UW, collaborators awarded \$10M to empower Black people to QUIT SMOKING!

A University of Wisconsin (UW) research team and its partners have garnered \$10 million in research funding for a five-year study to determine which treatments work best to empower Black people to quit smoking.

“Black Americans in Wisconsin and across the United States continue to face significant smoking-related health inequities that are exacerbated by menthol tobacco use and tobacco industry targeting,” said Lorraine Lathem, founder and director of Jump and the Sun Consultants (JATSC), a Black-women owned firm dedicated to reducing health disparities.

The funding comes from the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI). PCORI is an independent, nonprofit organization authorized by the U.S. Congress with a mission to fund patient-centered comparative clinical effectiveness research that provides patients, their caregivers and clinicians with the evidence-based information they need to make better-informed health and health care decisions.

The UW research team consists of Principal Investigators Dr. Megan Piper, Co-Director of Research at the UW Center for Tobacco Research and Package (UW-CTRI), and Dr. Hasmeena Kathuria, Director of UW-CTRI.

“In addition, the U.S. Surgeon General and members of Black communities in Milwaukee and elsewhere have identified smoking cessation as a key social justice and health equity issue and ongoing public health concern.”

Piper agreed. "Our partnerships with state tobacco control programs, the Center for Black Health and Equity, Jump at the Sun Consultants, Wisconsin Network for Research Support, and the North American Quitline Consortium will ensure that what we learn from this research will be used to improve real-world programs to help Black adults quit smoking," she said. "Research has shown that Black adults want to quit smoking, so let's make sure they have access to treatments that work for them."

This study will examine the effects of three treatment packages for Black adults who want to quit smoking as part of a five-state study (in Arizona, Indiana, Kansas, Virginia, and Wisconsin).

The 1500 participants will be randomized to one of the three treatment packages: Standard, Intensive, or Intensive Incentivized Package:

The Standard Package will provide 4 counseling sessions and 2 weeks of nicotine patches, similar to a typical state-run quitline.

The Intensive Package will provide 8 weeks of nicotine patches, 8 culturally specific counseling sessions (participants can choose whether to have in-person group counseling or individual phone counseling), and access to the Pathways to Freedom video (a video designed to help Black adults quit smoking) on the study website.

The Intensive Incentivized Package will be the same as the Intensive Package and will also provide up to \$50 in incentives for participants to attend counseling sessions.

These three treatment packages were selected because the individual components have been shown to be effective among Black adults trying to quit smoking and because the study's Community Advisory Board (CAB), with feedback from focus groups of Black adults who smoke, deemed them to be acceptable and feasible.

The CAB—based in Milwaukee, WI, made up of Black adults with lived experience smoking and/or public health professionals and the Director of Wisconsin's Commercial Tobacco Prevention and Treatment Program, came together with UW-CTRI to identify treatments that might work best for Black adults who smoke.

The goal of this research is to determine whether the culturally specific packages being tested in this study will increase quit rates relative to the standard evidence-based package.

Importantly, these treatments will not be provided in clinical settings but in the participants' everyday

lives and settings.

The study will also investigate the best ways to engage Black adults in these low-barrier treatments.

Specifically, the UW-CTRI study team—including Co-Investigators Dr. Adrienne Johnson, Dr. Tom Piasecki, and UW-CTRI Outreach Director Karen Conner—along with Co-Investigators Dr. Stephanie Carpenter (AZ), Dr. Nikki Nollen (KS), Dr. Kola Okuyemi (IN), Dr. Mignonne Guy (VA) and their partners will recruit participants from five metropolitan areas with elevated smoking rates among Black residents (Indianapolis, IN – 17.2%; Kansas City, KS – 18.9%; Milwaukee, WI – 20.2%; Phoenix, AZ – 11.8%; and Richmond, VA – 11.5%).

"It (PCORI) has the potential to answer an important question about what treatments work best to empower Black people to quit smoking and fill a crucial evidence gap. We look forward to working with the study team to share its results."

"I am particularly excited for this opportunity to address the critical need for effective smoking cessation treatments for Black adults," said Dr. Kathuria, "who experience some of the highest rates of tobacco-related disparities."

"This project was selected for PCORI funding not only for its scientific merit and commitment to engaging patients and other health care stakeholders, but also for its conduct in real-world settings," said PCORI Executive Director Nakela Cook, M.D., MPH.

"It has the potential to answer an important question about what treatments work best to empower Black people to quit smoking and fill a crucial evidence gap."

"We look forward to working with the study team to share its results."

This study was selected through PCORI's highly competitive review process in which patients, caregivers and other stakeholders join scientists to evaluate proposals.

Pragmatic clinical studies such as this test a treatment's effectiveness in "real-world" clinical situations such as standard hospitals and outpatient clinics, and can include a wider range of study participants, making their findings more generally applicable.

This award has been approved pending completion of PCORI's business and programmatic review and issuance of a formal award contract.

Funding to build the core community partnerships was provided by the UW School of Medicine and Public Health from the Wisconsin Partnership Program (WPP 5129) through a grant to the UW Institute for Clinical and Translational Research.

President Donald Trump gained votes in every county in Wisconsin in 2024 when compared to the 2020 presidential election, whereas Vice President Kamala Harris lost ground in 25 counties, a Wisconsin Right Now analysis found.

Trump posted his highest net gain in votes in Democratic Milwaukee County, demonstrating his crossover appeal. Dane County registered the largest NET loss for Trump in the state, with a net loss of 7,156 votes.

Riot-torn Kenosha generated the third-highest net vote gain for the president; its neighbors in Walworth, Racine, and Rock (which was 2nd) also ranked in the top 10, showing the reddening of Wisconsin's southeast corner.

Interestingly, St. Croix

County also ranked high for Trump; as it's in the Minnesota media market, perhaps voters were aware of Tim Walz's extreme record in their neighboring state.

Here's how we determined net gain and loss. We calculated the net gain by examining the gain/loss of Trump and Biden-Harris from 2020 to 2024.

For example, Trump gained votes in Dane County but Harris gained more, resulting in the net loss for Trump.

The Racine/Kenosha axis has increasingly turned red since rioters burned Kenosha's downtown with little pushback from police leadership, leading to the Kyle Rittenhouse shooting and acquittal. Kenosha elected a Republican DA on the heels of choosing a Republican County Executive.

The reddening of the southeast corner has helped offset continued erosion in the WOW counties of Waukesha,

Milwaukee County Delivered Most Net Votes for Trump, Dane County Least

Ozaukee, and Washington Counties.

We obtained the data via the Wisconsin Election Commission. The 2024 totals are unofficial.

Narrated tours return Thursday through Sunday evening as part of the Milwaukee Holiday Lights Festival

Southeastern Wisconsin residents and visitors will again have a convenient way to check out all the sights and sounds of the Milwaukee Holiday Lights Festival, presented by Johnson Financial Group. Milwaukee Downtown, BID #21 has partnered with KB Excursions to provide Jingle Bus service beginning next month. Tours will operate Thursdays through Sundays from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m., Dec. 5 – 29.

Silver Spring Neighborhood Center to Receive \$30,000 AT&T Contribution to Create New Innovation Lab

The Silver Spring Neighborhood Center (SSNC) will receive a \$30,000 AT&T contribution to support the creation of a new Innovation Lab dedicated to bridging the digital divide and providing families on Milwaukee's northwest side with equitable access to technology.

In Wisconsin, it's estimated that 10% of households don't have access to the internet or connected devices needed to fully participate in the online world, an issue known as the digital divide.

The new lab will provide low-income youth and their families with access to computers and technology, as well as digital literacy workshops, job training programming, coding and STEAM programs, and online education and career readiness resources.

Construction on the Innovation Lab is underway, with the new computer lab expected to open its doors to families in early 2025.

The lab will be available for low-income families and individuals residing in Westlawn Gardens, the state's largest public housing development, and surrounding neighborhoods on Milwaukee's northwest side.

"Jingle Bus tours allow residents and visitors a fun and easy way to see the more than half-million shimmering lights that make up the Milwaukee Holiday Lights Festival," said Beth Weirick, CEO of Milwaukee Downtown, BID #21.

"Our knowledgeable and lively Public Service Ambassadors narrate the tours, sharing Milwaukee history and pointing out key venues along the way. It's a convenient and affordable way to become acclimated with Downtown's holiday offerings."

Buses will depart from Courtyard Milwaukee Downtown, 300 W. Michigan St. Jingle Bus parking is available at InterPark The Avenue Garage, 615 N. 2nd St., at a discounted rate of \$3, thanks to Interstate Parking.

The Wisconsin Council on Problem Gambling Joins the 2024 Gift Responsibly Campaign to Raise Awareness of Youth Gambling Risks

GREEN BAY – The Wisconsin Council on Problem Gambling today announced its commitment as a participant of the 2024 Gift Responsibly Campaign, joining lotteries and community organizations across North America and around the world to raise awareness about the risks of underage lottery use.

The campaign is organized by the National Council on Problem Gambling (NCPG) and supported by the North American Association of State and Provincial Lotteries (NASPL).

Research shows that the earlier a person's participation or exposure to gambling is in childhood, the more likely they are to develop a gambling problem later in life.

Gambling exposure during childhood is often through some kind of lottery product, such as lottery tickets or scratch offs. Often these items are given to a child by an adult who is unaware of the associated risks.

The Wisconsin Council on Problem Gambling encourages adults not to give lottery tickets to underage children/teens as holiday gifts – many problem gamblers report that they began gambling during childhood.

"Problem gambling is a growing concern among adolescents. We feel it's important to let parents, grandparents and others know that lottery tickets are not a good gift choice for children", says Rose Blozinski, WCPG Executive Director.

The Wisconsin Council on Problem Gambling has signed on to the 2024 Gift Responsibly Campaign as a participant.

Service reductions by Ascension Health Services stand to negatively impact the community

Stressing Milwaukeeans deserve a full and transparent discussion of Ascension Wisconsin's announcement to consolidate some of its services, Alderman DiAndre Jackson announced the Public Safety and Health Committee will discuss the matter December 5 at 9 a.m.

Ascension's service reduction plan is expected to negatively impact a number of its health care sites throughout the southeast region. Perhaps no area will feel the force of those reductions more than St. Joseph's Hospital, which is in the alderman's 7th aldermanic district.

Jackson said St. Joseph's will lose its catheterization (cath) lab services which, he said, will be a massive detriment to the community.

"Cardiac cath labs are crucial for providing health services to those suffering heart attacks and cardiac arrest," Jackson said in a statement about the service reductions.

"The closing of the cath lab at St. Joseph's means that patients will have to be transported to Froedtert, St. Mary's Hospital Milwaukee, and Aurora Grafton when suffering one of these cardiac events.

"Those hospitals account for 15-30 minutes of extra drive time from St. Joseph's, extra time that could literally mean the difference between life and death."

The alderman added the change will result in nearly 115,000 Milwaukee area residents no longer being within a 15-minute drive of a cath lab, and the vast majority of those residents are Black.

"In a city where Black residents already have disproportionate health outcomes, the decision by Ascension to close this life-saving unit in the heart of the city is far from equitable."

Before the start of the committee meeting, Jackson has scheduled a news conference in the City Hall rotunda for 8:30 a.m. With Jackson will be Chief Lipski and other community stakeholders.

"The community deserves to know the extent of this decision and Ascension must be held accountable."

10-year-old Black boy could become the latest victim of a justice system rooted in outdated and racist 'super predator' myths!

Reverend John McVicker, Jr. takes seriously his Christian charge to care for the sick and elderly, as well as nurture and protect God's children.

That latter calling led Rev. McVicker to champion school choice to provide options for children failed by the educracy, to start at school, and to use the resources of his church to provide for the children of incarcerated parents.

His latest endeavor is a heart-wrenching and life-altering campaign to influence the outcome of a 12-year-old murderer who may soon be sentenced to prison purgatory.

Suppose you know the man and his mission. In that case, you should not be surprised 'Rev. Mac' is leading a crusade to intercede in the controversial—albeit heart-wrenching --- case of the Black adolescent who allegedly murdered his mother two years ago after she refused to buy him a virtual reality game. The troubled child was 10 at the time.

The case made national headlines not only because of its sensationalistic nature but also because the 'child' was immediately waived to adult court for trial.

Rev. McVicker's campaign is not intended to lessen the seriousness of the tragedy but, instead, to have the child judged in juvenile court, where he could receive mental health counseling and supportive services.

In a letter to presiding Judge Jan Carroll, Rev. McVicker appealed for her to "consider not only the letter of the law but also the spirit of justice and compassion that underpins our legal system.

"At such a tender age, a child cannot fully comprehend the consequences of their actions, let alone face the harrowing prospect of being tried in an adult court."

The well-known pastor of Christ the King Baptist Church noted that preadolescents' psychological, social, and developmental stages are vastly different from those of adults, and it is crucial that these differences be acknowledged in the pursuit of justice.

Interestingly, because of his age, the media is not allowed to name the boy, a situation that will change if he is tried as an adult.

He will then be treated as a 'man,' a status which most certainly will condemn him to an environment where numerous studies suggest he will be subjected to barbarous and callous treatment.

Imagine a child, unable to defend himself, forced to survive behind bars with pedophiles,

murderers, and rapists.

As experts note, juvenile facilities seek to rehabilitate with mental health counseling, while in prisons, for the most part, the sole purpose is to punish, often using extreme and cruel methods.

According to the Juvenile Law Center, adult prison represents cruel and unusual punishment in that many incarcerated youth are not only subject to solitary confinement (for their own protection) but daily strip search, shackled and chemical sprays while isolated.

These abusive practices cause physical injuries, the organization noted, cause emotional trauma, and psychological harm, thus interrupting healthy development.

"Youth in prison also face physical and sexual violence, compounding the trauma imposed by their isolation and separation from families, friends and communities."

Sexual assault can lead to suicide.

Under Wisconsin law, the only avenue to re-

verse what many believe is the callous decision to adjudicate an adolescent to adult prison is through a "reverse waiver process."

But according to a release by the child's attorney, that is a "mechanism designed to fail.

"The laws set an impossible standard. Instead of considering the overwhelming scientific evidence about brain development, mental health, and the unique rehabilitative needs of thought, the process only considers the seriousness of the crime."

McVicker echoed those concerns to Judge Carroll, also noting, "It is essential to consider the broader implications of this decision. Our justice system is based on the principles of fairness, rehabilitation, and the protection of all citizens, including the most vulnerable."

In a text to me, McVicker compared this case to the infamous 'Slender-Man' murder case, where two 12-year-old White girls committed a heinous murder in which they stabbed a friend 19 times but were found not guilty by a

mental disease or defect and committed to a mental health institute.

After seven years in custody, one of the girls is now free.

That scenario raises yet another question, one which the boy's attorney noted in a statement: "In Wisconsin, and across the nation, this harsh treatment (waiving Black youth to adult court) disproportionately targets Black youth.

"These decisions strip children of access to the juvenile justice system, a space intended to nurture growth, learning, and rehabilitation.

"This case lays bare the failures of a justice system rooted in outdated and racist 'super predator' myths."

Allowing a 10-year-old to be charged as if he were a 40-year-old adult is not only immoral but unconstitutional.

It undermines public safety and destines children to the horrors of adult prison without providing rehabilitation or meaningful reintegration into society.

The 12-year-old fits the same 'M.O.' ('Modus Operandi' or 'Method of Operation'—a 'pattern of behavior') as the two White girls.

According to several family accounts, the boy was not of 'right mind.' His conduct leading up to the killing of his mother was erratic and volatile. At four, he abused a dog and, a couple of years later, attacked a cousin. He also maliciously started a fire.

His relative expressed fear of the child. And while suggesting he was in dire need of counseling, they refused to take custody of him.

Moreover, while he apologized for his mother's death, he reportedly showed no remorse. No tears.

To anyone with common sense, the boy needed mental health intervention. Services provided in the juvenile justice system would address his needs while "providing him with the support he desperately needs if the goal is rehabilitation.

Mac Weddle, former executive director of Northcott Neighborhood House and current chair of the 'Call to Action' youth advocacy organization, said during a Monday conversation that the boy represents a classic example of a child in need.

In many respects, he is a product of society and an environment that breeds delinquency, violence, and low self-esteem.

But whatever his condition, he is still a child of the village. He should be given an opportunity for mental health services, which may provide an opportunity for a constructive life.

WASHINGTON – U.S. Representative Barbara Lee (CA-12) celebrated recently the passage of her bipartisan legislation to honor the life and work of the late Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm, the first Black woman elected to Congress in 1968.

The Shirley Chisholm Congressional Gold Medal Act would instruct Congress to posthumously bestow Chisholm with a Congressional Gold Medal – the highest award Congress can bestow – in commemoration of her accomplishments, activism, and legacy.

Alongside Congresswoman Lee, the Shirley Chisholm Congressional Gold Medal Act was led in the House by Democratic Leader Jeffries (D-NY-8), Congressmembers Maxine Waters (D-CA-43), Yvette Clarke (D-NY-11), and Byron Donalds (R-FL-19).

The Senate companion to the bill was introduced by Senators Laphonza Butler (D-CA) and Raphael Warnock (D-GA).

“The Congressional Gold Medal serves as the nation’s highest expression of gratitude for distinguished service and achievements, and I see no one more deserving than Shirley Chisholm,” said Congresswoman Lee.

“It is critical for the next generation of leaders to see the first Black woman elected to Congress get the recognition that she deserves.

“Congresswoman Chisholm made history as the first Black woman elected to the United States Congress and the first Black woman to run for President of the United States. To Mrs. C, thank you for being unbought and unbossed, for paving the way, and being a catalyst for change.”

“Shirley Chisholm lived an honorable life of service and was a trailblazer who opened doors for generations of Black women and opened the imagination of what leadership looked like for our entire nation,” said Senator Butler.

“Her extraordinary contributions to American history and progress deserve recognition, and today I am proud to stand with my colleagues in both chambers and on both sides of the aisle to have taken this step to celebrate her legacy, ensuring that future generation of leaders never forget her courage, sacrifice, and patriotism.”

During her seven terms in the U.S. House of Representatives, “Fighting Shirley” introduced 50 pieces of legislation and was a champion for racial and gender equity, low-income communities, and the end of the Vietnam War.

In 1972, Chisholm became the first woman and Black candidate to seek the nomination for president of the United States from one of the two major political parties. After a lifetime of service, Shirley Chisholm died at the age of 80 in Ormond Beach, Florida, on New Year’s Day 2005.

“Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm broke barriers for Black women, Black Americans, and anyone who refuses to be confined by injustice.

“As an educator, trailblazing public servant, and presidential candidate, she fought for an inclusive democracy that lives up to our nation’s highest ideals of equity and justice under law,” said Senator Reverend Warnock.

“I am proud to have passed this bill alongside Senator Butler to honor Chisholm’s legacy with a Congressional Gold Medal, and I will continue working to carry on her fight through my work in the Senate.”

Jemel Hill Has Theory On Why Kamala Harris Lost To Donald Trump

 Jemele Hill has never been shy about expressing her opinions on politics, particularly involving Donald Trump.

A longtime critic of the president-elect, Hill actually did stay relatively quiet on social media immediately after Trump’s win over Democratic vice president Kamala Harris last month. However, she shared some thoughts on the reasons for Harris’ defeat during a recent episode of her podcast.

Hill contended that racism and misogyny played major roles in Trump’s win, with the latter also helping the Republican pol-

itician defeat Hillary Clinton back in 2016.

“I take the reelection of Donald Trump quite personally because of the person themselves, but also as a black woman,” Hill said.

“And that is because I think for a lot of black women, we can relate to Kamala Harris just in the sense of some of us have been in that position before where we felt qualified, if not overqualified in many respects.

For a lot of black women, even though we should not internalize it this way, it felt like a particular rejection of some of the things we’ve been fighting for, or it felt like a particular rejection of sort of our place and how we’re seen in this society.”

“And I don’t think it’s by any accident that both of Trump’s presidential victories have been against women,” Hill continued.

“Some of those same tropes have come up in both elections. And so, it does make you wonder, at what point--I hate to use the word ‘ready’--but at what point will America be ready for a woman to be in that role? I think it’s a question we have to ask ourselves, is this like, what is it going to take?

Because I see all this post-election autopsy’s trying to box around what I think was pretty obvious about how racism and misogyny were driving a lot of the coverage, the opinions, and even how the [electorate] saw Kamala Harris.”

In September 2017, while working for ESPN, Hill famously referred to Trump as a “white supremacist” in a series of tweets, causing backlash.

In the months leading up to the 2024 presidential election, Hill blasted Miami Dolphins owner Stephen Ross for supporting Trump after Dolphins wide receiver Tyreek Hill was involved in a high-profile police incident before a game.

She also called out Trump in the wake of Joe Biden stepping down from running for reelection back in July.

“If I’m Trump, I’m seriously laughing my (butt) off. That man has been nothing but incompetent and buffoonish and he essentially forced one of the most accomplished presidents in history to quit. Well done,” Hill wrote on social media.

“I also feel the need to say this, even though it’s been said 4 million times: MICHELLE OBAMA IS NOT RUNNING FOR PRESIDENT. NOT NOW. NOT EVER.”

OP-ED: The Future of American Education: A Call to Action

Education is the cornerstone of success, and this fundamental right must be upheld without compromise.

President-elect Donald Trump has vowed to dismantle the Department of Education, a bold and contentious move that has sparked nationwide debate. His decision addresses frustra-

tions over perceived federal overreach and alleged “woke” indoctrination in schools.

Against declining academic performance, Trump envisions a comprehensive restructuring to rectify mismanagement of taxpayer funds and undue influence on the nation’s youth.

During a September rally in

Wisconsin, Trump reaffirmed his commitment, stating, “We will ultimately abolish the federal Department of Education.”

His pledge resonates with voters eager for educational reform and accountability.

The department primarily focuses on funding programs

such as Title I, which aids low-income districts, and special education initiatives rather than direct instructional oversight.

Critics question its overall efficacy, proposing to reallocate responsibilities to other agencies.

Suggestions include shifting the student loan program to the Treasury Department, delegating Title IX enforcement to the Justice Department, and converting Title I funding into state block grants with reduced federal oversight.

Trump’s initiative reflects a broader conservative critique of federal education policy, advocating for increased local autonomy and reduced federal intervention.

As education reform discussions intensify, the consequences of eliminating the Department of Education will shape future policy debates and electoral outcomes.

The education system faces extraordinary disruptions exacerbated by the pandemic. Despite additional COVID funding, many students experienced alarming setbacks in core subjects, raising concerns about long-term implications.

Recent data highlights troubling trends among nine-year-olds:

A five-point decline in

reading scores in 2022, the largest drop since 1990.

A seven-point decline in math scores, marking the first decrease in this age group for the subject.

These statistics underscore the pandemic’s impact on learning, emphasizing the urgent need for effective strategies to support student recovery and ensure success.

Immediate action must address both knowledge gaps and disparities worsened by the crisis.

Educators and policymakers must focus on innovative solutions that ensure every student has the opportunity to thrive.

The Role of the Department of Education

The U.S. Department of Education primarily handles funding and policy enforcement, leaving curricular oversight to state and local governments. Key functions include:

Funding:
Title I Grants: Allocates \$18.4 billion annually to support low-income districts, enhancing educational equity.

Special Education: Provides \$15.5 billion yearly to assist schools in serving students with disabilities under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

Civil Rights Enforcement:

Ensures compliance with Title IX and other civil rights laws, protecting students from discrimination based on sex, race, disability, or other factors.

Higher Education Oversight: Establishes regulations for institutions participating in federal student aid programs, overseeing the \$1.6 trillion federal student loan system.

Education is a non-negotiable priority. Parents and community leaders must work to safeguard the education system.

Gun violence down across state, including Milwaukee, report says

Gun violence homicides dropped by nearly 17% in Wisconsin over the first eight months of 2024 compared to the same time period in 2023, according to a report by the Center for American Progress, a nonpartisan policy institute.

The report, released in September, also found that gun violence victimizations, defined as all firearm-related

injuries and deaths, dropped in Milwaukee nearly 20% over that same time period.

“I think this decrease is happening for a number of reasons, but one is due to community violence intervention measures that are working,” said Nicholas Matuszewski, executive director of Wisconsin Anti-Violence Effort, a statewide grassroots organization.

Local violence intervention efforts include 414 Life, a violence interruption program; and Project Ujima, which provides services to families and children who’ve been impacted by violence.

In addition, Milwaukee County Executive David Crowley announced in late October the launch of the

national gun violence program, “Advance Peace.”

“Advance Peace is an investment in solutions to decreasing gun violence that will help ensure Milwaukee County is a safe and healthy community where families and children can thrive,” Crowley said in a news release announcing the program.

‘Numbers are dropping’

Matuszewski said Milwaukee and the state are national leaders in community violence intervention efforts, citing the work of the City of Milwaukee Office of Community Wellness and Safety and also programs supported statewide through Wisconsin Community Safety Fund grants.

The Wisconsin Community Safety Fund grants provided 10 organizations, including the Alma Center in Milwaukee, with \$10.4 million in funding to reduce violence stemming from the COVID-19 pandemic.

“After the pandemic, we had a huge increase in gun ownership and gun purchases which naturally led to more gun violence,” Matuszewski said. “Those numbers are dropping now.”

While many cities cited in the report have seen gun violence return or drop to pre-pandemic levels, Milwaukee is still on pace to experience more shootings this year than in 2019, the year before the pandemic.

According to data from the Milwaukee Homicide Review Commission dashboard, there were 442 nonfatal shootings in 2019. Those numbers rose to more than 750 each year from 2020 to 2023. So far this year, the city has experienced 471 shootings, according to information on the dashboard.

‘Too many shootings’

Travis Hope, a community activist who conducts street outreach on the South Side, said gun violence still

occurs at an alarming rate in the city.

“Too many shootings are still happening and impacting families, communities, and especially young people,” Hope said.

According to data from the Milwaukee Police Department, there have been 119 homicides in the city so far this year, compared to 153 during the same time period in 2023 and 192 in 2022.

The number of nonfatal shootings in Milwaukee also is down significantly, with 471 so far this year, compared to 769 at this time in 2023 and 788 in 2022.

Officials address drop in gun violence in Milwaukee

During a news conference discussing the reduction in shootings, among other crimes in the city, Mayor Cavalier Johnson cited the work of the Milwaukee Police Department as one reason for the drop in shootings and other crime this year.

“The work that they do is a big factor, a huge factor, in making Milwaukee safer,” he said.

Johnson said that in addition to law enforcement, intervention efforts have also been key in reducing crime.

“When we prevent a crime through intervention, that makes each and every one of us safer,” he said.

Ashanti Hamilton, director of the Office of Community Safety and Wellness, said that while the decrease in homicides and nonfatal shootings is promising, more work needs to be done.

“Reducing violence is an ongoing process,” he said. “Sustainable change requires addressing the root causes of crime, and this means looking beyond the immediate crime reduction strategies and focusing on broader social, economic and systemic changes that contribute to violence.”
