The GMUL's Annual Report



The Greater Milwaukee Urban League's (GMUL) board of directors recently held their annual meeting, reviewing the progress the 105-year-old organization made in 2024. The event was held at the headquarters of Johnson Controls.

Those gathered at the meeting reviewed the GMUL's legacy of service and its \$1.5 million campaign kickoff. The main goal of the annual meeting is to reinforce the League's ongoing dedication to creating lasting, positive change through education, employment, and entrepreneurship.

Dr. Eve Hall, president and CEO of the GMUL, told the gathering that the organization's theme, "Sustaining Legacy and Impact," encapsulates the organization's dual commitment to honoring its historical significance while ensuring continued, meaningful change in the community.

Milwaukee County Executive David Crowley was the featured speaker. He said the GMUL and the county share a vision of building bridges to the community that reflect its needs and create prosperity.

"It takes collaboration—and most of all—it takes strong, committed partnerships, something that the Urban League understands," Crowley said.

Highlighting the organization's youth development and civic engagement, the GMUL's education



division invited students from George Washington Carver Academy to ask Crowley questions related to the county's and GMUL's partnership in improving conditions for residents of the county, especially GMUL's target demographic, Black Milwaukee.

"The annual meeting demonstrates GMUL's commitment to sustaining its foundational values and

mission, while adapting to evolving community needs," said the organization's board chair, Margaret Bailey-Stewart, who is also the director of government and community strategy for the Midwest Region of Charter Communications.

From Milwaukee to regionals, ASKYA CHIPLEY makes history and blazes a trail for the next generation!

When 14-year-old Askya Chipley travels to Fargo, North Dakota for the 2025 USA Gymnastics (USAG) Level 9 Western Championships in May, she will be carrying more than her leotards and grips.

She will also carry the dreams of a new generation of girls looking to see themselves in gymnastics. As a young Black gymnast in a predominately white sport, Chipley understands the power of visibility and representation.

"I want young kids—especially in Milwaukee—to know that they belong here too," Chipley said recently.

"Gymnastics isn't just flips and routines. It teaches you leadership, discipline, teamwork, and self-worth."

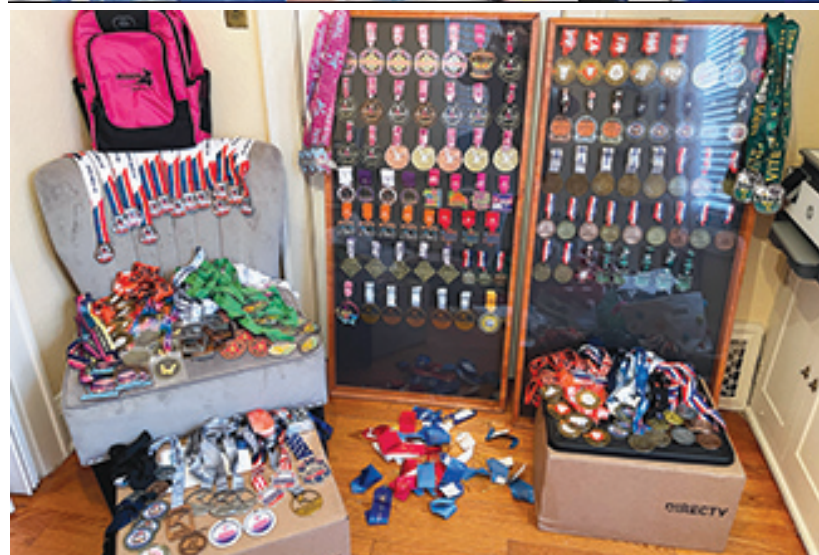
Chipley has earned 110 medals and awards in gymnastics. The accolades were earned through years of unwavering dedication and hard work.

Coupled with faith, and vision, Chipley is showing young girls how they too can break barriers and reach elite levels, even in spaces where they are often underrepresented.

Education: A Ticket Out and Upward

While he didn't necessarily appreciate it then, these days Joseph Addison realizes how blessed he was to be surrounded, loved and encouraged by his village as a young man.

It's that tough love and support that helped him land in a space where oftentimes he is the only person of color.

Addison is working to change that. As a Regulatory Compliance Analyst with Derco, A Lockheed Martin Company, he has climbed the ladder in the field of aviation. And, as President of 100 Black Men of Milwaukee, Inc. Addison is also paying it forward by mentoring young boys.

"Growing up in Pensacola, Florida (and in the South, in general), education was always emphasized. I grew up hearing that no matter what you do, you never stop learning because knowledge is some-

had me read newspapers and books and asked me questions about them.

"My uncle gave me some great advice that I carry with me every day. He said, "No matter who you are, act like you belong in the room. Do your research so you know what's going on."

"It's amazing how things your family tried to instill in you that you didn't necessarily pay attention to, pop back into your head as you get older.

Now that I'm older, I have a great appreciation for my family and the things they taught me," said Addison.

Addison also learned the values of patience and perseverance by fishing, a skill passed down from his aunt and uncle, Willie and Charlie Mae Steen. He developed

Chipley's love for gymnastics began when she was three-years-old at Infinite Gymnastics in Brown Deer, where she quickly stood out for her talent and determination.

By age nine, she had advanced to Salto Gymnastics in Waukesha, entering Level 4 and working her way up with quiet focus and unshakable grit.

Now at Level 9 and preparing for her transition to Level 10, she exemplifies what it means to build greatness from the ground up.

Her growing list of competitive gymnastic destinations reads like a future college gymnast's passport: Las Vegas, Atlanta, Texas, Florida, Arizona, Connecticut, and Kentucky.

Each meet was an opportunity for Chipley to showcase her excellence.

She recently participated in the Fisk University Gymnastics Camp where she connected with trailblazing coaches who are working hard to expand access to

the sport at the Black collegiate level. Fisk is a Historical Black College University (HBCU) in Nashville, Tennessee.

Fisk founded the first HBCU gymnastics program in 2022, becoming the first historically Black college or university to compete at the NCAA level.

They continued making history recently when they became the first HBCU to defeat both NCAA Division 1 and 2 gymnastic teams.

With her humble spirit, unmatched work ethic, and an eye on the future, Chipley is using her voice, her story, and her strength to light the path for others.

Milwaukee is a city known for its athletic greats. Chipley is creating a legacy all her own, one that uplifts, inspires, and empowers.

As she head to Fargo next month representing her hometown, Chipley is redefining what's possible for the next generation.

OP-ED: Target National Selective Buying Campaign Continues

The National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA), representing the Black Press of America, hereby reiterates our profound disgust and unwavering opposition to the continued disrespect shown toward Black America by Target Corporation.

Two months ago, the NNPA launched a National Selective Buying and Public Education Campaign in response to Target's blatant retreat from its stated commitments to Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI). This campaign is not simply about economic protest it's about justice, dignity, and the unyielding demand for respect.

As far back as October 2024, we sent a formal letter to Target CEO Brian Cornell detailing the company's persistent refusal to invest in Black-owned newspapers and media outlets. That letter was met with silence. Silence, in the face of truth, is complicity. By ignoring our appeal, Mr. Cornell and Target have made clear that they do not value the voices, institutions, or the economic power of Black America.

Let us be clear: we will not shop where we are disrespected. Our dollars will not finance our own marginalization. The Black Press has, for over 198 years, amplified the stories and struggles of our communities when others would not, we continue to, "plead our own cause." Yet, in 2025, major corporations like Target continue to bypass us in favor of performative gestures and hollow statements.

We therefore announce the continuation and intensification of the target-TARGET national selective buying campaign. We call upon all freedom-loving people from across all segments of society who believe in economic justice, media equity, and corporate accountability to join us.

To those companies who do embrace the inclusion of their diverse consumer base, we say this: Stand with us not just in words, but in deeds. Show your commitment by investing in our communities, supporting our businesses, and partnering with Black-owned media companies that have long carried the mantle of truth, justice, and advocacy.

This is not just about advertising. This is about visibility. This is about representation. This is about the moral obligation of, "Good corporate citizenship" by honoring its promises not with press releases, but with action. The time for silence is over. The time for selective buying is now.

a strong mechanical aptitude thanks to the guidance of his Uncle Liston Salter III, who introduced him to the world of hands-on problem solving.

After high school, Addison acknowledged that he didn't take his studies as seriously as he should have during his first two years at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University for Aeronautical Science.

He knew he wanted a career in aviation, with the goal of becoming a pilot, but he wasn't as focused as he needed to be. Eventually he transferred to Keiser University.

There, he clicked with one of his professors who continued the tough love his parents always practiced and Addison managed to get his life on course, earning a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration.

Today he works in aviation, but from the business side. Realizing that there were few Blacks in the field, these days he works to change that.

"After moving to Milwaukee, I realized that I needed to model to my two daughters the type of man they should be dating and marrying.

"I also felt compelled to pay it forward, understanding that if I could change some young man's life, I really needed to do that.

I was taught that you should always reach back and help someone. Mentorship really makes a difference, so that's what led me to get involved with 100 Black Men of America. Every African American boy needs the opportunity to

create a life of hope," said Addison.

Addison started as a mentee with 100 Black Men of Pensacola, Inc., and now he is the youngest serving President of 100 Black Men of Milwaukee, Inc., an organization that is committed to Milwaukee's African American community based on four precepts: respect for family, spirituality, justice and integrity.

"The promise of hope is what 100 Black Men of America and the Milwaukee Chapter try to provide," said Addison.

It's that promise of hope, drilled into Addison by all the people who showed up for him, that has given

him came out in his voice and mannerisms. That taught me that when it's time to shine, SHINE!

"I find myself walking into many rooms and being the only person and youngest that looks like me.

"I have the confidence to speak with authority to get my voice heard among the typical white male figures in the room.

"People start listening just because I speak with authority and I've done my homework," he said.

Addison believes that more needs to be done to dismantle the prevalent distrust and inability to share their emotions that exists among men, noting that this dis-

trust is often rooted in their childhood.

Investing in Milwaukee's Water, Workforce, and Future

With Earth Day here, it's worth reflecting on the power of water – not just as a natural resource, but as a force for community, economic strength, and environmental innovation.

partnered with the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District (MMSD) to manage one of the most complex and environmentally responsible water systems in the country.

April 22 as "MMSD/Veolia Ecofactory Day." That honor wasn't just about our work treating water – it was about what that work means for this city.

On the shores of Lake Michigan, water is foundational to

our identity, and it gives us an immense responsibility – and opportunity – to lead.

Water strikes at the heart of a decades-long effort to create a more sustainable city where green infrastructure, clean energy, and workforce development merge to trailblaze a path forward.

Over the years, Milwaukee has become a national model for sustainability in action.

From the MMSD's nationally recognized reclamation efforts to the creative partnerships powering climate education and workforce development, Milwaukee has shown that smart investment in water infrastructure can deliver real returns: cleaner waterways, stronger neighborhoods, and new career pathways.

Local organizations and students of all ages are touring the Jones Island Water Reclamation Facility to see sustainability in action, and volunteers are preparing to participate in the Big Clean MKE, an event led by the City of Milwaukee and community-based organizations to care for our shared public spaces.

These efforts underscore a simple but powerful truth: environmental stewardship starts at home, and when the community is engaged, the impact multiplies.

Milwaukee's leadership in the water sector also extends to how we prepare for the future.

With up to half of the water workforce nationally set to retire in the coming years, we face a critical knowledge gap.

But in our city, a solution is already underway. Last year, Milwaukee became home to the new Water & Wastewater Workforce Center – an initiative designed to close skills gaps, retrain workers from other sectors, and mentor the next generation of professionals.

With support from both public and private partners, this center aims to serve as a model for other communities facing similar challenges.

At the same time, local partnerships are creating meaningful career pathways for Milwaukee's youth.

In collaboration with schools and organizations, Veolia is developing new curricula and field programs that give students exposure to environmental and water-related careers.

Paid internships and mentorship programs are being developed to ensure that these opportunities are inclusive, accessible, and capable of lifting up historically underserved communities.

The Ecofactory concept reimagines what a water reclamation facility can be – not just a place that treats waste, but a center of innovation that generates renewable energy, reclaims water for reuse, and creates Milogranite fertilizer to nourish

our landscape.

It's a system where micro-organisms digest waste, waste heat powers operations, and solar energy supplements electricity use.

This closed-loop model benefits ratepayers and the environment alike, and it positions Milwaukee as a national leader in sustainable water management.

Milwaukee's story is one of resilience and reinvention.

From the Ecofactory's clean energy innovations to workforce programs rooted in equity, this city continues to show how environmental progress and economic opportunity can go hand in hand.

Earth Day reminds us of what's at stake – but Milwaukee reminds us of what's possible.

As we celebrate Earth Day and the progress we've made, we also look ahead. The challenges of climate change, aging infrastructure, and workforce gaps are real.

But so are the solutions we're building together – with MMSD, with our community partners, and with the people of Milwaukee.

We don't just celebrate Earth Day once a year. In this city, the work of protecting our environment, empowering our people, and building for the future happens every single day. And that's a story we should all be proud to tell.

Baldwin, Moore Urge Trump Admin. to Reinstate Childhood Lead Poisoning Experts at CDC, Push for Approval of Milwaukee's Request for Federal Assistance



WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and Congresswoman Gwen Moore (D-WI-04) demanded the Trump administration reinstate the fired Center for Disease Control (CDC) lead poisoning experts and approve Milwaukee's plea for federal assistance to help keep children safe from lead exposure in Milwaukee Public Schools (MPS). Moore and Baldwin's call comes after the City of Milwaukee's request for emergency help addressing lead poisoning in MPS schools was denied by the Trump Administration, in part because of staffing short-

ages after Elon Musk's DOGE and the Trump Administration fired the CDC's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention and Surveillance Branch. Milwaukee requested assistance after four students tested positive for lead poisoning connected to deteriorating lead paint chips at MPS buildings, leading to the temporary closure of four MPS schools while active and ongoing efforts to remediate lead exposures occur in those schools.

"We urge you to reinstate childhood lead poisoning experts at CDC and approve the City of Milwaukee's request for assistance to ensure that childhood lead poisoning prevention technical assistance is provided to help ensure that students are protected from lead exposure at school," wrote Moore and Baldwin in a letter to Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Robert F. Kennedy. "This haphazard approach to gutting the federal workforce is misguided and has resulted in unacceptable

mistakes at the agency charged with safeguarding the public's health. You have the ability to immediately rectify this issue, and we urge you to do so."

"Children who are poisoned with lead or at risk for lead poisoning should not bear the burden of a haphazard "restructuring plan." Federal technical assistance can make a significant impact in our response to this crisis, and the longer local officials are forced to work with strained resources, the longer children and families will suffer. Our communities cannot afford to wait," Moore and Baldwin continued.

Dear Secretary Kennedy,

We were alarmed to learn that the City of Milwaukee's Health Department's request to receive Epi-Aid from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) was denied. This critical assistance is needed to help local officials respond to a public health crisis involving a childhood lead poisoning case that was tied to a Milwaukee Public School (MPS) facility. The requested assistance would have supported improved data collection, public awareness outreach, and a comprehensive strategy to help protect public school students from further exposure. It is especially concerning to learn that this denial was reportedly due to a lack of staffing capacity resulting from the recent HHS reduction in force, where over 2,000 CDC employees with critical skills and expertise, including the entire Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention and Surveillance Branch, were fired. We urge you to reinstate childhood lead poisoning experts at CDC and approve the City of Milwaukee's request for assistance to ensure that childhood lead poisoning prevention technical assistance is provided to help ensure that students are protected from lead exposure at school.

According to the CDC, its Epidemiologic Assistance program (Epi-Aid) enables rapid and short-term response by federal public health experts to investigate urgent public health problems, such as infectious and noninfectious disease outbreaks, unexplained illnesses, or natural or manmade disasters. The focus of an EpiAid investigation is to assist partners in making rapid, practical decisions for actions to control and prevent the public health problem from growing, thus benefiting both the federal government and those assisted. This assistance is needed in Milwaukee now.

The recently denied Epi-Aid request would support ongoing efforts by the City of Milwaukee and MPS to address a serious public health threat that poses the greatest threat to our youngest residents. But it cannot do so without federal help. As you know, there is no safe level of lead exposure for children. When children are exposed to this neurotoxin, it harms brain development and the nervous system, contributing to learning delays and can lead to severe illness. This toxin endangers our children and prevents them from reaching their full potential. HHS has a responsibility to lend its technical expertise and make available the resources necessary to rid our communities of this poison.

In November, a young MPS student tested positive for lead poisoning, and after careful public health investigation, it was determined that case was connected to deteriorating lead paint chips at Golda Meir Elementary School, a MPS building. Since then, three other children tested positive for lead poisoning, leading to the temporary closure of four MPS Schools while active and ongoing efforts to remediate lead exposures occur in those schools. This issue is likely widespread, as there are 125 MPS buildings built before the federal ban on lead-based paint.

From news reports, it appears that the decision to shutter the CDC's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention and Surveillance Branch contributed to the decision to reject the recent request for EPI-Aid, a request that we understand is usually granted. You recently mentioned that, "there are some programs that were cut that are being reinstated, and I think that's one of them," referring to the CDC's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention and Surveillance Branch. You also said, "we talked about this from the beginning. We're going to do 80 percent cuts, but 20 percent of those are going to have to be reinstated because we'll make mistakes." This haphazard approach to gutting the federal workforce is misguided and has resulted in unacceptable mistakes at the agency charged with safeguarding the public's health. You have the ability to immediately rectify this issue, and we urge you to do so.

As Members of Congress, we have worked over the last decade on a bipartisan basis to help secure federal funding to address lead in paint and water infrastructure, including for strong investments that support critical surveillance, environmental investigation, and case management activities to help identify and treat children with elevated blood lead levels in the U.S. In fiscal year 2025, Childhood Lead Poisoning was funded at \$51 million—the same level as fiscal year 2024. HHS has contended that the reduction in force and the efforts to reorganize the department will not affect programs. Unfortunately, the denial of Epi-Aid in this instance is indeed a programmatic consequence of HHS' abrupt firings that will have lasting consequences for young children in Milwaukee.

Children who are poisoned with lead or at risk for lead poisoning should not bear the burden of a haphazard "restructuring plan." Federal technical assistance can make a significant impact in our response to this crisis, and the longer local officials are forced to work with strained resources, the longer children and families will suffer. Our communities cannot afford to wait. We urge you to swiftly reconstitute CDC's Office of Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention and approve the request for EPI-Aid from the City of Milwaukee's Health Department. Every moment of delay results in harm to our children.

I also wonder if some of those who did attend Easter Sunday services did so believing that attending services once or twice a year (for a particular holiday like Easter) will somehow pave their way to heaven?

I'm referring to those who own membership in the 'CME' denomination. As you know, attendance is only required on 'Christmas,' 'Mother's Day,' and 'Easter.'

They don't read the Bible, they don't know the Ten Commandments, nor do they understand the difference between the Old and New Testaments.

But they do believe that just merely attending one or three services during the holidays is all that's needed for salvation.

I attended the Easter program at Christ the King. It was excellent, not only because of the message but also because the entire service consisted of an Easter play.

The primary cast consisted of children as young as four, who each recited long sentences and acted out complicated scenes without mistakes.

Easter epitomizes the essence of Christianity, but most don't celebrate or commemorate its foundation, despite calling themselves Christians just because they hum along with popular gos-

pel songs led by Kurt Franklin. For many, if not most, Easter is an opportunity for female children to wear a new dress and for males to wear a new suit. Few are disciplined enough to follow the sermon, and instead, they can be found following their cell phone noise.

In fact, most tribal members today can be considered neo-Christians, evoking God's name only during sexual escapades or during times of stress.

I remember growing up in Milwaukee, where Easter was a shared experience of the community.

That's back in the day when we had a community defined by shared experiences, segregation, and cultural union.

On Easter Sunday, the streets were replete with nuclear 'families' walking to the neighborhood churches, in my case St. Matthew CME.

We returned home for Sunday dinner, which we opened with prayer. We then participated in a shared experience that dated back thousands of years when our ancestors sat around African fires.

Today, most 'families' look little like those I grew up with. I'm not criticizing, but instead, I'm stating the obvious.

There is no father in most Black homes, no sperm donor sitting at the head of the table, speaking of how the Resurrection defined our lives.

There is no bible in the house; few children know the Old Testament from the New. They know little of Jesus other than he was a leader of Jews (if they see that distinction) who was crucified for

speaking against the Vietnam War. According to the Pew report, over 70% of Americans identify with a religion—including atheism. Seventy-nine percent of Black folks claim to be Christians (by a generic definition), and about half go to church at least once a year. More truthfully, only 44% of White Americans say they are Christian, according to the PRRI research. I make that racial emphasis be-

cause I would assume far fewer Black Americans are practicing Christians, and even among them, it is a polluted membership. Most of us have challenged or amended scripture. We don't take the Bible—particularly the Old Testament—literally. And more offensively, we don't follow the 'Word' or commandments that interrupt our lifestyles. Lie or dispute this if you want, but if you're honest, you admit to sinful activities from having sex

outside of marriage, lying (white or black), stealing (even something insignificant or your taxes), and cheating on...well...anything. Conversely, I find it hard to believe half of White Americans are Christians. Imagine, if that was the case 400 years ago, we would not have had slavery. Sunday morning, then and now, would not be the most segregated time in this country. If the majority of Whites were true Christians, we would not

have needed a civil rights movement or affirmative action.

If the majority were true Christians, Donald Trump would not have been elected...Twice!

I'm one of the few brothers who acknowledge my religious inconsistencies. Some suggest I'm more a deist than a full-fledged Christian, even though I attend services at two churches.

But I justify my position because I study daily and know more about theology than most, including the many households and individuals who attend services because it's PC.

I have read more than those who attended church to show off their attire or be seen.

That said, I understand the importance of spirituality, if not religion, in Black households. Most religions, particularly Christianity, bring order, structure, and a connectedness with God by any name or essence.

As a long-time board member of Messmer Catholic High School, I can attest to the positive impact of Christian intervention and salvation.

I'm not suggesting we all become 'practicing' Christians. I don't care if you're a Zen Buddhist. I appreciate Muslims because they are more spiritually inclined and civil. I believe all religions are branches on a tree.

The bottom line is that we need spiritual structure, and those who believe in the tenets of the 'Golden Rule,' Ten Commandments, or the 42 Negative Confessions provide the solution.

TECHNOLOGY USE MAY BE ASSOCIATED WITH A LOWER RISK FOR DEMENTIA, STUDY FINDS

(CNN) — With the first generation of people exposed widely to technology now approaching old age, how has its use affected their risk of cognitive decline?

That's a question researchers from two Texas universities sought to answer in a new meta-analysis study, a review of previous studies, published Monday in the journal Nature Human Behavior. The query investigates the "digital dementia hypothesis," which argues that lifetime use may increase reliance on technology and weaken cognitive abilities over time.

"We say a really active brain in youth and midlife is a brain that is more resilient later," said Dr. Amit Sachdev, medical director of the department of neurology and ophthalmology at Michigan State University, who wasn't involved in the study.

But the authors discovered that the digital dementia hypothesis may not bear out: Their analysis of 57 studies totaling 411,430 older adults found technology use was associated with a 42% lower risk of cognitive impairment, which was defined as a diagnosis of mild cognitive impairment or dementia, or as sub-

par performance on cognitive tests.

Forms of technology included computers, smartphones, internet, email, social media or "mixed/multiple uses," according to the new study.

"That these effects were found in studies even when factors like education, income, and other lifestyle factors were adjusted was also encouraging: the effect doesn't seem just due to other brain health factors," co-lead study author Dr. Jared Benge, associate professor in the department of neurology at the University of Texas at Austin's Dell Medical School, said via email.

The authors searched eight databases for studies published through 2024, and the 57 chosen for their main analysis included 20 studies that followed participants for about six years on average and 37 cross-sectional studies, which measure health data and outcomes at one point in time. The adults were age 68 on average at the beginning of the studies.

While technology use was generally linked with a lower risk of cognitive decline, the findings for social media use were inconsistent, the authors said.

None of the 136 studies the authors reviewed overall reported an increased risk of cognitive impairment correlated with technology use — a consistency

EMERGENCY HOUSING VOUCHER PROGRAM FACES COLLAPSE, THREATENING TENS OF THOUSANDS ESCAPING HOMELESSNESS, ABUSE

A federal housing program credited with stabilizing the lives of tens of thousands of Americans fleeing homelessness, domestic violence, or human trafficking is running out of time and money.

The Emergency Housing Voucher (EHV) program, which supports more than 60,000 households across the country, is expected to exhaust its funding by the end of 2025, according to a letter from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The potential loss of this support could drive many back into unsafe living conditions, shelters, or the streets.

"To have it stop would completely upend all the progress that they've made," said Sonya Acosta, a policy analyst at the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities. "And then you multiply that by 59,000 households."

Launched in 2021 under President Joe Biden's American Rescue Plan Act, the program was seeded with \$5 billion to help individuals and families exit crises.

From New York to Florida to Texas, the EHV program has placed thousands in safe, stable housing—many of them seniors, children, and veterans. The program was intended to last through the decade, but rising rent prices have accelerated its depletion.

Last month, HUD formally advised public housing agencies to prepare for the worst. "Manage your EHV program with the expectation that no additional funding from HUD will be forthcoming," HUD officials wrote.

The message is clear: without Congressional intervention, the program will end. Representative Maxine Waters (D-Calif.), who championed the initiative in Congress, is calling for an \$8 billion funding boost.

But advocates are warning that the request faces strong headwinds in a Republican-led Congress focused on cutting spending. GOP lawmakers steering budget talks have so far declined to comment.

"We've been told it's very much going to be an uphill fight," said Kim Johnson of the National Low Income Housing Coalition. For people like Darniris Espinal, the end of the program could be devastating. Espinal and her daughters, aged 4 and

19, live in a three-bedroom apartment in Brooklyn, paying over \$3,000 a month—a cost made possible only through the voucher.

Her journey to that home began with an escape from an abusive marriage in which she was isolated, manipulated, and financially controlled. She quit her job at her husband's urging.

He stopped paying the rent. When eviction notices arrived in early 2021, she owed \$12,000 with no way to pay. It was the Emergency Housing Voucher

program that gave her and her daughters a second chance.

"I gained my worth, my sense of peace, and I was able to rebuild my identity," Espinal told the Associated Press.

She now works and sets aside what she can. But if the funding disappears, she fears losing everything she fought to reclaim.

"That's my fear," she said, "losing control of everything that I've worked so hard for."



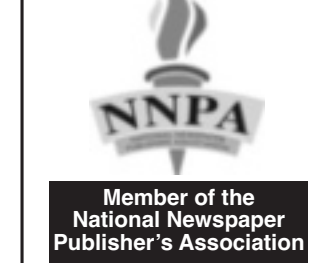

that is “really quite rare,” said co-lead study author Dr. Michael Scullin, professor of psychology and neuroscience at Baylor University, via email.

The research is “a really well-organized and -executed meta-analysis of essentially the entire field over the last 18 years or 20 years,” said Dr. Christopher Anderson, chief of the division of stroke and cerebrovascular diseases at Brigham and Women’s Hospital in Boston. Anderson wasn’t involved in the study.

But if you’re thinking the study’s findings mean you’re free to use technology to your heart’s content since your brain will be fine anyway — not so fast.

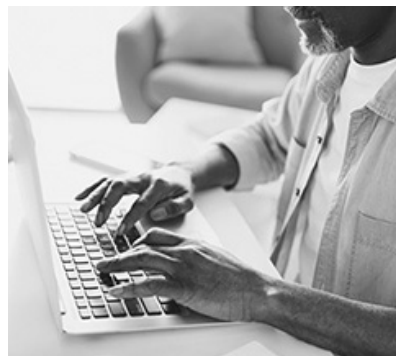
“Our findings are not a blanket endorsement of mindless scrolling,” Bengé, who is also a clinical neuropsychologist at UT Health Austin’s Comprehensive Memory Center, said. “They are instead a hint that the generation that gave us the internet has found ways to get some net positive benefits from these tools to the brain.”

And despite the study’s significance, there are still many uncer-

tainties about the relationships between various aspects of technology use and brain health.

Technology use and the brain

One of the study’s limitations is that it doesn’t have details on how people were using technological devices, experts said. As a result, it’s unclear whether participants were using computers or phones in ways that meaningfully exer-



cised their brains, or what specific way may be most associated with cognitive protection.

Lacking information on the amount of time technology was used means it’s also unknown whether there is harmful threshold or if only a little time is needed for cognitive benefits, Anderson said.

These questions are difficult “to try to answer, because the sheer

volume of technology exposures that we have to navigate is so high,” Sachdev said. “To isolate one technology exposure and its effect is difficult, and to measure just a whole ecosystem of technology exposures and ... their aggregate effect is also a challenge.”

Additionally, “the amount that we can extrapolate from this study towards future generations is very

Their brains were also already well formed, Bengé said.

The study may support the alternative to the digital dementia hypothesis, which is the cognitive reserve theory. The theory “contends that exposure to complex mental activities leads to better cognitive well-being in older age,” even in the face of age-related brain changes, according

adults who are using technology may already have more active and resilient brains, explaining their engagement with technology.

Managing your technology use

Inferences on best practices for technology use in consideration of cognitive health can’t be drawn from the study since it didn’t have specifics on participants’ use

decline.”

Engaging in moderation is best, Sachdev said. And that should largely bring joy, genuine connection, creativity and intellectual stimulation to your life, experts said.

“It should be productive in some way,” he added, and entertaining yourself can sometimes meet that requirement. But if you’re experiencing eye or neck strain from sitting in front of a screen, that’s a sign you’re using technology too much.

“Too much of anything can be a bad thing,” Sachdev said. “Identifying the purpose and the duration and then executing along those lines is how we would advise for most topics.”

Some older adults have avoided technology use, thinking it’s too difficult to learn.

But Scullin and others have found even people with mild dementia can be trained to use such devices, he said.

Though sometimes frustrating, the difficulty “is a reflection of the mental stimulation afforded through learning the device,” Scullin added.

unclear, given the ubiquity of technology today that people are exposed to and have been exposed to from their birth,” Anderson said.

“When you think about the kind of technology that this cohort would’ve been interacting with earlier in their lives, it’s a time when you had to really work to use technology,” Anderson added.

That technology may reduce risk of cognitive decline by helping us be more neurologically active is possible, Sachdev said. Technology use can also foster social connection in some instances, and social isolation has been linked with greater odds of developing dementia.

It’s also possible that older

habits, experts said.

But “it does support that a healthy mix of activities is likely to be the most beneficial, and that fits with other literature on the topic as well,” Anderson said.
