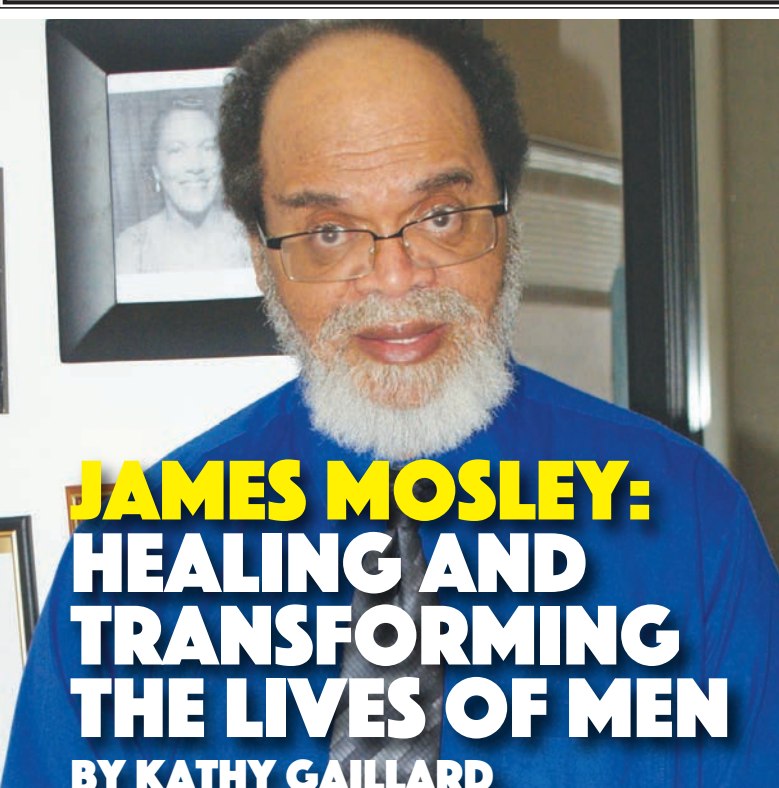
The Fellowship Open, which has launched

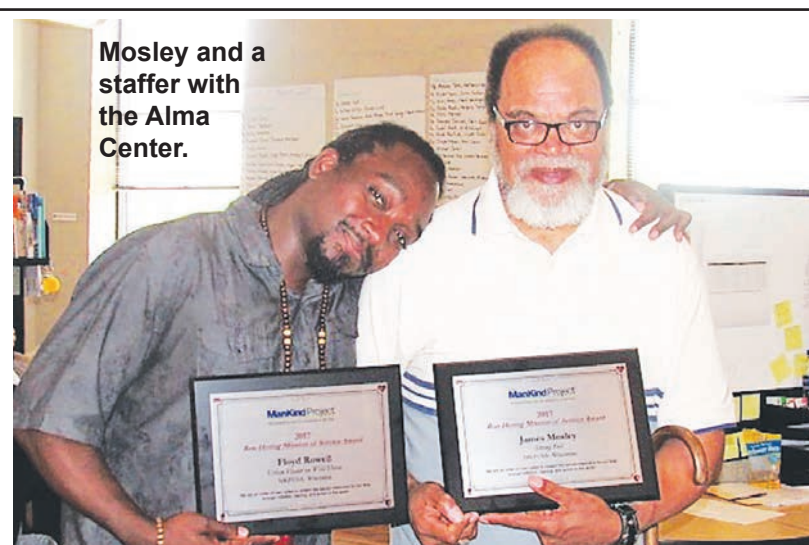
**JAMES MOSLEY:
HEALING AND
TRANSFORMING
THE LIVES OF MEN**

James Mosley, Senior Facilitator at the Alma Center, is continuing his family's legacy of service. Over the last 50 years he has served with a number of church and community organizations, primarily working with youth.

He also spent about five years in Chicago, right after the riots, helping to rebuild neighborhoods on Chicago's west side, one of the city's poorest areas.

"My family has always been involved in the community and the inner city church network. My grandmother was part of St. Mark's AME Church in the 1920s and 30s when they were located on Walnut Street, and my family was involved with St. Benedict the Moor Parish, which was across the street from where we lived.

"My learning about service began in 1961 as an altar boys at St. Francis Church," said Mos-

These days Mosley's service continues as he facilitates court mandated education at the Alma Center.

The Alma Center works to heal, transform and evolve the unresolved pain of trauma that fuels the continuing cycles of violence, abuse and dysfunction in

families and communities.

Most of the men served are at-risk or involved in the criminal justice system, with a particular focus on men who have a history of domestic violence.

"While the education we provide is primarily court-mandated, there has to be a willingness on part of the individual to take the program.

"During the interview process we assess if the men are willing to go through the stages of change.

"If they are willing to change, there is the potential to grow, learn, and begin learning ways to think and behave differently.

"They must be open to replacing old behavior with learned newer and better behavior. Nothing changes over a short period of time, which is why our program takes six-months to complete," said Mosley.

Launched in 2004, the Alma Center, Inc. provides an evidence-based trauma-informed approach of working with do-

domestic violence offenders.

Founded by Terri Strodthoff, PhD, the organization uses an innovative healing approach that recognizes domestic violence is a cycle that can be broken.

The fatherhood education program helps men who have been abusive recognize, acknowledge and, when safe and possible, amend the trauma they have caused their own children.

The program focuses on exploring personal experiences of fathering to learn compassion, forgiveness, and responsibility, and to build positive, trauma-informed and developmentally appropriate nurturing fathering and co-parenting values, attitudes, and skills.

“Our program is powerful and transformative. I’ve been facilitating these six-month cohorts for 15 years now.

“The challenge is always helping men see themselves and understand the value of connecting with their emotions. When a person is able to take that inner journey it is rewarding.

“Getting men to understand that there is nothing shameful about their feelings is challenging. We teach men that feelings are a sign of emotional intelligence if used correctly.

“Many of our men of color are just angry. Helping them step out of their anger is our goal,” said Mosley.

Mosley believes that if men improve themselves, it trans-

lates to helping them become better fathers and raising their children.

“One of my colleagues has a saying, “Healing is the new cool.” He started out as one of our clients, and now he is a facilitator.

“He’s learned a lot and is committed to his change and helping others,” said Mosley.

James Mosley and the work that he does at the Alma Center are much-needed services—planting seeds to grow, nurture and help men be better men and fathers on this journey we call life.

Alverno College Marks 50th Anniversary of Abilities-Based Curriculum with New Data Reinforcing Positive Impacts on Education and Career Outcomes

As the 2023-2024 academic year starts today, Alverno College welcomes both a new president, Christy L. Brown, J.D., and celebrates the 50th anniversary of its ground-breaking abilities-based curriculum and performance-based assessment.

To mark the milestone, Alverno released the findings of a new alumni survey that reinforces the positive impacts of Alverno’s eight Abilities on both their education and career experiences.

“Alverno’s Eight Abilities have never been more relevant delivering career-ready graduates with the skills most in demand by today’s employers, and providing an equitable educational experience that positions all students to succeed based on their individual needs, background and growth,” said Brown.

“The Abilities are foundational to our mission to prepare women for lives of personal and professional distinction and meaningful engagement with the world.”

With Alverno’s abilities-based curriculum and performance-based assessment, nearly all (95%) of the more than 300 survey respondents who graduated from Alverno between 1976 and 2019 felt “very well” or “well” prepared to find a job or pursue graduate school.

Nearly all (94%) also felt “very well” or “well” prepared for the demands and expectations of their careers, and to receive feedback from supervisors and colleagues.

“For 50 years, Alverno’s faculty and leaders have asked the same question, ‘What does every student need to be a successful person in the world whether at work or in

their personal lives?’” said Alverno’s Jodi R.B. Eastberg, PhD, Interim Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of the School of Professional and Graduate Studies.

“The Abilities were born in response to change and need. As

needs evolve, so do our Abilities.” Countless educators worldwide have studied and adopted Alverno’s innovative model of teaching and learning.

Following Alverno’s lead, well-respected institutions including Stanford and Yale Law Schools, Reed University, Brown University, and Sarah Lawrence University have eliminated letter grade assessments.

When compared to traditional letter-grading systems, almost all Alverno alumni respondents felt Alverno’s abilities-based curriculum and performance-based assessment was a more immersive, rigorous, and motivating educational experience that held students more accountable.

More than half (53%) felt it was “much more” rigorous while 78% felt they were held “much more” accountable.

More than half (55%) also felt they were “extremely” motivated

by Alverno’s curriculum and 70% said it provided a “very” immersive learning experience.

Thinking about present day, nearly all respondents reported they frequently (60%) or moderately (26%) use Alverno’s 8 Abilities at work, home, or their communities.

Most alumni respondents (82%) also noted that if all things were equal and they were interviewing two job candidates, they would “much more” (46%) or “more” (36%) likely prefer the candidate that graduated from an abilities-based curriculum like Alverno’s.

“Simply put, Alverno’s 8 Abilities are what set our students and alums apart,” Eastberg said.

“We’ve given our students and graduates the framework and tools to unleash their excellence and make a lasting impact. That’s the power of an Alverno education.” The Alverno Alumni Abilities survey was an online, multiple-choice survey conducted in Spring 2023.

“CLOSED FOR JUSTICE!”

Relatives and friends of shooting victim collecting signatures to have Teutonia gas station’s license revoked!

Relatives and friends were collecting signatures on a petition recently calling for the permanent closing of a Clark gas station—Teutonia Gas & Food—at 4295 N. Teutonia Ave. where its security guard fatally shot a man in the back of the head over stolen snacks. Isaiah Allen, 29 was the victim. He was shot by William Pinkin, 56, who was the gas station’s security guard.

Pinkin shot Allen after witnessing him take a box of Little Debbie snack cakes and walking out. Pinkin, according to online records, had been released earlier this year by the Wisconsin Department of Corrections after serving time for a 1989 robbery and fatal shooting of a clerk at a smoke shop.

As a convicted felon, Pinkin is barred from possessing a gun. Online records show he did not have a permit to act as a security guard. According to the state Department of Safety and Professional Services, Wisconsin doesn’t require security guards who

are directly employed by a business to obtain a permit. Individuals working as a guard for a private security agency must obtain a permit. Anyone under suspicion of a misdemeanor or a convicted felony are prohibited from obtaining a permit.

An individual who lives near the gas station, said it failed the community after becoming something of a neighborhood hub. It’s believed by many in the neighborhood that non-Black owned businesses cause more problems for the Black community than they provide benefits.

Ald. Andrea Pratt, who represents the area, said in a recent news release she has “many questions” about armed security that she is looking into. She added businesses shouldn’t be able to include security in their operations if it’s not credentialed by the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services. She noted she will explore legislation that further regulates private security.—Source for this article: jsonline.com—Photos by Mikel Holt

New Analysis Finds Choice Schools More Cost-Effective Than Public School Peers

WEST ALLIS -- According to new recently published research, schools in Wisconsin’s parental choice programs are significantly more cost-effective than their public school peers.

The analysis of publicly-available Department of Public Instruction school report cards and state and local funding data found that private schools in the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program, Racine Parental Choice Program and statewide Wisconsin Parental Choice Program all delivered significantly more bang for the buck than their public school peers:

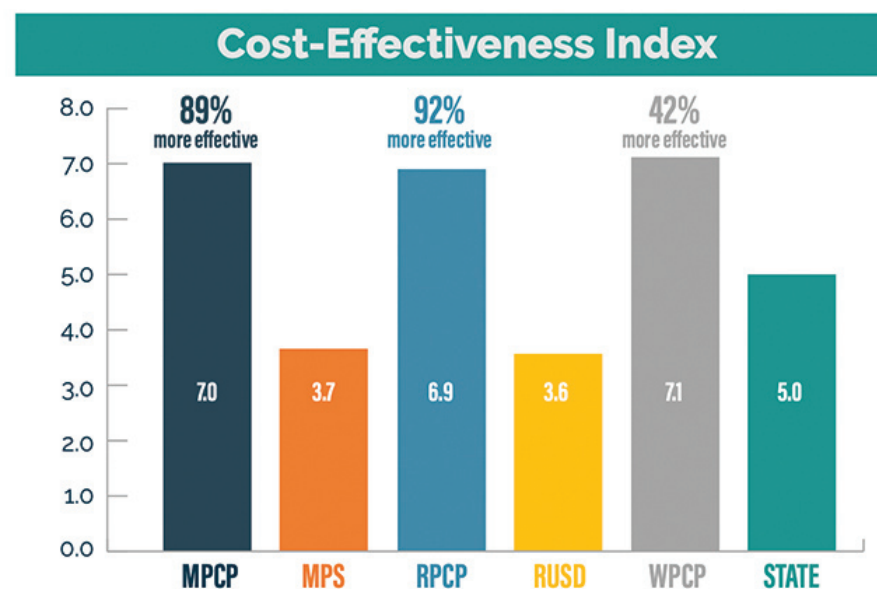
The Milwaukee Parental Choice Program was 89 percent more cost-effective than the Milwaukee Public School District.

The Racine Parental Choice Program was 92 percent more cost-effective

than the Racine Unified School District.

The statewide Wisconsin Parental Choice Program was 42 percent more cost-effective than statewide public schools.

The graphic above shows a cost-effective advantage for the MPCP, RPCP, and WPCP of 89%, 92%, and 42%, proving the cost-effective advantage of schools in the state's parent choice programs. Advantages exist even when recently approved higher payments are considered.

Housing Authority is overcharging tenants, Common Ground and HACM residents ask for investigation, repayment

Common Ground leaders and residents of the Housing Authority of the City of Milwaukee (HACM) are calling for an audit of the agency after several residents spoke out early this week about problems with the mismanagement of rent collection.

During a 'Rent Hearing' at Metropolitan Missionary Baptist Church HACM residents voiced their complaints about the city's public housing agency, noting their inaction and negligence with the collection of rent is causing emotional stress and economic hardship for residents.

HACM owns 27 buildings and has 4,000 units dedicated to low-income families and seniors in the city. Common Ground is an organization made up of 43 local groups that work together to address community issues.

Backed by documented evidence collected by Common Ground, residents shared stories of HACM overcharging on rent, bogus late fees, and 'lost' payments.

"I pay my rent on time every month and they charged me late fees seven months in a row," said Florence Riley, a resident of Westlawn. "That's stealing."

Several residents from different HACM owned properties had similar complaints. "I'm here because HACM is stealing from me, other residents and organizations like SDC," said Nicole Binns, a resident at College Court.

Another College Court resident, Layette Bell, said: I hope you can appreciate how serious this is for me. I pay \$50 a month in rent right now—a \$30 bogus late fee nearly doubles my rent!"

"They tried to terminate me from Rent Assistance," said Jackie Burrell, president of the Westlawn Resident Organization. "But I had proof of what was going on. It didn't happen just once! They try to do it every year!"

Savella McLaurin, a former property manager for HACM said she and other managers had complained about the rent issues to upper management. But nothing happened. "It is so sad that this is still going on after all this time."

"Knowing that your system is erroneously charging late fees and not doing anything about it—that's stealing," exclaimed Rev. Willie Davis of Invisible Reality Ministries and the Common Ground Executive Team. "And doing this to poor and elderly folks is an outrage!"

The Regional Administrator for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Diane

Shelley, was invited to the hearing, but she did not attend. This past June, Common Ground had sent a report to HUD of 12 alleged cases of 'serious rent mismanagement.'

Common Ground and HACM residents want:

- a detailed investigation of HACM's rent ledgers to quantify the problem -- how many residents are impacted?
- an audit of HACM's policies and practices on rent collection.
- recommendations of reforms to make the system work properly.
- HACM to pay back all the money it stole from residents with interest.

Common Ground Executive Director Jennifer O'Hare said in an interview after the hearing that her organization will "go around" HUD administrator Shelly and their their grievances to U.S. Representative Gwen Moore, U.S. Senators Ron Johnson and Tammy Baldwin, the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority (WHEDA), and to HUD Secretary Marcia Fudge.

"We're sticking with this until we get justice for residents," O'Hare said.

When contacted for their response, a representative for HACM reportedly said the agency is working to solve the problems its tenants face, adding the COVID pandemic left them short-staffed.

The spokesperson said HACM is working closely with the HUD local office's quality assurance division to see how they can improve its processes and systems. —Sources for this article: Common Ground press release, tmj4.com.

winners from school choice," School Choice Wisconsin President Nicholas Kelly said. "More than 30 years after its inception, school choice continues to deliver on its promise of delivering cost-effective education to students across our state."

By understating public school revenue by omitting federal aid and private donations, and overstating private school fundraising, this analysis provides a conservative estimate of overall cost-effectiveness of private schools that participate in the choice programs.

Of note, the overall cost-effectiveness advantage is maintained even when accounting for this summer's funding increases.

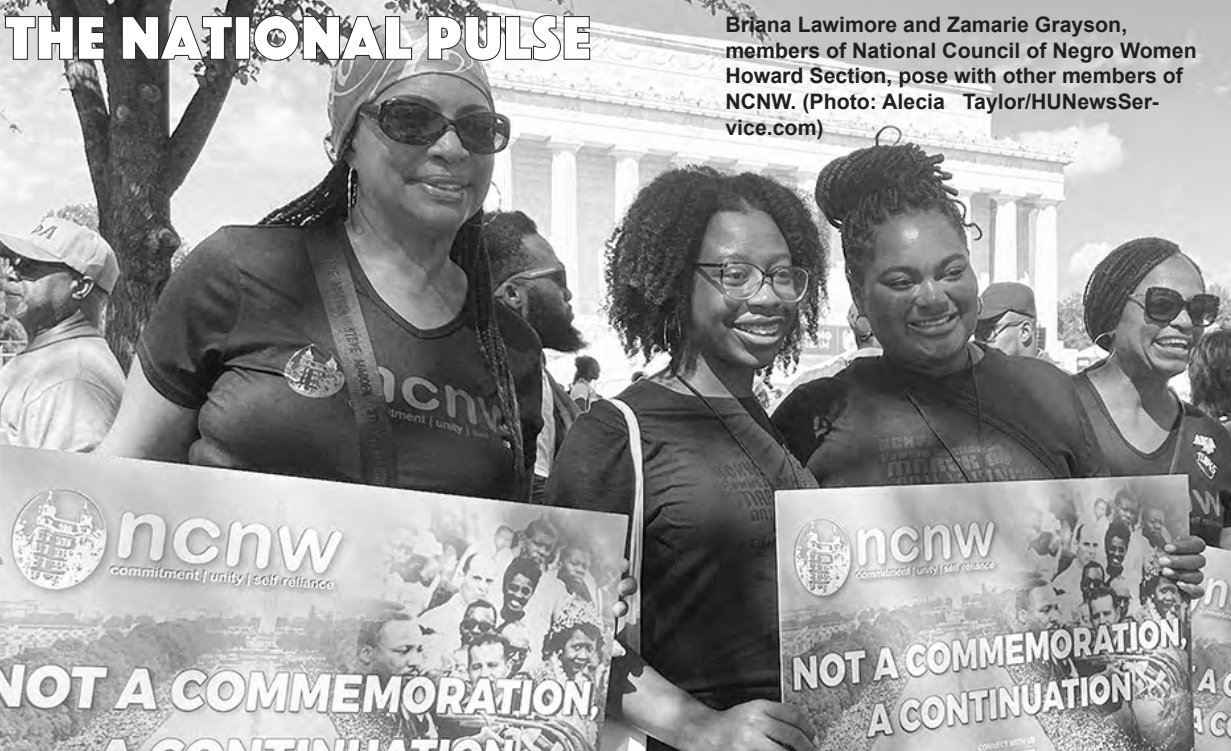

Students Make Voices Heard at 60th Anniversary of March on Washington

Black students from all over the nation gathered at the Lincoln Memorial to celebrate and continue marching for freedom and equal opportunities.

Thousands of people showed up Saturday morning to hear speakers honor the anniversary of the 1963 March for Jobs and Freedom, where Martin Luther King Jr. famously delivered his “I Have a Dream” speech.

The 1963 march drew over a quarter of a million people from all over the nation, from different racial, ethnic and religious backgrounds.

As many speakers, such as King and John Lewis, were scholars from Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Black students attended the anniversary march to echo their predecessors’ legacy.

Devonte King, a senior political science and economics double major at Howard University, attended the march with the Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc.’s Alpha Chapter. During the pandemic, King attended rallies for Black Lives Matter, but he found himself soaking in the historical significance of this march in particular.

“I’ve never been to something of this magnitude before,” he said. “There’s so many people and the magnitude of the 60th an-

niversary is very historic.”

King reflected on his organization’s involvement in the Civil Rights Movement, spotlighting A. Philip Randolph, a labor activist who was a Sigma. Randolph is credited by many as one of the predecessors of the mass demonstration that became the 1963 March on Washington.

Randolph was an advocate for ending employment discrimination as well as banning segregation within the armed forces.

He founded the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters in 1925 to improve the working conditions for African Americans working for the Pullman Company.

Some of Phi Beta Sigma’s core values are “brotherhood, scholarship and service,” King said.

Like many members of the National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC), King and his brothers continue the fight for education and equal opportunities like the Civil Rights leaders who were also part of the council.

Divine Nine members could be seen throughout the crowd, with many of their presidents speaking on behalf of the individual Black fraternities and sororities.

The Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Inc., Beta Chapter at Howard University, in collaboration with the Collegiate 100 and the Howard National Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), assisted with organizing for Howard

students to attend the anniversary march. Other organizations such as the National Council of Negro Women’s Howard section honored those who came before them and their contribution in the march 60 years ago.

Students from Florida chanted “No Justice, No peace!” along with speakers, citing Florida’s laws as anti-Black.

Safia Walker and Anylia Blue said they traveled with classmates from Florida State University not only to honor the anniversary of the March on Washington but also “advocating for their rights.”

“We’re marching for the educational rights that were taken away from us by Ron DeSantis,” Blue said of Florida’s governor.

During the legislative session, DeSantis signed hundreds of bills pertaining to education, gender and sexuality, and immigration, causing pushback from many marginalized groups. Among the bills the students mentioned were the Florida House Bill 1557, also known as the “Don’t Say Gay” bill prohibiting public schools from instructing on gender and sexuality in grades kindergarten through third grade and the Florida Senate Bill 266, which prohibits public universities from spending state funding on diversity and inclusion programs.

Students from Florida A&M University, the state’s only public HBCU, also there to Washington to make sure their voices were heard.

“We have a lot of stuff we’re fighting against,” Jovan Mickens, a political science major at FAMU, said. “African American studies is under attack, even LGBTQ [individuals] are under attack.”

As the president of FAMU College Democrats, Mickens said his organization enforces education, engagement and empowerment by hosting panel discussions, registering people to vote and attending marches such as the one on the Lincoln Memorial.

Alyssa Gooby and Aniya Wright, students from Lincoln University in Pennsylvania, drove over two hours to take part in what they referred to as a historic moment.

“To be able to march here freely and be able to have so many different opportunities nowadays... [Our people came a long way,]” Gooby said.

The pair said they enjoyed being surrounded by the unity of the different students who came to the march. They were proud to hear some speakers address issues such as police brutality and mental health in the Black community, topics they felt were not previously talked about enough.

In total, Lincoln brought about 60 students by shuttle to partake in the march, according to the attending students.

Many marchers also brought along their younger children, giving them signs and educating them on the history of discrimination in America.
 Among the children, were T’Kyrra Terrell, a 6-year-old who sat on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial with her grandmother Malita Tyre. Tyre said her granddaughter has been attending marches since the age of 2; one of the more recent marches being in 2022 to commemorate Civil Rights activists who were beaten while marching from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama on Bloody Sunday in 1965.

Zion Douett, 17, and Samuel, 13, of New York City, drove to the nation’s capital with their father James Douett. The two siblings said even if their father didn’t bring them to the march, they would still want to attend.
 “Everybody needs their support–everyone needs their attention,” Samuel said.
 His sister added their generation must start paying attention and collaborating with older generations.
 “[My generation] will say something but they don’t always do something. They say ‘Oh we should do this or do that’ but they really don’t do it,” Zion said.
 “How crazy the policies are getting...how strict everything is getting, we have to do something. We can start small.”
