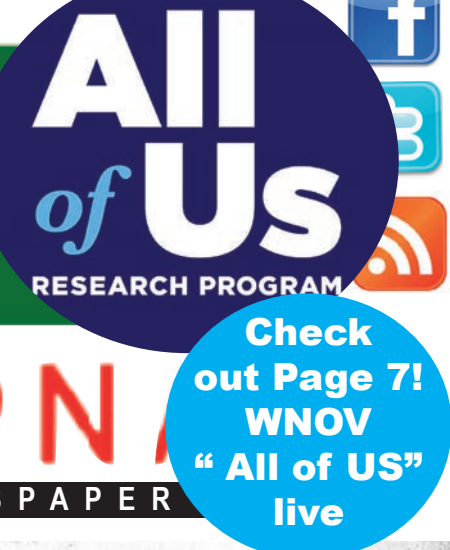

176 Years Is ENOUGH! Abolish Slavery In Wisconsin!

You might be surprised to learn that the word "slavery" is actually a fixture in the Wisconsin constitution.

In ARTICLE I., the DECLARATION OF RIGHTS, in the section after a provision on equality and 'inherent rights,' is the second issue that the state constitution addresses: SLAVERY.

At first glance, it's summed up in just two words: 'Slavery prohibited.' However further reading is required to understand the full context of those two words.

Article 1, Section 2, states: "There shall be neither slavery, nor involuntary servitude in this state, otherwise than for the punishment of crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted".

Right there—in black on white parchment—rests a provision that allows an exemption to the slavery prohibition rule.

The "Exception Clause," also known as the "Punishment Clause," made it possible for slavery to be used as a method of punishment, allowing the government to legally subject incarcerated people, across the United States, into forced labor.

Bill Tennesen, who for over four decades has taken photos of Milwaukee's Black community life and sporting events for the Milwaukee Community Journal, will have an exhibition of his work at Marquette University's Haggerty Museum of Art. The show is titled: 'Dynamic Range: Photographs by Bill Tennesen.'

A born-and-raised Milwaukee native, Tennesen grew up on 39th Street on the north side of the city. He is a 1956 graduate of Marquette University's School of Business Administration.

A self-taught photographer, Tennesen began contributing photos in 1981 to the Community Journal, Wisconsin's largest African American newspaper.

He has documented the Ernest Lacy demonstrations, Juneteenth Day celebrations, activities of

the Boys and Girls Club of Greater Milwaukee and the YWCA of Greater Milwaukee, and the Ko-Thi Dance Company. He captured many of Milwaukee's Central City storefront churches and the appearance in town of numerous important cultural and political personalities of our time. He has photographed the Milwaukee Bucks and Marquette University basketball and many other sports and community events.

'Dynamic Range' was curated by Lynne Shumow (Haggerty Museum Curator for Academic Engagement) in collaboration with Dr. Robert Smith (Marquette University Harry G. 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Mother/Sister Nature has a way of keeping everything in perspective---in balance.

Nights give way to the morning sun. Winter gives way to summer.

And for every bow-legged, college-degreed brother who walks in God's shadow, there is a knocked-kneed, educated, virgin--soul mate--ready to complete his circle and anchor a nuclear family.

That could be a bit of a stretch. But you get my point.

While data confirms a slight disparity of marriageable brothers at the top and middle socioeconomic tiers, the field is more equally balanced in the bottom ranks (probably 66%).

That's taking into consideration that nearly one-third of the sisters have nothing to offer other than non-committed sex.

In other words, if you assume one-third of the brothers have something to offer other than sperm, the field is pretty much equal when you eliminate the 'Neckbones' of either gender.

Obviously, I'm traveling down a slippery slope. But blame it on radio talk show host Sherwin Hughes, who riled up the discontented sisters last week through his discussion on the 'shortage' of brothers for available (and educated) Black women.

Sherwin offered statistics ranging from a slight disparity to the Atlanta scenario he mentioned on his show, with 10 sisters to every six men.

I assume those statistics were linked to 'marriageable mates' and not whether the government will

soon have to draft Black women for the next war to make up for a shortage of expendable brothers.

But Atlanta is an anomaly, as it is home to an array of colleges that attach sisters with marriage and careers in mind.

Many who don't find a comparable mate in college find themselves sorting through a smaller pool of equally yoked men.

Yet, away from the downtown campuses, it's a different story. When you focus on low-income or 'Neckbones' subscribing to the Culture of Poverty, it's a different story in Atlanta and elsewhere around the country.

Thus, in totality, the numbers---and assumptions of shortages across the spectrum---are, at the very least, as misleading as Donald Trump's belief that he is a solution to America's ills.

What sisters with paper and purpose surmise as shortages are solely restricted to their socioeconomic groups---assuming they are unwilling to marry 'down' for a good man.

At the community---or ghetto level---where 74% of the households are headed by a sister with children, most of whom are poor of mind and pocket, the landscape is far less rocky---albeit full of quicksand.

In fact, for the working brothers without a criminal record...or children, there might be a shortage of available sisters once you eliminate the Neckbones, who bring nothing to the table besides children, bad attitudes, and debt.

In other words, just as the over-used---albeit fabricated---statistic that there are more brothers in prison than in college, there is also an unacknowledged misconception that there is a vast pool of quality sisters within the 'Culture of Poverty.'

It ain't so.

While we rarely discuss it, the

The state of relationships/marriage in the 'Culture of Poverty'

'Culture of Poverty'---'Neckbonology'---has increasingly dominated our community.

Again, 'Mother Nature' has intervened, and it's not a sunny picture.

She's balanced the availability pool by taking many sisters off the marriage/mate list, even if they don't recognize it themselves.

And single parenthood is not the disqualifying factor.

I've been married twice, both times to queens with children. But they had a different mindset and came with aspirations and a belief in God.

In fact, I was a single parent myself; so to suggest I had a problem with a sister with children would be blatant hypocrisy on my part.

I remarried---giving up my 'whorish' lifestyle---in part because I understood the advantages of a nuclear family ruled by a good woman, not only for myself, but my children.

Moreover, I benefitted greatly from having a spiritual structure, with bonus children who gave me purpose and substance.

Indeed, the truth of the matter is that finding a sister without children these days is about as rare as finding a 20-year-old virgin.

But brothers I have spoken with over the last month said there is a specific number of children (two) that a potential mate can have. Anything more than the preferred number will not work. Brothers will avoid women with more than two children like someone would avoid spoiled green tomatoes.

A sister with two different sperm donors presents obstacles many brothers don't want to accept.

Three children by three different men brings with it questions about morality and promiscuity that does not bode well. And that's not even addressing concerns about baby-daddy drama or toxic familial problems.

Those were among the most frequently espoused commentaries offered during my 'research' on this issue, highlighted by 'interviews' during the recent Fatherhood Summit.

All the brothers I talked to were fathers, suggesting a level of pretense with their testimony.

But conversely, by virtue of their being at an event to strengthen their relationships and fatherhood skills, the brothers are two levels above what I refer to as 'disconnected sperm donors'---male 'Neckbones.'

If you eliminate the sisters with little-to nothing to offer, save for debt, a ready-made family, lousy grammar, wigs, weaves, and four-inch eyelashes, the field is limited, I was told.

And since uninhibited sex is seemingly offered as the 'new greeting card,' few unattached brothers focus on anything beyond that.

As one brother explained, "I don't want to sound like a hypocrite, but I can hook up with a (woman) every night; it's become that easy."

(But) generally, she's not the one I would think about (a long-term relationship). I want the woman who is looking for more and who doesn't look at sex as a sport."

The brother, a felon who turned his life around and recently started a business, said he 'dates' frequently but has not encountered anyone he would feel comfortable introducing to his parents.

Said another brother, "Seems like that's all I run into," he offered, "women with drama who are looking for help---financially---because they don't aspire toward anything beyond motherhood and being dependent."

Nearly all the brothers I talked with at the summit said they could identify a 'Neckbone' (my contribution to the American dialect) within a few seconds.

She's the one with 18-inch eyelashes, purple wigs running down to the floor, tight-fitting clothes that expose 'opportunity,' and expensive nails she can't afford. Ask her how her child is doing in school or what she learned at a PTA conference, and the conversation turns south."

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Ask her how her child is doing in school or what she learned at a PTA conference, and the conversation turns south.

"I judge a (woman) on how she cares for her children," the brother said.

"If she isn't engaged in the child's education and sees no problem smoking weed with them, there's no way I'm going to tackle that."

"And there are many (women) who fit that bill."

While acknowledging socioeconomic status is not an indicator of potential, most brothers surmise that a sister's cultural foundation is essential.

"There's a lot of THOTS out here," another brother said. "I'm not a prize, but I want more than to share nothing."

A female volunteer manning one of the information tables, who had listened in on our conversation, stressed disappointment in the brother's comments but agreed the disparities are not as severe among lower income.

While many young sisters are victims of circumstance or products of their environment and generational poverty, there are many who, by their actions and lack of morality, take themselves off the market.

She blamed the problem on government policies, dating back to slavery, where Black men were ostracized and made impotent.

As a result, there are too many "women who think they are men."

Hmmmm.

I can't put a finger on when our

culture was turned upside down, where gender roles were reversed, and the Black nuclear family concept left drowning in a sea of dysfunctionality.

But I can posit that we were better off during my youth when 78% of the households were nuclear---two parents with two and-a-half children---(versus 27% today), we viewed ourselves as po' instead of poor, and families lived under the tenets of their religion.

Today, there are two---maybe three---overlapping cultural paradigms. While gender disparities exist in the top two tiers, the field is balanced in the third.

Here again, 'Madame Nature' has figured out a way to keep things in balance when it comes to relationships. While data suggests most (the majority) of low-income tribal members will never marry or even co-habitate, a respectable percentage will overcome those socioeconomic obstacles to take the marital journey to family development, and economic stability.

I saw a tee-shirt online that said: "I asked God to make me a better man...And he sent my wife..."

Unfortunately, I don't know how many brothers of modest means, but good heart and purpose, think in those terms nowadays. Nor are there enough sisters of equal purpose and morality to change what is quickly becoming Sodom and Gomorrah.

I do hope that Mother Nature will sort through this sad reality show before Father Time catches up to her and the Black community is, like Lots' wife when she looked back longingly at the city of sin, reduced to a pile of salt.

Ratified in 1865, the 13th Amendment abolished slavery in America, "except as punishment for a crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted," and numerous states adopted the same language.

Former slaveholding states used the exception as a loophole to reclaim people who had been previously enslaved and whom had sought safe harbor in free states, like Wisconsin.

Pro-slavery sympathizers, living on the borders of free and slave states, used the language as an opportunity to keep a form of de facto slavery, by creating and enforcing laws that disproportionately penalized Black Americans.

Enslavers could ensure that they continued to get free labor off the backs of, often wrongfully, convicted people.

While the Wisconsin Department of Corrections does not use slave labor, they are legally permitted to do so under current law.

This has to change, but modifications to the state constitution does not come easy.

To remove the slavery provision, amendments to the constitution must be adopted by two successive legislatures and then ratified by the electorate in a statewide election.

As a part of a larger Conditions of Confinement Package of bills, along with fellow coauthors, I re-introduced a resolution to amend our constitution.

The amendment would strike the last 15 words of Article I, Section 2, and finally put an end to the ugly legacy of slavery. Wisconsin would join

states like Tennessee, Alabama, Oregon and Vermont, who have all decided to make changes to their constitutions, in the past year.

The Wisconsin constitution

has been amended 148 times, since the state was founded in 1848. It was last amended in April 2023. After 176 years, I hope we can all agree that it's time to remove any reference

to slavery.

Change starts with the passing of LRB 5017/1, re: slavery or involuntary servitude in punishment of a crime (first consideration).

Slavery In The Badger State!

It may come as a surprise to learn that during the seventeenth, eighteenth, and nineteenth centuries slavery existed in the region that would become the state of Wisconsin.

Over this period, thousands of enslaved African Americans or enslaved American Indians lived and worked in this region. Although their lives and histories have been obscured, enslaved men and women helped build some of the most important industries in the state.

French fur traders were the first to introduce chattel slavery to the region. They brought hundreds of enslaved African Americans and Kaskaskias, Meskwaki, Pawnee, and others into the region from the 1670s to 1763. When the British took control after the French and Indian War (1754-63), over 400 enslaved African Americans entered what would become the state of Wisconsin against their will. These men and women were brought to this region as laborers supporting the British fur trade. After the Revolutionary War, the newly formed United States drafted the Northwest Ordinance of 1787 to govern the territories on the frontier of the new country, including the lands that would become Wisconsin.

The Northwest Ordinance forbade the owning of slaves, but lax enforcement permitted slavery to continue in the region.

Chattel slavery increased during the Lead Rush in the Upper Mississippi River Valley, supporting an economic boom in southwest Wisconsin and neighboring parts of Iowa and Illinois.

Because the Northwest Ordinance stipulated that statehood was dependent on population,

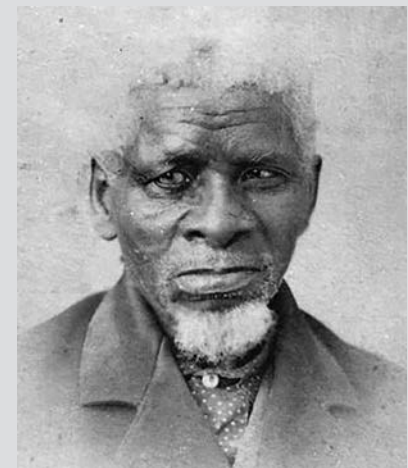
the population spike associated with the lead rush helped transform Wisconsin into a territory and then a state by 1848.

Prominent figures in Wisconsin history were connected to this history of slavery and lead mining. Henry Dodge (Dodgeville), John Rountree (Platteville) and George W. Jones (Sinsinawa) all came to the region in the 1820s to mine and process lead. Each brought enslaved individuals with them from Missouri or Kentucky.

Henry Dodge, for example, arrived in the Wisconsin Territory in 1827 from Missouri and brought five enslaved individuals with him. Toby, Tom, Lear, Jim, and Joe were held in bondage in the Wisconsin Territory, working as smelters at Dodge's furnace.

Dodge had promised to free the five men if they would work a short time at his smelting furnace. Instead, Dodge held them in captivity for twelve years despite the prohibition of slaveholding in the region. he five individuals were finally freed on April 11, 1838. The lead industry was already in decline when slavery was abolished in the United States in 1865.

Of the approximately 100 African Americans who worked with lead in nineteenth-century Wisconsin, most gained their freedom by 1842. Toby, Tom, Lear, Jim and Joe remained to work in the lead industry for years beyond 1838 as free Wisconsinites soon to be joined by freemen like James D. Williams. 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PERSPECTIVE: Calls for an Immediate Cease-Fire! Why Peace In The Middle East Could Avert a Regional Conflagration!

During the late 1970's, I went to work for the Carter Administration in the press office of Health and Human Services Secretary Joseph Califano. While our agency was focused primarily on domestic issues, one of President Carter's all-consuming objectives was a foreign policy issue: How to broker a peace between Israel and her Arab neighbors.

With Carter's tenacity and the willingness of Israel's Menachem Begin and Egypt's Anwar Sadat's to come to Camp David to hash out what would later be called the Camp David Peace Accords, the world was given an example of how seemingly unbridgeable national interests could be harmonized through skillful diplomacy.

Today, some 45 years later, the Middle East is once again mired in deadly conflict with casualties mounting for both Israelis and Palestinians. An attack by Hamas on innocent Israeli civilians has been countered by airstrikes on innocent Palestinians with a ground invasion resulting in the deaths of thousands, including more than 3,000 who are children!

As of this writing, over 1,500 Israelis and at least 8,000 Palestinians have lost their lives. The number of wounded on both sides is much larger. Over 200 hostages are being held in captivity.

The humanitarian crisis in Gaza has already reached nightmarish proportions with shortages of food, clean drinking water, medical supplies and fuel needed for hospitals to operate reaching dangerously low levels. Children are suffering and dying! Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu believes that this will be a protracted struggle; hopefully, he will be proven wrong. The sooner this war is ended, the better for all concerned. This includes Israelis.

The United States has leverage to discourage further carnage. We have not effectively used our resources as bargaining chips to secure a reliable two-state solution, with two sovereign powers, ruled by governmental authorities recognized by the United Nations and the world community.

To be an honest broker in this latest conflict, the U.S. must demonstrate to the people of the region that it wants a fair deal for both sides. If with our foreign aid, Israel has carte blanche ability to encroach and occupy without restraint, Arab resentment will proliferate; thereby giving justification to rogue states' desires to exploit local tensions.

My prayer is that the Holy Spirit will move the people of the world to insist on an immediate ceasefire between Israel and Hamas. Pictures of the human suffering broadcasted around the world should shock the conscience of all who say they believe in a just and compassionate God.

Nō Studios Attracts Artists and CenterStage Opportunities

working on Wall Street.

She is Chief Operating Officer of Nō Studios and while still based in New York, Caesar travels to Milwaukee every other week.

Ridley and Caesar worked closely with philanthropist Chris Abele, who supported the concept. In 2017, they bought the building that houses Nō Studios.

It is a collaborative workspace, hybrid experience platform, and social community for creatives and lovers of art. Memberships help sustain the facility.

They range from individual (\$25 a month) to organization memberships that cost \$2,500 annually. Space rental includes access to the Skyline Lounge that accommodates 150

people standing and 100 seated and includes an outdoor deck. The movie theater seats 47 people.

There is also a gallery with a screening room. Member benefits include a key fob to the building, discounted beverages and events, and access to the member directory. Every Friday Nō Studios has live entertainment from mostly local artists. Performers keep 80 percent of the ticket sales, with the rest going to Nō Studios.

Another unique opportunity within Nō Studios is that artists can apply to display their art in high traffic areas of the facility, at no cost. An application is used to vet artists, and artwork is available for sale, with artists keeping the proceeds.

“It’s a win-win. We don’t have to pay a curator to decorate and artists can display and sell their works. It is important to nurture community collaborations; that’s how we win. We must preserve the authentic narrative of people impacted by events so that it remains pure and undisturbed. It’s important to collectively amplify opportunities. I’m a believer in the power of community. We must encourage, empower and support communities. That’s what Nō Studios is about,” said Caesar.

Nō Studios is a vibrant, creative space offering hope and possibilities to our community. It may be a ‘family business,’ but it is also a ‘diamond’ and a community treasure.
