Alzheimer's Association event focuses on advancements for families impacted by Dementia



Over 100 people filled St. Mark AME Church recently for a Black History Month event presented by the Alzheimer's Association focusing on new advancements for families affected by Dementia.

According to the Alzheimer's Association, older Black adults are twice as likely as their White counterparts to have Alzheimer's or other forms of Dementia, yet there exists a big disparity between Black and white adults in access to care and support.

At the event called, "Creating Connections: New Advancements for Families Affected by Dementia," a new of guest speakers were on hand, along with resource booths, to address that disparity, and empower the Black community with the tools and knowledge to join the fight against the disease.

Attendees heard Malgorzata Franczak, MD, of the Medical College of Wisconsin, discuss new treatments for



Alzheimer's and Dementia, as well as the importance of early diagnosis.

The event's keynote speaker was Dr. Denita R. Ball, the first female African American sheriff in the state of Wisconsin. Her speech highlighted the impact of the disease and the need for greater awareness of both the signs and symptoms as well as specific actions folks can take to make a difference in the lives of their loved ones.

Dr. Ball also urged the attendees to become involved in Alzheimer's and dementia advocacy. Vanessa Dingman of the Wisconsin Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association provided more info about Wisconsin Advocacy Day on February 20 in Madison, and how sharing personal stories with legislators makes a material difference in better laws, funding and pro-



grams in the state regarding Alzheimer's.

The Alzheimer's Association will be providing transportation from St. Mark AME Church to Madison that day, for all those who pre-registered to attend Advocacy Day.

In addition to those speakers, many community organizations were present to share their resources. Particularly, AARP Wisconsin and Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services Aging & Disability Services sponsored this Black History Month event. The Respite Care Association of Wisconsin also provided on-site respite care to caregivers wanting to attend the event while ensuring a loved one's safety.

Through the partnership with St. Mark AME Church and its pastor, Rev. Joy Gallmon, a delicious soul food lunch was provided as well as the space to come together and imagine a future without Alzheimer's disease and other dementia. —Photos by Yvonne Kemp



Teaching Honest History: Kids Can Handle the Truth!

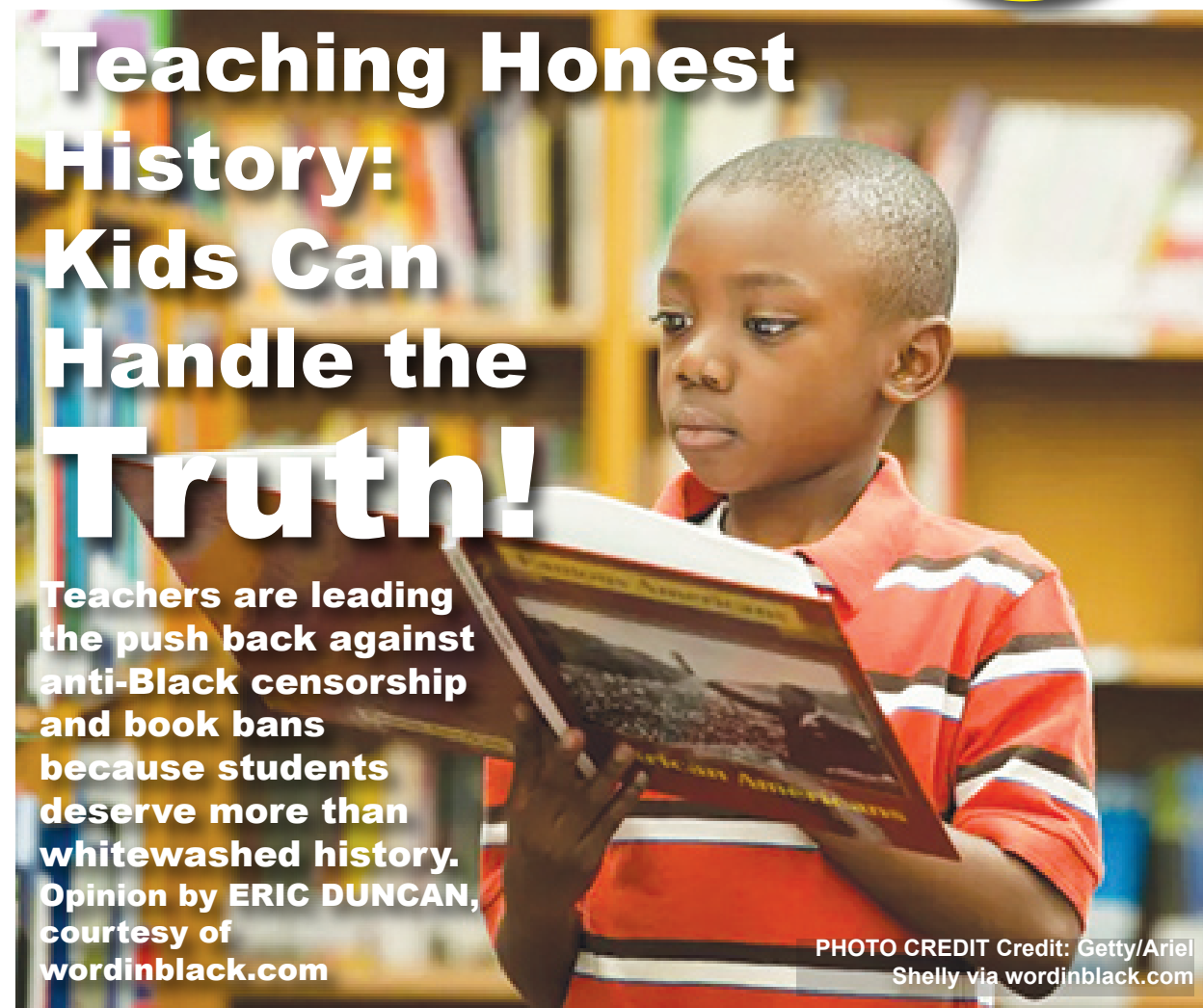

This year, we commemorate Black History Month under the shadow of continued efforts to whitewash or eliminate lessons about race and systemic racism in classrooms across the United States.

These efforts to spoon-feed children sugarcoated versions of our history leave them ill-equipped to be citizens weighing in on the choices they will be facing in the future. As I witness this extraordinary moment, I'm reminded of my own incomplete education of U.S. history.

In middle school, I was taught that Brown v. Board of Education was the result of a society coming together because everyone was finally ready to become more inclusive and just.

Rosy, right? I did not learn about the legal strategy to dismantle segregation in education, created at Howard University in the early 1900s, until my own sophomore year in college.

Ending segregation wasn't Black and White children holding hands while skipping down sidewalks, but rather, the law was upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court through the culmination of a legal strategy developed by Black lawyers to systematically end segregation in higher ed, K-12 schools, and society at large.

My professor at Emory University was an incredible Black woman who dismantled the misconceptions that our class had developed through years of learning sanitized, incomplete U.S. history in just one semester-long African American History course.

Those lessons I learned spurred my desire as a Black man to use law and policy to reform social systems—following in the footsteps of Thurgood Marshall and other Black lawyers and activists who shaped our society.

Children deserve to learn the complete and honest teaching of history, not only Black students like me who need strong examples of the success of proud, intelligent Black leaders of our past, but also non-Black students who benefit from seeing complex and diverse perspectives of different cultures.

To water down these lessons can lead to a lack of engagement and lower achievement for students of

color, and misplaced aggression that leads to violence and discrimination derived from the notions of White supremacy.

We're already seeing the impacts of harmful policies to limit curriculum and book options: across the country, less than 60% of challenged books by and about people of color were kept on shelves, according to a Washington Post review of book challenges. Books

with LGBTQ characters, authors, or themes were even more likely to be kept from children. In Florida, this has gone so far that districts have banned 1,600 books — including, in some districts, dictionaries.

Yet despite the clear negative impacts, state lawmakers continue efforts to limit curriculum and diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts.

A bill in Utah would allow elected officials to challenge school curriculum, while one in Kentucky would ban DEI efforts at colleges and end race-based scholarships.

And Florida policymakers have doubled down, banning public universities from using state or federal funds for DEI programs.

Teachers and education leaders have been filling in the gaps of sanitized curriculum and incomplete instructional materials for many years, which makes the “anti-woke” efforts in Florida and elsewhere frustrating yet predictable. As a result, teachers, particularly teachers of color, are having to grapple with the glaring omissions from U.S. history, while fighting censorship laws and book bans as they try to provide their students with a better foundation.

Take Brittney Mitchell, a middle school English teacher in Washington, D.C., who is struggling to ensure her students are taught a culturally rich and relevant curriculum.

It wasn’t until the start of her teaching career that

Brittney began learning about the history left out of her own education growing up in Florida, and how it touched people close to her.

She’ll never forget talking to her mother about the Ocoee Massacre — when a white mob attacked Black residents for attempting to vote on Election Day in 1920, leading to the deaths of several dozen Black residents — only to find out that their close neighbor had survived that dreadful night.

Yet Florida history standards go beyond merely erasing this atrocity from curriculum, instead requiring teaching about the violence “against and BY” Black residents — what scholars say is a total lie.

Learning the truth as an adult made Brittney feel lied to, like she was too fragile to handle the information as a student.

As an educator, she doesn’t want the next generation of students to rely on memories and personal anecdotes to learn important, nuanced, and sometimes painful history.

To paraphrase Tom Cruise, kids can handle the truth.

However, the burden of making sure students learn the full picture of our country’s complicated history shouldn’t fall on the shoulders of brave teachers like my professor or Brittney or the educators fighting in Florida and across the country.

Oftentimes, these teachers put their careers and livelihoods on the line to teach in a new classroom that has been whitewashed in the name of white people’s comfort.

Our schools must become safe havens for teachers to bring this level of instruction into their classrooms so that all, regardless of their identities, can become critical thinkers who constructively challenge societal norms. That is how a functional society works.

Black History/White Lies: The 10 biggest myths about slavery

OPINION: Part one of theGrio’s Black History Month series explores the myths, misunderstandings and mischaracterizations of America’s slave-holding past.

Editor’s Note:The following article is an op-ed, and the views expressed are the author’s own.

Because theGrio celebrates the legacy and the past of African America 364 days a year (to appease Ron DeSantis, we take a day off to celebrate white history), it’s always a difficult proposition to find new ways to celebrate Black History Month.

This year, instead of presenting interesting-but-meaningless nuggets of trivia like the first man to slit a piece of fried baloney (Levester Jermaine Robinson in 1823), we decided to explore some of the misconceptions, myths and misunderstandings that created some of the popular, almost true narratives that many people believe.

Here are the 10 biggest myths about slavery.

10. Slavery existed in every society.

I’m sure you’ve heard this one. It is one of the principles in Prager University’s ultra-conservative, pro-white version of American history. Depending on the time and geography, indentured servants, women in arranged marriages, child laborers and prisoners of war were described as “slaves.”

While it is true that varying forms of human subjugation, bondage and servitude have existed since time immemorial, there are distinct features unique to

America’s human trafficking enterprise:

It was race-based: This was not the case in ancient Europe, nor was it true in the Caribbean and Latin American New World colonies.

It was constitutionally protected: Slavery wasn’t just embedded into the foundational document of the nation, even states that rejected the institution were legally required to enforce precepts.

It reduced human beings to property: In Federalist Paper No. 54, one of the esteemed Founding Fathers notes that the Constitution views the enslaved “in the mixed character of persons and of property. This is in fact their true character.”

“The profits from human trafficking trickled down to every part of American society. Northerners could buy cheap clothing because of cheap cotton prices. Free labor increased earnings for farmers and manufacturers. Enslavers rented out their human chattel to merchants, builders and business owners. Insurance companies, banks and financial markets were backed by enslaved bodies. Churches and schools benefited from their involvement in the slave trade.”

9. Africans sold slaves.

Well ... kinda

The first African enslaved by Nuno Tristão and Antão Gonçalves — the Portuguese explorers credited with starting the African slave trade as we know it — was kidnapped by force. Most of the subsequent victims of the enterprise were already prisoners of war

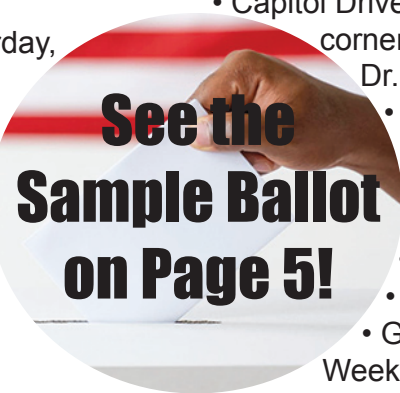

The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification*
- sign the poll book**

***If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.**

****If the voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word “exempt.”**

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device* (“ExpressVote”), the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Spoiling Ballots

If a voter spoils an **optical scan ballot**, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **optical scan ballot** is marked, it may be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

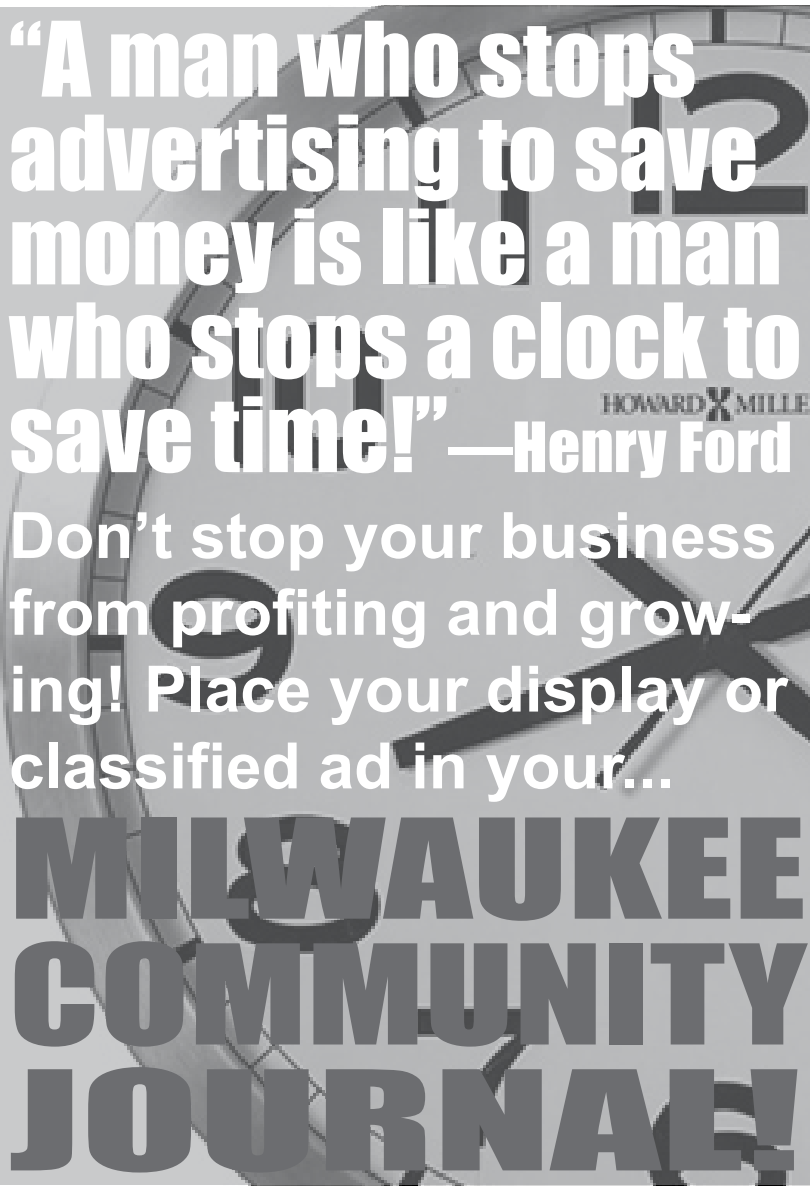

captured during intertribal conflicts. Portugal's Casa da Guiné and the East India Company were the first of many state-run European corporations formed to ensure West Africa's and Europe's economic dependence on the institution. And yes, as European corporations used coercion, duplicity and force by introducing capitalism and weapons into the fray, Africans willingly participated. Still, "sold" is an inadequate word to characterize African participation in the slave trade.

Africans could not have conceived of what awaited the victims of this brand-new enterprise. In Africa, POWs were not considered property, were not perpetually enslaved and could earn a path to freedom.

Still, nearly all of the slaves sold in Africa were resold by whites once they made it to the New World. Their children, grandchildren and subsequent progeny born in the Americas were sold by white Americans. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, more than 30% of human imports in colonial America were trafficked from the Caribbean, where generations of Africans had been enslaved for centuries.

So, yes, Africans sold slaves. However, African participation in the trans-Atlantic slave trade represents a tiny part of the human trafficking economy. Only 388,000 of the approximately 10 million human beings enslaved in North America were born in Africa.

Most importantly, none of that happened until white people showed up.

8. Black people owned slaves.

A Black American slaveowner was an extremely rare thing.

According to a study by Black historian Carter G. Woodson, 3,777 free Black people owned 12,907 slaves in 1830 — about one-half of 1% of the two million people enslaved in America. And because Black people had no legal rights in many states, many of those people were slaveowners in name only. Some of them had purchased their kin. Others technically owned themselves after buying their freedom. And, as Woodson notes:

"The census records show that the majority of the Negro owners of slaves were such from the point of view of philanthropy. In many instances, the husband purchased the wife, or vice versa ... Slaves of Negroes were in some cases, the children of a free father who had purchased his wife. If he did not thereafter emancipate the mother, as so many such husbands failed to do, his own children were born his slaves and were thus reported."

To be fair, white people weren't the only culprits. Native Americans enslaved African Americans at rates that often mirrored white Southerners. In fact, when the 13th Amendment abolished slavery, indigenous Americans in "Indian Territory" continued the practice until separate treaties were signed by what we call the "five civilized tribes."

7. Most white people weren't enslavers.

Again, this depends on how you look at it. While only 25% of white Southerners technically owned slaves, that number doesn't reflect the sons, daughters and families of slaveowners. It doesn't count the people who worked in the slave trade, the non-slaveowners who worked as overseers or the people who used slave labor. Are you a "car owner" if you drive your parent's old car every day? Should the wife or children of a slave owner be considered an "enslaver"? What if you inherit your parents' chattel?

The profits from human trafficking trickled down to every part of American society. Northerners could buy cheap clothing because of cheap cotton prices. Free labor increased earnings for farmers and manufacturers. Enslavers rented out their human chattel to merchants, builders and business owners. Insurance companies, banks and financial markets were backed by enslaved bodies. Churches and schools benefitted from their involvement in the slave trade.

Almost every free person in America benefitted from living in a slave economy. Historian David Blight notes that "by 1860, there were more millionaires (slaveholders all) living in the lower Mississippi Valley than anywhere else in the United States. In the same year, the nearly 4 million American slaves were worth some \$3.5 billion, making them the largest single financial asset in the entire U.S. economy, worth more than all manufacturing and railroads combined."

Slavery was the American economy.

6. The myth of "free states."

A Black person could not be free in a slaveholding society.

Even in non-slaveholding states, free Black people were often kidnapped, lured or forced into slavery. Some were wrongfully enslaved from birth like Jenny Slew, who won her freedom via lawsuits. But in states like Georgia, the burden of proof was on the enslaved person and, in others, Black people could not represent themselves in court — even before the Supreme Court ruled that Black people had "no rights which the white man was bound to respect."

In non-slaveholding states, Black Americans were still relegated to second-class citizenship. In the 1800s, Pennsylvania and New Jersey changed their constitutions to rescind voting rights for all Black citizens, free or enslaved. New York required Blacks — and only Blacks — to own property before they could vote. And, of course, every state was required to comply with fugitive slave laws.

As Fannie Lou Hamer said: "Nobody's free until everybody's free."

5. Slaves were forbidden to read.

While there were places where slaves were forbidden from reading and writing, South Carolina's Negro Act of 1740 — the law on which most slave codes were based — only forbade slaves from writing. Enslaved people were even given pro-white redacted versions of the Bible and even served as entrepreneurs and

bookkeepers. Yes, literate slaves were definitely considered a threat because all Black people were considered a threat.

And, because white people have the privilege of enforcing laws as they see fit, they rarely enforced the prohibition against reading until they needed to demonstrate their might.

4. There were "good" slavemasters and happy slaves.

Men like Thomas Jefferson may not have wielded the whip, but he employed proxies who used physical and psychological torture to uphold the institution. Ona Judge didn't run away from George Washington's Philadelphia home because he was a brutal master. Still, Washington's three-year quest to re-enslave her was an act of cruelty. Slavemasters may not have written the rules, but they dispatched slavecatchers and employed slave supervisors to enforce them.

Withholding someone's God-given right to freedom and liberty is evil. It is also important to distinguish between "happy slaves" and slaves who told white people they were happy. After escaping the plantation of the man who enslaved and impregnated her, Harriet Jacobs ran away. For years, she lived in a swamp by day and a tiny attic crawl space during the night. Even though a Kentucky history textbook teaches that "masters encouraged their chattels to engage in recreational activities, such as dancing and singing, that provided emotional release" because "happy slaves worked better than did discontented ones," Margaret Garner killed her child because she didn't want the child to grow up on a Kentucky plantation.

The institution of slavery is inherently violent.

3. White people fought to end slavery.

That never happened.

First of all, the Civil War wasn't fought to end slavery. The Civil War didn't even end slavery, the 13th Amendment did. Plus, it was passed by Congress before the end of the Civil War. Ending the institution wasn't the goal of Union Commander-in-Chief Abraham Lincoln, who said: "My paramount object in this struggle is to save the Union, and is not either to save or to destroy slavery." There isn't any evidence that a significant number of anti-slavery white men enlisted to fight in the war.

Ending slavery was a consequence of the Civil War. Saying white people gave their lives to end slavery is like saying slaves donated their labor to enrich white people.

2. Slaves labored on plantations.

The portrait of Black people toiling away on Southern plantations doesn't accurately portray the "peculiar institution" of race-based involuntary servitude.

Millions of enslaved Africans lived in urban areas like Charleston, Savannah and Richmond, where Black residents often outnumbered whites. Even the enslaved people in rural areas didn't often work on large plantations. In 1860, 54% of slaveowners owned less than six enslaved people, many of whom worked as domestic servants, trained artisans and industrial laborers.

More importantly, slaves were not just used for labor. The white aristocrats who initially invaded America didn't know about farming, hunting or building a new nation. Enslaved engineers and horticulturalists built the homes and engineered the aqueducts and dams that created the rice industry in South Carolina. African blacksmiths taught Americans how to forge iron and steel. They taught medicine and science, served as accountants and taught their sometimes incompetent owners how to do things.

What was stolen during slavery was much more than labor.

1. How slaves gained their freedom.

Most people assumed that there were three paths to freedom for enslaved people:

1. Manumission or the act of formally freeing a slave
2. The Underground Railroad
3. Slave revolts

First of all, white people almost never freed their slaves. In 1850, "less than one-twentieth of one percent" of America's entire slave population were manumitted — partly because freeing a slave was illegal in many states. Even the enslaved who were technically manumitted had actually emancipated themselves by purchasing their freedom.

Although hundreds of thousands of enslaved people successfully gained freedom by escaping the institution, most did not utilize the loose network as safehouses, routes and conductors known as the Underground Railroad. Many had no idea it even existed. Others didn't trust the whites who were involved. Many escapees didn't know the laws and geographic boundaries that separated free states from slave states. Instead of trying to reach Canada or a Northern state, many lived in maroon villages and Caucasian-free zones like North Carolina's Great Dismal Swamp, Louisiana's Bas de Fleuve or Hal's Kingdom in Alabama.

And, while the notion of slaves grabbing machetes is exciting, stories of revolts often went untold because whites feared that their human property could be inspired by successful uprisings. We'll never truly know how frequently rebellions took place. Plus, most rebellions took place before enslaved people reached America, including 485 documented insurrections aboard slave ships transporting Africans. Other acts of rebellion — like the frequently used tactic of setting everything on fire — were considered individual acts. Many were never documented because no one ever found out about them.

Residents, Common Ground demand HACM board fire Willie Hines

Seventy-six Common Ground (CG) leaders and Housing Authority of the City of Milwaukee (HACM) residents showed up at HACM's February commissioner's meeting at City Hall recently to demand the removal of HACM Executive Director Willie Hines.

The group presented a 12-point 'Performance Review' of Hines conducted over the past 12 months as evidence to justify his removal.

Earlier this month, CG reached out to HACM Board members—in particular, the Chair, Sherri Reed Daniels—to request 10-15 minutes at the beginning of the board meeting, but did not hear back.

Common Cause first requested meetings with Daniels and the other 3 Board members last July—none responded. Common Cause again requested a meeting with Daniels and the other 3 members on February 1. None responded. The organization reiterated its request on February 7. Once again, Daniels did not respond.

"We have subsequently confirmed that Daniels and the HACM Board have not conducted a Performance Review of Hine," read a statement by Common Cause.

Unfortunately, after knowing Common Cause was planning to attend, HACM instead scheduled the meeting to be a virtual phone-in, in which guests could not speak. So, Common Cause held a press conference downstairs, presenting its performance review, and calling on Daniels and the Board to fulfill their fiduciary responsibilities to HACM.

Jennifer O'Hear, lead organizer of Common Cause, said: "We came down here today to talk to the Board, to try to get them to do their job, and to evaluate Hines. Instead what we find is they are literally 'phoning it in.' We say to you, Ms. Sherri Reed Daniels—you're the chair of this Board—we've done your job for you. We've got a 12-point performance review."

Betty Newton, President of the Becher Court Resident Organization, added: "I looked forward to today—to

seeing this Board face to face. Yet they decided to do a Zoom so they cannot see the residents that are standing behind me."

Since March 2023, Common Ground has raised serious concerns about HACM's mismanagement regarding rent, maintenance, security, accessibility, Section 8, and more. Just last month, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) required that HACM outsource management of its Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher, serving 7,823 fam-

ilies—after more than a year of technical assistance from HUD, and millions of taxpayer dollars spent on consultants Nan McKay, CVR, and CliftonLarsonAllen.

Newton said specifically: "For the Board: you are responsible for holding Hines accountable to do his job. And if he is failing to do his job, so are you."

Pastor Will Davis of Invisible Reality Ministries spoke directly to the Board Chair: "Chairwoman Daniels: Do what needs to be done. Remove Willie Hines."



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
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
