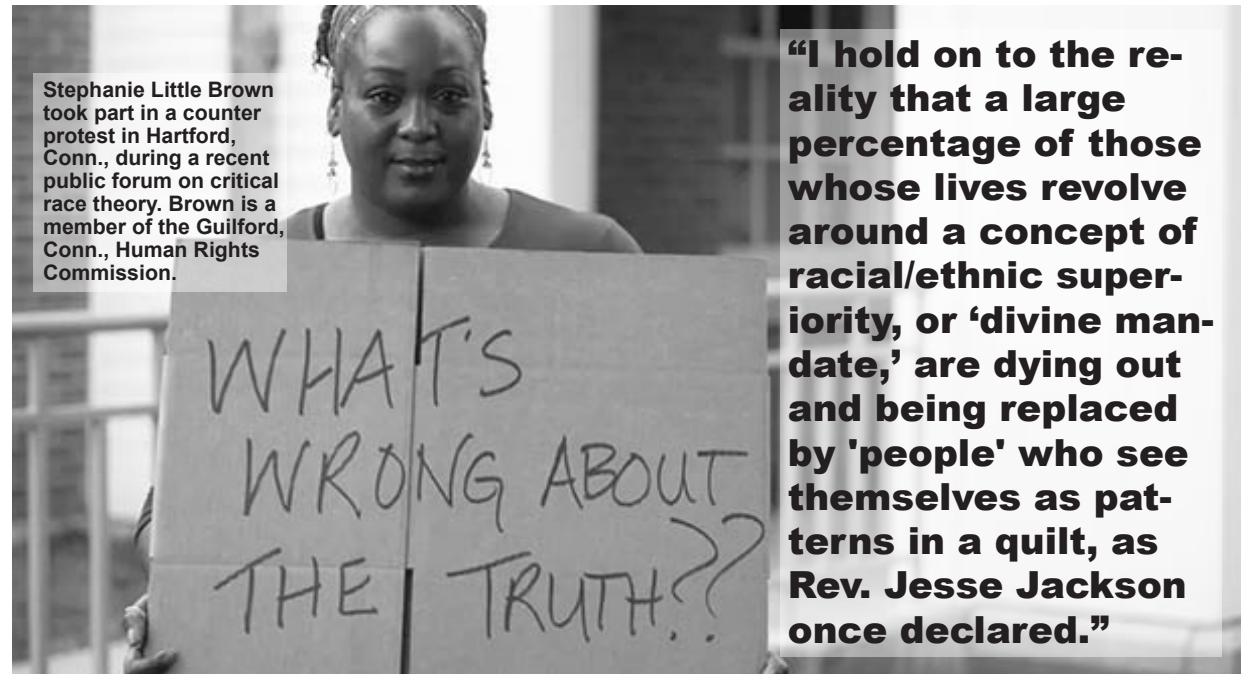
I have watched in awe as they have used the theory of Critical Race Theory as a catch-all to maintain the lies of 'His-story.'

The bottle cap that keeps my disdain from boiling over is my understanding of why they do what they do. Knowing their strategy provides an opportunity to counterattack.

I also posit that most are victims of a disease as deadly as cancer. It's a man-made disease, similar to COVID-19, created by the 5% to maintain control over the 95, to keep us separate, at odds, and unorganized.

Life will be harmonious when we reach the point of dropping the concept of race or ethnicity. When the world understands there is but one race, conceived in the womb of the world, in a virgin appropriately referred to as the Motherland.

In fact, throughout my three-day stay, I made a point of wearing my veteran's baseball cap and, on one day, a unique Vietnam Veterans jacket.

I did so not to express pride in serving a country that treated me and mine as second-class citizens, but because a veteran's ID is a shield. It's a get-out-of-jail-free card and helps to temporarily tame the most racists of 'rural terrorists.'

If you've ever visited Wisconsin Dells (and it's worth a visit), you will notice that many residents are Native Americans. The handful of Black folks you see are migrants, including many Africans, who work at the resorts over the summer months.

There are also many Hispanic workers.

It is an awkward diversity, given the fact that a large percentage of the year-long residents are obviously Republicans, right-wingers, and evangelicals who believe Donald Trump was sent by God to restore order and bring

While I have grown from animosity toward the entire ethnicity to select subcultures, I continue to see Klansmen behind every fifth tree, freshly tied nooses hanging at their branches.

My 'vanilla daughter-in-law' epitomizes a non-racial, truly caring example of what Caucasians should be. I've grown to love her dearly, as she and her family provide hope that one day---long after my death---there will come a time when people realize the dream of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. of a colorblind society.

Before her, I was privileged to see behind political affiliation to the souls of mankind.

Charlie Sykes, for whom I shared two decades of life, was among the conservatives who could see beyond race through the veil of an empowering agenda. Observing the world through the prisms he provided, I learned there are as many good people on both sides of the wall, as there are racists.

I learned to see the world through the prisms of color, ex-

sister described West Bend as one of the most racist communities she has visited.

I could understand her rationale.

When this paper started, we arranged with a West Bend printer to print the MCJ. I was told that one White supervisor refused to work with us, believing we were some inferior species whose station in life was to work for them, versus the other way around.

The publisher, however, quickly put him in place, and before we moved on to a local printer, the supervisor had a different impression of the team.

On several occasions, however, we were fortunate to escape racist encounters in West Bend, including once when a waitress spat in our food and then called the police when we confronted her and her red-neck customers.

Fortunately, we made it to the expressway before the mobs showed up.

I have dedicated my life to educating our tribe, challenging racism, and disputing the lies of

ally hear on the radio.

Or Sudan Archives. A classically-trained violinist, singer-songwriter, and producer, bringing in hip-hop. A true Renaissance woman. "She's a young Black woman doing some kick-ass shit. I think when young Black girls see an artist like that, just doing it and selling out shows, and not fit into a box, I think that's a powerful thing for young Black people to see. Plus they don't get to see a lot of those images, especially in commercial radio."

Forcing artists to fit into a box feels so antithetical to what music and art are about. Art is an expression of ourselves, and we are multi-faceted. We are a mixture of everything that has come before us, everything we have absorbed. Great artists steal, as they say, and the best artists steal from everywhere. White artists have been stealing from Black artists forever, and it's made their careers. But when Black artists steal from white artists, it's a very different story.

Speaking about the Grammy's, Tarik explains, "There's very few Black artists who ever win the mainstream artist awards." It's cool for white artists to be diverse, but Black musicians have always been pigeonholed in 'Urban.' It's rare that a Black artist wins album of the year, song of the year; they're always going to win urban, that's their spot."

Artists are always moving forward, trying something different, getting their work out there. Institutions, however, are slow to keep up. Where can you see these upcoming multifaceted musical acts from HYFIN in Milwaukee? Almost nowhere. Tarik laments, "Milwaukee has a lot of talent, but there are a lot of gatekeepers ... it's unfortunate some very talented artists have to leave."

SistaStrings, who were practically the voice of Milwaukee, had to relocate to Atlanta to get the opportunities they wanted.

Lakeyah, born and raised in Milwaukee, moved to Atlanta.

Silas Short, from the suburbs of Milwaukee and a graduate of Milwaukee High School of Arts, moved first to Chicago, then to Los Angeles.

"We invest in the legacy artists like crazy, but we don't invest in young artists. I wish we had the same amount of investment and care as we do the symphony as our young Black and brown creatives. If we had a fraction of that investment, this city would be world-class."

You'd think the city with the biggest music festival in the world would be an ideal place to showcase its homegrown, up-and-coming talent. But no. Even in their hometown they are still being left behind. How is it possible that Summerfest doesn't have space for the talented, genre-bending Black and brown artists of Milwaukee? I ask Tarik. He tells me he doesn't know. "We've never been invited to the table."

Why?

"I don't know."

But it's okay.

"Tyler Perry said it like, 'If you're not invited to table maybe it's time to build your own table.' So instead of me sitting and whining and complaining and bitching about what they're not doing or what they are doing—that doesn't get anything done. What can I do? Let me let me find some other people I can partner with and build something for the culture that deserves it."

When he pictures his own festival, what does it look like?

"It's the beauty of our culture. That's what I like. Afropunk in New York and Atlanta. I would love to have everything from hip-hop to jazz, Afrobeats to Black artists doing indie rock. Black Latinos, reggaeton, all that stuff on one stage celebrating Black and brown culture. And then also the local artists to back up, support a lot of that talent. I want food trucks showing the culture. I want vendors representing the culture. I want to have a pre-conference talking about issues. I want something kind of holistically. It's not just music but the culture."

He's definitely not stopping at music. He just worked with CopyWrite Magazine to amplify their Streetwear Showcase celebrating Black designers.

"I did a Black and beer festival because I saw this event called Blacktoberfest, and I was getting mad like, why don't you come to Milwaukee, home of the first Black-owned beer?" Instead of being upset and frustrated, Tarik reached out to Sugar Maple. The first Brown, Black & Brews: The 5th Ingredient, celebrating local brown and Black breweries from Illinois, Indiana, and Wisconsin happened in December of 2022, with the second one in the works now.

HYFIN's website is a wellspring for Black and

brown culture in Milwaukee. Including new artists on HYFIN Verified and conversations, events, interviews, and highlights on Milwaukee Made.

It's not easy, but Tarik's dedication and passion for HYFIN is paying off.

"The feedback's been great. I mean the ratings are growing ... they have a thing called 'time spent listening' and we have the most time spent listening than any other music station in the market. The only things that beat us are talk stations, so that's a good feeling ... it can only go up, as long as people support us financially."

They play the artists you can't hear anywhere else. Embrace the culture, represent the people. An outlet for new voices, attitudes, and points of view. Growing their reach and bringing people together.

The more I learn about all the incredible things HYFIN is doing, or trying to do, the more excited I am for them; and the more disappointed I am in our city. This article started as a piece about the power of music and where to find new artists. It turned into a spotlight on the need for better representation, a need to fill a void in a city with a lack of opportunities, a need for artists to thrive so they don't have to keep leaving to achieve what they want.

Why aren't there more alternative options in Milwaukee for artists?

Why doesn't Milwaukee have something like that?

Why do Atlanta or Minneapolis do this but Milwaukee doesn't?

The answer is you. Go make it happen, find people who can help, or support the ones already doing it. Like Tarik. Thanks Tarik, from all of Milwaukee.



SWIMMING IN SEGREGATION: THE UNSETTLING LEGACY OF AMERICA'S POOLS AND THE PATH FORWARD

Swimming pools have long been leisure, relaxation, and community gathering symbols.

However, they have also been a battleground for racial segregation and discrimination.

The history of white communities paving over pools after integration, as well as the creation of private clubs to maintain power, is a sad truth, and we must understand the impact of these actions on America's racial landscape, the

continued segregation today, and the role each of us can play in overcoming this hateful bigotry.

A Wave of White Resistance: Paving Over Pools

In the mid-20th century, as the Civil Rights Movement gained momentum, public swimming pools across the United States began to integrate.

This move towards inclusion was met with fierce resistance from white communities, who feared losing their exclusive access to these spaces.

In response, many white communities took drastic measures, such as paving over

their public pools, to prevent integration.

A 2018 study published in the American Journal of Sociology found that between 1950 and 1969, over 200 public swimming pools were closed or demolished across 17 states, following court orders to integrate.

These actions impacted millions of people, primarily African Americans, who were denied access to a vital public resource and a means of escaping the sweltering heat during summer months.

Private Clubs: A New Tool for Maintaining Power

White communities sought

new ways to maintain their power and exclusivity as public pools began to integrate.

They began creating private clubs, often with swimming pools as a central feature, to maintain racial segregation without violating anti-discrimination laws.

These clubs required membership fees and often had racially discriminatory policies to keep non-white people from joining.

A 1966 report by the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights found that over 1,000 private clubs in the United States had exclusionary policies, 90% of which were racially discrim-

inatory.

In the William & Mary Journal of Race, Gender, and Social Justice William & Mary Journal of Race, Gender, and Social Justice, Jennifer Jolly-Ryan writes that "[d]iscrimination by private clubs, which would be unlawful but for the private clubs' exemption from civil rights laws, is often subsidized through government-authorized tax exemptions,"

The impact of these clubs was deliberately codified in law and the effect of this systemic racism extended beyond just swimming pools; they also affected access to golf courses, tennis courts, and other recreational facilities, further exacerbating the divide between white and non-white Americans.

Echoes of the Past: Modern Segregation in America

The legacy of these actions is still felt today. Despite the progress made since the Civil Rights Movement, America remains a highly segregated nation.

A 2020 study from the University of California, Berkeley, found that 81% of metropolitan areas in the United States are more segregated today than in 1990.

Moreover, the racial wealth gap has continued to widen. According to the Federal Reserve's 2019 Survey of Consumer Finances, the median net worth of white families was nearly eight times greater than that of Black families.

This disparity in wealth and

resources perpetuates a cycle of inequality, making it difficult for minority communities to access quality education, housing, and recreational facilities, such as swimming pools.

Challenging White America's Feelings: Overcoming Hateful Bigotry

The actions of white communities in the past continue to shape America's racial landscape today.

The paving over of public pools and the creation of private clubs were not just about maintaining access to leisure spaces but also about asserting dominance and preserving a sense of racial superiority.

Our country will continue to disintegrate until white America understands this truth deeply.

White America must confront the attitudes and beliefs perpetuating it to overcome this hateful bigotry it seems so fearful to let go of.

White people must challenge themselves and those in their communities to recognize the historical context of white people's actions and attitudes and understand how they contribute to the ongoing racial divide with every vote and social media post they make.

We are tired.

Vice President Kamala Harris convened a small business roundtable of three dozen men of color this week to discuss ways the Biden-Harris administration can better support minority entrepreneurs.

Participants inside the Indian Treaty Room on the White House complex included more than 35 Black and Hispanic male business owners in various industries, from finance and technology to beauty and fashion.

Harris was joined by Don Graves, deputy secretary of the

Commerce Department, and Donald R. Cravins Jr., the department's first undersecretary for minority business development and head of its Minority Business Development Agency.

Seated at the head of the table, Harris said she and administration officials invited the group of predominantly Black men to share their stories of success and the challenges they face in growing their businesses.

"We want to give everyone an equal opportunity to compete and to not only survive but thrive," the vice president said during her opening remarks Tuesday. She emphasized that the roundtable was intended to "listen more than we talk."

Despite criticisms from "so-called leaders" about the Biden-Harris White House's focus on racial equity, she said, "We are proud of the fact that equity is one of our guiding principles, proud of the fact that we understand equality is important, but not everybody starts out on the same base."

The entrepreneurs shared their unique tales of triumph and the obstacles they encountered while trying to scale their businesses.

Brandon Blackwood, founder and CEO of Brandon Blackwood New York, said during the roundtable that despite his designer bag and accessory business earning \$30 million in revenue, he lacked the capital and resources to grow and compete with his counterparts.

"That requires more resources, way more money [and] way more knowledge," Blackwood told theGrio after the roundtable. "I learned about so many resources I didn't know about before."

Being able to share his "entrepreneurial struggles" in a room filled with other young Black and Latino male business owners was something Blackwood said he would continue to "hold on to."

"We don't really get to reflect or hear or talk to other people, and we got to really do that," said Blackwood. "It felt like support and community in the room."

Ryan Wilson, CEO of The Gathering Spot, a private membership

club in cities throughout the country, including Atlanta and Washington, told theGrio that access to capital is a recurring matter he sees among minority small business owners.

Wilson said he agreed to participate in the roundtable to ensure the

"interests of folks in my community are well represented."

"I see what happens when a business is thinking about trying to figure out how to go after its first contract but doesn't know how to do it," he shared. "I see what happens when folks are trying to figure out how to employ more people."

Wilson commended Harris for convening the group of minority entrepreneurs, noting that there are "any number of issues that the vice president could be spending time working on that are equally important." He recalled hosting Harris at his Atlanta club when she was a senator and vice presidential candidate and acknowledged seeing a "continuity between the conversation while she was running, to today while she's in office."

"It's really important that those same values track," said Wilson, "and that she has the same interests." Tuesday's small business roundtable was the latest in a series of meetings the vice president has held with young men of color at the White House.

"[The] conversation shows the administration's commitment to ensuring that the voices of Black men and their economic needs do not go unaddressed," said Natalia Madeira Cofield, an economic adviser and a former assistant administrator at the U.S. Small Business Administration.

She told theGrio: "Although Black women represent nearly 60 percent of all businesses started and run by African Americans in the U.S., the reality is that until and unless Black men have equitable access to resources, contracts and

capital to grow, the U.S. will never achieve entrepreneurial parity for Black Americans."

During the roundtable, Harris touted the \$12 billion that the Biden-Harris administration invested in Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFIs) and Minority Depository Institutions (MDIs), which she said are "rooted in and run by folks who understand the community" and are "best situated" to "understand the capacity of the community [and] the needs of the community."

Shaundell Newsome, a co-chair of Small Business for America's Future, applauded the administration for making the Minority Business Development Agency a permanent agency within the federal government.

"That's crucial because the MBDA will provide us with technical assistance, provide us with the access to capital, and they're an advocate for, of course, Black-owned firms," he told theGrio.

Newsome noted that during the COVID-19 pandemic, which the Biden-Harris White House inherited at its peak, Black and minority businesses faced record losses. More than halfway through the administration's four-year term, he said, "We have record gains, [and] we're at the lowest unemployment rate for African Americans in history."

Harris told the young entrepreneurs of color that the administration wanted to recognize their achievements and excellence and to "hold that up as models of who we are as a nation and what we can do to continue to grow not only our economy but our capacity and strength."

The feedback provided to the White House, she said, would be used to develop ways to "grow our administration's focus on what we can do to support you."

"It is about continuously focusing on what we can do to strengthen our nation," Harris said. "And that means strengthening and supporting the work that each of you has accomplished."
