While Northcott Neighborhood House (Northcott) may be known for organizing Milwaukee's Juneteenth Day celebration and parade, it is so much more than that.

For more than 60 years, Northcott staff have been catering to the needs of the community by operating a food pantry, addressing health disparities, and providing employment training and job opportunities, while

instilling hope to residents.

Tony Kearney, Executive Director, is committed to growing Northcott and has empowered his staff to bring ideas to the table to further increase its programs and resources.

Elizabeth Coggs, Director of Operations for Northcott, works to ensure that all the organization's services and programs are running according to protocol.

She brings family legacy and years of passion for the community and commitment to serving to the Northcott team.

"All of our services are free. An-

nually, we provide families, children, and seniors with almost \$2 million in food, working in partnership with the Hunger Task Force and Feeding America, and individual grocers. In partnership with Health Connections, we also offer Covid-19 testing, vaccinations, and booster shots, including influenza.

Annually, we serve some 1,000 youth through our hydroponic program, arborist program, and other on-the-job training initiatives that we have created through partnerships with MATC and Employ Milwaukee," said Coggs.

Key to Northcott's successful initiatives is partnerships. For example,

through Northcott's partnership with Health Connections, issues such as diabetes and hypertension are proactively addressed.

Northcott's food pantry which promotes healthier eating habits and lifestyles, and includes fresh vegetables and fruits, exists because of

partnerships with Hunger Task Force, Feed America, and privately owned grocers.

And, residents that engage with Northcott's job training programs, such as its MATC partnership, enable participants to learn skills and earn certificate programs in areas such as construction and nursing assistants.

Currently, the majority of the training programs are comprised of men, even though they are not limited to men, but the goal is to attract more women participants.

On the horizon are efforts to start a pharmaceutical program to train pharmacy aides and technicians, as well as continue initiatives geared to fostering wellness.

Northcott serves the entire Milwaukee County, and residents come from as far away as Cudahy and (continued on page 4)

Milwaukee Public Schools is holding its final job fair September 20 to fill positions including teacher, paraprofessional, children's health assistant, nurse, and food service worker.

The hiring events will be at MPS Central Services, 5225 W. Vliet Street, at 5 to 7 p.m.

Jobs include entry-level openings that have pathways for advancement. Part-time and full-time jobs are available. Some positions have summers off.

All full-time employees receive benefits that include health insurance, paid sick time, and a pension. Many MPS openings are conveniently available in neighborhoods across the city.

The district has many opportunities for individuals looking for a career in education — as teachers, substitute teachers, and paraprofessionals, who aid teachers.

MPS also is seeking food service assistants and food service managers for the breakfast and lunch programs.

The district needs school nurses and children's health assistants; CHAs provide support to students with disabilities, including personal care and school-related activities.

The district has openings in building maintenance, school safety, and other departments, as well.

like we assault spicy chicken wings at a family gathering.

Aside from the lone sentence, we are expected to 'assume' Florida's curriculum suggests we were 'happy-go-lucky' slaves, saved from the uncivil jungles of Africa by kindly 'cruise directors' who took pity on us 'po jungle bunnies' and offered free travel to the 'land of the free and the home of the Brave' (or Atlanta Braves).

Upon arrival, it was necessary for chattel slave owners to whip, torture, and murder hundreds of thousands of 'MIA Africans' to plant the seeds of Old Testament Christianity in us, a genocidal vindication that former HUD Secretary Ben Carson explained was a 'soul-saving' benefit for 'cruise survivors.'

Incomprehensively, the bigoted 'massas' actions were justified by scripture, which not only supported the concept of slavery (albeit not the cruelty of America's racist template) but also declared the victims... eer slaves... must willingly submit and smile while being tortured and brainwashed.

The Florida curriculum disingenuously declares that the millions of raped female slaves benefitted from their assaults, which was necessary to cleanse them of their savage DNA and impregnate them with pure, white genes.

Take my facetious and disingenuous analysis with a grain of salt, although I have no doubt the curriculum is misleading and corrupted to appease Whites while placating one of the most hideous, vile, and inhumane systems of slavery known to (wo)mankind.

Undoubtedly, history was replaced with 'His-story' to avoid traumatizing the sensitive emotions of the massa's ancestors and the WASP nation-state.

However, I have yet to hear that assumption, with the critic's only example being one misleading sentence.

Nor have I heard any Democratic abolitionists reveal that the evil White Supremacists were, in fact, their ancestral Democrats in 'white face.'

This makes me wonder if the objectionable sentence was reworded and what other examples

could supplement it.

For example, history reveals that one of the most painful periods for African and African Americans took place immediately following the 13th Amendment —which freed all of our ancestors- versus the emancipation proclamation, which freed those in Confederate states.

Millions of former slaves were liberated from the physical chains to face uncertain futures: no jobs, no property of their own, and no credit to get started.

They were uneducated (a byproduct of slavery), left in hostile lands, and without the benefit of a pot to pee in or a window to throw it out.

Few history courses note that hundreds of thousands of newly freed slaves starved to death during this era.

And when the Democrats enacted apartheid laws and insisted their bigoted leaders in Washington D.C. remove federal troops from the south whose mission was to protect and assist the newly freed slaves, the resulting chaos was mass murders, assaults, and internment.

Many slaves were forced to return to a system of neo-slavery to survive.

The few slaves who survived or could carve out a living had acquired specific 'skills' while on the plantation.

Blacksmiths, carpenters, and masons could find employment, while those with only 'cotton picking' on their resumes were left by the wayside.

Through those prisms, you could suggest a handful of skilled workers 'benefited' from their 'occupations.'

Which is not the same as saying they benefited from slavery.

My second concern about this tsunami of criticism is that it is more so rooted in gaining a political advantage than providing a remedy to an acknowledged affront to civil rights.

Its agenda is to turn Black frustration and disagreement for the Republican Party into mouth-foaming hatred.

My final realization fits neatly within this political reality show: I can find fault with every history curriculum provided by the 16,800 school districts in the U.S.

All fall short of providing an accurate picture, whether snapshot or video.

Indeed, the only curriculum I have come across that truly represents us within the framework of 'government' school history was provided at the former Harambee Community School.

Historian Taki Raton developed a curriculum that not only educated but empowered.

If the Democratic Party was genuinely concerned about how 'His-story' misinterprets, misleads, and misconstrues our sojourn in America, they could mandate a national standard through their Department of Education.

They don't necessarily have to rewrite entire history courses, but they can clarify and offer specific analyses.

They can start by refuting the accepted 'fact' that Black 'slaves' were brought to America in 1619. The truth is the first African slaves were brought to the southern coast by the Spanish in 1526.

In fact, historian Henry Louis Gates Jr. notes 'Juan Garrido became the first documented Black person to arrive in what would become the U.S. when he accompanied Juan Ponce de León in search of the Fountain of Youth in 1513, and they ended up in present-day Florida.

In 1565, the Spanish brought enslaved Africans to present-day St. Augustine, Fla., the first European settlement in the continental U.S.

In 1526, a Spanish expedition to present-day South Carolina was thwarted when the enslaved African's resistance was observed by Native Americans, who in turn attacked the settlement, killing the White interlopers while freeing the slaves.

The descendants of the Africans are in that area today.

Let me leave you with these final thoughts:

Florida's contentious curriculum is not new. In 1918, prominent American historian named Ulrich Bonnell Phillips framed institutional slavery as a "school" that provided adequate training in modern technology and helped "civilize" slaves.

Thus, we've been victims of dishonesty for two centuries.

This is nothing new or a reality that has to be.

If critics truly want to remedy this affront to our reality, they can begin by acknowledging that 'before there was history, there was African history.'

Now that's something that would definitely benefit all Americans.

## Birthing Inhumanity: The Grim Legacy of Slave Breeding Facilities

The institution of slavery that spanned many centuries is one of the darkest periods in human history. It is a part of our shared past that has left profound and painful imprints on society. One particularly disturbing aspect of this system that is not often discussed is the existence of "slave breeding facilities."

For many, "slave breeding" may cause confusion or discomfort. However, understanding this repugnant practice is essential in recognizing the extent of the dehumanization and violation of human rights that occurred during the era of slavery.

Slave breeding was a nefarious and calculated practice where enslaved African men and women were coerced into producing children to increase the population of enslaved people. These facilities were established mainly in the United States, particularly in Virginia and Maryland, but the practice also occurred in other regions.

The enslavers, viewing the enslaved not as people but as property and an economic resource, saw an opportunity to increase their wealth. A larger enslaved population meant more hands to work in fields and factories and more people to be sold, bartered, or traded.

This economic motivation disregarded the basic humanity of enslaved individuals, treating them as livestock rather than human beings.

The conditions within these slave breeding facilities epitomize the darkest corners of human depravity. Enslaved women were subjected to a living



nightmare transcending the harsh physical labor associated with slavery. Their plight revolved around a cycle of forced pregnancies, begun at startlingly young ages, often not much past the onset of puberty.

They aimed to exploit their fertility, maximizing the number of children they could bear before the relentless physical toll wore down their bodies.

The environment within these facilities was one of unimaginable squalor and psychological torment. Hygiene was often neglected, contributing to a high maternal and infant mortality incidence. The women lived in constant fear and anticipation of their subsequent forced encounters, making every moment a psychological torment.

Their oppressors viewed these women as mere breeding machines, paying little to no heed to their health or well-being.

Women often bore children year after year, with no time to recover physically or emotionally between pregnancies. This continuous strain on their bodies and minds resulted in serious long-term health problems, emotional distress, and in many cases, premature death.

Moreover, the inhumanity extended beyond physical abuse and into the psychological realm. These women were denied the most basic human rights—to control their bodies, choose their partners, and decide if and when they wanted children.

Instead, they were forced into sexual encounters and pregnancies, often with complete strangers chosen by their enslavers and sometimes the enslavers themselves.

The psychological impact of this continuous violation cannot be overstated. It constituted a brutal

mental and emotional torture designed to break their spirits and cement their servitude.

These women were also deprived of the freedom to form consensual relationships—another brutal form of psychological torment. Normal relationships, based on affection, mutual respect, and shared experiences, were impossible under such circumstances. Even if they formed attachments with other enslaved individuals, they lived under the constant threat of separation, either through sales or punishments. Their families, relationships, and bonds of love were not respected, adding another layer of psychological trauma to their already unbearable living



conditions.

In short, these breeding facilities were hellish places where enslaved women were subjected to unspeakable physical and psychological abuse. Their experience represents one of the most horrific aspects of slavery, an institution that, at its core, was designed to strip individuals of their humanity for economic gain."

The exploitation of enslaved men was horrifying and multifaceted. They were manipulated, abused, and brutally dehumanized in unimaginable ways. This ranged from physical assaults like systemic "buck breaking" to psychological torment, each tactic carefully crafted to break their spirits, strip away their dignity, and maintain complete control over them.

The forced breeding practice was at the forefront of this brutality, where the most robust and most physically impressive men were selected to propagate as many offspring as possible. The term 'selected' is used lightly here; these men were not given a choice.

They were raped and coerced into procreation under unimaginable duress. Such practices treated them not as human beings with feelings, desires, and autonomy but as mere means to a nefarious end—increasing the enslaved population.

The psychological trauma resulting from this vio-



lation was immense. The forced sexual encounters and the knowledge that they were being used to produce more enslaved individuals inflicted deep emotional wounds.

To cope with the terror, pain, and humiliation, some men may have had to numb themselves emotionally, disconnecting from their feelings as a survival mechanism.

Moreover, these men lived under the constant

# Birthing Inhumanity: The Grim Legacy of Slave Breeding Facilities

threat of physical violence. Enslaved men who resisted forced breeding or were seen as too independent or defiant could face brutal punishments, like castration and even death.

They were often subjected to unimaginable physical tortures, including mutilation, as a means to break their will and make them compliant.

In this context, being 'robust' or 'strong' was both a blessing and a curse. While physical strength may have helped them survive the harsh conditions and manual labor, it also marked them for the abhorrent practice of forced breeding. This reality's mental and emotional strain would have been devastating, constantly living under the threat of violence and sexual exploitation.

In the end, the system of slavery was designed to exploit these men's physical labor and purposefully and systematically shatter their emotional and psychological well-being.

This served to make them submissive, compliant, and more easily controlled, further illustrating the unimaginable depths of the inhumanity of slavery.

The suffering endured by the children born in these slave breeding facilities is yet another heart-wrenching chapter in this history.

These innocent lives were met with the reality of immediate separation from their mothers, a calculated move designed to sever any potential emotional bonds and ensure that both mother and child

remained compliant with their masters.

From their first breath, these children were treated as commodities, not as human beings deserving of love, care, and protection.

Their fates were determined not by their potential or desires but by their enslavers' economic motivations. Some were sold off to other enslavers, and their lives were reduced to a transactional value. Others were kept within the same facility or plantation, destined to replace their parents in the endless cycle of forced labor.

This systemic practice of immediate separation and commodification was a form of psychological warfare. The infants were denied the emotional nurturing and bonding essential for healthy psychological development.

Instead, they grew up knowing nothing but dehumanization and objectification, shaping their self-perception and place in the world.

The impacts of these cruel practices did not end with the abolition of slavery. Today, the descendants of those enslaved people still grapple with the lingering effects of this historical trauma. The systemic separation of families and devaluation of black lives has reverberated through generations, contributing to the disparities and systemic racism that persist today.

Studies have shown that intergenerational trauma can significantly impact the mental health of subsequent generations. It can manifest in various

forms, such as depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder, and other mental health issues. In essence, the echoes of the past still resonate within the present, a haunting reminder of the inhumanity inflicted on those children and their mothers.

Why does this painful episode of history not hold a prominent place in our collective consciousness? The answer, in part, lies in the legacy of white privilege and systemic racism.

For centuries, dominant narratives, primarily controlled by white individuals and institutions, have carefully curated what aspects of history are to be remembered and which are to be forgotten or obscured. The uncomfortable truths about slave breeding facilities fall into the latter category.

The deliberate minimization and erasure of such history serve a dual purpose. On the one hand, it provides a shield from facing the profound cruelty and dehumanization inflicted on fellow human beings.

On the other hand, it fortifies the structures of racial inequality by perpetuating ignorance and silence about these historical injustices.

Confronting this aspect of slavery underscores the importance of continuous education, recognition, and open dialogue about all aspects of our shared past - no matter how difficult or uncomfortable they may be.

Only then can we truly address the lasting impacts of such atrocities, work towards healing, and ensure that such inhumanity is never repeated.

## Solutions:

There are several organizations today dedicated to bringing the hidden history of slave breeding facilities to light, and supporting them can contribute greatly to this cause. The Equal Justice Initiative, founded by Bryan Stevenson, works tirelessly to challenge racial injustice and to create narratives that confront the history of racial inequality in America. The Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture provides numerous resources and exhibitions that delve into the darker aspects of African American history, including slavery.

Furthermore, The Zinn Education Project promotes and supports the teaching of people's history in middle and high school classrooms across the country, including lessons on the harsh realities of slavery.

Supporting local Black Historical Societies and Black Archives can also be an effective way to promote historical preservation and education. Contributions to these organizations not only help to shed light on these atrocities but also support their mission to educate future generations and prevent such history from repeating itself.

# My 12 favorite things about the Montgomery Riverfront Uprising

**OPINION:** Will we ever get enough of the Montgomery Riverfront Uprising, aka the Alabama Sweet Tea Party? The answer is NO! By Toure'—Courtesy of thegrio.com

It's all about the Montgomery Riverfront Uprising, aka the Alabama Sweet Tea Party, aka Fadesgiving. This is an epic part of Black history. One day, we'll tell our kids about it because we'll have to because, one day, Black history will be banned. Here are my 11 favorite parts of this glorious moment.

1. The three brothers skipping as they slide in to join the fight. That sort of skipping lets you know they're looking forward to the smoke.

2. The way Black people came to-

gether to defend Black people. I mean, isn't that the dream — you get into trouble when some whites start whiting, and suddenly, Black people emerge from every corner and crevice to defend you?

3. The man who many have been referring to as a dockworker or a security guard — the man who threw his hat in the air — is actually the co-captain of the riverboat Harriott II, which was attempting to dock in the space occupied by the pontoon boat. He was a boss who got off the boat to handle the situation before the vi-

deos started. His crew was on the boat watching him take shots. They were like, oh hell, no that's our leader, and they ran to help him.

4. Most of the Black people who jumped into that fight may not have been breaking the law. Alabama law makes it legal to defend yourself or others with force. The statute says: "A person may use deadly physical force, and is legally presumed to be justified in using deadly physical force in self-defense or the defense of another person." I wonder if unc with the folding chair may end up doing

time, but the rest of them may be in the clear (though investigations are still ongoing). It looks like they beat down them white people legally. You love to see it.

5. The catharsis of seeing white people get hurt by Black fists is so powerful. I don't care if saying that is impolitic. I'm not one to say violence is never the answer. Every once in a while, someone absolutely positively needs to catch some hands just so they don't forget what can happen when they get out of pocket. The caucosity was strong with these white

men. They needed to be knocked down literally and figuratively. It was for their own good. They should've just complied.

6. Have we ever loved a Black swimmer more? We could not be prouder of Scuba Gooding, Jr., that 16-year-old boy who swam his way into the fight. He is a role model. Someone raised him right.

7. Has a chair ever been more beloved??? I know we've idolized that African-looking throne-ish peacock chair that Huey Newton famously sat on but no, the Montgomery folding chair is now the most famous chair in Black history. Rosa Parks's bus seat is a close second.

8. I wonder if the inventor of the folding chair, Nathaniel Alexander, ever looked at his invention and thought, 'Yes, this is good for sitting, storing and bonking white people on the head.' If Alexander is in heaven looking down, I bet he's happy that his chair is famous for being a critical tool in a Black uprising rather than in a wild match of pro wrestling.

9. We have recontextualized that racist song by Jason Aldean. Those white men tried that in a small town, and they got rocked. Now tons of Black people are using "Try That In A Small Town" as the background music for their Montgomery videos, and that song will never sound the same. It will never have the meaning Aldean intended. It can only sound ironic. It is proof of white stupidity. We have culturally appropriated that song.

10. The hat has become a symbol of needing assistance — a bat signal or Black signal. Tell your kids: If you get in trouble, throw your hat high up in the air, and Black people will come to your aid.

11. This whole thing happened 24 hours after a Trump rally in Montgomery. Those white men who attacked the co-captain were probably hopped up on Trumpism. A study has shown that there's often a rise in violent incidents following Trump rallies. People walk out of Trump rallies filled with the arrogance of

whiteness, filled with caucosity and superiority, which leads them to say and sometimes do vile things toward non-white people. Trump has a unique ability to speak and motivate white men to go out and commit violence toward other people. There was a guy in Germany decades ago who was also good at that. Can't remember his name though.

12. The immense Black joy that has emerged from this is priceless. We watched and laughed and loved what we saw. The joy that Black people feel is worth all of the pain that those white people had to go through.
