## \$3 Million Donation by Northwestern Mutual Funds Partnership to Build 94 Homes in Amani, Supporting CDA Tax Incremental Financing

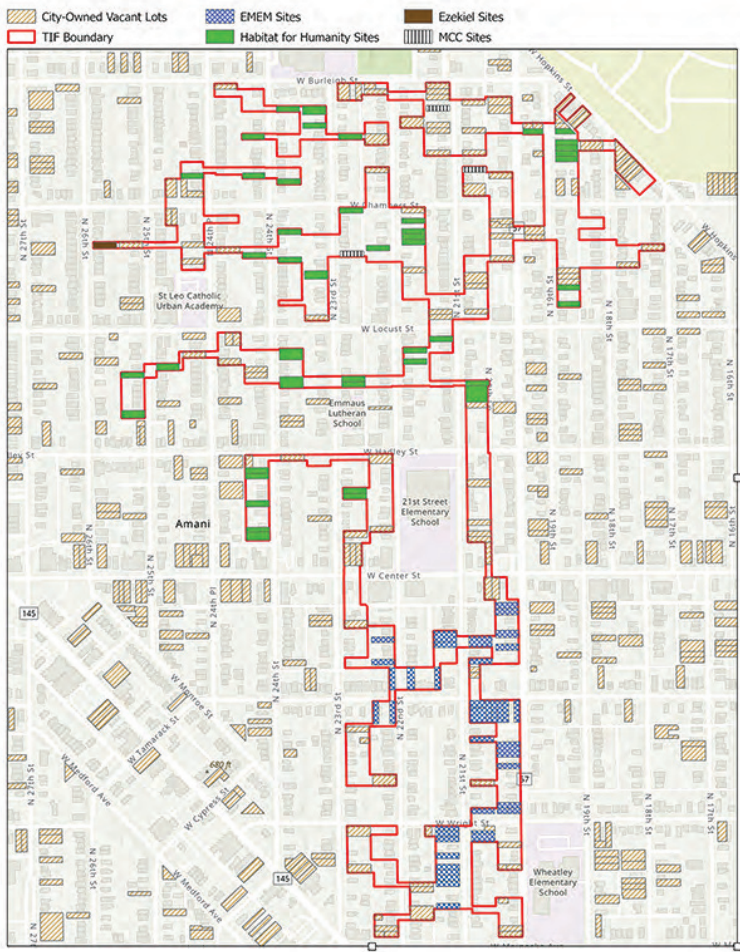
Plan is a Partnership with Amani United, Dominican Center for Women, Emem Group, Ezekiel Hope, Habitat for Humanity, Milwaukee Community Crossroads and Milwaukee County Land Trust

A plan to build 94 new affordable homes in the Amani neighborhood on the city's North Side received a huge boost recently when Northwestern Mutual committed \$3 million over the next three years.

The donation helps close the funding gap on the Amani project and coincides with the Community Development Alliance (CDA) filing plans with Milwaukee's Department of City Development seeking \$3.6 million in tax incremental financing to help fund construction.

Northwestern Mutual is one of CDA's original and largest donors. The company is supporting construction of 500 affordable homes in Milwaukee by 2030, in collaboration with local non-profit partners.

The Amani project, which CDA calls a "Coordinated Backbone Tax Incremental District," comprises vacant properties scattered in an area bounded by W. Meinecke Avenue on the north, N. 17th Street on the east, W. Burleigh on the south and N. 25th Street on the west. CDA is working with the Dominican Center for Women, neighborhood group Amani United, Milwaukee Habitat for Humanity and Emem Group to



build most of the homes. Habitat will build 50 homes to be sold to homeowners in the northern half of the TID with Emem building 40 homes in the southern half.

Developer Michael Emem is seeking state-issued low-income housing tax credits to fund construction. He would rent the homes to households making at or

### Why I Believe the Senate Must Reject the SAVE America Act!

Polling consistently shows that Americans' top concern is the cost of living, especially housing and health-care.

The president has made life more expensive by embroiling the United States in an unjustified war with Iran, driving gas prices even higher.

A reasonable voter may conclude that Republicans in Congress, who control the House and Senate and are facing abysmal polling, would be focused on ending the war and helping lower costs for Ameri-

cans. Those voters would be wrong.

Instead, Republicans are singularly obsessed with disenfranchising millions of voters ahead of the 2026 midterms.

How obsessed? Trump's recent executive order aims to change mail-ballot laws and would establish a list of voters in each state he deems "eligible."

He, along with congressional Republicans, are desperate to undermine free and fair elections and control who can vote.

Trump's allies in Congress frame the so-called SAVE America Act as an "election integrity" bill that simply requires an ID to vote.

That is wildly deceptive because their bill is, in fact, a full-frontal assault on the fundamental right of Americans to cast a ballot in future elections, including the 2026 midterms.

Americans could not use a driver's license, or even a REAL ID driver's license.

Instead, they would need a passport or a birth certificate to register to vote, and the name must match on each document.

This would put millions of married women at risk of losing their right to vote.

US service members could not use a military ID to register to vote, nor could Native Americans use a tribe-issued ID.

## Milwaukee County Executive David Crowley Announces Approval of Affordable Housing Subdivision in Oak Creek

Oak Creek Common Council unanimously approved new affordable housing subdivision

Milwaukee County Executive David Crowley joined local leaders and partners at Oak Creek City Hall recently to announce that the Oak Creek City Council has unanimously approved the first-ever affordable housing subdivision in a suburban community in Milwaukee County.

Crowley also announced that the Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Housing Services will serve as the lead developer for this first-of-a-kind development that will build up to 50 homes at 9050 S. Annette Place in Oak Creek.

"My administration remains committed to addressing the affordable housing crisis for working families across Milwaukee County," said County Executive Crowley.

"This first-of-its-kind project, an affordable subdivision in a suburban community, represents the continuation of our work to make critical investments that provide families with expanded access to becoming homeowners, improving their lives, strengthening our neighborhoods, and fostering a healthier community for all."

County Executive Crowley worked with U.S. Senator

Tammy Baldwin to secure \$7 million in Congressionally Directed Spending for the infrastructure for the project including roads, sewer, power, and landscaping. Federal HOME funds will be used to assist with the construction of the homes.

"I'm committed to addressing the housing crisis head on so more Wisconsinites can live, work, and raise a family in the communities they love," said Senator Baldwin. "We need to drive down the cost to rent and buy, increase supply, and help families put down those roots. I'm proud to partner with Milwaukee County and deliver this investment for Oak Creek, breaking down barriers to homeownership and allowing more Wisconsinites to invest in their communities."

The approximately 1,200-square-foot homes will be available for immediate homeownership and will be classified as affordable with a price point between \$225,000 and \$250,000. Eligible homebuyers must be at or below 80 percent in the Area Median Income (AMI) bracket. For example, that equates to approximately \$80,000 in

annual household income for a family of three. A development agreement with the City of Oak Creek will be signed soon to begin construction. A request for proposals (RFP) for infrastructure work will be released this summer and construction on that will begin after a contract is awarded. Home construction will take place in 2027.

"The City of Oak Creek is honored to be partnering with Milwaukee County on this historic project. This new subdivision will offer incredible on-the-job training to Oak Creek High School students who are exploring careers in the trades, create new homeowners and a greater sense of community," said Oak Creek Mayor Dan Bukiewicz. "We are grateful for our partners and would like to thank County Executive Crowley, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors, and our partners for their collaboration on this project."

"It's great news this innovative economic development project is taking place in Oak Creek with Milwaukee County serving as the lead developer on a project of this scale for the first time. This project will utilize the talent base of high school students on a site that has been zoned specifically for this purpose," said Milwaukee County Supervisor Steve F. Taylor. "This subdivision will increase homeownership and result in new revenue through property taxes for the City of Oak Creek."

below 50 percent of the median income for 15 years, and then sell the homes at affordable prices. Milwaukee Community Crossroads will build three homes and Ezekiel Hope plans to build one home, all in the northern part of the TID.

As part of the Amani Homeownership Initiative, the Milwaukee Community Land Trust plans to convert a small number of the newly constructed homes to its land trust model.

"These homes are part of the Fond du Lac and North Avenue Area Plan adopted by the Department of City Development and approved by the Common Council six years ago," noted Whaley-Smith.

"The Amani TID is the direct result of what residents want and we're excited to make that plan a reality.

"Building homes affordable to neighborhood families will both allow them to stay or enable those who may have been displaced by abandoned properties to return.

"We are very appreciative of all of our project partners and the generosity of Northwestern Mutual."

Tax incremental financing has been used by the City of Milwaukee and other municipalities since the mid 1970s to leverage private development investment.

The City provides upfront funding that is paid back through property taxes on the improved property within the project's borders (called a Tax Increment Dis-

trict or TID).

Once all the project costs are repaid, the district is terminated and property taxes go to taxing authorities (City, Schools, County, MMSD). State statute allows up to 27 years to pay off all TID costs. The City of Milwaukee says the average payback period is approximately 18 years. Tax incremental financing is a development tool that is often used for large commercial development projects.

The Amani TID puts a twist on this strategy by using it in some of the city's neediest neighborhoods to build homes that are affordable, allowing more Milwaukee residents to become homeowners.

Milwaukee has created more than 120 TIDs during the past 50 years. High-profile projects including Northwestern Mutual's headquarters skyscraper, Fiserv Forum, Reed Street Yards in Walker's Point, Century City business parks, the Riverwalk, South 5th Street reconstruction and the Bronzeville corridor were constructed with TIDs.

The Amani TID is CDA's third. A 2024 TID helped fund 74 homes in the Midtown neighborhood that are being completed and residents have begun moving in. Last year, a TID in the Harambee neighborhood was approved to build 59 homes. Those homes will be completed within the next two years.

The Amani TID will be vetted during the next several months with several public hearings. If approved by the full Common Council and the Mayor, construction could begin later this year.

Millions of Americans don't have access to their birth certificates or passports. Half of Americans don't own a passport, and it costs, on average, \$130 to obtain one, meaning this legislation is little more than a Jim Crow-style "poll tax" for millions of low-income Americans. This would come as working people struggle to pay for food, gas, housing, and childcare because of Trump's failed economic policies and unnecessary wars.

The SAVE Act also overrides state election law, such as Wisconsin's, which allows voters to register to vote same-day, on-line, or by mail, a policy that is especially helpful to voters with disabilities and rural voters. It grants unprecedented power to an executive branch that has peddled voter fraud conspiracies, tried to blackmail states for election data, and relitigated Trump's 2020 election loss through efforts like FBI raids in Georgia and Arizona.

Specifically, this legislation would force state governments to hand over their voter files to the secretary of the Department of Homeland Security, a dubious proposition under the US Constitution.

The architect of this legislation, Representative Bryan Steil, who represents my birthplace of Racine, Wisconsin, would be disenfranchising his constituents, and millions of other Americans.

Despite Republican claims, actual cases of vote fraud are extremely rare, according to numerous studies. For example, the conservative Heritage Foundation did a comprehensive study tracking voter fraud going back 25 years and found actual instances of fraudulent votes to be .0000845 percent, which is 36 instances of fraudulent votes out of 42,626, 379 ballots cast.

The so-called SAVE America Act is nothing short of Jim Crow 2026. The Election Administration and Voting Survey 2022 Comprehensive Report says that approximately 112 million votes were cast in that midterm election. If you do simple math, you can see that Republicans estimate that the SAVE America Act would disenfranchise more than 20 million Americans!

Don't believe Republicans when they tell you the SAVE America Act is just a voter-ID bill. It is something far more insidious and uglier. Free and fair elections and equal access to the ballot box are the cornerstones of our democracy, which is why I voted against both versions in the House and believe that all Americans should oppose this legislation.

## As weather warms, residents are encouraged to report potholes

As the weather warms, potholes will become more apparent citywide, and Alderperson Jocasta Zamarripa is encouraging residents to take action by reporting any potholes they see in their neighborhoods.

"Potholes are popping up throughout my district and around the city. The Department of Public Works tries to address potholes as quickly as possible, but the first step in the process is identifying problem areas. Should you see a pothole on your block, in your neighborhood, or along your traffic route, please take a moment to report it so it can be patched in a timely manner," said Ald. Zamarripa.

Residents can report potholes to the Department of Public Works in several ways.

Per the Department of Public Works, the current average response time to a resident request is approximately seven days.

There have been more than 5,000 pothole requests submitted so far this year, an increase in typical year-to-date numbers.



## Milwaukee helped launch a public Montessori movement. 50 years later, educators are gathering to see the results!

**Montessori educators and thought leaders will assemble for a conference April 17-19 in a city at the vanguard of school choice and innovative models**

Over 50 years ago, Milwaukee Public Schools helped birth an alternative to one-size-fits-all public education.

This spring, the results will be in the spotlight as the National Center for Montessori in the Public Sector hosts its third-annual conference in Brew City.

Montessori emphasizes personalized learning through a child-led, hands-on approach that fosters engagement, collaboration, and agency. A growing body of research supports the learning method's measurably great outcomes.

Long a province of private schools, a growing movement shows the model to be equally effective and desired in public settings — and part of that movement was born in Southeastern Wisconsin.

In 1971, Milwaukee Public Schools opened one of the first publicly funded Montessori classrooms in the country. Today, the district operates seven Montessori programs serving close to 3,500 students, making it one of the largest and longest-running public Montessori systems in the country.

"Montessori nurtures children's curiosity and creativity while supporting academic and executive function growth" said Sara Suchman, National Center for Montessori in the Public Sector's Executive Director. "Public Montessori serves an estimated 200,000 students, more than half children of color and as likely as not to qualify under federal poverty measures. We chose Milwaukee for our conference because of its longstanding commitment to offering the gift of this life-changing model to all families."

The National Center for Montessori in the Public Sector (NCMPS) is a national nonprofit organization promoting and supporting tuition-free, publicly funded Montessori programs like Milwaukee's.

The three-day conference, which opens Friday, April 17, will feature visits to Milwaukee Public Schools' Montessori programs. These observations will give attendees a glimpse at what public Montessori can look like when it's

given the chance to flourish for decades.

"Our MPS Montessori schools live the Montessori model with fidelity and provide a high-quality education for our students," said Milwaukee Public Schools Superintendent Brenda Cassellius.

"We are honored to welcome educators and supporters from around the country to see what we do in person."

The following days will bring break-out sessions and a keynote that question in today's troubled world — what if we taught peace as a skill set with as much rigor as we teach reading and writing?

The speech will be delivered by Paul K. Chappell, a West Point graduate, Iraq War veteran, and founder of the Peace Literacy Institute; and Jacqui Miller, a longtime public Montessori educator and leader.

"Milwaukeeans should be proud of what they have here," Suchman said. "It's a big win for a city and a school district to maintain a flourishing system like this for decades. Milwaukee stands as an example for the nation."

The Public Montessori Conference and Retreat is the only national conference dedicated to public Montessori. April 17-19,

So, yeah — for this bill to be successful, it would have to pass through a GOP-controlled Congress, and subvert the president's veto power.

And even if, by some miracle, the bill is signed off on and a commission finds Trump unfit, Trump's band of sycophants, brainless butt-kissers and fellow dictator wannabees would have to sign off on his removal.

# Why a 2011 Harvard Paper on Racism is Still Salient

*According to the research, whites see race as a zero-sum game*

In 2011, the Harvard Business School released a study by Norton and Sommers on white Americans' perceptions of race.

The study involved asking Black and white Americans across the Overton window how they perceived any changes in anti-Black bias, as well as anti-white bias, over the course of the multiple decades leading up to 2010.

The participants were instructed to chart how these two forms of bias had, in their view, shifted over time.

What the researchers found in the data was fascinating and echoes the long history of racial progress under the racial regime.

What became the crux of the paper's writing was the disparity between Black and white perceptions of racial bias.

What differentiated the two was a sort of zero-sum race logic that white people had and Black people did not. Conservative white Americans reported anti-Black bias decreasing since the 60s, with anti-white bias increasing.

This suggests a zero-sum game that Black people are winning. Liberal whites charted anti-Black bias increasing over time, with anti-white bias decreasing.

This indicates a zero-sum game that white people are winning. Both conservatives and liberals had a zero-sum race logic, just with different conclusions.

This reflects broader societal racial narratives about how progress for people of color allegedly comes at the expense of whites. Race-conscious affirmative action programs are accused of harming white people.

In a system like affirmative admissions programs designed to counter deeply pervasive structural white

dominance, conservative white Americans often see reverse racism.

Trump has said that DEI and civil rights laws hurt white people. He and other white conservatives claim that giving people of color help in hiring, the workplace culture, or civil rights is a gain for minorities and thus a loss for the majority.

This pattern of zero-sum thinking about race is a form of racial resentment rooted in the long history of white supremacy.

Further, research shows that white people who perceive racism as a zero-sum game in which Black people are winning against whites

## Following Storm Damage, Wisconsin Consumers Should Use Caution When Seeking Repairs

MADISON— This week, thunderstorms, high winds, tornadoes, flooding, and hail struck communities across Wisconsin. Homes and vehicles may be damaged and in need of repair work. The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) reminds consumers that they should practice caution when seeking repairs.

Consumers with homes damaged during the recent storms should avoid hiring a door-to-door home repair crew. These transient crews are known as “storm chasers” because they travel to communities struck by severe weather and solicit business at consumer homes. Despite their tempting promises of quick, cheap fixes, transient repair crews often provide poor quality work or ask for up-front payments, then perform no work at all. They are often not from Wisconsin, so if something goes wrong, it may be impossible for a consumer to get their money back.

### Tips for Homeowners

#### Seeking Repair Contractors

- Hire established local contractors.
- Ask for recommendations from trusted sources like friends, neighbors, and insurance agents.
- Check with a local building inspector if permits are needed for the repair job, then have them inspect the completed work before making final payments to the contractor.
- Make sure there is a written contract which specifies what work will be done, what materials will be used, a start and completion date, and warranty details.
- Receive lien waivers for every payment made for home repairs to any hired contractors.
- Keep copies of all contracts, receipts, communications, warranties, and written materials.

Homes are not the only property that may have sustained severe weather damage. Many consumers rely on their motor vehicles for everyday transportation, and seeking repairs can be a stressful experience. Consumers can protect themselves by knowing their rights, resources, and these auto repair tips:

#### Tips for Vehicle Owners Seeking Auto Body Work

- Ask for shop recommendations from friends, family, and other local sources they trust. If the work will be covered by insurance, select a shop with the insurance provider.
- Search for online reviews of the company and contact the DATCP Bureau of Consumer Protection to check if a specific shop has a record of complaints.
- Document all transactions and communications, including specific dates, times, expenses, promises made, and the names of shop employees.

Auto body repair shops cannot make repairs that the owner did not authorize or increase the price of those repairs without authorization after the consumer received an estimate or quote. A shop may hold a vehicle until the consumer pays for authorized repairs but cannot hold the vehicle if they refuse to pay for unauthorized repairs. After work is complete, the shop must provide an invoice describing and listing the cost for all repairs, replaced parts, and labor.

#### Insurance Tips

The Office of the Commissioner of Insurance (OCI) published an After a Storm Hits Fact Sheet which can help consumers understand their policy options and coverage. After severe weather strikes, consumers should:

- Notify their insurance agent or company right away to begin the insurance claim process.
- Make a list of damaged items, including any damage to the home's structure.
- Take photos of damages, including dented siding, damaged shingles, broken windshields, etc.
- Keep swatches of damaged material like shingles and siding.
- Keep damaged items – they should not be thrown out without the claim adjuster's agreement.
- Retain all receipts for repairs or replacement of damaged property.

State law protects consumers and businesses against insurance fraud. In Wisconsin, contractors:

- Cannot promise to pay any portion of an owner's property insurance deductible.
- Cannot negotiate with an insurance company on behalf of a customer. Contractors can only discuss damages and costs with insurers with the customer's permission.
- Must ask if the work is related to an insurance claim before they enter into a contract.
- Must notify customers of their right to cancel the contract within three business days if their insurer denies any portion of the claim for work.

Ideally, patients, regardless of their race or gender, should expect to receive quality care from healthcare professionals. However, in America, Black women are subjected to medical racism, which threatens their health and safety.

Consider, for instance, a case recently highlighted by the Atlanta Black Star, which involved six hundred women, most of whom are Black, who became victims of medical malpractice.

According to the lawsuit filed last December, a physician, Javaid Perwaiz, performed "unnecessary, uninformed, harmful, and invasive, unlawful, and life-altering gynecologic medical procedures on them and other women, for nearly a decade at the Chesapeake Regional Medical Center."

While doctors take an oath to "do no harm," and prioritize the care of their patients, the mistreatment of Black women in this case suggests some healthcare professionals fail to meet that standard.

The victims are seeking accountability not only from the physician accused of performing unnecessary surgeries and medical procedures without their informed consent but also from hospital leadership.

Systemic abuses often take place because those in positions of power are either complicit or negligent. In this case, the surgical department initially thought that "Perwaiz [was] unacceptable for appointment due to his Maryview suspension." However, the filing claimed that Donald S. Buckley, the CEO from 1978 to 2005, granted him "privileges to practice," despite clear red flags.

A letter dated December 4, 1997, addressed to the Chesapeake Medical Executive Committee and Administration issued a warning. They wrote that "after reviewing a recent operating room where Dr. Perwaiz had seven cases scheduled back-to-back in one day, with one case involving a 22-year-old who was having both ovaries removed, and none of the patients [were] older than 44 years, [they believed] Dr. Perwaiz... returned to the type of behavior that has had him to be dismissed from two hospital staffs, convicted of two felonies," accusing him of using bribes to "maintain his practice."

The fact that any physician could spend so much of their career performing "unnecessary and uninformed" procedures on Black women highlights the silent, yet harmful effects of medical racism in America. According to their lawsuit, the hospital leadership failed "to suspend, limit, or restrict Perwaiz's credentials or privileges given his risk to patient safety," and they blatantly ignored concerns raised by "staff, nurses, patients, or other physicians." They reportedly approved of his practice "based on financial motivation rather than patient safety or quality standards."

An FBI report states that the physician became skilled at manipulating his patients, "telling them they had cancer or were at serious risk for it." Telling them that their health was at risk, combined with his presumed authority as a medical professional, turned these women into "the perfect victims for his crimes."

While his patients believed they were receiving quality medical care and guidance, he betrayed their confidence. Not all cases of medical racism are this extreme or blatant. But the experience of feeling mis-

## How Medical Racism Threatens the Health and Safety of Black Women

A case of forced sterilization highlights a disturbing pattern

motivation was purely "financial," it's hard to imagine the race and class of his victims played no role. After all, the wanton disregard for Black women made them especially vulnerable.

If the civil lawsuit is settled in favor of the plaintiffs, there may be increased public acknowledgment of the harm caused, as the hospital may face financial consequences of the injustices Black women and others endured.

However, whether healthcare facilities will do more to protect Black women and other marginalized groups from medical racism and prejudicial treatment remains an open question.

Part of the problem is that many people view these cases of Black women being subjected to forced sterilization and other medical procedures as individual injustices rather than part of a disturbing pattern. But when we consider the history of medical mistreatment of Black women in this country, the connection comes into focus. The so-called "father of gynecology," J. Marion Sims, performed experiments on enslaved women without anesthesia. Much of what he learned about the female reproductive system, including the development of a "reliable surgical repair for vesicovaginal fistulas," a complication arising from traumatic childbirth, can be traced back to the hours of torture endured by Anarcha, Betsey, Lucy, and others.

During chattel slavery, the ability of Black women to reproduce was seen as an asset to slave owners, as their children were considered chattel and added to their wealth. Yet "once slavery was abolished and Black children no longer had monetary value, it became common for physicians to sterilize Black women without their consent (Averbach et al., 2023)."

A study conducted by Gregory N. Price and William A. Darity Jr. found that "in the State of North Carolina between 1958 and 1968, "the incidence of sterilization was conditioned on race, as the probability of institutional and total sterilization rose with the black population share." This was predicated upon the "stigma of a belief in black biogenetic inferiority," which "shaped a vulgar social outcome," in this case "racially disparate state-sanctioned eugenic sterilization."

This belief that White, wealthy people should procreate, and Black, poor people shouldn't, was central to the eugenics movement in this country. Michael Murphy, a historian who specializes in African American history, noted that the Mississippi Legislature, "on the eve of the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964," made it a felony to have children outside a marriage.

"Violators of the proposed law would have to choose between serving a one-to-three-year prison sentence or submit to sterilization in lieu of imprisonment."

Like in North Carolina, doctors throughout the South disproportionately sterilized Black women. Fannie Lou Hamer, the civil rights activist who challenged the racial discrimination Black voters faced, also became a victim of forced sterilization, a procedure so commonly performed in the state that it became known as a Mississippi Appendectomy.

Within this country, Black women continue to endure medical racism. As a consequence, they are not provided with the quality of care they deserve, and this has had negative health consequences.

For instance, they are more than three times as likely to die from pregnancy-related causes, which researchers attribute to a "variation in quality healthcare and underlying chronic conditions." It's estimated that "80% of pregnancy-related deaths in the U.S. are preventable." So, it is not unreasonable to believe that we should be doing more to protect Black women.

This shouldn't only apply to an extreme case in which a physician is accused for defrauding the government and patients, but also to the care routinely provided.

For instance, one report found "observers disproportionately underestimated women of color's pain compared to all other groups," which in this case included men of color, White women, and men (Ruben & Stosic, 2024). It stands to reason that we should confront the prejudice within our healthcare system. While most physicians claim they treat patients equally, disparities persist, and we have to reckon with what this means for Black women.

treated is common for Black women. In one study, 94% of African American women participants "felt as if they were receiving poorer service during medical visits (Washington & Randall, 2022)." One woman encapsulated this feeling by saying, they "aren't taken seriously."

Following a jury trial, Parwaiz was sentenced to 59 years in federal prison for healthcare fraud and false statements in May 2021.

The Justice Department noted that between 2010 and 2019, he engaged in an elaborate scheme, which they described.

He "induced patients prior to 39 weeks of gestation, contrary to the medical standard of care," and "persuaded women to undergo invasive and irreversible surgeries, such as hysterectomies, that were not medically necessary."

In doing so, he not only deprived these women of their rights as patients but also jeopardized their reproductive health and the lives of their newborns.

Parwaiz "routinely billed health care benefit programs for two in-office diagnostic procedures, namely hysteroscopies and colposcopies, that he did not actually perform," and used "fabricated results" to convince patients to allow him to schedule "more invasive surgeries."

Finally, he performed sterilization procedures, typically bilateral tubal ligations, without the necessary 30-day waiting period, in violation of Medicaid standards and federal regulations.

## Black Nonprofits Didn't See Lasting Funding Gains After 2020 Racial Reckoning

After the deaths of Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, and George Floyd in 2020, there was a nationwide "racial reckoning." There were protests, social media campaigns, and pledges from several companies to invest in Black businesses and nonprofits in a show of solidarity. Apparently, all that "solidarity" was a performance, as Black-led nonprofits haven't received any long-term financial support since.

According to AP, research conducted by the nonprofit research service Candid and the Black philanthropy group ABFE found that most of the money donated to larger Black-led nonprofits was raised between 2020 and 2022. Smaller, local Black-led nonprofits saw no significant increase in funding through the short-lived surge. The research found that while 70% of white-led nonprofits received foundation grants, only half of Black-led nonprofits received similar grants, and usually for significantly less money.

"Despite their years of impact, many Black nonprofit leaders report struggling to form sustained partnerships with foundations," Ann Mei Chang, CEO at Candid, said in the report. "There's a misconception that Black-led nonprofits received a windfall of funding following the 2020 racial justice movement. Data like this enables us to demonstrate what is actually occurring in the funding landscape and spark a productive, sector-wide discourse on what Black-led nonprofits need from private foundations."

Asiaha Butler, the CEO of the Resident Association of Greater Englewood, which was founded 15 years ago to help combat the negative narratives surrounding South Side Chicago, told AP that her organization received dozens of new backers in the summer of 2020. "All of a sudden, we were desirable for people to fund," recalled Butler. She added that the "spurt" became a "curse" as it became clear the surge in funding would be short-lived.

"We started seeing this revenue and thinking we're gaining really great relationships with funders," Butler told AP. "And, really, those priorities shifted quickly." Butler added that "Priorities have shifted" has become a common refrain she's heard from those previous backers, as well as being told they have "new strategic goals."

"Little buzz words that just say perhaps this nonprofit — grassroots, Black-led, very focused on the Black population — is probably just not in peoples' cards to continue to support," she said.

Instead of the foundations using the moment to build lasting relationships with Black-led nonprofits, the general feeling among the CEO's interviewed is that the brief surge was simply transactional for the donors. T'Pring Westbrook, a nonresident fellow at the Urban Institute's Center on Nonprofits and Philanthropy, cofounded a consulting group that works with small nonprofits. Westbrook has found that the issue isn't necessarily that foundations don't want to support marginalized communities, but that they only do so through "trend funding."

"Maybe during Black History Month, there will be a funding campaign," Westbrook told AP. "But the thing about a campaign is a campaign doesn't build sustainability."

It'd be one thing if these Black-led nonprofits simply had to return to the status quo they were operating in before the donation surge, but now they're dealing with a government that is actively combative against their work. The Trump administration's ongoing attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) initiatives have led to several companies and schools walking back their pledges to diversity.

Compounding the issue is that many of the moves made by the Trump administration are actively hurting the communities that rely on these Black-led nonprofits. The GOP's allowing Affordable Care Act subsidies to expire dramatically increased health care costs, the war in Iran has increased food and gas prices, and it also doesn't help that layoffs within the federal government have disproportionately affected Black women.

"We're literally being asked to do more with less resources," Black Voters Matter cofounder Cliff Albright told AP.

While the picture painted by the data isn't great, Candid and ABFE's report did outline several solutions that philanthropists and foundations could adopt to address the funding disparity. One of the key steps would be to move away from "trend funding" and actively build lasting relationships with Black-led nonprofits. While Black folks need to support our organizations when we can, it's simply a struggle for Black-led nonprofits to be impactful without significant, long-term investment.

also overestimate social progress for racial minorities.

As whites pivot away from facing the experiences of people of color with racism both historically and contemporarily, and toward a worldview where white people are the victims, the potential for society to progress becomes more mitigated.

We know that racial inequality hurts everyone. From public pools local leaders chose to close rather than integrate, to environmental racism hurting poor white communities, the subordination of non-white people impacts all groups.

Progress for people of color uplifts society as a whole, including white people.

That 2011 study is still relevant today. As white America embraces MAGA, the justifications for repealing HBCU funding, cancelling grants for research on Black maternal mortality, attacking birthright citizenship, engaging in mass detentions of immigrants, and more, all lie in zero-sum thinking — that somehow undocumented immigrants living on U.S. soil, or Black and brown students benefitting from affirmative action, or diversity broadly, all take something away from white people.
