Reverend and Brother Jesse Louis Jackson, Sr. A Civil Rights Icon! Freedom Fighter and Friend to Humanity

I was touched deeply by the loss of Reverend and fellow Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Brother Jesse Louis Jackson Sr. (It's why at times throughout this article, I refer to him as 'Brother Jackson.')

While the world remembers and pays homage to one of the last great Civil Rights Icons and globally recognized drum major for peace and justice, I also remember him as a friend and gift to humanity.

Over the years, I had the honor to engage with Rev. Jackson on many occasions. I have always been in awe of his energy and willingness to extend his right hand to help make the crooked roads straight for poor people and bring justice to those who have been impacted by an unjust system.

I remember communicating with Rev. Jackson and his team during the civil unrest in Kenosha after the shooting of Jacob Blake. Without hesitation, in the midst of the COVID 19 Pandemic and despite his own health, Brother Jackson said he would come to Kenosha, and he came.

He did not just come one time, Brother Jackson came on an ongoing basis and even led marches with the Blake Family and other leaders like Greg Bennett, Dr. Kweku Amoasi and Lena Taylor, until the civil unrest

ceased. Furthermore, Rev. Jackson came back to Kenosha to support the rebuilding of Kenosha.

Of the many occasions that I had the honor of spending with Brother Jackson, one of my favorite moments was after a long day of marching and meetings in Kenosha, he looked over at me and Rashawn Jackson (another Omega brother) and said, "Brother Williams, I am hungry." I then asked, "What do you have a taste for?"

He said, "Do y'all have a Cracker Barrel?" I said, "Yes sir, it's about five minutes away." Brother Jackson said, "Let's go!" Off we went for a late evening dinner at Cracker Barrel.

As you can imagine, when we walked in, everyone in Cracker Barrel was looking like, 'Is that Reverend Jackson who just walked in and eating with us at Cracker Barrel?'

But what was more impressive was during the approximately two hours we spent at the restaurant, Re-

shaw and I felt as if we were two sons breaking bread with our father or mentor who was providing knowledge and guidance to navigate the obstacles and challenges of life and world affairs.

We discussed the need to understand the politics and 'poli-tricks' in order to continue to improve the overall conditions of disenfranchised people here in Kenosha, the U.S. and all over the world.

Rashawn and I sat there listening and realizing the power of the moment. We were literally sitting there with Rev. Jackson, 'A Giant,' in a masterclass being taught by the man himself!

It reminded me of a stanza from Rudyard Kipling's poem "If": "If you can talk with crowds and keep your virtue, or walk with kings—nor lose the common touch..."

During that time at Cracker Barrel, we talked about everything from school and the power of education, fraternity business, civil unrest, to civil rights then and now.

But most heartfelt, Brother Jackson was truly concerned about us personally and professionally. Furthermore, he extended the right hand of friendship and comradeship as well as his personal influence and resources to help us in the future.

Shortly after this experience, I, along with Dr. Kweku Amoasi and other Omega brothers met with Brother Jackson at Operation Rainbow Push (ORP). He was as gracious and humble as he was at the Cracker Barrel in Kenosha. During our visit, we joined as members of ORP. Brother Jackson then gave us a book, a shirt, a pin, and a picture. He even took the time to sign each item for all of us.

On another occasion, I was invited and honored to stand with the Reverend during a press conference supporting the Family of Brother Jelani Day at Operation Rainbow Push.

While there, I, along with Brother Rashawn helped pass out food to the needy. Rashawn even presented Rev. Jackson with a copy of his book. Later, I was again honored to be invited to the Reverend's 82nd Birthday Party, where I did some of the photography.

Hence, the passing of Reverend and Brother Jackson 'hit' a little different.

In that spirit, I, along with Omega men from around the world, was honored to attend, participate and photograph our Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Memorial Celebrating the life and legacy of Reverend and Brother Jesse Louis Jackson Sr. He was truly a brother who lived and defined our Omega Cardinal Principles of 'Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance and Uplift!'

MPS Superintendent eyes non-classroom layoffs, \$30 Million in savings!

By Benjamin Yount, article courtesy of The Center Square via newsbreak.com Milwaukee's school superintendent says she can save tens of millions of dollars by cutting hundreds of non-classroom jobs.

Superintendent Brenda Cassellius plans to ask the city's school board to cut more than 260 positions in the next Milwaukee Public School budget.

The savings could net \$30 million.

"Protecting classrooms and supporting high-quality instruction remains our top priority throughout this budget process," Cassellius said.

"These changes will be hard, but by reducing positions outside the classroom amid our budget challenges, we can put more resources where they matter most: in the classroom."

Many of the layoffs that Cassellius is eyeing are vacancies.

In addition to protecting classroom teachers, Cassellius' plan would also protect counselors, social workers, psychologists and nurses.

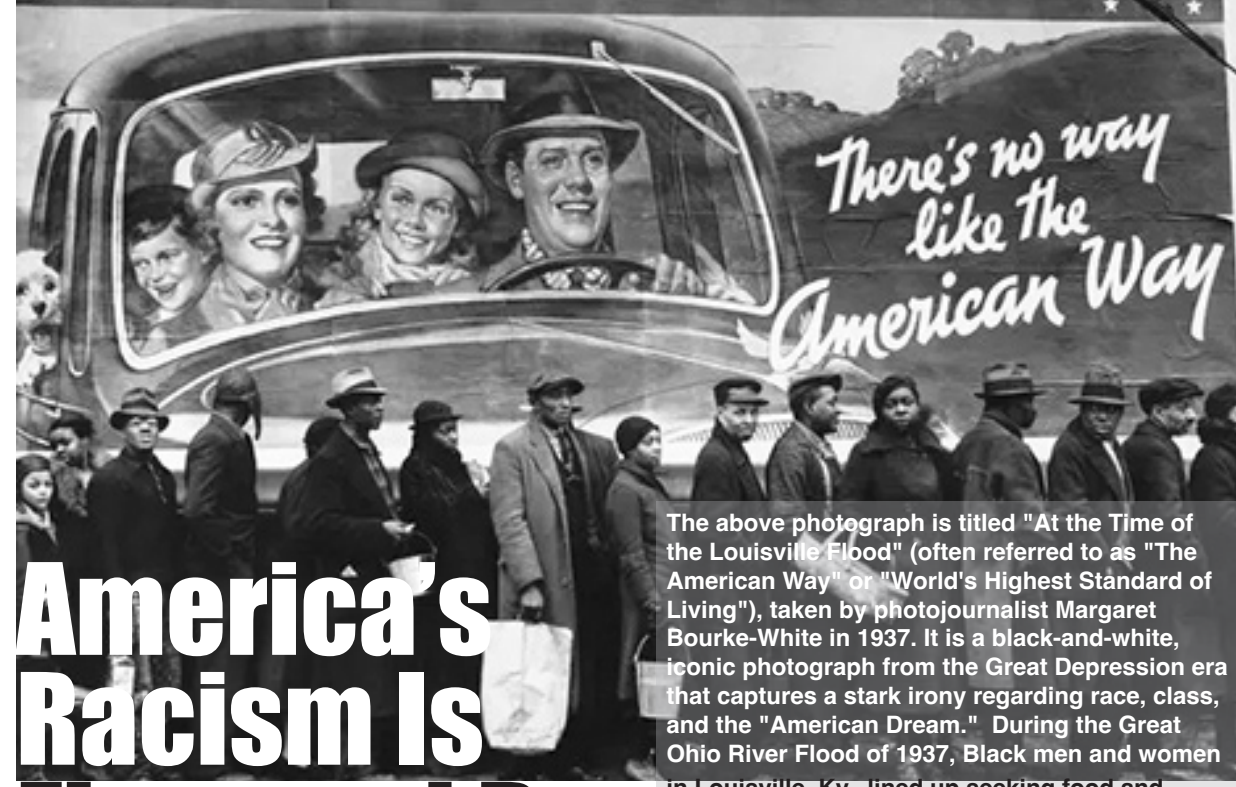
"Recently completed financial audits confirmed the structural deficit, including a \$46 million gap at the end of last school year," Cassellius' office said in a statement.

While classroom teachers would be protected in Cassellius' plan. Central office workers would not be.

"The approximately 263 position reductions include about 116 positions from the offices

America's Racism Is Financed By Black Fees!

Since the start of slavery, racism has cost Black Americans an estimated \$70 trillion over the course of several generations.

Black Americans face a staggering wealth gap. The Brookings Institute estimates that in 2016, a typical Black family had \$17,150 in accumulated wealth, while a typical white family had \$171,000 — nearly 10 times more wealth than Black families.

"Enslaved Africans built the infrastructure of

this country, and the production of cotton in the South laid the foundation for America's economic prosperity," wrote Julia Craven for Vox News on the nation's racial wealth gap. "America's 'Black taxes' are a glimpse into the ways our capital has been demanded, despite our labor never being properly compensated."

A 'Black Tax' is the financial cost of conscious and unconscious anti-black discrimination, which creates a massive financial burden on Black American households that dramatically reduces their ability to leave a substantial legacy for future generations.

For centuries, Black Americans were excluded from major government-sponsored wealth-building tools. In the 1890s, poll taxes were levied to prevent Black people from casting ballots.

By excluding domestic and farm workers, the 1935 Social Security Act excluded 60% of Black Americans. In 1944, despite being federally mandated, the G.I. Bill was executed at the local level and was stymied by redlining and racist housing covenants. (Eventually, that evolved into balloon loans.)

Today, the racial wealth gap can be seen in all areas of life — representation, homeownership, wages, education, business ownership, and more.

Craven writes the disparity in wealth "could be alleviated by paying reparations. Or by taxing the wealthy, not to mention multibillion-dollar corporations."

The cost of the Black Tax also shows up in car insurance premiums that run higher in Black ZIP codes even when a resident's driving record is spotless.

It's in the mortgage rate that comes back steeper for a high-income Black homeowner than for a low-income white one. It pops up in the Black neighborhoods with payday lenders instead of banks and dollar stores instead of supermarkets.

It is a pricing infrastructure built on top of a century of deliberate exclusion that created the exact conditions the current overcharge depends on. And it shows up across every industry, at

every income level, and at every stage of life.

Aside from payday lenders, insurance companies, banks, dollar store chains, and rent-to-own shops also benefit from the Black tax.

They've built a business model around moving into neighborhoods that mainstream institutions either abandoned or never entered and by charging the most to communities with the fewest alternatives.



Every dollar of the overcharge flows in the same direction — out of Black neighborhoods and into corporate balance sheets that have never invested a single dollar back. The extraction isn't incidental to these business models. In many cases it is the business model.

And who absorbs the cost?

Every Black person making a financial trans-

action in America. For example, a Black family losing \$4,000 annually to excess pricing across insurance, lending, and groceries loses \$120,000 over 30 years.

That's a down payment, a college fund, or the beginning of something to pass down. Plus, that calculation doesn't account for the compounding costs of being steered toward inferior financial products at every major life milestone.

"Every dollar of the overcharge flows in the same direction — out of Black neighborhoods and into corporate balance sheets that have never invested a single dollar back. The extraction isn't incidental to these business models. In many cases it is the business model. And who absorbs the cost? Every Black person making a financial transaction in America."

The Black tax doesn't just drain wallets; it closes doors, then tells Black families the gap exists because they didn't budget hard enough, invest early enough, or negotiate well enough.

It turns structural extraction into personal blame, suggests the problem is discipline rather than design, and places the blame on people rather than policy.

U.S. capitalism treats inequality as opportunity. After all, it grew wealth through slavery, land theft, segregation, and Black dispossession.

Today's higher premiums, lower appraisals, and predatory lending are updated versions of that same logic.

In a system built to maximize profit, companies are rewarded for charging whatever they can get away with.

Meanwhile, Black communities, burdened by generations of disinvestment, become prime targets.

The companies charging it call it standard practice, while regulators approving it call it the market, and politicians who could stop it call it complicated. Nobody calls it what it is: legalized theft.

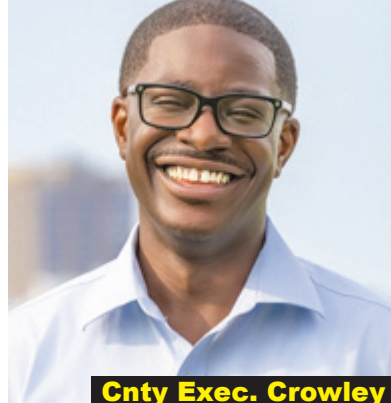
Abolishing the Black tax means dismantling the pricing systems and profit incentives that reward racialized extraction.

It means shifting power over land, credit, and capital into community control so Black wealth is no longer mined for profit and is instead passed down on our own terms.

Cnty Exec. Crowley wants board to pass law upholding MKE County's climate commitments amid fed rollbacks

County Executive David Crowley recently urged the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors to approve legislation reaffirming the County's commitment to the principles and goals of the Paris Agreement that promotes environmental sustainability, with the goal of combatting the global climate crisis.

The resolution also supports the scientific basis of the 2009 Greenhouse Gas Endangerment Finding that determined greenhouse gases pose a threat to public health and welfare, thereby providing the scientific and legal foundation for regulating emissions to mitigate climate change.

The proposed County Board resolution, authored by Milwaukee County Board Chairwoman Marcella Nicholson-Bovell and Supervisor Anne O'Connor, comes in response to recent federal rollbacks in climate policies and investments.

"In Milwaukee County, we know that the climate crisis is a real, pressing threat to our environment, our economy, our health, and our quality of life," said County Executive Crowley.

"In reaffirming our commitment to the Paris Agreement and Greenhouse Gas Endangerment Finding, we are standing with science and facts to achieve net zero carbon emissions by 2050, while advancing equity, justice, and resilience throughout our community.

"Looking ahead, my administration will continue implementing our Milwaukee County Climate Action Plan to promote clean energy, improve health conditions, create jobs, and combat the climate crisis in Wisconsin."

"Milwaukee County continues leading the way in the march toward a more environmentally sustainable community," said Chairwoman Nicholson-Bovell.

"As we celebrate Women's His-

tory Month and the trailblazing efforts that women around the globe advance to promote environmental, economic, and social sustainability, we recognize that our work is far from over.

"That's why I introduced this legislation recommitting Milwaukee County to the Paris Agreement and Greenhouse Gas Endangerment Finding: Because our children's future depends on how we combat the climate crisis and build the equitable future we all deserve."

"Milwaukee County has a responsibility to lead with evidence and long-term thinking when it comes to protecting our environment and public health," said Supervisor O'Connor.

"This resolution reaffirms that our decisions will continue to be guided by science and by our commitment to future generations.

"By standing behind the principles of the Paris Agreement and the scientific findings that support regulating greenhouse gas emissions, we are ensuring Milwaukee County remains a strong, steady voice for climate action and environmental stewardship."

Milwaukee County first committed to the goals and principles of the Paris Agreement in 2017, following an initial federal withdrawal.

In 2021, Chairwoman Nicholson-Bovell introduced legislation directing the Milwaukee County Office of

Sustainability to adopt goals to reach net-zero operational emissions by 2050 and administer a strategic plan to do so.

In response to this, County Executive Crowley signed into law the Milwaukee County Climate Action 2050 (CA50) Plan that is aimed at achieving net-zero carbon emissions in Milwaukee County operations by the year 2050, marking a significant step forward in the County's commitment to environmental sustainability and stewardship.

Under the leadership of County Executive Crowley and Chairwoman Nicholson-Bovell, Milwaukee County has already reduced operational greenhouse gas emissions by more than 46% from 2005 levels, reinforcing the County's longstanding leadership on climate action.

"Milwaukee County's progress is the result of years of strategic partnership, technical analysis, and a clear mandate to protect our residents from the impacts of climate change through reducing emissions," said Grant Helle, Director, Milwaukee County Office of Sustainability.

"Reaffirming our commitments is not symbolic, but rather a necessary step to safeguard public health and continue advancing climate mitigation efforts.

"Our team remains dedicated to administering the CA50 Plan and implementing innovative emissions reduction strategies that position Milwaukee County as a leader."

In the year ahead, Milwaukee County will unveil a public dashboard to track and share ongoing emissions reduction progress.

By reaffirming its alignment with global climate goals and upholding the scientific foundation for greenhouse gas regulation, the County continues to lead with urgency, transparency and a clear vision for a more equitable and sustainable future.



Acts Housing Completes \$26.4 Million Capital Campaign

Transformational Opening Doors Campaign is Reshaping Local Housing Landscape and Expanding Homeownership

Nonprofit Acts Housing today announced it reached its \$26.4 million fundraising goal for its Opening Doors Campaign, which launched in 2022.

The transformational capital campaign aims to reshape the local housing landscape and expand homeownership opportunities, especially for families with low to moderate incomes.

Acts Housing provides homebuyer and financial education and coaching, lending and real estate services, and home rehab coaching to aspiring homebuyers with income, credit, language, and other barriers.

"This was Acts Housing's first large fundraising campaign, and its success will open the doors to homeownership for hundreds of additional families every single year. Homeownership not only creates a foundation for a family, but at this scale will

strengthen entire neighborhoods," said Acts Housing President & CEO Michael Gosman.

Campaign contributions funded the nonprofit's initiative to increase the supply of affordable housing through a \$10+ million Acts Homes acquisition fund.

Launched in 2023, Acts Homes buys, rehabs in partnership with local contractors, and sells affordable homes to owner-occupants who have completed homebuyer education classes from Acts or other HUD-certified agencies. To date, Acts Homes has purchased and rehabbed more than 100 homes in Milwaukee.

Donations raised also funded the expansion of Acts Lending, established in 2013 to provide mortgage loans to families unable to qualify for traditional financing.

The Opening Doors Campaign adds \$14 million to the Acts Lending loan fund which will help at least 1,000 more families become homeowners during the next 10 years. Additional funds raised support the operations of these programs.

Community-Wide Support and Investment The Opening Doors Campaign garnered community-wide interest, support, and investment from local corporations, foundations, governments, and individuals. This includes three grants from the Zilber Family Foundation (\$2.75MM total), \$ 2.5MM from Milwaukee County, and a leadership donation

of Academics; Communications; Family, Community, and Partnership; Finance; Human Resources; Operations; Schools office; and the Superintendent's office," the superintendent's office said.

"About 147 positions, including assistant principals, deans of students, and implementers."

Casselius will ask the school board to support her plan during a special school board meeting on Monday, but her layoffs proposal is already facing opposition.

Milwaukee's teachers union, the Milwaukee Teachers Education Association, says it doesn't want to see any job cuts.

"No rank-and-file worker should face the possibility of losing their job, and the board should not blindly trust this administration to act in the best interest of MPS students," President Ingrid Walker-Henry said.

The union has asked for a specific, job-by-job list of positions that could be cut.

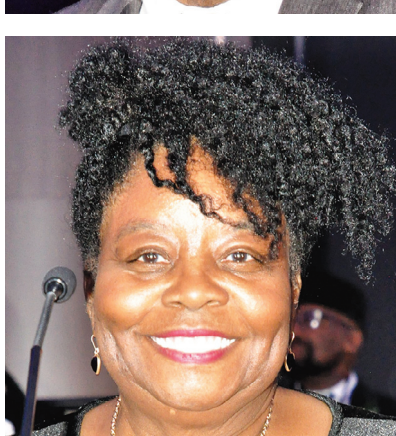

from Christine Symchych and James P. McNulty (\$2MM). The Campaign concluded in December with a final surge of support thanks to a \$500,000 Match Challenge from the National Exchange Bank Foundation.

The City of Milwaukee also made a \$1.25 million contribution and has declared 2026 the Year of Housing.

“All across city hall we’re making housing a priority, and community partners like Acts Housing are essential to making homeownership possible,” said Milwaukee Mayor Cavalier Johnson.

“Everything, literally everything, begins at home. A safe, stable, affordable home is the foundation for our health, for our education, our jobs and our neighborhoods.”

“When families have access to stable and affordable housing, children do better in school, local businesses grow, and communities become safer and more connected,” Gosman added.

As a poor ‘Po’ boy’ coming from the cotton fields of Abbeville, Mississippi where there was no running water or ‘pot to piss in or window to throw it out of,’ these words spoke directly to my spirit and uplifted me to achieve beyond situation; to rise from the pit of poverty and experience the American Dream—as I am too America!

The power and spirit of Brother Jackson’s words continue to inspire, empower, uplift and provide hope to our people today!

During the homegoing service, a number of people expressed their appreciation and admiration for the Reverend. However, one of the most impactful, heartfelt, meaningful and beautiful tributes was given in life during a face-to-face meeting between Rev. Jackson and Nation of Islam leader Minister Louis Farrakhan.

The meeting and words exchanged between these two great

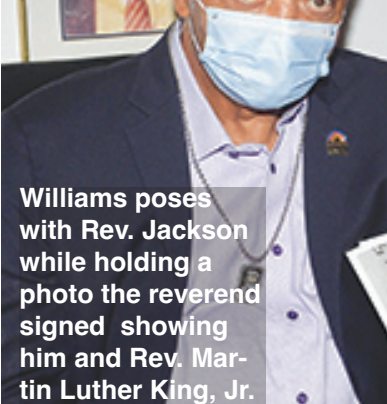

The point I’m trying to make here is Rev. Jackson’s global greatness and impact cannot be isolated or minimized! He was truly a king who walked with kings. But unlike many kings, Rev. Jackson never lost the common touch! He was truly one of one!

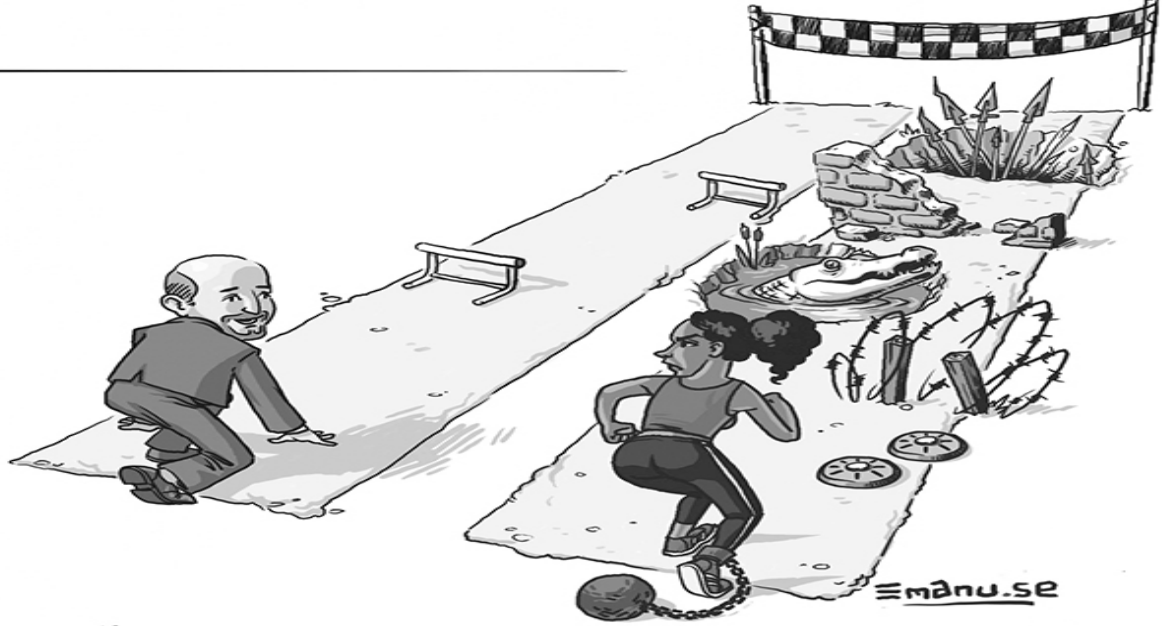

MADISON – Author and civil rights activist Ruby Bridges will give an address at Shannon Hall in Memorial Union April 8 at 7 p.m., at a Wisconsin Union Directorate (WUD) Distinguished Lecture Series (DLS) Committee event, presented in collaboration with the WUD Society and Politics Committee.

The event, “A Fireside Chat With Ruby Bridges,” will feature a 60-minute moderated Q&A with Bridges that will center on the topics of equality, education and community.

A 30-minute audience Q&A will follow. Current University of Wisconsin–Madison students may register for tickets on March 25.

Students will require a promo code, which they will receive via email, to acquire their ticket.

Any remaining tickets will become available to the general public on March 26, with a limit of one ticket per person. Registration for the event will be available on the Wisconsin Campus Arts Ticketing Page.

In 1960, at the age of six, Bridges became the first Black student to integrate into an all-white elementary school in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Her walk to school during the desegregation of public education was later depicted in Norman Rockwell’s piece “The Problem We All Live With,” chronicled in Robert Coles’ “The Story of Ruby Bridges” and portrayed in the Disney film “Ruby Bridges.”

“Don’t follow the path,” Bridges said in her oft-referenced quote. “Go where there is no path and begin the trail. When you start a new trail equipped with courage, strength and conviction, the only thing that can stop you is you!”

As creator of the Ruby Bridges Foundation, a nonprofit that develops educational and leadership programs, Bridges encourages dialogue about diversity, equity and inclusion among youth and community leaders.

Bridges is the author of several books reflecting on her experiences and encouraging civic en-

agement, including “Through My Eyes,” “This Is Your Time,” “I Am Ruby Bridges,” “Dear Ruby, Hear Our Hearts,” and her most recent release, “Ruby Bridges: A Talk with My Teacher,” published in January 2025.

Recipient of the NAACP Martin Luther King Award and the Presidential Citizens Medal, Bridges has also received honorary doctorate degrees from several major national universities. She became a member of the National Women’s Hall of Fame in 2024.

This event is made possible, in part, by the Ed Garvey Lecture Fund, ZBT Speaker Program Fund, and the Horace and Marian Wilke Lecture Fund.

The student-led WUD DLS Committee brings engaging and influential people to the UW–Madison campus to encourage thought-provoking conversations. WUD includes 12 committees and six Wisconsin Hoofers clubs that program thousands of events each year.

Last week I wrote about something my father, who is white, has said for years: when many white Americans hear the phrase “white privilege,” they respond by listing all the ways their lives have been hard.

But if you talk about “white advantage,” the conversation changes. Advantage is measurable.

It doesn’t erase suffering. It simply acknowledges that race still tilts the system.

After that column ran, readers reached out asking me to elaborate.

To understand why, we have to go back to the beginning of the American story.

Early in colonial America, poor Europeans and enslaved Africans sometimes recognized that they shared a common predicament. They ran away together. They rebelled together.

For a brief moment in our history, working people across color lines sometimes saw each other as allies rather than enemies.

That possibility deeply unsettled the people who held power. So over time, colonial elites built a system designed to prevent that unity.

Europeans were given small advantages—permission to carry weapons, positions in militias, small measures of authority over enslaved Africans.

At the same time, racial contempt was deliberately cultivated between the groups.

Racism itself became a tool

of political control. The wedge worked. In many ways, it still does.

White communities across America are hurting. Factories have closed. Life expectancy for many working-class Americans has fallen. Addiction and suicide have devastated entire towns.

Acknowledging white advantage doesn’t deny any of that.

It simply says this: if two people walk into the same job interview with the same résumé, race still affects the outcome.

If two families try to build wealth across generations, race still shapes the odds. Social scientists have measured this for years.

In a well-known study, Princeton sociologist Devah Pager sent out identical résumés to employers.

Applicants with traditionally white-sounding names received far more callbacks than those with Black-sounding names, even when their qualifications were the same.

Suffering and advantage can exist at the same time.

My father understood something many activists forget: language can open conversations, or it can shut them down.

For decades he worked with thousands of men—mostly white—helping them confront trauma and take responsibility for their actions.

He saw how quickly people shut down when they feel their suffering is being dismissed.

That’s the predicament. The reality of racial advantage is undeniable. But the language

we use to describe it sometimes pushes away the very people who need to be part of the solution.

Rev. Jesse Jackson understood this better than anyone. His Rainbow Coalition was built on a simple insight: racism has long been the oldest political wedge in America.

Divide working people by race and those in power stay secure. But if working people across racial lines ever truly unite, the coalition would be powerful enough to transform the country.

The opposite of racism isn’t just tolerance. It’s solidarity. Our history shows both possibilities.

At times we have been divided by race so completely that we could barely see our shared interests.

At other moments—Reconstruction, the labor movement, the civil rights era—we have glimpsed what multiracial democracy can look like.

That history should give us hope. Because if racism was built to divide us, it can also be dismantled.

Rev. Jesse Jackson spent a lifetime trying to show us what comes next. When working people finally refuse the wedge—when we stand together from union halls to houses of worship, from big cities to small towns—the coalition that emerges will be stronger than the politics that have kept us apart for generations.

Save The Date: Milwaukee Youth Spring Fishing Clinics Are April 18

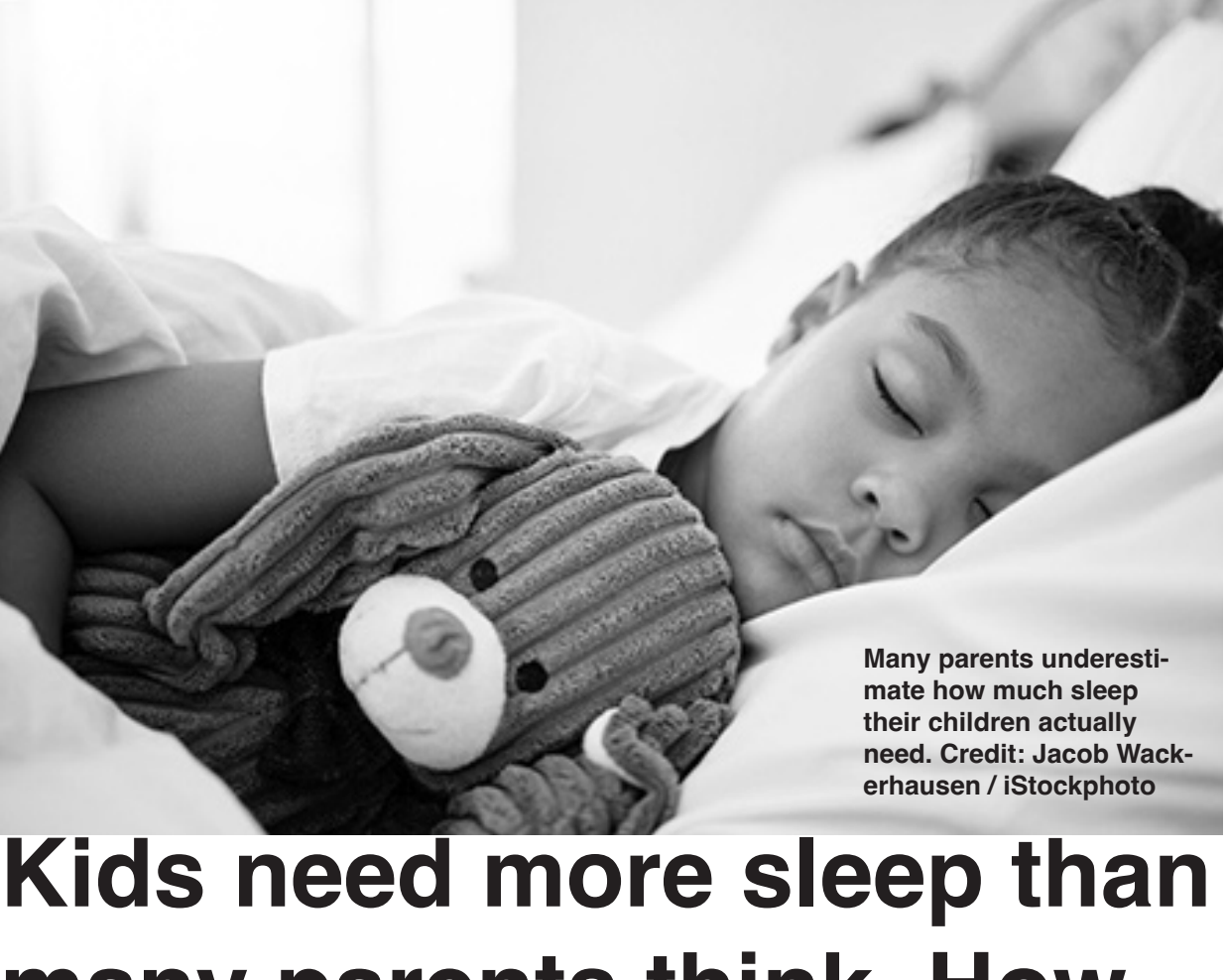

Kids need more sleep than many parents think. How to fix the bedtime gap

(CNN) — So how much sleep do kids really need? It's more than many parents may think.

The National Sleep Foundation recommends 14 to 17 hours for newborns, 12 to 15 for infants, 11 to 14 for toddlers, 10 to 13 for preschoolers and 9 to 11 for school-age children. Yet 44% of American children do not consistently get the recommended amount of sleep for their age, with younger children more likely to fall short, according to a new National Sleep Foundation poll. "We don't live in isolation, we don't sleep in isolation — as much as it is an independent

behavior it is also something that happens within a social context," said Dr. Joseph Dzierzewski, senior vice president of research and scientific affairs at the National Sleep Foundation. It's vitally important for your current and future health: Not only does sleep in your early years set the stage for mental and physical health, but it also creates the foundation for how you sleep later in life, Dzierzewski added. The poll surveyed 977 caregivers of children 13 and younger, including 53% biological mothers and 33% biological fathers, with the remaining participants including stepparents, grandparents, aunts and uncles. The online questionnaire was

offered in both Spanish and English and took place September 12 to October 5. The study supports what pediatric sleep doctors have been saying for a long time, said Dr. Laura Sterni, director of the Johns Hopkins Pediatric Sleep Center and associate professor of pediatrics at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. She was not involved in the study. **Poor sleep affects everyone** Ninety-five percent of all caregivers agreed that good sleep is essential to overall family function, and nearly 80% said their own sleep suffers when their child sleeps poorly, the poll found. Parents also tied sleep to how kids function during the

day: Sixty-nine percent said poor sleep hurts their child's mood and daytime performance, while 86% said a good night's sleep improves mood and behavior. Dzierzewski said most parents recognize the downsides of lost sleep — and that it's encouraging that so many also see the benefits of when kids sleep well, reinforcing how important sleep is to family well-being. **What's our problem with sleep?** The problem is threefold: First, while parents think a lot about their children's sleep, their kids aren't getting enough of it; second, parents underestimate how much shut-eye their children need; and third, the family isn't discussing sleep. The poll found that 74% of caregivers think about their kids sleeping daily. In fact, that group spent more than two hours a day on average thinking about slumber, Dzierzewski said, which affects parents' mental load. Some 61% of the parents said they would even be willing to pay — \$71 on average — for their kids to have a good night's rest. That stress could be tied to uncertainty about what "enough sleep" looks like for babies — especially in the earliest months. Some 78% of parents with kids between 0 and 3 months old underestimated their children's sleep needs. That percentage drops to 68% for parents of children between 4 and 11 months old. Oftentimes, parents fall below recommendations by more than an hour. Lastly, while sleep is a priority for many caregivers, they are not having regular conversations with their children about the importance of good sleep.

Nearly half never or rarely talk about the subject, according to the report. These discussions don't have to be complicated: They can be simple, positive and focus on what the kids care about — such as helping their bodies grow, getting strong, helping their brains learn and mood stay steady. Frame sleep like other daily health habits such as brushing teeth and focusing on benefits kids can see, such as feeling and performing better, Sterni suggested. If you are running into challenges with approaching the conversation, she recommends talking with pediatricians and sleep doctors if necessary. **Napping is not your enemy** Naps can be a key part of children's total sleep, especially for younger kids, the poll found. About two-thirds of children nap regularly, including 93% of those under 1 and 92% of 1- to 2-year-olds. Napping drops with age to 47% of preschoolers (ages 3 to 5) and 28% of school-age children (6 to 13). Among kids who nap, parents reported an average of a little more than two hours and 15 minutes of total nap time per day. For older children, napping may reflect individual sleep needs, efforts to make up for shorter nighttime sleep or structured rest periods in after-school programs. Sterni cautioned against skipping naps in hopes of improving nighttime sleep. For young kids, "sometimes people skip napping, hoping kids will sleep better, but that doesn't work," she said. It can backfire, resulting in kids being cranky by bedtime. Even a short nap can boost total sleep without throwing off the

overall schedule, she added. **Building healthy sleep hygiene** Routine and consistency are key, Dzierzewski said, starting with a regular bedtime and a predictable bedtime routine — not just a lights-out time. "Have that consistent bedtime, those schedules, but not just the bedtime, the bedtime routine," he said. The goal is to cue children that sleep is coming with a calm bedtime routine. "It should be relaxing. It should be a wind-down." He suggested dimming the lights, closing the blinds and reading stories. For younger children, parents can narrate the steps out loud to signal what's coming: "Now we're going to start to prepare for bed," so it becomes something that everyone can expect and can enjoy. "Prioritize sleep" for the whole family, Sterni said. Before bed, use a wind-down period to remove exciting electronics, she said. Try quieter activities such as reading, mellow music, drawing or journaling in a darkened room. Also exercise earlier in the day rather than right before bed, keeping as regular a sleep schedule as possible, including on weekends, and getting light exposure in the morning. "People should expose their eyes to light," she said, to help regulate the body's circadian rhythm and signal it's time to wake up. Ultimately, both Dzierzewski and Sterni said the most important step may be what caregivers do themselves. Children learn sleep habits at home. "Kids are always watching us," Dzierzewski said. If we respect and prioritize sleep, our kids can see that, and they will want to emulate us, he added.

Centering Black Women and Girls in the Fight Against HIV/AIDS

On National Women and Girls HIV/AIDS Awareness Day, physicians and advocates highlight persistent disparities, rising risks among young women, and the importance of testing, and education.

When the HIV/AIDS crisis first emerged roughly 40 years ago, it was widely perceived as a virus that primarily affected white gay men. But Black women have for decades made up a disproportionate share of the ongoing HIV epidemic in the United States — without getting nearly as much attention. In 2023, for example, Black women accounted for fully half of all new HIV diagnoses among women in the U.S., even though they are just 13% of the country's female population. The stunning disparity — and the lack of attention given to HIV-positive women — spurred activists to create National Women and Girls HIV/AIDS Awareness Day. For two decades on March 10, healthcare professionals like Dr. Zandraetta Tims-Cook, a physician who specializes in infectious diseases, work to inform vulnerable Black women and provide them tools to keep themselves safe. "For women, we have to realize that the risk of HIV acquisition does not lie solely in what we do as behaviors," says Tims-Cook, medical director at Faebriis, an Atlanta clinic that specializes in infectious

diseases. The biggest driver of the disease among for Black women, she says, is unprotected sex with HIV-positive men. **Misperceptions About Risk Leave Many Vulnerable** "I think that's where a lot of women, ultimately and sadly, get caught off guard," Tims-Cook says. "They think, 'I only have one partner; I'm not one of those people [with multiple partners]' — not realizing that your risk of HIV acquisition or infection is tied to what your partner does." HIV "really is an infection and an issue that involves everyone," she says. "There are no gender barriers. There are no sexual orientation barriers. Anyone who is engaged in sex with another person and without the consistent use of a condom, is at risk, pure and simple." Created to highlight the impact of HIV on women and girls, National Women and Girls HIV/AIDS Awareness Day is designed to raise awareness, promote testing and encourage prevention and treatment. The Trump administration, as with other observances related to HIV/AIDS, has not acknowledged the day. Nevertheless, the commemoration helps local, state, federal, and

national health and medical organizations to spotlight the impact of HIV and AIDS on women and girls, show support for those living with the disease and spread information about prevention and treatment. While the virus has had an outsized impact on Black women — their rate is approximately 11 times higher than that of white women — the HIV epidemic also disproportionately impacts women in some parts of the country more than others. In 2023, for example, new HIV diagnosis rates among women in southern states were nearly twice as high as in other U.S. regions. Given the data, Tims-Cook says, it's hard to overstate how critical testing and prevention are to prevent the spread of the virus. "It's important to get tested and simply know what your HIV status is," she says. Unlike the early days of the AIDS crisis in the 1980s, Tims-Cook says, a positive diagnosis isn't an automatic death sentence. "There are very convenient, very effective and very safe tools that people can use to still enjoy their sexuality," she says, pointing to PrEP, a drug regimen that is some 90% effective in barring transmission. "You can still enjoy all the benefits of being in relationship with another person, but do it

where you can control the controllables." Tims-Cook compared maintaining sexual health awareness to defensive driving. "When I learned to drive, my mom and dad said that you got to drive for yourself and the other person too," she says. "And in this arena of sexuality, [considering] the various ways that people can come together and meet you, you have to do things with a little bit of defense tied into it." **Testing, PrEP, and Education Can Help Close the Gap** Tim-Cook's clinic stresses knowing about HIV prevention medications including PrEP and the various ways patients can use it. Women made up just 9% of PrEP users in 2024, according to AIDSvu.org. "There are pills that one can take, and then you have injections, things like say, Apretude, that you can safely and conveniently, privately have administered just six times a year." While HIV is often connected to rising rates of other sexually transmitted infections, among younger people there may be opportunities to change this trend. "But we do see that with HIV infections if it's increasing in any age

group, it's increasing [among them] — and it's occurring with the other sexually transmitted infections, like chlamydia, gonorrhea, sometimes even syphilis and their other types of sexually transmitted infections."

Patients who have STIs face greatly increased chances of HIV transmission. So, having strategies to give young people, teens, and young adults, education and access to prevention medications is crucial.

"There have been ongoing studies of tools saying we can offer one that's called Doxy Pep," Tims-Cook says. "This is somewhat of a morning-after strategy for sexually transmitted infections. We've seen the data where this tool has been effective in preventing chlamydia, gonorrhea, even syphilis infections in men."

In her clinic, Tims-Cook approaches patients with conversations about both prevention and reassurance.

"Everyone who is seen in this office — I don't care what age, if they've ever engaged in sex, if they're still engaging in sex — I let them know that my gift to them, before they leave the office, is I will confirm that they are HIV negative," Tim-Cooks says "That's something I think every adult should expect and also demand from his or her healthcare provider."

Women in particular should lean into prevention and know their HIV status, Tims-Cook says.

"And if your provider has never checked and screened you for HIV, that is part of the issue that I think needs to be addressed," she says.

Despite decades of awareness campaigns, the numbers show that HIV prevention still requires continued public attention and should never be seen as falling on deaf ears.

For those who haven't been diagnosed, "that's a wonderful thing that's letting us know that you're hearing about it, and hopefully, it is having an impact," Tims-Cook says. "But for those who are living with it, their question always is, why didn't someone tell me?"
