Vice President Harris praised after calling out Trump's racism, embrace of hate and white violence at debate

Gleeful Democrats are praising Vice President Kamala Harris after Tuesday's presidential debate as they and voters polled shortly afterward overwhelmingly said she bested former President Donald Trump.

The Democratic presidential nominee took Trump to task on his racist history, embrace of white violence and hate, and "weak" record as president.

"Donald Trump was being embarrassed in ways that nobody has ever embarrassed him before," said Mandela Barnes, senior fellow at People For the American Way.

Harris, who often looked directly at Trump and seemingly smiled in pity, clearly got under the Republican presidential nominee's skin.

"Part of it was him just tripping over his own shoelaces and her just watching it happen, I think, had an even greater impact than ridiculing and mocking him for it," said Barnes, a former Democratic nominee for U.S. Senate in Wisconsin.

During the 90-minute debate, Trump was asked by ABC moderator David Muir about his remarks at NABJ in July that Vice President Harris happened to "turn Black."

Trump stumbled throughout his response, initially saying, "I don't care what she is ... I couldn't care less. Whatever she wants to be is OK with me, but those were your words." But then he added, "I mean, all I can say is, I read where she was not Black, that she put out, and I'll say that. And then I read that she was Black."

In response, Harris chastised Trump as a "tragedy" and someone who has "consistently over the course of his career, attempted to use race to divide the American people."

The vice president then went through a

Dialysis patients need congressional action now!

It is no secret that health inequities and barriers to quality care contribute to adverse outcomes within America's Black community.

I am the Senior Pastor of St. Paul Church of God in Christ MKE and the Superintendent of the Calvary District. I have seen the inequity first-hand amongst my parishioners.

I take very seriously my role of caring for both the spiritual and physical health of my predominantly Black congregation, and my parishioners experience disparities in both health care and health outcomes.

As a result, my mission includes fighting policies that threaten to worsen outcomes.

One of the most devastating diseases to the Black community is chronic kidney disease (CKD), and there is a federal policy on the horizon that would absolutely devastate these patients.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 20% of the non-Hispanic Black population has CKD versus only 14% of non-Hispanic white adults.[1]

Poorly managed CKD often progresses to kidney failure, requiring individuals to undergo dialysis a few times weekly to stay alive.

While Blacks make up about 13% of the population, they ac-

count for 35% of the people with kidney failure, or end stage renal disease (ESRD) and 33% of those on dialysis in the United States.[2]

Here is where the trouble begins. Most individuals with CKD who are on dialysis receive dialysis and needed medication through the federal Medicare program.

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) is now finalizing a policy change to be implemented in January 2025 that would severely limit dialysis patient access to certain medications, known as orally administered phosphate lowering therapies (PLTs).

Dialysis patients take orally administered PLTs to prevent hyperphosphatemia and receive

those essential medications at their community pharmacy through Medicare Part D. Patients often need a combination of different medications to control their phosphorus level adequately, and there is no one-size-fits-all solution; the combination varies from patient to patient.

The new CMS policy would prohibit PLTs from being paid for and provided under Medicare Part D. The result: access to these essential medications at community pharmacies will be denied.

Instead, CMS plans to move PLTs into the "ESRD bundle." This is a pre-set and often inad-

quate amount paid to the dialysis center to cover the cost of all services and therapies administered during dialysis.

There is no question that this action by CMS would further worsen health inequities experienced by Black dialysis patients. It is well-known that dialysis centers are already underfunded and typically operate using one-size-fits-all protocols.

This runs counter to the needs of dialysis patients, who must

have access to a wide range of PLTs, along with frequent monitoring of their phosphorus levels.

These two critical components of hyperphosphatemia management will not exist for dialysis patients if CMS moves orally administered PLTs into the ESRD bundle.

As a result, CKD patients may experience treatment complications, worse health outcomes, and reduced quality of life.

Consider for a moment: approximately 4 out of 5 dialysis patients depend on PLTs. It is vital to their health and well-being. This CMS policy will significantly harm the ESRD community.

All this will come to pass unless Congress acts! There is a bill

proposed in Washington that would protect dialysis patients from this harmful, wrong-headed policy.

The Kidney PATIENT Act of 2023 would ensure that dialysis patients who need these essential medications will be able to continue accessing PLTs through Medicare Part D at their community pharmacy.

Shifting orally administered phosphorus-lowering therapies into the ESRD bundle would reduce access and jeopardize the

health and lives of dialysis patients.

I urge the members of Wisconsin's Congressional delegation to lead on this issue. Co-sponsor the Kidney PATIENT Act of 2023 and get the bill passed this year.

It's not too late. Black dialysis patients in Milwaukee and throughout the nation desperately need your support.

Together we can take a step forward that protects all, rather than harming those among us who are already vulnerable and need our help.

them Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Wisconsin," said Tanisha.

The C. H. Mason Clinic is free to the community. It is open Monday through Friday and is staffed by a nurse practitioner, nurses and clinical support staff. Doctors are on staff Tuesday through Thursday, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Fridays, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. On average, about 40 people a week access services at the clinic.

Dr. Kemba Banyard, a Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner and Family Practice Nurse Practitioner, also runs a weight loss management program at the clinic.

"The program focuses on healthy lifestyle, and even serves a healthy lunch, through one of their more popular initiatives called "Healthy Lifestyles Lunch and Learn."

"During 'Lunch and Learn,' which meets every fourth Tuesday, from 12 noon to 2 p.m., some 50 to 60 people attend. We address important health topics such as diabetes, obesity, and depression. We also offer blood pressure screenings, annual checkups, glucose screenings, and provide a number of other

screenings, vaccinations, and services.

"Health is the key to success. If we have a healthier community, we will have healthier families. Providing access to health care goes a long way in helping individuals value healthier lifestyles and enables them to be successful in whatever they pursue," she said.

Tanisha is grateful for the encouragement she received from her mother, Joanne Collins, and her 'number one' encourager and husband, Christopher Johnson.

"My mother always told me to go after my dreams, believe in myself and always trust God and trust the process. At the end of the day, it's not about me; it's about others. If I can help someone along the way, I've done my job," said Tanisha.

As Bishop Daniels always said, "If God can do anything, God can do everything. There is nothing too hard for God," said Tanisha.

MCDOT aims to have the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan completed by February 2025. At that time, Milwaukee County will be eligible to apply for federal funding from the United States Department of Transportation's Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Grant Program to support design and construction of a select list of high-priority safe street redesigns and infrastructure solutions.

You can't assume anything when it comes to the 'culture of poverty'!

One of the first rules of journalism addresses writers making 'assumptions,' which—in this business—is a 'no-no.'

The most obvious is the 'assumption' that the reader knows what you are talking about, which is the backdrop for a statement.

I violated that rule over the last few weeks by contrasting the 'poor' and the 'po.' I assumed (making an 'ass-of-u-and-me') you all knew the difference.

Apparently, many of you don't. For reference, I grew up 'po'—or, you might say, in a 'working po' family—one generation removed from the deeper-than-deep South.

I was raised in a traditional two-parent religious family with a strong work ethic. We were pushed, prodded, and punched to excel academically.

We were surrounded by like-minded nuclear—'working po'—families.

For a myriad of reasons, that community structure and household configuration was replaced in the late 1970s by a new underclass (a fourth migration of southern folks seeking welfare and a handout versus a helping hand).

Thus, a new 'Culture of Poverty' (COP) was created, a paradigm in which the poor accepted their poverty—government handouts—maneuvered and manipulated the system and removed the last five letters of the word 'community' from their cultural vocabulary.

This new 'poor' class replaced God with rappers and social morality with sexual promiscuity.

During my upbringing, 70% of Black households were two-parent nuclear families. Today, that percentage is flipped with single parent-headed families, 80% of whom are poor (economically and spiritually), with 70% of them embracing the self-denigrating and social chaos associated with the COP.

Some say the welfare mandate prohibiting men from living in the households destroyed the institution of marriage, a critical factor in distinguishing between the poor and the 'po' (poor).

That's overly simplistic. However, married couples generally provide two incomes, a more robust parenting paradigm, and shared household responsibilities.

In case you have never studied or read the bible, marriage is an offshoot of Christian tenets—which most poor folks refuse to subscribe to.

In my case, my father's early adult blindness limited our family income but not our value system.

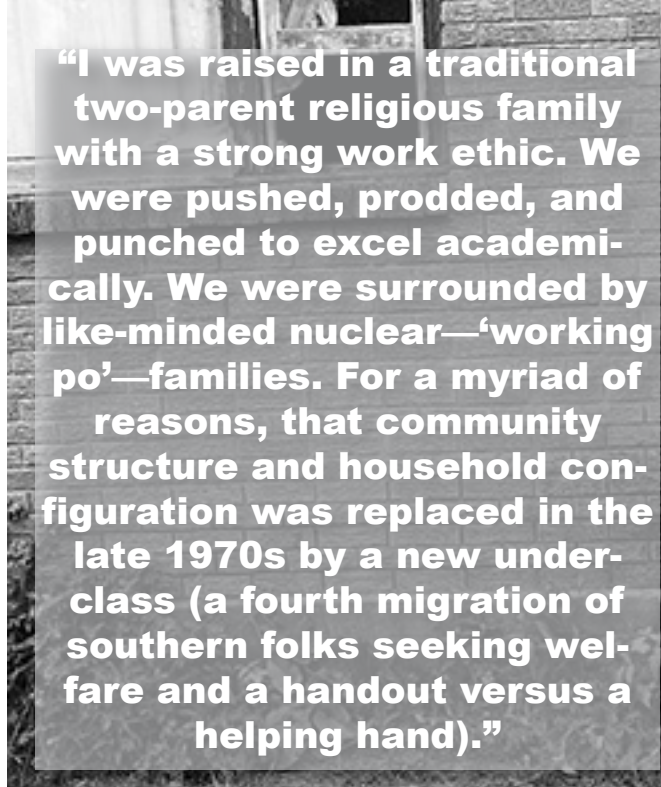
My siblings and I offset that loss with part-time jobs.

Because my family instilled within us a solid work ethic—another component of 'po vs. poor—I started working, at age 11, on my grandfather's scrap metal

truck. Between 11 and 17 (when I 'volunteered' for the military), I frequently worked three jobs: Mary's car wash, Milwaukee Sentinel (my introduction to ink), and my uncle's cleaning business. I provided my siblings with school clothes, bought a car, and contributed to the household.

A strong work ethic is not the only distinction between the 'po and poor. Here are a few more:

'Po folks can't wait to vote for the next president. Poor people plan to be 'busy' on November 4th.



assaults because their victim mugged them. Poor families treat rental property as if it were the city dump. Po families take pride in their environment and leave rentals better than they found them. They recognize that how they keep up that property (that they don't own) is a reflection of themselves.

Poor parents use their food stamps to buy porterhouse steaks, oysters (which explains why they have so many children), and lobster tails, which they microwave in the container they came in (making it taste like plastic for a reason, and it's not the saltwater).

My 'po mother read to us daily, took us to the library, checked our homework, and encouraged us to excel academically.

Most poor mothers' homes were void of books, and the only consistent reading was the cereal box. You can recognize their children as they entered kindergarten unable to recognize the alphabet unable to spell their names.

They can recite the latest 'gangsta rap' song, including words I would not repeat before a group of Black seniors (even though many can't remember where their sex organs are and can't follow the rapper's instructions if they did).

'Po folks value education, recite Malcolm X's declaration that education is our passport to the future, to independence and self-esteem.

Poor parents view school as a babysitter. They never attend parent-teacher conferences, nor can they name their child's teacher. Chances are they probably don't know what school their child attends, if indeed that's where they are. Many are at home playing video games that teach the art of stealing cars and drive-by

'Po folks might fix a pot of beans, greens, and chili to last the week. They buy fresh fruits. Sunday dinner is a family affair that starts with thanksgiving and prayers.

'Po families are vested in their religion, follow the tenets of the Bible or Koran, They live the 10 commandments. Even those more spiritual than religious follow the 42 Negative Confessions (look it up).

Poor families might call themselves Christians (even if they don't know what it entails) and even show up on Easter Sunday. But it's not to praise God; instead, to show off their new clothes. The mother and AWOL father take pride in the potential appearance of their daughter on the Maury Show---' You are NOT the father, nor is Kwame, Fred, Jaronte or Sam.

Poor parent(s) don't think twice about spending the rent, gas, and food money on Christmas toys and \$150 Nike tennis shoes, a wig or weave, and diamond clustered nails (oh, and don't forget the gold and diamond dental ware).

'Po parents buy within their means and celebrate Christmas for its proper application.

Many await Kwanzaa, not only because of its cultural relevance but also because the price of goods is on sale.

Obviously, I'm generalizing. The poor I'm referring to are the 'Neckbones,' individuals whose lifestyles fuel the poverty industry, which, I should add, is a self-perpetuating industry that benefits from 'Neck-bonology,' low esteem, and self-denigrating attitudes.

As many continue to react to veteran actor James Earl Jones' death on September 9, 2024, we are learning more about his life and his impact on some of Black Hollywood's biggest stars.

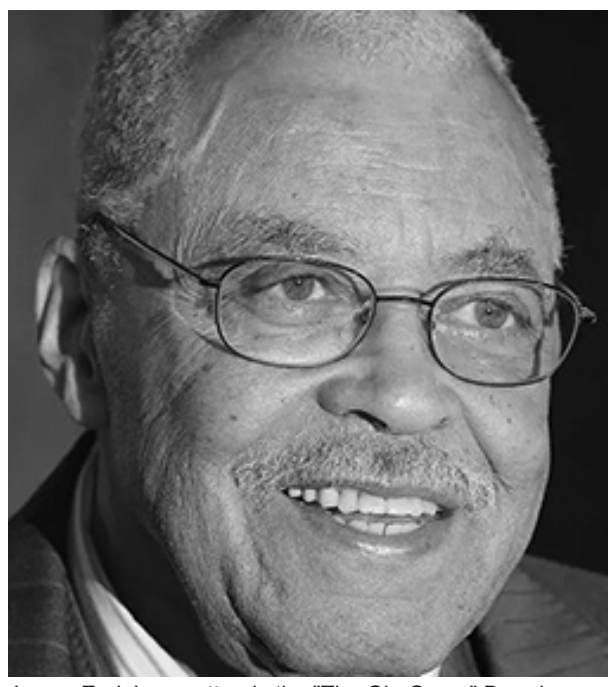

When Jones was inducted into the American Academy of Achievement in 1996, he shared in an interview what it was like growing up in Mississippi and Michigan.

"It wasn't that I stopped talking; it was that I resolved that talking was too difficult," Jones recalled, adding that moving away from Mississippi to Michigan with his grandparents, who raised him, caused significant trauma for him. As a result, he spent his entire first year of school mute which continued well into high school.

It wasn't until he encountered a high school teacher named Donald Crouch that Jones started pushing through his silence, discovering a love of poetry in the process.

"[Crouch] said, 'Do you like these words? Do you like the way they sound in your head?'" Jones explained. "He said, 'Well, they sound 10 times better when you give them out in the air. It's too bad you can't say these words.' He began to challenge and nudge me toward speaking again, and by using my own poetry and then other poets ... he nudged me toward that, toward acknowledging and appreciating the beauty of

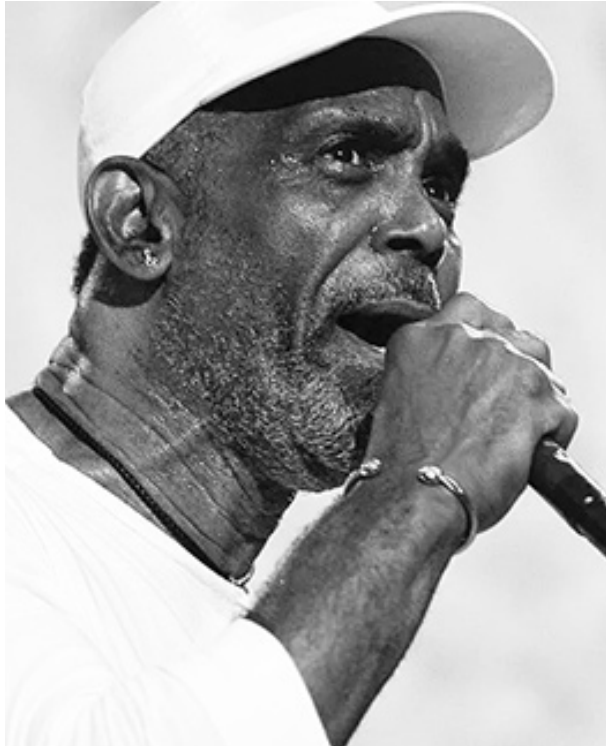

Summer, a season that rarely passes without the sound of his soulful voice, is concluding on a rather sad note this morning, as fans around the world are learning that Frankie Beverly has died.

On Wednesday, September 11, the family of Maze's co-founder and lead vocalist, born Howard Stanley Beverly, announced his death in a post on Instagram.

"Grieving the loss of a loved one is a deeply personal and emotional experience," the statement began, noting his date of death as Tuesday, September 10, 2024. Beverly was 77 years old at the time of his death; he and Maze had just wrapped their farewell tour earlier this summer.

"During this time, as we are navigating feelings of sorrow, reflection, and remembrance, we kindly ask for privacy and understanding, allowing us the space to grieve in our own way," the statement continued. "This period for is one of healing, and your respect for our need for solitude is appreciated as we honor the memory of our beloved Howard Stanley Beverly, known to the world as Frankie Beverly."

His family added that Beverly "lived his life with pure soul as one would say, and for us, no one did it better. He lived for his music, family and friends."

The statement concluded with a simple call to action: "Love one another as he would want that for us all."

Beverly was born and raised in Philadelphia, where his music career began as a teen in a doo-wop group called the Blenders. He changed his name to Frankie around the age of 12 after hearing Frankie Lymon and the Teenagers (the doo-wop act behind the hit single "Why Do Fools Fall in Love"), the Washington Post reports. According to the Philadelphia Tribune, after that group, Beverly went on to form The Butlers in 1963, the first group he recorded with. Eventually, The Butlers migrated to the West Coast, where they changed their name a handful of times more before finally arriving at Maze.

With Maze, Beverly recorded nine gold albums, toured for more than 50 years, and gave the world time-

Harris praised after calling out Trump's racism, embrace of hate and white violence at debate

series of examples of Trump's racist record, including refusing to rent his properties to Black families, buying a newspaper ad calling for the death penalty for a group of innocent Black and Latino boys known as the Central Park Five and pushing the racist conspiracy that Barack Obama, America's first Black president, was not born in the United States.

"I think the American people want better than that. We don't want a leader who is constantly trying to have Americans point their fingers at each other," said Harris.

She continued, "Regardless of people's color or the language their grandmother speaks, we all have the same dreams and aspirations and want a president who invests in those — not in hate and division."

U.S. Rep. Jim Clyburn, D-S.C., told theGrio that Harris' debate performance was "remarkable."

Given the small but significant number of Black male voters who say they are considering casting their ballots for Donald Trump, Clyburn said it was "very important" for Vice President Harris to take him to task on his racism.

"I'm really puzzled as to why so many African-American men, to know that history, ... could just ignore all of that," said the longtime congressman and known presidential kingmaker.

"Donald Trump was being embarrassed in ways that nobody has ever embarrassed him before..."

"Omarosa [Manigault Newman], who worked for him on his [White House] staff, he looked in the TV camera and referred to her as a dog," Clyburn recalled. "Come on! How can you vote for somebody who would say that about a Black woman?"

Harris also chastised Trump for inciting the Jan. 6, 2021 attack on the U.S. Capitol after refusing to concede his loss in the 2020 election against Joe Biden and Kamala Harris. The mostly white mob (some armed and wearing tactical gear) physically attacked law enforcement and broke into the Capitol building, resulting in deaths.

The vice president connected Trump's role in Jan. 6 to the 2017 violence in Charlottesville following a rally of white supremacists who chanted, "Jews

will not replace us." She also recalled Trump telling the Proud Boys, a white militia group, to "stand back and stand by" after refusing to condemn them.

"We're not going back. It's time to turn the page," said Harris.

Clyburn said plainly of Trump, "This guy is a reincarnation of Adolf Hitler," adding, "This guy is racist. He's antisemitic, and nobody can look at the facts and come to any other conclusion."

Barnes said Harris connecting the dots between Jan. 6 and Charlottesville was skillful and necessary.

"The visuals are certainly seared into people's minds," he explained. "Connecting those visuals to a person who has helped incite that sort of violence, reminding people what it looks like, what it feels

like, and what it can devolve into, helps, I think, make the case."

Barnes added, "It was very lawyerly, the way she handled it."

"Kamala Harris was detailed, precise, and thoughtful throughout this all-important debate. She took it seriously," said Brandon Weathersby, presidential campaigns communications director at American Bridge 21st Century, a pro-Democrat research firm.

He continued, "Donald Trump lost his mind on national television, and we all watched it happen. And this is the same guy that American Bridge has been watching in his rallies for the past two years since he launched his 2024 campaign. We're not surprised it was this bad."

Harris campaign co-chair and former U.S. Congressman Cedric Richmond told theGrio that Trump is "thin-skinned" and "stuck in the past."

"People got a chance tonight to see his character, his lack of values, and they got a chance to contrast it with hers. And I think it was a good night," said Richmond.

Clyburn similarly told theGrio of Harris, "What she did needed to be done." He said Harris, as a Black and Asian woman, had to overcome the misogynistic perception that a woman in America can't lead.

nation of neighbors. She’s a Democrat who’s a gun owner. She believes that strength means lifting people up. She’s bullish about America.

The dynamic between them — as she answered questions and he danced away from them — was like the girl who’d done every bit of the homework versus the boy who’d none of it.

A lot of voters came into this debate wondering who Harris really is — voters who care about politics but don’t pay close attention to it all the time so they don’t know that much about Harris. In the debate’s first moments, she humanized herself as a child of the middle class who’s a champion of small business owners.

She told voters what she wants to do — make life a little easier for the

middle class. If you’re having a baby, buying your first home or starting a business, her government will help out by giving you money. The contrast was clear — Harris is someone who says she wants to put middle-class voters first. Trump is a walking vat of chaos. I’m not sure what he wants to do beyond closing the border and being cruel to immigrants.

Harris won the debate by a lot, but we will have to wait to see if that really matters.

Postscript: Moments after the debate ended, we learned that Taylor Swift had endorsed Harris, and whatever you personally think of Swift or her music, it’s undeniable that she’s extraordinarily popular and influential, especially among millennial and Zoomer white women. Spare me your musical critique and your disgust of celebrity culture, Swift’s endorsement is

valuable.

I’m reminded of how influential Swift is every time one of my daughters’ friends comes over and talks about how much she loves Swift.

This summer, I told that young Swiftie: Everything Taylor does Beyoncé does better. Singing, dancing, songwriting, fashion, concert design, video creation, everything. Last night, I heard about how excited she was that Swift had endorsed Harris.

I told her, that is definitely exciting. Then I said that Beyoncé tacitly endorsed Harris over a month ago when she gave Harris the right to make her song “Freedom” a central part of her campaign, but we are thrilled to have young Taylor join the train that Beyoncé is already on.

Michigan.

“It wasn’t that I stopped talking; it was that I resolved that talking was too difficult,” Jones recalled, adding that moving away from Mississippi to Michigan with his grandparents, who raised him, caused significant trauma for him. As a result, he spent his entire first year of school mute which continued well into high school.

It wasn’t until he encountered a high school teacher named Donald Crouch that Jones started pushing through his silence, discovering a love of poetry in the process.

“[Crouch] said, ‘Do you like these words? Do you like the way they sound in your head?’” Jones explained. “He said, ‘Well, they sound 10 times better when you give them out in the air. It’s too bad you can’t say these words.’ He began to challenge and nudge me toward speaking again, and by using my own poetry and then other poets ... he nudged me toward that, toward acknowledging and appreciating the beauty of words.”

It’s hard to say what would have been if not for Crouch’s crucial intervention. However, it is easy to say what Jones would go on to do for many future Black Hollywood stars.

“He’s my hero,” Denzel Washington told Variety, who noted that his college theater career was inspired by Jones’ performances in both “The Emperor Jones” and “Othello.”

“I wasn’t going to be as big as him. I wanted to sound like him. He was everything to me as a budding actor. He was who I wanted to be,” Washington continued. “There weren’t a lot of serious Black actors for us to emulate; to follow, to admire. There was Sidney [Poitier]; it was James Earl Jones on stage. That’s what I remember.”

Ava DuVernay paid tribute to Jones through multiple posts in her Instagram Stories and ended with the caption: “A job well done. A gift well shared. Bless you as you journey on,” per Entertainment Weekly.

In a post on X, Kerry Washington shared, “Your voice left an everlasting mark on film and theatre. Your roles shaped our imaginations. Your legacy will live on forever. Rest in peace, Mr. Jones.”

Wendell Pierce wrote in his own tribute post on X, “Genius Personified. Humanity Exemplified. Artistry of the highest order. A personal hero of monumental talent. Once in a generation. My soul is broken with the news

of his transition.”

Colman Domingo shared an image of a young Jones on X, writing, “Thank you, dear James Earl Jones for everything. A master of our craft. We stand on your shoulders. Rest now. You gave us your best.”

Meanwhile, Courtney B. Vance, who spent time with Jones and his family six months ago, told Variety he regrets not reminiscing more about the times he shared the stage with the late actor, including a performance of August Wilson’s “Fences,” and when the two performed a scene from the play for the 1987 Tony Awards.

“At that very first table read, I didn’t know what to call James — I called him ‘Sir.’ I was the only one that didn’t know anybody. On top of that, I was green because I had just gotten into theater. I didn’t know upstage from downstage. They all brought me along. They schooled me,” Vance recalled.

He added that “James would like to be remembered as a gentleman, as someone who loved his family. Everybody from his generation, there were no models for them, so they had to make their way out of no way. They were all pioneers. Moses Gunn, Cicely Tyson, and James in “The Blacks” was a play that changed Broadway as much as “Fences” did, allowing African American performers to have careers.”

Vance also recalled the last time he saw Jones, who is survived by his son Flynn, at his home in upstate New York earlier this year.

“The whole family was there, and we were all just laughing, talking about old times,” he said. “He said to me, ‘Courtney, they’ve got me so ensconced in this bubble, I think I’m gonna live to be 100.’ I said, ‘Jimmy, I know you will.’”

less classics like “Before I Let Go,” “Joy and Pain,” and “Golden Time of Day.” Their music has become the soundtrack to many Black lives, played at summer cookouts, family reunions, graduation parties, wedding receptions, jazz festivals, and beyond. The color white has also become synonymous with Maze and Beverly, who wore it so often onstage that it became the official go-to color for fans attending their shows. As Maze fans around the world react to the news, many are noting how much of a staple Beverly’s voice was in Black households.

“The bard of the Black family reunion and the Black cookout. The voice of summer,” began a user’s tribute on Threads. “The one who called us together & reminded us that ‘we are one.’ The one who let us know that we would reach that ‘Golden Time of Day’ (‘when you find who you are’). And just a beautiful artist and spirit. Rest in Paradise Frankie Beverly.”

Another user on Threads wrote, “His music takes me back to my childhood. Those moments are so nostalgic.”

“There is something about a Frankie Beverly song that brings me peace, comfort, and joy. This is like losing a relative. Rest in peace, Uncle Frankie! We Are One,” someone else wrote on Threads.

In a tribute post of his own, John Legend wrote, “What I love about being an artist is that our work leaves a legacy that outlives our time on this Earth.

Frankie has given the world such joy. His music will live on. It will always be part of our culture, an essential part of the soundtrack of our celebrations, cookouts, and family reunions. May he rest well.”

Beverly’s family has not shared how the singer died, who he is survived by (as he was very private), or any immediate plans for a public memorial.

which fatal and serious injury crashes and acts of reckless driving occur regularly.

Segments on Corridors of Concern like S. 76th Street, W. Silver Spring Drive, and W. Layton Avenue are among those that are slated for full redesign and reconstruction, thanks to this federal investment.

Milwaukee County and the Milwaukee County Transit System (MCTS) will also receive over \$7 million in additional STP funding to replace 13 buses.

MCTS’ bus replacement program is one of the most critical aspects to operating an efficient, reliable mass transit system as the average lifespan of a bus is approximately 12 years or 500,000 miles.

The more its fleet of over 300 buses can operate con-

sistently and efficiently, the more feasible mass transit will be as a viable mode of transportation throughout Milwaukee County.

“For Milwaukee County to have a modern and robust transportation network, we continually seek to provide infrastructure that also ensures the safety and wellbeing of the travelling public,” said Donna Brown-Martin, Milwaukee County Director of Transportation.

“Similarly, new buses for the MCTS fleet will support connectivity by moving more people timely and efficiently, while also reducing operational and maintenance costs through the replacement of vehicles past useful life standards.”

Milwaukee County is committed to pursuing state and federal funding to increase multimodal safety, reduce reckless driving, and maintain public transit services in the community.

MCDOT is utilizing federal funding to implement street safety improvements in Greendale, Shorewood, South Milwaukee, Wauwatosa, and West Allis, as well as in partnership with the City of Milwaukee on a critical segment of the 35th Street corridor, to combat reckless driving, calm traffic, and create safer streets for all.
