Recently, the Sound of Gospel musical anthology transformed the Bradley Symphony Center into a sanctuary of harmony, heritage, and hope for more than two extraordinary hours. From the opening chord, the music did more than resonate through the hall; it elevated every heart inside it. Evers to veto a bill weakening Common Council authority over MPD policy

Gov. Tony Evers is expected to veto a state bill that weakens the authority of the Milwaukee Common Council over Milwaukee Police Department policies.

According to a spokesperson for Evers, the governor does not support a Republican-led amendment to the bill that would require the Milwaukee Common Council to unanimously agree before it can change Milwaukee Police Department policies.

The governor plans to veto the bill if it reaches his desk, the spokesperson said.

It's the latest development in a long-running dispute between state lawmakers and Milwaukeeans over who should control police policy.

Rep. Bob Donovan, R-Greenfield, who represented Milwaukee's South Side on the Common Council for 20 years, proposed the amendment to Senate Bill 799. The amendment would require all 15 council members to agree before they could reject or modify an MPD policy.

Donovan's amendment sets a higher bar for influencing Milwaukee police policy than currently exists under state law. The Common Council can currently reject or modify an MPD policy with a two-thirds vote – 10 of its 15 members.

The amendment could have real and tangible effects on life-and-death matters in the city.

For example, city officials have long disagreed over strategies for how best to address gun violence, such as the use of ShotSpotter, a technology that alerts officers when gunfire is detected.

Some council members have supported it as a tool to respond more quickly to shootings, while others have questioned its effectiveness and cost.

If Donovan's amendment were to be enacted, council members would have to agree unanimously in order to change it.

"Allotting single member veto power to any Common Council member who wishes to block a policy change that is potentially supported by the rest of the Council opens the door to unnecessary roadblocks for matters as serious as public safety," said Amanda Avalos, former vice chair of the Fire and Police Commission.

"Standard operating procedures and guidelines are meant to protect the members and community alike – there should be no room for governance loopholes."

A more recent controversy involving the use of facial recognition technology illustrates how the two-thirds majority rule can influence policy.

MPD has previously said it was considering entering into an agreement with a company called Biometrica to use facial recognition technology to assist in criminal investigations.

The announcement triggered widespread pushback from residents and others. In May, 11 council

DACA recipients, Wisconsin economy to receive boost via bipartisan legislation

In a strong display of bipartisanship, the Wisconsin State Senate recently gave its solid support to Assembly Bill 759 with a decisive 31-2 vote, advancing the legislation to Governor Tony Evers for his signature.

Alderman DiAndre Jackson and Common Council President José G. Pérez said the bill dismantles a longstanding and outdated barrier that has prevented eligible recipients of Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) — individuals often referred to as 'Dreamers' — from obtaining professional and occupational credentials, despite satisfying every other requirement established by the state.

Sponsored by Representative Joel Kitchens (R-Sturgeon Bay) and advanced through both

legislative chambers with robust bipartisan support—including the pivotal contributions of Senator Jesse James (R-23rd District)—the measure empowers DACA recipients holding unexpired status and valid federal employment authorization to pursue licensure in high-demand professions such as nursing, teaching, plumbing, electrical trades, cosmetology, barbering, real estate, dentistry, and many others, all while preserving the highest professional standards.

Pérez said the legislation is timely and "directly confronts Wisconsin's documented workforce shortages in local communities."

Members sent a letter to MPD Chief Jeffrey Norman expressing opposition to MPD entering a contract with Biometrica.

That meant the Common Council had enough votes to veto the policy. If Donovan's proposal became law, that wouldn't be the case.

MPD's perspective
Even if that policy did become law, that doesn't necessarily mean that MPD wouldn't take into account feedback it gets from others.

An MPD spokesperson said in an email that the department collaborates with local communities and officials in a variety of ways. "MPD continually and regu-

larly reports to the Fire and Police Commission, who still have directive powers, promotional powers and chief oversight, the Common Council that oversees budget, creates ordinance and resolution and now has (policy) modification authority, as well as the mayoral administration," the spokesperson said.

Most importantly, they said, MPD serves and ultimately reports to the community it serves.

Donovan did not respond to requests for comment about the amendment.

Act 12
How police policy is determined has already undergone significant changes in recent years.

When Wisconsin Act 12 was enacted in 2023, it stripped the authority from the Fire and Police Commission to determine MPD policy – authority it held for many years.

Civilian authority over police policy is something quite rare in the U.S., Edward Fallon, former chair of the commission, previously told NNS.

With this power, the commission banned, for example, the use of chokeholds as well as "no-knock" warrants.

After Act 12 took effect, the commission's role in setting police policy became limited to making recommendations, with the police and fire department

chiefs setting policy and the council having authority to reject or change policy with a two-thirds majority.

The changes brought by Act 12 prompted the resignations of Fallon and Avalos.

Legislative steps
The bill has passed both chambers of the Legislature and now heads to Evers' desk, where he plans to veto it.

The MPD respects the legislative process at the state and local level, the department's spokesperson said.

Perez said.
"The bill provides a means to help us address these critical workforce deficits."

At its core, the bill taps into an underutilized yet rigorously vetted workforce.

Approximately 5,000 DACA recipients reside in Wisconsin—individuals brought here as children, educated in the state's schools, thoroughly screened by federal authorities through background checks, Selective Service registration, and bi-annual renewals, and actively contributing via taxes.

Though they possess valid work authorization, they have until now been blocked from fully utilizing their skills and training.

Alderman Jackson, chair of the Judiciary and Legislation Committee, said the bill can help the city and state better compete for jobs and projects across many sectors.

"Nineteen other states allow DACA recipients to obtain professional licenses – we should not let Wisconsin and Milwaukee fall behind. We need to utilize this important workforce to its fullest and move our city and state forward," he said.

President Pérez also thanked the work of the Judiciary and Legislation Committee, which authorizes the legislative package that guides the lobbying activity of the city's Legislative Affairs Division.

"The committee members have been longtime supporters of this important legislation, and I thank them for allowing Milwaukee and our lobbying team to engage on the issue," he said.

It is important to note that this legislation carries no implications for new immigration policy or public benefits. It remains fully consistent with federal law, applies solely to those granted DACA prior to the effective date, and ties the validity of any professional license to continued federal employment authorization.

Dr. Howard Fuller's career includes many years of leadership in public service and education. He founded the Institute for the Transformation of Learning at Marquette University in 1995 and served as Superintendent of Milwaukee Public Schools from 1991 to 1995.

Dr. Fuller became nationally known for his steadfast support for fundamental educational reform with a focus on parent choice. He retired from Marquette University in June 2020, where he holds the title of Distinguished Pro-

fessor Emeritus.

Dr. Fuller earned his B.S. in Sociology from Carroll College (now Carroll University) in Waukesha, Wisconsin, in 1962; his M.S.A. in Social Administration from Western Reserve University (now Case Western Reserve University) in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1964; and his Ph.D. in Sociological Foundations of Education from Marquette University in 1986. His positions prior to serving as Superintendent of Milwaukee Public Schools included: Director of the Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services (1988–1991); Dean of General Education at the Milwaukee Area Technical College (1986–1988); Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Employment Relations (1983–1986); and Associate Director of the Educational Opportunity Program at Marquette University (1979–1983). Dr. Fuller was also a Senior Fellow with the Annenberg Institute for School Reform at Brown University (1995–1997).

The Thompson Center is a nonpartisan institute within the University of Wisconsin System, established by the Wisconsin Legislature in 2017 to advance research, teaching, and policy reform regarding effective public leadership. Previous recipients of the Distinguished Public Leadership Award include Paul Farrow and Tia Nelson (2025), U.S. Representatives David Obey and Thomas Petri (2024), Wisconsin Supreme Court Justice David Prosser (2023), and longtime Legislative Fiscal Bureau Director Bob Lang (2022).

Ald. Zamarripa comments on reports of alleged sexual misconduct by the late Cesar Chavez

The accounts shared today by Dolores Huerta, Ana Murguía, Debra Rojas, and other survivors are devastating. The New York Times investigation documents a pattern of sexual abuse and rape by Cesar Chavez, including the grooming and assault of girls as young as 12.

These women carried enormous pain for decades because they feared that speaking the truth would cost the movement everything they had sacrificed to build. That is an impossible burden, and they should never have had to carry it.

I believe them.

Cesar Chavez's contributions to the farmworker movement and to Latino civil rights are a matter of historical record. So is

Red Cross: More than 1K donations uncollected due to winter storms, give blood or platelets now

Severe Weather From Elsa Curtails Blood Donations Across Region

The American Red Cross of Wisconsin urges people to act now to help offset the impact of recent winter storms, which disrupted donation appointments across the state, and highlights the ongoing need to rebuild the blood supply. Donors of all blood types are encouraged to schedule a blood or platelet donation as soon as it's safe to travel.

Over the last few days, more than 30 blood drives have been canceled across the Wisconsin region, causing greater than 1,000 blood and platelet donations to go uncollected. In addition to the disruption of blood drives, dangerous weather

conditions have also made it tougher to transport vital blood products, which could potentially affect deliveries to hospitals in some locations.

Help is needed right now — and a simple act of donating blood or platelets can be the lifesaving gift people are counting on. Book a time to give blood or platelets now by visiting RedCrossBlood.org, calling 1-800-RED CROSS or by using the Red Cross Blood Donor App.

The Red Cross will perform A1C testing on successful blood, platelet and plasma donations made March 1-31, 2026 (one result in 2026). The farmworker movement was never one man. It was built by thousands of workers, organizers, and families who gave their lives to the fight for dignity and justice. Dolores Huerta's courage and moral clarity built something that outlasts any individual. That legacy belongs to the people.

I will be joining the broader community conversation about what it means to have Cesar Chavez Drive bear his name, and I am committed to being part of that discussion in the coming weeks.

To any survivor who is carrying something heavy today: You are believed, and you are not alone.

Promise Made, Promise Kept!

Gov. Evers Delivers on Key Promise to Wisconsin Moms by Extending Postpartum Coverage From 60 Days to One Year

Gov. Tony Evers recently made good on a promise he made to Wisconsin moms to extend postpartum Medicaid coverage for thousands of new moms, babies and families across the state from 60 days to one year.

During a signing ceremony at Children's Wisconsin in Milwaukee, Evers enacted Senate Bill (SB) 23, now 2025 Wisconsin Act 102.

By enacting the bill, Evers culminated a seven year effort to secure a full year of postpartum coverage for Wisconsin families, having included provisions to do so in each of his four biennial budget proposals since being elected governor.

Gov. Evers has made expanding postpartum coverage to one year a cornerstone of his "Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies" initiative, which he's spent seven years working to pass, including the proposal in each of his four budgets as governor and even going so far as to repeatedly and directly implore lawmakers in many of his major addresses over eight years as governor to do so.

The governor renewed his call for lawmakers to expand postpartum coverage once again earlier this year in a letter to members of the Wisconsin State Legislature outlining his top legislative priorities for 2026.

The governor is proud to have finally gotten this important priority across the finish line for moms across Wisconsin.

"Almost seven years ago to the day, I first proposed expanding postpartum Medicaid coverage from 60 days to a full year. It was one of the very first things I announced back in 2019 as part of my very first budget, and it's been in every budget I've ever introduced as governor—that's how long I've been fighting to get this done, folks.

"So, we knew from the get-go that getting this passed was an uphill battle. But we also weren't going to let partisanship or politics stop us from continuing our work to build support for this important proposal, because we know just how high the stakes are," continued Gov. Evers.

"Research has shown us that expanding postpartum coverage leads to improved maternal and birth outcomes, thanks to more

folks being able to access the care they need when they need it—and without breaking the bank.

"Now more than ever, we should be working to make healthcare more affordable and more accessible, not making it more expensive and harder for folks—including new moms and families—to get the care they need.

"Expanding postpartum coverage is the right move for Wisconsin families, it's the right move for our state, and it's a privilege to be able to sign this bill into law," Gov. Evers concluded. "It's been a long time coming, but I'm darn proud we got it done."

Gov. Evers believes that every Wisconsinite should have access to quality, affordable healthcare, including reproductive healthcare, and the governor has been a champion for addressing and im-

proving maternal and infant health outcomes in Wisconsin.

As part of his "Healthy Meals, Healthy Babies" initiative, Gov. Evers has proposed expanding postpartum Medicaid coverage to 12 months for the entirety of his tenure as governor, including in each of his Executive Budget proposals he has introduced across all seven years of his tenure as governor in 2019, 2021, 2023, and 2025.

Following the bill signing, the governor will be traveling across the state, hosting community conversations with local moms, families, and leaders to discuss how the state can continue to address maternal health disparities and ensure that new moms and families have the resources they need to be well.

THANK TALK SHOW HOST SHERWIN HUGHES ON 101.7FM 'THE TRUTH' FOR RESURRECTING THE 'N-WORD' DEBATE!

The Truth's Sherwin Hughes conducted a survey during his show last week on people's reaction to the adjective/noun/pronoun 'nigger' (n-word). And as I would have predicted, the majority of his listeners responded that they didn't have a problem with the racist epithet.

The question, however, didn't differentiate on the racist underpinnings of the adjective/noun/pronoun, nor did it address whether the word was uttered by a Hue-man or white/paleface/cracker/honky. Are you offended by those terms?)

As predicted, the majority of Sherwin's listeners (college educated or at least culturally attuned brothers and sisters) said they didn't have a problem with the word. Hmmm. Had Sherwin included Whites in the equation, I'm sure the tally would have been different.

More specifically, had I written the question to inquire if a white/paleface/redneck/cracker/orca/ referred to us as niggers (n-word) they would have been subject to a right cross.

Nigger (n-word) has been adjudicated as a 'fighting word.' And I'm assuming that's a colorless qualification.

But that's a irrelevant.

From my perspective, everyone should feel free to use the word. Or not.

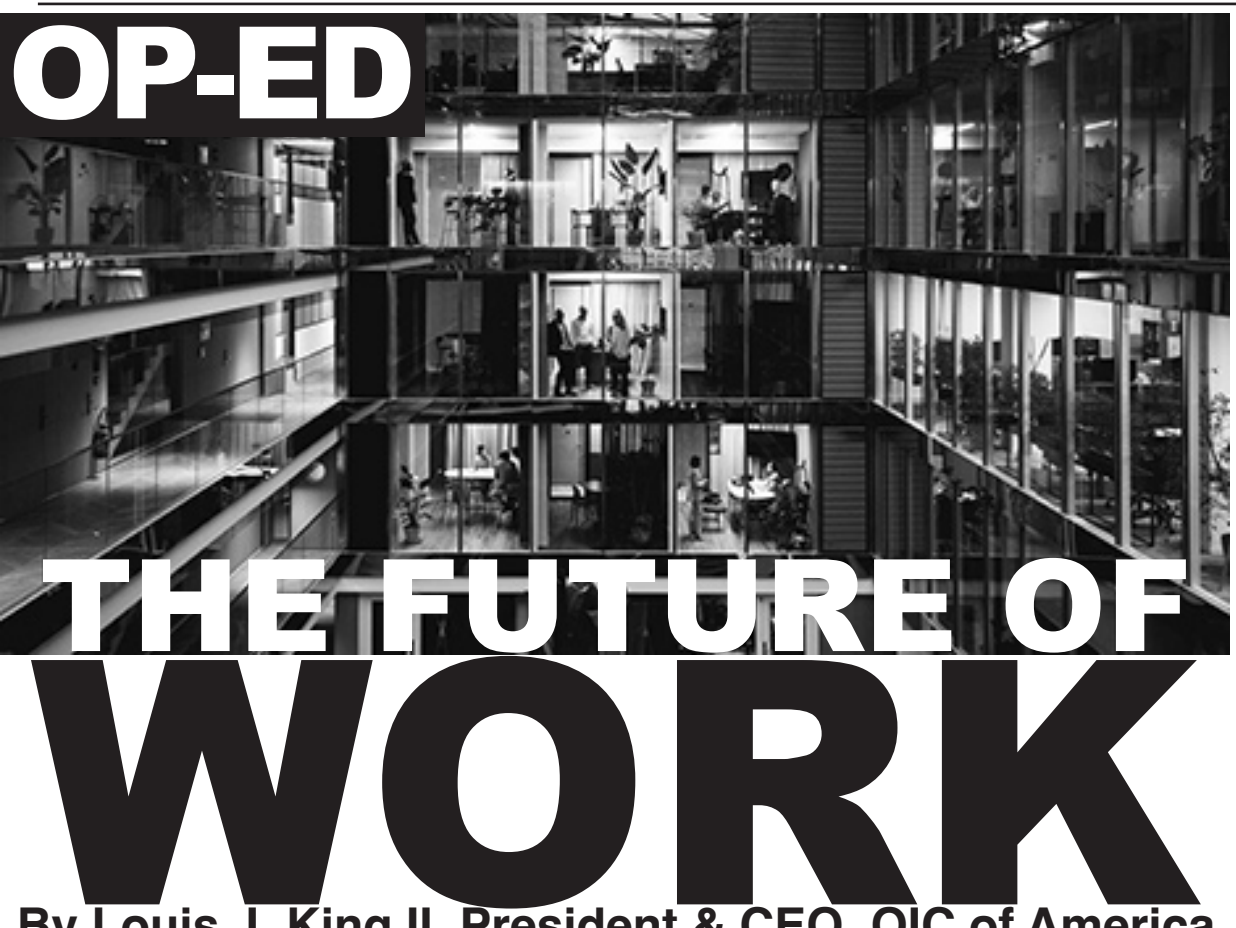

their babies in the first year of life is critical for the long-term physical and mental health for both, and we are grateful to Gov. Evers for his many years advocating for policies to improve infant and maternal health and signing SB 23, which authorizes extending postpartum Medicaid coverage to 12 months, subject to federal approval," said Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) Secretary Kirsten Johnson.

"Research shows extending this coverage improves health outcomes by strengthening a new mother's physical and emotional health and reduces the need for extensive and expensive long-term treatment.

"Providing health care when families need it the most also improves a family's economic stability, which is good for them and the state. We wish to thank Gov. Evers and lawmakers for helping DHS fulfill our mission of protecting and promoting the health of Wisconsinites."

From pregnancy to childbirth to postpartum and beyond, ensuring the health and wellness of all mothers and babies in Wisconsin has been a top priority for Gov. Evers and the Evers Administration.

Despite advances in medical science and technology, pregnancy-related complications and deaths continue to occur at high levels in Wisconsin.

According to DHS's Division of Public Health, Wisconsin's severe maternal morbidity rate, which are described as serious birth complications, or "near-misses," has steadily increased in recent years, and that the rate of severe maternal morbidity for people on Medicaid or BadgerCare is higher than for those with private insurance.

According to DHS, nearly half of pregnancy-related deaths occur in the postpartum period, and the Wisconsin Maternal Mortality Review Team found that nearly all (95 percent) of these deaths were preventable.

Unfortunately, in Wisconsin, this issue disproportionately affects families of color, especially Black families, as Black mothers are approximately 2.5 times more likely than their white, non-Hispanic peers to die from complications of pregnancy and childbirth.

Despite these appalling realities and the concept of expanding postpartum coverage having overwhelming support of 66 percent of Wisconsinites and a bipartisan supermajority in the Wisconsin State Legislature, Wisconsin has for years been one of just two states in the nation that had not expanded postpartum coverage under Medicaid to 12 months—until today.

Expanded postpartum coverage will be available for Wisconsin families starting July 1, 2026, following a standard period of review and approval of Wisconsin's state plan amendment by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services.

Senate Bill 23, now 2025 Wisconsin Act 102:

- Extends postpartum Medicaid coverage from 60 days to one year; and
- Requires the Wisconsin Department of Health Services to seek approval from the federal Department of Health and Human Services to extend until the last day of the month in which the 365th day after the last day of the pregnancy falls Medicaid benefits to women who are eligible for those benefits when pregnant.

At OIC of America, we're preparing people to lead in this new world of work and not get left behind. That means teaching digital and AI skills, expanding access to technology, and making sure every learner has the tools to succeed in a tech-enabled economy.

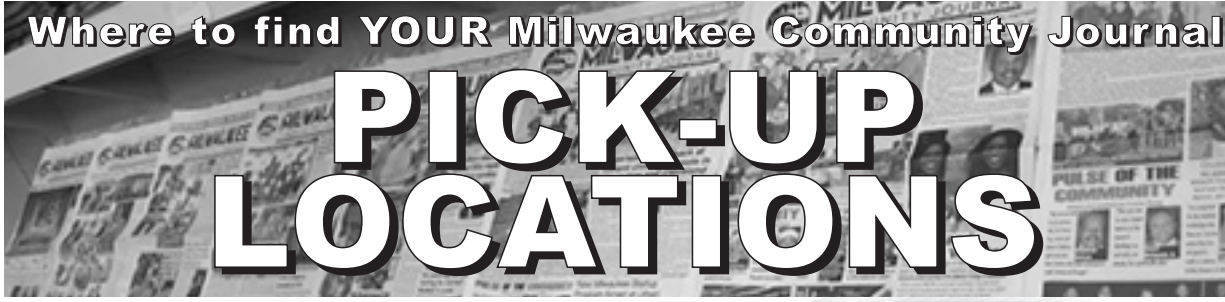
This coordinated effort is structured so that the Commonwealth's

booming industry surges in life sciences, data centers, and advanced manufacturing also benefit its citizens more equitably.

Trump-RFK Jr. HHS's policies disproportionately hurt people of color

WASHINGTON D.C. – Leading health advocacy groups Protect Our Care and the American Public Health Association (APHA) released recently a joint analysis on how Donald Trump and HHS Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr.'s cuts to vital health programs and attacks on vaccines have disproportionately undermined the health of people of color.

The review, first reported by The Root, comes as the CDC now reports over 1,360 confirmed measles cases and 14 new outbreaks in 2026, a dangerous situation for Black and AIAN children that “remain least likely to have received recommended childhood vaccinations and the MMR vaccine specifically.”

The spread of the disease so far in 2026 is on track to eclipse last year's total, which was the highest since 1991.

“Trump’s health secretary RFK Jr. is making communities of color sicker by putting up even more barriers to access safe and effective vaccines while destroying health programs designed to fix health disparities,” said Kayla Hancock, Director of Protect Our Care’s Public

Health Project. “Kennedy has abused his celebrity status and influence to baselessly stoke anti-vax fear and drive down vaccination rates even further, leaving already underserved communities even less prepared to deal with the massive uptick in preventable diseases like measles, flu and hepatitis B. RFK Jr. has put his widely discredited belief that Black people should have less protection from preventable disease into dangerous practice, and it’s costing a lot of people dearly in medical bills and their health.”

“With an implicit and explicit bias against vaccines and complete disregard for science, Robert F. Kennedy, Jr.’s impact on our nation’s health has been devastating since being sworn in as Secretary of Health and Human Services,” said APHA CEO Georges C. Benjamin, MD.

“His misinformation and poorly conceived actions have created chaos, confusion and mistrust, which disproportionately harms the health of people of color and other underserved communities.”

Analysis Highlights:
 • Targeted Black Professionals Working on Immunization and Health Campaigns at HHS. When RFK Jr. suddenly fired 10,000 HHS employees, he was not doing so in a colorblind manner.

While Black people make up nearly 14 percent of the U.S. population, around 20 percent of people who work at HHS are Black, and they were disproportionately at risk of losing their jobs last year.

• Supported Different Vaccine Schedules for Different “Races.” RFK Jr.’s history of undermining trust in vaccines includes statements claiming Black people should be given fewer vaccinations than white people, highlighting his

eugenics-inspired mythology of race as a biological reality, and promoting a policy which would decrease already low Black vaccination rates.

When confronted about these statements at his own confirmation hearing he defended them.

• The Number of Children Receiving Proper Vaccinations Has Declined. Asian American children have seen the sharpest decline recently, with a seven percent drop. Black and American Indian/Alaskan Native children also still fall below the MMR vaccination goal of 90 percent by 2030.

Thanks to RFK Jr.’s ACIP panel recommendations, fewer vaccines, like those for MMR and measles, may be available for low income children, who disproportionately are people of color, in the future.

• Millions Have Been Stripped Away from AI/AN Communities’ Immunization and Health Programs. RFK Jr.’s massive cuts to HHS programs have disproportionately targeted AI/AN communities, with over \$6 million in grants slashed in just the last year.

These grants were filling in the gaps for vaccination and other health programs as AI/AN are less likely to have access to hospital services or even a local doctor.

Funding and Policy Shifts Have Led to 750,000 Excess Deaths Worldwide. These staggering numbers reflect the interrupted immunization campaigns, delayed HIV and tuberculosis treatment initiation, weakened malaria control programs, and disruptions to maternal and child health services, all coming under the leadership of Donald Trump and RFK Jr. Around 500,000 of these excess deaths are children.

Are Identity Politics Harming Black People?

Whether focusing on race makes things worse

unnecessarily shining a magnifying glass when racism isn’t as big a problem as racial justice advocates would like us to think.

According to the critics, it’s making Black people feel worse about life than reality and angering white people for unjustly being called racists.

“You wonder why so many people in the country are over DEI? It’s because of people like you!”

This was the latest critique of a piece I wrote about practicing empathy and how people don’t take enough time to listen to the lived experiences of the Black community.

The critical comment was part of a longer one eschewing identity politics.

Identity politics is advocacy “based on a particular identity, such as ethnicity, race, nationality, religion, denomination, gender, sexual orientation, social background, caste, and social class.”

Nearly everyone engages in identity politics based on whichever “class” or group they fall into.

Of hundreds of issues, for years, Evangelical Christians have voted mainly on abortion.

Farmers support candidates who will maintain farm subsidies.

The LGBTQ+ community, for years, primarily supported candidates who were going to fight for marriage equality.

Many Jews definitely keep U.S. policy toward Israel at the top of their minds when they vote.

And yes, much of the Black community focuses on policies they think will help their disproportionately lower economic status, reduce police brutality, address mass housing and health care disparities, and the like.

Today, critics of addressing race-related issues have narrowed the definition of identity politics to just politics based on race.

In other words, it’s okay when other groups raise issues that are important to them. Just not Black people.

Harvard psychologist Steven Pinker criticized identity politics as “an enemy of reason and Enlightenment values.”

Columnist Bari Weiss says that the “corrupt identity politics of the left” is pure intolerance.

New York Magazine’s Andrew Sullivan contends that the “woke left” doesn’t “genuinely believe in liberalism, liberal democracy, or persuasion.”

But is talking about or focusing on the issues really the culprit of why America still struggles with race?

Are they essentially saying we can have identity-based oppression and racist systems but not also have politics based on addressing that oppression?

When Black families have one-tenth of the wealth of white families. When many Black people still face significant barriers to opportunity because of their race.

How else must we combat these issues if we don’t shine a

light on them?

Remember, lynching didn’t just magically disappear because people stopped talking about it. The practice ended because loud voices like Dr. King demanded its demise.

Separate drinking fountains and lunch counters for Black people didn’t just stop one day because we let the free market run its course.

Bus seating didn’t change because suddenly, bus drivers everywhere decided it was no longer fair to Rosa Parks.

Police departments didn’t add body-cams because they enjoy them and want the rest of us to see what they’re up to. People fighting for justice moved the needle.

The wheels of justice only turn when good people put their foot on America’s justice pedal.

Of course, all forms of politics ought to allow for debate, including so-called identity politics.

Advocacy should never be used to advance society as a tool to marginalize or exclude others.

But it’s unfair to tell Black people they’re the only ones who can’t engage in politics based on their identity while the rest of society gets a free pass to advocate based on theirs.
