### Cong. Gwen Moore co-sponsors resolution recognizing the intersection of violence against women, gun violence, and misogyny

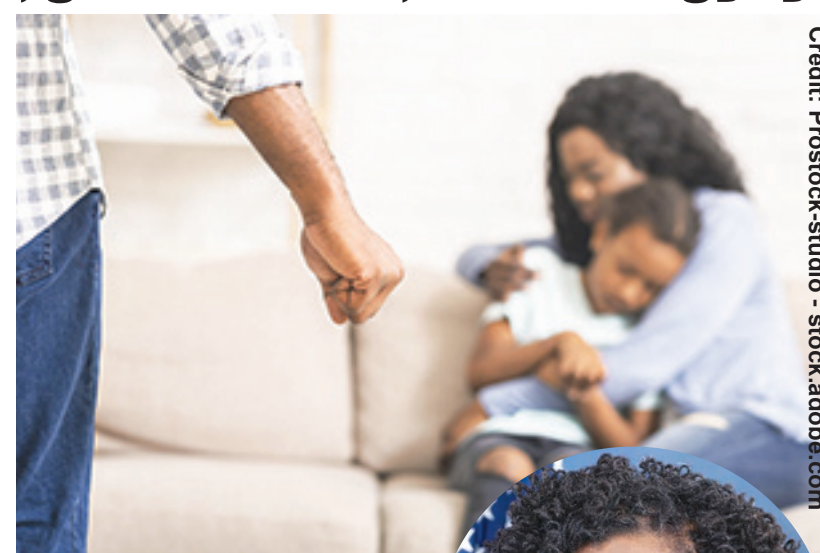
Wisconsin Congresswoman Gwen Moore was one of two lawmakers to introduce a resolution recently, recognizing the intersection of gun violence, violence against women, and misogyny.

"Misogyny continues to be a major driver of gun violence and domestic violence, with too often, fatal consequences for women," said Moore in a joint statement with Michigan Congresswoman Debbie Dingell.

Both co-chair the Domestic Violence Task Force, which introduced the resolution during Domestic Violence Awareness Month, which just concluded last month.

"While I was proud to support the bipartisan 'Safer Communities Act,' which worked to close the boyfriend loophole; we must build upon these efforts," continued Moore in the statement.

"As a domestic violence survivor and legislator, I remain focused on championing legislation, including the 'Violence Against Women Act'

and gun violence prevention proposals.

The congresswoman noted the resolution was introduced on the

heels of a case now before the U.S. Supreme Court, 'U.S. v. Rahimi.'

The court is hearing oral arguments

### Black Community's Retirement Woes Leading to New Ways to Save Money

A recent study has outlined a disturbing trend across the nation: Increasing retirement woes among Black people, coming from several angles that indicate some could choose to work longer or seek more palatable options for savings and income.

Either people aren't feeling on-track to retire, they're worried about outliving whatever savings they are able to accrue or their jobs don't offer fair retirement plans for people of color.



These being common fears in the Black community, some just breeze over the thought of retirement as a pipe dream.

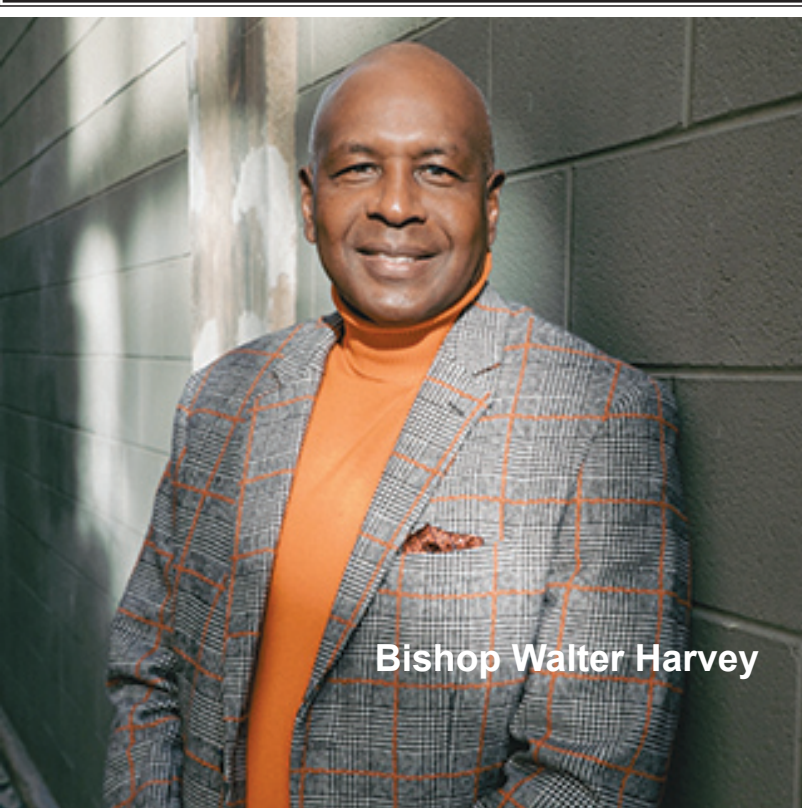
"Black and Hispanic workers have significantly less access to employer-sponsored retire-

### Upstart Kitchen: From Unrest to Unparalleled Success

"The children of the village will burn it down to feel the warmth of its love," is an African proverb that Bishop Walter Harvey references to illustrate the impetus for Upstart Kitchen, a project that evolved out of the 2016 civil disturbance in the Sherman Park neighborhood.

After dialogues with youth and community residents, a group of pastors and community leaders, including Bishop Harvey, put their heads together to address their concerns and Upstart Kitchen emerged.

Prism Economic Development Corporation (PRISM) was incorporated in 2011 to provide the Sherman Park Community access to resources that result in sustained economic growth and human flourishing.

Upstart Kitchen was founded by Prism.

"The seeds for Upstart Kitchen grew out of a cry for justice and has subsequently manifested itself economically.

Upstart Kitchen's Operations Manager.

Located at 4323 W. Fond du Lac Ave., Upstart Kitchen currently has 16 active members in the kitchen that fit into one of three categories—pre-venture, first-year entrepreneur, and established venture.

Towns said that the goal is to maintain an equal number of entrepreneurs in each category.

Participants are expected to grow their businesses while operating out of Upstart Kitchen, which usually takes about five years. Some ventures grow in less time and sometimes it takes more than five years for vendors to move into their own space.

"We check in with participants and offer support services or resources. If a business has not grown within five years, we evaluate them to help mitigate obstacles that may be preventing their growth.

Some of our members began producing food products as a "side hustle", but to become a legitimate business, they need to operate out of a licensed facility.

Upstart provides them with the

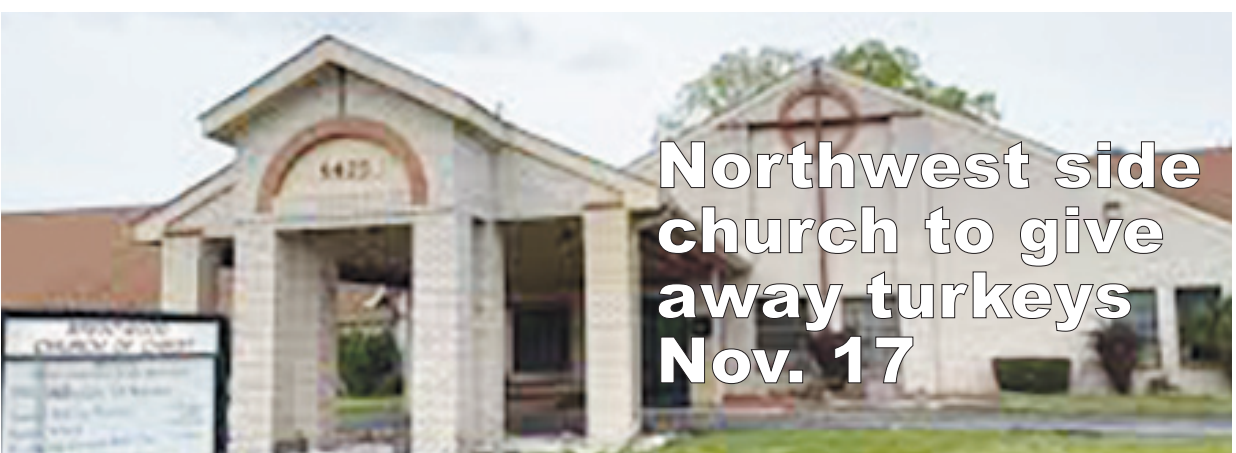

(continued from front page) space so that they can grow their business.

Some members choose to continue operating with only a limited clientele" said Towns.

Individuals interested in Upstart Kitchen can sign up online for a virtual kitchen tour. Following the tour, they can begin the pre-application process which includes completing a health department application, obtaining a seller's permit, and providing business documents, i.e., proof of LLC or tax documents.

The application process costs between \$300 and \$1200. WWBIC or BizStart will assist individuals with the documents.

The Health Department evaluates the kitchen space, which varies depending on their category of food service, such as a

baker, caterer, or food truck.

After acceptance, a tiered program determines participants' rent.

For example, food trucks pay \$100 a month and participants using eight hours of kitchen time are charged \$112. Fees increase to upwards of \$800 for full-time use.

Currently, using a scheduling program called Food Corridor, four vendors can work in the kitchen simultaneously and the facility is open 24 hours a day.

Due to increased demand, Upstart Kitchen opened a second location across the street for high volume users.

"Plans are underway for Prism EDC to prepare youth for careers in the culinary industry under a program called Brigade MKE. The program will help youth

'sharpen' their culinary skills by preparing meals for Upstart Kitchen's partnership with Children's Hospital which offers nutrition classes to youth.

Brigade MKE will also help youth transition into employment after training," said Amari Malone, Communications Manager for Prism.

Recently Upstart Kitchen won two MANDI awards—for economic development and the "People's Choice."

## MILWAUKEE PUBLIC SCHOOLS PROMISED TRANSPORTATION STIPENDS DUE TO UNRELIABLE BUSING, FEW PARENTS RECEIVED THEM!

The district did not distribute \$500,000 it allocated to reimburse parents for gas, bus passes and mileage. Parents say buses still run late.

Belinda Rodriguez depends on Milwaukee Public Schools busing contractors to transport her grandchildren to and from school. That poses problems. The bus sometimes arrives late to drive her 6-year-old

granddaughter, Magaly Coronado, to her South Side Milwaukee school, or deliver her home.

That tardiness leaves Rodriguez anxious about the child's whereabouts and wondering why one

grandchild gets picked up and not the other, even though they ride the same route and live less than two miles apart.

"This is not good because sometimes we don't have gas money or a

car to take her to school," Rodriguez texted to Wisconsin Watch in February — part of a series of messages documenting spotty bus service to her household.

Coronado's bus driver has been late again this school year, including during a day Wisconsin Watch visited her bus stop in October.

School districts across Wisconsin and nationwide have faced a years-long bus driver shortage, which the COVID-19 pandemic worsened. Bus delays and cancellations during the return to in-person learning in 2021 left many students late daily and even prompted families to consider switching schools.

Responding to the problem, the district eliminated hundreds of routes, added to drivers' workloads and launched efforts to compensate families for the hassle of finding alternative transportation.

This included mailing reimbursement contracts to a small subset of households that faced the most severe busing problems. The school board separately allocated \$500,000 in federal pandemic relief — tapping the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER) — to compensate parents for transportation costs.

But school district officials left families largely in the dark about how to collect compensation, Wisconsin Watch found. Budget documents show the district did not spend the \$500,000 it allocated, and officials say the district halted the parent contract program at the end of December 2021 after disbursing just over \$8,200 to 124 households in a district that serves about 67,500 students.

The district says it fixed its driver shortage, eliminating the need for compensation. Parents disagree and said they could still use compensation for transportation inconveniences.

Busing reliability has improved over the past two years, parents told Wisconsin Watch through its News414 collaboration with Milwaukee Neighborhood News Service. But drivers sometimes still show up late. Parents on those days must drive their children to school or keep

them home due to a lack of transportation.

"When I think about myself and in getting my daughter to school, a lot of times we don't rely on the bus because she was always getting to school late," said Milwaukee Public Schools parent Sharlen Moore, adding that being reimbursed monthly for gas would be helpful.

**Driver shortage leaves students waiting**

Shiela Cusack of Milwaukee's South Side remembers many days during the 2021-22 school year when drivers for Wisconsin Central School Bus, one district contractor, failed to pick up her daughter and take her ac-

ross town to Milwaukee High School of the Arts.

During one of her multiple calls to the company, she was encouraged to apply for a bus driver position. She wasn't interested.

Milwaukee Public Schools saw driver shortages that school year ranging from 30 to 70 drivers due to COVID-19 sickness or those who quit due to pandemic concerns, according to David Solik-Fifarek, sen-

ior director of business and transportation services. He described the disruption as brief.

"There were just some days where students were not getting picked up. (continued on page 7)

on the Rahimi case, which will determine whether a federal law prohibiting individuals under a domestic violence civil restraining order from possessing guns, violates the Second amendment.

In February 2022, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals had ruled that the federal law was unconstitutional. According to the CDC's 'The National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey (NISVS): 2010 Summary Report,' more than one in three women have experienced some form of intimate partner violence, including sexual violence, physical violence or stalking in their lifetime. This tragic reality is compounded by America's gun violence epidemic.

According to 'Everytown for Gun Safety,' a nonprofit organization formed in 2013 that advocates for gun control and against gun violence, 70 women are shot and killed by an intimate partner each month, which only magnifies the need for further gun violence prevention measures.

In Wisconsin, 96 lives were lost due to domestic violence homicide/murder-suicide in 2022, the highest number on record so far in the state.

"This loss of life is horrifying, precisely because it is preventable," said Monique Minkens, executive director of 'End Domestic Abuse Wisconsin.'

"Now is a critical moment, before the Supreme Court makes a decision in U.S. v. Rahimi. Will they protect true victims of abuse, or further enable those with access to firearms to commit violence against their victims? The choice is theirs."

Cong. Dingell said in the joint-statement that people with a history of domestic violence shouldn't have access to gun...period. "The evidence is clear and convincing that the presence of a firearm in an abusive situation makes homicides five times more likely."

Dingell called on her congressional colleagues to close loopholes in the law that allows abusers to access guns and put women and families in danger.

"We must also confront the root causes of domestic violence, understanding the way individuals who exhibit misogynistic tendencies toward women often go on to commit violence against them."

The Michigan congresswoman said guns are a deadly tool used by abusers to exert power and control, to intimidate, to terrorize, and often kill victims. Most domestic violence homicides are committed using guns.

"The intersection of misogyny, gender-based violence, and gun violence creates a deadly combination that has gone unaddressed for far too long in our nation, said Ruth Glenn, President of Survivor Justice Action (formerly the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence).

"The presence of firearms in cases of domestic violence is known to dramatically increase the risk of homicide and escalate an already dangerous situation. These interconnected issues must be addressed collectively to create a safer future for all survivors." —Source for this article: Press release from the office of Cong. Gwen Moore.

ment plans than do white counterparts, exacerbating economic inequity and hampering the ability of people of color to build financial security later in life, according to researchers," AARP reports.

"Among private sector employees ages 18 to 64, more than 53 percent of African Americans and about 64 percent of Latinos do not have access to a workplace retirement plan, compared with about 42 percent for white workers and 45 percent for Asian Americans, a July 2022 report from the AARP Public Policy Institute found."

According to the latest U.S. Census data, more than 55.8 million adults are older than 65.

That is nearly 17 percent of America's population that is "retirement age." Yet only half of Americans even have access to retirement plans. And although we know well what the gender gap is, what isn't talked about enough is the retirement gap.

Generally, studies on savings show that the average Black family has lower savings than the disparity between the average U.S. family.

It's unsurprising, then, that 54% of Black Americans don't have enough savings to retire — whether it be from system inequalities or otherwise.

All studies and reports on retirement are saying the same thing: People are worried about outliving their retirement

savings.

The retirement crisis is hitting all of the country, but as usual, disproportionately impacting Black and other racial minority communities. Nearly 40 percent of independent savers, specifically, aren't feeling on-track to retire. Independent savers are individuals who do not have access to a retirement plan through their employers.

Many in the Black and Latino communities fall under the independent saver category. Therefore, for many in these communities, retirement planning gets put on the backburner as more urgent expenses and matters arise.

But there are now new financial tools that every person can use to begin retirement savings.

Recently, the financial industry recognized this issue and started to rollout new products that will open up access to professionally managed retirement vehicles at a lower cost and without the need for a workplace-based retirement plan.

For example, BlackRock recently launched the industry's only suite of target date ETFs (Exchange-traded Funds), which is a new investment tool aimed at curbing the growing number of people who do not have any retirement savings plans, or access to such. Investors that choose this new product will be able to easily select a fund closest to their target retirement date and

make regular contributions as their own finances allow. This allows for recurring deposits, but also allows for more choice. Meaning if life happens and an unexpected expense comes up — which will certainly happen — and there's nothing left over for the month to invest, that's okay. However, this investment is professionally managed and is taken care of to make sure it's stable as retirement nears.

According to BlackRock's Read on Retirement report, 47 percent of independent savers lean on cash to build their retirement, creating a missed opportunity for potential investment growth which is important to achieving retirement goals.

These new ETF funds allow for savers that might typically rely on stashing cash to instead put that into these ETF funds that will invest in a broad portfolio and turn out even more money.

Such strategies are often in line with initiatives such as Rev. Jesse Jackson's Wall Street Project, which encourages the financial industry to open up and reach out to communities that may not necessarily be aware of alternatives to their personal savings that they may need from day to day.

"If Corporate America could see the vast potential within our underserved minority communities, would Wall Street provide access to opportunities for economic growth and sta-

bility?"

Rev. Jackson asks in a statement.

All of these retirement tools are built off of the idea that in order to encourage more retirement saving, we need to make it as easy as possible for people to build their nest egg. Retirement tools like these are for the people that don't have workplace retirement plans, those looking to complement their existing 401(k), or people that just want to boost their confidence in their retirement potential.

Most Americans are nervous; even stressed about retirement, savings, and finances in general. This is especially true for the Black community.

These products may be the first of many from Wall Street aimed at further providing transformational solutions to the retirement burdens many have been feeling over the years.

For equitable economic contributions to family and to American society regardless of race or age, retirement savings and income must become straightforward and possible for everyone.

"The road to shared economic security travels through two-way trade, where all are included, and none are left in the margins of the marketplace," Rev. Jackson states. "Industry by industry, the quantifiable gaps in opportunity and in access to capital for people of color-owned businesses define our agenda."

Three days later, they were getting picked up again,” Solik-Fifarek said.

Buses failed to pick up at least 700 students on time or at all for the first day back for 40 of the district’s roughly 150 schools following the pandemic shutdown, the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel reported in October 2021.

The crisis prompted district officials to cut 600 routes, remove about 200 buses from service, increase driver routes from two to three and recruit more drivers.

## Few compensation contracts returned

But those strategies didn’t immediately solve the problem as the district waited for new drivers to complete training.

The district sought to compensate the most affected families by mailing reimbursement contracts to about 1,000 households monthly between November and December 2021 where buses didn’t show up for multiple days in a row, Solik-Fifarek said.

School board directors Megan O’Halloran and Sequanna Taylor (who is now a county supervisor) additionally saw opportunity in the district’s \$506 million final round of ESSER funding. The board unanimously approved their proposal to allocate \$500,000 of the pandemic aid to reimburse families for bus passes, gas and mileage.

“Perhaps this a redundant amendment, and we already have plans,” O’Halloran said during an October 2021 budget meeting.

Local media reported on the compensation vote, but the school district did not tell parents how to access the funds.

“I don’t think we did a great job with informing parents about that benefit,” said Aisha Carr, another school board director.

By the time the district mailed out the contracts, 124 of which were returned, 95% of bus routes were running on any given day, Solik-Fifarek said.

The majority of contracts went unreturned for a variety of likely reasons, he added, including that the family had switched addresses, switched schools, didn’t get their mail or decided they didn’t need the small stipend.

The district had enough drivers in the pipeline by mid-December to further stabilize the busing system, allowing officials to end the compensation program, according to Solik-Fifarek.

“That was a very short-lived program,” he said.

The district did not spend the additional \$500,000 it allocated for transportation stipends, according to a May 2023 document submitted to the school board directors. The document, an update on ESSER spending, proposed removing the stipend allocation in a budget revision.

“I think that’s extremely unfair,” Cusack said.

District officials did not answer Wisconsin Watch’s questions about whether the funds were reallocated for another purpose.

Wisconsin Watch asked school board president Marva Herndon and board member Henry Leonard about how the district spent the money.

Herndon told a reporter to submit a public records

request, and Leonard said he didn’t know where the money would have gone. Wisconsin Watch is waiting on the district to fulfill that request.

## Bus route changes are a challenge

Some residents say the requirement that drivers work a third route has kept the system moving slowly.

“If (drivers) get a hiccup on their first or second route, it’s going to impact everything else that comes after it,” Moore said.

Heather Peña, whose sixth and seventh grade daughters rely on the bus, said late buses were a particular problem during colder temperatures.

In February Peña lacked a car, causing the children to miss school one day when the bus was late.

“I wasn’t going to have them waiting outside for a half an hour for a bus that was going to show up late and have them freeze their butts off,” she said.

Cusack’s daughter was often late to her first class due to unreliable bus service in February, the mother said.

“There’s still days where I have to take my daughter to school. She doesn’t even know if the bus is coming,” Cusack told Wisconsin Watch.

Adding an additional route to drivers’ schedules and offering them longer hours largely works, but it can create a time crunch, Solik-Fifarek acknowledged. He added any change to previous routines can create challenges.

“You set these routes up and then all of a sudden you add another kid, another kid, and another kid and before you know it, the route is running 20 minutes longer than it was a month ago,” he said. “And then it requires some fixing.”

Some drivers remain frustrated that the extra demands make staying on time more difficult, particularly when bad traffic or weather strikes, said Farina Brooks, a long-time bus driver and community leader.

Brooks’ first daily route starts on Milwaukee’s West Side. She then serves the Far Northwest Side. Her third route covers the East Side, she said.

In the early months of the busing overhaul Brooks would show parents her far-reaching duties on a map to assure them she wasn’t late on purpose.

“We have a heart. Most of us have children, and we understand that these babies have to stand out here. It’s not like we want them to, but there’s only so much we can do,” Brooks said. “We have to run the route the way it is and the way the times are set up. It’s frustrating to us because there’s nothing we can do.”

A study released today from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration shows that, among high school students, current (past 30-day) use of any tobacco product declined during 2022-2023 (16.5% to 12.6%), primarily driven by a decline in e-cigarette use (14.1% to 10.0%). Declines also occurred for use of any combustible tobacco product, including cigars, among high school students.

Among middle school students, significant increases occurred during 2022-2023 in current use of at least one tobacco product (4.5% to 6.6%) and the use of multiple tobacco products (1.5% to 2.5%). However, no other significant changes occurred during 2022-2023 for any individual tobacco product type, including e-cigarettes, among middle school students.

For the 10th year, e-cigarettes have been the most commonly used tobacco product among both middle and high school students. Youth e-cigarette use remains a critical public health concern, as approximately half of students who ever tried e-cigarettes reported currently using them, indicating that many youth who try e-cigarettes remain e-cigarette users.

Additionally, among students reporting current e-cigarette use, about a quarter reported using e-cigarettes daily. Notably, nearly 9 in 10 used flavored e-cigarettes.

“The decline in e-cigarette use among high school students shows great progress, but our work is far from over,” said Deirdre Lawrence Kittner, Ph.D., M.P.H., director of CDC’s Office on Smoking and

Health. “Findings from this report underscore the threat that commercial tobacco product use poses to the health of our nation’s youth. It is imperative that we prevent youth from starting to use tobacco and help those who use tobacco to quit.”

## Other key findings

This study is based on findings from the 2023 National Youth Tobacco Survey and describes ever use and current use of nine tobacco product types, flavored tobacco products, and e-cigarette use behaviors among U.S. middle (grades 6-8) and high (grades 9-12) school students.

Among middle and high school students, 2.8 million (10%) reported current use of a tobacco product in 2023.

Additionally, 2.13 million (7.7%) students reported current e-cigarette use in 2023. E-cigarettes were followed by cigarettes (1.6%), cigars (1.6%), nicotine pouches (1.5%), smokeless tobacco (1.2%), other oral nicotine products (1.2%), hookah (1.1%), heated tobacco products (1.0%), and pipe tobacco (0.5%).

Disposable products were the most commonly used e-cigarette device type among youth. However, the most popular brands included a variety of both disposable and cartridge-based products.

Among students who currently used e-cigarettes, the most commonly reported brands were Elf Bar (56.7%), Esco Bars (21.6%), Vuse (20.7%), JUUL (16.5%) and Mr. Fog (13.6%).
