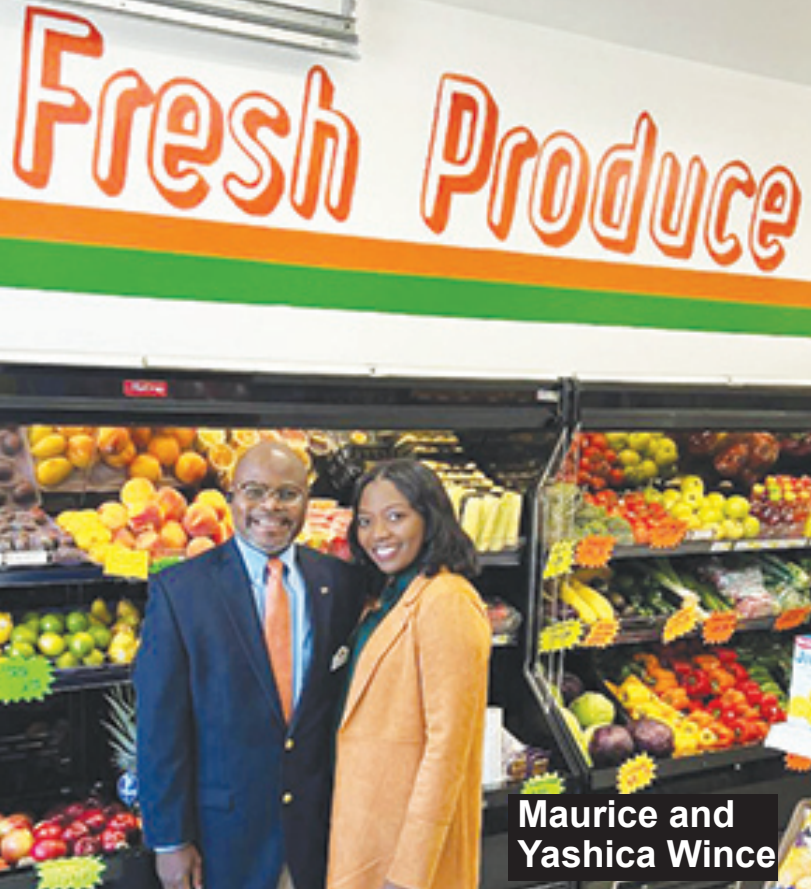

## Sherman Park Grocery Store: Neighborhood Grocery Store Serves Up More Than Food!

Maurice ("Moe") and Yashica Spears Wince, co-owners of Sherman Park Grocery, are bringing back the nostalgia of a corner grocery store to the Sherman Park neighborhood. They are not only meeting the needs of this community by provid-

ing fresh produce, but they are also building relationships, providing good customer service and building trust among neighbors. Currently Sherman Park Grocery has the distinction of being the only Black-owned, full scale grocery store in the state of Wisconsin. "Sherman Park Grocery grew out of resident listening sessions led by Bishop Walter Harvey, on the heels of civil unrest six or seven years go. We listened and responded to their concerns." The neighbors have embraced us and the kids call me 'Uncle Moe,' It's been great. Last July 29 we celebrated one year in this location," said Maurice. According to Maurice, the Sherman Park neighborhood has more than 40,000 residents. The first week that the Sherman Park Grocery opened, even before the store was Quest-card certified, ten percent of residents came through its doors. Understanding the challenges of

Sherman Park residents is not new to the Winces. Both Yashica and Maurice came from large families. They are both products of Milwaukee Public Schools and both grew up with food and home insecurities. In spite of these challenges, they both attended college and are successful entrepreneurs. In fact, Yashica has a Master's of Science in Management from Cardinal Stritch and a certificate in Human Resources. She works full-time with Milwau-

kee Public Schools in the Human Relations department. On most days, she joins Maurice at the grocery store after work. Both Maurice and Yashica also have years of experience in the retail spaces. "No matter your upbringing, you can overcome any obstacle if you put in the work to be where you want to be in life. Remember, nothing comes easy. Although it is challenging sometimes for us as grocery store owners, it is also rewarding to be in a position

to help others while helping to build a strong community," said Yashica.

"Yashica worked in management at Walgreen's and I managed pizza franchises in Menomonee Falls. Our business acumen comes from those experiences. In addition, we have other real estate holdings, including a laundromat on the same block as the grocery store," Maurice said.

The Wince's credit the spiritual guidance of Dr. Marcus L. Arrington, Senior Pastor of Embassy Center MKE (formerly Parklawn Assembly of God Church) and Bishop Walter Harvey with their community-minded focus.

"Bishop Harvey and Dr. Arrington have taught me that our business is rooted spiritual principles. The advancement and transformation of God's kingdom is directly connected to the transformation of residents.

"I see and experience the attitude change among residents. For example, one resident who frequents the store called me and she was livid.

"I was ready to resolve any customer complaint she had; instead, she asked me if her 'babies' could come stay at the store until she got off work. She drives a school bus and had to work late.

"Her kids were sitting on the porch and she trusted me enough to care for her most precious valuables. And, of

course, I agreed. Her request let me know that I'm regarded as part of the community. I was humbled that she knew she could call on me and I was there to help," said Maurice.

The Wince's are also elated that they are addressing some of the health disparities prevalent in the community they serve.

"Diabetes and hypertension are just some of the health concerns in our community.

"Providing fresh vegetables and fruits helps address those issues. We were taught that you only have one temple and you have to take care of it. Eating healthy and exercising helps you to that," Yashica said.

The Winces also are staunch believers that dollars should be recycled within the community and that building generational wealth should include multiple income streams. And they practice what they preach.

For example, Upstart Kitchen, a product of Sherman Park's Prism Economic Development Corporation, has nine businesses which sell their products in Sherman Park Grocery.

In turn, those businesses buy their eggs, flour, sugar and other necessities from the grocery store and they wash their uniforms at the laundromat owned by the Winces, which is next door to the grocery store.

"We must grow and grow together. This does not work unless we grow together," Maurice said.

## 'I'm scared as \$&!%': Justice Jackson, Black leaders explain why Supreme Court granting Trump immunity is dangerous!

Elected officials and advocates are decrying the Supreme Court's Monday ruling granting former President Donald Trump some level of immunity for undetermined "official acts" in his federal criminal case for his role in trying to overturn the 2020 election and the subsequent Jan. 6, 2021, insurrection executed by a mob of his supporters at the U.S. Capitol.

Hours after the conservative majority ruled that, as president, Trump could be subject to certain immunity privileges in a case where he faces four criminal indictments, NAACP President Derrick Johnson told theGrio that America is in a "crisis." The civil rights leader argued that the ruling

has made America "something less than a democracy," or at worst, a "dictatorship."

"That is a danger, not only to the African-American community – it is a danger to this society as a whole," said Johnson.

# Better Ways To Cope

## Milwaukee County Executive David Crowley Announces 15 Grant Recipients for 'Better Ways to Cope' Projects

County Executive David Crowley is announcing that 15 organizations have been selected to receive grants as part of the "Better Ways To Cope" initiative that is administered by Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Behavioral Health Services (BHS).

Better Ways To Cope is re-granting Opioid Settlement Fund dollars to nonprofit and for-profit organizations to develop prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery initiatives that focus on increasing access to information and resources to reduce opioid-related overdose deaths, preventing substance misuse disorder, and increasing healthy coping choices.

The newly funded projects will kick-off July 11, 2024. "Milwaukee County is committed to ensuring opioid settlement funds are being used in the most effective way possible to foster collaboration and innovation in addressing the overdose crisis and substance use disorder facing our community.

By funding transformative substance use prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery projects, we are working to change the lives of individuals affected by opioid addiction," said Milwaukee

County Executive David Crowley.

"Our goal is to increase access to life-saving resources and programs to reduce the likelihood of overdose-related fatalities in our community."

mative initiatives aimed at tackling challenges related to the opioid epidemic.

"We are very excited for this next cohort of Better Ways To Cope projects, said Jennifer Wittwer, Director, BHS Community Access to Recovery Services.

"The organizations selected submitted exceptional projects that leverage existing partnerships as well as new approaches to reach people in our community from a prevention standpoint, for those who are currently struggling with addiction, and individuals on the road to recovery."

## City launches new campaign, "Speeding - We Can Live Without It!"



Earlier this week, the City of Milwaukee launched its anti-speeding campaign, "Speeding - We Can Live Without It!"

Throughout the one hundred most dangerous days of driving this summer, the campaign aims to reduce the speeds of people driving by sharing stories of residents who have suffered the consequences of speeding.

During a news conference at Atkinson Library, 1960 W. Atkinson Ave., several city officials spoke on the importance of the community-focused campaign. Residents who spoke shared how speeding has impacted their lives.

"With summer upon us, the City of Milwaukee, Department of Public Works, community partners, and those who have been impacted by speed-related crashes are all committed to addressing this problem to improve the quality of life for our residents and save lives," said Milwaukee Mayor Cavalier Johnson during the news conference.

Milwaukee is facing a crisis of speeding and reckless driving in recent years, and fatalities caused by car crashes have skyrocketed, from a low of 32 in 2013 to 80 in 2023. The campaign will focus on the High Injury Network, the 10 percent of streets that have 58 percent of the crashes that kill or severely injure people (Source: MKECrashAnalysisReport2022.pdf (milwaukee.gov)).

Reducing death and injury by slowing speeds on these streets is critical to making progress towards Vision Zero. In collaboration with the campaign, MPD Traffic Safety Unit is conducting speed enforcement operations on the High Injury Network and throughout the city.

"Saving lives is as easy as driving the speed limit, not being distracted, and yielding to pedestrians, said Jessica Wineberg, Milwaukee's Vision Zero Policy Director.

"Each of us can drive slower and help ensure that our friends, our parents, and our kids, are able to travel without fear or injury throughout Milwaukee. We deserve streets with zero traffic deaths."

The 'Speeding- We Can Live Without It' campaign encourages the people of Milwaukee to:

this message. Speeding has real human costs and has hurt too many people in Milwaukee, but it's consequences can be prevented by slowing down.

The campaign amplifies the voices of two residents that have been directly impacted by speeding: Mariah Johnson and Alecia Alstaetter. Mariah's brother Jerrold Wellinger was killed by someone speeding in 2021. Alecia was hit and injured by a speeding driver in 2023. Neither want to see anyone else go through the loss and pain they have experienced.

"My brother was in the median when two cars were racing. His car just shattered into pieces. He was only 22. He had so much to live for," said Johnson.

"Every day, every time you're on the road, your speed matters. You have the power to make the streets safer for all of us."

The City is partnering with community organizations like Friends of Lincoln Park, Martin Drive Neighborhood Association, Rooted & Rising, Villard Avenue BID and Westown Association, along with Milwaukee County to decrease speeding this summer and beyond.

"The City and MPD have been focused on engineering and enforcement to address speeding and this campaign is adding education to the mix," said DPW Commissioner Jerrel Kruschke.

"In the ongoing effort for Vision Zero, we need to continue to layer strategies, so that they reinforce each other and maximize impact."

Dozens of billboards and building posters, along with bus ads, social media, and news stories, will raise awareness of the issue of speeding and educate the community on their ability to make change. In alignment with the High Injury Network, the campaign will focus on areas that have the most serious and deadly crashes.

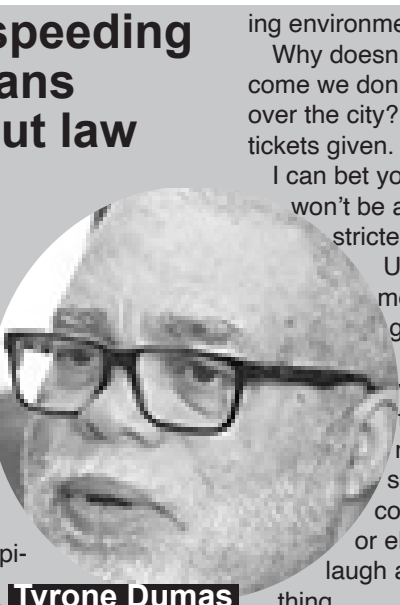
### Reader says speeding campaign means nothing without law enforcements involvement

# In First Debate, Trump Overwhelms Biden With Bluster and Lies

*"Black Vote, Black Power," a collaboration between Keith Boykin and Word In Black, examines the issues, the candidates, and what's at stake for Black America in the 2024 presidential election.*

Well, that was awkward.

The first presidential debate of the 2024 campaign has just

ended in Atlanta, and it felt like a disservice to the public. Donald Trump lied and rambled nonstop without correction. And President Joe Biden was simply not able to keep up with Trump's tor-

rent of falsehoods.

It was the first time in history a convicted criminal took part in a presidential debate, but it was 40 minutes into the discussion before the subject came up.

It was as if it were completely normal for a twice-impeached, quadruple-indicted, convicted felon awaiting sentencing, who also incited a deadly insurrection, to be considered a serious candidate for the most powerful job in the world.

But the spectacle likely did nothing to move the needle: Biden's shaky performance did not allay concerns about his age, and Trump's nonsensical tirades did not allay concerns about his mental or moral fitness to hold office.

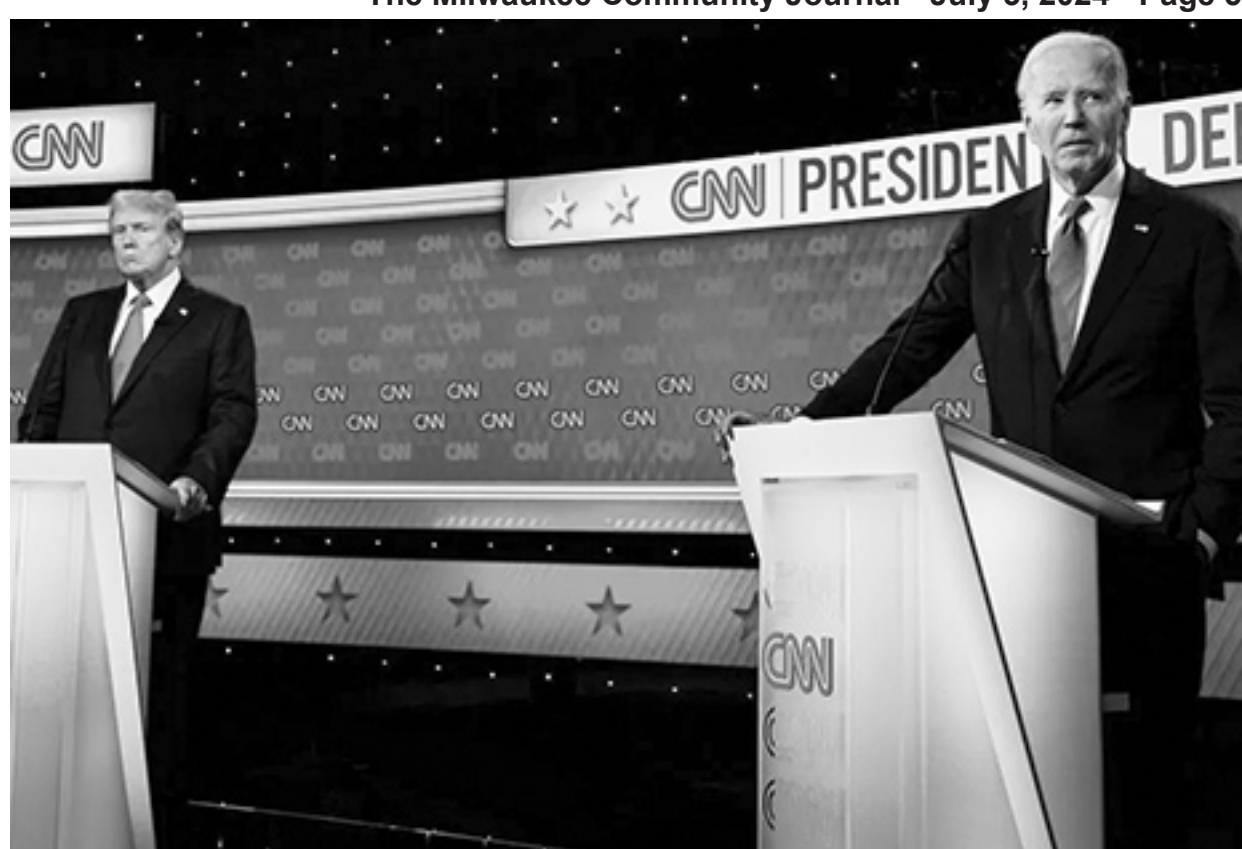
After the first half hour, Biden finally had a few good moments, attacking Trump as a criminal, condemning him for "having sex with a porn star while your wife was pregnant," and accusing him of having "the morals of an alley cat."

But Trump is a master at denying the truth, dodging questions, inflating his own record, and lying about other people as he pivoted to his favorite talking points.

Asked about Black voters, Trump blamed immigrants for taking what he called "Black jobs." First of all, that's not true, but second: what, exactly, are Black jobs?

In the same round, Biden missed a golden opportunity to sell his own record on Black issues: lower Black unemployment, lower Black poverty, more Black businesses, more HBCU funding, more Black judges, less student loan debt, and historic appointments to his cabinet.

Trump blithely walked past his own history of housing discrimination in the 1970s, the lynch mob he led against the now-exonerated "Central Park Five" in the 1980s, and the birtherism lie

he peddled about President Barack Obama for nearly six years.

Biden did cite a few examples of what he's done for Black voters, but he let Trump put him on the defensive on an issue where Trump's own record is abysmal.

This is especially true in Atlanta, the predominantly-Black city that Donald Trump attacked

Asked about childcare, Trump avoided the question, rambled off into immigration lies, and spoke about how he fires people. Not one word about child care. And no one held him accountable.

Asked about the opioid crisis, Trump went on and on about irrelevant issues and again failed to provide a single substantive idea, much less give a coherent

the debate, Biden showed up at a rally and looked like a different person — refreshed and energized in a way that he was not during the debate.

I don't know what just happened, but it's going to be a long four months, and an even longer four years if things keep going in this direction.

# The Tragedy of Mainstream Media Coverage of The Presidential Debate

# Black leaders explain why Supreme Court granting Trump immunity is dangerous!

quickly reacted to the ruling, including holding a press call with one of the campaign's top Black senior officials, Principal Deputy Campaign Manager Quentin Fulks. He was joined by U.S. Rep. Jasmine Crockett, D-Texas, U.S. Rep. Dan Goldman, D-N.Y., and former U.S. Capitol Police Officer Harry Dunn.

"I'm scared as s—," Fulks told reporters on Monday. "I think Americans are scared and should be scared of what Donald Trump will do."

As liberal Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson noted in her dissent to Monday's ruling: "...a hypothetical President who admits to having ordered the assassinations of his political rivals or critics ... or one who indisputably instigates an unsuccessful coup ... has a fair shot at getting immunity under the majority's [ruling]..."

Fellow liberal Justice Sonia Sotomayor, in her own dissent, said the conservative majority's ruling now ensures that "in every use of official power, the President is now a king above the law."

She, too, warned that under the premise of the court's ruling, a president would be hypothetically immune from ordering the assassination of a political rival — more specifically, ordering the "Navy's Seal Team 6" to do so.

"When Sotomayor put that into her decision, she wasn't just saying this. This was argued by [Trump's] attorneys. So this is not hypothetical for me," Congresswoman Crockett told reporters of Sotomayor's dissent during the Biden-Harris campaign call.

The Texas lawmaker said she feels the ruling from the Supreme Court, as well as others from U.S. District Court Judge Aileen Cannon, who is presiding over Trump's criminal documents case and accused of showing partisan favor to Trump, reflect a departure of the federal government's "checks and balances."

"They seemingly are operating just in service to him, which is what Project 2025 talks about," said Crockett. Project 2025 is a conservative playbook that outlines policy actions in a potential

second Trump administration, including politicizing the Department of Justice.

Similarly, on the campaign trail, Trump vowed to use the agency to send federal agents or troops to cities to clamp down on crime, including cities with large Black populations like Chicago and New York City.

NAACP President Johnson said the combination of the high court's actions and Trump's statements presents an "existential crisis" for the country.

"He's already proposing Project 2025, which will undermine the rule of law as we know it, and now has been backed up by a Supreme Court who are making political decisions that's not wholly based on the Constitution," he told theGrio.

Johnson said the role of Black voters and all voters will be critical in November's election to ensure Trump does not retain power at risk of what he sees as the partisanship of the court's conservative majority being "cemented" in the next presidential term. He also pointed

out that three new appointments to the high court could "potentially" be named in the event the older justices decide to retire or are unable to carry out their lifetime appointments.

The court has already made controversial rulings this session that stand to have implications for Black and brown communities, including allowing the criminalization of homelessness and stripping away the executive branch's ability to enforce regulations that could impact areas like civil rights, the economy, and environmental justice.

"This election is whether or not we have a functioning democracy or something less. And if it's something less, the African-American community will be under threat," he argued.

Fulks, of the Biden-Harris campaign, said that President Joe Biden will be on the campaign trail "talking about the reasons why Americans should be scared of Donald Trump, as he has been for months." He added, "This Supreme Court opinion today just amplified that."

## SCREEN SAFETY: Wisconsin Parents Are More Lenient on Kids' Social Media Use Than National Average, Finds Study!

Thirty-six percent said they monitor their children's online habits daily. Most parents surveyed believe it is acceptable for children to start using social media at age 13 or older. In an era when digital connectivity has become a staple of everyday life, social media's increasing threat to children has prompted urgent action. The Surgeon General recently called on Congress to mandate labeling on social media apps, akin to the warnings on cigarettes and alcohol, to address these concerns. This heightened awareness has spurred parents to take

more active roles in monitoring their children's online activities. A recent survey conducted by HostingAdvice involving 3,000 parents sheds light on the extent of parental controls on the websites and apps their children access. The findings reveal a spectrum of practices and concerns, reflecting the diverse approaches parents take to safeguard their children's online experiences. **Parental Monitoring Practices** According to the survey, half of Wisconsin parents (50%) actively control the websites and social media

sites their children visit (however, this is lower when compared to the national average of 52%). Among these, 36% said they monitor their children's online habits daily, showcasing a high level of vigilance. The methods parents use to monitor or control their children's internet usage vary, with some parents employing multiple methods: **Regularly checking browser history:** Thirty-three percent of parents surveyed said they routinely check their children's browser history to stay informed about their online activities. **Parental control software:**

Twenty-five percent said they use parental control software to restrict access to inappropriate content and monitor usage. Discussions on online behavior: Twenty-two percent of parents said they sit down with their children to discuss online behavior and instill safe internet practices. Occasional restrictions: 18% said they occasionally restrict online access to ensure their children stay within safe digital boundaries. Interestingly, the survey highlights significant geographic disparities in parental control practices. For instance, 80% of parents in South Dakota surveyed said they actively control what their children access online. In contrast, only 30% of parents in Nebraska said they exercise similar levels of control. **Primary Concerns About Social Media Use:** HostingAdvice also surveyed Wisconsin parents about their primary concerns regarding their children's social media use: Exposure to inappropriate content: 44% of parents surveyed said they are most concerned about their children being exposed to inappropriate content online. **Potential for cyberbullying:** 27% cited cyberbullying as their primary concern, highlighting the pervasive nature of this issue when it comes to online interactions. Health implications of screentime: 17% of parents

said they worry about the health implications of significant screentime, including its impact on physical and mental well-being. **Data security:** Eleven percent said they have concerns about the sharing of their children's data, underscoring the importance of privacy in the digital age. **Age Appropriateness for Social Media Use** The survey also explored parents' views on the appropriate age for children to have their own social media accounts. The responses reflect a spectrum of opinions on this matter: Forty-five percent of parents surveyed believe it is acceptable for children to start using social media at age 13 or older. A more conservative 37% of parents said 16 or older is a more sensible age for children to engage with social media. Thirteen percent of parents surveyed think it is okay for children to start using social media from age 10. "As more information has come out about social media and how it impacts the emotional and mental well-being of our youth, I think it has become clear that more needs to be done. However, it can be tricky to determine exactly what should be done, especially given the fact that each child is likely to interact with social media differently," said HostingAdvice consumer technology expert Christian de Loper.

Parents are increasingly aware of the potential dangers posed by social media, but awareness alone isn't enough. The survey highlights the need for comprehensive strategies involving parents, educators, and policymakers to create a safe online environment for children. "I think it's completely reasonable to raise age limits on social media and for there to be some kind of warning label. Additionally, it's important parents ensure that their children, especially young teens, are interacting with social media in a healthy way, and for limited periods of time," said Christian. **Methodology** We selected 3,000 respondents from a geographically representative online panel of double opt-in members. This selection was further tailored to meet the precise criteria required for each unique survey. Throughout the survey, we designed questions to carefully screen and authenticate respondents, guaranteeing the survey's alignment with the ideal participants. To ensure the integrity of our data collection, we employed an array of data quality methods. Alongside conventional measures such as digital fingerprinting, bot checks, geolocation, and speeding detection, each response underwent a thorough manual review to ensure quality and contextual accuracy.

U.S. Representative Jim Clyburn recently held a roundtable with state and local leaders to condemn Donald Trump's assault on American democracy. Rep. Clyburn was joined by County Executive David Crowley, State Senator LaTonya Johnson, State Representative Kalan Haywood, Former Lt. Gov. Mandela Barnes, Patricia Ruiz-Cantu, and

Tammie Xiong to emphasize the stakes of the election for American democracy and discuss how the Biden-Harris administration and Democrats have delivered for Wisconsinites. The roundtable was held at 'Coffee Makes You Black,' a popular Black-owned and operated coffee house and cafe. "We've got a candidate for president who is spreading nothing but hate and division, creating chaos, putting the worst of the American people on display.

"That's the big threat to this country," said Representative Clyburn. "We must not allow the goodness, the basic goodnesses of the American people to get annihilated or eliminated. Because if we do, this country will lose its greatness. That's what this campaign is all about to me." The event capped off Rep. Clyburn's two-day tour of Wisconsin, where he also met with community members and civic leaders in Beloit and Madison to underscore the stark contrast facing Wisconsinites this November: between Joe Biden, who has made protecting American democracy a central cause of his presidency, and Trump, who snapped after losing the 2020 election and has grown increasingly unhinged in his pursuit of power. Trump has made the violent January 6 attack on the U.S. Capitol a "cornerstone" of his campaign of revenge and retribution for himself, saying he'd be a dictator on "day one" if he is elected, warning of a "bloodbath" if he loses, and promising to pardon and "free" January 6 rioters.

# Why Do Black People Continue Supporting Brands That Hate Them?

*Problematic brands still have a grip on Black consumers*

Upon entering “Lululemon” and “Black girls” in TikTok’s search bar, scores of videos come up featuring enthusiastic try-on hauls and positive reviews of items from the athleisure company. The posts range from June of this year to late 2023.

What’s ironic is that in November 2023, a bombshell report from the Business Of Fashion revealed that the company was complicit in creating a racist culture for

employees, per their own admission, and ultimately wanted no parts of Black consumership.

“They said that Blackness was off-brand for the company,” Konesha Armstrong tells ESSENCE.

She was a sales lead for a Chicago-based Lululemon location in Hyde Park, a neighborhood that boasts a large Black population.

The store was closed in 2023 after being open for less than two years despite consistent sales, she says.

Armstrong was one of the

14 employees that spoke out about the company’s troubling actions toward its workers of color.

The deep dive report was boosted by celebrities, picked up other by outlets and widely shared on social media.

Yet and still, some Black women still unashamedly patronize and promote the brand.

“We’re our own worst enemy,” Armstrong tells ESSENCE.

“The Black community will see blatant disrespect from brands but will continue to put

money in the pockets of companies who don’t want anything to do with them. As long as we continue to support them, it’s never going to change. Balenciaga is going to continue to reign.

As long as Lil Wayne wears it, as long as Kim Kardashian wears it, as long as Kanye keeps wearing it, the community is going to think it’s okay to wear it.”

Brand specialist Rhea Skinner agrees.

“It’s so layered from a psychological standpoint,” she tells ESSENCE.

“You have your consumers that buy into the pretentiousness of a luxury brand and want to be able to have a status symbol on their back regardless of what that really means. It’s a tale as old as time.”

As previously reported by ESSENCE, in October 2022 LVMH Moët Hennessy Louis Vuitton SE raked in one of its highest sales months despite the International Monetary Fund’s warning of a worsening outlook for the global economy.

Their report highlighted a continual rising in inflation rates and likely hiring freezes on the horizon.

As an assertion can be made that this consistent growth in the sector can be linked to Black consumers specifically.

Black shoppers accounted for 20 percent of luxury spend in the US market in 2019 — a number that’s forecasted to increase by 25 to 30 percent by 2025, according to a Bain report.

Skinner, who is a publicist that has worked with various fashion brands including Mercedes Benz Fashion Week, says this loyalty is unsurprising.

“Collectively, we are the only people, and I hate to say it this way, that don’t stand in our true power,” she tells ESSENCE.

“We can roll our eyes at other racial groups all day long, but right, wrong, or indifferent, they are standing 10 toes down on what they believe in. If a company doesn’t

treat them right, they ice them out.”

Armstrong traces the Black shopping loyalty back to systemic racism and how the community was often barred from being able to purchase fine goods in department stores.

“It runs deep, and I think we still think we have something to prove when buying supporting these ‘quiet luxury’ brands despite them showing us their true colors,” she tells ESSENCE.

“But we have to really stand on business when we see some stuff isn’t right. And we have to really take our buying power back because they don’t make these clothes for us.”

To her point, a 2024 McKinsey report stated that Black consumers’ collective economic power is set to expand dramatically, from about \$910 billion in consumption in 2019 to \$1.7 trillion (in nominal dollars) in 2030.

Despite this, Armstrong says companies still have a very long way to go when serving the Black consumer.

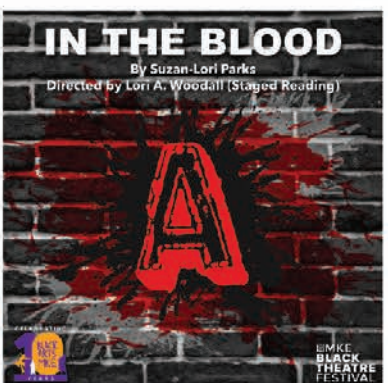
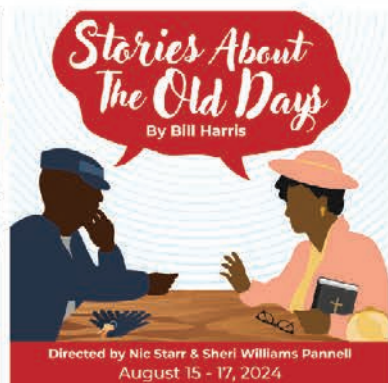
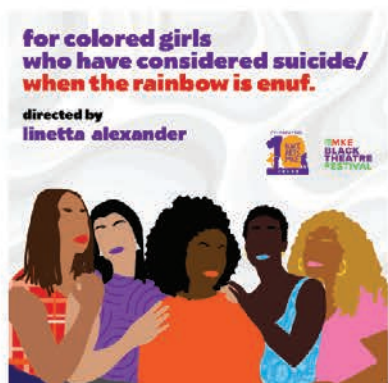
“Every store that I’ve ever worked at, Topshop, Topman, Bloomingdale’s—they strictly make clothes for the European stature, they’re not for us.

“And we spend so much money forcing ourselves into these brands or into these spaces when it’s obvious they don’t want us there. It’s time that we realize how powerful we are.”
