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SHARON ROBINSON: A LEGACY OF FAITH AND SERVICE

Sharon Robinson recently retired from the City of Milwaukee as Director of Administration.

Still not weary from this journey we call life, she plans to continue doing what she believes is her life's calling—serving!

"I think serving is in my blood. Even as a young girl, I had the heart of a public servant and wanted to make an impact in people's lives.

"My grandmother had patients from the Veterans Administration who were boarders in her home.

"I always had a desire to go above and beyond to ensure their rooms were clean. And later, when I first arrived in Washington, DC, I wasn't that well versed on some of the political issues like apartheid.

"As I learned more about it,

my moral conscious was awakened and I was compelled to march outside the South African Embassy," said Robinson.

Even while working on Capitol Hill, Robinson volunteered during the early years of the AIDS epidemic. She

would decline fancy Capitol Hill social engagements to serve with a program called Food for Friends, where she performed housekeeping duties and dropped off meals to people who were in the final stages of AIDS.

"It was so soul fueling. For several years, I volunteered

with this organization, at a time when others were afraid to do so," said Robinson.

Born and raised in Battle Creek, Michigan, Robinson graduated from Michigan State University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Communications.

Prepared to pursue a career in public relations, she listened instead to a higher calling.

"God called me to public service. I initially envisioned myself working in marketing or public relations.

"God has navigated this path for me and it's (public service) in my heart.

Last week, I was proud to present my 2023 State of the City.

One of the primary themes I discussed was "One Milwaukee." An internship with a Michigan Congressman ultimately led him to offer me a position in Washington, DC working as his receptionist," said Robinson.

One day the Congressman was in a bind and needed talking points so Robinson offered

to write them.

Shortly after Tom Barrett was elected to Congress, he hired Robinson to be his legislative director because of her

She later became his Chief of Staff. When Barrett decided to return to Milwaukee, Robinson remained in DC, working in the international arena and at the William Davidson Institute with former US Secretary of State Madelaine Albright.

After receiving a call from Barrett's transition team with an offer to become the administration director, Robinson accepted the challenge and moved to Milwaukee.

"I don't believe it was a coincidence that God put me on a path where He fulfilled my desire to serve.

"Working with the City of Milwaukee for 18 years was a blessing. Looking back at my career, I feel honored that I

was able to help shape quality of life initiatives and develop transformational procedures to help government run more smoothly," said Robinson

One of the initiatives that Robinson is most proud of is

the "I Have a Dream Foundation" which gives low-income children the opportunity to earn a college degree.

The initiative provides free tuition, tutoring, mentoring and support services. Started

in 2007 at Clarke Street Elementary School, Robinson has witnessed dozens of students earn college degrees because of this program.

"The philosophy behind the program is that every child is

worthy to attend college, regardless of the sometimes tremendous socio-economic barriers they face," said Rob-

I recently sat down for an interview with City of Milwaukee Police Chief Jeffrey Norman.

The chief is a Milwaukee native, growing up in the area around seventh and Capitol Drive.

To give you a better point of reference, that's right by Messmer High School by the I-43 expressway.

He admits to always having an interest in policing. When he was a sophomore in high school, he met the captain from the district 5 station.

The DARE officers, dealing with drug issues, came and talked with students at the school.

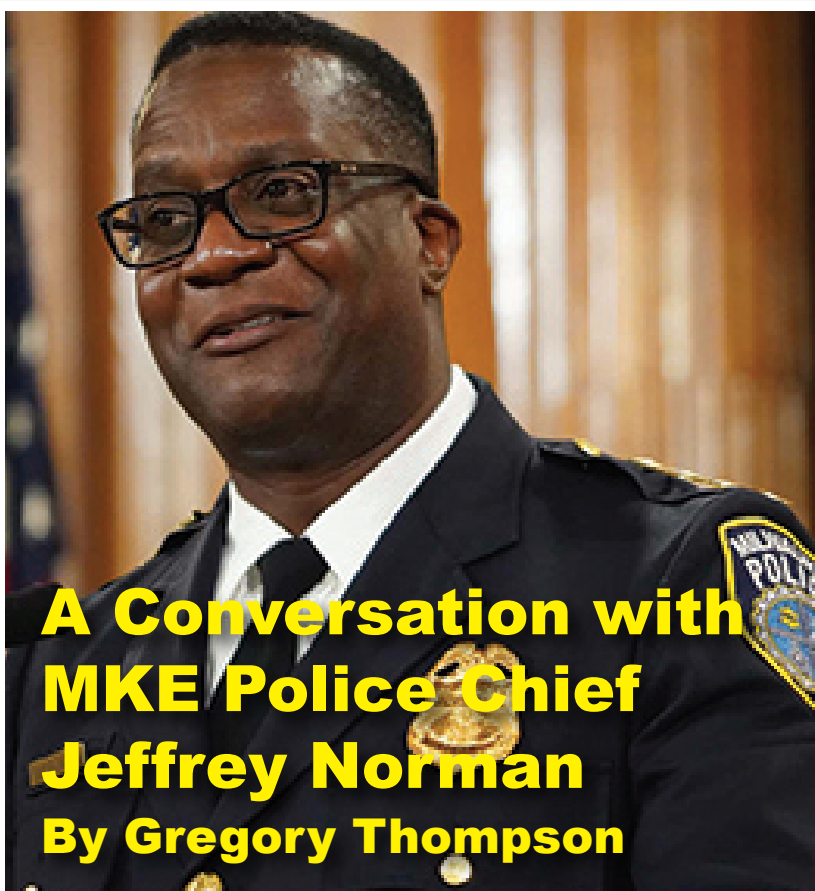
During Norman's senior year in college, he decided to apply for the MPD.

He had offers from several departments. He received a degree in criminal justice from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

Several of Norman's friends also eventually became police officers including his current assistant chief, Steven Johnson.

Chief Norman also admitted during our interview that while at the police academy, he told classmates he wanted to be chief one day, a boast some cadets didn't take seriously.

He eventually took the test to become a detective, passed and

moved up the ladder.

A level of trust is very important in police work according to Chief Norman, who added it helps with leadership and those who you work with.

The chief rose up the ranks, becoming assistant chief and later acting chief, before being appointed to the top cop position.

Norman talked about his vision for the department and stressed everyone in the MPD must engage and be involved for that vision to become reality.

Stable neighborhoods are a major goal for the chief. The department must be responsible for the residents of the city.

Norman noted he has certain expectations and needs that

must be met in order to realize his vision. Those expectations are measured and must be reviewed from time to time.

I asked Chief Norman how he engages the community how do you engage the community and what does it look like?

Norman said the MPD has hired a community engagement manager to keep the department on track.

The manager was hired about a year ago now. He coordinates with the districts and the community.

PAL has been brought back and is helping to reach out to the city's youth.

Each district is adopting and working with a local school.

Norman said he doesn't specifically tell a district what to

WHEDA CEO praises signing of budget that includes large investment in workforce housing

MADISON— Governor Tony Evers recently signed the 2023-25 Biennial Budget that includes one of the largest state investments in workforce housing.

The newly signed budget includes a total of \$525 million in funding for affordable housing development programs to be administered by the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority (WHEDA). The following is a breakdown of the programs that are included in the budget:

- \$50 million to support housing rehabilitation grants or loans
- \$275 million for Residential Housing Infrastructure loans
- \$100 million for Main Street Housing

Rehabilitation loans

- \$100 million for Commercial-to-Housing Conversion loans

"Today is a very special day for Wisconsin due to the extraordinary investment in affordable housing included in the 2023-25 Biennial Budget," said Elmer Moore, Jr., CEO and executive director of WHEDA. "We are excited to move forward with these efforts to help Wisconsin thrive by expanding access to affordable housing choices.

"I want to thank Governor Evers for his unwavering support of housing as a core human need as well as Representative Brooks, Senator Quinn, and the many authors of the Workforce Housing Package for spearheading bipartisan efforts to address our housing crisis. "We stand ready to implement new programs that will enable more people in Wisconsin to have an affordable place to call home."

do.

However, he does monitor their overall activities to see how they are interacting with residents in their respective districts.

Norman is trying to combine education, law enforcement and engineering in order to deal with the crisis of reckless driving plaguing our city's streets.

When asked about the new 'bump outs' along Capitol Drive and other locations, Norman said they are cutting

down on passing in that 'third lane,' by slowing down overall traffic.

The chief is confident the 'bump outs' will cut down auto accidents and calls for service.

If a driver is pulled over for a traffic stop and found to have an outstanding reckless driving citation, their car can be towed.

Citizen academies one and two are currently going on. The academies allow citizens to learn about the inner workings of the MPD—the how and why the police do what they

do.

Block watches are also very important to help with stable neighborhoods. The chief just wants the community to meet the department half-way.

The crime situation is getting better, but there are still challenges he said, adding:

"we need to step up, all of us, and not be afraid of our youth. Kids say they want more mentors, not money."

It's important to remember that whether we establish a sales tax or not, those policies are now state law. The only issue before us is the ability to generate additional necessary revenue via a sales tax.

Without this new revenue, we will have no options other than laying off hundreds of police officers and firefighters, which would devastate our ability to respond promptly to emergencies. Libraries all across the city would be closed and other City services would be greatly impacted by the loss of hundreds of general City of Milwaukee employees. We would spiral into a deeper and deeper fiscal crisis. I do not want that and I am confident you do not want that either. If we want to continue to build "One Milwaukee," we need this additional revenue source.

I commend the members of the Common Council Steering and Rules Committee, who last week debated and ultimately voted to move the sales tax legislation forward for consideration before the entire Common Council. I want to thank Common Council President José Pérez for his leadership throughout this entire process and Alderwoman Marina Dimitrijevic, Alderman Robert Bauman, Alderman Mark Borkowski, Alderman Michael Murphy, and Alderman Scott Spiker for their vote in support of enacting a sales tax.

On July 11th, I hope that all members of the Common Council will vote to affirm this vital legislation. I will continue to work in partnership with our Common Council members to try and ease any concerns they may have in the meantime. To that end, I have attached a document to this email that illuminates the dire nature of the current fiscal situation while also providing a light at the end of the tunnel if the sales tax is enacted at the July 11th Common Council meeting. 3. Never order the expensive dish on the menu when someone is buying you a lunch/dinner.
4. Don’t ask awkward questions like: ‘Oh so you aren’t married yet?’ Or ‘Don’t you have kids’ or ‘Why didn’t you buy a house?’ Or why don't you buy a car? For God’s sake it isn’t your problem;
5. Always open the door for the person coming behind you. It doesn’t matter if it is a guy or a girl, senior or junior. You don’t grow small by treating someone well in public;
6. If you take a taxi with a friend and he/she pays now, try paying next time;

8. Never interrupt people talking. Allow them to pour it out. As they say, hear them all and filter them all;

17. Never give advice until you’re asked;

18. When meeting someone after a long time, unless they want to talk about it, don’t ask them their age and salary;

19. Mind your business unless anything involves you directly - just stay out of it;

20. Remove your sunglasses if you are talking to anyone in the street. It is a sign of respect. Moreso, eye contact is as important as your speech; and

21. Never talk about your riches in the midst of the poor. Similarly, don't talk about your children in the midst of the barren.

President Biden Amplifies Importance of the Black Press of America

This week, during the NNPA’s Annual Convention, which celebrated 196 years of the Black Press of America, Biden appeared via video to salute the NNPA and its member publishers on the occasion.

“Congratulations to the Black Press of America for celebrating 196 years of serving communities across our nation,” Biden stated in the address which aired on July 1.

“Ida B. Wells once said, the way to right wrongs is to turn the light of truth upon the wrong. That’s the sacred charge of a free press. That’s the charge African American publishers have pursued for nearly two centuries,” Biden continued.

“With every story you publish, you make our democracy stronger. Thank you for what you do to turn the light of truth wherever your work leads you. Thank you.”

President Joe Biden has always maintained that the Black vote pushed him over the top in his 2020 election victory over Donald Trump.

And it’s never been lost on the president that the pivotal day in his campaign occurred in Charleston, South Carolina, on Feb. 26, when he sat down for a live roundtable interview with Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis Jr., the president and CEO of the National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA), the trade association of the more than 200 African American-owned newspapers and media companies.

Joining Chavis at that campaign-turning event were dozens of Black Press publishers and media company owners, and the livestream of that event, followed later in the day by an endorsement from Democratic South Carolina Rep. James Clyburn, catapulted the once slumbering candidacy all the way to the White House.

Dr. Chavis and outgoing NNPA Chair Karen Carter Richards, praised the President for recognizing the importance of the Black Press of America.

“The NNPA is especially honored to hear directly from President Joe Biden for his continued support and advocacy of the importance of the Black Press of America,” Chavis stated. “As we celebrate 196 years of the Black Press, it’s always gratifying and encouraging to have the support of the President of the United States. In the wake of the recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions on civil rights, the Black Press rededicates our journalism to be a clarion voice for freedom, justice, equality, and equity.”

Richards who is the publisher of the Houston Forward Times, also thanked the President.

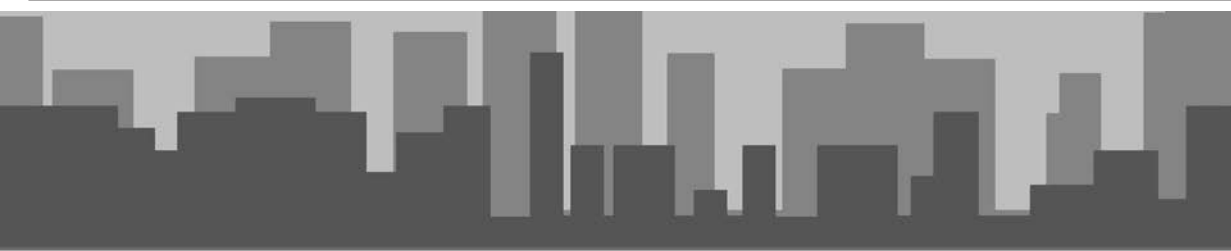
“To have the President of the United States take the time out to be a part of our convention is of course special,” Richards said. “But, it’s also a testament to just how vital the Black Press remains. Collectively, as Black publishers and

Black business owners, we are stronger than ever and the President’s message reinforces that.”

Newly elected board chair Bobby Henry, publisher of the Westside Gazette in Florida, added, “That message from President Biden to the association was one that signifies that he remains true to his pledge to value the role African Americans play and have played in this country. Further, acknowledging the role that the Black press plays in reaching our people and those sympathetic to our plight remains a critical component of the 2024 electoral strategy.”

City of Milwaukee Sales Tax Frequently Asked Questions

On June 20, 2023, Governor Evers signed historic legislation that allows the City of Milwaukee to enact a 2% local sales tax. The legislation requires a 2/3 vote (10 of 15 Common Council members) of approval to enact it.

WHY DOES MILWAUKEE NEED A SALES TAX?

- The City of Milwaukee faces a budget gap of **at least \$183 million** due to increased pension costs, the expiration of ARPA money, increased personnel costs, and increased costs to administer essential services.
- The anticipated revenue from a sales tax (**\$190 million**), along with about \$20 million in additional shared revenue, would close the budgetary gap and allow the city to sustain essential services.
- Milwaukee is the **largest city in the U.S. without a sales tax** and, as of 2021, Milwaukee ranked 120th out of 124 cities for its tax rate. A 2% local sales tax (plus a 0.4% sales tax that Milwaukee County may enact) would still leave Milwaukee's tax rate in the lower half of all major cities with a population above 200,000.

WHAT HAPPENS IF THE SALES TAX IS NOT APPROVED?

- In the first year alone, the City of Milwaukee would need to make drastic cuts to city services, including laying off approximately 700 police officers, 250 firefighters, and 400 general city employees.
- These cuts would result in the closure of at least 10 of 12 library branches; a drastic increase in 911 response times; an increase in blighted and abandoned properties; a reduction of city services and worse

turnaround times for requests; a reduced ability to assess properties, issue building permits, and approves licenses; and fewer street repairs, street lights, and less garbage collection.

- The City of Milwaukee would eventually reach insolvency, effectively shutting down basic city operations and public services and threatening thousands of current and retired city employees' pensions.

AREN'T THERE OTHER OPTIONS TO GET MORE MONEY?

- Bankruptcy is not currently authorized under state law. Even if it were, bankruptcy would create similar dramatic cuts to city services, reduce or eliminate pension benefits, and force the City of Milwaukee to be governed by an outside entity.
- Even if the City turned to Payment In Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) programs, short-term rental fees, and other revenue sources (some of which require changes to state law), the total increase in revenue would be a small fraction of the money needed to keep the City of Milwaukee solvent.

WHAT ABOUT THE OTHER PROVISIONS IN THE BILL?

- **The only** item before the Common Council is whether to enact the sales tax and allow the City of Milwaukee to raise \$190 million.
- There are many other provisions in the state bill (e.g. limiting diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts, restricting the Fire & Police Commission Authority, and limiting funding sources for the street car, etc.). This is now **current state law** and will be law regardless of whether the 2% sales tax is adopted.

WHAT HAPPENS IF IT IS NOT VOTED ON NOW?

- The 2% sales tax is estimated to bring the City of Milwaukee about **\$16 million** a month. For scale, \$16 million is the cost of 139 firefighters or 125 police officers.
- Because of the legislation's wording, **any delay beyond the Council recess** would cost the City of Milwaukee a loss of three months' sales tax proceeds (\$48 million) which would have a direct impact on funding for the **entire library system** (\$25 million).

HOW DO MILWAUKEEANS BENEFIT FROM THE SALES TAX?

- An additional source of revenue would allow the City to benefit more directly from tourism and attendees of events, including the 2024 Republican National Convention. A significant portion of the sales tax will be paid by restaurant and bar patrons, tourists, and non-residents, thereby sharing and alleviating the tax burden on Milwaukee residents.
- Families will be reap the benefits from more resources towards public safety, well maintained roads and summer programs.

- It is estimated that a low-income family would pay an additional \$230 a year (\$19/month) in sales tax, while the median family would pay \$365 a year (\$30/month).
- Sales taxes in Wisconsin are far less regressive than sales taxes in other states because of the wide range of exempted products, including groceries, medicine, and other essential goods.
- A sales tax would allow for consistent and responsive service delivery while avoiding increases in property taxes or fees that would disproportionately affect our City's poorest residents.

IS THIS THE END OF DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION EFFORTS?

- No! It only limits Property Tax Levy funding. There are other sources of funding to continue and expand the City of Milwaukee's efforts to improve its diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) practices.
- DEI is one of Mayor Johnson's highest priorities and is factored into the operation of all City of Milwaukee departments.

After Anticipated Affirmative Action Ruling, Black Leaders Speak Out

After the U.S. Supreme Court did what many have long expected, strike-down race-based admissions to colleges, Black leaders held emergency press conferences and strategy calls. One convened by Marc Morial on June 29 hours after the Supreme Court’s decision yielded sharp commentary.

Affirmative action refers to a set of policies and

practices aimed at promoting equal opportunities for historically disadvantaged groups, particularly in relation to employment or education.

The purpose of affirmative action is to address the historical and ongoing systemic discrimination and underrepresentation that has been faced throughout history.

Affirmative Action ruling puts spotlight back on HBCUs

As students and universities across the country begin to make sense of the impact of the Supreme Court’s ruling on affirmative action, the national spotlight on historically Black colleges and universities (HBCUs) glares brighter as they stand to be prime destinations for students seeking diverse campuses.

While the rulings in Students for Fair Admissions v. Harvard College and Students for Fair Admissions v. the University of North Carolina do not completely ban race in admissions considerations, experts note that the decision will create new challenges for colleges and universities in keeping their student bodies diverse. There is already data from public universities that points to declines in Black undergraduate enrollment at institutions in states that banned race-conscious college admissions.

Svante Myrick, president of the progressive advocacy group People

For the American Way, noted that the court’s ruling will likely lead some predominantly white institutions (PWIs) to “throw up their hands and say, ‘Well, there’s nothing we can do to encourage diversity.’”

Those colleges and universities, he said, will become “more monochromatic and less interesting to top students of all races.”

“It’s why the best universities in the world weren’t doing affirmative action because the law said they had to — they were doing affirmative action because they wanted to,” Myrick told theGrio. “They knew it made them more competitive and more attractive.”

Myrick, the former mayor of Ithaca, New York, said such institutions will likely lose good students because “young people want to study in diverse environments.”

As those enrollments potentially decline and students consider alter-

natives, they could see HBCUs as prime destinations. A similar situation occurred following the anti-racism uprisings in 2020 when Black students turned to HBCUs as academic safe havens.

Tennessee State University president Glenda Glover told theGrio it’s more of an “assumption” that students could flock to HBCUs in light of the Supreme Court ruling, but said she would welcome it.

“We’re hopeful that as students consider higher education, they will consider HBCUs,” said Glover, who is also vice chair of President Joe Biden’s White House Board of Advisors on HBCUs.

Glover pointed out that enrollment at HBCUs has increased over the past couple of years. She credited some of that to the election of Vice President Kamala Harris, who is a graduate of Howard University and the first HBCU alum to serve as vice president. Harris helped bring a national spotlight on the historical institutions that provided education to Black Americans when PWIs refused to admit them.

Leaning on Harris’ connection to the HBCU experience, the Biden-Harris administration consistently touts its record funding for the historical institutions. Education Secretary Miguel Cardona told theGrio that, to date, the administration has issued more than \$7 billion.

“This administration has provided more support in two years than any other administration for historically Black colleges and universities, and we’re going to continue,” Cardona said during a White House press call last week after the Supreme Court’s ruling on affirmative action.

The Biden administration has sought to level the playing field for HBCUs through targeted investments, including increasing Pell Grants and improving access to federal funding for research and development.

Cardona noted that in the American Rescue Plan, the administration secured a waiver in order for some funds to be used for repairing infrastructure. These actions were critical because, as he put it, HBCUs “punch above their weight.”

But as interest in HBCUs grew, increased enrollment inadvertently caused a housing shortage for some campuses. If concern over affirmative action policies drives up enrollment further, it could exacerbate already strained resources and funding.

“Do we have to increase our capacities to serve? Yes,” Glover told theGrio. The TSU president said that last fall, the school’s student population more than doubled, which caused housing and infrastructure challenges for the campus.

Despite those challenges, Glover said she sees the role of TSU and other HBCUs as working to “stay prepared at all times to make sure that we’re ready to serve the students,” which includes having funds to provide more financial aid and scholarships.

Florida state Sen. Shevrin Jones,

Women, racial and ethnic minorities, and individuals with disabilities have been beneficiaries.

Typically, affirmative action involves taking proactive steps to increase the representation of these under-represented groups in areas where they have been historically excluded or marginalized.

The 6-3 ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court will alter college admissions policies. Chief Justice John G. Roberts Jr., writing the opinion for the majority, said the programs “unavoidably employ race in a negative manner” and “involve racial stereotyping,” in violation of the Constitution.

The ruling affirmed that race-conscious admissions programs at Harvard and the University of North Carolina are unconstitutional.

Associate Justice Sonia Sotomayor spoke in person her dissent from the bench which signaled strong disagreement saying the court’s ruling “further entrenching racial inequality in education” will have a devastating impact.”

The decision would seem to be a slap in the face of history as well as real world reality. Currently, a move is on to ban books in many school districts across America with many Republicans calling rudimentary discussion on race “divisive.” Statistics on college enrollment for African Americans demonstrate there is more work to be done to increase enrollment at a time when college costs have skyrocketed.

“I find it interesting to say we’re beyond race in this country when we know that 48 percent of white students admitted to Harvard between 2009 and 2014 either were legacy admissions or they were athletes,” said Maya Wiley, President of the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights.

“This is the first time that we are facing a court that misinterpreted the equal protection clause and our seminal case Brown vs. Board of Education after a predecessor court made very clear what the principals were in the Constitution and in the Brown case,” said

who also sits on the White House Board of Advisors on HBCUs, noted that PWIs don’t face the same financial and infrastructure challenges.

“There is no equity in the amount of dollars that PWIs receive when it comes to them being able to do any external or internal renovations, external or internal redevelopments,” said the graduate of Florida A&M University.

He added: “We already know that HBCUs tend to already not have the resources to be able to do those internal grooves [and] be able to take on the capacity of students that are coming now or later.”

In an effort to secure needed resources, Jones told theGrio, the board unanimously approved a report for

the White House on HBCUs with proposed policies that would allow them to thrive better. One major proposal involved expanding the amount of federal funding that can be used for infrastructure projects. Another is related to adjusting compliance rules.

“Our hope is that the White House will continue to look at HBCUs as a major part of the higher education system,” said Jones.

Cardona told theGrio that the administration sees supporting HBCUs as going beyond providing more resources. Through its board of advisors and roundtables with stakeholders, he said, the White House is “listening to them to see what they need.”

Giving HBCUs a seat at the table is

Janai Nelson, President of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund during a mid-day press event held by the National Urban League.

The NAACP Legal Defense Fund has been involved in every case involving affirmative action that has gone to the U.S. Supreme Court.

“Unfortunately, this Supreme Court is trying to have a reality that is more reflective of 1950,” said NAACP President Derrick Johnson.

“Today’s case, let’s be very clear, does not end Affirmative Action but it makes it much more difficult. It narrows the ability of higher education institutions to use their own power to decide who should be in a classroom... we are not abandoning the fight,” Nelson concluded.

“Friends today the Supreme Court got it wrong. I think this day will live in infamy. Because it was one of the most tortured opinions any of us have ever seen because it’s twisted in terms of its logic on the law,” Damon Hewitt, President of the Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights Under Law.

“Nothing in the opinion stops universities from asking about their race,” Hewitt pointed out. “Our advice to students is to continue to talk about your experiences with race and racism,” he concluded.

“This Supreme Court ruling will close the door to educational opportunity for many Black students and students of color who want to attend non-HBCUs. With this new ruling, UNCF knows that more students will turn to HBCUs for their college educations. We also know that our HBCUs will do everything they can to meet increased student demand,” stated a press release from the United Negro College Fund.

about “making sure that we’re advocating for the appropriate dollars for the right thing so that they can have a level playing field and continue to contribute to this country,” he said.

While he concedes the Supreme Court’s affirmative action ruling was a “step backward,” Cardona said it also is “strengthening our resolve to make sure that we come together with good ideas to make sure that the benefit of diversity on campus is felt throughout the country.”

“Everyone benefits from it,” he contended, “and we’re on it.”
