### African American Milwaukee residents still more likely to be stopped, frisked by police

**Report finds Black drivers 4.5 times more likely to get stopped than white drivers.**

Five years after a historic \$3.4 million settlement over the Milwaukee Police Department's stop and frisk practices was reached, a report released Monday found Black Milwaukeeans still face higher rates of police stops.

The report from the Crime and Justice Institute found that Black drivers in Milwaukee are 4.5 times more likely to get stopped by police than White drivers and more than twice as likely to be frisked after a stop.

The findings come after a settlement was reached with the Milwaukee Common Council in 2018, which looked at the Milwaukee Police Department's stop and frisk policies from 2010 to 2017.

In the lawsuit, the American Civil Liberties Union of Wisconsin claimed the department disproportionately stopped people of color without cause or suspicion.

"The disparities that started this lawsuit and started the liti-

gation in the first place remain," said Jon Dougherty, an attorney with Gilbert LLP and counsel for the ACLU of Wisconsin.

The agreement requires the Milwaukee Police Department and Milwaukee's Fire and Police Commission to release stop and frisk data regularly to the public and use an independent consultant to evaluate if the city, police department and commission are making programs to im-

plement reform.

The data released Monday found that the department conducted an estimated 31,081 traffic stops in 2022 and 1,212 field interviews. Of those encounters, 225 involved frisks.

The differences in frisk rates were the most racially disparate of any, the report said, with the frisk rate for Black subjects more than eight times higher

ing the diversity of our partners, employees, and volunteers.

**M**alcolm X once lectured on how Black slaves were used by their 'owners' to convince their beaten and brutalized brethren their status was condoned by biblical decree.

That indoctrination included the false—and ridiculous—statement that Africans (or anyone darker than vanilla) were the descendants of the biblical Ham, who was cursed (by Noah of Noah and the ark fame) and destined to be the slaves of righteous (White) men.

Since reading was outlawed for slaves, and the conspiratorial message was carried by people who looked like them, many --if not most--fell for the okie doke.

It is, in truth, a classic case of racist

propaganda, ethnic division, and reverse psychology.

Well, that's not entirely true. The first two sentences of the commercial provide a positive purpose in that the father, Kory Yeshua, explains how he has taught his daughter that there is no obstacle she can't overcome; nothing she can't achieve (regardless) of her race.

But after that utterance, the manure runs downhill. As if on an unblemished metal slide.

The brother goes on a rant about how CRT is advancing a narrative to divide the good people of America by race, to traumatize white children who, according to similar propaganda, will be forced to shoulder the burden of their evil ancestors' complicity with the cruelest form of slavery known to mankind.

Normally, I would dismiss the commercial as another propaganda marketing ruse, putting it in the same category as miracle diet pills or political campaign promises to end racism and bring peace to the free world.

But this piece of tainted indoctrination hit me on the (not so) funny bone, not only because of its underlying canards (lies) and distortions, but also because unless the brother is a braided Oreole, he is insanely ignorant and not only misleading his brethren and White America, but his precious daughter, named Royalty, as well.

I fear the articulate tot is in for a sad awakening if she is taught to believe there are no longer any obstacles--institutional racism--in her way; that the only thing dividing the country is CRT.

The most apparent affront to common sense is his assertion that CRT is being, or will be taught in the schools. Inches behind that ludicrous statement is his suggestion that CRT is propaganda and a misrepresentation of American (not Black) History.

For the record, CRT is not an 'al-

In truth, CRT is a 40-year-old legal study that explores the relationship between systemic racism and disparities in convictions and sentencing of Black Americans.

To crystalize it for the myopic, CRT is an evaluation (research) of ra-

convinced the gullible and weak-minded into believing it was instead an elementary school curriculum that teaches a false history.

That includes the 'deceptive' narrative that the U.S. Constitution had a sentence stating African slaves were not fully human, that the government did not legislate to maintain second-class citizenship for our ancestors,

This deceptive ad is actually one of many aired around the country.

There's a \$1 million television campaign running in Virginia by a group called 'Free to Learn' whose sole intent is to plant the fear in White par-

ents that one school district is trying to integrate CRT in its curriculum and, if successful, their precious children will be adversely impacted.

In truth, I find it hard to believe that so many White people--including their political leaders---don't know the truth about CRT.

No, check that.

I find it hard to believe so many gullible Whites are willing to ignore facts--- who have fallen prey to this scheme, the okie doke!

And scheme it is.

Indeed, the commercial is intended to prey upon the weak-minded, to exonerate racists for their unjustifiable hatred, to pave the way for censorship of facts--true history--and to further divide the ethnicities.

This affront to reality is second only to the false belief that there are 'races' based on melanin---white and yellow and red and black.

There is but one race --'hue-man'--with roots in the Motherland--Africa. That must be true since the remains of the first human were discovered by White anthropologists. The only questionable element of that fact was they named her 'Lucy' (when her name was La-Quissha).

But back to Yeshua, a Hebrew/Aramaic name translated to 'Jesus' by Europeans to enable them to take ownership of the Messiah.

That descriptive name aside, either this brother is ignorant (absent of knowledge), stupid (misuse of knowledge), or complicit in a propaganda scheme that Malcolm warned us of.

## Rev. Al Sharpton declares temporary victory in fight to preserve affirmative action

**Federal Judge in Atlanta Denies Preliminary Injunction Against the Fearless Fund in Defeat for Right-Wing Legal Activists**

ATLANTA, GA — Rev. Al Sharpton, Founder and President of the National Action Network (NAN), declared a temporary victory in the fight against conservative legal activists, as they continue their campaign against affirmative action, economic equality and justice.

Standing outside the federal courthouse in Atlanta this morning with Fearless Fund Co-Founders Arian Simone and Ayana Parsons, the civil rights leader noted this was just the first step in an ongoing struggle.

"We came to Atlanta to take a stand against those who seek to undo generations of hard-won civil rights, because this country needs to move forward on equality -- not backward," said Rev. Al Sharpton, Founder and President of NAN.

"Today, I am proud to have stood with Arian and Ayana in that courtroom as the judge denied the preliminary injunction, recognizing the weak argument the other side is making. These women started the

Fearless Fund as a correction to the historic economic discrimination Black women face. This is a good day for our fight, but we cannot sit back now. We have won round one of this fight but the battle is far from over.

The National Action Network will be in Atlanta, in Jacksonville, and in every other city where racism of

any kind seeks to pop up its ugly head."

Tuesday marked the first court appearance for the Fearless Fund since conservative legal advocates filed a lawsuit earlier this summer.

The lawsuit specifically targeted its Strivers Grant Contest, which gives \$20,000 grants to Black female entrepreneurs, arguing it violates the Civil Rights Act

of 1866.

The Fearless Fund's legal team has categorically dismissed these conservatives' legal argument. The controversial and highly condemned lawsuit is the latest effort to chip away at hard-fought civil rights in Corporate America following the Students for Fair Admissions, Inc. v. President and Fellows of Harvard College decision.

Within weeks of that crushing Supreme Court decision, a group of Republican state Attorneys General fired off a letter threatening Fortune 100 companies that DEI efforts would count as discrimination.

Rev. Sharpton swiftly denounced their attempt to capitalize on the decision as a way to peel back initiatives to level the economic playing field for Black and Brown Americans.

The case against the Fearless Fund has become a litmus test for right-wing activists attempts to undo diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) efforts.

Companies have pledged a combined \$340 billion toward racial equity from May 2020 to last October, according to the Brookings Institute, with many of those commitments coming from the financial sector. Some pledges made after the 2020 murder of George Floyd have been peeled back as companies come under political pressure, while others have still not lived up to the benchmarks they set for themselves.

than the frisk rate for white subjects.

Dougherty does believe progress has been made since the settlement was reached, and he said more work still needs to be done.

"There are clear differences in the experiences of Black residents of Milwaukee as opposed to those in other racial groups," Dougherty said.

"This continues to be troubling. It is persistent and it demonstrates how difficult it is to change cultures within large institutions like the police department," he added.

Dougherty said the requirements of the settlement will re-

main in place to monitor the department's numbers.

The ACLU sued the department on behalf of Charles Collins and five other plaintiffs who were stopped by police on at least one occasion from 2010 to 2017.

The ACLU claimed the department targeted tens of thousands of people without reasonable suspicion of criminal activity and that there were significant disparities between the rates that police stop black and Latino residents compared to white residents.

"While the settlement agreement will persist until the city reaches full compliance, it is important for all of us to recognize

that our vision for public safety in Milwaukee must focus on investing in strong communities and addressing root causes of harm," said Dr. Melinda Brennan, executive director of the

ACLU of Wisconsin.

In 2020, former Milwaukee police chief Alfonso Morales said the department was still changing policies and training officers on new documentation

procedures.

A request for an interview was not granted by a public information officer Monday.

The settlement calls for several policy and training changes in the department, many of which have already been reached, according to another recent report.

That's encouraging to Leon Todd, the executive director of the Milwaukee Fire and Police Commission, the civilian oversight board of the police department.

Todd said the department has taken "a lot of steps forward" since the 2018 settlement.

He also believes more analysis will help determine what's

driving the racial disparities, so the department can address them in the future.

"Both the FPC and the Milwaukee Police Department have committed to conducting additional analysis so that we better understand what's really driving the racial disparities that are identified in the report and where and why they're occurring," Todd said, "so that we can have that data, that analysis to better understand that information and look for ways to improve on thighs going forward."

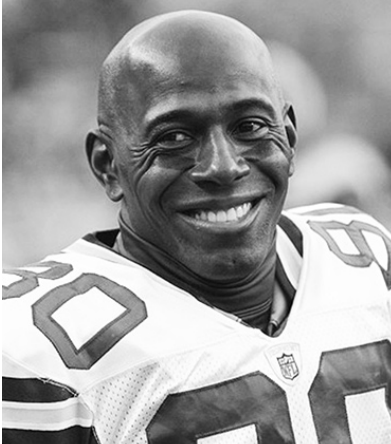

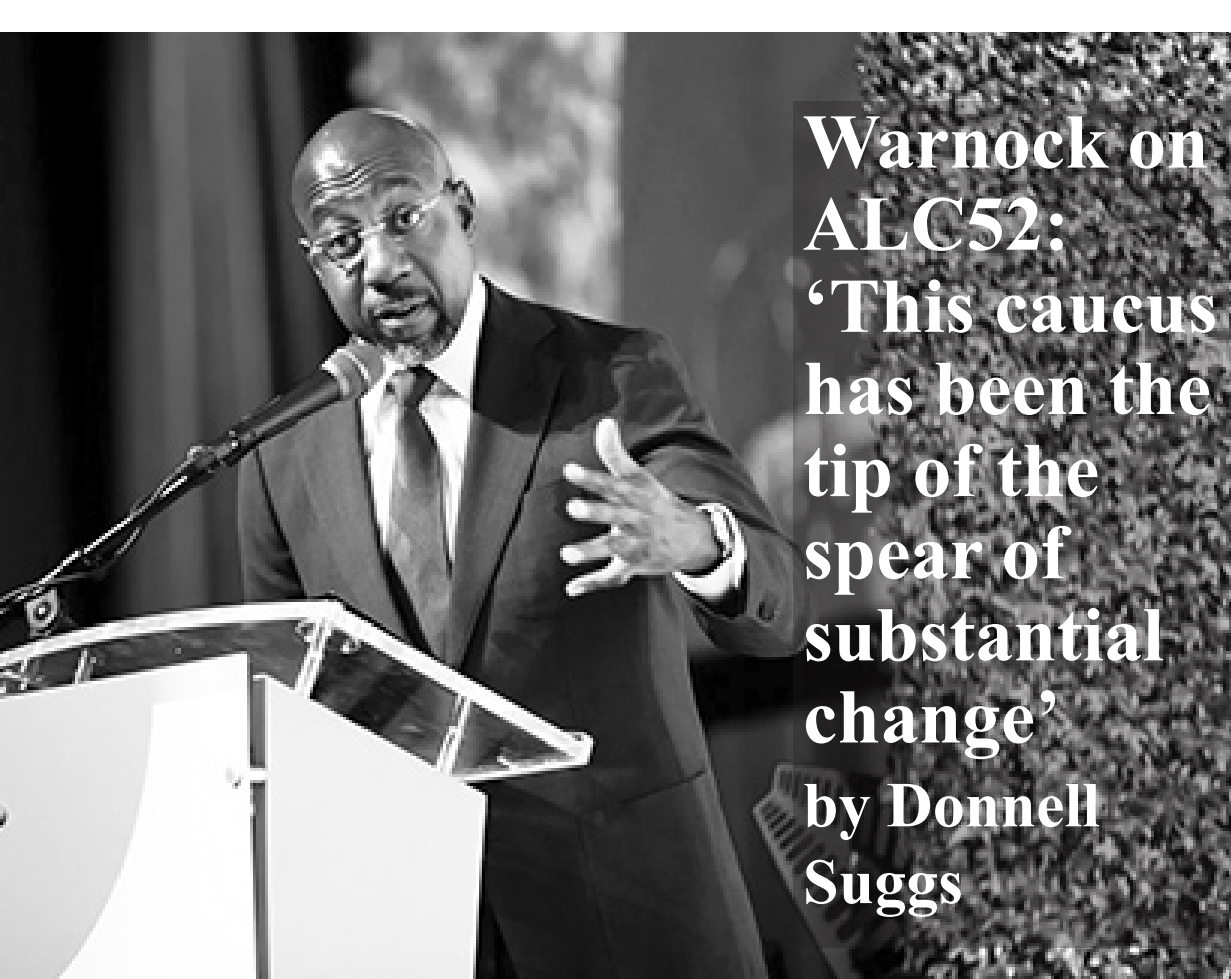

# Warnock on ALC52: ‘This caucus has been the tip of the spear of substantial change’ by Donnell Suggs

WASHINGTON, D.C. — In an empty conference room inside the Walter E. Washington Convention Center, Georgia Senator Rev. Raphael Warnock took a seat at a table and prepared to speak about what had been taking place the past three days.

The 52nd Annual Legislative Conference was taking place while Warnock, and honorary co-chair along with Representative Stacey E. Plaskett, were taking a moment to speak with The Atlanta Voice in between meetings and appointments.

“I think when the history of our country is written, historians will have to pause when covering this period and acknowledge that much of the progressive change that we have seen in this country has been advanced through the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC),” Warnock said. “This caucus has been the tip of the spear of substantive change in our country.”

A second-year member of the United States Senate, Warnock has already had a bill passed that capped the cost of insulin to \$35, which has played a major part in bettering the health of Georgians. As a member of the CBC he has seen even more change take place throughout by way of the efforts from his fellow CBC members throughout the government.

“It has been the conscience of the Congress on everything from voting rights, to civil rights, to racial equity jobs and opportunity,” he said. “What I have seen in just two years in the Senate is that perspective matters.

“There have been many occasions that I have felt that my being in the room meant that certain questions were raised that would not have even been asked, let alone answered.”

Many questions have been asked and answered this week as both national and local topics were featured in panels. Warnock was among the first featured speakers during the annual town hall that took place Thursday morning.

He gave his remarks early on because the Senate had to votes to cast. He said he wanted to be a part of that annual tradition because multiple voices matter.

“The only way to get the ideal of

justice and equality right is to have diverse voices in the room,” Warnock said. “This is a launching pad for continuing work. This conference is not going to solve these problems in four days or even four years. It does act as a catalyst for change, because it brings not only legislatures to the table, but activists, policy makers, big thinkers, thought leaders and ordinary folks.”

Next door to where Warnock took this interview there was a press conference hosted by the Hip Hop Caucus and “Cop City” was the topic of discussion. Actors, actresses and religious leaders talked about how the Atlanta Public Safety Training Center can start a trickle down effect, both on the personal and climate front.

Warnock said while walking through the halls of the convention center he has been a part of conversations about topics that are not on the conference agenda, but are equally important.

Asked how important it is to continue having those conversations outside of the Senate, the United States Congress, and even the ALC, Warnock agreed that is in a big way.

“I really believe that change doesn’t happen so much from the top down, it happens from the bottom up,” he said. “I decided to get into politics because it provides another set of tools to advance the work that I’ve been trying to do for years.”

He has plans to get the cost of insulin capped for Georgians with health insurance as well.

“In a state like Georgia where we have a million diabetics, this will make a huge difference,” he said. “I have been able to translate my years of agitation into legislation. My protests into public policy.”

Told that the ALC isn’t streamed live so that people can watch different panel discussions take place from their homes, Warnock, who has plans to preach at the 9 a.m. Sunday service at Kingdom Fellowship A.M.E. Church in Calverton, Maryland said, “Maybe that’s something we should think about.”

## Wisconsin Conservatory of Music Hosting Instrument Drive to Empower Young Musicians

**Four collection centers across Wisconsin accepting donations on Saturday, October 7**

The Wisconsin Conservatory of Music (WCM) is on a mission to inspire young musicians by providing them with musical instruments. WCM is inviting the community to contribute to this cause by donating gently used instruments that will be refurbished and given to students and schools who cannot afford to rent or purchase instruments.

To simplify the process, WCM is organizing a regional instrument drive on Saturday, October 7 at four collection centers across Southeastern Wisconsin. Instruments can be dropped off between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. (locations listed below). For more information about the Instrument Drive and how you can make a difference, visit [here](#).

Since 2017, WCM has collected over 400 gently used instruments through its biennial Instrument Drive, investing an average of \$250 per instrument in refurbishment.

Those who wish to support this initiative but don't have an instrument to donate can contribute to the Instrument Repair Fund online, over the phone, or by mail.

This fund plays a critical role in ensuring that all donated instruments are in top condition before they find a new home.

WCM has committed nearly \$70,000 from its own operating budget for instrument repairs, covering saxophones, clarinets, flutes, tubas, trumpets, violins, and more.

"Our mission is to remove barriers and provide access to music instruction," said John Bragle, Director of Community Partnerships at

the Wisconsin Conservatory of Music. "One of the ways we do that is by reaching out to the community, repairing donated instruments, and providing them to students who want to learn to play but lack the means."

Instruments needed for donation include brass instruments (trombone, trumpet, French horn, tuba, euphonium, various horns), strings instruments (cello, double bass, harp, viola, violin), guitars (electric, acoustic, classical, bass, ukulele), wind instruments (clarinet, flute, oboe, bassoon, piccolo, saxophone - all types), percussion instruments (complete drum sets), and accessories (new instrument cases and instrument cleaning supplies).

Donated instruments are preferred to be accompanied by a case.

Please note that there is currently no need for pianos, organs, kazoos, recorders, hand drums, cajons, frame drums, congas, and bongos.

Following the October 7 drive, donations will continue to be accepted on a rolling basis at the McIntoshGoodrich mansion on Milwaukee's East Side.

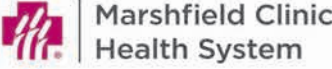
