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A Legend of Black Politics in Harlem and Beyond, Congressman Charlie Rangel Dies at 94

Charlie Rangel, the long-term Congressman and a heavyweight in New York politics as a member of Harlem's "Gang of Four," has died at 94. His colorful and charismatic personality, bowties, and raspy voice made him a character on Capitol Hill who was impossible to forget.

Rangel was simultaneously larger than life but also approachable and engaging. Rangel was the last living member of the "Gang of Four" made up of powerful African American leaders in New York: David Dinkins (1927-2020), Basil Paterson (1946-2014), and Percy Sutton (1920-2009).

The four dealmakers were powerbrokers at a time when political decisions were made in smoke-filled rooms over poker games. In 2010, President Obama suggested that Rangel resign from Congress "with dignity" after he was targeted by an ethics investigation that would eventually mean he had to give up the Chairmanship of the Ways & Means Committee.

"This guy from Lenox Avenue is retiring with dignity," Rangel would later tell reporters as he departed Congress on his terms and at the time of his choosing.

Rangel ignored Obama and remained in Congress for another six years with an aura that made many forget about the ethics investigation. Before serving Congress, Rangel did about every job in politics that existed. In 1961, Rangel was appointed by Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy to be an Assistant U.S. Attorney in the Southern District of New York.

Rangel was also a legal counsel for the New York Housing and Redevelopment Board. Charlie Rangel was born in Harlem in 1930. He would go on to represent one of the most storied parts of Manhattan for 46 years in the U.S. Congress. Along with the late John Conyers, Rangel was also a founding member of the Congressional Black Caucus.

"We all have a large stake in preserving our democracy, but I maintain that those without power in our society, the black, the brown, the poor of all colors, have the largest stake not because we have the most to lose, but because we have worked the hardest, and given the most, for what we have achieved," Rangel once said.

Rangel was the first African American to serve as Chairman of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee. As chair and as a member of the Com-

Ramona Curry knows firsthand about the housing conditions of her neighbors.

That's because Curry was part of a project by the Reclaiming Our Neighborhoods coalition that surveyed the exterior of Milwaukee homes.

The coalition, known as RON, is a partnership between the Milwaukee Christian Center, Muskego Way Forward, Sherman Park Community Association, Clarke Square Neighborhood Initiative, Rooted and Rising Washington Park, Riverworks Development Corp, Near West Side, Amani United, ViA CDC, Walnut Way, Dominican Center and Southside Organizing Center.

The groups work alongside local housing agencies to improve the housing quality in Milwaukee through data-informed, resident-

engaged strategies and actions.

In February, the group released its 2024 Housing Condition report.

The beginning

In 2013, residents in the Sherman Park neighborhood started to inventory housing conditions in a grassroots effort to reclaim their neighborhood.

According to Mabel Lamb, ex-

ecutive director of the Sherman Park Community Association, the RON coalition is the brainchild of Fred Curzan, the group's former executive director.

"He had the long-term vision of surveying homes and helping improve housing conditions," Lamb said.

What the coalition does

Since its origin, the RON coal-

ition has slowly grown into an alliance of 12 neighborhood organizations, supported by a coalition of public, nonprofit and philanthropic partners.

Every month, partners from every neighborhood, other organizations, the city and anyone who wants to join meet and share information on housing conditions,

REV. WILLIE BRISCO A Lifelong Social Justice Advocate

Rev. Willie Brisco acknowledges that the life he envisioned for himself is not the life he has lived.

With dreams of becoming a journalist or author of some of the greatest books ever written, he ended up exchanging a writing pen to become an advocate for social justice.

"After my mother 'rescued' us from the South in search of a better life and educational opportunities, I quickly realized that I had an interest in and duty to promote social

justice for my people. On every level, I began to understand how different we (African Americans) were and how we were treated differently

when he was two years old, leaving his mother to raise him and his siblings alone.

"I thought living on the farm was the greatest life ever, not

a single parent, she wanted better for us.

"To this day, I endeavor to make her proud and let her know that I appreciate what she did and why she did it," said Rev. Brisco.

His mother left the Brisco children for a year and moved North to set up residence in Detroit, after which they were bused off to reunite with her. The family spent a year in Detroit, before moving to Milwaukee.

"Detroit was a cultural shock for us. We went from attending a segregated school in the South to desegregated schools and neighborhoods. General Motors was a boom-

Born on a farm in Sardis, Mississippi, across from the Tallahassee River, Rev. Brisco's parents divorced

realizing how limited my choices and chances were growing up as a Black man. We never lacked food or the necessities. My mother realized those limitations and, as

ing business and Motown Records was in its heyday. The city was bustling with energy—good and bad. “When I completed the seventh grade, my mother moved us to Milwaukee where life wasn’t so fast paced, the neighborhoods were less crowded and the people were more friendly. This is where we planted our roots,” said Rev. Brisco.

After graduating from North Division High School, Rev. Brisco attended the University of WI-Madison.

Along the way, he witnessed and experienced several incidences of overt and covert racism.

Ultimately absorbing everything that he could, he made a commitment to himself that those racist encounters would no longer embarrass him, and that he would take a stand

against racism and injustice. Rev. Brisco worked on the shipping dock for about ten years before he received an unexpected opportunity to apply for a job with the House of Corrections (HOC).

“This job had nothing to do with writing or broadcast journalism. It was not in my plans. After completing the training, on my second night at the HOC I stopped, looked up and said, “God what did I get myself into?”

More than 23 years later, upon my retirement I walked through that same razor wire path and God spoke to my heart and said, “You’ve seen what I wanted you to see. Now do something about it.”

“I witnessed racism and how the law treats people unequally. I saw how our people have inept legal reputation.

“I also saw some of the most talented, gifted people housed

there; men who just couldn’t get it together.

They needed role models to help them be the artists, electricians, or mathematicians,

that they should have become.

The lack of opportunity, mental illness and substance abuse brought them into the system and a lifestyle from which they could not escape.

Throughout my time there, I tried to make sure that everyone was treated fair and

equally, and that I would stand as an example,” said Rev. Brisco.

During his tenure at the HOC, Rev. Brisco said that he

in God and belief, I’ve learned to press forward, with God as my guide,” said Rev. Brisco.

he ever received came from Richard Cox, former Superintendent of the HOC, who told him, “You can’t save everybody. You have a gift and you can use it to help people. You can push people forward, but you won’t be able to save everyone.”

Rev. Brisco said the best advice he can give to other men is “wherever you are, whatever you do, you have an obligation to pour into another man in order to defeat what comes against us as a people—a friend, brother, acquaintance or church member.”

In the end, Rev. Brisco said that he wants his legacy to be, that “I failed and fell down, but I always got up. I dusted myself off and moved higher. I took an imperfect life and strove toward perfection. I am still striving until my last breath,” he said.

programs and resources. Each partner organization recruits residents to conduct parcel surveys, paying and training them to survey the exterior conditions of homes.

The group has released multiple housing condition reports and expanded its work to include rental property residents. The coalition continues to share and create resources that aid in improving the quality of homes in Milwaukee.

Dawn Hutchison-Weiss, consultant to the steering committee, said the group went from a budget of \$20,000 in the first year to a current budget of \$500,000.

Community centered
Curry is a proud Lindsay Heights resident.

As an active leader, she got involved with RON after being sent to training by her neighborhood organization Walnut Way.

In 2023, she started helping hand out housing surveys in Lindsay Heights.

“I am very proud of the work we were able to accomplish,” Curry said. “Conducting surveys in our community made us more aware of the conditions of our neighborhood and allowed us to get to know neighbors we didn’t know.”

Curry is one of hundreds of neighborhood residents who worked with neighborhood organizations to collect surveys.

Organizations use the data collected to better serve neighborhoods.

Patrick Humpal, the data and logistics director at VIA CDC, said the organization uses the data

collected to inform how they serve neighbors.

“It helps us identify which homeowners may need a particular resource or where in our community might have multiple people who need resources,” he said. “It also allows us to show how homeownership impacts communities.”

VIA CDC has worked with RON since 2022.

Barriers
While RON is efficient in its work, it’s not without its challenges.

One barrier, which Amanda Clark, the housing coordinator at Dominican Center pointed out, is providing residents with resources once they know what issues they have.

“It’s helpful to tell someone what work they need,” she said. “It’s unhelpful when you can’t tell that person where to get the assistance they need” for the work.

She said there simply aren’t enough funds.

In its monthly meetings, the coalition connects its partner organizations to other groups across the city doing housing work and provides resources that can help the communities they serve.

Lamb agreed that more funding is needed because the coalition pays residents for their work.

Another challenge, she said, is working with investors or homeowners who are sometimes unwilling to collaborate.

“We’ve had folks tell us that it’s not like Sherman Park is the crown jewel of Milwaukee,” she said. “Some people don’t feel that

the city of Milwaukee deserves good housing.”

What’s next
At a recent Zoning Committee meeting, RON asked members for support in advocating for safe, healthy living conditions across Milwaukee neighborhoods.

Neighborhood groups have already begun reaching out to property owners in their prospective communities to inform them about the work needed on their properties and to create a plan for them.

Adrian Spencer, deputy director of Rooted & Rising Washington Park, said her group has received a great response from local homeowners but not from bigger conglomerates.

“The landlords and property owners that live in these neighborhoods want to see things get better and have been very willing to work with and partner with agencies like ours,” she said. “And we want to help them get good tenants in their homes and protect their properties.”

But, she said, more assistance is needed.

“We still need support like change in legislation and change in ordinances,” she said. “Things that will allow those investment property owners to be held accountable at a higher burden than an owner occupant.”

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mittee, Rangel played a central role in shaping U.S. tax legislation.

He advocated for progressive tax reform, closing corporate loopholes, and increasing tax equity. Rangel was also a strong supporter of Social Security and Medicare and defended and expanded programs aimed at reducing poverty and supporting working-class families.

The legendary Harlem Congressman also championed federal investment in affordable housing and urban infrastructure, especially for Harlem and other underserved communities.

In a noteworthy policy move, Rangel also pushed to reinstate the military draft during the Iraq War—not to promote it, but to spark debate on the fairness of who bears the burden of war.


Rangel earned a Purple Heart and a Bronze Star for his

service in the Army during Korea. Rangel served as a member of the New York State Assembly from 1967 to 1971 and went on to defeat another New York political legend—Adam Clayton Powell Jr. in a primary, before winning in the general election in 1970. Rangel retired from Congress in 2016 at 86 years old.

At a time when many are discussing the age of members of Congress and the many who have died in office over the past two years, Rangel was an exception who departed on his terms.

Rangel’s seat in Congress would go to Dominican-born Adriano Espaillat. The moment represented a shift in Harlem’s demographics and the power of the Latino community in the Bronx.

Rangel’s wife Alma Carter, passed away last year. The two met in the 1950s at the famous Savoy Ballroom in Harlem. They married in 1964 and have two children.

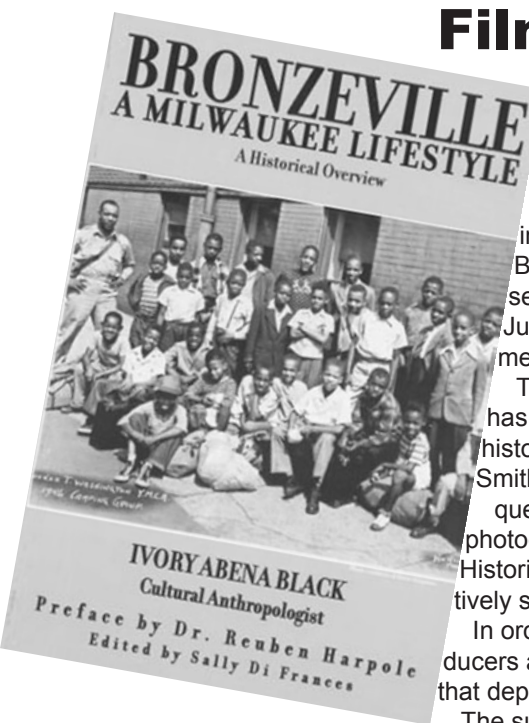

Filmmakers seek old home movies of Black Milwaukee



The Milwaukee County Historical Society is currently producing a television documentary about the history of Milwaukee's Black community. It will start with the arrival of Joe Oliver, who settled here in 1835 to work as a cook for fur trader Solomon Juneau, and continue through the 'Black Lives Matter' movement of today.

The project is led by John Gurda, a writer and historian who has been studying his hometown since 1972, working with Black historians Clayborn Benson III, Reginald Jackson, and Dr. Robert Smith of Marquette University. The documentary will rely heavily on historical photographs from local archives, including the Wisconsin Black Historical Society and Museum, but community input is being actively sought.

In order to give the film an authentic grassroots flavor, the producers are looking for both still photos and especially home movies that depict every life in the Black community in decades past.

The subjects will include backyard barbecues, house parties, birthday celebrations, musical performances, amateur sporting events, graduations, weddings, anniversaries, and anything else that shows what daily life was like in the past.

Movies made before 1990 are of particular interest and a modest honorarium will be paid for images actually used in the documentary.

UW Oshkosh Dedicates First Campus Building Named After an African American Alumnus, Dr. Dorian Boyland

In a historic and heartfelt tribute, the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh officially dedicated Dr. Boyland University Hall earlier this month.

Formerly known as the Multicultural Education Center (MEC), this building becomes the first in the university's history to bear the name of an African American, honoring alumnus Dr. Dorian Boyland—a former Major League Baseball player, successful entrepreneur, and dedicated humanitarian.

This milestone is particularly significant as it marks a rare instance in the state of Wisconsin, where few government buildings are named after African Americans. The dedication underscores UW Oshkosh's commitment to recognizing the contributions of its diverse alumni and promoting inclusivity on campus.

The celebration commenced on May 9, in Milwaukee, where Dr. Boyland hosted a dinner for over 165 guests.

The event featured a keynote address by esteemed scholar and cultural critic Dr. Michael Eric Dyson, followed by a candid roundtable discussion with Dr. Boyland.

Attendees—comprising UWO alumni, members of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., friends who flew in from across the US and other community members—engaged in meaningful dialogue about the challenges faced by African American students during Dr. Boyland's time at the university and the progress made since.

More than 230 individuals recently gathered for the dedication ceremony in Oshkosh. University leaders, including Chancellor Andrew Leavitt, faculty, students, alumni, and Dr. Boyland's family and friends, celebrated the renaming of the building that has long served as a hub for multicultural engagement and support.

"This building was more than just a center," said Dr. Boyland during an interview. It was a sanctuary where we found unity and purpose," Dr. Boyland remarked during the ceremony.

"Renaming it in my honor is a testament to the collective journey and resilience of all who walked through its doors."

To commemorate this historic occasion, Dr. Boyland gifted each attendee dimensional custom crystal keepsak encapsulating the image of Dr. Boyland University Hall—a tangible reminder of the building's enduring legacy and the significance of the moment.

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The 'skin (and hair) game' is alive and well and running amok in the psyches of 'melanated' women (and men)!

For believers in the fallacious construct of multiple races, Black America stands alone as a distinct and separate entity---a tribe of sorts, but not a racial one, since the concept doesn't exist.

By all applications, we are a unique American society, separate and distinct from our African heritage and roots. My two DNA tests confirmed that I am 18% 'White,' and I know my slave ancestor didn't willingly have sex with her big-toted 'massa.'

It would be more appropriate to call us 'Colored' --- various shades of brown and tan --- than dark chocolate.

Our Motherland sisters and brothers are generally far darker than us.

And, according to smell and identification, we are American

or Eurocentric. During my first sojourn to Afrika, our Milwaukee group ventured into downtown Dakar, Senegal, for drinks after our nine-hour flight.

We stopped at a French café. Passing through a small white fence, we observed a miniature poodle who looked up from his sleep as we passed, only to return to its midday nap.

A few minutes later, as we occupied a table, two African merchants entered the compound to market their goods. Strangely, the dog went berserk, barking and threatening to attack them.

The African merchants retreated.

I asked the waiter why the dogs had let us pass but attacked the local merchants. His response shocked and angered me: "They are bred to attack Africans by smell, but he sensed you were Europeans (based on your smell)."

Thank you for that. Aside from our hue, we were considered European and American. Accept it for what it is, but you can't dismiss it.

In keeping with that premise, many members of the Afri-American tribe work hard to be accepted as 'white.' Or at least non-African.

Most of us---both genders--- have been conditioned to believe in that old adage: 'If you're white, you're alright; you're yellow, you're mellow; if you're brown, stick around; but if you're black, get back.'

Don't disregard my statement; merely take notice that many sisters idolize whiteness at an

early age, demonstrated by the White doll test utilized during the Brown vs. Board of Topeka, Kansas School of Education evidence.

dolls, stressing that black was dirty, nasty, and ugly. It's not hard to figure out why they wear straight-haired Asian wigs or horse hair today.

so out of a desire to emulate those they have been conditioned to idolize: white women.

Hey, don't assassinate the messenger. I'm just saying what I'm saying cause it needs to be said.

I'm not condemning or ridiculing them (Black, weave/wig wearing sistahs). I'm just revealing a cultural fact.

Black male slaves conked their nappy locks with axle grease in a vain attempt to be accepted by the bigoted bosses.

It didn't stop them from being called 'niggers' (n-word), a reference to laziness, savages, and non-human beings.

The first Black millionaire patented straightening combs for the same reason. Jet and Ebony magazine's top advertisers were companies that made skin-whitening creams, also known as the 'Michael Jackson phenomenon.'

Wigs---Indian (jet black) or dog hair---are the most profitable products sold in America to Black---excuse me, 'melanated'---women.

I would be a millionaire today if I had invested my savings in wigs and weaves 30 years ago.

OK, don't get caught up in my fixation on sisters wearing wigs. I will admit I can't get over their attempt to 'look white.' But I have grown to accept them, conditioning my mind to view wigs as 'hair gear' or hats.

Conversely, I have never dated a sister who wore wigs (a personal preference), much less married one. I prefer, in order of personal preference, natural, pressed, shortcut, or even bald.

I want to run my fingers through natural hair without

being cut by a staple, needle, or whatever holds that wig in place.

I received a couple of mindless comments on a recent recent column in which I mentioned the overwhelming majority of Black Republican women at the Republican National Convention were wearing wigs. It was a symbol, I suggested, of their attempt to be accepted by the GOP establishment.

You might suggest they want to look cute. But that 'cute' look they wanted is based on a Eurocentric standard of beauty.

Let me put a cherry on top. If you believe the propaganda of television commercials, 90% of 'Black married couples are bi-racial. For the last decade --- since it became 'popular,' ads selling cereal, toilet paper, or new cars typically consisted of a Black male, a white wife, and two 'mixed' children. What is mixed? Bi-racial? Half-breed?

Since life originated in Africa, every shade is rooted in Blackness.

But in this new PC commercial platform called 'life,' all the girls have long, silky hair, and the boys have wavy hair versus nappy locks.

These marketing strategies tell a new generation what today's generation has already accepted as a cultural icon: We are a tribe that has evolved from African dark chocolate to vanilla chocolate.

And since our women are the first teachers, I assume by 2100, the Black American 'race' will disappear.

BLACK CHICK-FIL-A WORKER CALLED 'APE', THREATENED TO BE 'PUT IN CAGE'

A Black employee at Chick-fil-A has filed a lawsuit alleging that he endured racist abuse from co-workers who called him an "ape" and threatened to be put in a cage.

According to the lawsuit obtained by The Independent, Thomas Wade, a former Chick-fil-A worker in Idaho, faced incessant racial discrimination at the franchise despite filing dozens of complaints to his superiors.

"Of course he works at Chick-fil-A; he's Black, so he loves chicken," one coworker allegedly told Wade.

Wade started working as a cook on the back-of-house crew at a Chick-fil-A in Idaho Falls in December 2022.

During one instance of abuse, Wade attempted to intervene when he saw two of his coworkers, one of whom was the supervisor's son, "antagonizing a third employee," according to the suit.

"In response to his attempts to intervene and diffuse the sit-

WE HAVE BLACK MILWAUKEE'S ATTENTION!

Keisha Lance Bottoms, the charismatic former Atlanta mayor who took on Donald Trump before joining former President Joe Biden's White House, is running for governor of Georgia.

Bottoms made the announcement in a video released Tuesday to social media, in which she recounted her upbringing and willingness to take on Trump.

"These days, most Georgians are right to wonder: Who's looking out for us? Donald Trump is a disaster for our economy and our country. From his failure to address rising prices to giving an unelected billionaire the power to cut Medicare and Social Security—it's one terrible thing after another," Bottoms says in the video.

Bottoms also calls on the need to expand Medicaid and her support for "...first responders like firefighters and police officers, as well as teachers; promises to "crack down on corporate landlords raising prices;" and says her administration would help young people get "better pathways to college or career training," NBC News reports.

During an interview with NBC News, Monday—a day before she would make her announcement—Bottoms said that "Trump 2.0 has been even more catastrophic for our state."

"From the 600,000 people across our state who have jobs that are directly impacted by what's happening in our Port of Savannah and Trump's tariff policies to people being laid off at the CDC, Trump has directly impacted this state, and not in a positive way," she said, referring to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, whose headquarters is in Atlanta.

"Everything that Trump does is impacting us, whether you're looking at your retirement account or you are a CEO who's looking at stock prices fluctuate. He has not been a great president for Georgia," she said.

But before Bottoms can set her eyes on the Thanos of the American

government, she's got to fight an uphill battle in her own backyard. Bottoms won't just be running against the Republican candidate, assuming that she wins the Democratic bid, she'll be running against a rigged system that helped current governor Brian Kemp in office for eight years.

That's because...how shall I say this...Kemp has a history of playing fast and loose with Georgia's votes.

Editor: Don't be shy now, Stephen. Me: Fine, Brian Kemp is a professional Black vote suppresser.

In 2018, as then Georgia's Secretary of State Brian Kemp was running for governor against Georgia darling Stacey Abrams, he was sued for "...suppressing minority votes after an Associated Press investigation revealed a month before November's midterm election that his office has not approved 53,000 voter registrations—most of them filed by African-Americans," PBS reports.

Just a year before he would run for governor, Kemp and his cronies enacted a law that a voter's registration information had to match data from the Department of Motor Vehicles or Social Security Administration. This law disproportionately affected Black and Latino voters and thus legally allowed for their votes not to be counted.

Here's how Michael Harriot explained all the ways Brian Kemp has worked to suppress the Black vote in a piece aptly titled: "The Wizard of Voter Suppression: Brian Kemp's Long History of Making Black Votes Disappear."

Between 2008 until 2012, the state of Georgia struck 750,000 voters from its rolls, according to the Brennan Center for Justice, an unusually high rate of purging, but still within reason.

However, after Kemp got his hands on the state's voting apparatus, he has purged twice as many voters. Kemp has nixed nearly 1.4 million voters from Georgia's books for inane reasons such as missing hyphens, rumors that voters have moved and even misspelled street names. And since he became the Republican nominee for governor, he has doubled down.

One of his biggest weapons is his "exact match" policy. If a voter's reg-

istration doesn't match their DMV records (which often has flawed data), Kemp has mandated that the registration be invalidated. There are reports of voters with hyphenated names being removed from rolls because their registration didn't have the hyphen. Others have been deleted because their addresses were misspelled.

To be fair, when voters sued the state of Georgia about this policy in 2013, noting that it was arbitrary and

not a legal standard, Kemp did stop doing it. Then he simply had the Republican-led state legislature pass a law codifying the exact match system, and continued his purge.

Kemp also uses other methods to get rid of voters. He tosses out the names of people suspected of not being citizens. He purges inactive voters. He kicks out people who didn't serve on jury duty. He uses every imaginable method, and somehow the voters left out are always Black.

Could Georgia Get A Governor Named Keisha?

Before Keisha Lance Bottoms can set her eyes on the Thanos of the American government, she's got an uphill battle in her own backyard.

Let's just say that for the sake of journalism and the excitement of a Black woman running for governor (if elected Bottoms would become the first Black female governor in the history of the United States), that Kemp has a lobotomy and somehow stops throwing away Black votes, which he could easily do from outside the office—Bottoms would also be required to pull all of the votes that Stacey Abrams received during her two failed attempts at governorship, and well, I don't know if that's possible.

I'm not thoroughly entrenched in Georgia politics, but I have eyes and know that I can't remember these two powerful Black Southern women ever being sisters.

Meaning, I don't know if Abrams, a kingmaker and powerhouse in Georgia politics, will stump for Bottoms. And if Bottoms can't pull Abrams voters (Abrams fell only

54,723 votes short in 2018 and close to 300,000 votes in her 2022 bid), then she doesn't have a snowball's chance in hell.

And, Bottoms was a beloved mayor. During her time in Atlanta she "...presided over the city's response to the COVID pandemic and amid the protests (some of which turned violent) in the aftermath of George Floyd's death in Minneapolis police custody, as well as a fatal police shooting in Atlanta around the same time," NBC News reports.

She also publicly pushed back against Kemp's decision to lift COVID restrictions in the state, even battling him in court over city mask mandates. Bottoms is currently the highest-profile candidate to enter the race.

Kenosha Olympian Laborde Wins Senior National Title Ahead of Judo World Championships

Harvard Reaches Historic Settlement Over Earliest Known Photographs of Enslaved Americans

Harvard University will relinquish ownership of the earliest known photographs of enslaved people as part of a historic legal settlement announced Wednesday by nationally renowned civil rights attorney Ben Crump.

The agreement resolves a 2019 lawsuit filed by Tamara Lanier, the great-great-great-granddaughter of an enslaved man known as "Papa Renty," whose image, along with that of his daughter Delia and five others, was captured in 1850 to support racist scientific theories promoted by a Harvard professor.

The 19th-century daguerreotypes, long held by Harvard's Peabody Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology, were commissioned by a Swiss-born biologist Louis Agassiz, a Harvard professor who used the images in a campaign to promote polygenism—the debunked and deeply racist theory that different races have separate origins and that Africans and African Americans are inferior to whites. The photographs

were taken in South Carolina, where Renty and Delia were stripped and posed under duress.

"This is a day of reckoning 175 years in the making," said Josh Koskoff, co-counsel on the case.

"This is not just an unlikely personal victory for the Lanier family; it is also a win for the importance of truth and the power of history at a time when both values are under unprecedented assault."

As part of the settlement, Harvard has agreed to fully relinquish the images to Lanier, who is advocating for their permanent display at the International African American Museum in Charleston, South Carolina—the same state where the pictures were initially taken.

A confidential financial agreement was also reached. "Since Black Americans were first brought to this country in chains, our pain and trauma have been exploited for capitalist gain," said Lanier.

"Harvard played a role in the darkest chapter in American history.

This is a small step in the right direction towards fully acknowledging that history and working to rectify it."

The lawsuit accused Harvard of wrongfully seizing and profiting from the images, charging licensing fees for their use in books and promotional materials, and publicly dismissing Lanier's well-documented genealogical claims.

The Massachusetts Supreme Court ruled in her favor in 2022, stating that "Harvard's present obligations cannot be divorced from its past abuses."

"Papa Renty was taken from his descendants and used to promote a lie – but today, he has finally been returned to the love and care of his family," said Crump.

"This historic settlement is a step forward in the pursuit of justice and a recognition of the pain caused by the dark history of exploiting enslaved people."

"They will be returning to their home state where this all began, and

they will be placed in an institution that can celebrate their humanity," Lanier said.

Wade also found a variation of the n-word written on the kitchen freezer, the complaint states.

According to the complaint, Wade made roughly 25 to 30 reports to Chick-fil-A management about the racist abuse to no avail.

He was fired on October 16, 2023, "because [he] refused to tolerate and continued to report racist behavior and comments by his coworkers," the complaint states.

The owner of the franchise, Lauren Mosteller, Inc. of Woodstock, Georgia, responded to the allegations in court earlier this month, denying "each and every."

Wade's lawsuit seeks to hold the franchisee accountable for discrimination, hostile work environment, retaliation, and intentional infliction of emotional distress.

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True Unemployment Rate Soars Past 24% — Black Workers Hit Hardest

Despite federal reports suggesting a stable labor market, new data from the Ludwig Institute for Shared Economic Prosperity (LISEP) reveals a far grimmer reality for American workers—particularly Black and Hispanic Americans.

The institute's April report on the True Rate of Unemployment (TRU) shows a functional unemployment rate of 24.3%, compared to the official Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) figure of 4.2%. The numbers mark the third consecutive month that functional unemployment has surpassed 24%, according to LISEP, which defines functional unemployment as the combined total of those without jobs, those unable to secure full-time employment, and those earning poverty-level wages—less than \$20,000 per year adjusted for inflation. "We are facing a job market where nearly one in four workers are functionally unemployed, and current trends show little sign of improvement," said LISEP Chair Gene Ludwig. "The harsh reality is that far too many Americans are still struggling to make ends meet."

Racial and gender disparities remain wide. Black workers saw a 1.4 percentage point increase in their TRU to 26.7%, while White workers experienced a slight decrease to 23%. The rate for Hispanic workers climbed to 28.2%, maintaining the highest among reported groups. A persistent gender gap also emerged in the data: functional unemployment for men rose to 20%, while women—though showing a slight improvement—still face a significantly higher rate at 28.6%.

Beyond labor force disparities, BLS statistics further indicate a disproportionate impact on Black Americans.

The unemployment rate for Black men remains at 6.3%, more than double that of White men. Meanwhile, since September, approximately 181,000 Black women have dropped out of the labor force entirely, even as participation rates among women of other racial groups have increased. The origins of this exodus stretch back to 2020 when millions of working mothers—particularly women of color—left the workforce amid the collapse of childcare infrastructure during the COVID-19 pandemic. Many have yet to return due to ongoing issues with affordability and accessibility.

LISEP's white paper, "Measuring Better," outlines significant flaws in headline economic indicators such as GDP and BLS unemployment rates, labeling them misleading and outdated. Instead, LISEP advocates for measures that reflect the lived economic realities of most Americans—particularly those in working- and middle-class communities that have long been left behind by policy and prosperity. According to the paper, the methodology behind TRU includes only those working full-time and earning above poverty wages as "employed." It excludes part-time workers who would prefer full-time employment and those earning less than \$20,000 per year. This approach, LISEP argues, provides policymakers with a more accurate understanding of economic well-being and informs better decision-making for resource allocation. "The public would be well served by a commitment from economic policymakers to adopt a stable course of action, based on real-world metrics, that better serves the interests of working Americans," Ludwig said.—Stacy M. Brown
